#### STRONG DEMAND FOR B. C. LUMBER IN THE ORIENT

VANCOUVER, March 10.—There is a strong demand for B. C. lumber in the Orient, it is reported here by the local lumbermen. The Canadian Robert Dollar Company is shipping a large quantity. The demand is caused by the fall in freight rates from a minimum of \$25 to \$12.50.

#### GOVERNMENT ASKED ASSUME CONTROL OF LIQUOR DISTRIBUTION

Effort Being Made to Break up  
Bone Dry Combination  
in Ontario.

LONDON, Ont., March 10.—A number of petitions are being circulated in this city asking the Ontario Government to assume control of liquor distribution, as a substitute for the proposed "bone dry" law. Local temperance workers declare the petitions are a scheme of the liquor interests to "draw a herring over the trail." As a result of the decision of the Government to permit appeals in liquor cases, it is stated here that there will be many appeals from people in this district who have been subjected to heavy fines for breach of the O. T. A. during the past few months.

#### LURE OF GOLD ON QUEEN CHARLOTTES

An unauthenticated report comes from Skidegate that a Mr. Pettipiece of Massett had brought in all the gold he could carry from Naden Harbor. The southeast storms have prevented a stampede to the fields, but rumor has it that a company has been formed in the Old Town composed of Fessers, Deasy, Ponder, Gillette, Baker, Mancore and Pettipiece, to corral the new Eldorado.

#### MIXED MARRIAGES ARE OBJECTED TO BY ARCHBISHOP MCNEILL

Says People Lack Social Sense  
and Forget Effect on Public

"Most of the social problems which vex the minds of reformers are connected with family life," states Archbishop McNeill in a Lenten pastoral. "Directly opposed to unity of the Christian family is the legal system of divorce.

"Another obstacle to family unity is the mixed marriage, that is, the marriage of a Catholic with a non-Catholic. The first thing that strikes one in dealing with marriage engagements of this kind is the tendency of the parties to regard the matter as one of individual or personal concern merely. They agree that the proposed marriage promises to make them happy; then why should others care? They seem often to lack any social sense, and to be unable to understand that every marriage affects the general public in one way or another.

#### Ontario Schools

"In Toronto the effect of mixed marriages upon the Catholic body is brought home to us by the fact that the other Catholics pay about thirty thousand dollars every year to educate the children of mixed marriages."

His grace states that family unity has been weakened by three other influences which should also be considered. "One is the industrial revolution which began in the 18th century; the second is the performing of family functions by the community or by the state; and the third is commercialized pleasure for children."

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## COLD STORAGE FISHING BOATS WILL OPERATE AS INDEPENDENTS THIS YEAR

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company is sending out its boats to fish on the independent lay instead of as company boats. The Chief Skugaid, a six-dory boat, leaves tonight for the halibut banks in charge of Captain Lawler, this being the first of the company's boats that has ever fished as an independent. It means that the owners will get one fifth of the proceeds of the catch, out of which they pay a bonus to the captain, and keep up and insure the boat. The captain and other fishermen share the other four-fifths equally after paying operating expenses.

The company is planning to send also the Sitka and the Zebassa, both six dory boats, on a similar plan, and if a suitable skipper can be secured the Summer may also go out. Owing to the excessive cost of operating under the company lay, the big steamers will tie up indefinitely. No attempt will probably be made to operate them as independents.

Mr. Johnson, manager of the company, explains that the cost of operating the boats is too great under the company lay and there is nothing to do but tie up the larger ones and operate the smaller craft as independents.

#### IS PRAIRIE LIQUOR BEING SENT TO B.C.

Stuff Manufactured in Saskatchewan for Export Said to Contain Wood Alcohol.

SASKATOON, Sask., March 10.—To give it "a kick" and the "correct color" wood alcohol and aniline dyes are being freely used for doctoring and diluting liquor handled by some of the export liquor houses in the province, according to B. E. Leech, chairman of the Saskatchewan Liquor Commission.

"Some of the product is little less than rank poison," said Mr. Leech. "The wood alcohol is used to give the drink a 'kick' and aniline dyes are used to give the dope the requisite color. The dyes can be skillfully shaded to represent Scotch whiskey, Irish whisky or almost any other brand of spirit. In addition to these ingredients, instead of distilled water being used for the mixtures, anything that has a semblance of water, whether it be from the pump, a river, or a slough serves the purpose."

#### AGE FOR MARRIAGE.

CALGARY, Alta., March 10.—The adoption of a uniform marriage law throughout Canada is urged by the Local Council of Women who have discussed the subject at recent meetings. They advocate raising the legal age for marriage from 18 to 21 years.

## MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT AROUSED OVER RAILWAYS VERY SERIOUS SITUATION

OTTAWA, March 10.—An insistent demand both among Government and opposition members is developing for the curtailment of railway estimates and the reorganization of the whole Canadian National Railways system. The huge estimate brought out in the budget has brought about a realization of the seriousness of the matter.

The warning of Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, may lead to a general investigation of the whole situation. The estimates for railways will have a stormy passage.

#### SAANICH TEACHERS ON STRIKE TODAY

SAANICH, March 10.—Fifty-four teachers in the schools of Saanich municipality are on strike today as a result of the refusal of the school board to meet wage demands. The teachers offered to negotiate or arbitrate their requests but this the board declined to do. Accordingly the schools are closed today.

## W. R. LORD GONE TO SEARCH FOR MISSING BOAT

Noticed With Four Fishermen Is  
Thirty-Four Days Out on  
West Coast.

The W. R. Lord, loaned for the purpose by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., left last night to search for the fishing boat Notlad which is 34 days out and fears for the safety of which are being expressed on the waterfront. Capt. Parsons was in charge of the Lord with five fishermen.

The Notlad was spoken on February 20 at Marble Island on the farther end of Skidegate Channel. She is a Prince Rupert craft in charge of Captain Jack Smith and with him Harry Haskell, Charlie Cook and William Pearl, all fishermen.

The Government boat Newington would have been loaned by Capt. Saunders for the search, but she is at present at Green Island and the delay in getting her away would be very considerable.

## FIRST MATE IS BLAMED

Princess Beatrice Was off Course  
When Struck Bluff on  
Lasqueti Island.

VANCOUVER, March 10.—As a result of the stranding of the Princess Beatrice a month ago today at Tucker Bay, Lasqueti Island, Straits of Georgia, First Mate F. R. Springalls has had his certificate suspended for three months. The vessel was found to have struck a bluff when off her course. All passengers were removed in safety. Captains William Boyce and the other navigation officers of the vessel are found free of blame.

## MAKING GOOD TIME ON DOCK

Pile Driving is One Third Done  
and Decking Commenced

The work of construction on the new 800 foot salmon wharf at the west end of the present Grand Trunk Pacific Dock is advancing very rapidly. One third of the pile driving is done and a start has been made on the decking. Although progress depends largely on the condition of the weather and other circumstances it is likely that the pile driving will be completed some time next month.

The pile driving follows up on the work of bringing sand across from McNicholl for the foundation and the casting up by another dredge at the site of the wharf. The Tefon, which was wrecked on Frederick Island some months ago, is just finished and off the ways and will be ready to fish again next week. Her job was quite extensive.

The

Ingrid H., which went aground on Herbert Reef about a fortnight ago, is also finished and leaves tomorrow night again.

The fishing boat, Speculator, and Harry Mobley's pleasure boat, Seminole, are up for general overhauling. The latter was rather badly burned in the interior last winter when a gasoline stove exploded while the boat was on a hunting expedition.

#### FISH ARRIVALS

About two carloads of halibut is in at the local fish wharves and was sold this afternoon, the average price paid being 15,40 and 6,30. There are plenty of fish ears in to handle it.

Will Mr. Reid  
Weather the Storm?

Will Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, weather the storm of protest which is being aroused at the immense expenditures on the Canadian National Railways? He has been very much on trial during the past year, and the opinion is prevalent in the west that the job is too big for him. It is the biggest job there is in Canada and Mr. Reid is not by any means the biggest man. He is said to be too much of a politician to be given charge of so important a department.

It is possible that the Meighen Government may not survive the railway admissions. The deficit is colossal. Just at a time when the country was expecting reduced taxation owing to the curtailment of reconstruction expenses, there comes an additional load placed on the shoulders of the people with absolutely no hope for any immediate relief. Whatever Government is in power, the debts will have to be paid, and the people will have to foot the bill. There is no getting away from it.

When the returned soldiers asked for some help they were told there was no money. Yet the Government announces that the money has been spent on one of its departments, and the only result, so far as Prince Rupert can see, has been to provide for the people a poorer service than formerly.

The discussion on the railway estimates will prove interesting. Mr. Reid is trying to lay the blame for the present condition of affairs on McAdoo, an American, but the people of Canada will scarcely swallow that. Mr. Reid has failed in his conduct of the Railways Department, and, if Mr. Meighen expects to retain the confidence of the few supporters he has left, he should make haste to see that a better man is placed in charge.

Lumber Situation  
Is Discussed.

The following is a short editorial article appearing in the current number of the Pacific Coast Lumberman under the heading "Prince Rupert's Urgent Need."

"Of all the hardships under which the Northern British Columbia lumbermen at present labor none is more apparent than the need of a lumber assembly wharf at Prince Rupert with crane and all facilities for the speedy and efficient loading of deep sea vessels. There is a demand all over the world for the products of this district but there is no machinery that enables the small millmen and the big ship owners to take advantage of the situation.

"The exorbitant railway freight rates now in operation have put an end to the shipment by land of any but the highest grades of northern timber at anything approaching a profit, but the loss to the mills might be offset to a considerable degree if advantage could be taken of the falling water rates to ship the lumber of the north, not only to its established markets, but to new ones where its unique qualities would gain it a steady sale."

"At present it no more pays a big vessel to loiter around picking up portions of a lumber cargo here and there than it compensates the small manufacturer to pile it in places accessible for shipment by water. The key to the whole situation is the abolition of delay and the heavy cost of handling and rehandling. So vital does the question seem to the establishment of a market for Northern B. C. lumber anything like commensurate with its possibilities, that is incredible that no action has been taken in the matter before this."

"Pending the arrangement for first class facilities surely some shift can be made to meet the present emergency."



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

## In the Letter Box

## PARTY SYSTEM

Editor, Daily News—In dealing with the "party system of government" in your editorial recently, you seem to have injected a new point, and to have discussed the merits of the different forms of government prevailing here and in the United States. This question is entirely apart from the subject matter under discussion, which deals solely with the representative character of legislative councils set up through the agency of political parties such as the Liberal and Conservative. It will be noted that the legislative branch of the U.S. Government is controlled by political parties in about the same measure as is done here, notwithstanding the difference in the form of government.

## Must be Shown

The Daily News has in the past alluded to "parties," political and otherwise, and adduced arguments in support of its views, and by reason of the point being again raised the writer cannot admit of being mistaken in his conception of what constitutes a political party, at least not without convincing proof being offered.

It is admitted, however, that the farmers' party of Ontario is political, but its form of organization, aims and pretences are so different from the old line parties, and this is so well understood, that to refer to such would seem to be superfluous.

The Liberal and Conservative political parties are organized along national lines and under the pretext of representing all classes in society, and perhaps they do in a theoretical sense and according to geographical divisions and have the effect of dividing the voting strength and influence of not only the farmers but of others.

## Class Lines

The farmers' political party is an organization based on class lines and aims to protect the farmers, its own class, and the effect has been to have united them, hence the clear-cut distinction.

This does not necessarily imply class domination, as Ontario presents the nearest approach to a practical form of democracy perhaps on the American continent. And its government retains its representative and responsible characteristics to as great an extent as obtains elsewhere.

## A BOAT BUILDER'S POSITION AT COW BAY

Editor, Daily News—Regarding your remarks as to Cow Bay in your issue of March 7, my place at Cow Bay is conducted as a boat building plant. I was given permission to locate there by Mr. Mehan, late Superintendent of the G.T.R. Railway Co., who assured me at the time of location that I could stay there until he could find me a permanent location on the G.T.R. waterfront, and ever since I have been waiting for that waterfront to materialize. I have in the meantime conducted my business on a purely temporary basis, until the permanent location was available and have always been willing to pay any reasonable rental for a permanent location. I have urged, pleaded and used every honest method to obtain a location and have failed. Hence I have had to conduct my large and growing business on a scow at the mercy of wind and tide, and also of the various persons who from time to time have viewed Cow Bay with envious eyes, and as their own ideal vantage point for the mauling of up-town merchants, fishermen and others who have no waterfront.

## Turned Away Work

Compare my case with some of the merchants you mention who have waterfront. Last winter I had to turn away \$80,000 worth of work on account of not having a place to handle it. This work went to Vancouver and Seattle at the expense of myself, Prince Rupert generally, and also to the detriment of many a man out of employment. These merchants have waterfront which is denied me and others. I have bought material and lumber from them and do not forget in doing so I have helped to pay for their waterfront privilege, and when you say they would be glad to get off as cheaply as we have, I think you do not know what you are talking about. If you do, then you are begging the question.

The industries at Cow Bay and the fishing fleet using it have paid ten dollars for every one paid by the

waterfront lessees to the general upkeep of Prince Rupert. The reason why the fishermen do not pay for the floats is because, not only is it not a permanent anchorage, but because they have never been expected to. The fishermen pay their bills promptly and are always willing to pay for accommodation, but by no stretch of the imagination can Cow Bay floats be construed as proper accommodation.

## Invested Money

Mr. Editor, my place at Cow Bay represents an investment of twenty-three hundred dollars. Would you be willing to take the same chance with twenty-three hundred dollars? Would you be willing to put such a sum into a temporary location as I did, with the hope that I might get some encouragement to grow bigger? I see now that under the present attitude of some in Prince Rupert I have made a mistake, that according to you, the small industry does not count, that what Prince Rupert wants is not the small industry, but our big million dollar industries that go into bankruptcy and keep half the people of Prince Rupert running to Ottawa to see if they can get the public to take care of the wreckage.

## Drifting Policy

The City of Prince Rupert is like a ship without a rudder and drifting around. No one can tell where they are getting off at, and I for one am fed up. I have never taken any part in politics, nor have I ever been concerned with what is done with Cow Bay except only as it relates to my business and others located there, and but for your scathing remarks about the contributions of Cow Bay locators to the general good of Prince Rupert I should not even have written this letter.

## Would Be Remunerative

As to the profit outlook of excavating Cow Bay, I am sure that the resulting good to the city of Prince Rupert would more than remunerate the Dominion Government for the monies expended, and did not know that public works are conducted on the money-lending basis. But if such is the case, any development for the good of the people must fail, if such immediate returns are looked for.
