Big Fire Destroys Part of Alice Arm

SYMPATHETIC STRIKE TONIGHT FOLLOWING SPLIT IN THE LABOR RANKS

Sensational Split in Ranks Of Labor Results in Calling Off Triple Alliance Strike

LONDON, April 15.—(Noon)—The complexion of the black-national crisis ever faced by Great Britain was completely changed this afternoon when an unexpected and sensational split in the ranks of the Triple Alliance of Labor occurred. The prospect of a railwaymen and transport workers, which was on at 2 o'clock tonight, is off and the hopes for the settlement of the whole strike are much enhanced.

Events have developed with such sudden and startling rapidity that the public are left in amazement. Simultaneously with the announcement of Premier Lloyd George that the miners were to accept the invitation to renew negotiations, the railwaymen and transport workers announced that tonight's strike had been cancelled. After hearing this news it was decided to call delegates of the miners from all the coal fields into conference with the mine owners and authorities tomorrow.

M'CAFFERY IS BACK FROM TRIP TO OTTAWA

Was Representing Local Creditors in Fight Against Defunct Shipbuilding Concern.

After having spent some weeks in Ottawa in connection with the bankruptcy proceedings against the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Company and the claims of local creditors, M. P. McCaffery returned to the city on last night's train. Mr. McCaffery had nothing of a definite nature to report this morning but stated that new developments in the situation might be announced shortly.

LIQUOR BOARD MEET TODAY TO DISCUSS PLANS

Liquor Buyers and Tasters Want Jobs But No Appointments To Be Made.

CHAIN OF STORES TO BE OPENED GRADUALLY

Salary of Commissioners Set at \$5,500 a Year—Falconer Not Satisfied.

VICTORIA, April 15.—The first sitting of the new liquor board will be held here today when plans to open government stores throughout the province will be discussed. It is likely there will be a whole chain of stores to extend gradually from the present Victoria and Vancouver stores.

Chairman Archie Johnson has been besieged with applications for positions as liquor buyers, liquor tasters, inspectors and liquor experts of every kind, but no appointments of this kind will be made until the government has set under way next month. Nothing is known in government circles of a reported refusal of J. H. Falconer to accept a position on the board because the salary is only \$5,500 instead of \$10,000. The premier said there was no justification for paying men on the liquor board as much or more than paid the premier of the province.

ALICE ARM, April 15.—About one third of the business section of this town was wiped out this morning in the biggest conflagration that has ever visited Alice Arm. The fire broke out at 2 o'clock in the Exchange Grill, a small restaurant owned by George Merrill, and, favored with a south wind blowing up the Arm, quickly gained hold and destroyed the Prospectors' Home, a two-storey log rooming house owned by A. Maguire, and a store owned by O. Gray.

After the blaze had started the wind changed and assisted the work of the fire fighters before the Royal Bank and the post office had caught, but not before the flames had leaped across the street and swept up James McAleenan's cigar store and residence in their path.

He accompanied Capt. Douglas to the Yukon, stopping off here on his return. A widow and two children survive.

LONDON, April 15.—(a. m.)—A deputation of members of the House of Commons conferred with Premier Lloyd George at midnight and left the interview with brighter hopes of a settlement of the coal dispute.

Leaders of the miners have been invited by the mine owners to continue the discussions. There was little change in the situation last night.

LONDON, April 15.—(Later)—British mine owners and representatives of the National Federation of Miners have accepted an invitation from Premier Lloyd George to renew negotiations with a view to settlement of the miners' strike. The proposal is accepted by the miners subject to the sanction of the other unions making up the triple alliance.

HOW AMERICAN LEAGUE LOOKS

Cleveland Confident Can Repeat—New York Yankees Have Bright Prospects.

CHICAGO, April 15.—American League clubs this year are, almost every one, resting their hopes for pennant honors with the efficiency of their pitching staffs.

The Cleveland Americans, the world's champion team, has started the season with the same line-up that won last year's baseball classic. Manager Tris Speaker, after figuring that the same team that captured the big honors will be able to repeat this season. All the members of last year's team believe the Indians will win the pennant again this year, basing their claim on the judgment that the tribe has the best balanced baseball club in the country.

Torn to Pieces.

Building a pennant contender from the wreckage of one of the greatest teams ever assembled is the task that faced "Kid" Gleason, manager of the Chicago White Sox, this season. The team was torn to pieces last fall as a result of the grand jury indictments charging seven players with participation in the big 1919 scandal. However, the members of the wrecked team who came through clean are all confident that the 1921 White Sox will spring a big surprise built up as they are with Eddie Collins, Faber, Kerr, Ray Shalk, Annos Etrunk and Harry Hooper as a nucleus to a bunch of recruits.

Connie Mack rests his hopes for the Philadelphia Athletics' honor this year on his pitching staff. The pitching and general morale of the team is better according to critics but there are signs that aggressiveness is lacking.

Wealth of Material.

With the wealth of playing material at his disposal, Manager Miller Huggins, of the New York Yankees, has found it difficult to properly place his various players. Not since their debut in the junior league have the New Yorkers started the season with brighter prospects than those that prevail for them now. The team will also be one of the big drawing cards with "Babe" Ruth still on deck.

Manager Lee Fohl, of the St. Louis Americans, has not indulged in any prediction but his team led the American League in batting last season with an average of .308 and ranked with the leaders in the number of runs made. It is expected that the pitchers will better the standing of the team which finished last season in fourth place.

Like the National League in the same city, the Boston Americans will scarcely look the same team with so many changes that have taken place since last fall. The team is a melange that is regarded as dependent for their strength in the pennant competition on two members, Stuffy McGinnis and Derrill Pratt.

Ty Cobb Manager.

With but one or two exceptions, familiar faces appear in the Detroit lineup. The development of the Tiger team will be watched with considerable interest, speculation centering around the managerial ability of Ty Cobb, who makes his debut in this capacity. Although reports tell of utmost harmony among the players and perfect team work in the field, Ty has made the statement that he would not be disappointed if his team finished in sixth place.

The officials of the Washington team claim that they have gotten together a well-balanced machine and if the pitching staff lives up to expectations they should be near the top of the race. Their great hope is still pinned on the veteran, Walter Johnson, and the only position giving concern is third, there being no definite selection for the permanent man as yet.

BASEBALL WORKOUT.

The Elks had a baseball workout at the Acropolis Hill grounds last evening. There were about fifteen prospective players out and some very promising material was displayed.

It is likely that work on the erection of the new court house will eliminate the use of the market Place for the young baseball players, so that there will be but two open evenings at the Acropolis left to divide between three leagues and one is likely to be left out altogether as far as the Acropolis Grounds are concerned and it is hard to say if the remaining two would be satisfied with but one night a week.

The only solution would be the finding of new grounds or the playing of some of the games in the afternoon. On Saturday afternoons the grounds could be devoted to the junior football games or the juvenile baseball games, these two leagues consisting mainly of school boys who would possibly be free at this time. But even if some arrangement were made to this effect it could not prove satisfactory altogether, for it is almost impossible for all the players in any league to be free in the afternoon and even if they were the time would be cramped. There is nothing for it then, it would seem, but that some other ground be provided and the Sixth Avenue and McBride Park seems to be the only place in sight. It would be money well spent if the city carries on with its work there and puts the place in shape for the playing of games. It would certainly relieve the congestion that is bound to be felt at the Acropolis.

With this week's meetings organization work in both the football associations is now well under way. The first games in both lines of sport will be played soon after May 1 and, in the meantime, the players for each club in all the leagues will have to be registered with the baseball and football secretaries. The various clubs have been busy for some time signing up their men and the players have been pretty well allocated. However their pieces will not be official until they have been submitted to and been passed by the associations. There is a plenitude of material here this year and enthusiasm promises to be keen, so the various series should be keenly interesting and successful in every way.

The finance committee of the General Hospital has again written to Hon. T. D. Pattullo asking him what assistance could be expected from the provincial government this year.

SMITHERS TO HAVE STRONG BALL TEAM INCLUDING WALLACE

With a continuation of the present fine weather, another two weeks will see the Smithers baseball team in training at the Polo grounds, says the Interior News. Considerably more interest is being manifested by the fans than has been the case in past years and it is hoped that the game will enjoy a most successful season during the summer months.

Practically the same team that represented this town last year will be lined up again. Wallace, the star hurler of the Telkwa team, will wear a Smithers uniform this year, and with Raymond or MacKay on the receiving end, the locals will have a battery second to none in the North. Several recruits will be given a try out, under the eyes of the management, when the season opens early next month.

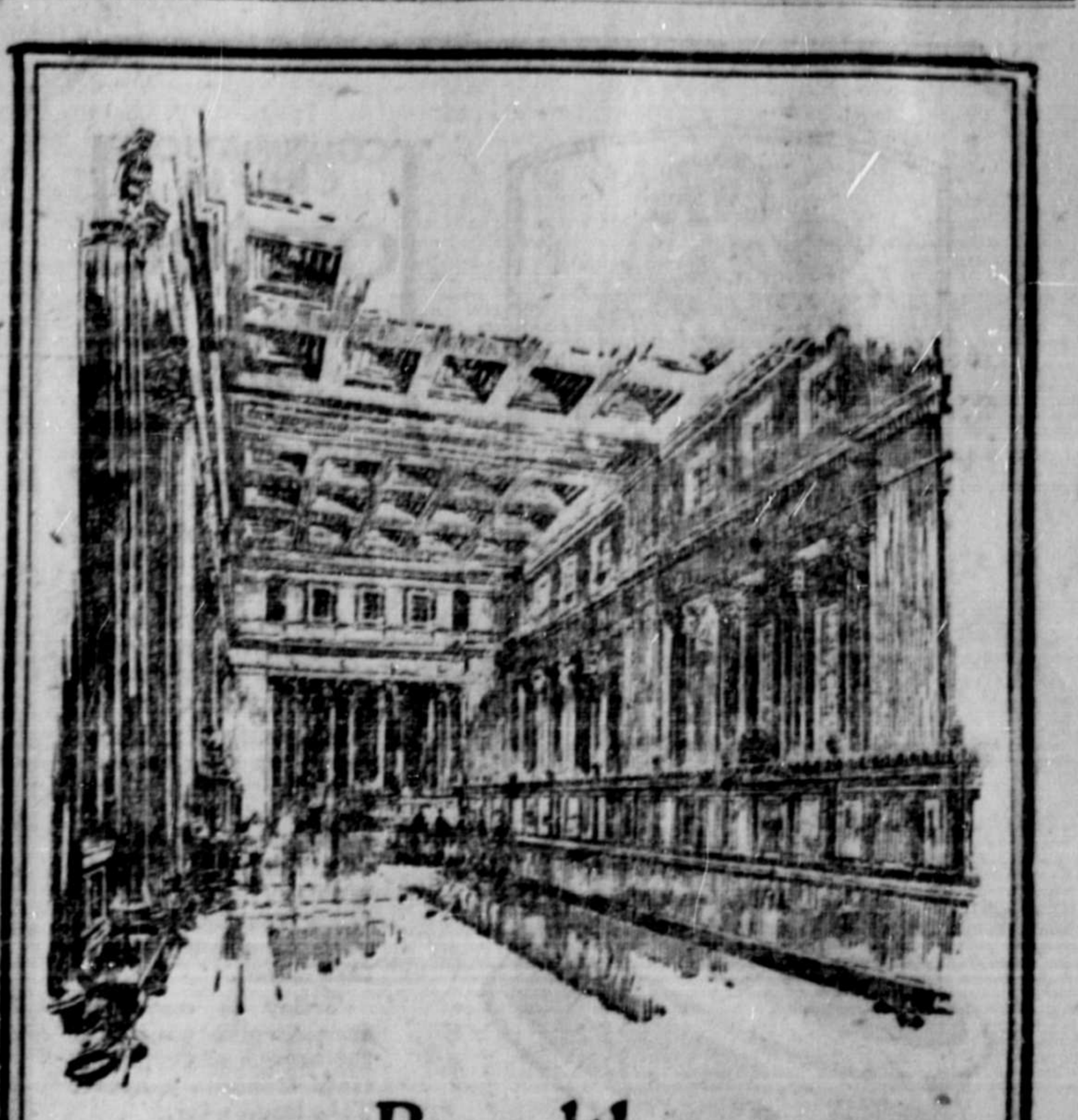

Gillett, introduced a moving picture plant which is taken to the various settlements on the islands for the entertainment of the residents. Literary and athletic societies have been organized by the natives who held several socials for the benefit of the funds of the Massett church. The children of the Indian day school, numbering over one hundred pupils, have also held entertainments under the direction of their teachers, Messrs. Alfred Adams and Peter Hill, two Indian graduates of the old Metlakatla School. The Massett Indian day school is credited with the largest attendance of pupils of any Indian day school in the province.

The election of the councils of Massett and Skidegate bands of Indians took place recently. Massett council comprises Alfred Adams, chief councillor; Roger Wiat, Peter Hill, William Matthews, Robert Ridley and David Jones.

The Skidegates, after a keen contest, elected William Russ as their chief councillor, with Jas. McKay, James Sterling, Henry Green, G. W. Young and Solomon Wilson.
