Unity of Purpose Washington Today

BRITISH SETTLEMENT PROPOSAL WAS ONE DOMINION PARLIAMENT

World Powers in Agreement On General Principle of the U.S. Disarmament Proposals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—In unison the spokesmen of Britain, France, Italy and Japan today accepted the United States' proposals for the limitation of armaments in "spirit and principle," making reservations for suggested modifications in detail. In the following order Arthur J. Balfour of Great Britain, Baron Kato of Japan, Senator Schanzer of Italy and M. Briand of France gave the adherence of their governments to the terms of the proposals.

Mr. Balfour said in part that many of those in his audience citizens of the United States. "The United States stands impregnable with its lines of communication protected by any conceivable hostile attack. It is not merely that you have 110,000,000 people. The geographical position of your Empire makes you wholly immune from the perils to which the Empire is subjected. Suppose your western states suddenly removed ten thousand miles across the sea? Suppose you removed the heart of your country was on a small and crowded island depending on its overseas communication for raw materials. Suppose your population never had more than seven thousand and that this had to be replenished from overseas. You would understand why it is that every citizen of the Empire, no matter where he lives, can forget that it is the communication from which he lives and without which he dies."

Mr. Balfour suggested the submarine tonnage might well be limited and the construction of large submarines prohibited. Taking the battleships as a basis he thought the propositions were reasonable.

It is understood the British acceptance contemplates modification of several important details of the replacement plans.

SLIGHT ENGAGEMENT IN CALICUT REGION OF BRITISH INDIA

MADRAS, India, Nov. 15.—Messages from Calicut report an engagement between rebel and government forces near Kanara Mosque at Vayakad where disputes have previously arisen. One officer and twelve soldiers of a Gurkha regiment were wounded and rebels are reported to have suffered numerous casualties.

BEER ADVOCATES TO GET OPPORTUNITY FOR LEGISLATION

VICTORIA, Nov. 15.—Premier Oliver told a deputation of the Liberty League and the Modernization League of B.C. that full opportunity would be given to introduce a beer clause into the amendments of the Liquor Control Act during the present session and that members would be released from party pledges to vote as they desire individually.

LARGE NUMBER OF MEN WORKING ON ROAD AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Nov. 15.—Thirty-five men are working on the building of the road from Houston to Knockhill which will put from Telkwa to Burns Lake. Angus McLean is in charge of the work and the men engaged are mostly settlers of the district.

BARTER AND SALE IN RUSSIAN CITIES

MOSCOW, Nov. 15.—In cities the size of Petrograd and Moscow scores of street markets have lately been opened. Food is the drawing card. People who have not the money to buy white bread go to the markets to look at the large tempting loaves, and they generally take something with them to sell or barter. They wander from market to market until the best way to meet one's friends and hear the news.

The wide streets and boulevards of Russian cities, and the great circles and squares afford ample space for markets which, however, cannot be confined to the market places of imperial days because of the lack of shops and the universal necessity for barter and sale.

IMMIGRATION COSTLY; 2000 POUNDS EACH RETURNED SOLDIER

Ulster Minister Slates Coalition Cabinet for Attempted Betrayal

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Reuter's correspondent at Melbourne cables that the high commissioner of office was attacked in the senate recently and emphasis was laid upon the need of alert, well-informed officials.

A discussion on the immigration question produced the reply that the government had no difficulty in securing immigration, but the difficulty lay in providing for immigrants upon their arrival, considering that it cost £2000 to settle each returned soldier.

OPPOSE BRINGING OF UNKNOWN SOLDIER TO CANADA FROM FRANCE

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Parkdale branch of the G.W.V.A. passed a resolution strongly opposing the proposal to bring an unknown Canadian soldier from France for burial in Canada. The view is expressed that the honor accorded the unknown soldier in Westminster Abbey is sufficient for the overseas Dominions and the British Empire.

OBJECT TO INCOME TAX ON TIPS GIVEN TO RAILWAY PORTERS

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Railway porters and conductors are protesting against a claim made by revenue authorities that they are liable to income tax on the amount of tips they receive. The men contend the tips are gifts and as such are exempt from taxation.

RACE WAGERS ARE IMMENSE

Over \$56,000,000 Bet At
Race Meets in Ontario
This Season.

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—Over fifty-six million dollars was wagered at race meetings in Ontario during the past season. The Ontario Jockey Club's two meetings head the list with \$8,837,000.

60,000 GARMENT WORKERS ON STRIKE

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Sixty thousand garment workers went on strike this morning as a protest against the piece work system.

HOSTILE RECEPTION TO LATE GOVERNOR

Duke of Devonshire Found It Impossible to Speak at Chiswick.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The Duke of Devonshire was given an extremely hostile reception when he attempted to give an address on the question of the League of Nations at a meeting held at Chiswick. Owing to the hostile attitude of the crowd it was impossible for him to speak. The animosity against him was doubtless ostensibly inspired by his being a large landowner in that district, and the disturbance had evidently been carefully organized.

ATTACK ON GOVERNMENT

McKenzie and Pooley Criticize
Administration of Various
Departments.

VICTORIA, Nov. 15.—Another opposition attack was made on the Provincial Government in the Legislature yesterday. W. A. McKenzie of Similkameen told the Legislature that the Government was neglecting the municipalities, denying them new sources of revenue. He thought the Government was to blame for the backward state of the mining industry in the province and thought the Merville soldier settlement badly financed.

R. H. Pooley of Esquimalt returned to the charges against Dr. Baker of the Game Conservation Board, making specific allegations that Baker trafficked in furs and mishandled licenses. He called Baker a fur bootlegger.

Hon. J. W. deB. Farris moved the adjournment of the debate, which was on a motion for a select committee to investigate Dr. Baker's administration. He said several of the questions asked could not be answered offhand.

VICTORIA COUNCIL DABBLES IN POLITICS

VICTORIA, Nov. 15.—A federal enquiry into alleged extravagances of the Provincial Government will be suggested to the city council by Ald. Sangster when the special committee meets on Friday to plan a response to Hon. John Hart's proposal respecting municipal revenue.

The city council at its meeting last night passed resolutions condemning the Provincial Government for alleged "reckless expenditure" and asking Victoria members of the Legislature to furnish information regarding expenses of the departments for automobiles.

JUGO-SLAVIA REFUSES

Will Not Accept Boundary Set by
Allied Council.

BELGRADE, Nov. 15.—Jugo-Slavia cannot accept the decision of the Allied Council of Ambassadors delimiting boundary lines between Jugo-Slavia and Albania. The cabinet has decided that a note to this effect be sent to the Allies.

STEAMER AFIRE

San Francisco Bound Outward
1000 Miles S. E. of New York.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The steamer San Francisco was reported to be on fire on Sunday one thousand miles southeast of New York, heading toward Bermuda, with the fire spreading. The steamer Larrinaga is standing by.

Main Issue
Before Electors.

There are still a few people who profess not to understand that voting for Colonel Peck may mean voting to perpetuate the present condition. Until Colonel Peck makes it quite clear that he will vote if necessary to put the Meighen Government out of office, there can be no other interpretation of his action. In his utterances and those of his committee there has been shown no slightest inkling of his possible attitude when he gets to Ottawa, except that he will do as he likes.

Is it fair to the voters of this constituency to ask them to vote for a man without giving some idea of the line of policy he will follow on the great national questions? Local affairs undoubtedly loom large, but others are vital to the nation. From everything the independent candidate has said, from his general attitude toward Liberalism, and from the people who have been rallying round him, it seems that should he be returned he will vote to keep the present group in power.

Do We Want
Present Government?

It then comes back to this: Do we want the present Government continued in power? Skeena is going to be a factor in the election. This constituency will help to decide whether or not Meighen and his tribe of capitalists will remain in charge of the affairs of state or if the government of the country shall be handed over to those in closer touch with the common people. A vote for Stork is a sure vote for putting Meighen out. There can be no misunderstanding about it. The policy that far is clear cut. There is no compromise. A vote for Stork is a vote for a change, and any change would be better than the condition which we have suffered for the past few years.

Effort Made to
Stampede Electors.

An effort has been made to stampede the electors into the belief that large numbers of Liberals were deserting their own candidate and supporting the opposition. Such is not the case. There are a few who, for reasons best known to themselves, are supporting Colonel Peck at this election who formerly supported the Liberals. Similar changes occur at any election. On the other hand, however, there are large numbers of men and women who are dissatisfied with the Meighen Government and who are not willing to take chances on any man who lives in the Meighen atmosphere, is supported by the Meighen group and who refuses to state how he will vote if he goes back to Ottawa.

Silent Vote Will
Determine Election.

It is the silent vote that will determine the present election. There are in the city hundreds of men and women who do not say who they intend to support. Some do not yet know which way they will vote. They are harassed with doubts. They remember Colonel Peck's war record and feel they owe him a debt of gratitude. We all feel that way. The difficulty is to disassociate sentiment from the election. It is difficult, but it has to be done. We have to get down to cold facts. We have to realize that this is peace time and that the good of the country is the first consideration. Patriotism consists in doing that which is in the best interests of the country. To be a good Canadian is to vote in such a way that the whole country will prosper. It is not to continue in office the men who are controlled by the big manufacturers, the railways, the banks and the other overwhelming interests of the country, thus perpetuating class rule. It is to make the government once more representative of the people.

Playing on Street.

Little children playing on the streets are in grave danger from passing autos and trucks. A lady tells of seeing a truck driving along one of the avenues at a reasonable speed. Some children were playing at the roadside. Just as it was passing a little boy dashed out in front of it, and the truck driver almost wrecked his truck in order to save the child. The youngster laughed about it and apparently thought he had done something smart. Had he been run over the truck driver would probably have been blamed. What is the remedy?

Editor Daily News:
A great celebration of Magna
Charia Day is being arranged
for next June 15, throughout
the British Empire and the United
States.From this love of liberty, in
politics and religion our great
Empire, and the republic to the
south of us have been developed.With this in mind the pro-
posal contained in the letter of
Dr. H. E. Tremayne in your issue
of November 12 calls for
at least one protest in the name
of Liberty.There is no doubt at all that
this appointment would, according
to the doctor "enhance the
value of medical examination of
children manyfold" but that "She
would be able to convince their
parents that it is in the interest
of the child's welfare they should
be attended too" is quite another
matter. The average parent
knows better than any one how
to care for his or her child
without being reminded daily, or
weekly, of his or her duty in
this direction.

Educated, Not Ticketed.

Children are sent to school
to be educated not to be ticketed
and numbered and examined like
pedigree stock. May we not
leave the public schools of the
city free to carry out their scope
and purpose in the limited time
they have for lessons, without
providing gratis a field for the
cultivation of theories, free subjects
for experiments. The doctor
is not the repository of all
knowledge, though acting with
the best of motives.In the Prince Rupert Hos-
pital we have a Municipal In-
stitution established at large
cost to minister to all who be-
lieve in the regular allopathic,
homeopathic, osteopathic or
other schools of treatment, and
maintained and paid for by the
taxpayers who believe in these
schools.

Parents Have Say.

NO MEDICINE AT HOSPITALS

TZARITZIN, Russia, Nov. 15.—(Associated Press)—The lack of medicine in Russian hospitals becomes accentuated here. It is even worse than further down the Volga. Tzaritzin has five hospitals, none of which has single grain of quinine or of any of the other simpler medicines, nor have they money with which to purchase nourishing food for their patients.

At the Second Soviet hospital for typhus patients established here in a converted private residence, there are 50 patients with a lone woman doctor in charge, and with a few servant girls as nurses. She is totally without olive oil, camphor, alcohol, bed clothing or fresh garments. In the First Soviet hospital, at the outskirts of the city, there are 150 patients, but no medicines, no lye soap, no carbolic acid for washing the germ infested floors.

Food and Medicine. The daily food of the convalescents consists of one dish of soup, one-sixth of a pound of meat and three-quarters of a pound of bread.

The Soviet government formally supplied all medicines free to hospital patients and the general public but it ceased doing so some months ago.

Doctors and hospital attendants are thin and hungry despite the fact that Tzaritzin now is the best and cheapest food centre in the entire Volga district.

Here the public market is fully stocked. But as in other Volga cities, at prices beyond the purse of most of its inhabitants.

The market lies between the river and the railway station, at each of whom may be seen from 5,000 to 10,000 refugees in various conditions of underfeeding. They are living in crowds. Many refugees are arriving from points as far east as Tschernigov, where the crops are thin. They are striving to reach Poltava and the Don district, but the trains are irregular, due to bad railway and to the "green army" bands, or non-Bolshevik peasants, who sometimes cut tracks and otherwise interrupt traffic.
