Lunenburg Member Pleads for Prince Rupert to be Given Cars to Handle Fish Catch

"Mr. Speaker, I only rose to say a few words in regard to the Prince Rupert fishing industry. I do hope that the minister of railways and the Government will see these people get the necessary refrigerator cars to handle the fish which goes into that port three times a week. The fishing industry of Prince Rupert should be encouraged. There is no reason why the Government should not give Prince Rupert the proper accommodation. If they do so the population of that port will increase by leaps and bounds and it will be a most advantageous thing for the section of the Canadian National Railways connecting with that port."—W.M. BERLIN, March 24.—Communist workers have seized the administration building in Hamburg, occupied the Blohm and Voigt shipyards and hoisted the red flag. Workers in the other parts of the city have quit work and begun organizing demonstrations. The city hall has been destroyed by a bomb and there has been used against city administration buildings at each, Friedberg and Dresden, resulting in heavy property loss and wounding several persons.

GREAT CATHOLIC DIGNITARY DEAD

Cardinal Gibbons Passed Away
This Morning in Baltimore,
Aged 88.

WAS GREAT POWER
IN CHURCH AND STATE

BALTIMORE, March 24.—Cardinal Gibbons died here this morning. He was born in Baltimore July 23, 1833, and was the son of Irish parents.

Cardinal Gibbons, as senior bishop of the church, wielded a strong influence outside as well as within the United States. The confidant of three popes, he was several important factors in Rome the last in August, 1914, a few days after the opening of the war, to elect the successor to Pius X. He arrived too late, however, to participate in the ceremony that elevated Benedict to the Pontificate.

Upon returning to the United States he visited President Wilson, informed the latter of affairs in Europe and discussed means for bringing about peace.

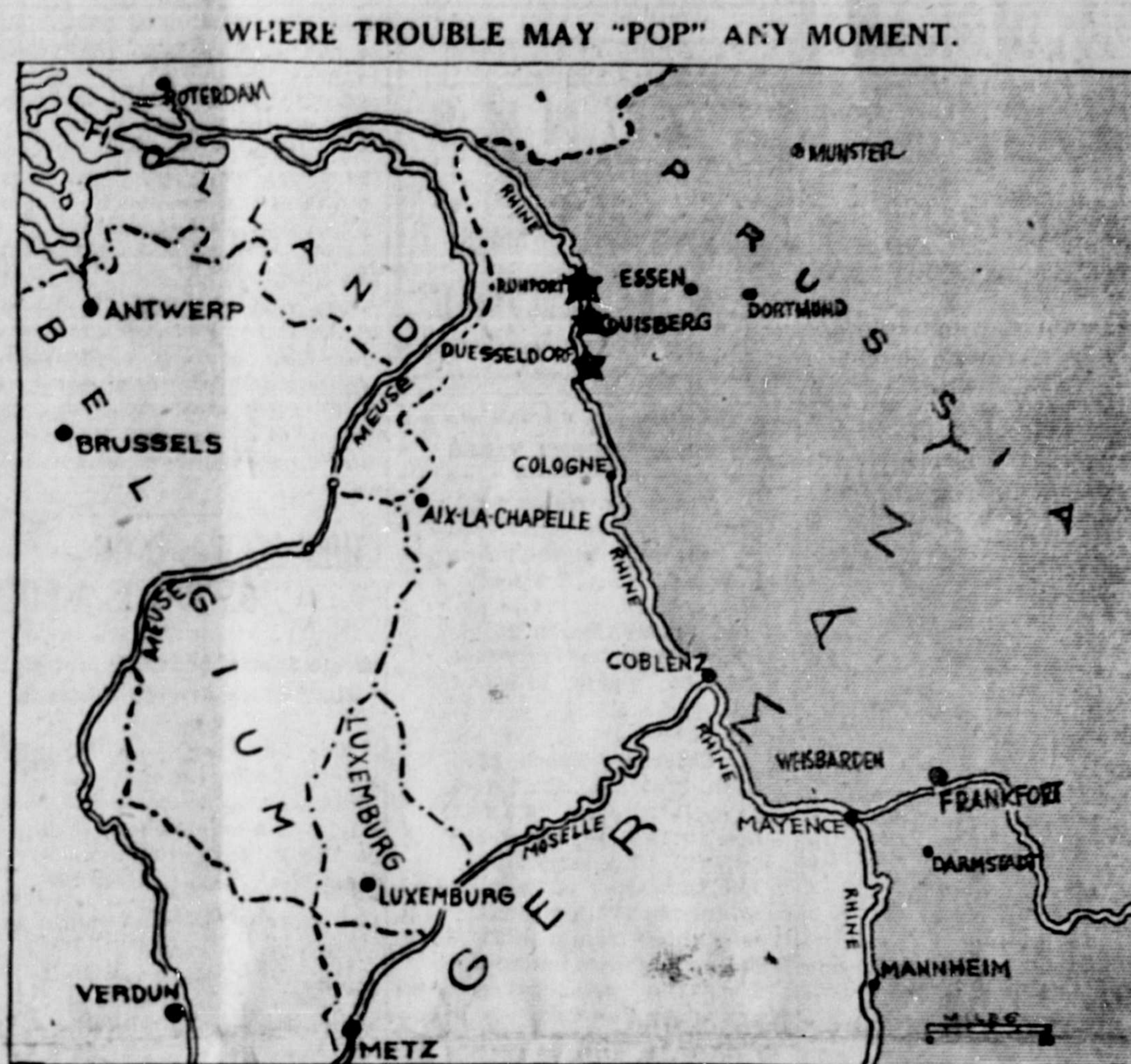
Active in War.

Cardinal Gibbons was active in his work for the Allies in the war and in a letter written to the Catholics of the archdiocese of New York in 1917 when the United States entered the conflict, urged the fullest support of the government.

In a sermon at Baltimore, in 1918, he praised the speech by Lloyd George and said that Germany's war aims would fail. About the same time he explained Benedict's war policy, an article which so pleased the Pope that he ordered it translated and published broadcast.

Supported League of Nations.

The Cardinal's views on political, economic and sociological questions were frequently sought by newspapers. In interviews he endorsed the plan for the establishment of the Jewish Homeland in Palestine, he opposed the government ownership of public utilities, maintained that prohibition meant "the invasion of home and sacramental practice," condemned divorce, praised the work of the Salvation Army in France, favored American military training, implored the clergy to fight Bolshevism, demanded that the Turk should be driven from Europe and appealed to the public to support America's entrance into the League of Nations. At a convention of Irish Nationalists in Philadelphia he expressed the hope that the Paris Peace Conference would make it possible "to free Ireland."



Occupation of German territory which the Allies had announced they would take possession of as one of the penalties for Germany's failure to meet the Allied reparations demands has been carried out. The occupation of the city of Dusseldorf, the largest of the cities taken over, was the first city entered and that of Duisburg and Ruhrort, comprising together the chief port of the Ruhr coal and industrial region, followed.

TWENTY BILLION GOLD MARKS PAID OR MORE PENALTIES

PARIS, March 24.—The German Government has been notified by the allied reparations commission that the total amount of twenty billion gold marks due under the peace treaty must be paid by May 1 or additional penalties will be inflicted upon Germany.

MORE OUTRAGES IN CORK NEIGHBORHOOD

Number of Young Men Driven
From Refuge Farm—Four
Killed.

CORK, March 24.—A number of young men have been driven from the refuge farm at Glogheen and four shot dead as they ran.

Police Sergeant Coughlan was killed and three policemen wounded in an ambush in County Mayo last night.

A party of soldiers were ambushed by 200 revolutionaries near Longford. Capt. Peak was killed and every other member of the party wounded.

ANARCHISTS BLOW UP MILAN THEATRE

Supposed to be Work of Malatista
Sympathizers—Many
Casualties.

LONDON, Mar. 24.—The Diana Theatre at Milan has been blown up, it is believed by sympathizers with the imprisoned anarchist, Malatista. Twenty were killed in the explosion and twenty more may die. There are many other casualties.

Make New Province of All The North from Parallel 52

Ottawa, March 24.—The formation of a new province of Canada consisting of "all that portion of British Columbia which lies north of the 52nd parallel of north latitude and including Yukon Territory, subject to the approval of the majority of the electors of all the territory mentioned as determined by a plebiscite" is the substance of a resolution moved in the House of Commons by Col. Peck and seconded by Colonel Alfred Thompson of the Yukon.

The 52nd parallel passes south of Ocean Falls and Bella Coola, but north of Rivers Inlet. The proposed new province would therefore take in all the industrial centres of the north and would include the Cariboo.

There Will Be No Beer Except in Government Stores, says Legislature

VICTORIA, March 24.—There is to be no beer clause in the moderation bill unless it should be inserted when the bill comes up for its third reading. An amendment will be moved then to have eight per cent beer sold in clubs and hotels.

The vote on the Mackenzie amendment to raise the percentage of alcohol by weight from one to two per cent was defeated by a vote of 32 to 12.

Near beer was dealt a death blow by the adoption of an amendment presented by M. B. Jackson, member for the Islands, to the effect that no other than the government vendor shall sell or deal in any liquid known or described as beer, near beer or by any other name whatsoever commonly used to describe malt or brewed liquor.

Those who supported the Mackenzie amendment for two per cent beer were Pattullo, Sloan, Hart, Farris, King, Mackenzie, Kergin, Perry, Lister, Uphill, Sutherland and Anderson. Other amendments by the attorney-general were proceeded with.

CHAMBERLAIN RE-ELECTION

Appointed Lord Privy Seal;
Speaker Retires in Favor of
Deputy

LONDON, March 24.—Austen Chamberlain, new leader of the House of Commons, has been appointed Lord Privy Seal, necessitating a re-election in Birmingham. The seat is considered a safe one.

Speaker Lowther is retiring from his position and the position has been offered to Deputy Speaker J. H. Whitley.

IRISH QUESTION DOMESTIC ONE

So Says Pemberton Billings in an
Address at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, March 24.—The Irish question is a domestic problem for Britain to settle and the United States should not interfere, Pemberton Billings, member of the British Parliament, declared in an address to the Chamber of Commerce. He said that agitators were using the Irish situation as a cause of cleavage between the two people, British and Americans.

FRANCE AND GERMANY

Reply Sent Regarding Indemnity
But Not Yet Made Public.

PARIS, March 24.—The Government sent a communication to the German Government tonight in reply to Germany's refusal to pay the indemnity of a billion marks.

UNSEEMLY ROW
IN GLASGOWLabor Members Demonstrate
Against Granting Freedom of
City to Prince

Pandemonium reigned at a special meeting of the Glasgow Town Council called for the purpose of considering the proposed visit of the Prince of Wales, says a Glasgow despatch to the London Times.

At the outset Councillor Kirkwood said that no freedom of the city should be given to any individual, no matter who he was, so long as there were men unemployed. The Lord Provost was not the lord of creation and had no right to go to London to see the Prince about a Glasgow visit without the sanction of the class he (Councillor Kirkwood) represented.

In an Uproar

The crisis was reached when, after other labor members had harangued the House, an attempt was made to take the vote. Amid a chorus of "Vote, vote," the labor members wildly demanded a roll call, so that a record could be kept.

The Council Room was now in an uproar. Members jumped from their seats, and standing on the desks wildly gesticulated and shouted insulting epithets at Lord Provost Paxton. Councillor Kerr, during the hubbub advanced to the chair, seized the mace and deliberately flung it on to the floor. The Council officer replaced the mace on its accustomed resting-place. Above the noise the Lord Provost shouted, "All in favor of the motion to confer the freedom on the Prince hold up their hands."

Left the Chamber

The labor members who favored an amendment to the effect that no entertainment should be given out of the common fund because the Council refused a grant of an extra £10,000 for unemployed relief, rushed at Lord Provost, but several magistrates closed round his lordship, who then left the chamber, preceded by the officer bearing the mace. The exciting discussion ended in the corridors.

STRUCK ORE ON
THE BELLEVUE
AT ALICE ARMTunnel at 100 Foot Depth Proves
Veins Extend Downwards
That Far.

L. J. Hughes, manager of the Bellevue mine at Alice Arm, telegraphs E. C. Hall, one of the shareholders, that he has struck fine looking ore at 186 feet in from the mouth of the tunnel, showing galena and grey copper.

This property is up the Illance River about twelve miles from Alice Arm and has wonderfully good showings of ore. The tunnel is 100 feet from the surface, driven in from the bank of the river. It was started on the advice of P. W. Racey, consulting engineer, with the purpose of proving the depth, width and richness of the surface showings. Naturally this strike is most satisfactory, as, while it does not prove the extent of the ore or any further particulars concerning it, it does prove that the ore has depth, which was the important thing.

The vein which has just been struck at 100 foot depth has been uncovered for about a mile on the property and from appearances it would seem as if there was the making of a rich mine. There are other outcroppings which look well.

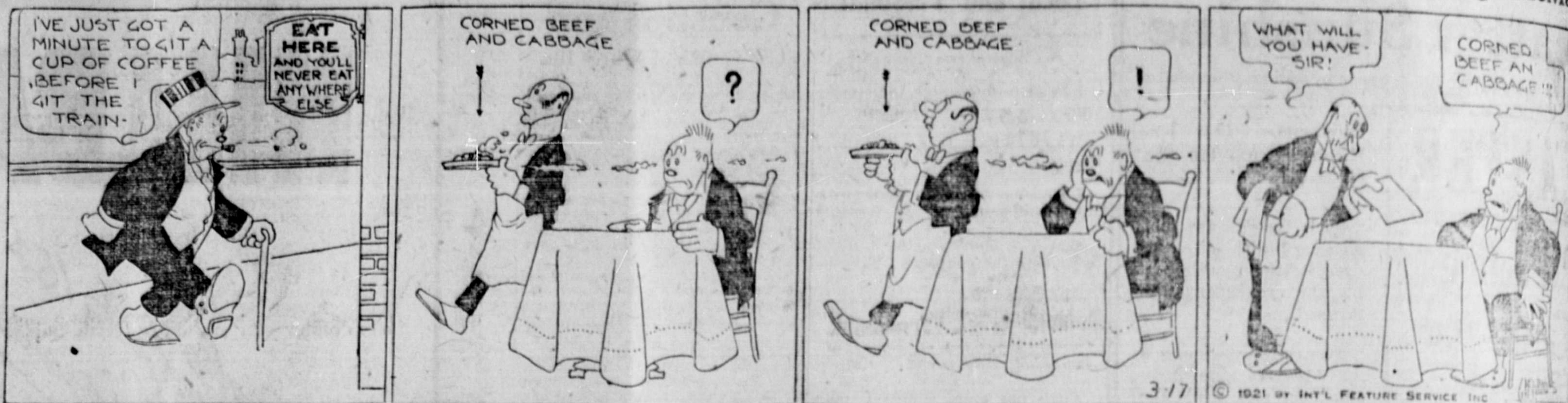

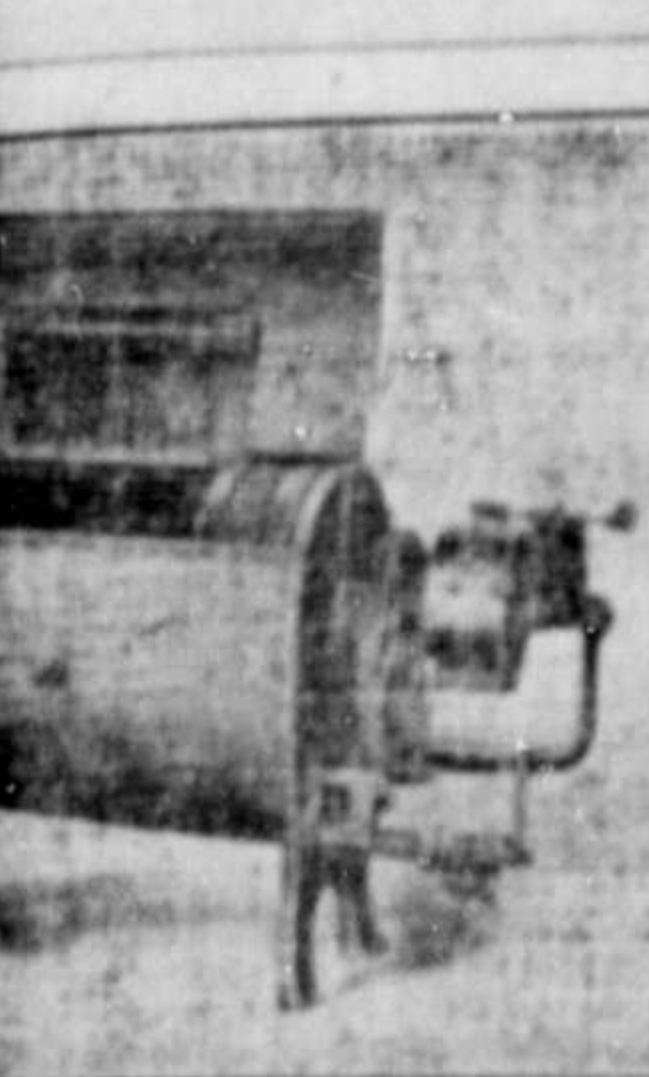

This quantity of fish, as you will readily realize, Mr. Speaker, would require something like about 150 refrigerator cars, but the Department of Railways had no cars, or practically none, to handle this great catch. And that has been the case for the last three or four years. Now, is that the way for a government to treat people engaged in a great industry like the halibut industry of the British Columbia coast? It certainly is not, and the Minister of Railways merits condemnation for the manner in which he has dealt with this industry.

Deficit on Railways.

The hon. member for Maison-neuve (Mr. Lemieux) referred to an article in the Canadian Fisherman. In order that the House may appreciate the exact condition of affairs, I should like to refer to this article. It appears under the caption "Strangling an Industry," and the sub-head reads: "How the fishing industry of the North Pacific is being bluffed and humbugged by the Canadian Government Railways." Now, Sir, this House was startled a few days ago when the estimates were laid on the table to find what the deficit on the Canadian National Railways would be this year. But, Mr. Speaker, it is not surprising that there should be deficits in the affairs of the country, and particularly in the Department of Railways, when the present Minister of Railways is handling the great transcontinental system of Canada as we have witnessed. What the Government should do, if they desire to administer the affairs of the railways properly and to secure traffic, is to see to it that every day all this abundance of fish that comes to Prince Rupert is properly taken care of in the way of transportation. I am told that the daily freight would amount to something like \$21,000 and it seems to me that the Government and the people in charge of the railway system should see that better transportation facilities are available.

ties are available. I presume that this article which I shall read is written by the editor of the journal in which it appears. It is as follows:

Humbug and Indifference.

"In all our experience of the many drawbacks which militate against the proper development of our Canadian fisheries, we have never seen anything to equal the nonchalant manner in which the officials of the Canadian Government Railway Systems have treated the urgent needs of a great industry, and the whole story is one of 'passing the buck,' unfulfilled promises, humbug and absolute indifference."

That is what the editor of the Canadian Fisherman says about the way in which the present Government and their officials are handling the railways of this country. The article goes on to say that for some years Prince Rupert has been suffering from a shortage of express cars, and the people and business men of that city have done everything in their power to direct the attention of this Government to the necessity for better transportation facilities, but without avail. At the meeting of the Canadian Fisheries Association, held in Vancouver in June, 1920, this matter was thoroughly discussed by hundreds of delegates present, and a resolution passed.

Although this resolution was forwarded to the Minister of Railways and to the president of the Canadian National Railways at Toronto, nothing was done, and on July 8, of the same year, the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association passed another resolution.

The article in question goes on to state that both resolutions were placed before the Minister of Railways and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries as much as it did the Minister of Railways, and if the Minister of Railways was negligent in his duty in seeing to it that a sufficient number of cars were provided for this business, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in the interests of this great industry, should have urged the matter upon his colleagues and endeavored by every means in his power to have the situation remedied.

Nothing Done.

But nothing was done. All they did was to promise a certain thing was to be done and the promises were never fulfilled. Now, what happened? Owing to the fact that the Government Railways refused to, or at least did not, provide the people of Prince Rupert with refrigerator cars a great number of the boats which always came in the past to that port to land their fish were compelled to go to American ports. I think the members representing British Columbia constituency will bear me out when I say that a number of these boats, finding insufficient refrigerator cars at their disposal were compelled to go to Seattle and other ports in the United States in order to sell their catch. Consequently the Government Railways lost all that business and the Canadian people lost in a variety of other ways.

Now, Sir, the progressive people of Prince Rupert were not satisfied with the way things were going on. Although they telegraphed and wrote the Minister of Railways and his officials they still kept after them. It seems that some official of the Government wrote to Prince Rupert and said: "The Government had ordered one hundred cars to be built at the works of the National Car Company at Hamilton." The people of Prince Rupert never placed too much confidence in the word of that official and they asked the Canadian Fisherman to send a representative to Hamilton and

see if these cars were being built there. Here is what that paper said:

A representative of the Canadian Fisherman was then sent to interview the National Car Company at Hamilton to find out what progress had been made with the construction of the 100 long-promised cars. We went there on February 9 (of the present year) and interviewed one of the highest officials of the Car Company and his report is that—

"The company has been and is at present closed down. It is expected to resume operations in a week or so. No start has been made on the construction of the promised cars, and the only information advanced is that the car company expects to start work on an order of 1,000 freight cars for the Government and that it was hoped that the thirty refrigerator cars would be put through at the same time."

The article goes on to say:

To sum it all up: there is certainly no chance of these thirty express refrigerator cars being delivered in March and the promises of the railway officials amount to nothing but bluff and humbug.

It is no use blaming the minor officials for negligence in the Prince Rupert affair. The blame lies on the men higher up and we do not hesitate to name the Minister of Railways, Hon. Dr. Reid, for his indifference to the request for more equipment, and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, for his lack of interest in the development of a great fishing port. If the latter had given more time and thought to fishery matters, his influence in the Cabinet could easily have secured action in the matter of supplying Prince Rupert with more refrigerator cars.

The whole fishing industry of Canada will suffer from this species of humbug until we get a Department of Fisheries with a responsible official at the head of it and a minister who will give ear and action to the plain suggestions of the industry along the lines of sane development.

Mr. Duff concluded with the words at the commencement of this article which are an indication of the way the Nova Scotian looks at the business prospects of this city.

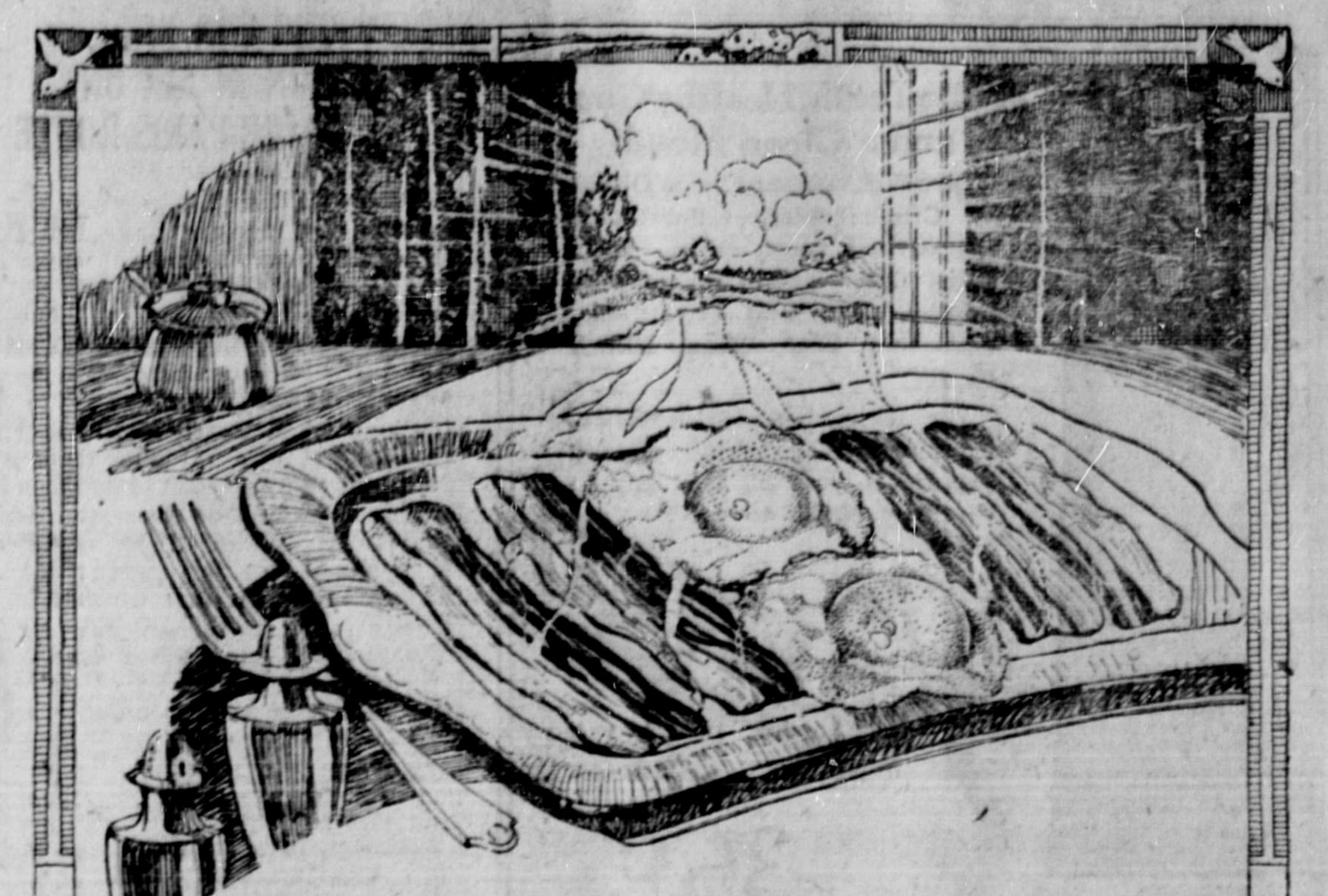

PREPARING FOR BIG SEASON IN AIR ON DOVER-PARIS ROUTE

LONDON, Mar. 23.—French air experts now declare their belief that this season the air-passenger traffic to the Continent will be more than doubled—that the 5,000 travellers who flew last season will increase this summer to as many as 20,000.

France is determined to carry the bulk of this valuable traffic. Last year she spent £125,000 on her subsidy. This year she is said to be prepared to devote £500,000 to it. By cutting the Paris-London air-fare to 300¢, about £5.5s, at the present rate of exchange—airplane experts in Paris hope to divert from railway to airway a large number of first-class passengers. If, in fact, one takes into account the incidental expenses of a long boat and train journey, which are avoided in the air, it will now be almost as cheap to fly as to go by land and sea, with the added advantage, for the airway, that it saves about six hours.

Reduce Fare

Our air transport industry has been hit so heavily by the recent "slump" that, if an attempt is made to vie with the French in fare-cutting, it is feared that it will be impossible to make things pay. It will mean bringing our London-Paris fare down from £10, 10s, to £5.5s, and even when our subsidy is added this will bring in only £6, 11s. 3d, per passenger. With the programme for 1921 so disorganized, and with orders cancelled for new and improved passenger craft, it is not thought possible for us to deal with a large enough volume of traffic to make profits at such low rates.
