present there are only three express passenger trains a week and out of the city, the reason for the poor communication being the small amount of travel on the line. If there was a business there could be express trains.

As has before been said, there is plenty of fish offering if cars were only available to carry it to market. With plenty of cars there could be a daily fish auction and the cars might well be shipped each day to the regular express train. This would give daily service and all the expenses of the train would be covered by the fish shipments. A matter was mentioned some time ago by F. G. Dawson at a meeting of the Board of Trade that came up again at the meeting of the council of the city held this week. It was pointed out that the possibility of a daily train service would very largely offset the fish situation. If there are cars, there is a possibility of getting daily passenger service.

Service Brings Business
While the amount of business along the line just now is very large, it will increase. Trains are coming in to the valleys of the interior and makes travel. Prince Rupert is steadily growing and the possibilities of the city are becoming every year more apparent. All developments add to the travel and an improved service would to a very great extent increase the business offering. It would be a thing for Prince Rupert to have a daily service because of the people going through the city and they will not delay their trip for two or three days.

BANDON FORT NORMAN TRIP

Decision of Dominion Government in Suspending Staking Privileges is Damper

DAWSON, Jan. 29.—Several parties outfitting here preparatory to pushing 500 miles over snow with dog teams and sleds and other supplies to the oil lands in the Fort Norman district will probably abandon or shorten their trip on account of the graphic advices received by Commissioner G. Mackenzie of the federal government had suspended until further notice the privileges for staking or otherwise acquiring oil lands in the Northwest Territories. The gold commissioner has notified several interested parties, notably many men who had headed Hootalingua from Victoria, B. C.

Shortage of Cars Boat Goes South

Commonwealth's 80,000 Pounds would have Meant \$11,000 Sale and \$2,400 Express Tolls

The halibut schooner Commonwealth, with 80,000 pounds of fish which she offered for sale on the local market, cleared last evening for Seattle, forced to the American port, 600 miles away, on account of the refrigerator car shortage.

Of the five cars available yesterday to the local fish concerns, four were sent east with the fish bought up at yesterday morning's sale and the other one went east with fish for the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Company.

There is but one car in sight now and the usual week-end arrivals will likely arrive today and tomorrow morning. The Commonwealth would have received \$11,000 for her catch, could she have sold here and the express company loses \$2,400 in tolls for four cars of fish. If more fish has to be turned away tomorrow on account of the car shortage more money will thus be lost to this port and Canada.

E. E. Campbell, of Granby Management, has Resigned

Mining Expert of Anyox Will Take Responsible Position in Southwestern States; Munro on Way North

VANCOUVER, January 29.—E. E. Campbell, assistant general manager of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Co., has resigned and leaves in two weeks to take a responsible position with a large copper corporation in the southwestern states.

Mr. Campbell was one of the most prominent of the province's mining men and before becoming assistant general manager of the Granby company under the H. S. Munro management, was mine superintendent under W. A. Williams. He was one of the few officials who survived the general shake-up in the management last summer.

The announcement was made co-incidental with the return on Thursday of H. S. Munro, general manager, from a directors' meeting in New York City. Mr. Munro left on the Chelohsin last night for the north.

GERMANY TO PAY BIG SUM

Fifty-Six Billion Dollars to Be Handed Over for Reparations.

PARIS, Jan. 29.—The Allied Supreme Council has approved of the plan for German reparations as drafted by its special committee. This provides for a payment by Germany of 226 billion gold marks, equivalent to 56 billion dollars at the normal exchange.

The payments will be made in 42 annual installments on a rising scale beginning with payments of two billion marks in the first two years and an additional payment of twelve per cent tax on German exports. Eight per cent discount will be made on payments made in advance.

PLEBISCITE NECESSARY

If Provincial Government Wishes Monopoly Must Do It Under Doherty Act.

REPLY WILL BE SENT TO PREMIER OLIVER

OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—If the British Columbia government wishes to have a monopoly of the supplying of liquor to the citizens of that province, the legislature will have to formally request the Dominion to take a plebiscite under the Doherty Act as was recently done in the three prairie provinces. That in effect will be the answer of the federal authorities to the request of Premier Oliver for special legislation to give the B. C. Government the sole right to import liquor.

Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Owes City at Least \$400,000

Was Granted Remission of Taxes for Specific Purpose; Agreement has Not Been Carried Out; Amount May be Collectable by Law

RECORD OUTPUT OF LOGS DURING 1920

Twenty Million Feet Were Scaled by Government Officials.

VICTORIA, Jan. 29.—In spite of the declining lumber production and the temporary closing of many of the camps during the last months of 1920, the year breaks all records in log production. During the year the lumber scaled by government officials is equivalent to 2,046,000,000 feet board measure, compared with 1,758,000,000 feet in 1919.

HOBO QUEEN IS DROWNED

Girl Who Was Here Recently Jumps Into River at Westminster.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 29.—Evelyn Butler, seventeen years of age, of Prince George, jumped into the Fraser River this afternoon and after swimming 50 yards towards shore was drowned.

This is the girl who recently passed through Prince Rupert and made herself notorious on the steamer Prince George as Queen of the Hoboes. She jumped from the bridge today in order to escape arrest after escaping from the girls' home.

It is estimated that the Grand Trunk Railway Company owes the city of Prince Rupert half a million dollars in taxes remitted on the understanding that certain improvements were made. These improvements have not been made, hence the money is still owing.

A careful calculation has been made of the amounts which would have been collected had there been no tax remission scheme put forward. Based on the actual assessment as it appears on the city books today the Railway Company should have paid the city during the past ten years and should be paid. The half million would build a nice little station and roundhouse and a few other improvements as well.

Poor Assessment.

It is pointed out, however, that owing to the fact that the G. T. P. taxes were not affected by the assessment there was a good deal of carelessness in making that assessment which in equity should have been much higher.

The amount owing by the company is based, not on the actual tax rate levied but on the rate as it would have been if the G. T. P. had paid their taxes like others. To illustrate this: In 1920 the local tax rate was 25.168. If the G. T. P. had paid their taxes the rate would have been 20.143. In making the calculation of the amount owing by the company, the latter rate is used, which is much smaller than if calculated on the actual rate.

It is estimated that an equitable assessment on the G. T. P. properties would have been \$1,500,000. If this had been the valuation, the total taxes due by the company to the city would have been for the ten years \$743,967.87, from which deduct the amount actually paid under the improvement agreement \$165,000 and the amount now due the city owing to failure of the company to fulfill its part of the agreement is \$578,967.87.

Recoverable By Law.

Churchill Boom in British Politics

Times Announces Election Likely in late Spring; Lower Taxation Forecasted in coming Budget

LONDON, January 29.—Winston Churchill, the new secretary of state for the colonies, will inherit the estate of the late Lord Herbert Vane Tempest, a cousin, who died some time ago from injuries in a railway collision in Wales.

Political circles are eagerly discussing the possibility of Churchill now aspiring to become leader of a political party and ultimately prime minister.

The London Times says Lloyd George has sent instructions from Paris for the coalition party, which he leads, to be ready for a general election in May or June after the introduction of the budget which will take place early in April.

The same paper comments that it appears the prime minister and chancellor of the exchequer have decided it is possible to introduce a budget to provide for £50,000,000 which would allow considerable remission of taxation compared with former years and thus afford a favorable opportunity for appealing to the country.

Two Big Camps In Northern B. C.

There will be two important mining camps in northern British Columbia in the very near future, Alice Arm and Stewart. That seems assured. The recent reports from the Premier mine are most encouraging.

Reports from the Spider group in the same neighborhood are that ore shipments will be made before spring. Other developments are going on in that district, all of which point to a rich camp.

At Alice Arm the Dolly Varden is temporarily shut down, but a number of important ore strikes have been made within the last few months which go to show that both on the Kitsault and on the Illiance rivers there will be good producing mines.

Making First Move Toward Good Exhibition.

The first move was made last night toward the holding of a bigger and better fair this year than has ever been held here before. Attempts are to be made to get the districts to cooperate. Already the natives have expressed their intention of competing with each other for suitable prizes and it is to be hoped that the farmers of the interior will be induced to join in making the event a notable one.

Non Voters Must Register Again.

Those who did not vote at the last provincial election must register in order to get their names again on the list of voters. Automatically their names were struck off because they failed to exercise their franchise.

In order to register it is necessary to call on the government agent or a commissioner authorized to do the work, and there fill out the form and make the necessary affidavit. It will take but a few minutes and should not be neglected. No one can tell what may happen. There may be a plebiscite and there may be a Dominion election.

Churchill Boom Unaccountable.

There seems to be a Churchill boom in the Old Country. These booms are unaccountable. Sometimes they are manipulated, but it is difficult to do it in the case of a political leader such as the one in question. It is a psychological phase that seems to sweep through a country and move the people to a certain line of action.

Fish Cars Are Conversation Topic.

Since the publication of the news recently in connection with activities with a view to securing fish cars to serve this port, the subject of fish cars has been the principal subject of conversation in and around the city. Its importance is fully realized and it is to be hoped that nothing will be left undone which might in any way affect the issue.

In the Letter Box

ACTION ADVISED REGARDING RAILWAY SITUATION

Editor, Daily News—I think you pretty nearly strike the right note in your editorial when you say it is about time the people of Prince Rupert took the law into their own hands in connection with the thing called a railway system with which this place has been cursed since its inception. A retrospect of that organism seems to justify the opinion that it was conceived in sin, born in iniquity and nursed by insolent incompetence and matured in corruption until, when at the point of death through gangrene, the unsavory mess was dumped into the palsied hands of a quack physician called a government, whose final function will be that of undertaker unless by the miraculous interposition of some higher power the dying thief is rescued from a dishonorable grave at the eleventh hour and given a chance to make tardy restitution to an outraged community.

Proofs are Legion

The history of its dealings with Prince Rupert is a shameful record of contemptuous neglect, abysmal incompetence and deliberate deception—a persistent policy of insult and injury in its most extreme form. The available proofs of the correctness of this accusation are legion in number, running through all the years from the clearing of the townsite to the memorable occasion about a year ago when two of the leading Western officials of the nefarious corporation appeared before a specially convened meeting of the business men of this city, and, instead of realizing the importance of the occasion and trying to talk sense, disported themselves like a brace of buffoons, making hard but futile efforts to be funny, and with cool effrontery explaining that their inability to say anything worth listening to was due to the sleepless nights they had spent since arriving in our most hospitable town!

We listened to their imbecile twaddle, and I believe we actually applauded it, when by right we should have hissed them off the floor. But after all perhaps their performance was a suitable valedictory deliverance for a place which they had, no doubt, been taught by the mandarins above them to regard as a joke.

No Better Treatment

Have we any reason for expecting better treatment from the new controllers? What has happened? It is many months since Minister of Railways Reid—a manifest assassin—and President of Railways

Hanna—an omniscient oracle—paid their first visit to Prince Rupert, to see things for themselves and, presumably, to do their duty. The former, with a sublime audacity, worthy of a cabinet harlequin of much longer standing, informed us that up to that moment he was not aware there was no railway station in Prince Rupert and then with mock solicitude and sympathy assured us that that and several other of our just grievances would be remedied without delay.

One Promise Fulfilled

With a solemnity becoming his position the all-wise President also gave us to understand that our wrongs would be righted, and was considerate enough to assure us that our freight rates would shortly be increased. This special promise was promptly carried out, and it is the only one of the many made to us that has been even partially fulfilled.

The Greatest

These direct descendants of Ananias and Sapphira had not proceeded very far on their voyage of discovery, as they described their tour, before another ambassador from the temple of fame at Ottawa bore down upon us in solemn state and lonely grandeur, and as we listened to the gracious words that fell from his lips we all with one consent exclaimed: "The greatest of these is Ballantyne," and we felt that in him we had a friend indeed by whom our troubles would be ended once for all. "To soothe our sorrows, heal our wounds and drive away our fears," this great and good authority on ships and fish magnanimously volunteered to use his utmost efforts (mysterious phrase) to secure for us a wharf about two hundred feet longer than the one for which the contract was just then being placed!

Idol of Our Hearts

Who that was present can ever forget the broad grins of delight and gratitude that accompanied our thumpings of the table and rattlings of the festive cutlery when the oracle, who by this time had become the Idol of our Hearts, thus showed his determination to heap coals of kindly fire upon our heads, granting us more than we had asked or thought of!

Our grief at the departure of Benefactor Ballantyne was only rendered bearable by the consoling reflection that the two hundred feet of bonus wharf would furnish us with a perpetual reminder of him, on which we could at all times kneel and bless his memory and praise his name. I am fully satisfied that the reason nothing has since been heard about the bogus (I beg pardon, I mean "bonus") addition is simply that it has been reliably ascertained by the sanhedrin at Ottawa that there is no material in existence of fine enough quality to be suitable for the bally benediction, and so instead of a Ballantyne blessing we have a cabinet curse.

Effective Means

But now, seriously, Mr. Editor, what silly suckers we have been all these years for these "Wise men from the East"—these transportation tramps and ministerial mountebanks, and how they must laugh at us over their coffee and cigars as they range the plains in their private cars!

As you say—What is the meaning of it all? How long are we going to put up with it? What are we going to do about it? Well, whether or not any governmental "studjes in wood" with which we may be insulted happen to be cremated prematurely—by

the discarded Lucifer of a pensive smoker, or any other accidental cause—we ought to be able by concerted and vigorous action to discover and use effective weapons for our purpose, without necessarily violating what is called The Law.

Mass Meeting

Why not have a mass meeting of the citizens, called immediately, at which the feelings and determination of the people would be expressed in no uncertain manner, and certain definite actions decided upon, which could hardly fail to produce results—in fact we could see to it that the desired results would be secured or very unpleasant happenings take place. All that is required is determined combination.

If the curse we are suffering under continues it will be our own fault. Let us rise up and end it like men, pulling together and standing by one another loyally in any action that may be decided upon at a public meeting. If we do we are bound to win. We shall be less than men if we tolerate this odious condition of affairs any longer.

If we are not worms afraid even to turn let us prove it by taking up the weapons within our reach and using them. They could be mentioned at a public meeting convened by the Mayor and supported by the Board of Trade and our gallant member, Colonel Peck. J. E. MAGUIRE.

MORE MARINE INVESTIGATIONS

Members of International Committee Appointed by Canada

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—W. A. Found, assistant deputy minister of fisheries, Loring C. Christ and Dr. A. C. Huntman, of the marine biological board, have been named as members of the international committee on marine fisheries investigations, which will determine the measures of co-operation desirable in regard to scientific investigation of the deep sea fisheries adjacent to both coasts.

TIE INDUSTRY AND EMBARGO

Canadian National will not Accept Western Hemlock — Is Superior Timber.

An embargo that the Canadian National Railways has placed on hemlock ties has practically put the tie cutting industry between here and Hazelton out of business. The company has sent out an order to the tie cutting contractors that their ties must not be more than 10 per cent hemlock. As the timber between here and Hazelton is largely hemlock the industry is thus crippled.

This action of the railway, it is believed, was taken from the standpoint of the quality of eastern hemlock. The eastern timber is unsuitable for ties but the western hemlock is altogether different and, in the opinion of expert timber men, is of equal or better quality than jack pine which is now being cut.

Had the hemlock embargo not been placed, many men between here and Hazelton might have been working through the winter cutting ties where now they are idle. The camps at Pitman Spur and Skoena Crossing would have been operating. As it is now the only camp running is that at the Crossing which is turning out cedar poles for piling and telegraph poles.

WERE RESCUED BY HALIBUT SCHOONER

ties Picks Up Wrecked Men at Egg Island

A despatch from Seattle published in the papers to the south tells of the wreck of the cruiser launch Osborne in Queen Charlotte Sound, where it was dashed to pieces on a rock and the three occupants, Capt. E. Osborne of Everett, Henry Erickson of Seattle and J. J. Boyer of Port Angeles, were rescued from Egg Island by the halibut schooner Atlas, Capt. Peter Wold.

The three men left Ketchikan, 150 miles from Seattle, Christmas day, bound for this port, and were crossing Queen Charlotte Sound when they were caught in a heavy storm which swept their little vessel ashore and reduced her to a hopeless wreck. The castaways reached shore safely and succeeded in landing a small amount of supplies. Their vessel, however, had stranded on a barren stretch of the British Columbia shore and they were forced to seek shelter in a deserted Indian shack.

After lying on the isolated, storm swept coast for nine days the three castaways crossed over to Egg Island in a small boat, where they sought assistance from the lighthouse keeper and his wife.
