NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The Metropolis is all worked up over the world baseball series, the first game of which will be played here tomorrow. Both New York teams held their final practice today and the weather outlook for tomorrow is fine.

American league clubs have won eleven world series and the New York Yankees will try to make it twelve this year. Since this classic first was played in 1903 National League clubs have won but six times and the New York Giants are anxious this year to add another to their league's string.

The world series baseball has been played every year since 1903 with the exception of 1904.

CHANGES TO BE  
MADE IN STAFF  
CITY ENGINEER

Malcolm McLeod, Road Foreman, in Charge Tools; W. James Road Work.

Changes in the staff of the city engineer's office are to be made according to a resolution which was moved by Ald. Kerr, seconded by Ald. Parker, and passed by the city council last night.

Malcolm McLeod, now road foreman will be placed in charge of all the city tools and equipment and W. James will take charge of all road and street work under the city engineer.

Ald. Kerr explained that under this arrangement he believed the city road work would be carried on more efficiently. It would also be in the interests of economy to have one man in charge of tools so that they could be distributed properly.

Ald. Kerr asked that the Utilities Committee be given an opportunity to consult with the Superintendent of Utilities before the rule in regard to tools was made applicable to that department.

YANKEES ARE  
FAVORITES IN  
WORLD SERIES

First Entry of American League Team Into World's Series;  
Giants' Sixth.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The New York Yankees seem to be the favorites in betting circles for this year's World Series. Odds in almost every case are being offered on the American League team. Yesterday 7 to 5 seemed to be the popular rating; today the tendency is towards 2 to 1 and even greater odds have been taken.

The Yankees are given credit for better team work and heavy hitting abilities than the Giants.

As far as a World Series is concerned the Yankees are an unknown quantity. This year marks their first entry into the annual garden party. On the other hand the Giants have been in five already but have been successful only in winning one—one away back in 1905 when they beat the Philadelphia Athletics.

LIQUOR RING

San Francisco Prohibition Supervisors Say Business Men Are Behind It.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—Two prominent Vancouver business men, who are at present unnamed, are said to be financing an alleged liquor ring for the shipping of liquor into the United States. The San Francisco Prohibition Supervisors here who have arrested four liquor smugglers in San Mateo county. They are accused of bringing in a big quantity of liquor from Canada.

COL. PECK IS

Colonel Peck further says that the visit is non-political.

The Venture is due to arrive here Thursday night or possibly Friday morning. The visitors will proceed to the interior.

WORKMAN SERIOUSLY

Canada Lumber & Timber Co., at Foot of Smythe Street Sustains \$100,000 Loss.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 4.—The mill and plant of the Canada Lumber Co. has been destroyed by fire. The loss will be \$100,000. The plant was located at the foot of Smythe Street.

Mackenzie King Says Liberals  
Fought Battles of Farmers in  
Reciprocity Election of 1911

DIGBY, N. S., Oct. 4.—W. L. Mackenzie King at a public meeting here last night said that if the Liberals had not gone down to defeat fighting the battles of the farmers for reciprocity there might have been some excuse for putting farmer candidates in every riding. As it was these could only divide the forces of progress and further the Government interests.

Meighen Denounces Mackenzie King.

AMHERST, Oct. 4.—Premier Arthur Meighen was well received at a public meeting here last night. Before an audience of two thousand people he outlined the Government's policies.

Hon. F. B. McCurdy, minister of public works, scathingly denounced the war record of W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition.

Premier Meighen declared that Canada would be commercially absorbed by the United States if protection was removed.

Do Parents Make  
Home Attractive?

The tendency of the day is toward living away from home and making the home just a place at which to sleep and eat occasionally. Men and women of the last generation deplore the tendency of the age, which is to get away from the family life ideal and instead to spend the evenings away from home. They claim, and with a measure of truth, that the time when girls did needlework or spent their time in other home occupations is gone and that instead the young people wish to get away from home influences. This is to a certain extent true, and yet is it not also true that the fault lies largely with the men and women of the older generation who are doing the complaining? If they made the home sufficiently attractive to combat the outside influences the young people would stay there. Many parents forget that they have a duty to make the home pleasant, to provide amusement there, and to invite young people with whom their sons and daughters may associate. If the parents do not invite young people to their homes the children will go where the young people are. Make the home attractive and the young people will not be so prone to wander away. Parents forget the need of companionship and fail to adapt themselves to changing conditions. Parents are often in need of education even more than children.

Slipshod Marriages  
Lead to Divorce.

Divorce records of British Columbia show an increase of 30 per cent. in twelve months. No wonder. Testimony in some instances reveal an acquaintance of a couple of weeks preceding the marriage, while several instances show the weddings were "mail order" or matrimonial bureau matches. All of these, it was demonstrated, were marriages made of hasty acquaintances by mail, with hardly any personal acquaintance when brides and grooms came from distant parts of the United States to complete the contract. One old man met an elderly relative of his expected blooming fiancee. He took a chance and married her after the woman threatened to sue him for damages. That is only a couple of weeks ago. Now he is in the divorce court.

Our divorce courts will always have a constant run of business so long as marriage is treated flippantly. The amazing part of the thing is there are not more of them, when all things are considered.

Strange, isn't it, that a man will dicker half a day over the purchase of a tattered set of harness, but will rush into wedlock with a slatternly shrew, open-eyed, on the impulse of an ill-tempered moment?

And how often will one find a shrewd housewife clawing over the contents of a remnant sale for a whole afternoon to save a few cents, but who will smirkingly yield her life's future to a beery old bum whose acquaintance a self-respecting devil would shun? There will always be divorces so long as wedlock is regarded in this haphazard way.

Specialize in Something,  
Young Friend.

This is a little lay sermon to you, young man, or you, young lady. If you are soon to go out in life to make your way in the world, don't make the mistake of thinking the world has a welcome for you unless you can do something particularly well. Without training you will be out of luck. The cities and towns are filled with mediocre men and women who never learned to do something well. British Columbia has thousands of them—failures all.

Some girls imagine a happy, ideal marriage will come along to simplify things and render training unnecessary. We hope it will turn out that way, but it seldom does. Learn to cook and keep house, anyway. You owe at least that much to him and to the kiddies that come. But don't be too sure about the ideal marriage. They are scarce at best. Probably you will have to earn your own living. Learn to do it to perfection. If you follow a commercial course, learn to spell perfectly. Many girls in the cities are constantly getting "fired" and hired and "fired" again because the weary employer has no time to fool with getting the same letters written over half a dozen times. And the same thing with anything else you learn to do for your keep. Make sure you know it well.

And you, young man—learn a trade or some particular method of earning a living, no matter what it honestly is. Without a trade you will soon drift into the workless ranks in town or city. Vancouver, Victoria—all over this province of ours—there are thousands of human misfits, human weeds, effigies of mankind, wastrels, wrecks, dismal failures—the fellows who never troubled to learn something when they had the chance. Remember, you cannot "get by" without knowing how to do something well. The world is exacting and has no place for the untrained. Get busy now while this idea is hot in your mind, and learn, something, well!

ALD. SILVERSIDES  
IN CRITICAL MOODCalled Board of Works to Task  
at Council Meeting Last  
Night on Several Points.

Ald. Silversides was in a critical mood at last night's council meeting and called the Board of Works to task on several points.

First he wanted to know why planks had been taken to Eighth Avenue and decking work commenced on either end of the avenue and then the planks had been removed without the job being finished. Ald. Kerr explained that the Board of Works did not know anything about this decking and had not authorized it. The foreman in charge it had seemed had wanted to use up some plank. The work had been ordered stopped by the mayor.

Then Ald. Silversides wanted to know if something could not be done on Taylor Street. That street was in bad condition and was almost impassable. Would it not be possible to take some of the old planks from Fulton Street and lay them down there? Ald. Kerr replied that the road foreman said nothing could be done for Taylor Street and suggested personal reasons for this decision. He knew that Taylor Street was in bad shape. Finally the matter was left with the mayor for attention. The mayor stated that changes in the conduct of work in the city engineer's office had been made. There was now an order book where orders were written instead of the verbal system that had been in vogue.

Alderman Silversides also wanted to know what was being done about Summit Avenue. Ald. Kerr said that the Board of Works would have a report on this for next meeting.





## SECTION FIVE STREET GRADING

City Engineer Reports Cost Under Simplified Scheme Would Be \$65,000.

### MATTER REFERRED TO FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Section Five street grading project came before the city council again at the meeting last night and after discussion in committee it was left in the hands of the Finance Committee to ascertain if temporary financing cannot be arranged to at least get the work started.

The city engineer had a report on the simplified scheme of doing the work whereby all the streets with the exception of McBride and Fulton Streets are to be graded to a width of 16 feet and McBride and Fulton Streets 20 feet with plank walks on the eastern sides. According to the latest report there will be a total frontage of 11,163 feet, 7,531 feet of which will be assessable. The total cost will be \$65,528.16 and the cost per front foot will be \$11.90, \$8.71 of which would be paid by the property owners abutting. On the five year basis the tax rate per year per front foot would be \$2.14, on the ten year basis, \$1.24 per front foot.

## JENNINGS IS ABLE LEADER

Hughie Jennings, Assistant Manager of Giants, Given Credit For Success.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—A great deal of the credit for bringing the New York Giants successfully through the 1921 pennant campaign is being given to Hughie Jennings, the grass-chewing, jumping jack, who won managerial fame as leader of the Detroit Tigers.

In October of 1920, Jennings signed a contract to serve as assistant manager of the Giants, taking the place made vacant by Johnny Evers, who had been selected to manage the Chicago Cubs. The acquisition of Jennings by the Giants came as a surprise to the fans and it was generally predicted that he would be one of the most able assistants John McGraw ever had.

### McGraw on Job.

McGraw in no wise relinquished his job as manager but Hughie began at once to do all the work itself. His "E-yah" and grass pulling had been seen before at the Polo Grounds but with Hughie as a giant, the fans took him differently. It was "Atta-boy Hughey" where before it had been "Aw, go and lay down."

The good-natured Jennings soon won favor with the players and his fighting spirit helped them to pull through many tough games. Jennings is considered a great little general and has proved an able second-helmsman.

### Manager Fifteen Years.

This is Jennings' 15th year as a leader. He won pennants in the American League with Detroit in 1907, 1908, and 1909. He is not exactly a stranger in the National League, having spent several seasons with teams representing Baltimore, Brooklyn and Philadelphia in the older circuit. He was a comrade of McGraw's on the famous old Oriole aggregation.

Jennings was born at Pittston, Pa., in 1870, and first played professional baseball with the Leighton, Pa., club in 1890. The following year he signed with the Louisville, Ky., club of the American Association playing first base and short. In 1891, he was traded to Baltimore Nationals and four years later was shifted to the Brooklyn Nationals. In 1901, he became manager and captain of the Philadelphia Nationals and two years later returned to the Baltimore, Eastern League club, playing second and short until 1907 when he was drafted by Detroit. He was made manager and won the pennant that year. All of his Detroit teams were regarded as pennant contenders.
