Mackenzie King and Meighen Speak ENGINEER IS HERE IN CONNECTION WITH THE PROPOSED NEW PULP MILL

Mackenzie King Calls on Meighen to Face Electors

Argues that This is New Government with New Policy and
Not Same as Borden Administration and Should Not
Dare Tamper with Tariff

OTTAWA, February 16.—In the Dominion Parliament yesterday afternoon W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, congratulating Hon. Arthur Meighen on the attainment of the present position, launched into a demand for a general election. He asked by what right Premier Meighen presumed to govern the government of the country. The leader of the Government must answer that question before consideration could be given to lesser matters mentioned in the speech from the throne. Mr. King said the Borden Government was a war administration, and the present one was entirely different. It had neither sought nor received the approval of the electors. It had taken a new name and published a platform of principles. How dared the leader of the government presume to say the Government was justified in dealing with the all-important tariff question without first giving the people an opportunity to return to Parliament a house that would give proper expression to their views.

BOR LEADERS REFUSE TO ASK THEIR PAROLE

Mr. Norris Tried to Get Them
Released in Time for the
House Opening.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 16.—Premier
Norris, when in Ottawa in December,
made personal efforts to get
Winnipeg strike leaders released,
so that the three elected
legislators, William Evans,
Queen and George Armstrong,
might be able to take
seats when the House opened.
The premier said that judging
conversations he had with
minister of justice the men
still in jail because they had
refused to ask for parole.

6%.

Meighen Declares He'll Not Resign While Supported By Majority in Parliament

OTTAWA, February 16.—Premier Meighen in the reply to
Mackenzie King in the House of Commons, made it clear that the
government had no intention of an immediate appeal to the
electors. "Under the circumstances that prevail it is the clear-cut
policy of the Government, at all events for the present, to carry on
to carry out its policy so long as the majority of the members
of the House support him," he declared.
So long as the Government retains the confidence of the country
it is its duty if it allows itself to be stamped by the
press or party politicians," he said. "The Government is in
the same right as any other government in the Dominion
provinces. It is in office by the majority of the votes of the
people."

Pulp Plant Expert Arrived Yesterday

H. S. Taylor of Dayton, Ohio, is Con-
sulting with J. A. W. Bell and E. F.
Duby Regarding Site for Pro-
posed Pulp Plant

To examine the proposed site for the new pulp mill to be
erected in this neighborhood by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co.
and to consult in regard to the proposed new plant, there arrived
in the city last night H. S. Taylor of Dayton, Ohio, an expert on
pulp plants. He is chief engineer for the Mead Engineering Co.
and made this trip especially to give expert advice to the local
concern.

Mr. Taylor was met there this morning by J. A. W. Bell of
Vancouver who arrived on the Prince George and who will go
into the whole matter with Mr.
Taylor and Mr. Duby. Both will
be in the city for a few days.

It is possible that Mr. Duby will
meet the committee of the City
Council this evening to discuss
the proposals which he made to
them by letter on Monday.

Mr. Taylor's firm is carrying
out some pulp mill contracts at
Fort William, where he visited
for a day or two on his way west.

Shipyard Case to Be Continued in Vancouver Courts

R. L. Reid, K.C., for the Dominion
Government Asks for Court Order;
Will be Argued, Possibly
Tomorrow

VANCOUVER, February 16.—The war between W. E. Hodges,
liquidator for the Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co.,
and the Dominion Government will break out next in court.
Probably on Thursday, when R. L. Reid, K.C., will make appli-
cation for directions to the trustee from the judge of the bank-
ruptcy court.

The dispute arises out of an interpretation of the contract
clauses. According to Mr. Reid, the Government has no desire
to injure anyone. The question is how far the rights of the
Department of Marine extends
over the assets of the company.
Mr. Hodges, representing the
creditors, has taken the material
which caused the dispute, has set
very reliable watchmen over it,
and is now sitting back awaiting
the Government's next move.

In the meantime the Wallace
contract to complete the two ves-
sels now on the stocks is held up,
temporarily.

DEADLOCK YET, TEACHERS OUT

Westminster Trouble Still Un-
settled. Both Trustees and
Pedagogues Firm.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Feb. 16.

The striking teachers announ-
ced yesterday that they will not re-
turn to work on Thursday as re-
quested by the school trustees.
They accept the prospect of being
automatically dismissed, feeling
that the board will be unable to
secure seventy teachers at a mo-
ment's notice to take the places.
The trustees say they will not
increase salaries further unless
authorized by the ratepayers.

Sentiment in North
Toward New Province.

There is a very strong sentiment in the northern part of the province in favor of breaking away from the southern part of British Columbia and forming a new province to include everything from, say, Bella Coola to the Yukon boundary. It is a more or less latent sentiment but has been fanned a good deal of late. Particularly in districts where they feel they are not getting a square deal from any of the governments that have been in power in Victoria.

The swing of the south is so strong, it is claimed, that very few real improvements can be secured for the north. Just now we need a road from the coast to the interior. We need it at the coast and the people of the interior need it. There seems to be little hope that we shall have it for some time to come, yet they can have roads in the south. Unless the north gets good treatment, larger representation, good appropriations, there will undoubtedly be a strong agitation to have the province sheared in two midway between north and south and a separate provincial government formed for each.

Be a Unit on
Railway Treatment.

If we were a separate province just now we could better deal with the deliberate ignoring of the claims of the north by the Canadian National Railway, influenced doubtless by the Mackenzie interests which are so powerful throughout Canada today. A provincial government in the north would take up the fight for a better service. A government at Victoria has not that compelling interest in things here which would make them see the great northland as we see it. They see it as a purely Dominion question, which of course it is, but a northern province would make it their own question and would have a great deal of prestige—such as a few boards of trade have not—in influencing the railway to give us that service to which we are entitled.

Prince Rupert is
Pattern for North.

As the largest city north of Vancouver and as the place with the prospect of becoming a large centre in the not far distant future, Prince Rupert is watched more closely than the ordinary city. People come here and go away with an impression and this impression they try to impart to others.

One man, a journalist too, at that, called in passing. He apparently saw the lower streets of the town and went away to tell the people of the east what an ugly place Prince Rupert is. He saw the worst of it, as travellers usually see who spend only half an hour or so in a place, and he carried away a false impression. It is because of the danger of our creating a bad impression of the whole north that responsibility rests on us. We should use every effort to smarten ourselves and put our best goods in the store window. We should see that even if we have no station, we have surroundings that make a prosperous appearance. The fact that we have much hill and rock is simply to say that we have beauty possibilities which no flat town can possess. Think of any level city and compare it with a fine city like Seattle or Vancouver built on hills and the difference is at once noticeable. We too are building on hills and it is a rock foundation that is permanent. We have all the possibilities of making one of the finest cities of Canada.

King Puts It Up
To Meighen.

Mackenzie King has put it up to Premier Meighen in the most forcible manner possible that he is not the chosen representative of the people but rather a Bolshevik leader, ruling by right of might rather than because he has been selected by the people for the position. He did not use those words but that was the intent of his address. It is the apt way in which the other Liberal leader, Ernest Lapointe, puts it in many of his addresses. The true Bolshevik is one who usurps the powers of the people and rules autocratically on behalf of a class.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

SINN FEINERS KILL CADETS

Authentic Story of Manner in which Seventeen Men were Shot Down

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The first detailed authentic account of the killing of 17 auxiliary cadets of the Royal Irish Constabulary by a party of Sinn Feiners near Macroom, Ireland, on November 28 has just been obtained from the sole survivor of the ambush party, Lieutenant H. F. Forde. The lieutenant has recovered from his wounds in a London military hospital. All previous accounts of the affair have been based on "eductions, in the absence of reports from eye-witnesses.

Lieutenant Forde suffered a bullet wound in the head and was clutched with the butt of a rifle and left for dead.

Between Rocks

He says that the two motor cars carrying the cadets were attacked as they were passing between rocky declivities on either side just as the leading car ran into a ditch which had been prepared for it. Many of those in the first car were wounded by the first fire from forces concealed behind huge rocks.

Those in the second car came up and fought until the last man fell wounded. Forde was lying wounded when he heard the order to cease fire. He adds: "Then a large number of attackers from both sides rushed into the road. They wore the uniform of British soldiers and handled us all very roughly, not excepting the dead. After knocking us about they called on us all to stand up."

Bayonet in Back

"Two of the party were able to get to their feet and were immediately shot down at close range by the 'shimmers.' One of the cadets near me groaned and turned over. One of the civilians plunged a bayonet into his back. I muttered something and he turned to me and after cursing me, said it would be my turn next. I could see the others going through the clothing of the cadets, who were being brutally treated. One of the civilians tried to pull a gold ring from my finger, but failed. The next thing I remember was when one of them rolled me over roughly, to see, I suppose, whether I was dead.

"When I woke up it was pitch dark. The ambushers had retired to their positions and occasionally fired a few shots."

GERMAN OFFICERS FORBIDDEN TO WEAR MONOCLE IN FUTURE

Avanche of Abuse for Minister
of Interior Follows; Grand
Stand Play Charged

BERLIN, Feb. 16.—An order forbidding the wearing of the monocle by officers and members of the Security Police, issued by the Prussian Minister of the Interior has brought down upon the minister a veritable avalanche of abuse. It has also evoked scenes of argument in favor of the ancient institution of the single eye-glass.

The minister described the wearing of the monocle as "an unbecoming habit," and attributed it to the vanity of officers rather than to any weakness of the eye.

Honored Institution

His critics accuse him of being deficient in anatomical knowledge, of making a grand-stand play to the proletariat, and of a malicious attempt to overthrow an old, honored and common German institution.

A man's two eyes are very seldom of equal soundness, it is pointed out, and the use of spectacles might injure a sound eye while aiding the weak member. Therefore, it is argued, the custom is well established on physical grounds.

Custom in England

The majority of commentators scornfully reject the minister's reason for this order—that the monocle is an affectation and smacks of monarchical times. They argue that the one eye-glass custom prevails in such democratic countries as England and even to some extent in America.

One participant in the fray thinks the monocle wearer is not getting a square deal. Any man who can manage to hold a round piece of glass between his eye, brow and his cheekbone ought to be rewarded with a medal of merit for exceptional skill, instead of being reprimanded.
