Shipping Man Writes of Prince Rupert Giving Nautical View of Port and Its Future Possibilities

Prince Rupert is a Pacific Coast terminus of the Canadian National (Trans-Continental) Railway and is the third largest seaport in British Columbia. It is located on one of the finest natural harbors in the world, about ten miles long and from one to three miles in width, and is open all the year round, being entirely free from ice conditions,
