GOVERNMENT GETS BIG MAJORITY ON FIRST VOTE

PRELIMINARY PLANS FOR STATION; ROUNDHOUSE ADDITION HAS STARTED

Preliminary Plans For Station Here

He is consulting with the various departments with a view to getting out a final set to submit to the head engineering office for approval.

Alberta Liquor Case to Supreme Court of Canada

Bell Company Recently Won Appeal for Possession of \$50,000 Stock of Liquor which Had Been Taken by Crown

EDMONTON, February 17.—The attorney-general's department will leave nothing undone in an effort to win their case in the famous action against the Nat Bell liquor warehouse. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada, it is learned here.

The appeal is against a finding of two out of three judges of the Appeal Court who decided against the province of Alberta in their decision that the company sold liquor illegally.

FLAW IN SHAFT WAS DISCOVERED

Albert Will Take About Three Weeks Longer Before Leaving the Dry Dock

During the course of the overhaul of the Prince Albert a flaw in her thrust shaft was discovered by Chief Engineer Cameron and the discovery will necessitate the replacing of the shaft with a consequent delay of about three weeks in getting her out of the yards. The work will likely be done here before she leaves.

GREAT DAMAGE TO TIMBER FROM STORM

Cruisers Report Thirty Million Feet Down on Limits Near Powell River

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—Extensive damage to timber limits on the British Columbia coast was caused by wind storms at the end of last month. According to a report of cruisers, 30,000,000 feet of timber is down on the limits of Brooks Scanlon and O'Brien near Powell River.

PRISONERS ESCAPE

Two Men Got Away from Prince George Lockup—Local Police Informed

Chief Minty has received a telegram from Prince George informing him that two prisoners have escaped from the lockup there. They are Franz Ferdinand Harman Annak, a Bohemian, and Geo. R. Hudson, held under the extradition and immigration acts, respectively.

SENT RESOLUTIONS TO PREMIER OLIVER

STORIA, Feb. 17.—The presentation of resolutions at the recent convention of the Associated Boards of Trade in Vancouver to the Government, place yesterday. Premier Oliphant promised that the resolutions would be given consideration at an early date.

NAVAL SQUADRON VISIT VANCOUVER MARCH 11 TO 16
OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—The Canadian naval squadron, the gift of Britain to Canada, which is on its way to this coast, will visit Vancouver between March 11 and 16. It will leave for the return voyage to the east coast on April 13.

PRINCE GEORGE MAN IN SHOOTING AFFRAY

Was Without Occupation and Had Loaded Gun Which Other Man Used

VANCOUVER, February 17.—A Prince George man figured last night in a Vancouver shooting affray in an apartment house occupied largely by denizens of the underworld, when Marie Baker suffered a broken wrist from a shot fired by C. Dingman, and Randall Gray was fatally wounded.

S. O. Long, the renter of a suite in the house, told Detective Ellice this morning during an investigation of the shooting, which took place in his room, that he came from Prince George a month ago and had no occupation. He also admitted owning a fully loaded gun which Dingman in some way got possession of and used. Dingman declared he did not know the gun was loaded.

Long's wife was lying "ill" in another room during the examination of Long.

OFFICIALS OF UNITED FARMERS TO ADDRESS VICTORIA CONVENTION

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—Norman Lambert, secretary of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, and J. B. Musselman, secretary of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers Association of Regina, will address a convention of United Farmers here next week.

It is understood that one important matter to come before the convention will be the position taken by the association in regard to politics. It is believed the mission of the visiting speakers is to try to persuade the farmers to join the Canadian Council.

PRAIRIE WIRES UP FOLLOWING BLIZZARD

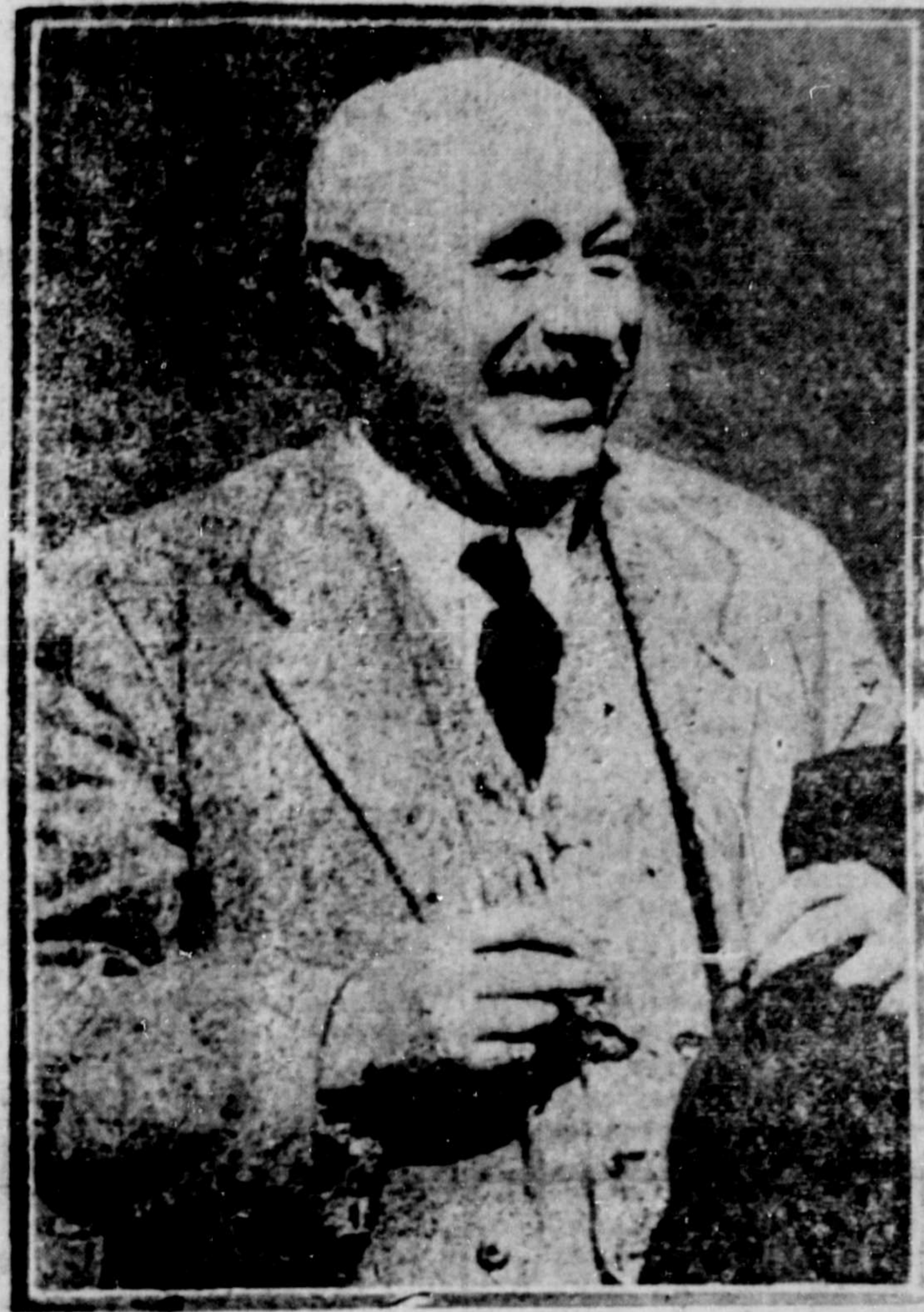
For Two Days Communication in Manitoba Was Cut off by Storm

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—Telegraphic and news service of eastern Canada was restored this morning after being cut off for two days owing to one of the worst blizzards of the year which swept over Manitoba, destroying wire communication.

UNIVERSITY ACTION ENDORSED BY SENATE

VANCOUVER, Feb. 17.—The Senate of the University of B. C. has endorsed the faculty's recommendation that thirty students be asked to withdraw from the institution on account of not obtaining sufficient marks at the Christmas examinations.

SEES THE WHOLE WORLD DRY.



William "Pussyfoot" Johnson predicts a dry law everywhere if America makes good with enforcement. At the meeting of the Union Traders of New York city and surrounding towns, in which he was the principal speaker, he emphasized the fact that prohibition would have to be enforced in the United States before trying to enforce prohibition in other countries. He says that should the United States fail in prohibition, which is not likely to happen, the dry law would be set back for a hundred years.

Sulphite Mill Soon To Be Going Concern Says Visiting Engineer Taylor

J. A. W. Bell, of the Emerson lumber interests, and Howard S. Taylor, of the Management Engineering & Development Co., in company with F. E. Doby, local manager of the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., spent yesterday after the arrival of the Prince George inspecting the site for the new pulp mill at Seal Cove and tonight there will be a meeting with the city council committee to go into the question of obtaining water power from the city line which passes by the property. Mr. Bell and Mr. Taylor will proceed south tonight.

Mr. Taylor, in speaking of the project to a News representative this morning, seemed very favorably impressed with what he had seen. "Prince Rupert is the logical place for the establishment of the next pulp mill on the coast," he said, "for it has both water and rail transportation and there is plenty of suitable timber. The initial plant would be a sulphite pulp mill and if the concern is able to get water from the city there is every indication that it will be a going proposition very soon."

Mr. Taylor will catch a fast train on his arrival at Seattle and will return to Dayton. He will likely be back here in the summer.

Drydock Legal Battle Commenced in Vancouver; Creditors State Case

VANCOUVER, February 17.—(Special)—The legal battle between the Government and the creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co. opened this morning and was adjourned until Monday.

Counsel for the creditors claim that the Dominion Government lost the lien which they had for steel and other material supplied to the drydock company when the trustee was appointed. The creditors are not protesting against the completion of the ships now half built but declare that all material in the yard is the sole property of the creditors. Charles Wilson, K. C., appeared for Hodges while R. L. Reid, K. C., was for the Government.

Independents Vote with Government on Liquor Legislation

First Vote Taken in House at Victoria Result in Majority of Fifteen for Government; Conservatives a Unit.

VICTORIA, Feb. 17.—By a vote of 29 to 14 the B. C. Legislature yesterday endorsed the procedure of the Provincial Government in bringing the liquor question up for consideration. Efforts of the opposition to prove unconstitutional the move, whereby the House as a whole would petition the Lieutenant-governor to present a bill to the Legislature, was frustrated after a debate lasting an hour.

The vote taken provided the first occasion this session for division and on that occasion the move of the Government was approved, the only adverse expression being from the fourteen conservative members, all the independent members voting with the Government and several speaking in support of its attitude in regard to the proposed bill.

M. A. Macdonald declared the public did not want the liquor measure to be dealt with as a party question. He held that the procedure was perfectly constitutional. The same stand was taken by Kenneth Duncan of Cowichan, Dick Burde of Alberni, and Uphill, the labor member for Fernie, each speaking in support of the procedure.

FLOATING CANNERY FOR NORTH COAST

Arrangements Made for Financing of M. N. & R. Canning Co. Recently Formed.

Arrangements have been made for the financing of the M. N. & R. Canning Co., the concern that is to operate a floating cannery on this coast during the coming season. The proposal is to use one of the stern wheelers now out of commission on the coast and to fit it up as a cannery, this steamer to be placed at any point convenient for handling the salmon and other fish.

The company was formed locally and will be the first of its kind to operate in British Columbia waters. It is expected to operate for ten months of the year.

CALIFORNIA OFFERS PLENTY OF FUEL OIL

Guarantee of 600,000 bbls. Suggested for Twelve Months.

VANCOUVER, February 17.—Announcing that fuel oil will be again on the market, C. M. Rolston, local manager of the Imperial Oil Co., states that California producers are prepared to guarantee 600,000 barrels in deliveries distributed equally over the next twelve months.

If verification of the offer comes tanks at here will again be open to the public.

MANAGING DIRECTOR EDMONTON JOURNAL, DIES AT VICTORIA

VICTORIA, February 17.—M. B. Jennings, managing director of the Edmonton Journal, died here this morning from an acute attack of heart failure. He had been ill for some time.

PEASANTS ARE AGAINST LENINE

Premier of Russia Expects Dictatorship to Last for Forty Years

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Nikolai Lenine, Bolshevik Premier of Russia, expects the Russian peasants to continue their resistance against the dictatorship of the proletariat for forty years, but says the communists will continue that government until they submit, according to the delegates of the Spanish Socialist Party who have just returned from Moscow.

The Spaniards went to Russia to present a statement of the conditions under which their party would affiliate with the Third International. On their return they told a representative of the Times about their interview with the Bolshevik Premier.

Never Spoke of Liberty
 Asked by Senor de los Rios and Senor Anzuano, who made the trip to the Soviet capital, when the Russian dictatorship would be replaced by a regime of freedom, Premier Lenine said:
 "We have never spoken of liberty. We are exercising the dictatorship of the proletariat in the name of the minority because the peasant class in Russia is not yet with us. We shall continue to exercise the dictatorship until they submit. I estimate the dictatorship will last about 40 years."

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

WHAT IS MINE IS NOT YOURS

That is Policy of Bolsheviks, says Canadian who Went to Galicia

TORONTO, Feb. 15.—Following are extracts from a letter written by Nicholas Olesko, a Ukrainian, formerly of Oshawa, Ontario, where there is a considerable Ukrainian settlement, to his friend there, Ignace Kraviec. This man was a great believer in Bolshevism and while in Canada expressed the hope that the Bolsheviks would invade Galicia "and make it a Bolshevik Paradise." In the spring of 1920 he went to Galicia from Canada. Bolshevik troops under Rudenny were masters there for five weeks until expelled by General Petlura. He writes from Horbki, Eastern Galicia, under date of last December.

"This summer we had the people's defenders or Communists. We lived the 'full life!' I liked very much these people. You might reckon them civilized apes! It is true that I would not include all of them in this class, but the term might be applied to great numbers of them. They do not understand for what they are struggling nor what they want. If someone tells them something they answer with a string of Russian curses: 'I am a hero; I am fighting for you, because what is yours is mine—but what is mine, it is not yours!'"

"When a man's horse is taken from him to carry stores, food, etc., he may have a piece of bread in his mouth as he works in the fields. The Bolshevik will take it from him and leave him to starve. They took cattle, horses, wagons, pigs and all fowls. And now the Galician peasant does not want even to hear the word Bolshevik! Truly the Bolshevik would equalize, not the rich with the poor, but the poor with the beggar. Not only the rich farmer, but even the poor man will not hear of Bolshevism. It is the truth when it is said that the Bolsheviks will drag back Socialism for many years. It is truth, too, that even with a hook you may not pull the peasants to Bolshevism."

Writing to his son at Oshawa, Ont., from Kopyiv, Eastern Galicia, on December 19, 1920, Tymko Kraviec says: "The Bolsheviks were in our district five weeks, but may God protect us from ever seeing them again! There were many invasions and much robbery during the war, but of all who passed through our country they were the worst, and robbed in the worst way."

DEDICATION OF MASSETT CHURCH

Rev. Archdeacon Collison Visits Field of Early Missionary Endeavor

ADVANCE OF HAIDAS UNDER CHRISTIAN BANNER

MASSETT, Feb. 17.—On Sunday afternoon, February 6, the new Anglican Church, erected on Massett Indian Reserve, was formally opened for divine service by Rev. Archdeacon W. H. Collison, assisted by the incumbent missionary, Rev. James Gillett.

A procession was formed at the Massett town hall, headed by the Massett brass band, which proceeded to the recently constructed structure. The building was well filled with white and Indian residents of Graham Island. The native supplied choir, assisted by Mrs. Gillett as organist, furnished appropriate music for the occasion. Archdeacon Collison preached the sermon, which was interpreted by Chief Councillor Alfred Adams.

Father Hogan Started
The large frame building, entirely constructed by Indian workmen, has been in course of erection for some time. Native fishermen undertook the work and carried it to completion without outside assistance. The late Rev. William Hogan, whose remains lie in the cemetery near the church, was engaged in preparing for the construction of the edifice when he passed away. The successive missionaries took the matter up and the present incumbent, Rev. James Gillett, began active operations, which he successfully carried to completion.

Rev. Archdeacon Collison, the first missionary among the Haidas, had the pleasure of visiting Massett once more to view the result of his efforts during the early history of the Massett band. He arrived on the steamer Prince John and was met at the wharf by the congregation. In the early hours of Saturday morning an address was presented the Archdeacon, to which he replied in feeling terms. Although the time of the Archdeacon in Massett, at the solicitation of his converts to Christianity, Rev. Mr. Collison decided to spend the intervening two weeks with his people and was cheered to the echo by the large gathering.

Christian for Forty-four Years
Forty-four years ago the Rev. Archdeacon Collison first set foot on Graham Island. With his wife and family he disembarked on the H. B. Company's steamer Otter and took charge of the spiritual guidance of the then scattered natives. His first step was to bring them to a central point for baptism and confirmation. A number accepted the call, but others were imbued with the heathenish customs of their forefathers and resolutely declined to accept the teachings of the young missionary. The Haidas were known from the coast of California to the Fraser River, as the greatest predatory race among the aborigines of the Pacific and many desired to confine their forays for the acquisition of slaves, pelts and scalps.

In a publication issued by Archdeacon Collison under the title of "In the Wake of the War Canoe," the difficulties of the early missionary are shown in a most comprehensive and realistic manner. His task of bringing the scattered "clans" together was accomplished with the assistance of friendly chiefs and converts. Massett was selected as the central point, being on a beautiful peninsula at the entrance to Massett Inlet. It is the first and nearest point of call on the Queen Charlotte Islands, standing out in the Pacific Ocean, eighty miles from Prince Rupert.

Turn to Christianity
The Massetts gradually turned to the missionary for relief and assistance. His self-sacrificing spirit brought results even beyond his expectations, until the whole of the Indians found their way to the worship of God in preference to the teachings of their "medicine men" and the practice of heathen customs. It is seldom that the results of human endeavor have been so forcibly shown as in the visit after almost half a century of Archdeacon Collison to his old pastorate at Massett.

Pleasing Retrospect
From a number of shacks and lodges of reigning chiefs to find large and commodious residences,

wharves, town hall, town council, modern gasoline launches and the comforts of a large-sized and well built town, was surely a pleasing retrospect for the aged and respected former missionary. The Church and state made many changes since the landing of the Archdeacon and his family on the isolated islands stretching out into the Pacific ocean. Few of the older converts were present at the recent reception. They are sleeping with their forefathers in the adjacent cemetery.

The schoolhouse built by the Archdeacon with his first church are still in existence. The old shacks of the Hudson's Bay Company are still standing. On the trees are the remains of those who died before the advent of Christian teachers. Here and there the signs of ancient rites and ceremonies may be seen, but the prevailing point of Christian endeavor is noticeable in the modern structure built with the hands of those who first met the respected missionary who brought to them the peace and prosperity known by those who follow the narrow path of righteousness.

Crime is Unknown.
Archbishop Du Vernet, the Rev. Mr. Collison and Rev. James Gillett may well be congratulated on the success of the mission work in this district. The Massett Indians have been fortunate in the selection of their missionaries. Crime is an unknown quantity among these Indians. Since the advent of Christian teachers no Indian of the band has been incarcerated for a criminal offence. Their day school is crowded with pupils eager to learn the language and ways of modern civilization. In the industrial schools they are taking first place as the leaders of the Indians of the province. Their homes in the largest settlement on Graham Island are improved beyond the conception of those who write and speak of "Poor Lo" and his condition. It is safe to say that Archdeacon Collison was agreeably surprised at the results following his first efforts and the work of his successors, Reverends Keen, Harrison, Hogan, Green, Crarey, Price and Gillett.

Banquet Was Held.
After attending to the dedicatory services and during the stay of the Archdeacon in Massett, a banquet was held in the town hall at which the reverend gentleman was the guest of honor. Speeches, music and selections by the band followed the repast at which the guest of the evening spoke to the assemblage in the Haida tongue. A visit was paid to the Indian day school and several other historic spots throughout the reserve. The Archdeacon was the guest of Rev. J. Gillett and Mrs. Gillett during his stay in Massett.

TELKWA TO HAVE BUILDING BOOM

Movie House Being Organized, Creamery, Grist and Other Improvements

LAND BEING SOLD IN THE DISTRICT

TELKWA, Feb. 17. Developments here are coming thick and fast. There are all sorts of new buildings projected for the near future and some of them are sure to materialize. The buildings under consideration include a new creamery, a grist mill, garage, depot and moving picture house.

According to the order of the Railway Commission, the new depot is to be completed by mid-summer. Other expected improvements on the railway include stockyard and coal bunkers.

Tenders are being prepared for a new hotel here which is to be modern in every respect. It will be steam heated, with hot and cold water laid on throughout and electric lighting is to be provided.

The same organization that is preparing to go into the movie business here is also considering the installing of electric lights and a water system for the town. The construction of the barracks for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is nearing completion and the Mounties are expected next week. Telkwa is looked on both officially and by general consent as the hub of the territory between Prince George and Prince Rupert.

As an indication of the development going on here, the Rattenbury Lands, Ltd., have disposed of several acres of choice lands in and around Telkwa recently.

MUCH SUICIDE IN HUNGARY TODAY

Over Five Thousand Ended Own Lives Last Year and Ten Thousand Attempted

BUDAPEST, Feb. 16.—Thirty-two hundred women and 2,100 men committed suicide in Hungary during 1920, police reports for the year show. In addition, there were more than 10,000 unsuccessful attempts at suicide.

The tremendous increase is causing much worry, inasmuch as the pre-war figures were from 50 to 60 suicides yearly. The situation is attributed to the gradual deterioration in living conditions and the fact that the war had the effect of making human life much cheaper.

Government, society and church circles, realizing the grave danger to the country, have begun a campaign against self-destruction. Sermons on the subject are being preached in all the churches and a special police force has been organized to keep strict watch and prevent suicides.
