Over's Speech Distorted by Opposition Press to Injure Him Politically; Makes Statement

TORONTO, August 20.—Attempts are being made by the opposition press to twist the words of Premier Oliver in order to stand in badly with the labor people of the province. These of the recent unemployment conference he spoke of not offensively, stating the case for the government so that there might be no mistaken idea of what it was possible to do.

Now you are not going to agree with some of the things I have to say.

I do not deprecate the idea of employment. It is going to be largely in the hands of the Government. The question is whether the Government realizes the importance of the problem. We must be prepared at times to face a loss, and you laboring men must be prepared to bear your share of that loss.

Russia a Bad Example.
"We are told something worse may happen. Yes, it has happened in Russia, but I ask you how that happening is going to benefit the working man, that threatened starvation, rioting and trouble. That is not the way out, it will not help anyone or in any way improve the situation."

Safer Than Industry
The reason for the failure of funds is that the man who does not see his money in enterprises under conditions when he is in Government service and secure interest, can invest it in industry, the products of which he can dispose of.

There is a limit to the credit of the province. I don't know how far we can reach the breaking point. I can tell you that in the past, as we hoped, money was not at any time since the war.

DROWNING AT OCEAN FALLS

Frank A. Wardle Lost Life
While Bathing at Wearing Point.

OCEAN FALLS, Aug. 20.—A sad drowning accident occurred here on Sunday when Frank A. Wardle, aged 26, lost his life while bathing.

The whole family with a few friends went down Cousin Inlet in the young man's gas-boat, and landed at Wearing Point, five miles below Ocean Falls, intending to stay a few hours before returning in time for church service. Two or three members of the party prepared to bathe and the deceased entered first. He was observed swimming on the surface for a minute, and before the others entered he was missed. Inside of two minutes he was lying in 8 feet of water 3 yards from the shore. Artificial respiration was at once applied on the beach and continued for half an hour, when he was placed in Mr. Wright's gas boat and treatment continued till Ocean Falls was reached, where the local medical man—Dr. Christie, took him in charge, and with his hospital attendant, worked for half an hour, when life was pronounced to be extinct.

From Edmonton.
The deceased was the eldest son of Frank A. Wardle late of 11516 96th Street, Edmonton, and now of Ocean Falls. He was born at Longton, Staffordshire, England in 1901, and with his family came to Edmonton, Alta., in 1913, leaving for Ocean Falls in 1918.

The funeral service was held on August 16 at the Union Church, and he was interred at Ocean Falls cemetery. A large number of wreaths, etc. were sent, and the whole family extended their deepest sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Wardle and to the surviving daughter and younger son.

The deceased was qualifying as a steam electrical engineer in the boiler house of the Pacific Mills, Limited, Ocean Falls, B.C., for which company his father is acting as timekeeper since his demobilization from the Edmonton 63rd Battalion.

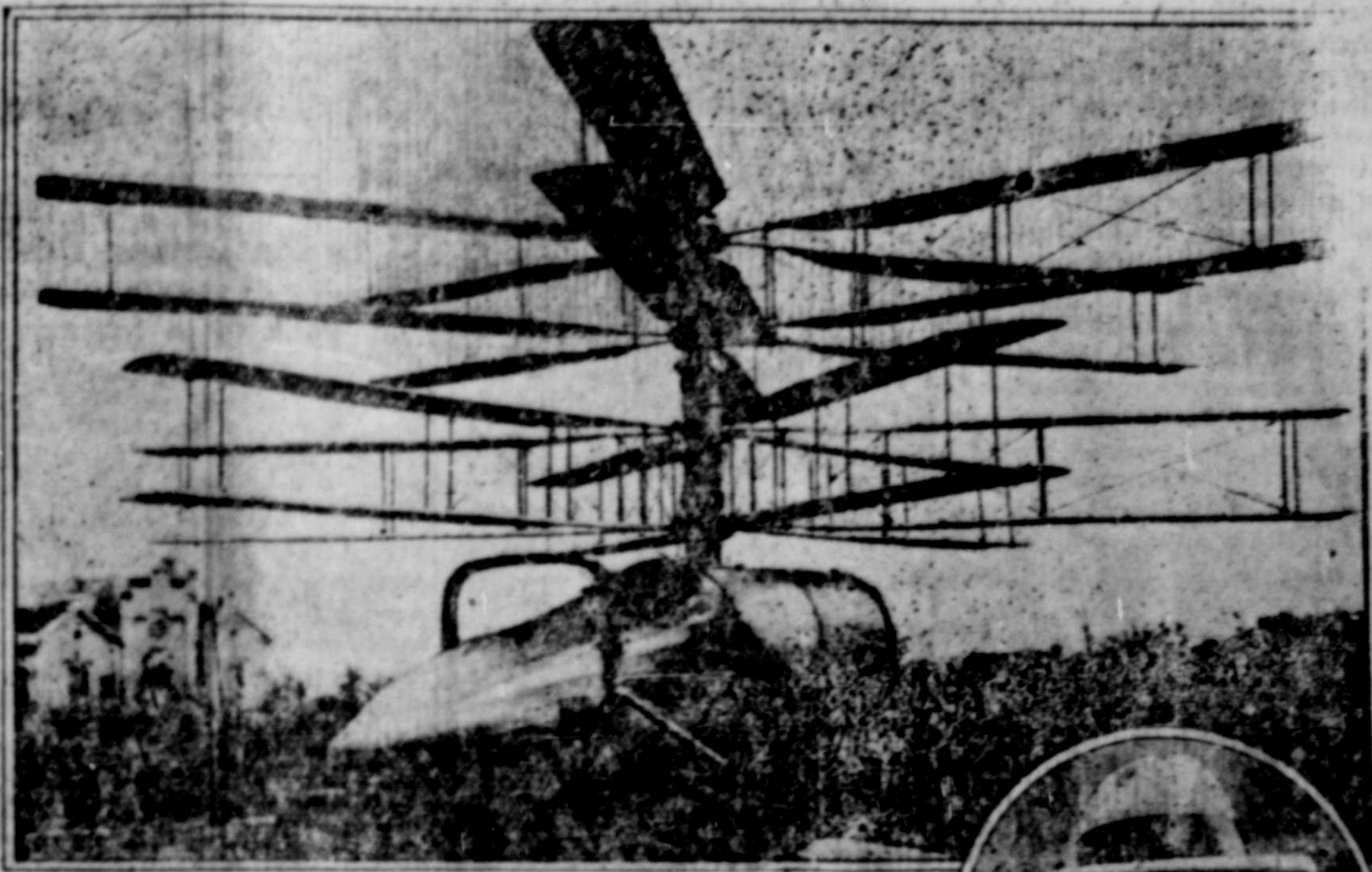

British Reported to Have Taken Long Lease on Port Of Petrograd in Russia

LONDON, August 20.—It is reported here that an English financial group has secured a long lease on the port of Petrograd from the Russian Soviet Government, a number of London bankers being interested.

It was reported in June that negotiations were under way at that time for a company to take control of all the workshops and foundries in Petrograd and that the British might extend their operations to other Russian ports.

VERTICAL ASCENT STIRS AERONAUTICAL WORLD.



The Pescara helicopter, the latest machine of its kind in the world, has achieved vertical ascent in its preliminary tests at Buena Vista, the estate of Marquis Pescara. The helicopter made ten successful flights, each time rising about a yard, remaining aloft, maintaining perfect stability and then settling vertically to the ground. The preliminary trials put the new machine in line for honors in development of the helicopter. Marquis Pescara (in insert), a Spanish nobleman, is the inventor and is working in conjunction with French army engineers.



Ireland's Latest Demand Is An International Guarantee Against English Aggression

DUBLIN, August 20.—The Irish Bulletin, organ of the Sinn Fein, protests against "deliberate distortion of the grave issue by misrepresenting Ireland as demanding home rule. What Ireland demands is freedom, which in Ireland's sense can never be reached by the roads the Dominions have travelled."

"Ireland's proximity to England demands international guarantees against aggression from England, which have been unnecessary for the Dominions."

DUBLIN, August 20.—Leaders of the Irish republican parliament are expected to confer with De Valera, and the text of Lloyd George's latest speech is likely to be discussed.

FIRED ON MOB IN TENNESSEE

Attempt to Lynch a Negro Was
Prevented by Police and
Military.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 20.—Police defending the jail fired on a mob trying to lynch a negro accused of an attack upon a school teacher and 27 white people were injured, two seriously. The mob stoned the jail and the military were called out but the shooting was left to the police.

NEW GOVERNOR AND THE NEWSPAPERS

The attitude of the new Governor-General, Baron Byng, toward the newspapers is shown in the account of his reception on the arrival of the ship at Quebec. An eastern exchange says:

"Immediately the boat docked, a crowd of newspapermen and moving picture operators flocked on board. His Lordship readily agreed to talk with the reporters and faced the cameras stoically. After his ordeal before the cameras he said to one lay scribe who was smiling: 'It is all right for you to laugh. How would you like to do it when ordered to?'"

This had reference to the admonition of the camera man to His Excellency to "smile, please."

Prest will leave for Prince George by the train today to pick a landing field for the next flight and Prest will follow with the plane, leaving Sunday if the flying conditions permit.

BYNG MAKES FIRST SPEECH

Proud of Military Achievements
of Canadians During War
Says Governor.

SOUTH MARCH, Ont., Aug. 20.—Baron Byng made his first public informal speech at the rifle range dinner here yesterday. He said that if militarism meant to goosestep he would rather see the Canadian boys fox-trot, but if militarism meant pride in Canadian war achievements, then Byng was the greatest militarist alive.

The Baron said he never made more than a ten minute speech and his Canadian speeches probably would be brief.

WARRIOR WAS ALSO ASHORE

Follows Canadian Recruit But Is
Refloated Not Seriously
Damaged.

QUEBEC, Aug. 20.—Yet another Canadian Government steamer has been ashore. This time it is the Canadian Warrior which went ashore in the St. Lawrence River near the spot where the Canadian Recruit sank on Thursday night.

The Warrior has been refloated and it is believed is not seriously damaged.

FIGHT TOOK PLACE BETWEEN CHINESE ON UNION STEAMER

One Goes to Hospital and Other
to Jail at Ocean Falls.

Provincial Constable Alex Saint returned this morning from Ocean Falls, where he investigated a stabbing affray involving Chinese.

It appears that two Chinamen, Mah Toi and Wong Wok Ying, had left Prince Rupert on the steamer Camosun Tuesday evening and had been put in the same stateroom. Between Swanson Bay and Ocean Falls a quarrel arose between the two, and Mah Toi was badly cut up with a knife. On arrival at Ocean Falls, both were turned over to the provincial police, Mah Toi being sent to the hospital and Wong Wok Ying to jail. On recovery of the injured man, Ying will come up before Magistrate Andrew Tyson for preliminary trial charged with wounding.

Everyone Help To Beautify City.

Everyone can do something toward beautifying the city. This year some of the residents have been working hard to get their gardens into shape. They have been sowing lawns, planting flowers and making all sorts of improvements which are having a good general effect on the community. Every year we hope to have more of that, but one pioneer is worth a dozen who follow the lead of the others. The power of example is very great. Credit is due to many for the excellent work they have done along that line this summer, and it is not yet too late for more to get busy so that there may be still further improvements next year. The time to make a garden for next year is to begin now.

The private garden is just as useful, so far as the community is concerned, as the public garden. We can all enjoy the results of our neighbor's labors. Visitors to the city gauge a place very largely from the way the gardens are kept, the houses painted, and the general tidiness of the community. The company towns are always admired for their cleanliness and the general air of tidiness that prevails. It is up to the people in a town like this to show that they do not need any control in order to make them put their places in order.

Unify Laws of Different Provinces.

An effort is being made to unify the laws of the various provinces of Canada. The legal fraternity are taking the first step. They are getting together with the idea of having the laws such that a lawyer can practise in any province and be thoroughly qualified for the work; that a teacher can teach in any province, that a doctor can practise in any province, and that there be a general tendency toward greater uniformity of laws of all kinds. The move seems to be an excellent one. Quebec is the only province which is not to be represented at the meeting which is to be held. That province, having certain privileges under the British North America Act, holds to them tenaciously and therefore will be excluded from the scope of the movement.

Unconscious Mind And Its Influence.

Psychologists tell us that we all have what is known as an unconscious mind which influences all our actions, which is always alert and always working. Bruce Barton in an article in the September American Magazine tells of some of the vagaries it plays, especially in regard to affecting our memory. The unconscious mind tries to shut off things which are unpleasant, and for that reason we easily forget things which we do not like. In our unguarded moments we say and do things which reveal our true selves because the unconscious mind is working while the conscious self may be temporarily dormant. The study is a very fascinating one and anyone interested in it might well, as a starter, read the article in question.

TALE OF A HORSE.

Editor Daily News:—During a vacation, my attention was called to an article in your journal, describing the "destruction of an animal, which was prized very much by the Indian Agent of the Queen Charlotte Agency." Apparently, your informant must have been under "Government Control," when reciting the "story," for publication.

The truth of the matter is that the animal had its leg broken, by a kick from another horse. It was impossible to have the bone set and it was decided to destroy the beast.

Indians, of this agency, are not in the habit of shooting animals through "sarcastic remarks," or because they do not understand right from wrong. We all appreciate jokes, when they emanate from a source that might be considered reliable; but when you take into consideration that the horse was the property of the Indian Department; that I had to report on the cause of the accident and death, and that the story places me in a wrong light with my superiors, the joke becomes serious. Any Indian knows better than to destroy a valuable animal, through a sarcastic remark. It might be instructive to state that no Indians, of this Agency, have been convicted of an offence calling for a prison or penitentiary sentence, during the eleven years we have been among them. The jail records of the Province will not show one Haida Indian convicted and sent to jail, from these islands, during that long term of years.

This speaks well for the Haidas, numbering over six hundred and fifty natives. If the story related of an Indian shooting a horse, through a sarcastic remark made, had any truth in it, your informant would not require to recite such a jocular article. The incident happened about four years ago, which is another proof that it takes quite a time for news to travel from these islands to the metropolis of the North.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

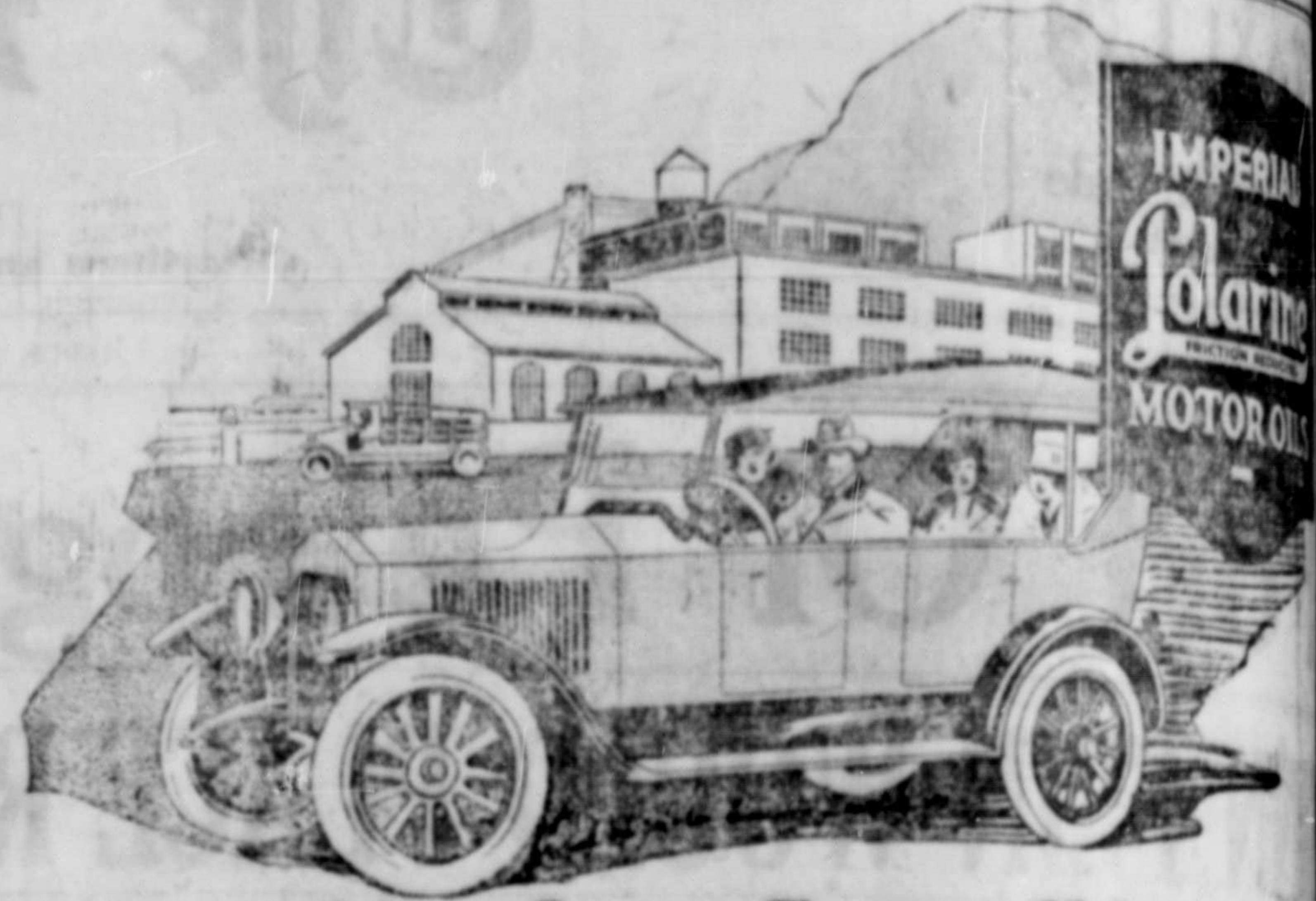

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FRANCE RISING FROM DEVASTATION OF WAR

EDMONTON, Aug. 20.—French Consul General for Canada M. de Verneuil, at the regular weekly luncheon of the Kiwanis Club gave a short address on general conditions in France, the work of reparation and the most friendly relations that existed between that country and Canada and the motherland.

After quoting facts and figures to show that France was gradually rising from the devastations of the war, he went on to show that there was now in that country internal peace, with little or no labor trouble, and workers were graciously accepting a lowering of wages in keeping with the conditions of the time. The farmers of the country were content and had settled down to production with might and main, and politically there was union in the midst of the opposing parties. There was a general spirit of co-operation in the nation.

PROVE GOODImmense Pressure of Water
Alongside Oil in Recently
Drilled Well.PEACE RIVER, Aug. 20.—Re-
ports from the Peace River Pe-
roleum Company's well, 30 miles
down stream from this point,
indicate that the water gusher
which wrecked the company's
well recently also carried a large
volume of gas and some oil.The drilling is now throwing
a solid ten inch stream of wa-
ter, with an admixture of oil,
fifty feet into the air, and had
it not been for the unfortunate
break through of the water pres-
sure, the drillers are of the
opinion that they had the "real
thing."In addition to the water gey-
ser there was a heavy flow of
gas when the pressure was li-
berated, and the gas underlying
the water was responsible for
the damage caused to the plant.

off the water above the gas, but

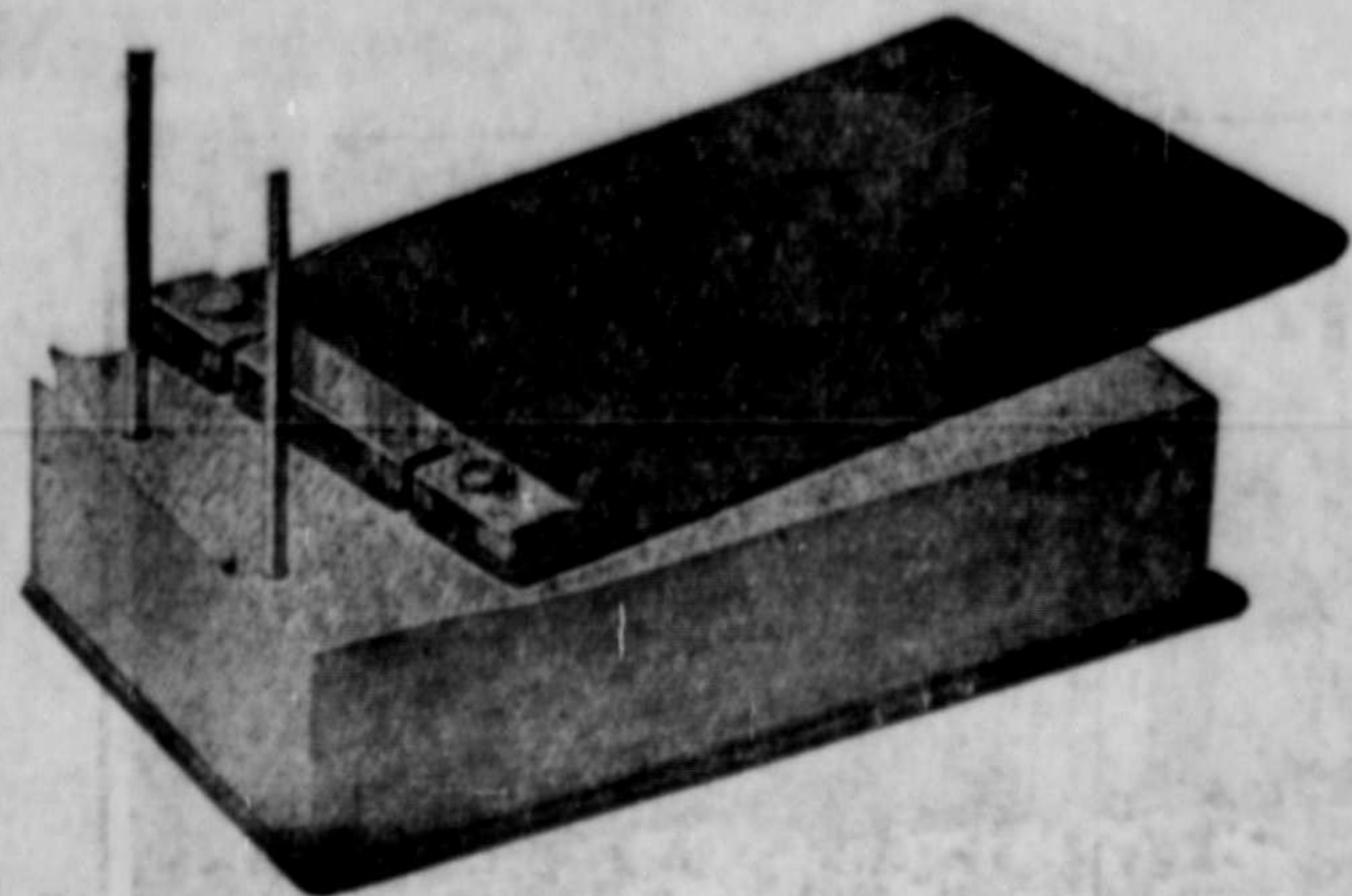

TIMES QUIET ON ISLAND

P. W. Anderson, Provincial Road Foreman, Thinks That Great Future in Store, However.

P. W. Anderson, provincial road foreman, who returned yesterday morning from an extensive tour of Graham Island, says that the island is now having very quiet times.

Lumbering, which kept things bustling there for several years, has fallen off practically altogether this season. The Buckley mill at Buckley Bay is the only plant that is running. There are 75 men working there cutting up several million feet of logs that are in the water and which would not last another year if left there. At Port Clements, W. P. Lynch and associates are cleaning up the last of their lumber and after they are through Port Clements will be a very quiet place. The spruce from both mills is being shipped on barges, shipments for Vancouver being in the form of big timbers.

Mining.

There is little or no activity in mining. A lot of land is being staked for its oil shale on all parts of the island but there is no development work going on whatever. The black sands are not being operated either.

Fishing has brought nothing to the island with the exception of the Indians who are returning from the canneries to Masset Reserve. No canneries operated on the islands this season.

Agriculture is practically tied up by the lack of transportation facilities. Beef and potatoes will likely be shipped but fine crops of smaller produce such as turnips, lettuce, etc., cannot be handled. Fowl, such as geese and ducks, Mr. Anderson says, can be raised there with great success and from spring to fall do not have to be cared for but can feed and care for themselves.

Future Brighter

While the situation now is very dull, Mr. Anderson is confident that eventually lumbering and agriculture will be important and thriving industries on the Queen Charlotte Islands and will repay the initial investments which now seem inactive. The country is but feeling the general depression that exists all over the world.

When Mr. Anderson paid his visit, Graham Island was very beautiful. The weather was perfect and, when he walked over the Mexican Tom trail, was as hot as the jungles of Africa. Much natural growth of exceeding beauty abounds and there were great crops of wild fruits. June, July and August are the right months to visit the Islands and Mr. Anderson thinks that when they are better known many Prince Rupert people will go there for the summer.

Road Building.

The provincial government is carrying out work on the building of the road between Port Clements and Tiel. A fourteen-mile right of way is being cleared to a width of 66 feet. This road will prove the salvation of the settlers on the East coast where it is impossible for steamers to land. It will take two years to complete.

is some reason to believe that
Premier Meighen has come back
to Canada prepared to concur
in the views of that wing of the
cabinet who favor dissolution of
parliament as the best solution
of a perturbed political situation.
That he entertains such a view
is not surprising because at the
final caucus of his party on the
eve of his departure for England
he bade them prepare for a
general election. While such
counsel is often given, it is un-
derstood that the premier's refer-
ence in this instance was
pretty specific. The advice of
the caucus, however, was against
such a course.

Therein lies the great doubt
today as to whether or no disso-
lution will occur this fall. The
views of the most influential
men of the cabinet predominate
—and the Premier himself is
said to be in accord with them—
the government with little delay
may throw its hat in the ring
but the members of parliament
have to be considered and con-
sulted and deference extended to
their views.

How Premier Was Chosen.

A year ago when Sir Robert
Borden retired from the premier-
ship and the question of selec-
ting his successor arose, the then
premier took the democratic
course of asking each minister-
ial member to indicate his prefer-
ence for the premiership.
There is little question that a
majority favored Mr. Meighen.
As, somewhat at least, he is of
their own making, the propriety
of consulting them is more ap-
parent than usual. There is the
further consideration that, in
many cases, the present member-
ship of the government side will
be the candidate in the next
general election and if they have
to put up the fight in the con-
stituencies, they have an addi-
tional claim for being consulted
as to when they should go there.

May Consult Followers.

It is believed, therefore, that
before any definite conclusion is
arrived at, on the question of a
general election the prime min-
ister will take steps to ascertain
the views of his followers. If the
final conclusion be to go ahead,
the by-elections will be brought
on. There are five vacancies al-
ready and indications that, in the
natural course, three other con-
stituencies will be opened up. If
these elections in the main
should be adverse to the govern-
ment, dissolution would seem in-
evitable. If the most of them
are carried, the result would be
construed as a mandate to carry
on. If the members of parlia-
ment supporting the government
will stand for it, a general elec-
tion this fall would seem highly
probable, but that either they or
the rank and file of the two op-
positions relish the idea of disso-
lution is exceedingly question-
able. The average M. P. on all
sides wants another session and
the annexation of another in-
demnities of four thousand is not
a wholly foreign influence.

FRENCH WRITER DISCUSSES THE YELLOW PERIL

"Asia for the Asiatics," He Says
Is Becoming the Cry.

PARIS, Aug. 20.—Dr. A. F.
Legendre, a French writer on
Chinese and Asiatic subjects
gained from 25 years of travel
and observation in the Far East,
warns the world in his latest
work that "Asia is at the white
man's doors, 900,000,000
strong." The biggest cloud on the
horizon of the future, he says, is
the "yellow peril."

The white race, Dr. Legendre
says, "lost face," as the Orient-
al puts it, when Japan defeated
Russia. During the great war
he writes, Japan multiplied her
resources and saved her strength
while Europe lost 20,000,000
men and today suffers depress-
ing, intellectual, moral and
economic debility. Great Britain
the author holds, erred in sup-
porting Japan through her
"marriage of reason" with the
Pacific Empire, an alliance "now
proving so embarrassing."

Tendency of Today.

"Imperialistic Germanism and
Socialism now are a union," he
adds, in expounding his theory
that the Japanese and German
expansion each toward the other,
threaten to bridge the old Rus-
sian bulwark against Asiatic in-
vasion of Europe and call for
prompt action by the white man
to save himself from the dom-
ination he sees impending in the
steadily increasing crystalliza-
tion of "Asia for the Asiatics,"
sentiment, particularly among
the Musselmans. Russia, he says,
cannot save herself; she must
be helped with a new brand of
statesmanship.

Detailed studies of Asiatic
economic resources are given by
Dr. Legendre to support his as-
sertion that the yellow race may
become sellers instead of buy-
ers unless the white race de-
velops its commerce in every
way and seeks to produce cheap-
ly, anticipating Asiatic competi-
tion by establishing factories in
Asia and by increasing produc-
tion in all of Europe's colonies.

Siberian Butter.

Among the many illustrations
of Asiatic resources, the author
cites Siberian exports of butter
that went from 35,000,000 lbs. in
1900 to 100,000,000 lbs. in
1913 and much of which was
sold as "Danish" butter.

Formidable and imminent as
the author deems Asiatic competi-
tion he nevertheless concedes to
the white race superior work-
ing ability and greater leader-
ship. "It must at last be realized
however," he says, "that here-
after, it is Asia face to face
with Europe."

"Pan Americanism is a real-
ity," he concludes, "and the
Peace Conference ingeniously
did all it could to favor it, par-
ticularly on the Shantung ques-
tion." This "error," Dr. Le-
gendre says, the United States,
the only champions of China,
saw, and from now on "America
will raise herself against any
show of political immorality or
spoliation."

PERMIT WORKMEN SHARE OF PROFITS

Law in Vera Cruz State Meets
Much Opposition.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 20.—A law
recently passed and promulgated
in the state of Vera Cruz to per-
mit workmen to share in the
profits of any industry in that
state has met with much protest
and threat is made that if there
is any attempt to carry it into
effect a general paralysis of in-
dustry will result.

The law calls for the estab-
lishment of a commission of
seven, three employers and three
workmen and a chairman select-
ed jointly, in each municipality
in the state which, at least once
annually, shall call for the books
of all industrial concerns and,
after a careful audit, shall name
the share of the laborers. The
workmen are to receive not less
than 10 percent of the total net
profits. No maximum is stated.

The chairman is to be named
by the president of the muni-
cipality if his selection cannot
be mutually agreed upon by the
employers and the workmen. It
is pointed out by those who op-
pose the law that this will almost

clared to have been the greatest
prison riot and attempted deliv-
ery in the history of the United
States. The nine convicts in-
jured were shot by city police,
county detectives and prison
guards while attempting to fight
their way to liberty. Virtually
all of the 1,135 prisoners except
fifty, who are women, took part
in the rioting, both inside the
main building and in the prison
yard.

Divide Net Earnings.

The profits to be divided, ac-
cording to the law, "will be un-
derstood to be the net earnings
realized in the business, after
taking into consideration the in-
terest and the amortization of
the capital invested. The inter-
est will not exceed six percent
per annum and the amortization
will be adjusted according to the
nature of the capital, but must
never exceed 10 percent of the
capital of the immovable estate."

One of the principal objec-
tions made to the law is that it
is retroactive to February 5,
1917. An elaborate system of
embargoes and fines is provided
in the case the employers fail to
comply with the orders of the
commission or are discovered
attempting to evade any of its
findings.

sold at public auction to secure
payment.

RUSSIAN FOOD PRICES SOAR

Black Bread and Herrings Only
For Preferred Classes.

RIGA, Latvia, Aug. 20.—Prices
of foodstuffs on the Moscow
market are reported steadily in-
creasing. A pound of rye bread,
early in July, could be had at
from 3,600 to 4,000 rubles; beef
at from 7,000 to 9,000 rubles;
pork from 10,000 to 12,000; but-
ter from 18,000 to 20,000 rubles
and potatoes from 1,600 to 2,-
800 rubles a pound while eggs
are sold at 1,000 to 1,200 rubles
and cucumbers, one of the most
popular articles of diet, at 1,000
to 1,500 rubles each.

The average wage paid in fac-
tories and to government em-
ployees, in addition to rations
supplied by the state, was about
10,000 to 15,000 rubles a month.

The Moscow rations for the
week, as reported by the official
Pravda, were, for workmen of
the preferred classes, three
pounds of black bread, some her-
rings and small quantities of
other essentials for a period of
five days. Less favored citizens
were allotted one pound of bread
for five days and no herrings.
The wage allowed in addition to
these rations would not buy a
pound of butter.

The Bolshevik government, in
fixing international telegraph
rates, considered 20,000 rubles
as equal to one dollar.

DOG RACING AT EDMONTON

Proposed Made to Have Speed Contests for Coyote Hounds with Electric Animal.

EDMONTON, Aug. 20.—Every man the owner of his own racing stud! Such is the picture which the future may bring forth, if a proposition now before the city commissioners comes to any material end.

The request has been made whether permission could not be granted for the erection of a track in the South Side athletic ground for the purpose of holding dog races there, similar to those held in the United States. In the States the incentive used for the purpose of inducing the dogs to run is an electrically controlled figure of a jack-rabbit mounted on a rail along which the figure travels in a very similar manner to the moving targets at rifle ranges. Its means of the control the rabbit is made to stop and listen, then move off again, and also the speed can be augmented or made slower. Races are between various classes of rabbit dogs.

Coyote Hounds.
For Edmonton it is proposed that coyote hounds will be used for racing, and for this purpose the quarry will be an electrically controlled coyote which will be mounted on rails and be part of the track equipment. It will be made so that it can stop and look around, and then go on again, such as a coyote will when running from hounds.

The request is made by W. Mohler, and it is asked whether a quarter mile track cannot be made. A charge would be made for admission to the grounds, and it is suggested that the city's interests shall be a percentage of the receipts, the figure named being 20 per cent.

Some information has already been secured on the matter and already there are something like fifty dogs in the city, whose owners would be anxious to enter them in any sporting events of the kind.

Attract Thousands.
It might here be said that this particular sport of dog racing is not a new thing, as it has been in vogue in the old country, particularly in Yorkshire, for many years.

Yorkshire whippet races are a great feature, and attract thousands of most enthusiastic on-lookers, particularly from men of the mining class. The whippet is a cross between the greyhound and terrier, and is bred specially for racing.

The gambling aspect was discussed when the matter came before the commissioners and it was remarked that it was an issue which would have to be properly settled before the project was carried out to any length.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Hon. Arthur Henderson who was recently about to leave for Canada, was detained owing to the critical state of affairs in the Old Country. Should negotiations with the Sinn Fein fail, it is possible an election may be precipitated.

When in Berlin recently the Socialist paper Vorwarts, had an interview with Mr. Henderson who explained the splitting up of the working classes, which in the minds of English Socialists is the greatest misfortune that has befallen the Labor movement. It is most important, Mr. Henderson says, that the Socialists of all countries should become again united in the great International.

Mr. Henderson thinks if the negotiations with Ireland break down England in a few weeks must have a general election. The election prospects of the Labor party he regards as very good. The Irish elections will be an exclusively Irish affair, and the English labor party will not concern themselves with them. Out of the 600 constituencies in England, Scotland and Wales, the Labor party is contesting 500.

The end of the coal strike, in Mr. Henderson's opinion, can only improve the prospects of the Labor party. English workers have been taught by their late experiences in the economic struggle that industrial methods alone are not sufficient, and that the political vote has reached a growing significance. At the next general election the British Labor party will fight in complete independence and liberty, without compromising with other parties.

DEPUTY MINISTER M'NIVEN TO ATTEND EMPLOYMENT COUNCIL

VICTORIA, August 20.—J. D. McNiven, deputy minister of labor, and J. H. McVety, superintendent of the provincial employment bureau, are leaving here on Monday to attend a conference of the Employment Service Council of Canada at Ottawa and later the international employment conference at Buffalo in September.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Enlistment of British citizens in the Morocco service has been suspended by the Spanish consulate here, and men who volunteered for the foreign legion to fight against the Moors will be discharged.

MINISTER LEAVES.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—The deputy minister of justice leaves today for Geneva to attend the conference of the League of Nations. Hon. Hugh Guthrie is acting minister of justice during the absence of the minister.

SMITHERS

A. G. Garde, mining engineer from Prince Rupert, H. W. Dyson, of the Yorkshire Trust Co., Vancouver, W. F. Osborne and H. S. Robinson, arrived here last week and left with their pack train for the Copper River country where they will spend a fortnight inspecting their holdings.

After two weeks of ideal haying weather, one of the worst storms experienced in this section for many years broke on Sunday being preceded with a wind storm that blew down many trees. Many mowing parties were caught in the rain.

Tommy Haig caused a little flurry of excitement here last week when he returned from the Babines with a piece of rock showing free gold in large sized pieces. He relates the utmost secrecy as to the location of his find.

The Canadian National Railways have announced willingness to enlarge the electrical plant in the round house to provide for the needs of the town.

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MINISTER AND
ROAD PROBLEMHon. J. H. King States Position
of Government in Regard to
Highways.

Hon. J. H. King, minister of public works, who is to pass through Prince Rupert next week, addressed the New Westminster Automobile club at their picnic at Crescent Beach. He said that municipalities, if they came to the Government seeking assistance for highways, must bear a fair share of the burden. But if municipalities do not require highways improved the Government will not force expenditures upon them under the agreement and municipalities in accordance with the New Highway Act, which classifies roads into primary, secondary and municipal, and establishes a basis of Government assistance of 25 to 50 per cent. respectively.

Auto License Fees.

The Minister also gave the assurance that the Government was 'faithfully observing the spirit of their agreement with the Good Roads League that the returns from increased fees would be devoted to permanent highway building. The Government had consolidated the money derived from automobile license fees and is devoting it to building permanent roads. He considered this a sound policy and that it would be productive of good results. Ninety miles of the highways being constructed or improved this year will be of a permanent nature. They realized that better road conditions were required and they were trying to meet the needs of the Province in this respect, but municipalities must bear their share of the cost.

Work of Department.

The Province had 15,000 miles of road, declared the Minister in his opening statement on British Columbia's road problems. There are 4,000 miles of these graded, and otherwise improved. The remaining 11,000 miles are in an unfinished state, and will not stand up under auto traffic. The municipal administration control only one-half of one per cent. of the area of the Province and in that area 90 per cent. of the population live. The Government is interested in 300 miles in the municipalities of the Province. But although population is concentrated in the large centres, the development of the Province will not go on unless the hinterland is developed. In this the Government has a large work to do. Trails have to be built and maintained, colonization roads kept up if that development would go on. Bridges also have to be built and constructed. There are some fifty ferries to be maintained. Hence the Department of Public Works must give consideration to the whole problem and build up an organization that will look to the future.

LABOR ORGANIZATIONDocument Being Drawn up Under
Instructions from Tom Moore.

TORONTO, Aug. 20.—When the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada meets in Winnipeg this month, delegates from affiliated organizations will be asked to deal with a new constitution which is being prepared by George Kelly, barrister, of Ottawa, on the instructions of President Moore and the Executive Council of the Congress.

The necessity of a new constitution came with the decision handed down last winter by Justice Rose in the suit of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees against the Congress which had revoked its charter. Mr. Justice Rose determined that the action of President Moore and the Executive council could not be sustained in law, and rendered a decision in favor of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees.

End of Fight in Sight.
There is every indication that the fight between the Canadian Brotherhood and the International Brotherhood, which has dragged through several conventions of the Congress, will be terminated this year.

Following the decision in favor of the Canadian Brotherhood President Mosher called the convention of that organization in Winnipeg during the first week of September, anticipating that the Congress Executive would hold its sessions at the usual time in the same month. Later President Moore announced the convention of the Congress for the last week in August.

Faces Crisis.
Efforts are being made by the Canadian Brotherhood to muster its forces to give it a commanding influence in the convention.

Its representatives are securing support from the anti-administration element within the Congress, and with the prospect of a much smaller attendance at the convention on account of the conditions facing many of the local unions throughout the country there is every indication of a keen fight between President Moore and President Mosher.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert and minister of lands, and F. C. Wade, agent general for B. C. in London, were the guests at the dinner given by the Canadian Club in London on July 28 to Baron Byng, the new governor-general, on the eve of his departure for the Dominion. The Duke of Connaught proposed the health of the new governor and paid a glowing tribute to his qualities as soldier and citizen.

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
