# GOVERNMENT GETS BIG MAJORITY ON FIRST VOTE RELIMINARY PLANS FOR STATION; ROUNDHOUSE ADDITION HAS STARTED

## Preliminary Plans For Station Here

M. Lang, Superintendent of Buildings, is Consulting with Departments Regarding Final Set

M. Lang, superintendent of building of the G.N.R., who is here in connection with the building of the new station and has a set of preliminary plans for the structure. He is consulting with the various departments in view to getting out a final set to submit to the head engineering office for approval.

Work on a lean-to to the present roundhouse and an addition to the car shed has just commenced in the yards. The work which is not very extensive is being done by the operating department.

## Alberta Liquor Case to Supreme Court of Canada

Bell Company Recently Won Appeal for Possession of \$50,000 Stock of Liquor which Had Been Taken by Crown

EDMONTON, February 17.—The attorney-general's department will leave nothing undone in an effort to win their case against the Nat Bell liquor warehouse. The appeal will be appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada, it is said here.

The appeal is against a finding of two out of three judges of the Appellate Court who decided against the province of Alberta in the decision they obtained confiscating the \$50,000 stock of the Bell Co. on the charge that the company sold liquor illegally.

The province obtained possession of the liquor by the judgment of the Appellate Court, it reverts to the former owner.

The attorney-general has given directions for an appeal to the Supreme Court of the province for a stay proceedings in the judgment so the province may retain possession of the liquor until after the decision of the case by the Supreme Court of Canada. An appeal is being made. It is said that if necessary he will carry the case to the Privy Council.

## SITUATION AT OTTAWA

Station in Regard to Coming Want of Confidence Vote

OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—A Government caucus has been called for tomorrow morning.

It is believed that the debate on the speech from the throne will take long and the expected vote may be reached on Tuesday, leaving little disposition of members to speak.

The attitude of the National Progressives and those sitting on cross benches in regard to the proposed amendment is causing concern generally and it is believed they will support the government.

## SENT RESOLUTIONS TO PREMIER OLIVER

OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—The offering of resolutions at the recent convention of the Associated Boards of Trade came to the Government place yesterday. Premier Oliver promised that the recommendations would be given consideration at an early date.

### NAVAL SQUADRON VISIT VANCOUVER MARCH 11 TO 16

OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—The Canadian naval squadron, the gift of Britain to Canada, which is on its way to this coast, will visit Vancouver between March 11 and 16. It will leave for the return voyage to the east coast on April 13.

### PRINCE GEORGE MAN IN SHOOTING AFFRAY

Was Without Occupation and Had Loaded Gun Which Other Man Used.

VANCOUVER, February 17.—A Prince George man figured last night in a Vancouver shooting affray in an apartment house occupied largely by denizens of the underworld, when Marie Baker suffered a broken wrist from a shot fired by G. Dingman, and Randall Gray was fatally wounded.

S. O. Lang, the renter of a suite in the house, told Detective Ellice this morning during an investigation of the shooting, which took place in his room, that he came from Prince George a month ago and had no occupation. He also admitted owning a fully loaded gun which Dingman in some way got possession of and used. Dingman declared he did not know the gun was loaded.

Lang's wife was lying "ill" in another room during the examination of Lang.

### OFFICERS OF UNITED FARMERS TO ADDRESS VICTORIA CONVENTION

Albert Will Take About Three Weeks Longer Before Leaving the Dry Dock.

During the course of the overhaul of the Prince Albert a flaw in her thrust shaft was discovered by Chief Engineer Cameron and the discovery will necessitate the replacing of the shaft with a consequent delay of about three weeks in getting her out of the yards. The work will likely be done here before she leaves.

## FLAW IN SHAFT WAS DISCOVERED

Cruisers Report Thirty Million Feet Down on Limits Near Powell River.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—Extensive damage to timber limits on the British Columbia coast was caused by wind storms at the end of last month. According to a report of cruisers, 30,000,000 feet of timber is down on the limits of Brooks, Seaton and O'Brien near Powell River.

### PRISONERS ESCAPE

Two Men Got Away from Prince George Lockup—Local Police Informed.

Chief Minty has received a telegram from Prince George informing him that two prisoners have escaped from the lockup there. They are Franz Ferdinand Harman Annak, a Bohemian, and Geo. R. Hudson, held under the extradition and immigration acts respectively.

### RAIRIE WIRES UP FOLLOWING BLIZZARD

For Two Days Communication in Manitoba Was Cut off by Storm.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—Telegraphic and news service of eastern Canada was restored this morning after being cut off for two days owing to one of the worst blizzards of the year which swept over Manitoba, destroying wire communication.

### UNIVERSITY ACTION ENDORSED BY SENATE

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—The Senate of the University of B.C. has endorsed the faculty's recommendation that thirty students be asked to withdraw from the institution on account of not obtaining sufficient marks at the Christmas examinations.

SEES THE WHOLE WORLD DRY.



William "Pussyfoot" Johnson predicts a dry law everywhere if America makes good with enforcement. At the meeting of the Union Preachers of New York city and surrounding towns, in which he was principal speaker, he emphasized the fact that prohibition would have to be enforced in the United States before trying to enforce prohibition in other countries. He says that should the United States fail in prohibition, which is not likely to happen, the dry law would be set back for a hundred years.

## Sulphite Mill Soon To Be Going Concern Says Visiting Engineer Taylor

J. A. W. Bell, of the Emerson lumber interests, and Howard S. Taylor, of the Management Engineering & Development Co., in company with E. E. Duby, local manager of the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., spent yesterday after the arrival of the Prince George inspecting the site for the new pulp mill at Seal Cove and tonight there will be a meeting with the city council committee to go into the question of obtaining water power from the city line which passes by the property. Mr. Bell and Mr. Taylor will proceed south tonight.

Mr. Taylor, in speaking of the project to a News representative this morning, seemed very favorably impressed with what he had seen. "Prince Rupert is the logical place for the establishment of the next pulp mill on the coast," he said, "for it has both water and rail transportation and there is plenty of suitable timber. The initial plant would be a sulphite pulp mill and if the concern is able to get water from the city there is every indication that it will be a going proposition very soon."

Mr. Taylor will catch a fast train on his arrival at Seattle and will return to Dayton. He will likely be back here in the summer.

## Drydock Legal Battle Commenced in Vancouver; Creditors State Case

VANCOUVER, February 17.—(Special)—The legal battle between the Government and the creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. opened this morning and was adjourned until Monday.

Counsel for the creditors claim that the Dominion Government lost the lien which they had for steel and other material supplied to the drydock company when the trustee was appointed. The creditors are not protesting against the completion of the ships now half built but declare that all material in the yard is the sole property of the creditors. Charles Wilson, K.G., appeared for Hodges while R. L. Reid, K.G., was for the Government.

## Independents Vote with Government on Liquor Legislation

First Vote Taken in House at Victoria Result in Majority of Fifteen for Government; Conservatives a Unit.

VICTORIA, Feb. 17.—By a vote of 29 to 14 the B.C. Legislature yesterday endorsed the procedure of the Provincial Government in bringing the liquor question up for consideration. Efforts of the opposition to prove unconstitutional the move, whereby the House as a whole would petition the Lieutenant-governor to present a bill to the Legislature, was frustrated after a debate lasting an hour.

The vote taken provided the first occasion this session for a division and on that occasion the move of the Government was approved, the only adverse expression being from the fourteen conservative members, all the independent members voting with the Government and several speaking in support of its attitude in regard to the proposed bill.

M. A. Macdonald declared the public did not want the liquor measure to be dealt with as a party question. He held that the procedure was perfectly constitutional. The same stand was taken by Kenneth Duncan of Cowichan, Dick Burde of Alberni, and Upstill, the labor member for Fernie, each speaking in support of the procedure.



## MUCH SUICIDE IN HUNGARY TODAY

Over Five Thousand Ended Own Lives Last Year and Ten Thousand Attempted

BUDAPEST, Feb. 16.—Thirty-two hundred women and 2,100 men committed suicide in Hungary during 1932, police reports for the year show. In addition, there were more than 10,000 unsuccessful attempts at suicide.

The tremendous increase is causing much worry, inasmuch as the pre-war figures were from 50 to 60 suicides yearly. The situation is attributed to the gradual deterioration in living conditions and the fact that the war had the effect of making human life much cheaper.

Government, society and church circles, realizing the grave danger to the country, have begun a campaign against self-destruction. Sermons on the subject are being preached in all the churches, and a special police force has been organized to keep strict watch and prevent suicides. In a number of cases where the police intervened in time the persons attempting suicide protested against what they termed the tyrannical oppression of the authorities.

It has been reported in the legislature at Victoria that the route for the Peace River extension of the P.G.E. could be built through Vanderhoof at a cost of seventeen million dollars and the grade would not exceed 1 per cent.

The question of co-operating to buy seed grain through the government, the obtaining of a veterinarian for the district, the raising of the standard of potato seed, the building of silos and the prospect of obtaining a trained nurse for the district were among the questions discussed at the meeting of the Fort Fraser Farmers' Institute last Saturday.
