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Premier Urges Use of Common Sense POLITICAL LEADERS BOTH ADDRESS MEETINGS EASTERN CANADA

Lloyd George In Speaking at Inverness Advises Conference Not Try Reconcile Extremists

INVERNESS, Oct. 4.—Premier Lloyd George, in speaking at a public meeting here last night, declared that the conference on October 11 at London between the British Government and the Sinn Fein delegates would succeed if those who entered it would make up their minds to use common sense. They should represent the majority of the people and not to reconcile the extremists to the disarmament conference at Washington, he said. Lloyd George said that it constituted the outstanding problem which would affect human history for centuries.

FIRST GAME OF BASEBALL TOMORROW

Stage All Set for Opening
Game at New York—
Giants vs. Yankees.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The Metropolitan is all worked up over the world baseball series, the first game of which will be played here tomorrow. Both New York teams held their final practice today and the weather outlook for tomorrow is fine.

American league clubs have won eleven world series and the New York Yankees will try to make it twelve this year. Since this classic first was played in 1903 National League clubs have won but six times and the New York Giants are anxious this year to add another to their league's string. The world series baseball has been played every year since 1903 with the exception of 1904.

CHANGES TO BE MADE IN STAFF CITY ENGINEER

Malcolm McLeod, Road Foreman,
in Charge Tools; W. James
Road Work.

Changes in the staff of the city engineer's office are to be made according to a resolution which was moved by Ald. Kerr, seconded by Ald. Parker, and passed by the city council last night. Malcolm McLeod, now road foreman will be placed in charge of all the city tools and equipment, and W. James will take charge of all road and street work under the city engineer. Ald. Kerr explained that under this arrangement he believed the city road work would be carried on more efficiently. It would also be in the interests of economy to have one man in charge of tools so that they could be distributed properly. Ald. Perry asked that the Utilities Committee be given an opportunity to consult with the Superintendent of Utilities before the rule in regard to tools was made applicable to that department.

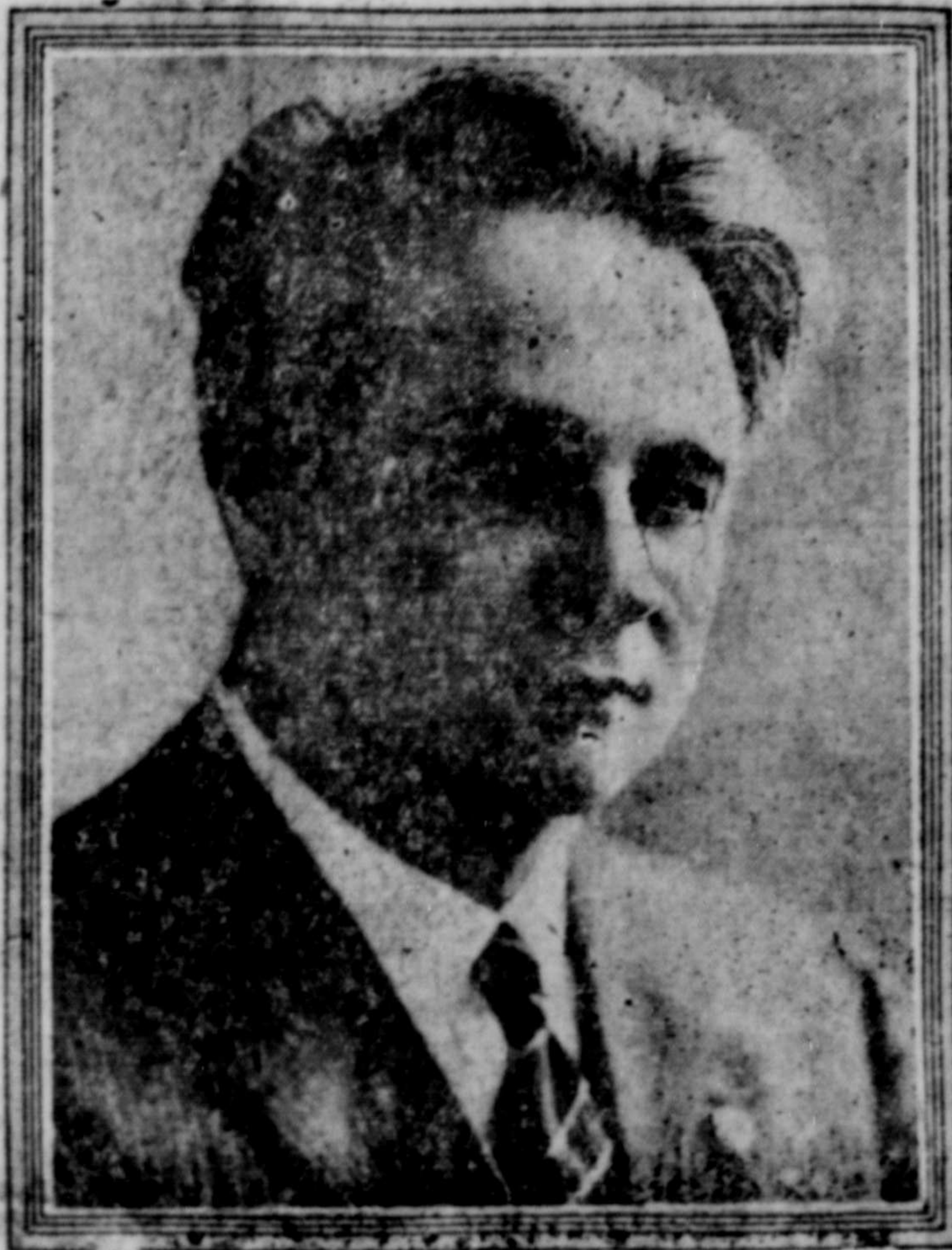
AMERICAN NATIONAL DEBT IS REDUCED

YANKEES ARE FAVORITES IN WORLD SERIES

First Entry of American League
Team into World's Series;
Giants' Sixth.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The New York Yankees seem to be the favorites in betting circles for this year's World Series. Odds in almost every case are being offered on the American League team. Yesterday 7 to 5 seemed to be the popular rating; today the tendency is towards 2 to 1 and even greater odds have been taken.

The Yankees are given credit for better team work and heavy hitting abilities than the Giants. As far as a World Series is concerned the Yankees are an unknown quantity. This year marks their first entry into the annual garden party. On the other hand the Giants have been in five already but have been successful only in winning one—that one away back in 1905 when they beat the Philadelphia Athletics.

VANCOUVER LIQUOR RING

San Francisco Prohibition Super-
visors Say Business Men
Are Behind It.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—Two prominent Vancouver business men, who are at present unnamed, are said to be financing an alleged liquor ring for the shipping of liquor into the United States say prohibition supervisors here who have arrested four liquor smugglers in San Mateo county. They are accused of bringing in a big quantity of liquor from Canada.

COL. PECK IS COMING NORTH

Leaving on Steamer Venture With
Hon. S. F. Tolmie for
Prince Rupert.

A telegram has been received in the city from Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck saying he is leaving for Prince Rupert on the Venture, in company with Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, and wishes to meet the executive of the Agricultural Association and also the creditors of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company.

Colonel Peck further says that the visit is non-political. The Venture is due to arrive here Thursday night or possibly Friday morning. The visitors will proceed to the interior.

WORKMAN SERIOUSLY INJURED AT WALLACE SHIPYARD YESTERDAY

Today at the General Hospital he is making as good progress as possible, although it is not certain how serious the permanent effects of the injuries may be.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 4.—The mill and plant of the Canada Lumber Co. has been destroyed by fire. The loss will be \$100,000. The plant was located at the foot of Smythe Street.

Mackenzie King Says Liberals Fought Battles of Farmers in Reciprocity Election of 1911

DIGBY, N. S., Oct. 4.—W. L. Mackenzie King at a public meeting here last night said that if the Liberals had not gone down to defeat fighting the battles of the farmers for reciprocity there might have been some excuse for putting farmer candidates in every riding. As it was these could only divide the forces of progress and further the Government interests.

Meighen Denounces Mackenzie King.

AMHERST, Oct. 4.—Premier Arthur Meighen was well received at a public meeting here last night. Before an audience of two thousand people he outlined the Government's policies.

Hon. F. B. McCurdy, minister of public works, scathingly denounced the war record of W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition.

Premier Meighen declared that Canada would be commercially absorbed by the United States if protection was removed.

GIANT METEOR HALIBUT IS NEAR EDMONTON SELLING AT BIG PRICES

Immense Rock, Quarter of Mile
Across, Thought to Have
Been Star.

This Morning 20.6c Was Reached
for First Class Fish.

E. N. Enholm and A. W. Johnson, who are now on their way to Edmonton from Chicago, are making plans to investigate what is believed to be a giant meteor discovered by the latter, says the Edmonton Bulletin. Mr. Johnson was trapping at the time of the discovery and did not have much occasion to look into the matter carefully. He is certain however, that it is a meteor far exceeding in size anything in that line hitherto discovered.

Location of the alleged meteor is roughly southwest of Edmonton, between Red Deer and the Rocky Mountain foothills. The territory is described as level, the ground being sandy and covered with a light growth of Jack-pine. It is stated that all indications point to a single meteor, covering roughly a quarter of a mile in extent, and accompanied by numerous smaller meteors, having come to earth at that point within recent years.

It lies within a hollow apparently dug out by the force of the impact and itself protrudes some forty feet above the ground. Supposition is that it is partly buried in the hole of its own making. It is described as being glazed on the surface and gray in color. Surrounding timber is badly burned and stripped and indications are that the meteor, if such it is, fell within the last decade.

Messrs Enholm and Johnson are planning to make a special trip to the scene very shortly and will make a thorough investigation and will bring away samples of the material for analysis so that if it contains any metal of value, such as platinum, they will profit by the effort.

FREIGHTER AGROUND BUT FLOATS AGAIN

Arizonian Went Up Early This
Morning—Now on Way to

SEATTLE, Oct. 4.—The steel freighter Arizonian was aground early this morning near Limekiln, Gulf of Georgia. She was later floated and proceeded under her own steam to Esquimalt where she will be dry docked.

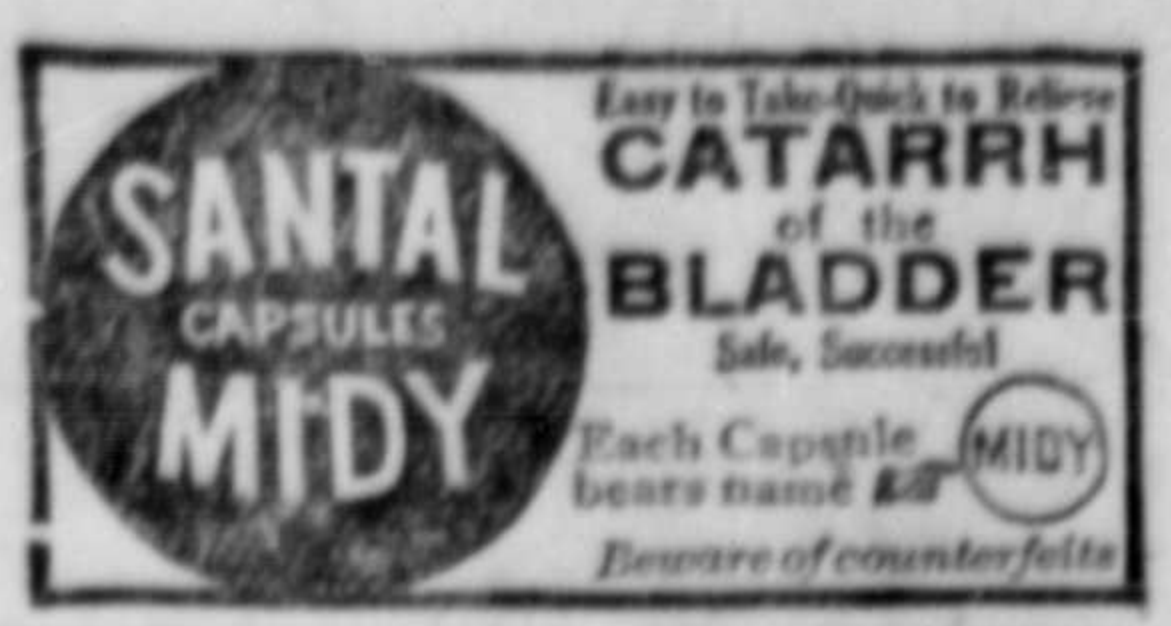

GYMNASIUM BEING USED

Fifty Children Played Basketball Yesterday at Former Manual Training Building.

There was a great time at the Methodist Church gymnasium yesterday, the old manual training building being used for the purpose of physical classes and basketball practice. Between four o'clock in the afternoon and nine in the evening five classes aggregating fifty young people took advantage of the opportunity to get some instruction in preliminary basketball work.

The girls came in the afternoon to the number of about twenty and played basketball. Rev. G. G. Hacker being the instructor. In the evening the boys were in charge of Messrs Wilding and Edwards and they enjoyed it to the full.

The building is to be used by the Telephone girls on Thursday afternoons for basketball practice and there are gym classes for young men on Wednesdays at 7 and older men at 8. Mr. Hacker says the building may be used for a businessmen's class or any other group at times to be arranged.

SECTION FIVE STREET GRADING

City Engineer Reports Cost Under Simplified Scheme Would Be \$65,000.

MATTER REFERRED TO FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Section Five street grading project came before the city council again at the meeting last night and after discussion in committee it was left in the hands of the Finance Committee to ascertain if temporary financing cannot be arranged to at least get the work started.

The city engineer had a report on the simplified scheme of doing the work whereby all the streets with the exception of McBride and Fulton Streets are to be graded to a width of 16 feet and McBride and Fulton Streets 20 feet with plank walks on the eastern sides. According to the latest report there will be a total frontage of 11,163 feet, 7-531 feet of which will be assessable. The total cost will be \$65,528.16 and the cost per front foot will be \$11.90, \$8.71 of which would be paid by the property owners abutting. On the five year basis the tax rate per year per front foot would be \$2.14, on the ten year basis, \$1.24 per front foot.

Mayor Rochester remarked that the total cost of this reduced scheme had come to a higher figure than he had expected.

Ald. Dybhavn also thought the estimated cost was high. He would be afraid to go ahead with a \$65,000 scheme. He was practically satisfied that such a project could not be financed at the present time. Bonds could be sold for the work but then there would be no money available this year on that plan. The only other method for quick action would be by temporary financing which he was doubtful could be arranged. He had expected that the matter would have been before the council much earlier in the year than this. The Finance Committee would, however, undertake to ascertain what could be done in

the way of arranging temporary financing.

The city engineer was called in and explained that he had found it impossible to make the cost any less than \$65,000 on the new scheme. McBride and Fulton Streets would have the same work as under the first scheme. There would not be much reduction on the other streets. He did not think that the work could be done for less than \$65,000.

Answering an inquiry from Ald. Parker, Mr. Clements stated that new plank roads in the section would cost \$4.60 per front foot as against \$11.90 under the permanent scheme now proposed.

Methods of starting the work and the manner of carrying it out, by contract, station work or day labor, were discussed and finally the committee arose referring the matter to the Finance Committee.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—A great deal of the credit for bringing the New York Giants successfully through the 1921 pennant campaign is being given to Hughie Jennings, the grass-chewing, jumping jack, who won managerial fame as leader of the Detroit Tigers.

In October of 1920, Jennings signed a contract to serve as assistant manager of the Giants, taking the place made vacant by Johnny Evers, who had been selected to manage the Chicago Cubs. The acquisition of Jennings by the Giants came as a surprise to the fans and it was generally predicted that he would be one of the most able assistants John McGraw ever had.

McGraw on Job.

McGraw in no wise relinquished his job as manager, but Hughie began at once to do all the work afield. His "E-yah" and grass pulling had been seen before at the Polo Grounds but with Hughie as a "Giant," the fans took him differently. It was "Atta-boy Hughie" where before it had been "Aw, go and lay down."

The good-natured Jennings soon won favor with the players and his fighting spirit helped them to pull through many tough games. Jennings is considered a great little general and has proved an able second-helmsman.

Manager Fifteen Years.

This is Jennings' 15th year as a leader. He won pennants in the American League with Detroit in 1907, 1908, and 1909. He is not exactly a stranger in the National League, having spent several seasons with teams representing Baltimore, Brooklyn and Philadelphia in the older circuit. He was a comrade of McGraw's on the famous old Oriole aggregation.

Jennings was born at Pittston, Pa., in 1870, and first played professional baseball with the Leighton, Pa., club in 1890. The following year he signed with the Louisville, Ky., club of the American Association playing first base and short. In 1894, he was traded to Baltimore Nationals and four years later was shifted to the Brooklyn Nationals. In 1901, he became manager and captain of the Philadelphia Nationals and two years later returned to the Baltimore, Eastern League club, playing second and short until 1907 when he was drafted by Detroit. He was made manager and won the pennant that year. All of his Detroit teams were regarded as pennant contenders.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 4.—F. F. Busted, formerly general superintendent for the Canadian Pacific Railway here, is dead, aged 63 years.

Sport Chat

Tonight all basketball fans and players will get together at the annual meeting of the Basketball Association in the city council chamber. The Gray Cup, emblematic of the football championship of Central B. C., has been won this season by Telkwa; the team from the Bulkley Valley town having last Wednesday defeated Hazelton, the former holders, by a score of 4 to 1. Telkwa had formerly defeated Smithers in an elimination game. The last game was a closer one than the score would indicate and was not lacking in interest. High feelings, engendered by the stubbornness of the contest, precipitated several fist fights, which interrupted the game somewhat. Jack Frost, formerly of this city, played goal for Hazelton and is given credit for having made the best showing of the Hazelton players.

The New York National League baseball club, which enters the world's series this year, came into being in 1883 with John B. Day, a patron of the game financing the project. James Mutrie, whose name still lives as the "Father of the Giants" induced Day to back the club after the game had been tried on the old polo grounds, then on Fifth Avenue. All the first players were large in stature and were then named the "Giants" which name has stuck to them ever since. Mutrie was the manager under Day. In 1893 Cornelius Van Gott became president of the club and in 1895 Andrew Freedman purchased it. John W. Ward was manager under Van Gott and Freedman had eleven managers during his regime: George Davis, Jack Doyle, Harvey Watkins, Arthur Irwin, Bill Joyce, Capt. A. C. Anson, John B. Day, Fred Hoey, Buck Ewing, George Smith and Horace Fogel. In 1903 John T. Brush purchased the team and put John J. McGraw in control where he has been ever since. In 1911 Harry Hempstead succeeded his father-in-law, Brush, as owner and in 1919 Charles A. Stoneham, John McGraw and Francis McQuade purchased the controlling stock from the Brush estate. Stoneham now is president.

He has been known to go without a meal to give succor to a hungry waif, and he has even befriended luckless whites. Rugg's kinsman, states a press report, died in prison where he had no opportunity to spend the value of some property that increased in value during his long incarceration. The aged shoeblack says he will give \$1000 to poor blacks and invest the rest in a little truck farm, thus carrying out his lifelong ambition.

MEXICAN CONSUL BUT NO CITIZENS OF THAT COUNTRY IN PROVINCE

VICTORIA, Oct. 3.—The republic of Mexico has a full consulate in British Columbia, without a single subject of Mexico residing in this province.
