Big Fire Destroys Part of Alice Arm

SYMPATHETIC STRIKE TONIGHT FOLLOWING SPLIT IN THE LABOR RANKS

Sensational Split in Ranks Of Labor Results in Calling Off Triple Alliance Strike

LONDON, April 15.—(Noon)—The complexion of the black-national crisis ever faced by Great Britain was completely changed this afternoon when an unexpected and sensational split in the ranks of the Triple Alliance of Labor occurred. The prospect of a railwaymen and transport workers, which was in effect tonight, is off and the hopes for the settlement of the whole strike are much enhanced.

Events have developed with such sudden and startling rapidity that the public are left in amazement. Simultaneously with the announcement of Premier Lloyd George that the miners were to accept the invitation to renew negotiations, the railwaymen and transport workers announced that tonight's strike had been cancelled. After hearing this news it was decided to call off the delegates of the miners from all the coal fields into conference with the mine owners and authorities tomorrow.

LIQUOR BOARD MEET TODAY TO DISCUSS PLANS

Liquor Buyers and Tasters Want
Jobs But No Appointments
To Be Made.

VICTORIA, April 15.—The first sitting of the new liquor board will be held here today when plans to open government stores throughout the province will be discussed. It is likely there will be a whole chain of stores to extend gradually from the present Victoria and Vancouver stores.

Chairman Archie Johnson has been besieged with applications for positions as liquor buyers, liquor tasters, inspectors and liquor experts of every kind, but no appointments of this kind will be made until the government stores get under way next month.

Nothing is known in government circles of a reported refusal of J. H. Falconer to accept a position on the board because the salary is only \$5,500 instead of \$10,000. The premier said there was no justification for paying men on the liquor board as much or more than paid the premier of the province.

CHAIN OF STORES TO BE OPENED GRADUALLY

Salary of Commissioners Set at
\$5,500 a Year—Falconer
Not Satisfied.

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Alice Arm was Visited This Morning with Biggest Blaze In History of Silver Camp

ALICE ARM, April 15.—About one third of the business section of this town was wiped out this morning in the biggest conflagration that has ever visited Alice Arm. The fire broke out at 2 o'clock in the Exchange Grill, a small restaurant owned by George Merrill, and, favored with a south wind blowing up the Arm, quickly gained hold and destroyed the Prospectors' Home, a two-storey log rooming house owned by A. Maguire, and a store owned by O. Gray.

After the blaze had started the wind changed and assisted the work of the fire fighters before the Royal Bank and the post office had caught, but not before the flames had leaped across the street and swept up James McAleenan's cigar store and residence in their path.

There is no organized fire fighting brigade in Alice Arm for the town has been singularly fortunate in the past in having no serious blazes. The citizens came out in the early hours with a will and the volunteer fire fighters worked most energetically with buckets to quell the flames that threatened the large part of the settlement on the fire flats.

Spectacular Blaze

All the buildings mentioned were completely destroyed, the fronts of the fire fighters being directed towards the saving of the rest of the town when the destruction of the blazing structures was seen to be apparent. The fire was a most spectacular one and the leaping flames with their glare could be seen for miles.

The Maguire hotel is reported to be covered with \$10,000 insurance, the restaurant with \$1,000 and the Gray store with \$500. The store and house belonging to James McAleenan were not insured.

Constable's Report.

Chief Minty, of the provincial police, had the following telegram from Constable D. S. Cameron at Alice Arm this morning: "Fire started 2 a.m. originating in Merrill's restaurant. Part of the business section of town was destroyed. The strenuous efforts of the citizens assisted by a change in wind were successful in arresting the fire. No loss of life or injuries were sustained."

RAILWAY LABOR AGREEMENT TO BE ABROGATED

Each Line will Negotiate
Terms with Employees

LONDON, April 15.—National unions defining the working conditions of American railroad men ordered abrogated on a railway labor board and representatives for a conference.

It is believed that the negotiations will be thrown on the roads and their employees and the present system of the problem as a railway will be cancelled.

198,000 SKUNK PELTS ARE SOLD

Total Proceeds at New York Fur Sale for Yesterday \$560,000.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Bidding continued active yesterday at the spring fur auction now going on in the Masonic Hall here. The mink pelts held over from Wednesday were disposed of first. The entire offering brought prices substantially above the January sale levels.

Nearly 198,000 skunk pelts were sold at prices ranging from unchanged for southwestern to 50 per cent higher for northern and 10 per cent higher for easterns. Leopard was unchanged but badger advanced 15 per cent.

Of the fancy furs sold yesterday chincheilla did best. The average prices paid for it were 15 per cent higher than at the winter sale of the New York Fur Auction Sales Corporation. Russian ermine sold better than American. The former advanced 10 per cent while the latter declined 20.

Sales for the day realized \$560,000, bringing the total to date to \$1,654,811.

MASSETT, April 15.—The Massett Indians purchased an electric lighting plant for the new Anglican Church recently erected by the band on Massett Reserve. The Anglican missionary, Rev. J. Gillett, introduced a moving picture plant which is taken to the various settlements on the islands for the entertainment of the residents. Literary and athletic societies have been organized by the natives who held several socials for the benefit of the funds of the Massett church. The children of the Indian day school, numbering over one hundred pupils, have also held entertainments under the direction of their teachers, Messrs. Alfred Adams and Peter Hill, two Indian graduates of the old Metlakatla School. The Massett Indian day school is credited with the largest attendance of pupils of any Indian day school in the province.

Native Councils.

The election of the councils of Massett and Skidegate bands of Indians took place recently. Massett council comprises Alfred Adams, chief councillor; Roger Wiat, Peter Hill, William Matthews, Robert Ridley and David Jones. The Skidegates, after a keen contest, elected William Russ as their chief councillor, with Jas. McKay, James Sterling, Henry Green, G. W. Young and Solomon Wilson.

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H. LIBUT STATION QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S: FISHING PREPARATIONS

MASSETT, April 15.—Arrangements are under way for the placing of three libut stations on the Queen Charlotte Islands. One will be placed at Lankara, at the extreme north end of the group; another will be placed at Massett Indian reserve; the third will be on Hippo Island, on the west coast of Graham Island, midway between Cape Knox and Skidegate.

Foo-Run Expected

Few of the canneries will operate on the islands this year. The fact that the "soak-ye" do not enter the rivers and that the run of "pinks" occurs only during every second year, means that the supply would be insufficient to supply the canneries. A large number of trollers are preparing for the "spring" and "soak-ye" run, which commences off Lankara Island about the 1st of May. The supply of springs and coils will be marketed through Prince Rupert.
