Russia Again Seethes With Revolt

NEGOTIATIONS UNDER WAY FOR PEACE IN IRELAND; MANY MURDERS THERE

Russian Revolution Spreading Rapidly

Conditions Cause Peasants to Rebel; Bolsheviks at Moscow Desert for Enemy; Surrender of Petrograd Demanded

LONDON, March 11.—The revolutionaries at Kronstadt demand the Soviet's surrender of Petrograd before March 25 and the threat of a refusal threaten a general bombardment. Artillery from Kronstadt has done great damage.

A peasant uprising throughout Russia is reported. Food conditions are appalling and revolts are spreading throughout the country.

RUSSIA, March 10.—Three brigades of Bolshevik troops at Moscow have joined the revolutionary forces prompted by the acute situation at Moscow.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 12.—(Noon)—Kiev, Odessa and Simbirsk have been captured from the Bolsheviks by Ukrainian revolutionaries but it is reported that Odessa has been recaptured by the Soviet forces.

WARSAW, March 12.—Petrograd is in the hands of revolutionaries. The Bolsheviks have been ousted, according to a wireless message received. The message is confused owing to the haste of the sending station. It is believed to have been sent from Petrograd.

Prince Rupert Ignored in Docking of Cruiser

Announcement by Captain Hose that Vessel Will Not Be Overhauled in Canada

VANCOUVER, March 11.—As the cruiser Aurora is too long for the Esquimalt drydock she may possibly go to Prince Rupert. Wallace Company has notified Captain Hose that the Prince Rupert drydock is ready for occupancy and is awaiting a reply.

VICTORIA, March 12.—The cruiser Aurora of the Canadian navy will not be drydocked in British Columbia waters. The vessels will not go to Prince Rupert for the purpose of being overhauled there, Capt. Walter Hose, director of naval services, announced.

VICTORIA, March 11.—(a. m.)—It is unlikely that the Canadian naval squadron will visit Prince Rupert, as it is necessary for the vessels to undergo overhauling before their return to the Atlantic seaboard.

U.S. RAILWAYS TRY TO SECURE LOWER WAGES

Effort to "Keep Out of Bankruptcy and Reduce Rates" Going On.

CHICAGO, March 12.—Virtually all the large railways of the United States are taking steps to bring about a reduction of the war-time wage scale of the unskilled employees in order to "keep the railways out of bankruptcy and reduce the rates." Reduction of the wages of skilled men will also be sought.

OLIVER REPLIES TO MR. BOWSER

Defends Action of the Government Regarding P. G. E. Construction.

VICTORIA, March 12.—Charges levelled against the Government by W. J. Bowser in connection with the P.G.E. railway were replied to in the legislature yesterday by Premier Oliver when the bill to authorize the borrowing of another four millions to permit the completion of the line to Prince George was under discussion.

Mr. Bowser has charged that the Government had wantonly wasted public funds and made a personal attack on Manager Blackworth. The Premier went at length into the P.G.E. railway history and replied to Mr. Bowser's allegations. He referred to the present situation of the road and said had he known in 1918 or 1919 that the railway would become such a drain upon the finances of the province, he might have stopped construction then.

PRESIDENT HARDING AND GREAT BRITAIN

Will Not at Present Deal With Foreign Problems, It is Announced.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The new administration will not likely take up for some time the numerous questions of foreign policy outstanding, especially those with Great Britain. They desire first to deal with pressing domestic problems.

PARIS, March 10.—Negotiations are under way between the French embassy at Washington and the State Department in an effort to induce President Harding to favor the acceptance of a modified League of Nations.

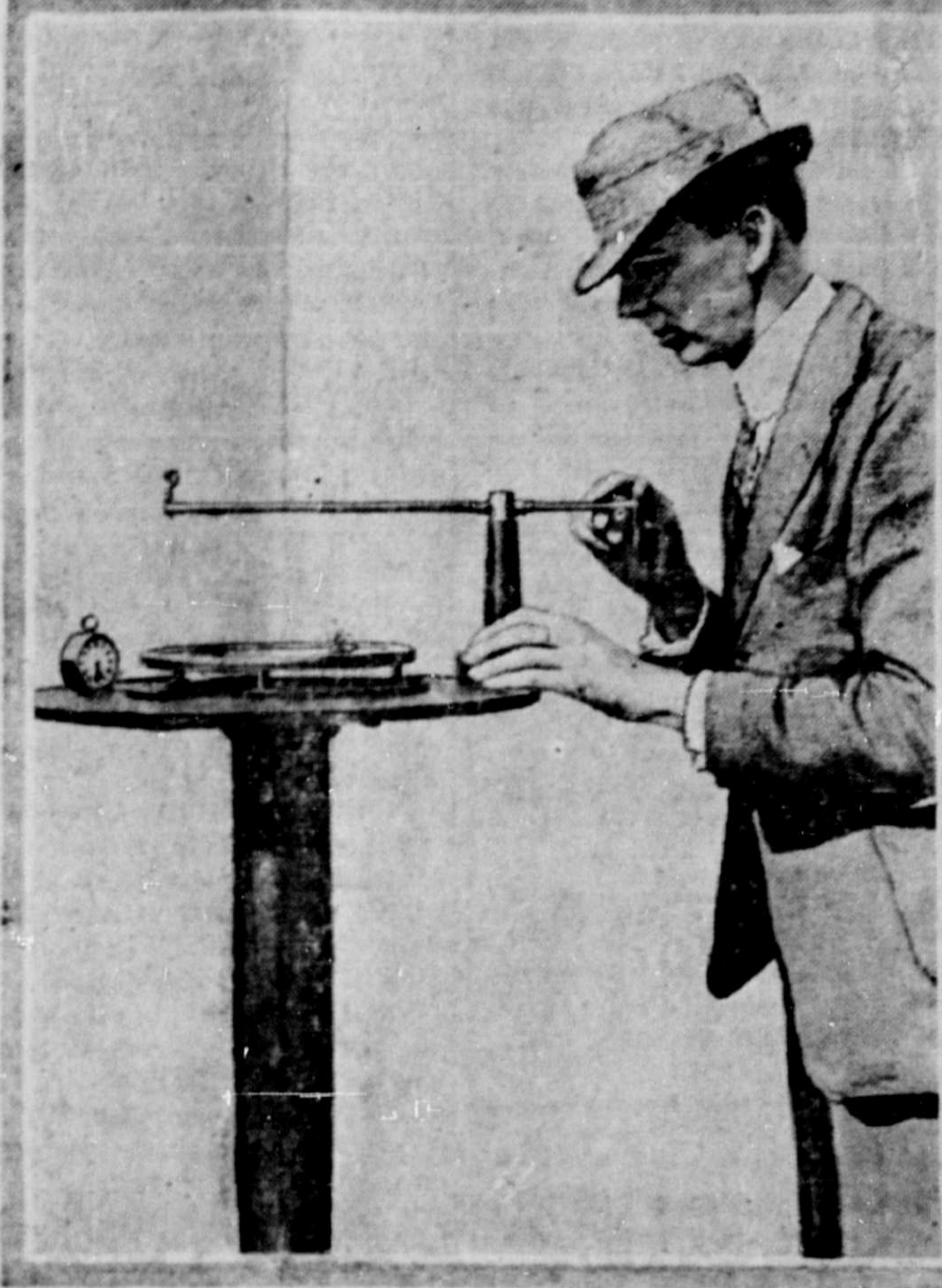
GOOD FISH WEATHER ON HALIBUT GROUNDS

Expected That a Number of Small Boats Will Arrive Tomorrow's Fish Sale.

Weather on the halibut banks for the past week has been most favorable and a number of small boats are expected to arrive in the course of the next 24 hours for tomorrow's fish sale. Arrivals have been rather light during the past few days following the big rush of a fortnight ago when 55 boats with over half a million pounds were in the course of two fish sale days.

Seven cars are reported to arrive tomorrow but today there are no cars in the yards.

Liquor Act Debated In Legislature; No Beer in Restaurants

VICTORIA, March 12.—Whether the commissioners to be appointed under the new liquor act will be named by the Legislature or by the Government and whether their salaries should be fixed by the Legislature or by the Government was debated on Thursday in the Legislature.

The act as it stands provides for the appointment by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council and that they be paid such salary as the cabinet may fix.

The attorney-general declared that "unless the House is prepared to express want of confidence in the Government" that section must be allowed to stand without any change.

At the suggestion of Canon Hinchcliffe it was agreed that a clause be inserted whereby a man arrested for intoxication and compelled to tell where he got the liquor should not be prosecuted.

APPROVE MOVE OF GOVERNMENT

British Commons Gives Lloyd George Tremendous Majority on Soviet Trade Treaty

LONDON, March 12.—Approval by a large majority of the Government's procedure in attempting to make a trade treaty with Russia, was given by the House of Commons yesterday. The vote of confidence stood 218 for the Government and 62 against. The Government refused the agreement on the Soviet terms.

Negotiations Under Way For Peace With Ireland; Many Crimes Committed

DUBLIN, March 12.—It is stated on excellent authority that renewed efforts are being made to bring peace with Ireland and the negotiations are well advanced. The Government insists that the first step in any consideration of a settlement is cessation of the attacks by the republican army.

LONDON, March 12.—Lloyd George told the House of Commons yesterday that he had received a request to postpone the opening of the southern Irish Parliament and will consider it. He denied that 300 military blockhouses were being erected around the northern counties, as reported.

BELFAST, March 11.—Armed men killed Lawrence Hickey, republican, and William Loughane, Sinn Fein, at Thurles. J. J. O'Kelly, Sinn Fein member of Parliament, has been arrested, making the 20th member arrested.

BELFAST, March 10.—Four men who incurred the displeasure of the Sinn Fein, were murdered near here. Cards left on the breasts of the men were inscribed "spy."

Alexander McCabe, member of the Sinn Fein Parliament, and Michael McLoughlin, prominent Sinn Feiners, were arrested. Patrick Morgan, found guilty of connection with the murders of British officers at Dublin, have been sentenced to death.

MOHILL, Ireland, March 12.—(Noon)—Thirty men of the Bedfordshire regiment en route to Ballinore were ambushed and attacked by rifle fire and bombs. The soldiers returned the fire, killing six attackers and mortally wounding one.

The killed were attired in the uniforms of the Irish republican army.

NAVAL SQUADRON AT VANCOUVER

War Ships Enter Harbor This Morning and are Officially Welcomed.

VANCOUVER, March 12.—The Canadian naval squadron dropped anchor at English Bay at six o'clock last evening and entered the harbor this morning.

This afternoon a formal welcome was extended to Capt. Adams and the officers and crews of the three boats by the reading of an address of welcome at two o'clock this afternoon.

IMPORTANT HOCKEY RESULTS BOTH HERE AND IN THE EAST

SEATTLE, March 10.—The hockey results last night were Vancouver 2, Seattle 4.

OTTAWA, March 11.—The Ottawa hockey team defeated St. Patricks of Toronto by a score of 5 to 0 in the first playoff to decide the eastern championship and the right to play the Pacific coast champions.

VICTORIA, March 12.—The hockey final under the Pacific Coast Hockey Association league resulted in a win for Victoria by 11 goals to 8.

THOUSAND DROWN STEAMER WRECKED

AMOY, March 10.—One thousand were drowned when the coolie carrying steamer Hong Moh was wrecked off Port Swatow on March 3, according to reports received here. She struck a rock and sank immediately. She carried 12,000 passengers.

GOVERNMENT MAJORITY IS A LARGE ONE

Legislature Adopts Oliver Motion By 23 to 14—Independents With Administration.

VICTORIA, March 10.—The Premier's resolution to memorialize the Federal Government for a provincial monopoly of the right to import liquor was adopted by the Legislature on a vote of 23 to 14, all the independents voting with the Government.

The Conservatives supported the stand taken by the leader of the opposition that no application of this nature was necessary and that the object sought could be accomplished under Dominion legislation already existing.

The House resolved itself into committee on the liquor bill, during which Mr. Whiteside inquired who would have to bear the expense of maintaining prisoners prosecuted under the act. Hitherto municipalities had to bear the cost.

The Premier agreed that the cost of prosecution and maintenance of prisoners should come from the profits of the business conducted under the act.

IMMIGRATION LAW CHANGES

Proposed to Tighten Regulations Regarding People Coming to Country

OTTAWA, Mar. 10.—Striking changes in the immigration regulations are reported under consideration of the cabinet. Those are to maintain or increase the money regulations now in force and admit only bona fide farm workers and domestics to the country.

Immigrants from Central Europe are to be barred.

CENSUS ENUMERATORS

OTTAWA, Mar. 12.—Census enumerators will be appointed by the census commissioners of each province, subject to the approval of the Dominion Government.

MONTREAL FIRE

MONTREAL, March 10.—Two firemen were injured and a third asphyxiated in a fire here which destroyed a residential block valued at \$100,000.

SENATOR DIES

HALIFAX, March 10.—Hon. A. B. Crosby, Conservative senator for Halifax, died this afternoon.

LONDON PAPERS
MOSTLY FAVOR
ALLIED ACTION

Daily News Opposes, but Times
and Post Rejoice at Welding
of Entente

LONDON, March 12.—Most of
the newspapers approve the allied
decision to penalize Germany for
refusing to accede to the plan for
reparations. The exception was
the Daily News, which complained
Lloyd George had "brushed aside
solid German offers making for a
peaceful solution of the situa-
tion."

"Mr. Lloyd George," the news-
paper continues, "completely cap-
itulated to France. The allied
decision was a triumph of the
French policy of revenge, and all
the sinister implications it con-
tains."

No Justification

The newspaper argued that
there was no legal and scant
moral justification for the steps
projected by the entente and asked
why the allies could not have
waited a fortnight longer for the
result of the Upper Silesian
plebiscite. It says three sequels
are almost inevitable—Germany
will lose the plebiscite, which will
still further reduce her paying
capacity; the indemnity will be-
come worthless as an economic
reality, and Marshal Foch's army
will find a "convenient occasion to
take over a vast industrial region
which France has long coveted."

"The ultimate consequences of
this reckless adventure," the
newspaper went on, "may be only
guessed, but Marshal Foch's ad-
vance may soon prove a march to
perdition."

Wants Activity Limited

The newspaper was ex-
pressed by the Daily Express
which urged that Great Britain
limit its participation in military
activities to the minimum.

"If this is the beginning of a
lengthy campaign requiring wide-
spread preparations and the crea-
tion of a great general staff," the
newspaper declared, "it will be
opposed. British taxpayers can-
not support another expensive
venture."

The London Times and the
Morning Post rejoiced that the
conference had produced a "weld-
ing of the entente." The Times
said the German counter-propos-
als had been rejected because they
were not honest, and that the
allies, by occupying German
towns, "would have their hands
on the taps through which a large
amount of German wealth passes,
and they will know how to regulate
the flow."

The Daily Mail asserted the
final speech by Dr. Walter Simons,
head of the German delegation,
was "impudent and cynical," and
that every sentence was an af-
front.

Even the Laborite Herald, while
it called the penalties a sheer
colossal folly," said Dr. Simons'
speech was "a model of tactless-
ness and inaptitude." The news-
paper consoled itself, however, by
asserting: "From a revolutionary
viewpoint, the penalties will be all
for good, as the end must be a
crash from which revolution will
arise."

SMALLPOX INCREASE
ALBERTA PROVINCE

Report of Medical Health Officer
Shows 536 Cases for Year

According to the report of the
provincial medical health officer,
Dr. Laidlaw, as presented to the
legislature by Hon. C. R. Mitchell,
minister of health, the number of
cases of influenza in the province
in 1920 was reduced to less than
3,000 from 7,000 the year pre-
vious.

Smallpox, however, showed
more signs of activity on the part
of its microbe and there were 536
cases as compared with 101 the
year previous.

Diphtheria was 608 compared
with 174 the year previous, tuber-
culosis, 428 compared with 58
reported the year previous, ty-
phoid fever 285 compared with
187 the year previous, measles
1,995 to 343 in 1919, whooping
cough 704 compared with 183 the
year previous, chickenpox 108
compared with 303 the year pre-
vious, mumps went up to 570 from
8 the year before.

Infantile paralysis did not give
a return at all last year, compared
with 10 the year previous, and
lethargic encephalitis registered
11 compared with 42 the year
before.

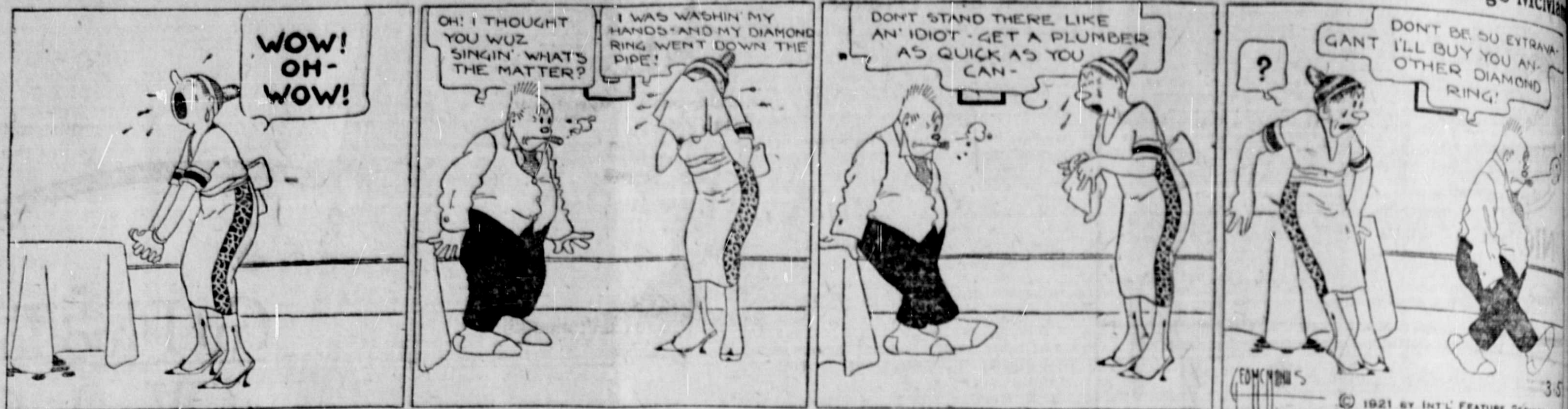

In the Letter Box

BROTHERHOOD OF MAN

Editor, the Daily News—I met an atheist yesterday for the first time in my life, that is one who does not believe in the existence of God. When I asked where in literature was that theory supported, I was directed to Grant Allen's "Evolution of the Idea of God." As this book was published many years ago, under the auspices of the Rationalist Society, it may that many others are reading it, and misinterpreting it, just as sadly as my friend the atheist mentioned above.

Agnostic Position

Whatever else Grant Allen endeavors to do, he does not attempt to destroy belief in the existence of God. He would not be so foolish. On the very first page he intimates as plainly as the English language can express it that such is not his idea. Indeed he accepts the existence of a Supreme Being. His book is an attempt to trace the evolution of man's conception of that Being. His position is the Agnostic one, or our inability to know God. Naturally he throws a good deal of ridicule at the credulities of the beliefs in God in the evolutionary process, but as well laugh at the attempts of the child to spell "phthisis" when it is only at the stage when it can spell "cat."

Survival of Fittest

Let us suppose that all men should throw over belief in God, and that this disbelief should be maintained until the very atmosphere built up around our civilization, by centuries of Christian teaching, should disappear. What would the result be? Might world then be right, and the animal law of the survival of the fittest would be in the ascendant. Conduct would descend to mere expediency, and justice and right would have no basis. St. Paul having in mind such a condition said—"Let us eat and drink for tomorrow we die."

If on the other hand we all accepted the existence of God as a truth, His existence would mean nothing to us unless we could know something about Him, other than that He is the Great First Cause. Jesus knew this and so gave us the highest revelation of God we are capable of understanding. He said God is our Father. Now fatherhood is antecedent to the family, or in other words there cannot be fatherhood without the family. We are God's family therefore we are brethren.

Brotherhood

The natural sequence of the fatherhood of God is the brotherhood of man. Brotherhood can exist on no other basis. If all men accepted Christ's idea of brotherhood as based in God, what would the result be? It would be impossible to think of differences in the family of God. Quarrels would cease, warfare disappear and

We trust you will pardon us for asking valuable space in your paper, nor would we do so were it merely to air a personal grievance, but when an unprovoked, wanton and malicious attack is made in public print upon a reputable labor union by an employer in that trade, it then becomes a matter of general concern and the true facts of the case should be laid before the public.

First, that he was an associate member of the sheetmetal workers union.

Second, that he had not received an invitation to the Plumbers' and Sheet Metal Workers' social.

Third, that he had been informed casually by a Mr. Murray on the afternoon preceding the social, which was a Tuesday, the secretary, a kid named Robertson, was requested to send him an invitation.

Fourth, that he had been told by a Mr. Sutherland, foreman in Steen & Longwill's shop, that the union could not let him have a man without the consent of Jim Steen.

Now, Mr. Editor, permit me to examine each and every one of

would not let him have a man without asking Jim Steen's permission; on the contrary if Mr. Rowe applies to Local 672 to procure him a man, we will be pleased to fill the order.

Union Shops.

Mr. Rowe did ask Mr. Sutherland during a short rush of work if he could borrow a man from Steen & Longwill's staff, which we believe any unprejudiced person will agree with us was a matter in which Steen & Longwill should be consulted. The union label belongs to the mechanics and not to the shop and if Mr. Rowe employs union mechanics they will carry the label to his shop and not otherwise. The remedy rests with him.

We hold no brief for Mr. Steen who is well able to take care of himself, he is not a member of our local but his shop is one hundred per cent union, and we have always received fair treatment in our dealings with the firm.

We believe Mr. Rowe's statements about him are entitled to as little consideration as those about the union.

We must apologize for taking so much space but plead in extenuation that it is a matter of grave concern to the public at large and the labor unions in particular, that a public sheet, however obscure can be found to lend its columns to the venting of personal spite upon returned war veterans and the labor unions to which they belong.

SIR DOUGLAS CAMERON SAYS FREIGHTS HIGH

Scores Board of Railway Commissioners for Recent Ruling

WINNIPEG, Mar. 12.—Trade and commerce is being strangled in Canada through the increased freight rates put in effect some months ago by the Board of Railway Commissioners of which Hon. Frank Carvell is the chairman, according to Sir Douglas Cameron of Vancouver, president of the Rat Portage Lumber Co., and former lieutenant-governor of Manitoba, who is at the Royal Alexandra hotel.

"The railway commission," declared Sir Douglas, "has in the past been of great service to Canada, but as constituted today it is a menace."

"I believe the public should rise up and have this matter of freight rates satisfactorily adjusted," he said.

Under existing conditions, the railways, according to Sir Douglas, are "under the shelter" of the Board of Railway Commissioners, and they take cover in the commission's ruling when arguments are laid before them that freight rates should not be so high.

"It would be in the best interests of Canada if railways and shippers" were on more intimate terms," said Sir Douglas; "I mean that shippers should be in a position to go to the railways, lay their problems on the table, and both interests determine what would be the most advantageous agreement for all parties concerned, having regard always for the future of Canada."

MURDER—INSANE.

MONTREAL, March 10.—Major Robert Griffith, self-confessed slayer of William Holland, a broker, who was shot on January 14, was found by a jury until 10 stand trial because of insanity. He will be confined pending instructions from the lieutenant-governor.


