BRITISH COLUMBIANS TO AFRICA WITH STEWART

CONTRACTORS ARE HERE IN CONNECTION WITH TENDERS FOR COURT HOUSE

Major Gen. Jack Stewart is Sending Staff from Vancouver For Big Gold Coast Contract

VANCOUVER, February 2.—The sum of \$50,000,000 is to be entrusted by the British Government to the Canadian firm of Stewart & McDonnell, headed by Major General J. W. Stewart, to be spent in enormous works on the Gold Coast Colony on the west coast of Africa.

General Stewart has just returned from England after making arrangements for carrying out the first unit of the great harbor works at Takoradi, which will cost \$17,000,000 and take two years to complete. As far as possible Canadian material and equipment will be used in the work.

The Canadian heads of departments and the first batch of thirty men leave here soon, in time to arrive at the Gold Coast in time to take charge of the work which will be in charge of the work will be Angus McDonnell, a former resident of British Columbia and a partner of Grant, McMillan & Co. in the building of wharves and docks.

They are here to look over the site of the new government court house and also to inspect with a view to tendering on other work in the city. Mr. McDougall stated this morning although the government had not yet called for new tenders for the construction of the court house at Market Place, they likely do so in the near future. With the object in view of doing the work the visit is being made to Prince Rupert.

MONTREAL, Feb. 2.—At a special meeting of the Hockey League this afternoon, it was unanimously decided to fine the Ottawa Club \$500 as a punishment for the team leaving the ice on Wednesday in a game with the Canadiens.

Ottawa supporters say their team will refuse to play until the order is rescinded.

HERRING ARE NOW RUNNING

Jack Eracbury Reached Port Yesterday With First Catch of Season.

Jack Bradbury brought in on his boat "Reveille" the first herring catch of the season yesterday. The vessel had two tons of the fish which was taken at Captain's Cove down the coast from this port.

Herring is now reported to be running outside the harbor and the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage boat "Friedelia" left yesterday for the grounds. The fish is not running in any great quantity but it is expected that the run will be on in full in the course of a few days. The herring now running is of exceptionally fine quality.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. is preparing to put up a larger quantity of herring this year than ever on account of the prospects of more halibut boats requiring bait from Prince Rupert this season. Last year there was a general shortage of herring bait all along the coast.

ANYOX GAVE DANCE IN HONOR RETIRING ASSISTANT MANAGER

E. E. Campbell will be Here Tomorrow Night En Route for New Post in Arizona.

There was a big farewell dance held in the recreation hall at Anyox on Friday night in honor of E. E. Campbell, the retiring assistant general manager, who will be in Prince Rupert tomorrow night on his way to Arizona where he is to take a responsible post with a big mining concern. Mr. Campbell has been in Anyox since the inception of the camp and is highly popular. His absence will be felt in social as well as official circles.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 2.—Gene O'Connor sustained a fracture of the skull when the fire truck on which he was proceeding to a small fire piled up on the sidewalk on Hastings Street in avoiding a street car. At the same time Archibald Munroe fractured his leg.

CHEAPER FOOD

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Prices are falling in London restaurants and tea shops. In several restaurants reductions of from 7 shillings to 4 shillings in the price of champagne have been made, while in the popular tearooms bread, steak and kidney pies, and chops have been reduced. The fall in the price of sugar has resulted in reductions in the price of nearly all cakes and candies.

Additional Equipment at Hospital and Home for Nurses are Badly Needed

City Urged to Provide Motor Ambulance; Doctors Ask that Hospital Be Brought Up to Standard by Making Improvements

The need of a nurses' home, a well equipped laboratory, and a more efficient X-ray, both the laboratory and the X-ray apparatus to be in charge of a fully trained technician, was urged last night as the chief need of the Prince Rupert General Hospital. The hospital building also has to be painted on the outside, something which could not be done last year owing to lack of funds.

In his address to the Hospital Association at the annual general meeting last night President D. G. Stewart said: "The retiring board has had under consideration for some time the appointment of a technician and the installation of a fully equipped laboratory. There is not the slightest doubt if we are to do our full duty to the pupil nurses, funds for this very necessary adjunct should be provided."

Motor Ambulance. "The city should be approached to provide a motor ambulance. This is a public necessity and strenuous efforts should be made to obtain it. It is almost a disgrace that the city of Prince Rupert does not possess this very necessary conveyance in connection with taking care of the sick."

"The erection of the nurses' home should be undertaken this year. Hon. T. D. Pattullo has given an assurance that he will endeavor to have a grant of \$10,000 placed in the estimates this year for the purpose. With the \$2,100 on hand there should be no difficulty in raising by public subscriptions the balance necessary to erect a suitable building."

Emergency Outfit. Judge Young said that the Red Cross Society had selected Prince Rupert as one of the points at which an emergency outfit would be kept. He did not know whether this outfit had yet arrived, however. The Red Cross was always ready to assist.

Shot for Having Revolver at Cork

Martial Law Sentence First of Its Kind; Fa h r Dominic Goes to Wormwood Scrubs P ison; Prisoner Escapes

CORK, February 2.—Cornelius Murphy of Rathmore, County Kerry, was shot today after being found guilty by court martial of having in possession a revolver, contrary to the recent military proclamation. This is believed to be the first execution on such a charge since martial law was declared in Cork.

LONDON, February 2.—Father Dominic, spiritual adviser to late Lord Mayor McSweeney under sentence by a Dublin Court Martial of three years' imprisonment, has been brought to Wormwood Scrubs prison.

DUBLIN, February 2.—Vincent Fouvarde, described as an important Sinn Fein prisoner, escaped last night when being conveyed from Kilmainham prison to Dublin Castle.

The car on which he was being taken was attacked. The police jumped out to return the fire of the attacking party. When entering the car again it was found that the prisoner had vanished.

JOHN KEEN IS HOUSE CLERK

Uniforms are Abolished and there will be No Frills in Legislature This Session

VICTORIA, Feb. 2.—John Keen, former speaker of the legislature, who was defeated in Kaslo in the last election, has been appointed clerk of the house in succession to the late Thornton Fell.

P. O'Hara will be sergeant at arms, M. G. McLeod, deputy, and away by receiving information at Henry Hearn, assistant sergeant at arms. There will be no frills in this session. The uniform of the sergeant at arms has gone for good from the B.C. legislature and this officer will follow the example set last year in wearing a plain black suit.

LOSS TO PORT LAST MONTH

In January 233,000 lbs. of Halibut Came Here and Was Turned Away.

The record of halibut that came to this port during the month of January but could not be handled last election, has been appointed clerk of the house in succession to the late Thornton Fell. This is in addition to the 233,000 lbs. of halibut, it is estimated, would have sold for approximately \$35,000 and the Canadian Express Co. would have received approximately \$9,000 for carrying it east.

Fishermen Lost 5c Pound Because of Lack of Cars

Nearly Ninety Thousand Pounds Sold at Lower Rate This Morning; Thirteen Cars Expected This Week

Two carloads of fish were bought at the Fish Exchange this morning for shipment east and brought prices over 18c. On account of the car shortage another lot of arrivals that would have filled four cars had to sell at about 13c. There were only two cars available for the fish and these are promptly being despatched east. Thirteen more cars are reported for arrival here some time this week.

The lucky boats which sold at the 18c figure this morning were as follows:

- Spencer, 15,000 pounds, and Aili, 7,000 pounds, to the Pacific Fisheries at 18.1c and 6c.
- Defence, 11,000 pounds; Tramp 10,000 pounds, and Bee, 1,000 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 18.2c and 6c.

NO WHALING

Owing to lack of Demand for Oil Ships will Not go North.

VICTORIA, Feb. 2.—Owing to the present tendency in the oil situation throughout the American continent, the Consolidated Whaling Co. will not send its fleet north this season. The prices are too low to allow the work to be carried on profitably.

A resolution was passed urging the governments of the Dominion and Province to investigate the possibility of establishing a sanatorium for treatment of consumptives at Hazelton.

Hospital Needs Are Pressing.

The needs of the Prince Rupert Hospital are pressing. Perhaps the most important of these is the provision of an ambulance for carrying injured patients to the institution.

It is also asked that there be a laboratory and proper X-ray apparatus at the hospital. These are things which are necessary in every well-equipped institution of the kind and it does not seem reasonable that this city should have to be without what other similar institutions have.

Nurses' Home Also Necessary.

There seems every probability that a nurses' home will be erected in connection with the hospital this year. President Stewart announced last night that Hon. T. D. Pattullo had promised to try to secure \$10,000 from the Government for the purpose.

The home is one of the necessities of the modern hospital. The staff cannot be expected to live in the hospital building all the time. It is most depressing to have always the hospital atmosphere around them.

Superannuation Should be Popular.

A scheme of superannuation for civil service employees should prove popular with the staff generally. Until the scheme is outlined it is impossible to comment on it at length, but any proposal looking to the increased permanence and efficiency of the service should be welcomed.

It will not have much interest for young girls, all of whom expect some day to be married and not spend their days in dusty offices. For men the case is different. With a regular system of promotion and increased pay for length of service and with the additional inducement of a pension when too old to work, the civil service should attract good men and keep them.

Are Railway Employees Civil Servants?

Civil servants are not allowed to take part in politics. That condition obtains everywhere throughout the British Empire. The Canadian National Railway is to a large extent a government institution and the president of the road some time ago issued an order that the employees must keep out of active participation in politics.

Opinion is very much divided on the issue. There were employees of the company who were members of provincial legislatures and also members of the staff of the railway. They had to resign. It is possible that Mr. Hanna is right and that it would not make for effective work to have the members of the railway staff, all of whom are government employees, engaged in politics.

SEVERAL THEATRES FOR NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Another flock of New Theatres for New York! Early next month Messrs. Lee and J. J. Shubert are to open the Ambassador, the first of six new theatres which they are building on 48th and 49th Streets near Broadway.

The Ambassador is the first New York theatre to be built on the triangular plan. Ten lap relay race—H. F. Kergin and V. Hanson vs. Gust Anderson and "Indian Kid" Gordon, won by the former.

Five lap race—Al. Falconer vs. "Dooley" Falconer. Won by the former.

Anyxox Plays Too.

On Sunday the Anyxox Beach and Mine Juniors played hockey on the Alice Arm rink, the Mine Juniors winning by 6 to 3. This was one of the most exciting games of the season.

The skating rink was established here this winter, having been constructed in December. It is located beside the railroad bridge over Falls Creek and has been the centre of social and sporting activity since its opening. Several hundred dollars raised by public subscription made the building of the rink possible. The cold weather of the past few weeks has put the ice in the best of shape.

HOSPITAL DOES GREAT WORK

Annual Reports Show Improved Financial Condition With Debt Reduced.

ACCOUNTS COLLECTED AND MONEY SPENT

The Prince Rupert General Hospital wound up its year with a net debt of \$3,082.33, a reduction of about \$2,000 from the annual report of a year ago. This was made possible by the action of the city in increasing the allowance and in paying it regularly, thus enabling the hospital to pay cash and take advantage of all discounts.

According to the report prepared by the secretary for the board of directors and read at the annual meeting in the city council chamber last evening there were 812 patients admitted to the hospital and 15,811 days treatment given at an average cost of \$3.21 per patient per day.

Many Improvements.

A considerable amount of money has been spent on maintenance of the building and equipment. A serious defect in the foundations of the east wing had to be remedied and many minor improvements and repairs made. The interior of the hospital was redecorated and the operating room repainted and the floor recovered with linoleum. Fire gongs and extinguishers were placed on each floor. A kitchen range of the best make was installed, the old one being worn out. These expenses, which of course added considerably to the cost of maintenance per day, were defrayed largely by the proceeds of the collection of a large number of old outstanding accounts.

Liabilities.

All accounts for the year have been paid and the total liability to the bank for bills payable and checks outstanding was \$16,124.74, against which there was due from the B. C. Government \$1,952.70, the city of Prince Rupert, 137.97, and cash on hand, \$951.74, leaving a deficit of \$3,082.33.

It is recommended to the incoming board that the matter of using steam for the sterilizing apparatus and for heating the operating room be investigated.

Thank Auxiliary.

The thanks of the board are due to the Ladies Auxiliary for the splendid work done for the hospital as set out in their annual report, and to the matron and staff for their conscientious and efficient services during the year.

President Spoke.

The report of the secretary was supplemented by President D. G. Stewart who spoke of the needs of the institution and of the local support he had received in his work. He further said:

"Representation in an advisory capacity was granted to the Medical Association and the O. B. U. Doctors Kergin and Eggert representing the former and rendered much valued assistance; Mrs. Booth ably represented the latter body. It will be in order at this meeting, if you wish, to alter the constitution to allow these bodies full representation on the board. I would, however, point out to you that full control of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association should remain in the elective body.

After again thanking the Ladies Auxiliary, the president said the

board was fortunate in having as its secretary Major Gibson. With the genial major in charge he could assure the incoming board that their duties would be light and that it would be a pleasure for them to serve on the board. On behalf of the board he assured Miss Atkinson, the matron, of the board's appreciation of her splendid services.

Matron's Report.

The report of the matron gave further details of the work of the institution. There were 123 births in the hospital last year, 26 deaths—eight of which occurred within 24 hours after admission—254 operations, 364 surgical cases treated, and 328 medical cases treated.

In February a year ago twelve cases of influenza necessitated the opening of one of the wards in the basement. Since then it has been used for male patients who could not be accommodated on the main floor.

Present Staff.

The present staff consists of superintendent of nurses 1, night super. 1, operating room supervisor 1, head nurses 2, graduate nurses on general duty 2, third year nurses 2, second year nurses 1, first year nurses 1.

The Christmas celebrations were curtailed by many cases of severe illness at the time. All patients were remembered by the Ladies Auxiliary, the board of directors, the E.K.s, the I. O. D. E., and individual donors. In conclusion the matron thanked the Ladies Auxiliary for their help and the board of directors for their co-operation.

Other Reports.

The auditor, D. C. Stuart, submitted his report, making several recommendations and stated he would not be in a position to again accept the position, which he had held for a number of years.

The Ladies Auxiliary submitted a report of much useful work and a number of resolutions were passed, including one to the retiring board with special mention of D. G. Stewart, the president, for their splendid work and to the ladies for their valued aid.

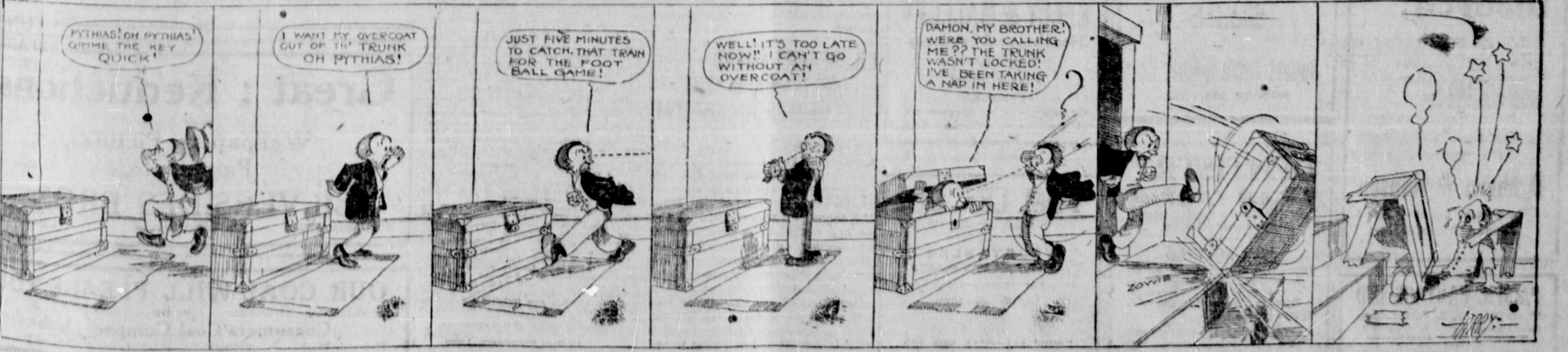

CATHOLIC CHURCH AT EDMONTON WAS FINELY DECORATED

EDMONTON, Feb. 2.—Fire was responsible recently for the destruction of the second oldest ecclesiastical institution in this part of the province, when the forty-year-old Catholic church at St. Albert was destroyed.

INCREASE IN PRODUCTION

British Miners are Speeding Up with View to Higher Wages

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Put on their mettle by the prospects of sliding scale bonuses for increased production, the coal miners of Britain have put their backs into the work and achieved a record post-war output of 5,307,000 tons for one week. As a result their pay will be increased by about \$250,000,000 in the coming year.

Five weeks were selected by the government as a test period as part of the recent coal strike settlement. The miners were told that if they produced between 258,000,000 and 262,000,000 tons in a year of 50 weeks they would get an extra three shillings and sixpence a day (normally equivalent to about 87 cents) from January 3, 1921, and that when their output reached 266,000,000 tons they would get four shillings—nominally about a dollar, extra.

At their latest rate, they are producing at the rate of 265,350,000 tons a year; just under the four shilling mark.

In 1913, Britain's coal output was 287,000,000 tons, but during the war this figure was reduced by over 50,000,000 tons.

TORONTO'S CHIEF OF POLICE ACTIVE

When He Took Office Few Months Ago He Tightened Grip on Offenders

TORONTO, Feb. 2.—When Samuel J. Dickson, Toronto's new Chief of Police, took charge of the department, a new broom began to sweep out criminals and crooks lurking in various parts of the city. From the moment he seated himself at his desk some months ago the law tightened in its hand upon the whole tribe of offenders against the criminal code throughout the city.

Wholesale raids for law-breakers have been conducted since he assumed his new position and in addition to the criminals punished, property worth thousands of dollars, stolen during the past year, has been recovered.

In the downtown section robberies were very frequent a few months ago and in a short time eight men were apprehended and sentenced to long terms for stealing both goods and money. Cigar stores were entered, the thieves decamping with safes which they drove to the outskirts of the city, ridding them there. There are now in custody six men awaiting trial in connection with these thefts and since their arrest the police have not had one complaint of a safe being stolen.

AFTER LONG VIGIL STANLEY GETS LAND

CALGARY, Feb. 2.—After a vigil of seventeen days outside the Dominion land office, assisted by two returned veterans in his employ as sentinels, C. H. Stanley, secretary-treasurer of the Elgin Coal Company, of Drumheller, succeeded in landing two valuable pieces of land, a coal lease at Drumheller and an oil lease at Czar.

The period of seventeen days was put in shifts of four hours on and eight hours off. "I erected a small hut of beaver board," said Mr. Stanley, "and with the aid of rugs and blankets, managed to hold the fort against all-comers." Attempts were made to get his henchmen to leave him, but despite offers of \$800 at one time and \$200 another, they stuck to the job.

CHAMPAGNE KILLED ONE MAN AND SENT OTHERS TO HOSPITAL

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 2.—Eleven Breman of the Canadian Pacific steamship Victorian were charged recently with stealing a case of champagne and one of gin from the cargo. It was stated that the second engineer found a number of Breman drunk and fighting. Many of them were unable to work for three watches and one of them was off duty for six days. Another died at sea and three deserted at St. John. Six of the men were sentenced to a month's imprisonment and five went to the hospital for six weeks.
