Soldiers, Farmers And Liberals Unite In Comox, Alberni

VICTORIA, Nov. 2.—All the parties in the Comox-Alberni constituency have united to oppose the National Liberal and Conservative party, otherwise known as the Meighen Government party. They have chosen A. W. Neill, a well-known farmer and business man of the Alberni district, and behind him are both Major R. J. Burde, member for Alberni, and Rev. J. Menzies, member for Comox in the Legislature.

Recently William Marchant was nominated by the Liberals, but at the instance of the soldiers and farmers he agreed to withdraw and allow the Liberal-Soldier-Farmer elements to agree on a man who would represent them all. A new convention was called which was addressed by Joseph Martin, K.C. J. S. Cowper and others and Mr. Neill was nominated on the first ballot.

PRICES ON EDMONTON CITY MARKET LOW

EDMONTON, Nov. 2.—In the vegetable line there was a fair showing of cabbage which was selling at from 2c to 2 1/2c per pound. Celery was offered at from 10c to 25c per bunch depending upon the size and lettuce at 10c per bunch. Turnips were offered at 2c per pound, beets and carrots at 3c, and parsnip at 5c per pound. Potatoes were offered by several dealers at prices ranging from 50c to 60c per bushel.

The offering of butter and eggs was somewhat lighter than last week, and prices for the most part were fairly good.

Dairy butter was offered at from 45c to 50c per pound, and at these prices was finding a steady market. Eggs were selling from 45c to 60c per dozen, new laid egg ranging in price from 55c to 60c per dozen.

The offering of live poultry was somewhat larger than usual and chickens were selling at from 45c to 75c each. Ducks were offered at \$1.25 each. Dressed chicken was offered at 25c for front quarters and 7c for hind quarters.

Minimum temperature, 35. Rainfall, 13.07 inches. The maximum temperature was on September 10th and the minimum on September 29th.

GEORGE J. HAMMOND IS AT FORT MCMURRAY

Says He Will Supply West with Oil and Gasoline From Tar Sands.

EDMONTON, Nov. 2.—George J. Hammond, formerly of Prince George, and well known in Vancouver and throughout the west, has organized a company to utilize the tar sands near Fort McMurray. Control of 6,000 acres has been secured on which are the most valuable deposits of the world.

The oil will be extracted by a special process and Mr. Hammond says he will be able to supply the whole of western Canada with oil, gasoline, kerosene, distillate and lubricant.

PREPARE TO CELEBRATE ARMISTICE DAY AT ARM

Banquet to Be Given on November 11 at Alice Arm Hotel.

A meeting of ex-service men of the Alice Arm district was held at the residence of G. Young on Wednesday last, when preliminary arrangements were made to hold a banquet on Armistice Day, November 11. George Young and D. S. Cameron were appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements with the proprietors of the hotel and to prepare a toast list, etc. All men who have seen service in the Allied armies or navies are extended a cordial welcome to attend.

ELEVEN FISHERMEN BELIEVED DROWNED NEW JERSEY STATE

ANGLESEA, N. J., Nov. 2.—Eleven fishermen are believed to have been drowned by the upsetting of a small motorboat in a storm. The tragedy was not discovered until two of the bodies were washed ashore.

Government On Taking Hold Of Local Shipyard Will Probably Keep Fifty or Hundred Working

Between fifty and one hundred men will likely be kept working at the local drydock when the Government takes it over in the near future. There will have to be a good staff ready for emergency repair work, and it is possible that there may be some new building, although there is nothing definite as to this yet. The feeling is generally expressed that it would be a shame to keep the plant idle now that it is in good running order. J. H. Pillsbury, it is understood, will be in charge when the Government takes control.

The government lighthouse tender Newington is now in the dock undergoing overhaul. She will be finished about Friday. The Prince George is also still in the plant. Besides there are several smaller craft, including fish boats, being repaired.

With the finishing of the Canadian Britisher the Wallace Shipyards and Engineering Co. will be done at the yard unless their latest offer should be accepted. The Britisher will have her trial runs next Monday and in about a week's time after that should be turned over to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine. She will go to Vancouver to load a cargo for Japan taking nothing from here. Some of the officers have already arrived, these including Captain Larmour, Second Officer Roberts and Chief Engineer Chappelow. These officers came from Montreal here although they have been in service on the Pacific coast already with the Merchant Marine. The second engineer arrived this morning from Vancouver.

CONTRACT FOR RESIDENCE AT SIMPSON LET

Thomas Gosnell Will Build \$6,300 Doctor's Office and Residence—Meeting Here.

The contract for the erection of the new doctor's office and residence in connection with the Port Simpson Hospital was let last night by the board of directors of the hospital to Thomas Gosnell, of Port Simpson. This decision is subject to confirmation from Toronto. The tender presented by Mr. Gosnell was for \$6,300. The building will be a commodious bungalow with a concrete foundation and will be on the same site as the old one which was destroyed this year by fire. J. W. Potter, of this city, is the architect and will have supervision of the work which will commence as soon as ratification is received from Toronto. Besides Mr. Gosnell there were five other bidders on the job, one from Port Simpson and four from Prince Rupert.

Seven members of the board of directors were present at the meeting which was held in the office of Dr. W. T. Kergin in this city. They were: R. Boyd Young, in the chair in the absence of President John Flewin, Dr. W. T. Kergin, Dr. J. C. Spencer, Rev. W. F. Rushbrook, A. J. Watkinson, C. C. Perry, Rev. G. G. Haacker and Dr. William Sager, secretary. The Port Simpson directors returned home this afternoon at 3 o'clock on the launch Narbethong, Captain Hoopes K. Freeman.

YEAR IN JAIL FOR STEALING

Winnipeg Woman Sentenced to Year in Common Prison For Dastardly Act.

TAUGHT DAUGHTER TO STEAL FOR HER

Caustic Comment of Judge McDonald in Passing Sentence.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 2.—Dorothy Myers was sentenced to twelve months in prison for stealing and for teaching her nine year old daughter to steal. In passing sentence Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald said:

"You have been found guilty of a dastardly offence, not so much in the act of stealing, but in teaching your child to steal and teaching her to perjure herself," his lordship said, after he told the jury they could not have been honest with themselves if they had brought in any other verdict on a trial which was the most "brazen attempt to evade justice" he had encountered.

Mrs. Myers, her shoulders drooping and handkerchief pressed to lips as she awaited her sentence, her tenseness repressing her emotion, screamed, "Oh, my God, my child," as his lordship said, "you are a bad woman. I sentence you to the common gaol for twelve months."

Evidence produced by detectives of a local departmental store proved that Mrs. Myers stole articles from six departments. When detained and taken to the store detective's office she admitted the theft of all articles except a white blouse, which she said her girl stole on her instruction.

Political History of B.C. Shows Province Formerly Conservative then Liberal

VANCOUVER, Nov. 2.—(By Canadian Press.)—British Columbia representation in the House of Commons dates back to 1872, the first general election following the entrance of the province into confederation being held in that year. During the fourth session of the first Parliament of Canada, British Columbia was given six members, the province having entered confederation July 20, 1871. The representation remained at six for seven parliaments. In the Parliament elected in 1900 the representation was increased by one and continued at seven until 1914. In that year a redistribution bill was passed increasing the province's representation to thirteen members, and at this number it stands today.

TWO BODIES RECOVERED

One Identified as Mrs. J. Godin and Other is Unidentified Child.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 2.—Two more bodies of flood victims at Britannia Beach have been recovered. One was identified as that of Mrs. J. Godin and the other has not been identified. It is that of a child. This makes a total of eighteen bodies recovered. There are still seventeen missing.

FARMERS HOLD GRAIN PEACE RIVER DISTRICT

Shipments Small on Account of Low Price—Weather Has Been Good.

EDMONTON, Nov. 2.—Grain shipments from Clairmont this season so far amount to 53,000 bushels. This is a comparatively small quantity as the farmers are holding back for higher prices. High yields of wheat are reported in the Peace River and Grand Prairie country and the excellent weather conditions have made it possible to complete the threshing and do a good deal of fall plowing.

RAILWAY CONNECTION WITH VANCOUVER IS TEMPORARILY ARRANGED

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1, p.m.—The abnormal situation in regard to the trains in and out of the city on account of the floods will be relieved on Wednesday, it is expected. The Canadian National now has a through line and the C. P. R. expects to be able to send a train over the G. N. R. to Hunt-Ingon and thence to Mission to join the main line.

PROHIBITION OFFICERS MEETING TODAY DISCUSS PREVENTION METHODS

REGINA, Nov. 2.—Prohibition enforcement officers from Ontario and the three prairie provinces and the border states meet here today to discuss methods to suppress the illegal liquor traffic and the methods of carrying out liquor legislation in the best interests of both countries.

BOARD OF HEALTH IN MANITOBA BUSY

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 2.—Under the act which went into force October 1, supervision and inspection of maternity homes, boarding homes and day nurseries in Manitoba will be part of the duties of the provincial board of health. Such institutions must have permits, issued annually by the board, and must keep a record of all particulars concerning children received. A supervisor of these homes, Miss E. Wilson, has been appointed and she will have the co-operation of the public health nurses.

Veterans' Band Worthy of Support.

There is no institution in the city better worthy of support than the G. W. V. A. Band. In a city where we are largely shut in on ourselves and dependent on ourselves for musical entertainment, a band is very desirable. The veterans' band has already done good work and is the basis of a valuable civic organization worthy of the support of everyone.

With the closing of the construction part of the local shipyard a number of men find themselves out of employment or will very soon so find themselves. Among the number are several important members of the band. An effort is being made to keep these men employed so that they may remain in the city. Employers who are able to aid in this would be doing the city a great service if they would stand behind the bandsmen and give them whatever preference is possible. Music is a civic asset and anything we can possibly do to encourage it should not be neglected.

There is a committee appointed to try to make arrangements for the continuance in the city of several of the men who are proposing to leave. It is to be hoped they will meet with success.

Britannia Tragedy Excites Sympathy.

The sympathy of the people of Prince Rupert will go out to the people of Britannia who have lost parents or children, relatives or friends in the awful tragedy of the floods of the last week-end. It came upon them in their own homes at night. They were absolutely defenceless, and the horror of the situation was made worse by the dread of uncertainty as to the extent of the trouble. Parents were separated from their children and wives from their husbands. Whole families were wiped out, and what was even worse, in some cases members of families were taken and others left.

The people of this city were keen to know the extent of the tragedy, and if necessary will be just as keen to help the survivors.

Candidates Out Looking for Votes.

The candidates in the forthcoming federal election are out looking for votes. They are trying to impress the electors with the fact that the district will benefit from support of the particular candidate. Colonel Peck tells of what he has done, and on the strength of that and his military career expects to be sent back to Ottawa, not as a Conservative this time but as a Don Quixote to till at any windmill he may happen to see. Fred Stork, on the other hand, asks for support not on his own merit so much as because he represents a set of principles, the principles of the Liberal party. Stork has a leader whom he will follow, so in returning him everyone knows exactly what they are voting for. There is nothing personal about it.

Liberalism has stood the test of many years. It is not by any means a fixed principle. It is opposed to Conservatism in that it refuses to be tied and bound by the outgrown usages of the past, but it refuses to be led headlong into doubtful experiments by the too radical element. It has often been used and abused by petty politicians for their own ends, but it remains as before, the surge forward which keeps men and women abreast of the times without encountering the dangers of being too far in advance.

Carrying Banner of Liberalism.

Fred Stork is carrying the banner of Liberalism. If elected he will be a supporter of W. L. Mackenzie King or any other leader whom the Liberals by popular vote may select. We know exactly where he is and what we are voting for in supporting him. If on the other hand we support Colonel Peck we do not know whether he will support the Tory leader, Arthur Meighen, high protectionist and friend of the profiteers; T. A. Greer, head of the farmer movement, or Mackenzie King. If we give him our vote we do not know what he will do with it.

If we vote for a Socialist we know he will carry the banner of Socialism. If we vote Conservative we know the candidate will be a high protectionist and will carry favor with the millionaires of the East, the Sir William Mackenzies and the Flavelles. If we vote for Stork we know he will be in the march of progress; he will be looking to the people for guidance rather than to the millionaires; but if we vote for Peck we stick our vote on the roulette table and spin and pray that it may come out a winner.

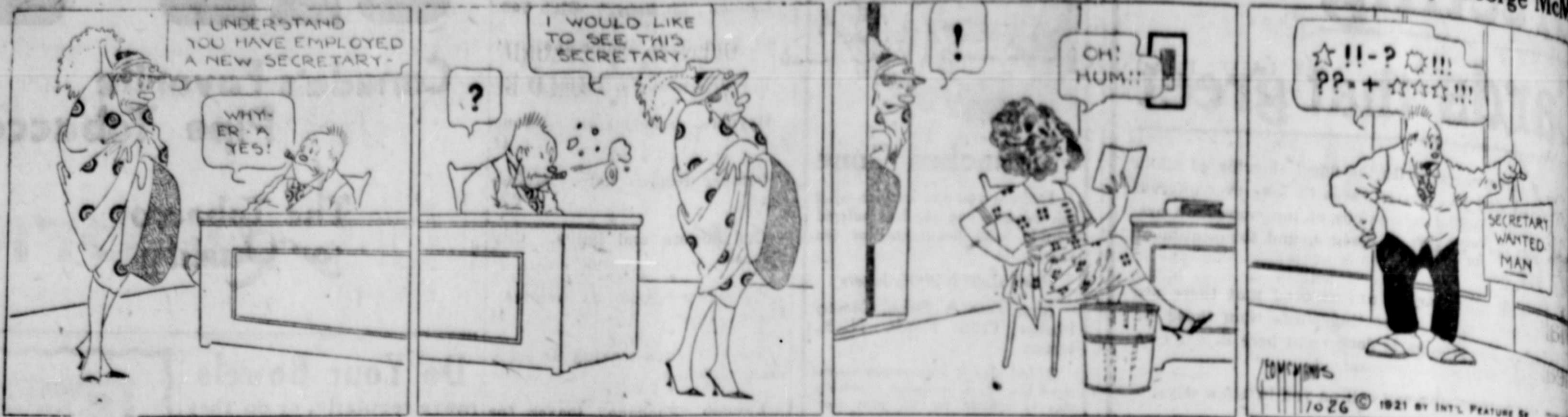

REPAIRS FOR PLANK ROADS

Building Inspector to Make Inspections—Board of Works Will Do Work.

The building inspector is to be asked to make another inspection of plank roadways in the city with a view to having repairs made that are absolutely necessary. The Board of Works has been authorized to have the work done where necessary.

The matter was brought up at the council meeting Monday night by Ald. Perry, who stated that the plank roads were becoming increasingly worse. He referred to the condition of the Hays Creek bridge and McBride Street. He suggested short term bonds as a method of financing. If necessary some work could be charged up to next year's estimates if this year's were strained.

Speaking of finances, Ald. Dybbavn stated that as far as the Section 5 work was concerned they had not learned from the bank what it would do towards financing it. The work on Fulton Street was being proceeded with and he had reason to believe that the bank would finance it. The same applied to McBride Street. Estimates had not been made yet for Ambrose Avenue. The repairing of the Hays Creek bridge would be a matter for general fund to pay for. If there was any work absolutely necessary it would be up to general fund to take care of it. All that was necessary was for the board of works to proceed with it. The financing would have to be arranged.
