Blue Outlook for Shipyard Creditors

WINTER NEWS IS RECEIVED FROM THE COLD AND SNOWSWEPT NORTHLAND

Shipyard Creditors Met Today To Consider Their Position

Five Inspectors Appointed to Act with Receiver; Financial Condition not very encouraging; Government may Purchase Plant

Lease Continued for Nine Months to Complete Ships

Guaranty Company has Repudiated Its Liabilities and Government May Make Good; Newman Erb Liable for \$75,000 of Funds Used

That the only hope of getting anything like a settlement of the claims against the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co. is to get the government to purchase the plant which has been installed by the company, was the opinion expressed at the meeting of creditors held here this morning, W. E. Hodges, receiver, presiding.

Mr. Hodges outlined the condition of affairs and distributed printed statements showing secured claims amounting to \$362,480; preferred wage claims, \$112,000; unsecured creditors, \$392,000; total liabilities, \$866,480, to pay which there seems to be net amounts due amounting to \$244,996, but that of this the ships have to be completed. This statement is very incomplete as no statement has been rendered by Newman Erb, president of the company, from New York.

Mr. Hodges reported that the Government had let a contract to complete the ships on a cost plus basis and that it would be impossible to tell at present what the final deficiency would be.

Five Inspectors

Five inspectors representing the creditors were appointed: J. E. Melroy and F. Cantwell of Vancouver and George Nickerson, D. G. Stewart and M. P. McCaffery of Prince Rupert.

A vote of thanks to Col. Peck was passed on motion of Mr. Melroy for his untiring efforts on behalf of the creditors, both of Prince Rupert and Vancouver.

Mr. Hodges told the creditors that it was his intention to proceed to Ottawa just as soon as the work at the shipyard was under way. He wished to remain here for a few days, so that there should be no delay in regard to the work proceeding. He wished to discuss the whole question with the Department of Marine.

The statement issued by the liquidator stated that the yard was leased for ten years at a monthly rental of \$2,904 and that application to continue the lease for nine months had been made in order to complete the ships.

Klondyke is in Grip of First Cold Snap

Arctic Marathon to Fort MacPherson Commences Today—Many Going to Fort Norman

DAWSON, Y. T., January 6.—Five crack Royal Canadian Mounted Police dog teams with toboggans leave here today on a thousand-mile midwinter Arctic marathon. They will travel five hundred miles directly north through the wilderness of snow and over the Rocky Mountain divide to Fort MacPherson at the mouth of the MacKenzie River and will then return. They are expected to be back here about the first week in March bringing advices from the Fort Norman oilfields and from the Arctic explorers and whalers who are frozen in along the northern coast. Word will also be brought back from Rampart House.

First Cold Snap

The first cold snap of the winter struck the Yukon Territory on Tuesday night when the thermometer dropped to 63 below at Carmack midway between Dawson and Whitehorse. At Dawson it was forty below.

Emerson O'Neill, a well known pioneer of Alaska and the Yukon, died here on Tuesday. He arrived at Dawson a fortnight ago in a serious condition in charge of others after a 160-mile sleigh trip over the snows.

Several parties are planning to go to Fort Norman where the oil strike was recently made. They will go over the snow with a dog team. The distance of 500 miles will be done in twenty days-nursing.

Little Alaska Mail Boat Missing Since December 15

Washington Fears Joseph Pulitzer Lost but Seattle believes is in shelter from storms

WASHINGTON, January 6.—(Canadian Press)—That the United States mail boat Joseph Pulitzer, with at least seven men aboard, has been missing since December 15 and may have been lost in the Straits of Shelikoff, Alaska, is the advice which Secretary Payne received from Governor Riggs of Alaska today.

SEATTLE, January 6.—The coast guard cutter Snohomish leaves today or tomorrow in search of the missing mail boat Joseph Pulitzer. It is believed that the boat may have run into a sheltered cove to await the abating of furious storms that have swept Northwestern Alaska since late in November.

The vessel sailed from here on March 18 last to take up a mail run. She is a gasoline schooner of 69 gross tons and is owned by Dr. Andrew Smith of Portland, Oregon.

Nickerson's Position Clearly Stated.

Yesterday George Nickerson, one of the mayoralty candidates, issued a statement of his position on public questions which concern the civic government.

Possibly one of the most interesting matters dealt with is that of power. We must have power, not only for our own use but to sell. We want industries here and there is no better method of securing them than by preparing to give them power when they come.

Playgrounds are Very Important.

During the past two or three years the Daily News has from time to time urged the importance of playgrounds to the community. Just now there is a movement afoot to secure grounds for the use of the young people of the city.

It has been suggested that a playground should be made in the low land near the city park on Hays Creek. Others again are of opinion there should be a playground near the new school where it is possible the high school may be located in the near future.

It would be a very desirable move to get rid of the big rock on Acropolis Hill, if the cost is not excessive. At any rate it could be done a little at a time. The great thing is to lay down a policy of playground improvement which will move forward constantly.

Shipyard to Reopen Soon.

The letting of the contract for the completion of the two steel ships here is of great importance to the people of this city. It does away with the possibility of tying up the yards indefinitely and will provide work for those needing it just at a time when the demand for such employment is very great.

Ground Hog Again Being Discussed.

The Ground Hog coal fields are the centre of attention in certain circles. There is a general impression that something will be heard from there soon. The coal fields are so extensive and development work in that direction is likely to be of so important a nature that the whole north coast will feel the influence.

It is possible that Prince Rupert will not be in the direct line of the Ground Hog development. The city cannot, however, fail to benefit from any move in the northern part of the province.

ILLIANCE RIVER PROPERTY IS SHOWING WELL

Prospect Bonded from Dr. Kergin Promises to Become Big Mine

G. W. Cathoun, the mining man who passed through the city yesterday en route to Alice Arm, in conversation with a Daily News representative showed much enthusiasm over the prospects of the Bellevue group on the Illiance River, Alice Arm, in which he is interested.

The property has recently been reported on by P. W. Racey, the well known mining engineer, who characterizes the property as very promising. There is a vein of 40 ft. wide giving an average of 23.05 oz. to the ton of silver, and of gold .97 oz. lead 3.4 per cent and 5.4 per cent.

Mr. Racey says that the big vein is traceable for a mile and contains considerable high grade ore which it will pay to ship out by pack train.

It is planned to put in a concentrator in the near future.

When the syndicate that now controls the property took it over last summer from Dr. Kergin of this city, there was nothing on the surface to indicate its value and the showing made in six months is phenomenal. Winter supplies have been taken in and the development work is proceeding. Several men were taken North yesterday by Mr. Cathoun.

PROVINCE IN HEALTHY WAY

Dr. H. E. Young, secretary Health Board, Gives Most Satisfactory Report

VICTORIA, Jan. 5.—(Canadian Press).—British Columbia's population is 555,536 according to Dr. H. E. Young, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, whose annual report for 1920 was made public today. This total includes 25,619 Indians.

The total population shows an increase of 89,700, or a little more than 20 per cent, over the count of the previous year. The 1918 population was given as 440,187 and the 1917 population, 379,804. The Health Board's figures are based on vital statistics showing births, marriages and deaths as well as school registration.

The death rate for the province was 9.2, less than half the birth rate. The total births for the year were 10,002, deaths, 1,120, marriages, 4,650, the latter being an increase of 1,821 over the previous year.

"There has been a remarkable decrease in the death rate and a phenomenal increase in the birth rate," states Dr. Young.

JOE POLK GETS THREE YEARS NEW WESTMINSTER

Young Russian, who Forged Withdrawal Slip, Sent Down by Judge Young

Joseph Polk, the young Russian who was arrested on November 22 last charged with forgery, came up for sentence in Judge Young's court yesterday afternoon and was given three years in the penitentiary. Upon his previous appearance he had pleaded guilty to the offence, but sentence was deferred pending a reply to communications that the accused's counsel, W. H. Johnston, had sent to relatives tending to establish the good character of the young man. Mr. Johnston informed His Lordship that rather strangely so far no replies had been received, but his client was willing to let the case be disposed of without further delay in the matter.

Exceedingly Brazen
Accordingly to the depositions, Polk acted in an exceedingly brazen and bold manner, walking into the Royal Bank on the morning of the occurrence, going straight to the teller and presenting a savings account passbook belonging to a man of the name of J. A. Walton, stating that he wished to draw out one hundred and fifty dollars. The teller filled out a withdrawal slip, which the accused signed with the name of J. A. Walton and was handed out the money. It was not many minutes after he had left the bank that the teller keeper saw that the signature was a forgery. The police were notified and the accused promptly arrested.

After the counsel for the defence had made a plea for leniency and Crown Prosecutor W. E. Fisher had pointed out the seriousness of the crime, which was punishable in Canada with a maximum sentence of life imprisonment, Judge Young, summing up, remarked that considerable trouble had been caused in this province by Russians especially in regard to banks and that foreign-

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Sir Edward Carson has decided to relinquish the political leadership of the Ulster Unionists and will not take office in the new administration. He considered his work done with the passing of a home rule bill satisfactory to his followers.

USING COAL FUEL AT OCEAN FALLS

All Boilers Now Converted from Oil; Consumption 225 tons Daily

OCEAN FALLS, Jan. 6.—The big paper and pulp plants here have given up using oil fuel and all the boilers are now converted for the use of coal. The last of the boilers has just been completed and the total consumption of coal now amounts to 214 tons a day. With the addition of the new lime kiln on February 1 this will be increased to 225 tons a day.

LIME KILNS AT OCEAN FALLS

New Plant to be Ready for Operation by February 1

OCEAN FALLS, Jan. 5.—Another step in the development of Ocean Falls will have been attained when on February 1 the new lime kilns are put into operation. These are being erected adjoining the paper and pulp mills and will have a capacity of 25 tons a day.

The limestone will be quarried in the neighborhood of Rivers Inlet about one hundred miles distant and will be carried to the Falls on scows. The plant is nearing completion and will be ready for operation by the first of the month.

Spectacular Scene as Mountain Emits Molten Rock.

Henry Torrey, lately of the reporting staff of the Sun, has been appointed managing editor of that paper.

Revised Statutes of Canada (chapter 115).
