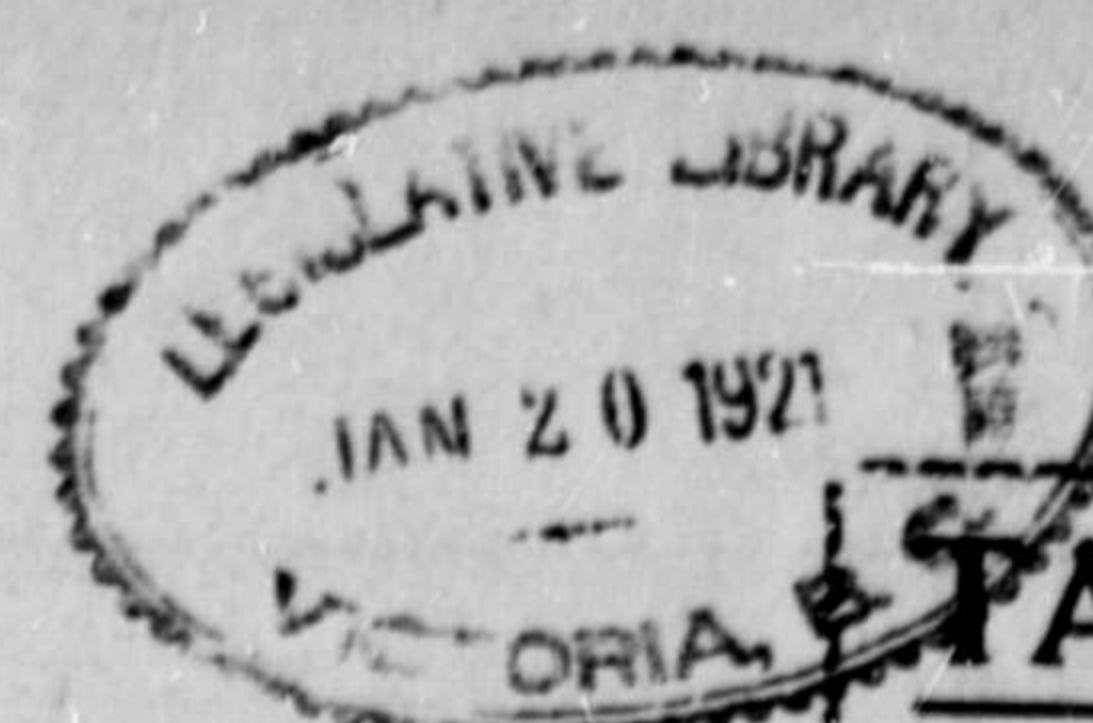

CLOSE CONTEST HERE IN MAYORALTY ELECTION

ARMY OF 200,000 MEN SAID TO BE ORGANIZED THROUGHOUT IRELAND

Harry B. Rochester Elected to be Mayor of Prince Rupert

Close Contest in which former Alderman is Victor over George W. Nickerson; War Veteran Leads Aldermanic List

Harry B. Rochester was yesterday chosen mayor of Prince Rupert with a majority of 39 over George W. Nickerson. Keen interest was taken in the election and the poll was a large one, people registering their preferences. City Clerk E. A. Woods was returning officer, with Harry Birch assistant, and a staff of deputies. Everything went well from the official standpoint and there was no delay in balloting. Every facility was offered voters and the counting was quickly and efficiently carried out.

There was keen competition for the position of alderman and school trustee. Several defeated ones came so near winning that the result was in doubt for a long time.

The G. W. V. A. secured two representatives on the council, Mr. Kelly leading the poll, besides getting the grant of the property which they now occupy. The by-law was carried almost unanimously.

ALBERTA PREMIER ILL AT EDMONTON

Taken with Sudden Attack of Appendicitis and Operated on at Hospital.

EDMONTON, Jan. 14.—Following an illness of a few hours only Premier Charles Stewart was removed to the Royal Alexandra Hospital in this city Tuesday morning at 1 o'clock and operated on for appendicitis.

The news of the premier's illness coming almost without warning caused a feeling of genuine alarm in the provincial parliament buildings Tuesday, but reports from the hospital during the forenoon indicated that Hon. Mr. Stewart stood the operation well and that his condition was gratifying to the medical attendants, Doctors I. W. T. McEachron and M. E. McKay.

PORTER MAYOR OF VICTORIA THIRD TERM

Tisdall Elected Alderman in Vancouver on First Count.

MONEY BYLAWS IN VANCOUVER DEFEATED

Victoria Passes Daylight Saving But Vancouver Rejects It.

VICTORIA, January 14.—The final count for first choice in the mayoralty campaign in this city gives Robert J. Porter 2,195 over Joseph Patrick, 1,601. This elects Mr. Porter for the third term.

Daylight saving is carried here on the plebiscite.

VANCOUVER, January 14.—C. E. Tisdall is definitely elected alderman for Vancouver under the proportional system of balloting. Others not elected yet but first choice of electors on the first count are J. J. McRae, F. Crone, T. H. Tracy, W. J. Scribbens. The final results may not be known until late today.

Bylaws Lost.
All school and money bylaws received majorities but none had the requisite three-fifths of the total vote so were declared lost. Daylight saving, which last year was adopted here, was defeated on this occasion.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 14.—Mayor Johnson has been re-elected here.

PRINCE GEORGE, Jan. 14.—Henry Wilson was elected mayor with a majority of 57.

FERNIE, Jan. 14.—G. C. Henderson was re-elected mayor by a majority of 53 over E. Rutledge.

Noon Returns.
VICTORIA, Jan. 14.—Noon—Further count of the ballots in the civic election reveal the reelection to the council of Alderman A. E. Todd, Ald. George Sangster, Ald. Dewar, and A. M. Atken. Six more are to be elected.

For the school board Magistrate Jay, Mrs. Spofford, and A. G. Pike have been chosen.

The surprise of the election was the overwhelming success of Jos. North for police commissioner. It will be two days before the complete results are ready.

Vancouver Probables.
VANCOUVER, Jan. 14.—(Noon) With C. E. Tisdall definitely elected to the council it is generally regarded that Ald. McRae, Ald. Crone, Ald. Owen and Col. Tracy will be returned. There are eight seats to fill.

For the school board it looks as though Professor Matheson, J. W. Prescott and Dr. Nicholson would be elected. The counting will continue for a day or two.

Irish Republican Army is Said to be 200,000 Strong

Dispatch to Montreal Paper says Force is Well Disciplined, has Armies, Armouries, and is Partially Uniformed

MONTREAL, January 14.—A Montreal Star cable from Dublin says: The Sinn Fein organization has 200,000 men under arms in Ireland, it was stated authoritatively yesterday. The republican army represents five per cent of the Irish population.

The army which is under military discipline is organized in zone groups; is partially uniformed; has secret arsenals and armories, and comprises men between the ages of 18 and 30.

Grand Trunk Gets \$25,000,000 Loan

Will Use Cash to Purchase Equipment for Road; Dominion Government is Behind Transaction

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Negotiations were completed today by bankers for a loan of approximately \$25,000,000 to the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada to be used by that line and its subsidiaries for providing equipment needed.

The loan was sought by the Dominion Government which controls the railway. The line will soon be a part of the Canadian National system and the loan is really a government loan. It will probably be used partly to pay for purchases in this country in order to avoid the adverse exchange rate.

MAYOR ELECT H'S H'D INTERESTING CAREER

Mary B. Rochester was Operator, Dispatcher, Coal Merchant and Hotel Manager—Father Mayor of Ottawa.

Mayor-elect Harry B. Rochester is a native of Ottawa but has been in British Columbia for the last thirty years. His family are among the very oldest residents of the capital and his grandfather, who was a native of Yorkshire, England, settled there many years ago, taking up a piece of land adjoining Ottawa in the days before the place was moved there and the place was known as the village of Bytown. The land which Mr. Rochester's grandfather took up later became part of the city of

Ottawa and is still known as Rochester's father, who was born in New York, but came to Bytown at the age of six, was the first mayor of Ottawa and sat for sixteen years in the House of Commons for Carleton County, giving up his seat then in favor of Sir John A. Macdonald, premier, who had been defeated in Kingston. He was considered an un-beatable candidate in that county. Thirty years ago Mr. Rochester came west and has served as the Prince Rupert hotel in 1914 operator and train dispatcher where he has been since.

MAY ABOLISH NEAR BEER IN CITIES' BARS

Suggested Three per cent. May be Sold in Motel Dining Rooms.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 14.—A special to the Province from Victoria says the sale of near beer in British Columbia cities and villages will be abolished and that three per cent. brew will be substituted. This beer will be sold in hotel dining rooms but only with meals. In the intervals between meals patrons may obtain their favorite brew a la buffet.

These are said to be among the more interesting provisions of the new legislation to be passed as a result of the referendum on October 20. This represents the progress so far made in the carrying out of the mandate of the electorate.

New Mayor and Aldermen.

A new civic year has commenced and there are new men in charge of affairs at the city hall. Mayor Rochester was elected after a rather exciting contest by a sufficient majority to make it clear what the people wanted. He has had three years of experience at the council and this should now stand him in good stead. He has a good council with him and there is no reason why the coming year should not be a most successful one.

Mayor Rochester has two lines of policy which are admirable. He stands for better roads and a clean city. It was probably the latter policy that elected him. There was a feeling around the city that the less desirable elements of the community were backing Mr. Nickerson, and to a large extent the people were right. Nickerson did not bid for that support nor, we believe, was he prepared to cater to it. The fact of receiving that support defeated him, however. It was undoubtedly used somewhat industriously by many of Mr. Rochester's supporters in the contest now closed. The announcement of the new mayor in favor of police reform also seems to have been endorsed by the people. This is a matter for the police commission as a whole to deal with.

Road Policy Of New Mayor.

Mayor Rochester has always been in favor of better roads. He knows what it is to drive over the bumps and he realizes that in any modern city the streets must be kept in good shape. In the city council as alderman he has often inveighed against the bad condition of the thoroughfares and doubtless now he has the opportunity will see that things are improved.

Coming Year is Very Important.

The coming year is a very important one for the city. The news despatch from Victoria saying that a new pulp concern had been incorporated known as the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., with a capitalization of four million dollars, is in itself very interesting. With a mill such as that in the city, there would be no fear of a drop off in business and population as soon as the shipbuilding program is completed. It is to be hoped that the mill will be erected at or near Seal Cove. There are good sites in the neighborhood and it would be a decided benefit to the city to have it there rather than on the Skeena River.

Many other proposals for improvements are likely to come up in the not far distant future and the mayor and council will have an opportunity to show their mettle. A growing period is always a difficult time as improvements are absolutely necessary to keep pace with the influx of new residents.

Good Feeling Follows Election.

Both Mayor Rochester and Mr. Nickerson showed an excellent spirit following the election. There was no bitterness evident. Nickerson took his defeat like a good sport and immediately on the announcement being made, congratulated his opponent on the victory. It is the way in which contests of this kind should be carried on. People support the man they think best fitted for the work, not that the opponents are bad but that they think their man better fitted for the position. We take this opportunity of congratulating Mayor Rochester on his election to the important office and Mr. Nickerson on the fine fight he put up and the sportsmanlike way in which he took his defeat.

FRASER LAKE COAL COMPANY FORMED HERE

New Concern to Develop Mine at Fraser Lake, Head Office at Prince Rupert

VICTORIA, Jan. 11.—The incorporation of the Fraser Lake Collieries, Ltd., with a capitalization of \$600,000 has been announced. It will have its head offices at Prince Rupert. This is a company formed by residents of Fort Fraser district to develop a coal property at Fraser Lake which was discovered last summer when a steam shovel was being used there, and was reported on very favorably by H. G. Colgrave, of Prince George, a mining engineer.

The company owns something like 2,000 acres of coal land. Among the owners are Paul Hagan, G. Muggen, H. H. Olesen, C. J. Kelly and T. T. Hamilton, but it is understood others are in on the concern. The coal is semi-anthracite and is said to be good for domestic and steam purposes.

Prince George Opinion

The Prince George Citizen speaking of the mine says:

"In early July of this year a steam shovel crew was at work at this point, and in the process of making a cut they broke into a seam of coal four feet wide, and the coal was of such excellent appearance that the ground was staked and that steam shovel crew have since then been railroaders by profession, but coal operators with a mighty promising future by a freak of circumstances.

A small program of work was outlined at the beginning, consisting chiefly of surface prospecting and testing the continuity of the first vein by a short cut, and it was in the process of the prospecting work that in a few days the men opened up a ten-foot seam about a half mile from the first showing. Since that time a small force has been driving a tunnel on the second seam with the gratifying success of steadily widening the seam and a distinct improvement in the quality of the coal as progress is made.

Excellent Quality

"While no great quantity has been sent out for test on the market, the coal has been used along the railway to a sufficient extent to lead to the belief that the boys have a first-class product for domestic purposes and hope and confidence is generally expressed that they will be able to get it on the market at an early date. While no official analyses are available, the coal is excellent in combustible qualities, is clean, with an apparent good percentage of fixed carbon and a low ash content.



SOUTH AFRICAN NOMINATIONS TAKING PLACE

Test Over Question of Secession, with Smuts for Continuing Union

The nominations for the parliament of the Union of South Africa taking place today and the elections are to be held on January 8. The Unionist coalition party is headed by Jan Smuts and against it are the Nationalists who stand for separation from the British Empire. There is also a Labor Party which is in favor of continuing a part of the British Empire. The Nationalists have been much surprised, says a recent London paper, "as had not anticipated that Smuts would dare to lead the country; but throughout, General Smuts' leadership has been the surprise. Nationalists were wholly unprepared to follow him, and to follow him wholeheartedly for when the Hereenizing (re-

union) Conference was held in September. They represented him as the enemy of reunion, but discovered that he was doing his utmost to promote it. Their second was when the South African Party delegates stood like a rock at the Hereenizing Congress on the question of secession; their third was when General Smuts proclaimed the policy of forming a strong centre party to fight secession; and their fourth when that policy was unanimously adopted by both the South African and the Unionist Party Congresses.

AUSTRIAN AFFAIRS APPROACH CLIMAX

Emperor Charles' Ready on Way from Switzerland

VIENNA, Jan. 14.—Officials in foreign circles assert that affairs in Austria are approaching a climax. Uneasiness is increasing from the report that former Emperor Charles is already on his way from Switzerland to Hungary. Communist demonstrations have been frequent and there is a general feeling of unrest. Affairs cannot continue as at present long without a break.

"LEILA R." IS BACK IN PORT

Was in Shelter at White Rock Six Days and Did Not Make Queen Charlottes

The Provincial government for-estry launched Leila R. returned to port yesterday afternoon at 3.30 and fears for her safety were happily dispelled on her arrival. The Leila R. left here last Thursday morning bound for Thurston Harbor to bring Robert Holmes, accused of manslaughter in killing Joseph Booth, to this port, but on Thursday evening she met such bad weather that she headed for White Rock, at the north end of Banks Island, it being plain that she could never weather the crossing of Hecate Straits in such a storm as was raging. Several times she ventured forth from her shelter, but always had to come in again, once having been four hours out. Finally early yesterday morning the weather calmed down sufficiently for her to come out again, but Hecate Straits still looked bad, so Captain Butt headed his boat home for Prince Rupert. On the

way north, about 20 miles from Prince Rupert, the Narbethong with Captain Freeman and Lieutenant Sault on board was met and both launches came in within half an hour of each other yesterday afternoon. The Leila R. was out of port a week, six days of which were spent at White Rock. Those aboard her were Constable Ackroyd, Captain Butt, Captain Leighton and Engineer G. Dorien.

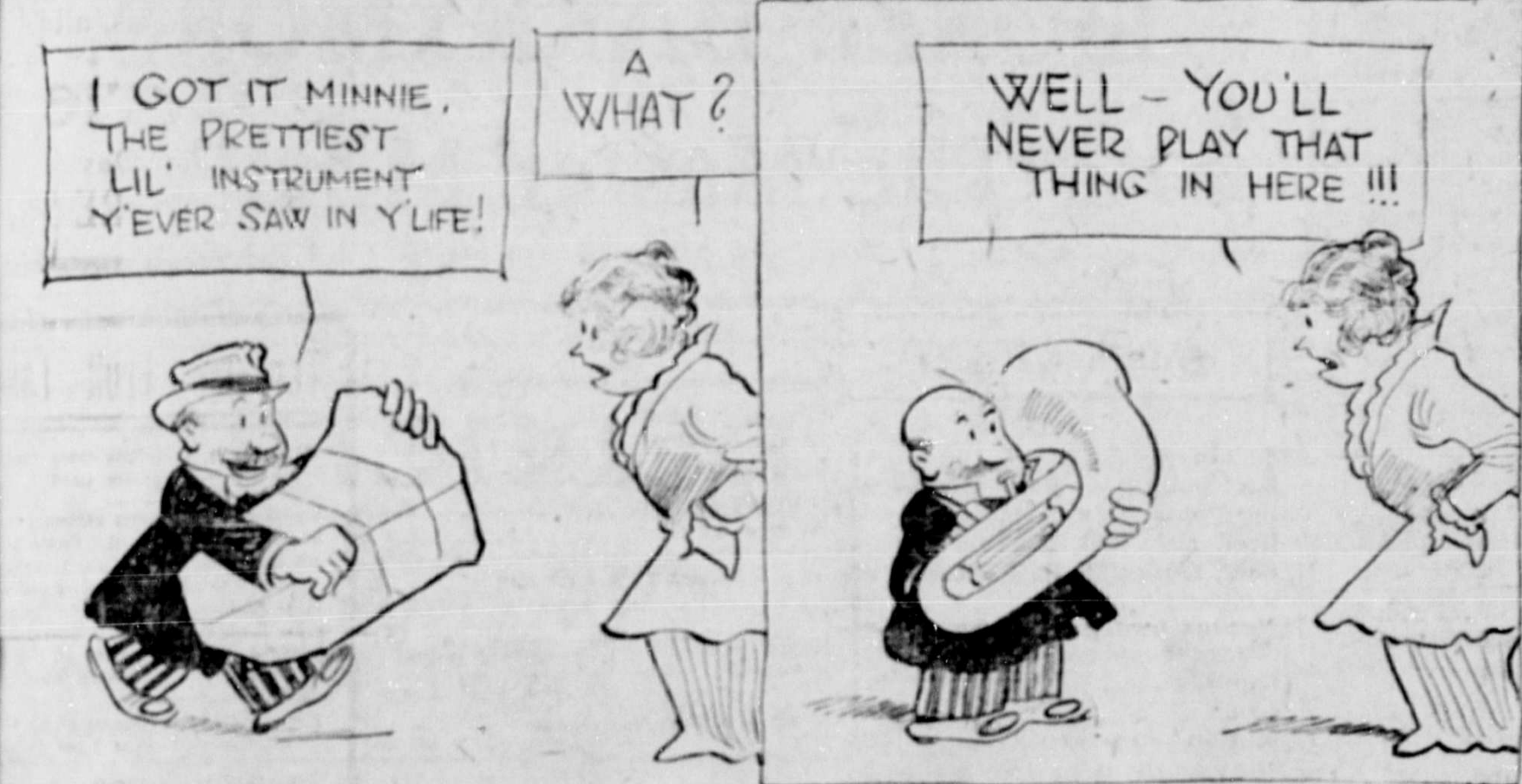

REV. FATHER O'FLANAGAN

Man in Public Eye has Curious History; Punished by Church

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Father Michael O'Flanagan, acting president of Sinn Fein, who sent the famous telegram to Premier Lloyd George asking him what steps he proposed to make peace in Ireland before Christmas and who has been in consultation with the Premier since, is described by one who knows him as "the sort of man who would not hesitate to argue with the Pope himself."

"When he was curate of Crossna," says Professor Robert Mitchell Henry in "The Evolution of Sinn Fein," "Father O'Flanagan had taken a very active part on the side of Sinn Fein in the East Derry election, when Arthur Griffith was returned. Soon after he was deprived of his bishop, Dr. Coyne, of all his faculties as a priest, including the right to say mass. The technical offence for which he was punished was that of having addressed meetings within boundaries of three parishes of the local parish priests. Everyone knew that the real reason for his punishment was not the technical offence, but the fact that his speeches had been strongly, and even violently, Sinn Fein.

"The people of Crossna retorted by shutting up the parish church and refusing to allow mass to be said in it by any one else."

After the Easter rising of 1916, Father O'Flanagan took Eamonn de Valera's place. In appearance he is described as a smiling man in early middle age, with just a suspicion of silver in his jet-black hair. His conversation is easy and witty, and on the platform he is an effective speaker, with a crisp command of epigram.

INSANITY COMMON AMONG NEW SETTLERS

Anglo-Saxons of Older Part of Saskatchewan Not Afflicted with Trouble

REGINA, Jan. 13.—The old idea that insanity in the prairie provinces is confined to areas which are not served by railways is exploded by a map which the Administrator of Lunatics' Estates for Saskatchewan has under preparation. A pin denotes each estate on the map.

The first fact to strike one who examines this map is that the older-settled portions of the province, where the population is principally of Anglo-Saxon stock, here is practically no insanity recorded, whereas in the newer-settled portions the pins at some points rub elbows. And very generally they keep very close to the railway; showing apparently, according to the administrator, that the great majority of the insane persons whose estates are being administered by the provincial government at the present time came into the province with a rush of immigrants which occurred during the past two decades.
