Experts Favor Falls River Project

AFTER LONG ABSENCE STEAMER PRINCE RUPERT BACK IN HER HOME PORT

Local Pulp Manufacturing Concern Plans to Interest Eastern Capital in Power

W. J. Barrows, consulting hydraulic engineer for the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., J. P. Leland, superintendent of construction, H. P. Crowell, resident engineer, and E. F. Duby, local manager, returned by the company launch Seal Cove from a trip to the Falls River on Monday night. The trip took three days and a thorough physical examination was made of the power project at the Establi River. A great deal of data was obtained and a little taken of the dam site. All the information will be used in the making of estimates on costs.

Mr. Barrows, as well as Mr. Leland and Mr. Crowell, both of whom have had considerable experience in hydraulic engineering, look upon the Falls River project with a good deal of interest. It is one that is believed would answer well to the large extent that is being considered by the company. Mr. Barrows is setting out a preliminary plan for the project.

Packed to the doors with smiling and merry chattering children bursting with excitement and high spirits, the Westholme Theatre presented a bright and inspiring appearance on Monday afternoon. The occasion was a grand rally of the children of the city under the auspices of the Municipal Chapter of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire to listen to the age worn story which is epitomized in the two beautiful Latin words, "Pro Patria" (for our country).

ELECTIONS IN ULSTER HELD

Charges of Intimidation and Beat-ing Are Made by Both Sides.

BALLOT COUNTING WAS STARTED THIS MORNING

BELFAST, May 25.—Wholesale charges of intimidation by beatings and threats during the balloting in Ulster today have been made by the Nationalists and Unionists. Each side appears to conceal the fact that personation has been carried on to an unprecedented extent. The city has returned to an almost normal condition after a night of excitement. Following the elections crowds remaining on the streets until late and the stragglers had to be sent home by the police.

The election officials, this morning, began to count the votes cast in the elections yesterday for the members of the new North of Ireland parliament.

While here, Rev. Liacopoulos will hold baptismal services for seven little Greek children who have been born in Prince Rupert.

PRINCE RUPERT IS BACK AGAIN

Popular Coaster Presents Pleasing Appearance After Complete Repairs Made.

Presenting a very pleasing picture, the steamer Prince Rupert, Captain H. L. Robertson, sailed into the harbor at noon today for the first time since the Swanson Bay disaster of eight months ago. The vessel had a good list of passengers and a big freight cargo.

There are some specially attractive new features on the vessel, chief of which perhaps is the observation saloon, which has been entirely refurnished in selected birdseye maple. Inch deep carpets cover the first cabin decks and the staterooms have been refitted with new equipment of the best quality.

There has been little change in the machinery of the vessel with the exception that the steering gear has been altered to direct control. When the ship met with her accident the rudder was operated by a telemotor and some doubt was expressed at the marine inquiry as to the satisfactory working of the mechanism.

Special Trips.

The Prince Rupert took the place of the Prince George at Vancouver on Saturday night when she made the run to Victoria and Seattle. The Prince George, has now gone to Esquimalt where she will be until the end of this week. Next Saturday night she will leave Vancouver on a special run to Prince Rupert carrying passengers and mail, arriving here on Monday morning. On her arrival here she will go into the dry dock to complete her annual overhaul.

On Saturday, June 5, the Prince George will leave at midnight for Vancouver on another special trip carrying passengers and freight, calling at Swanson Bay and Ocean Falls. At Vancouver she will pick up the Board of Trade excursion and return north. When she again gets back south the double summer service will be commenced with the trip from Seattle on June 12.

BOYS OF BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL ARE BEING ORGANIZED

SETTLEMENT OF DIFFICULTIES IN UPPER SILESIA

PARIS, May 25.—The latest plan for the settlement of the Upper Silesian controversy is reported to be a British suggestion that Germany and Poland be given respectively the communes that voted in their favor in the recent plebiscite but that the territory be held under the control of a special commission for thirty years.

CANADA'S HEART IS STILL TRUE

Premier Meighen Says Country Would Again Rise to Occasion.

OTTAWA, May 25.—Replying to the speech of the Right Honourable J. W. Lowther, former speaker of the British House of Commons, who after the presentation of the new speaker's chair to Canada was the guest of the Canadian branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association, Premier Meighen declared that the heart of Canada, which brought her into the war on August 4, 1914, was as true now as it was then and that if a similar occasion arose in the future her actions would be identical.

VERNON, May 25.—James McCulloch, a driver from Sumas Lake, fell into the swift flowing water while breaking up a log jam near here and was drowned. The body was yet unrecovered. McCulloch was a returned soldier and had been overseas for four years.

Colonel Lowery Goes Beyond.

Colonel Lowery, publisher of "The Ledge," at various times in many of the towns of the southern interior of British Columbia, has told his last joke, written his last witty sentence and gone to the place where newspapermen go. He has been a notable character. He was not always orthodox and because of that he was always interesting. He had a caustic-tipped pen, there was just a touch of vitrol in his makeup, but he softened it all with the heaven of humor and those who would have been angry were bound to smile.

Lowery was an institution. His paper was never well supported because he was too outspoken for a businessman. Because of the lack of support it was never large or prosperous in appearance. In spite of this it was read by everyone and was one of the most welcome exchanges in most of the newspaper offices in B. C.

Building Movement Gaining Headway.

The building movement is gaining headway in this city. New houses and blocks are being planned and there seems a likelihood that before long there will be quite a stir in this line of industry.

The lower prices on lumber is giving an impetus to the building movement. There are not enough houses and there seems every probability that before long at least twice as many will be required as there are here today. Someone must build these. Apartment houses in particular will always be in demand, for this is a climate particularly suited to apartments. It is good news that some people are having faith enough in the city to erect buildings here.

Many New Boats Added to Fleet.

Boats are continually being added to the local fleet. This year a great many fine little craft have been built at this port and others are under construction or being planned. All these make business. A boat is worth as much to the city as a house, often much more. For every boat built there should be a house built. This is the sort of thing that builds up the community. The more mosquito boats we have, the more prosperous we shall be.

Daughters of Empire Not Forgetting Duty.

It is indeed gratifying to witness such a demonstration of patriotism as that which was given at the Westholme Theatre on Monday afternoon. In these times, after the days of war and strife, one is apt to forget the lessons that were taught, but the Daughters of the Empire are not doing so. In teaching the children their duties towards the Empire and the feeling that should be manifested towards it they are doing a work that cannot be overestimated in its value. After all the children are the coming generation and the destiny of the Empire will ultimately be in their hands.

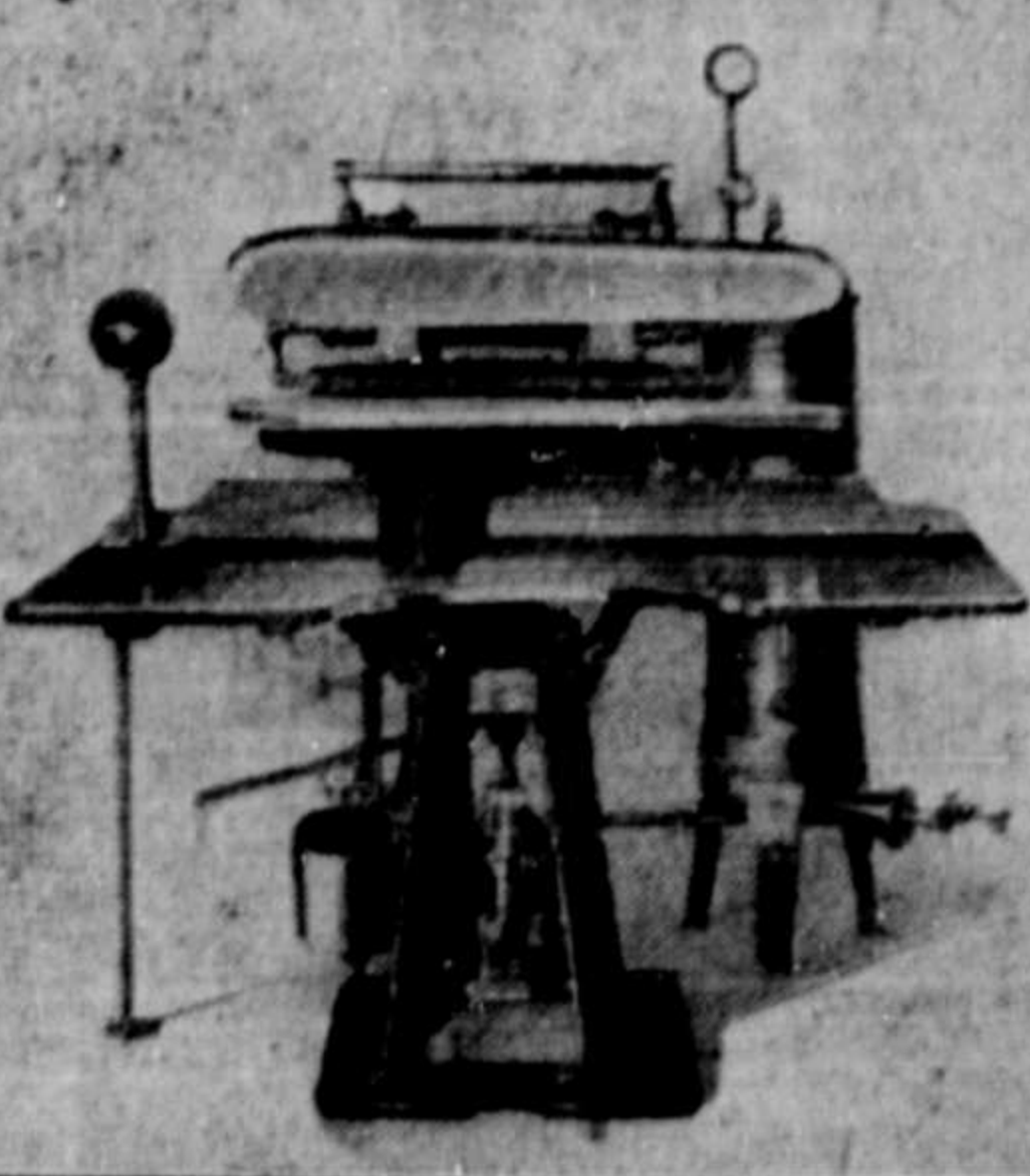
