Light Docket for Summer Assizes

MONTREAL CABLE SAYS GOVERNOR GENERALSHIP IS OFFERED LORD BYNG

Holmes Murder is Most Important Set For Local Assizes

The summer assizes in Prince Rupert open today with Mr. Justice Gregory presiding. There is not a very big docket of cases. The list includes three criminal cases involving two prisoners, four civil cases and five divorce actions.

The most important case will be the Holmes murder trial which will not commence until Saturday or possibly Monday. The other accused in the criminal list is Harry Ross, charged with jail breaking and having stolen goods in possession. W. E. Fisher is to be crown prosecutor and A. M. Manson, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, will be counsel for the defence in the murder trial. At past hearing Harry Ross has conducted his own defence.

LOGGER BLED TO DEATH ON WAY HOSPITAL

Hubert Johnson Victim of Tragic Accident Yesterday Morning.

Hubert Johnson, a hard logger from Port Stevens and well known in this city, is dead as a result of an accident yesterday morning at the camp which resulted in his bleeding to death.

Johnson started out to his work as usual yesterday morning and while on his way he tripped and fell. Attempting to free himself of the axe he was carrying he threw it from him but it must have struck a rock or some other obstruction for it glanced back on him, the sharp blade cutting an artery in his arm. Bleeding profusely he was hauled into a gas boat to bring him to the hospital here.

About 9 o'clock last night, 12 hours after the accident, while the boat was passing Lewis Island, Johnson died from the great loss of blood. An inquest is being held and it is not thought an inquest will be necessary, death being purely due to accidental causes.

Johnson was but 34 years of age and was a native of Sweden. He was married a short time ago and the widow still resides in the city. The funeral will take place on Saturday.

ASCRIBE BASE UNEMPLOYMENT

Senate Committee Says There is Want of Confidence Between Producers and Consumers.

OTTAWA, June 2.—A general want of confidence on the part of manufacturers, producers, middlemen and consumers is the base of the present employment situation in Canada in the opinion of the Senate Committee on unemployment.

Evidence of bankers, manufacturers and workmen taken is submitted in a formal report issued by the committee.

PROROGATION LIKELY BY END OF THIS WEEK

OTTAWA, June 2.—It is expected that parliament will prorogue during the coming week-end. Premier Meighen sails June 7 for England to attend the Imperial Conference.

RALPH CONNOR IS MODERATOR

Will Lead Epochal Presbyterian Assembly at Toronto

TORONTO, June 2.—Rev. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor), of Winnipeg, was yesterday elected moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. Dr. W. L. Clay, of Victoria, was also nominated but he withdrew. Rev. Prof. James Ballantyne of Toronto is the retiring moderator.

MINING RUSH TO STIKINE

Stuart Henderson is Starting An Expedition According to Reports

VICTORIA, June 2.—Hopes for discovering a new Eldorado in Northern British Columbia are held by a group of experienced mining men who are understood to be financing an expedition into the Cassiar District. Stuart Henderson, the well known lawyer and promoter, is said to be at the head of the enterprise. It is believed that the Cassiar country will see a great gold rush this year.

Already there have been several outfit passes through Prince Rupert, bound for these new fields and three weeks ago, the Daily News told of the reported stampede. The parties are going in by way of Wrangell and up the Stikine River to Telegraph Creek.

COMMONS REJECTS LOOSE AMENDMENT FOR FOREIGN VOTE

If It Had Passed Would Have Allowed Children and Wives of Foreigners to Vote

OTTAWA, June 2.—At an early hour yesterday morning the House of Commons rejected the amendment approving of the granting of the vote to the wives and children of naturalized British subjects without the application of a judge's certificate. It was felt that such a rule would leave too many loopholes for the foreign population.

BUMPER CROP ON PRAIRIES

Fall Rye Already Heading Out—Acreage Will Be Normal

WINNIPEG, June 2.—The fall rye crops are heading out at Wawanesa. Government reports point to a bumper crop all over the prairies as well as in Manitoba. The acreage is no more than normal.

KING MAY OPEN NEW ULSTER PARLIAMENT

BELFAST, June 2.—The News Letter says that it has learned on good authority that King George will open the Ulster Parliament in full state on June 21. The report is unconfirmed in London.

Former Commander Army Of Canada May Be Next Civil Leader in Dominion

MONTREAL, June 2.—The Gazette says that a cable has been received here announcing that the governor generalship of Canada is to be offered to Lord Byng of Vimy. An Ottawa despatch says there is no confirmation.

Despite the fact that the report seems to be unofficial it is being accepted with a good deal of confidence in official circles. Lord Byng, who was formerly at the head of the Canadian army in France, is considered a likely choice for governor general and his qualifications are of the best for the post. His appointment would be a most popular one.

ANGLO-JAP ALLIANCE SET AHEAD A YEAR

TOKIO, June 2.—Nichi Nichi, a Tokyo newspaper, declares that Britain has suggested that Japan permit the Anglo-Japanese alliance to stand for another year. The two nations are definitely negotiating for a revision of the alliance, it says.

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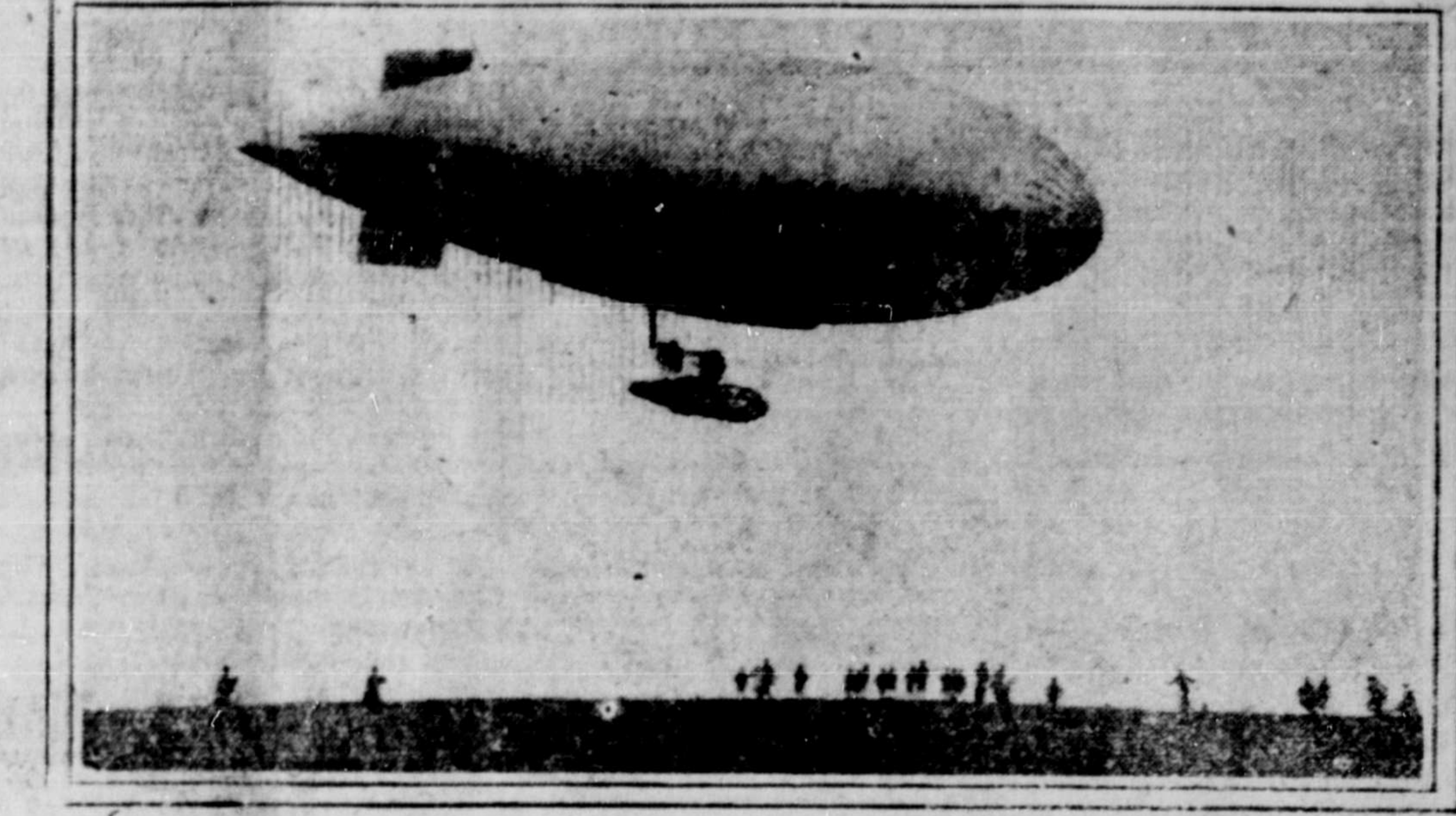
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ANOTHER GERMAN RECEIVES PENALTY FOR CRIME IN WAR

LEIPSI, June 2.—Sergeant Teuman, accused of ill treating British prisoners during the war, has been sentenced to six months' imprisonment by the High Court which is conducting its sessions here.

RIOTS FOLLOW ARREST NEGRO

Tulsa, Oklahoma, Put Under Martial Law Following Killing

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 2.—Martial law has been declared at Tulsa, Oklahoma, according to a message that has been received by Governor Robinson from the chief of police of Tulsa. The action follows riots in which seventy-five persons, including whites and negroes, were killed.

TULSA, June 2.—Battle raged all Monday night and into the early hours of yesterday morning along ten blocks in the south section of the city and resulted in the death of six whites and fifty negroes. Yesterday many were wounded as a result of fires that had been set.

The trouble is reported to have arisen out of the arrest of a negro who is alleged to have assaulted a white girl.

TULSA, June 2.—An investigation will commence today into the race riots of yesterday morning. It is unofficially estimated that one hundred persons were killed and scores injured.

The city is now quiet and is under the control of the militia. Some thirty-five injured remaining in the hospitals are not expected to recover.

The loss by fire in the negro quarter and damage to adjacent property is estimated at \$1,500,000. Five thousand homeless negroes are camped in the fair grounds. The burned area covers a square mile.

FURIOUS FIGHT UPPER SILESIA

Poles Are Defeated in Engagement Near Gross Strehlitz—Leave Dead on Field

OPPELN, June 2.—The Germans are fighting the Poles furiously near Gross Strehlitz. In a recent engagement the Poles retired leaving one hundred and thirty dead.

British troops have arrived here from the Cologne bridge-head and it is understood that they are to be sent to suppress the Polish insurgents. A British division, instead of four battalions, as previously reported, is being sent to Silesia.

NEW YORK BANKS PAY OUT MONEY

Charge Thirty-five Million Dollars Against Germany and Pay to Allied Credit.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Thirty-five million dollars of Germany's first installment on reparations payments to the Allies has been paid by four New York banks and charged against the German funds deposited with them. The money has been placed in the Federal Reserve Bank and credited to the Bank of England and the Bank of France.

INCREASES FOR CIVIL SERVICE

Rumored in Victoria May Be Granted on Return of Premier Oliver

VICTORIA, June 2.—The British Columbia civil servants may receive a statutory increase in wages after all this year, it is unofficially stated. It is also reported that the decision of the government refusing any increases will be reversed on the return of Premier Oliver from the East at the end of the week. These statements are made on the authority of the officers of the Civil Service Association.

Ever since the government stated that there would be no increases for civil servants there has been a good deal of agitating and appealing to the authorities and the discontent of the employees concerned was much in evidence. The agitation is not a new one and the civil servants have been organizing along union lines for the past two years.

SERIOUS FRAUD AT UNIVERSITY

Students of Toronto College Charged with Writing Tests by Proxy

TORONTO, June 2.—Nineteen students of the University of Toronto have been summoned to appear before the faculty to answer charges of attempting to pass their examinations by proxy.

Suspension will probably be the punishment for these while the students who undertook to write for the absent ones will likely be dealt with more drastically.

In the crowds of students attending at the annual college tests held recently it is alleged that advantage was taken of strange presiding examiners and that advanced students were bribed in some cases to write for others, who were doubtful of their chances of being successful. The discovery of the fraud has just been made.

TRUE BILL IN ROSS CHARGES

Trial Being Proceeded with by Assize Court This Afternoon

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill in the Harry Ross jail-breaking and stolen goods in possession cases today and the trial is being proceeded with before Mr. Justice Gregory this afternoon.

PROVINCIAL ELECTION IN SASKATCHEWAN

Very Quiet Campaign and Likely Martin Government Return with Big Majority

REGINA, June 2.—The quietest political campaign in the history of the province of Saskatchewan is now drawing to a close with nominations today and the elections one week later, on June 9.

The election will terminate the fourth legislature of Saskatchewan, which was chosen on June 26, 1917, and has finished its four year term. In this house, composed of 59 members, there were 51 supporters of the Liberal administration headed by Premier W. N. Martin, K. C.; six Conservatives and two Independents.

Present indications point to the government being sustained with as much power as it at present has and that is one reason why the campaign is so quiet. The greatest opposition the Martin Government will have will be from the Independents. The Conservative party is without a leader in Saskatchewan and will, therefore, not put up a serious fight.

How Vancouver Will Spend Time in the North Next Week

Several members of the local Board of Trade will likely join the Prince George when she arrives here next week with the Vancouver Board of Trade excursion and will make the northern end of the excursion between here and Anyox and Stewart. The fare for this trip will be the same as the regular round trip fare to Stewart, namely, Twenty-Five Dollars.

The following schedule for the northern end of the trip has been announced: Arrive Prince Rupert, 7 o'clock Thursday evening. Leave Prince Rupert, midnight Friday. Arrive Anyox, 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Leave Anyox, noon Saturday. Arrive Stewart, Saturday evening. Leave Stewart, Sunday morning. Arrive Prince Rupert 5 o'clock Sunday. Return to Vancouver, midnight Sunday.

Will Hold Dance

On the evening of the arrival of the excursion here there will be a dance held in the St. Andrew's Hall. Although it will be under the auspices of the local board to entertain the visitors, the orchestra will be one that is being brought from Vancouver with the excursion. It is said to be of unusual excellence and will provide quite a change for local dancers who will, doubtless, turn out enthusiastically.

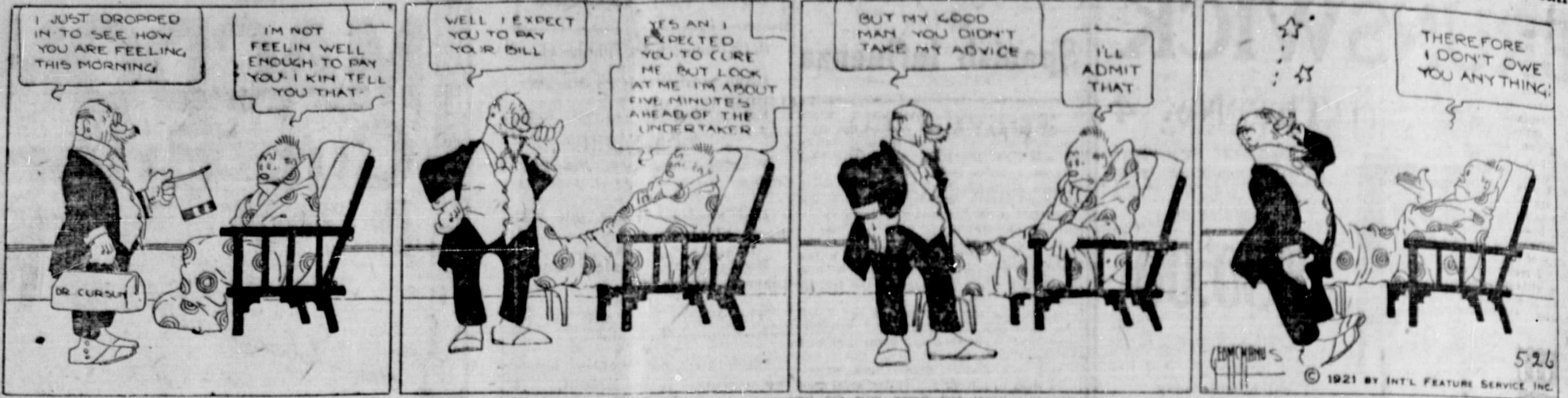

WELL KNOWN ATLIN CLERGYMAN IS IN CITY FOR FEW DAYS

Rev. Fred Stevenson Was an Early Pioneer of North—Served Overseas

Rev. F. L. Stevenson of Quamichan, Vancouver Island, is a visitor to the city, having been called north in connection with a case coming on at the present sitting of the Assize court. Probably, "Fred Stevenson," as he is affectionately called by hundreds of his warm friends in this northern country, is one of the best known, and most popular clergymen who has ever done duty in the north. Arriving in Atlin in '99, he was one of the outstanding figures, amongst that heterogeneous mass of argonauts who flocked there, diverting for a time from their original idea of hitting Dawson City and the famous Klondike, the golden Mecca of the North, to which all roads led in the late '90's.

Mr. Stevenson was a Padre of the right stamp, and lived the life of the camp sharing the ups and downs, joys and sorrows of the feverishly gold-mad people of that memorable rush. He will never be forgotten by hundreds of people whom he numbered among his friends in those early days.

When the Great War started, Mr. Stevenson was there, going over with the C.M.R.'s, as Padre. He was badly wounded by shrapnel. His two sons also were to be found doing duty for their country, following in their fathers footsteps and fortunately all came through without serious casualties. Mr. Stevenson is a brother-in-law of W. E. Fisher, of the local law firm of Fisher & Oughton.

JUDGE YOUNG GAVE ADDRESS ROTARY CLUB

Spoke on Peace Time Work of Red Cross

Judge F. McE. Young was the guest of the Rotary club at the weekly luncheon today. The president, E. F. Doby, was in the chair. Judge Young thanked the club for the courtesy extended him in the invitation to the luncheon, and for the opportunity afforded him to address them on a subject that was particularly dear to his heart, namely, "The Peacetime work of the Canadian Red Cross Society."

"His honor, in the course of half an hour's address, gave a clear and lucid exposition of the origin of the society and its activities from the time of the Boer war to the present moment. Many people might be under the impression that the usefulness of the Red Cross was terminated with the signing of the armistice, 'Far from it.' The great organization that had done wonders during the war and brought such prestige to Canada had taken steps to organize along peace time lines. WOODSTOCK KILLER WAS HANGED TODAY

Norman Garfield Hanged on Gibbet Built Inside the Jail

WOODSTOCK, June 2.—Norman Garfield, who made a sensational escape from the jail here last week where he was awaiting execution for the murder of Ben Johnston, the local confectioner, of which crime he was convicted, was hanged this morning.

Curious eyes did not have the chance to see the execution although many had planned to climb trees, poles and house tops to do so. Instead of on the usual gallows built inside the fence of the jail yard, the hanging took place on a gibbet specially built inside the jail. Garfield calmly paid the supreme penalty for his crime.

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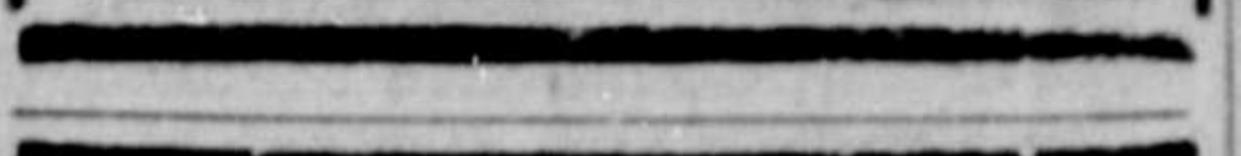
