

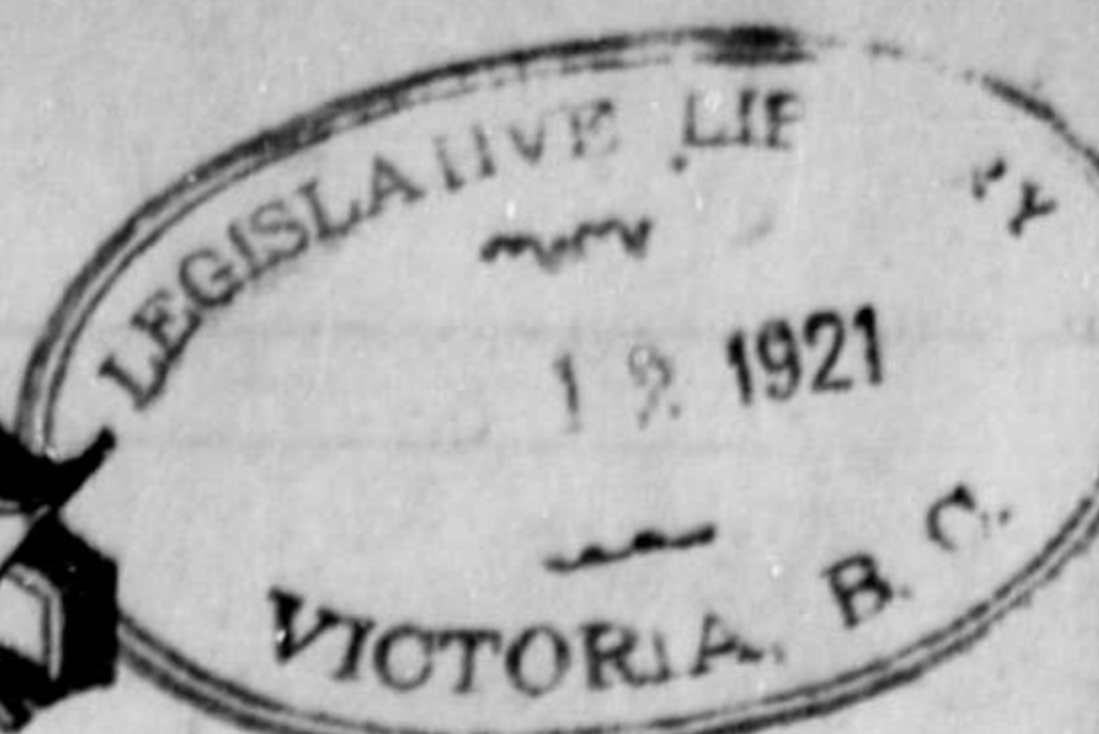

FIERCE CYCLONE DEVASTATES OLYMPIC SLOPE

NEW PAPER MILL AT PRINCE GEORGE IS TO COST AN IMMENSE SUM

West Slope of Olympics were Struck by Terrific Cyclone

Damage to Timber said to be \$10,000,000; Farms Destroyed and Stock Killed, according to Word Reaching Seattle

SEATTLE, February 7.—First reports of a cyclonic storm which swept the west slope of the Olympic Mountains, cutting communication, have been received here by L. Smith & Co. Farmers of Jefferson county report that a hundred families are short of supplies. Scores of farms in the course of the storm have been practically destroyed and the stock killed. The injury to standing timber has been immense, it being estimated that \$10,000,000 worth has been destroyed.

S. S. M. GOFFIN IS BACK FROM EXTENDED TRIP EASTERN CITIES

Wallace Submitted Lower Tender For Ship Completion Than His Company.

Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Magoffin returned to the city on last evening's train after an extended visit to the east. Mrs. Magoffin was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Bogit, of St. Paul, who will visit here indefinitely.

Mr. Magoffin was at Ottawa in connection with the local ship-building contract and reports that the contract was let to Wallace's at a lower tender than his company had submitted. In Ottawa, it is understood, that operations here are to commence immediately.

Mr. Magoffin also visited New York, Montreal and Winnipeg. There is a lot of unemployment generally but the situation is being ably coped with by the governments and others. The financial situation shows signs of improvement.

WOULD ELIMINATE DOFFING OF HATS IN ELEVATORS



Doffing of hats in skyscraper elevators by men when women are also passengers soon will stop if the Building Owners and Managers' Association campaign opened a short time ago in Cincinnati is successful in carrying out its objects in all parts of the United States. Legislature Opens Victoria Tomorrow

Moderation Act to be passed at Session providing Government Sale in Sealed Packages; Other likely legislation

VICTORIA, February 7.—The chief feature of the first session of the fifteenth Legislature of the Province of British Columbia which opens tomorrow afternoon will be the introduction of the new liquor control act to take the place of the present Prohibition Act. Another feature is the possibility of Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith, M. L. A., of Vancouver being elected speaker of the House. If she is chosen she will be the first woman speaker of any legislature in the world.

Other questions that will come up will be: Increased aid to municipalities. Provisions for the superannuation and pensioning of civil servants.

Efforts on behalf of chiropractors to break the professional monopoly of qualified and licensed doctors. Proposals of the Premier to amend the Elections Act to make it a punishable offense for any person to register the names of voters and then fail to turn in the names. Many persons were disfranchised at the recent election through the practice.

Draft of Liquor Act. It is understood the draft of the Moderation Act has been completed and that it is framed along the lines the people voted for in October. The Government will sell in sealed packages. Hotel men will make an effort to secure the privilege of selling beers and light wines and club men may also ask for a limited license. Financial aid to municipalities may be granted through the operation of the Moderation Act, in that the Government may provide for a fifty-fifty split of the profits of all liquor sold in each municipality.

VACANCY IN CABINET IS CONSIDERED

Brigadier General Griesbach of West Edmonton Suggested as Successor to Sifton.

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—A number of suggestions are being made for filling the position in the Dominion cabinet made vacant by the death of Hon. A. L. Sifton, secretary of state. In Edmonton an effort is being made to secure the position for Brigadier General W. A. Griesbach, the sitting member for West Edmonton, and a memorial asking that this be done has been received here.

Many other centres consider they have a member who would fill the position with credit to the district and with advantage of the cabinet. It is possible, however, that no appointment will be made at present as all elections are fiercely fought by the opposition. Much will depend on the result of the West Peterboro election today as to whether another constituency is to be opened.

ONE KILLED ON NATIONAL RLY.

Engine and Express Car Derailed and Engineer is Victim—Strikes Slide.

KAMLOOPS, Feb. 7.—The Canadian National Railway passenger train was partly derailed when westbound at a point about 150 miles east of Vancouver. As a result Engineer Johnson is dead and Fireman Middleton injured, while Expressman Holmes is slightly bruised. The engine and express car Number 1 was derailed as a result of striking a rock slide.

GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—Mrs. Louise Peete was found guilty of murder in the first degree for slaying Jacob Charles Denton. The penalty for this offense is life imprisonment.

TARIFF WAR IS IMMINENT IF CONGRESS ACTS

Winnipeg says Canadian Agricultural Interests will be Protected

HAMILTON, Ont., Feb. 7.—Hon. S. F. Tisdale, minister of agriculture, in a speech to the agricultural section of the chamber of commerce, said if the McKinley Tariff Bill becomes operative in the United States, the Canadian Government will retaliate in kind. Canadian agricultural interests will be adequately protected, he said.

NEW TENDERS FOR P. R. COURT HOUSE

The secretary of the Board of Trade this morning received a letter from the deputy minister of public works at Victoria in reply to communication from that body as follows: "Referring to your communication of the 22nd ultimo, I beg to advise that we will shortly be calling for new tenders in connection with the Prince Rupert Court House."

GOVERNMENT WORKING ON OIL REGULATIONS SUITABLE FOR NORTH

EDMONTON, Feb. 7.—Word has been received here by the Board of Trade that the Dominion Government is preparing a new set of oil regulations which will be put into effect at an early date. It is thought that the new regulations will allow staking by private individuals and preparations are being made by a number of people to visit the oil district.

FINE HOUSE WAS BURNED

Gasoline Poured in Wings and Place Set on Fire Because of Rumor.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Summer-Hill House, one of the most beautiful homes in Ireland, was burned on Saturday, the financial loss being £100,000. Several men are said to have poured gasoline into the two wings of the house and set it on fire because it is stated it was believed the place would be occupied by the military.

UNITED STATES STOPS ENLISTING MORE SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—A resolution directing the stoppage of enlistments until the regular army has been reduced to 175,000 men has been passed over the president's veto by Congress. This is the first concrete step toward the curtailment of armaments and is an indication of the general feeling of the nation in this regard.

SKULL MAY BE MURDERED MAN

Investigation to Find if It is the Remains of Thomas Scott.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 7.—A skeleton unearthed from a gravel bed several miles east of Transcona may be that of Thomas Scott who was executed by order of Louis Riel in 1869, in the opinion of local historians. An attempt to establish the facts will be made by a committee of Orangemen.

The condition of the skeleton indicates rough hasty burial. The body of Scott was never recovered and there has been much uncertainty as to its disposal by those responsible for his death.

The case of Hall vs. Lawrence in the county court has been adjourned for two weeks.

DESBOROUGH MAY BE CANADA'S GOVERNOR

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Daily Telegraph says this morning that Lord Desborough, the famous sportsman, may be appointed Governor-General of Canada.

The appeals that the police commission is entering from the dismissal by Magistrate McMorde of two Chinese, Quong Sun and Quong Gin, charged with opium offences, were proved in the county court this morning and trial will commence before Judge Young in a week.

Plans Being Completed for Prince George Paper Mill

Many Prominent Eastern Lumbermen connected with new Tenture which is to cost from Seven to Eight Million

VICTORIA, February 7.—The plans for the pulp and paper mill at Prince George, which is to cost between seven and eight million dollars, are being completed here with Government officials by Robert Thurst, of Dome Creek, a member of an eastern pulp and timber syndicate.

The capacity of the new mill, when completed, will be 200,000 tons a day. Members of the syndicate include Frank P. Jones, Montreal financier; Angus McLean, of Bathurst, lumberman; B. Preisch, of Buffalo, president of the New York Lumber Co., and several other Ottawa Valley lumbermen.

Prince George has been chosen as the site for the mill because of the abundance of pulpwood is there and also because of the advantage in the matter of freight rate to the prairies over the coast rates. They expect to cater especially to the prairie market.

**ANGLICANS TO CO-OPERATE IN MISSION FIELD**

Joint Arrangement Made With Presbyterians at Meeting With Archbishop on Friday Night.

As a joint-committee representing the Anglican and the Presbyterian churches in British Columbia some months ago agreed upon a measure of co-operation in sparsely settled districts, and at the Provincial Synods of these two churches at their last sessions approved in general terms the principle set forth in the report of this joint-committee there remained only the practical carrying out of the principle involved by those who have the oversight of church missions in sparsely settled places.

On Friday Archbishop Du Vernet, representing the Anglican Church in the Diocese of Caledonia, which covers the northern half of British Columbia, met in his house in Prince Rupert Rev. Dr. Wilson, the superintendent of Presbyterian Missions covering the same territory, and Rev. Dr. Grant, chairman of the Prince Rupert Presbytery, and together the whole field was, with map in hand, surveyed.

In places already occupied by both churches, where only one service a Sunday is held by each church, it was mutually agreed that while pioneer conditions lasted the services of the two churches will be held at different hours so as not to conflict.

In places where each church holds only a fortnightly service it was mutually agreed that these services will be held on different Sundays for the same reason.

Quarterly interchange.

It was further mutually agreed that so long as pioneer conditions prevail that certain isolated places will be regarded as mainly Anglican, and certain other places as mainly Presbyterian, but in order to satisfy a few in each place who might prefer their own church it was arranged that there will be a quarterly interchange between the ministers of such places, the Anglican minister conducting an Anglican service in the Presbyterian church and the Presbyterian minister conducting Presbyterian service in the Anglican church.

Each church will preserve its own list of communicants.

This mutual arrangement for a measure of cooperation in sparsely settled districts will prevent much unnecessary overlapping and will enable each church to do more for outlying parts at present without any religious service.

**INTERNATIONAL RIFLE SHOOTING BY CABLE**

Match Arranged With One Team on Each Side of Atlantic

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—The small bore rifle teams representing Oxford and Yale Universities will shoot an international match by cable on February 11. There have been a number of international matches shot between teams representing England and the United States, but this is the first international match between collegiate teams.

Small bore rifle shooting is one of the leading English sports. There are 6,000 small bore rifle clubs in London and Oxford has always had an excellent rifle team.

Small bore rifle shooting is in its infancy in the United States. This is the second year for the sport at Yale, and this year varsity and freshmen teams have been formed. Scores of the Oxford-Yale match will be arranged by cable.

Oxford and Yale have already exchanged targets. The standard National Rifle Association 75-foot targets will be shot. Eight men will shoot on each team and all scores will count. Each man will fire twenty shots, a score of 200 being possible for each shooter. Oxford will use the service Enfield—so familiar to the Canadian infantryman—equipped with Morris tubes. Yale will use the Winchester 22 calibre bolt action, the same rifle as was used by the United States team in winning the international matches in 1919 and 1920.

Officers of the British and United States armies will act as referees of the matches at Oxford and New Haven.

### FUEL SHORTAGE CAUSES CRIME

People of Budapest Steal Coal or Wood Whenever Possible

BUDAPEST, Feb. 7.—Many of the poor people of this city are being driven to wholesale thievery by the fuel shortage. The recent theft of 25 carloads of wood from one train of 100 carloads as it entered the city shows the extent to which the stealing is going on. Wood is so scarce that when a woodload is driven through the streets people stop and gaze after it until it is out of sight. During small boys are ever on the alert for a stray piece of wood or anything that will give heat at home. They scamper after every passing wood wagon, but are soon frightened away by long whips in the hands of two women who sit on guard astride the load.

**Pathetic Picture**  
—The operation of unloading a ton of Hungary's inferior brown coal before a house attracts many neighbors, who make a pathetic picture as they watch basketful after basketful disappear into the coal bin of the more fortunate one.

Because of the urgency to obtain fuel, by dishonest means, if honest ones are of no avail, the juvenile courts were never so crowded with youthful offenders.

The scarcity of fuel grows more acute daily as winter advances. The street railway service has been sharply curtailed and people wait for hours exposed to the bitter cold. The worst operated American street car never tolerated such crowding.

**Bath Closes a Week**  
Gas factories are provided with coal for only 24 hours at a time and the gas is turned on now only at noon and after six o'clock. Only one light is permitted in a room and not more than three rooms in a house or single apartment may be lighted at the same time. Even at the most expensive hotels. There is no running hot water. Saturday is bathing day. On other days baths can only be had at the public baths for which Budapest is famous.

### CALGARY'S OIL WELL SOLD TO IMPERIAL

Has Production of Only Five or Six Barrels a Day, but High Grade

CALGARY, Feb. 7.—The Dingman oil well, the pioneer in the Calgary oil field, has been taken over by the Royalite Oil Co., and subsidiary to the Imperial Oil Co., together with the associated leases and property. Oil was struck in the Dingman well in 1913 and an oil boom throughout Southern Alberta was started. The well had a small production of five or six barrels a day of very high grade oil. It was being operated by the Calgary Petroleum Products Company until taken over by the Royalite. The Royalite Co. will rebuild the absorption and operate the works on a larger scale than before.

The gasoline extraction plant of the Petroleum Products Co. was burned down in October last. The Royalite Co. will enter upon an active development policy and will drill new wells to thoroughly test the field.

**LITTLE DAMAGE IS REPORTED IN STORM OF THE WEEK END**

Dowling, Dominion meteorologist, reports that 4.89 inches of rain fell in the 24 hours up to this morning and that the peak of the wind was about 40 miles an hour yesterday afternoon around 3 o'clock. Changing to the west last night the storm blew up the river and large falls of snow and rain with high wind are reported on points on the railroad west of here. Telegraph lines were not very seriously affected, although the government line was down for a while this morning west of Telegraph Point.

**JOHN EYOLFSON OF OSLAND DIED LAST NIGHT IN HOSPITAL**

The death occurred last night at the General Hospital of Tom Eyolfson of Osland, Smith Island. Deceased was a fisherman and was but 26 years of age.
