


COAST HOCKEY

BOWSER MAKES SLASHING ATTACK ON GOVERNMENT

Declares Present Method of Dealing with the Liquor Control is Effort of Weak Administration to Sidestep Its Responsibility

VICTORIA, Feb. 15.—W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition in the Legislature, yesterday afternoon dubbed the procedure under which the Government proposed to introduce to the Legislature a measure providing for government control and sale in sealed packages of spirituous and malt liquors, as mere camouflage. It was an effort by a weak administration to sidestep its clear constitutional responsibility.

Mr. Bowser urged that constitutional practice, as prevailing in this province since confederation, had been wholly ignored by Liberal administrations and the proposal now to have the Legislature as a body in committee of the whole, pass a resolution calling on the Lieutenant-Governor to bring in an act for consideration of the House, was merely brazen effort by the Government to evade responsibility, which should rest wholly on the Government.

Rather a neat and efficient method of obtaining money these hard times, although its use is to be deprecated by right thinking people, was that resorted to by a Hindoo gentleman resident of the city, of the name of Bugga Singh, according to the police report. A week or so ago another Hindoo of the name of Sunter Singh essayed to leave for a trip to Vancouver, but arrived late at the wharf, only just scrambling on to the boat as the gangplank was being hauled in. It appears, seeing the hurried straits that his fellow countryman was in, and knowing that one of the two suitcases Sunda Singh was carrying contained money, he made a grab, captured it and beat it successfully.

The sorrowing Sunda was carried willy nilly on to Vancouver minus his suitcase, some valuable clothes and papers and a matter of \$120.00 in cold cash. Sunda, however, was not going to let it go at that. He immediately got the wires hot with telegrams to the police here and returned to Prince Rupert on the next boat to endeavor to locate his false countryman and prosecute him to the full extent of the law. Warden Bailey made a special trip to Georgetown and the alleged thief has been arrested. The case will come up in the police court this afternoon.

JAIL SENTENCES FOR MEN WHO SET FIRES

Liverpool and Bootle Incendiaries Punished for Offences.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 15.—Two men were yesterday sentenced to ten years' imprisonment for connection with incendiary fires in the north and south ends of Liverpool.

Another conviction was obtained against an incendiary at Bootle whose crime was committed last November. He was sent to prison for two years.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT OPENED WITH ALL ITS OLD TIME PAGEANTRY

King says Violence Will Not Solve Irish Problem; Test of Government Strength to Come Soon

LONDON, February 15.—New political alignments and proposals and Government issues of tremendous import to the people of Britain were foreshadowed when Parliament reassembled today.

Opposition to the Lloyd George ministry and discontent with many of the policies it has pursued in the immediate past seem to have reached a climax and it appears as if the stability of the cabinet will be given a crucial test before final adjournment.

Parliament was opened by the King with all its pre-war pageantry, thousands lining the streets from early morning to witness the passing of the royal procession.

The King in his speech declared that violence would not solve the Irish problem.

The speech was brief but it touched on numerous questions which are confronting the Government. It declared that the most pressing problem today was that of unemployment, which was the result of world wide restriction of trade.

HINDOO TAKEN LABOR ATTACKS FOR STEALING ON GOVERNMENT ARE EXPECTED

Maladministration in Ireland will Be Charge by Opposition to Lloyd George Govt.

LONDON, Feb. 15.—Alleged governmental maladministration in Ireland, waste, and unemployment promise to be the principal questions upon which the Laborites and other elements in opposition to the Lloyd George Government will centre their attacks tomorrow. As soon as the House gets under way for the session, the belief prevails that the anti-government forces will centre a most strenuous attack in regard to the Irish situation as offering the most promising material for debate.

It is considered that certain questions will be asked from the opposition benches which will bring some of the long-awaited replies in regard to Irish administration.

ROWELL REMAINS IN FORMER COMMONS SEAT

Says He Will Occupy It as Long as He Remains in House.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—When the House of Commons opened yesterday afternoon Hon. N. W. Rowell, former president of the Privy Council in the Borden Government, occupied his old seat on the Government benches. He said he would occupy it as long as he remained in the House. He did not say how long that would be.

Meighen Policy
is Protection.

The old Conservative policy has been rejuvenated, the Unionist camouflage flung aside and the present Meighen Government steps out boldly for straight protection. That will be the breaking point, where the Liberal Unionists will split with the Tories. Any former Liberal Unionist who does not now break away from the Meighen affiliation has forever cast in his lot with the Conservatives. It is the parting of the ways. It is the point at which there will have to be a declaration of principles.

Meighen Anxious
For Workingmen.

Premier Meighen expresses himself as very solicitous for the workingmen and states that industries must be protected in order that workingmen may be insured a high standard of living. That is the usual thing that is heard at election time. It is the sort of thing that is used more or less by every party and is a sign that an election is at hand. Everyone knows that protective duties are imposed in order to build up industries and this is done at the expense of the rest of the people.

The ideal policy is free trade, but at the present time, following the war in which money was poured out as if it were water, there has to be a large revenue raised and this cannot well be done from direct taxation because the people will not submit to a tax high enough to pay the interest on the debt and to carry the country forward. For that reason there must be customs duties for a time, but the only reason for exacting them is to raise revenue. Meighen and his party will look more to protection of the big interests to see that they are not undercut by American competitors.

Pulp Mill
Proposition.

A proposal was made last night by E. F. Duby in regard to securing privileges in return for the establishment of a pulp industry in this city. The matter has not been discussed with the council and until there is more information forthcoming it is useless trying to discuss it. The council must necessarily scrutinize any such proposals with care, but also in a sympathetic manner, something they are sure to do.

We all want industries in this city. It is the one thing above everything else that will make us important and give us prestige. We want above everything basic industries that will use our raw material, and convert it into marketable commodities. For that reason anything we can do toward securing such an industry should not be neglected.

There are other pulp and paper concerns proposed for the north, but all seem inclined to locate where the power and water are easily accessible, and also if possible in the midst of the timber supply. By locating at such a point a freedom from excessive taxation is secured and a plentiful supply of water free of cost. Given these similar conditions here, the present proposal is to bring the industry to the city.

We suggest that the people withhold judgment in connection with this matter until Mr. Duby is given an opportunity of stating his case to the City Council and of discussing the matter in detail. Then they will be in a better position to judge of the merits of the present application. All we ask is that they keep an open mind in regard to it and view it sympathetically, for industries are our life-blood. We want the city to grow so that we can have much-needed improvements and the amenities of civilized life.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

One job where it worked would more than pay for the cost, said Ald. McNeill.

BRINGING UP FATHER**PREFERENCE TO RESIDENTS**

Unemployed Coming From Outside and Getting Relief Work, Say Men.

EFFORT TO BE MADE TO RELIEVE DISTRESS

That the citizens of Prince Rupert now unemployed get the preference over men from outside in the work which the city is doing was the request made to the city council at their regular meeting last night by the representatives of the unemployed. J. J. Gillies addressing the council stated that men from the outside districts were coming to town and getting city work, while at the same time there were many citizens, with their homes and families here, unemployed. He understood that there were around 350 men waiting for work.

Men With Families.

The mayor intimated that he had already had this matter up with the city engineer and had requested him to pick out the resident citizens with families and give them the preference. These men the city will have to take care of, said Mr. Rochester, and everything possible done to alleviate distress.

The city engineer was called in and stated that since the last delegation had waited upon the council in January some 532 time checks had been issued to 212 men, amounting to \$5,025.50. He had a list of 315 men wanting work and he would have each case investigated and the work proportioned, giving preference to married men with children, then married men and last single men.

Some With a Wad.

L. Dewhurst who was with the delegation, mentioned that men with a wad were getting city work, while other citizens who needed work were without it and he agreed that investigation was right and proper.

A suggestion of Ald. Dybhavn's that the matter be left in the hands of the mayor to take whatever steps were necessary was seconded by Ald. McNeill. He said that some of the men were doing the city.

Alderman Parker urged that the most necessary work be done first. It would be poor business unless there was a fair return for the work expended. Besides, he wanted official work done for the money paid.

Fair Day's Work.

Mr. Dickens, of the delegation, took exception to Alderman Parker's remarks. He said there were doctors, lawyers, parsons, clerks, boilermakers, men living on "coffee and" and on one meal a week unemployed and these, unused to manual labor and unfit, how could they be "efficient?" Alderman Parker said what he wanted was a fair day's work for the excellent supper.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE TO GIVE RELIEF

Alderman Kelly Wants to Know Why Prince Rupert Not Well Treated.

PROPOSAL TO OPEN A GRANITE QUARRY

There was considerable discussion and criticism over Alderman Kelly wanting to know at last night's council meeting. He had just returned from Vancouver and there the city provided the men with two days' work, and the Dominion and Provincial governments provided for the other two-thirds of the week. He wanted to know why the two governments would not pay these two-thirds to Prince Rupert.

Alderman Kerr intimated that they knew exactly what the Dominion and Provincial governments would do. They would not pay one-third each for work. Ald. Kelly was for wiring Vancouver to see just what they were doing and how they did it. His motion was seconded by Alderman McNeil.

Meet Emergency.

Alderman Perry stated that in 1919 some \$15,000 was spent on replanting certain roads and financed from general revenue. When the work was done, a bylaw was put up to the citizens for this expenditure and passed. He thought that this might be done again to meet this emergency of unemployment. Work might be done on the street, parks, plank-roads or whatever was in accordance with the plan of development and a bylaw prepared and put up to the citizens again.

Granite Quarry.

Alderman McNeil intimated that the Board of Works' intention was to go out to locate a granite quarry for the city, but the bad weather and the snowfall had prevented this for this last two weeks. The work at the quarry, at the crusher and hauling it to town and utilizing the granite on the roads would employ a considerable number of men.

Alderman Parker thought there was something lacking in the board of works. It would be the middle of summer before a quarry would be operating, which would not help the present condition.

Only Grub Bill.

Alderman Kerr explained that all the governments would do was to pay a third each of the grub bill for relief work. They would not pay a dollar for relief employment. They would give charity but no work.

Relief work, however, meant relief work to Alderman Kelly, whatever relief work meant and he still wanted to know how Vancouver could do what Prince Rupert could apparently not.

The whole matter of relief work was left in the hands of the public works committee, with Ald. Kerr dubious a little as he knew that that committee could only spend \$50 without authority.

KLEANZA MILL TO OPERATE

New Plant at Usk to be Completed; Mining Development and Prospecting

USK, Feb. 15.—The Kleanza Lumber and Mining Co., carrying on operations at Usk and Kleanza Creek, are looking forward to a busy season this year and much development, both in regard to mining and lumbering. The vice-president of the company, C. A. Bjornstad, has been in Usk consulting with Captain Willeman, the local manager, and Mr. Reid, the engineer. As soon as the snow conditions will permit, the installation of the machinery at the larger sawmill will be completed and sawing operations commenced.

In the meantime the small mills will be started, and, as soon as the title to the townsite and loading grounds can be secured, an aerial tram for handling the lumber will be put in from the large mill, right through to the railway, thus overcoming all difficulties in transportation.

Mining Operations

In regard to mining it is the intention of the company to operate on a somewhat larger scale than last year, when attention was devoted entirely to surface work. That work has been completed and the future will be given over to prospecting and development. During the summer it is expected a diamond drill outfit will be secured and the numerous veins in the Wallalla property thoroughly tested. At an early date construction work on the camps and mills at Kleanza Creek will be commenced. It is on Kleanza Creek that the future big developments of the company are to take place and where one of the largest sawmills in the North is to be installed.

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FIFTH OF PILES ARE NOW DRIVEN

All Piles Required for New Dock on Hand; Completed by May

Despite the undeniability dullness of the times at the present moment which is always to be looked for at this period of the year, decided activity in construction work can be witnessed, if one pays a visit to the waterfront at the port where the extension to the G.T.P. dock is being made. A large number of men are employed, both in the construction of the dock and in connection with the dredging operations across the harbor in the obtaining of gravel for the filling necessary. All the piling is on hand, the last consignment arriving yesterday. About a fifth of the piles are driven, a considerable portion of the 800 feet addition being yet to be completed. Mr. Knox, the superintendent in charge of construction for the contractors, estimates that with favorable conditions for carrying on, the work will be finished about the first of May. The present contract is for the decking alone, that for the fish sheds not having been let yet.

Amongst the communications received by the city clerk at last night's council meeting was a letter from Premier Arthur Meighen, in reply to an urgent appeal from the Local Board of Trade, that the Premier take up with the government the matter of the refrigerator car shortage at this point. The Premier promised to refer it to Minister of Railways Dr. Reid, for his immediate attention.

LLOYD GEORGE'S SALARY SMALL

Asquith says Premier of Britain Cannot Pay Bills from Pay

LONDON, Feb. 15.—The Premier of Great Britain has a hard time of it trying to pay his bills on a salary of £5,000 a year and his pay ought to be raised, says the former Prime Minister, Herbert H. Asquith, and he ought to know for he occupied that position for 11 years.

As far as known, David Lloyd George has not asked for a raise in pay, but his remunerations has been the subject of an inquiry conducted by a committee of Parliament, which also is examining into the salaries of all the British cabinet ministers.

Mr. Asquith told the committee that the office of the Premier of Great Britain is a very expensive one and his duties can only be properly discharged by an expenditure limited to that amount. The former Prime Minister added that he, himself, was a much poorer man when he left office than when he entered it.

MUCH ENTERTAINING

Mr. Asquith explained that the Premier had to do a great deal of entertaining and afford hospitality to all sort of conditions of people both at home and abroad, but, under the existing arrangement, he had to defray this expense entirely at his own cost.

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Mr. Asquith had a few kind words to say about the privilege which the Premier has of occupying the official residence at 10 Downing Street:

HOUSE RENT FREE

"It is quite true," he said, "that you live in the house free from rent, rates and taxes, but it is a very expensive house to keep up. It is a very inconvenient house in many ways; it requires a large staff and I suspect myself that any Prime Minister who had experience of it as I had would, if he were offered the choice, rather not live in it at all."

The salary of the Prime Minister of Great Britain at present rate of Canadian exchange is equivalent to \$24,500. This compares with a salary of \$50,000 for the Governor General of Canada and \$12,000 for the Prime Minister of Canada.

The President of France receives 600,000 francs a year and a similar amount for expenses, and the President of Germany receives 160,000 marks salary and 600,000 marks expenses.

Members of the Canadian cabinet receive \$7,000 a year.
