## ALLIES UNITED ON GERMAN REPARATIONS CLAIMS

## IMMENSE QUANTITY OF HALIBUT MARKETED IN APRIL SPITE CAR SHORTAGE

### Germany Given Ten Days to Answer Yes or No to Demands of Allies Over Reparations

PRINCE RUPERT, May 2.—Belgium's plan for reconciliation of Great Britain and France's reparations proposal has been accepted. The ultimatum goes to Germany with ten days' grace. France continues preparations for the occupation of the Ruhr district with advance on the tenth day if Germany fails to make good. Preparation for possible trouble, France is mobilizing an army class tomorrow.

**Categorical Answer.**

Under the plans as finally decided on, Germany must give a categorical answer, yes or no, to the Allies reparations demands for infliction of the military and naval penalties, according to terms of the ultimatum drafted by the Allied foreign ministers and submitted to the Supreme Council for approval. The interval of the ultimatum is not for the purpose of negotiations but to give the German Government time to reflect. Negotiations are to be considered at an end after receiving the report. The council of foreign ministers and the Supreme Council are agreed in principle on the plan of the ultimatum.

**Naval Demonstration.**

Britain will make a naval demonstration if Germany refuses to accept the allied conditions in the reparations issue. The demonstration will not take the form of a blockade. It will probably take place in the North Sea.

### EIGHT CARS FISH TODAY GOING EAST

Six Carlin's finds no Cars While 80,000 Pounds Sails for Seattle.

Eight carloads of halibut was bought at the fish exchange this morning for eastern shipment, filling all available cars, while another six car loads went for local cold storage and Ketchikan delivery at short prices. Besides this the schooner Republic called last night with 80,000 pounds and, after half an hour's delay, cleared for Seattle.

Alaska, 31,000 pounds; Hanaco, 9,000 pounds, and Bayview, 6,000 pounds, sold to the Pacific Fisheries at 11.6c and 5c.

Lancuz, 11,000 pounds; Kincome, 700 pounds; Rose Spit, 10,000 pounds, and Petrel, 800 pounds, sold to the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co. at 11.6c and 5c.

Wilson, 18,500 pounds, and Pelican, 3,500 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 11.4c and 5c.

Alaska, 40,000 pounds, and Alliance, 10,000 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 10c and 5c.

Road Amundsen, 14,000; Seymour, 38,000; Olympic, 35,000; Skugaid, 50,000; Torberg, 4,000, and Imperieuse, 5,000 pounds, sold at short prices on account of the car shortage, the average being slightly over 9c and 5c. The Seymour was offered 8c and 4c by the New England Fisheries for Ketchikan delivery.

### YUKON ASKING ROAD LEADING FORT NORMAN

Legislature of Territory Says It Is Shortest Route to the Oil Fields.

DAWSON, May 2.—The Yukon legislature unanimously adopted a resolution memorializing the Government to extend the Yukon trunk road and telegraphs to the Fort Norman oil fields in the Mackenzie valley.

The road by way of the Yukon is the shortest into that country, the memorial states, and only a .65 mile link is needed to give through connections to the coast at Skagway, where the liners ply to Prince Rupert and Vancouver.

### SIX MILLION SILK SHIPMENT

Steamers Monteagle and Katori Maru Bring Valuable Cargo From Orient.

VANCOUVER, May 2.—The C. P. R. steamer Monteagle and the Japanese vessel Katori Maru docked here today, bringing from the Orient \$9,000,000 worth of silk which is being rushed east over the C. P. R. to New York by special train. The Monteagle also brought a number of passengers, including several missionaries.

A lifeboat squad from the Monteagle rescued the crew of the French steamer Hsintien which was wrecked in the China Sea, according to information brought by the officers of the vessel. The members of the crew received testimonials of their bravery for the rescue in the teeth of a big storm. Only four seamen from the Hsintien were drowned but 49 were rescued.

### STORAGE TEAMERS WILL OPERATE SOON

Fishermen's Strike Settled and Boats Being Out on Company Lay.

Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. has succeeded in settling its differences with the fisherman and the trawlers and operations are now being made by the three steamers to sea.

Steamers Andrew Kelly, Foster and James have been laid up for months and the smaller boats have been sent out on the coast lay. When they get to the halibut banks will, however, be on the way as before. The dispute between the company and fishermen was settled by a compromise.

### MISSIONARY OF NORTH PASSES

James Benjamin McCulloch, of Aiyansh, Died Here Yesterday Morning.

After a long illness at the General Hospital here, Rev. Jas. Benjamin McCulloch, the well known missionary of the Naas River, passed away yesterday morning at 5 o'clock, aged 68. He is survived by a widow and five children, Nancy, Jean, Patrick and Chris, Mrs. A. F. Priestly, of Aiyansh, is also a daughter.

Mr. McCulloch was a native of Ireland and came to this country in 1883, establishing at Aiyansh on the Upper Naas one of the earliest missions under the auspices of the Church Missionary Society of London, England, an organization of the Anglican Church.

**Learned Language.**

For the thirty-eight years of his abode in the north, Mr. McCulloch's labors were centered about the same village of Aiyansh. When he arrived in the province he found the natives in a heathen state. His first work was to learn the language and, rapidly accomplishing this, he started the work of teaching the natives in the paths of Christianity and civilization. His efforts were crowned with success for he established at Aiyansh a model Christian village and succeeded in converting all the natives of the Upper Naas. His work included the translation of several books into the native language. He was appointed a justice of the peace some years ago, but subsequently resigned.

**Deeply Regretted.**

The demise of Mr. McCulloch will be deeply regretted, not only by his flock at Aiyansh, but by people of the north generally for everyone who became acquainted with him learned to respect and admire him. All will join in the sympathy for the mourning widow and her little children who are at present in the city. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

### Nearly Two Million Pounds Hal but was Marketed Here During the Month Just Past

The total amount of halibut landed at Prince Rupert last month was 1,819,000 pounds, and salmon 26,600 pounds. These figures compare favorably with last year's when for the same month there were 1,395,000 pounds of halibut and 18,999 pounds of salmon. The fish car shortage which has prevailed throughout the most of the month has put the fishing business at a disadvantage. On account of this condition 162,000 pounds of halibut actually left here for sale at other ports while many boats selling here had to do so at short cold storage prices.

The weather in the past month was fair but market conditions were not all that might have been expected. The demand at no time was very strong and the highest price was paid by the Atlin Fisheries on April 3 when 17c was bid. The lowest price for the month for first class fish was 9c. Last year as high as 19.2c was paid.

### GREAT LOSS TO BUSINESS IN THE CITY

One Firm Lost \$700 Order This Morning Owing to Seymour Leaving.

As a result of the Seymour having to leave port with 33,000 pounds of halibut, owing to car shortage, one firm in town lost an order for \$700 worth of goods and the dock lost the cleaning of the boat's hull for \$135. Other losses from the same cause it is difficult to compute, even for the one boat.

Every firm in town loses money every day because the railway company refuses to do business on which it could make a good profit.

### SHIPPING STRIKE 125,000 OUT

Say Shipping Will Be Tied up Within Twenty-four Hours.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Union leaders predict that the walkout of some workers called yesterday as a protest against the ten per cent wage reduction will result in a complete tieup of American shipping within 24 hours.

It is estimated that 125,000 workers are affected by the tieup.

### MICHELSON COMMITTED

Will Be Tried for Kidnapping—Robbery Case Remanded.

E. Michelson, of the Ketchikan boat Valorous, was committed for trial this morning by Magistrate McMordie on the charge of kidnapping Jack Miller and the charge of robbery with violence of 40 cases of liquor was remanded until tomorrow. There was considerable argument of counsel as to whether the accused could be sent up for trial without going over the evidence again which is said to be similar to that presented in the kidnapping case.

A. M. Manson, appearing for Miller, cited a Supreme Court case where this had been done and adjournment was made to allow the magistrate to consider the point.

**TWO KILLED IN ITALY.**

ROME, May 2.—Two persons at least were killed in May Day riots throughout Italy yesterday.

### SEAPLANE TO GIVE SERVICE

Will Operate Between Vancouver and Seattle Commencing June 1.

VANCOUVER, May 2.—A seaplane passenger service between Vancouver and Seattle is planned to commence June 1. Six passengers and 1,000 pounds of cargo will be the capacity of the planes and the average time to make the trip will be 90 minutes.

The new concern is a Seattle enterprise.

### PROPOSAL TO HOLD WORLD'S FAIR AT UNIVERSITY SITE

VICTORIA, May 2.—Capt. Ian Mackenzie, M. L. A. of Vancouver, made a proposal to the Government Saturday that the world's fair should be held in Vancouver on the University site and the buildings erected in connection therewith be permanent and used for the university after the fair.

The Government has not yet expressed an opinion in regard to the proposal.

### KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT WHEN WERE JOY RIDING

VANCOUVER, May 2.—James Tabor was killed in an auto accident in Stanley Park on Saturday night. Thirteen youngsters were joy riding in a limousine when the car was wrecked. Two were seriously injured and others slightly.

### JAMES GORMAN APPOINTED S'PT. C. N. R. SERVICES

TORONTO, May 2.—It is announced that Canadian National Railway headquarters here today that James Gorman has been appointed superintendent of the sleeping, dining and parlor car department. His office will be at Winnipeg and the appointment became effective May 1. Superintendent H. B. Woolen has been transferred to the hotel department.

### VICTORIA ADOPTS DAYLIGHT SAVING

VICTORIA, May 2.—This city adopted daylight saving at midnight on Saturday and is now running an hour ahead of Vancouver and most other points in the province.

### JEW AND ARABS SCRAP NEAR JAFFA

JERUSALEM, May 2.—Twenty persons were killed and 150 wounded in a clash between Jews and Arabs at Jaffa on Sunday. Troops restored order without firing.

### JOB PRINTERS ARE ON STRIKE

Movement for 44-Hour Week Comes to Climax With Men Quitting Work.

VANCOUVER, May 2.—Between sixty and seventy job printers are on strike here for a 44-hour week. At present they are working 48 hours.

The job printers in Prince Rupert are on strike. They have been employed 45 hours a week and they ask for 44.

### UNEMPLOYED PARADE STREET

Carry Red Flag and Union Jack at Vancouver, but Make No Speeches

VANCOUVER, May 2.—Two thousand unemployed men paraded quietly through the streets carrying a red flag and a big Union Jack. The crowd sang revolutionary songs, but dispersed without speechmaking. The police were ready to take a hand, but had no occasion for interference.

Missionary Was Great Student of Languages.

The death of Rev. J. B. McCullagh, the pioneer missionary of the Naas River, removes one of the picturesque characters of the coast, a missionary who was responsible for the Christianizing of many of the natives and who was a keen student of the languages of the Indians.

Mr. McCullagh discovered that many of the words used by the Indians were closely related to the Hebrew and other languages of western Asia, some being identical. From that he traced the origin and spread of those languages and came to the conclusion that the natives here must have originally come from stock closely related to the western Asiatic.

Much interest was taken in England in Mr. McCullagh's language studies and had he been able to return to that country and put his discoveries into writing, they would have been a valuable addition to the scientific works on the subject of philology.

Mr. McCullagh was an expert amateur printer and took great pride in some of the little magazinelets he had published from his own hand press at Aiyansh.

The death of Mr. McCullagh is a distinct loss to British Columbia and to the scientific world. He was a man with vision, seeing in his mind's eye the fertile Naas Valley inhabited by thousands of settlers living there in the lap of luxury from the production of the soil. He was a great believer in the north country and its future prosperity. His work will have a lasting effect on the future of the province.

Experimental Farm Need of Interior.

The Dominion Government has been establishing some experimental observation stations in the interior where the farmers will grow certain crops under observation and will receive aid from the Dominion in doing so. This is the first interest taken by the Dominion in the country.

What the farmers want, however, is an experimental farm that will be in charge of an expert where crops will be grown under observation and definite instruction given to settlers, and soils analyzed. There are already such farms at Agassiz and Saanich but conditions here are quite different and the farms in the south are of no value to Central British Columbia.

The establishment of observation stations is a recognition of the need, but it does not fill the bill. The farmers there should press for the larger institution where they may secure that aid which is given to farmers in other parts of the country.

Experimental Fishing Station.

There are experimental farms for farmers in various parts of the country but experimental stations for fishermen are also needed. The marine and fishery department is controlled by the Dominion but so far they have not recognized that there are fisheries in these waters, except in regard to salmon or in the matter of placing taxes on the fishermen.

The time is coming when the halibut will be much scarcer than it is today. Looking toward this time, an experimental station could undertake the work of locating new halibut banks, of experimenting with other food fishes and of giving publicity to the values of fish foods. There might also be in connection with it a school for fishermen where the latest methods would be taught combined with scientific data which would prove of value to the fishermen. There seems no reason why the fishermen should not get as much attention as the farmer, especially in view of the fact that the lands belong to the province whereas the fisheries belong to the Dominion.

GIVES UP MONEY LIVES IN BARN

Member of British House of Commons would Avert Danger

HYDE, Eng., May 2.—Austin Hopkinson, a member of the House of Commons, has just given to the local governing council of Hyde his mansion, valued at \$150,000 and 20 other houses and he has gone to live in an old barn that was once a part of his estate. He has taken this action because he believes that a manifestation of the spirit of self-sacrifice on the part of public servants would avert danger of a revolution in England.

Mr. Hopkinson's other deeds of generosity include the disposal of his furniture to friends and the needy, partly by sale at bargain prices and partly by free gift. He gave his handsome automobile to his chauffeur. The latter has now started in business with it. His former employer, the donor of the machine, is one of his best customers.

Simple Life

To questioners, Mr. Hopkinson has said his intention was to live the life of a simple workman and to help others as much as possible. In his own workshops, he has introduced a profit-sharing system that is without precedent, inasmuch as the higher the yield the less he receives, and after a certain sum is reached, he is to receive nothing at all. During the war Hopkinson was an officer. He was discharged as unfit, but rejoined as a private.

NEW GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS WILL BE COMMODIOUS

Substantial Two Storey Brick Building with Concrete Basement

The new provincial government building here is being built on very similar plans to those that were sent out last November. It will house all the government offices, such as forestry, land registry, provincial police, jail, public works and, most important of all, the law courts with an adequate court room. The land registry office will be especially commodious and proper provision will be made for the safe keeping of deeds which in the present building on Second Avenue is none too secure.

Two Storeys Brick

The building will be a substantial structure of two storeys and basement. It will be built of brick with concrete foundations and will have a massive appearance. On the basement floors will be the boiler rooms and the police offices. The office of the government agent, land registrar, assessor, district forester and school inspector will on the main floor, while the second floor will be devoted almost entirely to court accommodation. The court room will be a handsome one, finished with fine appointments.

LIGHTHOUSE TENDER COMING NORTH SOON

New Vessel, Which Will Supplement Newington, Leaves for Digby Island Wednesday.

The new lighthouse tender that has been built at Point Hope yard of the B. C. Yacht & Boat Builders, Ltd., for service out of this port has been completed and will leave Victoria on Wednesday for the north to take up her work with the Newington working out of the Digby Island station.

The boat has been named the Birnie after Birnie Island in northern B. C. waters. It was specially designed for the coast service and will be largely used in the recharging of buoys and beacons supplementing the services of the Newington in cases where it will not be necessary to send out the steamer.

The new vessel is 75 feet long and is equipped with a 100 h. p. Canadian Fairbanks-Morse marine oil engine. A similar vessel, the Berens, was built by the Marine Department at the same time. It will be used out of the Victoria depot.



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## COAL BUNKERS GOOD PROJECT

**S. S. Magoffin Says Would be Good Investment for Railway Company.**  
Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Magoffin returned to Winnipeg on this morning's train after a few days' stay in the city.  
Mr. Magoffin, who is a member of Grant, Smith & Magoffin, who are building the ocean dock here, states that the original plans of building the superstructure at the dock are to be carried out by the railway company.  
Mr. Magoffin is very enthusiastic about the prospects of building coal bunkers at this port and says that their establishment here would be in the interest of the Canadian National Railway for it to build these bunkers here. He intends to interview General Manager Warren on the subject when he is in Winnipeg.  
Mr. Magoffin will be back here in about a fortnight's time.

## PECK URGES LOANS TO RETURNED MEN IN FISHING INDUSTRY

OTTAWA, May 1.—Dr. M. R. Blake (North Winnipeg) addressed the special committee on pensions and re-establishment, urging that permanent hospitals for returned men be established at Winnipeg and at other points where needed. The member also asked for more generosity in regard to pension grants.  
Col. C. W. Peck, V.C. (Skeena) urged the committee to recommend assistance to returned men who wished to enter the fishing industry. Licenses to Orientals in British Columbia were being reduced, and returned soldiers should be given assistance by way of loans to enable them to enter the industry.  
W. G. McQuarrie (New Westminster) supported the request of Col. Peck. Returned soldiers should be encouraged to become the basis of a white fishing population.

## WAGE REDUCTION AT WINNIPEG ANNOUNCED

**Bricklayers and Carpenters are to Work for 90. an Hour This Season.**  
WINNIPEG, May 2.—Ten cents an hour reduction in the present existing scale of wages for carpenters and bricklayers was the decision reached by the Joint Council of Industry and announced by Dr. C. W. Gordon, chairman. Carpenters, who have been receiving \$1 an hour are to be paid 90 cents during the season ending May 1, 1922, and bricklayers' wages are reduced from \$1.25 to \$1.15 an hour.  
The matter has been under investigation for more than a week and at the various sittings of the council representatives from both employers and members of the building trades unions were given an opportunity to state their positions and their claims. They all agreed to accept the finding of the council.

## DRIVE DAIRYMEN THROUGH BULKLEY WAY TO VANDERHOOF

TELKWA, May 2.—Preparations are being made for the forthcoming visit of the members of the British Columbia Dairymen's Association. It is expected that arrangements will be made for them to stop off here and drive to Houston so that they may see this part of the country.  
It is also expected that a number of the local dairymen will go to Vanderhoof for the meeting of the association which takes place there.

Newmarket justly earns its title of "headquarters of the turf" for the class of horse seen on this track is generally superior to that found on other courses with the exception of Royal Ascot and Goodwood. During the war, when racing was abandoned everywhere else it was maintained at Newmarket. It was threatened during the present critical labor conditions in England that the famous spring races would have to be abandoned, and from a racing standpoint, this would have been disastrous. The two races, One Thousand Guineas and Two Thousand Guineas, which were run on Tuesday give the first real light on the horses of the season and the winner of the Two Thousand, and generally starts favorite for the Derby run at Epsom on July 1.

The lean years of the war had, indeed, a disastrous effect on racing stock from which it has hardly yet recovered. Horses bred during the war, when food of the right description was none too plentiful, were at a disadvantage. Last year's three year olds were a poor lot, but the impression now prevails that the present lot are better than their predecessors. There are five turf classics run in the Old Country. One Thousand Guineas, Two Thousand Guineas, Derby, Oaks and St. Leger. The problem of the three year olds is always an interesting one and even if this year is not to be a "vintage" one among the classics it starts out with being unusually open in character. Among the 1924 Derby favorites are: Leighton, Monarch, Hamorist, Allen rock, Granely, Craig an Erran, Polemarch, Winter Ling, Trash, Thunderer, Our Prince and Pharois.

Jack Dempsey is going to be as fit as a fiddle when he meets Georges Carpentier, July 2, at Jersey City. The world's champion is going about his preparations to start real training in the right way. 



## AIRPLANE IN FROM NORTH

Arrives at Edmonton from Peace River; Plans for Future Operations

EDMONTON, May 2.—With the return of one of the aeroplanes from Peace River it is felt that far north communication by air has really been established. John M. Larson returned in the J. L. 6 all steel monoplane, in which he flew from New York to Peace River stopping at Edmonton en route and is now on his way back. The trip was made from Peace River in 2 hours and 42 minutes, and this in spite of storms and head winds.

Piloting the plane was H. S. Myhres, who is one of the company's pilots, and who also accompanied George Gorman when he flew another of the planes across the continent in mid-winter. Others who came in per aeroplane were George Gorman, who had just returned from Fort Simpson in one of the Imperial Oil aeroplanes of the same type, E. Buehl, mechanic, and W. H. Waddell, who was the navigator accompanying the party on the Fort Simpson trip.

**Flew Through Storms**  
Everyone was delighted with the trip out from Peace River, but they ran into all sorts of storms, hail, snow, rain and treacherous winds, so that they did not make such a direct route as they might otherwise have done.

The plane sailed past over the city to the May-Gorman aerodrome, and when it alighted there were several on the spot to greet the passengers of the big plane.

**Larson is Returning**  
Mr. Larson is tremendously enthusiastic over the northland, and although he did not go any further than Peace River, is returning again this summer and will locate there. At present he plans, after a few days in Edmonton, to take some sightseeing trips by aeroplane to Jasper Park.

Meantime he will return to New York and equip a machine with everything that will possibly be needed in such a trip.

other days whose homes were divided into the harem and the haremlik, that is, one half of a mansion or palace for the women and the other for the men, acc-parting with their luxury as they have parted with their carriages, horses, jewels and lands. The peasants still keep a division of their houses for the privacy of their wives and daughters' and children.

**Like Europeans.**  
Many Turkish women deplore the necessity which compels them to live like the "poor European." They declare that they were happier when living apart, that the home was easier to manage and their husbands, too.

In Constantinople the majority of the private houses show this division, but the chance to rent one side of the house, or else the requisitions of Allied troops, has caused families to live together in only one half of their home.

Foreigners are getting for the first time a peep into the more aristocratic of these old homes, until now hidden in the mystery of protecting garden walls, latticed windows and huge gates or doorways. The vista often reveals a charming interior, with room, walls and ceilings decorated with fresco paintings and mosaics showing charming view of mosques, mountains, seas, forests, or towers of the old empire.  
As the homes are vacated, their elaborate European furniture, together with much of the collections of brocades, gossamer silks and fine rugs are sold at auctions held in the house or else sent to the dealers or auction room of the Old Bazaar.
