SENTENCE FOR CONSPIRATORS

Secretary of Irish Self-Determination League Gets Fourteen Years for Hoarding Arms.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Severe sentences were passed yesterday on five prisoners convicted at Cardiff of hoarding arms and ammunition in connection with an Irish conspiracy. The organizer of the South Wales branch of the Irish Self-Determination League was given fourteen years penal servitude. Others received seven and four years terms.

WELL KNOWN LADY PASSE

Death Occurred This Morning in General Hospital of Mrs. L. W. Patmore.

The death occurred at 3 o'clock this morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital of Emma Patmore, wife of L. W. Patmore, the well known barrister of the firm of Patmore & Fulton. Mrs. Patmore has been seriously ill for some time and her death was not altogether unexpected although the news of it came with a shock to her wide circle of friends in the city. Indeed, Mrs. Patmore was so well known and so popular that a gloom has been cast over the city.

OF ENGLISH BIRTH.

Mrs. Patmore was 44 years of age and was born in Rochdale, Lancashire, England. Her maiden name was Miss Emma Kershaw. She came to Fort Steele, British Columbia, at the age of 18 and was married in 1898 to Mr. Patmore. Besides her husband, she is survived by six children, four daughters and two sons. The oldest of these is Muriel, the wife of R. Walker, former of this city but now of Vancouver. The others are Eileen, William, Louis, Dorothy and Eleanor.

VICTORIA IS FRANTIC OVER HER FINANCES

Makes Demand on Legislature For Relief of Municipalities.

VICTORIA, Nov. 18.—The demand that the Provincial Government give "justice" to the municipalities of British Columbia by resigning was made in a resolution passed by the Victoria City Council yesterday afternoon. The resolution is being forwarded to all the municipalities of the province asking for their endorsement and also to Victoria's members of the Legislature.

JAPAN WILL ASK SIXTY PER CENT. OF TWO OTHER POWERS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The Japanese delegation to the Armaments Conference will ask that Japan be allowed to maintain a navy of capital ships amounting to sixty per cent. of the combined strength of Britain and the United States. She also will ask for defensive type of vessels in approximately the same strength.

PERJURY IN LIQUOR CASE

Employees of Liquor Board Give Contrary Evidence in Case at Cumberland.

VICTORIA, Nov. 18.—Conflict in the evidence of two employees of the Liquor Board, George Morris and L. Wheeler against George Neil and Edda Johnson of Union Bay over an alleged breach of the Liquor Act caused an abrupt adjournment of the Cumberland police court, when the defence counsel denounced the witnesses.

Mackenzie King at Edmonton Is Sure of Coming Victory

EDMONTON, Nov. 18.—That the Liberals will have a majority over all parties in the next Parliament of Canada is the prediction made here by W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party in Canada. He says the Maritime Provinces and Quebec will have an almost solid Liberal representation; Ontario will split almost equally into three parts, Liberal, Conservative and Farmer; British Columbia will return half Liberals, and the prairie provinces will go stronger Liberal than has been generally credited. He points to the results in provincial elections as showing that the cities generally are Liberal.

"Everywhere we go we find people heartily disgusted with the present government," said King, "and there is not the slightest chance of the present administration being returned if appearances and declarations count for anything. On the other hand the Liberals are gaining ground in a steady manner, and I feel in every way confident that we will have a majority over all other groups in the next parliament."

Secret Munition Deal.

Asked regarding the charges made that the government is bringing in vast stores of high explosive ammunition Hon. Mr. King said future revelations will show the extent to which this secret deal has been carried on though it was impossible at this time to have this inquiry made. In fact the Meighen administration was one with a policy of doing public business in a secret manner for the benefit of an influential and wealthy few. Their whole record was one of secrecy and this was one thing of many which made it impossible for Premier Meighen and his government to be returned. Canada was sick of secrecy in public affairs.

CONFERENCE WILL MEET AGAIN MONDAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The armament conference will meet again on Monday next in its third plenary session. In the meantime the various representatives of nations are preparing arguments for special favor.

CANADA NOT IN POSITION HELP RUSSIA FAMINE

Canadian Red Cross Society Deems it Unwise, at This Time to Appeal for Russia.

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—Deeming that no relief organizations in Canada are in a position to help the afflicted Russian people from the famine which grips their country, the Canadian Red Cross Society has decided that it is unwise at this time to make any appeal in Canada for Russian relief. Relief should begin at home and it is needed in Canada at this time, it is generally felt.

LIQUOR CASE GOES TO COURT

Right to Impose Tax on Liquor Imported by Private Dealers to Be Tried.

YANKEE, Nov. 18.—A case to decide the right of the Provincial Governments to impose a tax on liquor imported into the province by private dealers was begun before Mr. Justice Clements yesterday. James Little bought a case of liquor from the Gold Seal Company and refused to pay the eleven dollars provincial tax and suit was brought to test his position.

DISEASE Baffles DOCTORS; CHILDREN DIED IN AGONY

MILTON, Nov. 18.—As a result of a disease, the origin of which is baffling the doctors, two children of James Blacklock died in agony. One doctor believes that the sickness was caused by a fly carrying a contagious disease and depositing it on apples which were eaten by the children.

PETROGRAD HARBOR BLOCKING WITH SILT

PETROGRAD, Nov. 18.—Only 20 ships can find docking facilities for unloading now in this port at one time. Previously it was possible for 99 ships to unload simultaneously but the silting up of the river and the decay of docks make it necessary for many ships to wait their turn since the resumption of shipping activity.

CONSERVATION FOR EMPIRE

Forestry Association Passes Resolution Urging Extension Constructive Policy.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—At the inaugural meeting of the Empire Forestry Association, a resolution was passed urging the early extension of a constructive forestry policy in all parts of the British Empire for the purpose of scientific conservation and prudent exploitation for the benefit of the Empire. The resolution was seconded by Sir George Perley.

When Mackenzie King Was in Prince Rupert.

When Mackenzie King was in Prince Rupert he spent a good deal of time among the citizens, and he certainly heard all their grievances against the Meighen administration. While here also he addressed a public meeting, at which he said:

"Was the G. T. P. policy a wise one? What was Sir Wilfrid's vision when the transcontinental railway was being planned, and his vision of this particular city? I know. It was of ships plying from this very harbor, crossing the Pacific with the products of this country, bringing back other commodities here, making this community one of the greatest marts in the world; of a railway running through a country as fertile as any in the world, with feeders running north and south, tapping the resources of the province, mineral and timber, the great national wealth; a great community with ocean wharves, docks, repair yards, drydocks, roundhouses, hotels, railway stations, and all the sights and signs of a great world metropolis.

"And what have you got today?" enquired Mr. King. "A side line and not a main artery, the difference between the Liberal and Conservative parties."

Two Big Groups in Body Politic.

The Liberal policy of Mr. King was further expounded at that time in the following words:

"Irrespective of the political groups which grow from time to time for political purposes, there are two great parties in the political world, the one progressive and democratic and the other a party of reaction, looking to the big interests and resenting change. The Liberal party has set out to build up the Dominion of Canada, advocated freer markets, naval defence, and had built a national highway with a Pacific terminus. And the Liberal party is anxious to keep up the work and to finish and carry through the plan interrupted ten years ago. It is for you to say whether you wish that work to be accomplished or not. We can go to Eastern Canada and ask for the support of the men in the East, but unless you send us men committed to see that the program is carried out, our hands are tied. For the building up of Prince Rupert there is every reason for your giving us your support. The first thing we have to do is to carry out the policies of our leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and we who have been trained by him will see to it that his every policy will be completed."

Can Anything Be Clearer Than Mackenzie King's Speech?

Can anything be clearer than the statement made by Mackenzie King in his speech here? He knows the conditions; he has visited the city and spent considerable time here. He has accurately sized up the situation and it is to him we have to look for relief.

What a lot of Liberals would like to know of the independent candidate is whether he is backing Mackenzie King, the man who has the will to help us, and will soon be given the power? While we want to send a good man to Parliament and intend to do so, the main thing is that the man who is sent from here shall pledge himself to back up the Liberal leader, who has already placed himself on record in regard to Prince Rupert.

There are two other leaders in Canada today, and only two of any standing. They are Arthur Meighen and T. A. Crerar. Have either of these men visited Prince Rupert? Have they ever by word or sign indicated that they are ready or willing to help us? There is not so much as the wink of an eye from the man Meighen, whom Colonel Peck has so faithfully supported and whose pictures adorn the billboards in this city, to indicate that if he is returned to power he will relieve the railway situation and really place Prince Rupert on the map. Since he has had the reins of office he has tried to drive everything to the south, and we are neglected. In view of this the man for us to support at the present time is the man who is pledged to support this clearly laid down policy of Mackenzie King.

They plan extensive development operations on the "American Boy" mine next year with the shipment of 400 tons of silver ore by way of Prince Rupert in the fall.

Thirty-five surveyors and timber cruisers, many days overdue on the Naas River, reached the city on the Venture today. They had an adventurous trip by trail and canoe.

Seventy-five men arrived in the city today from Goose Bay having been laid off for the winter by the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Co.

Among the officials of the Wallace Shipbuilding Co. who sailed for the south last night on their return to North Vancouver were J. Allen Ritchie, purchasing agent; Hubert Wallace, assistant hull superintendent; and T. H. Allen, hull superintendent. Mrs. Ritchie and Mrs. Allen accompanied their husbands.

Several Police Killed and Wounded and Mob Fired Upon at Bombay.

BOMBAY, Nov. 18.—Disturbances in the native quarter during the procession of the Prince of Wales and following through the European section of the city yesterday were caused by a mob of unemployed mill hands who wrecked and burned a number of tram cars at several points. The mob threw stones at European passers-by.

After several of the police had been killed or wounded in scuffles, which followed the riot, the police fired upon the mob inflicting a number of casualties.

The tramway service was suspended and the mob is still carrying on sporadic demonstrations today.

Archbishop Du Vernet Probes Some National Fallacies and Urges Balance in Social Life

That man is a ministering member of society and not an individual apart from society was the predominating idea of Archbishop du Vernet in an address to the Rotary Club yesterday. That is social idealism, the right balance between extreme individualism on the one hand and extreme socialism on the other. Individualism would sacrifice the rights of society for the sake of the one, whereas socialism would sacrifice the individual for the sake of society. Both extremes were incorrect.

Man was born into the world as a member of society and could not escape from it. At the same time the individual must be developed in order that the best interests of society may be worked out.

In the opening of his address Archbishop Du Vernet told of the vast territory of which he was a sort of travelling superintendent for his church. He was away from home a good deal and for that reason was not eligible for an institution such as the Rotary Club. At the same time no one was so much interested as he in the ethical platform of the Rotary Club. He had made a deep study of Christian ethics and he rejoiced in the motto of the club which was "Service before Self." It was one of the fundamental principles on which society was based.

Problem of Day. One of the great problems of philosophy is the relationship which should exist between the one and the many. For the best results both the individual and society should receive proper attention. There must be no injustice on either side. The pendulum is swinging back and forth, now to individualism and now in the other direction.

"Man has the herd instinct," declared the speaker. "The propagation of the race, and the need of mutual service drawing people together. Men banded together for the purpose of procuring food and defending themselves against enemies. There was no element which caused them to band together like the need of self protection."

"In the early days," said the Archbishop, "the conception of society was crude and the individual was often sacrificed for the benefit of the many. It was in the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth century when the individual came into prominence. This was the period when individualism was rampant. It led to the doctrine of 'Every man for himself.'"

Swing of Pendulum. "Later the pendulum was found swinging the other way and the society side of life was emphasized more and more until there became a danger from false socialism, ready to sacrifice the individual for the sake of society. To recognize and reconcile each led to 'social idealism.'"

The individual apart from society was not recognized. Such an one could not be found. Man comes into the world as a member of society, a ministering member. Mutual service is recognized and this is the ethical platform of the Rotary Club, service before self.

Class Warfare Dander. "The relations of life have become complicated and there is danger today of class warfare. While the Archbishop said he realized that the individual had rights so it is with the class. Progress had been made through class consciousness. If, however, class was put first it led to a dangerous condition. The Archbishop said he had always been in deep sympathy

with labor but he did not believe in that class consciousness which put the interests of class before everything else.

Turning then to the commercial class, he declared that they had dominated society and there was great responsibility on them. There was danger of their carrying too far their determination and if they did so there would be a combination that would sweep them out of existence. The commercial class was vitalizing life. While it was most necessary to the whole of society and had a right to profit, they must have a broad vision as to what was best for the country as a whole.

Nationalism. Dealing then with the spirit of nationalism, the Archbishop said the national and patriotic spirit was necessary but it was simply a step in the evolution of the human race. In Germany there had been a one-sided nationalism which did not recognize that the nation was simply a ministering member of society. Just now there was in progress a conference of nations at Washington to deal with some of the problems which came between nations.

HALF MILLION POUNDS FISH

Big Catches Halibut Arrive in Port From Northern Banks.

MUCH FROM YAKUTAT.

Twenty-five Car Loads Here Is Valued at \$40,000.

Five hundred and twenty-seven thousand pounds of halibut arriving at this port today constitutes a record big day's business for the local fish packing concerns. Fishing conditions for the larger boats on the Yakutat and other banks to the westward are excellent and splendid catches are being made as is manifested by the size of the arrivals here today. The weather, though cold, is clear and the seas are smooth. The price being paid is well over the 9c mark.

A day like this illustrates the importance of the fishing industry to this port for the halibut landed will reach about \$40,000 in value and will require nearly 25 express refrigerator cars to transport it to the Eastern market to which the most of it will be consigned.

"MAIN STREET" DRAMATIZED

Popular Novel Is Stage Play in New York Today.

By BEN DEACON Canadian Press Correspondent.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—The "Main Street" and established recipe for making a popular play is this: Take a plot (a fresh plot is desirable, but if no fresh plot can be obtained a warmed-over plot will do), add equal proportions of crisp, spicy dialogue, local color and characterization, season with wit and a dash of surprise, stir it until it reaches a happy ending and serve garnished with publicity. Harvey O'Higgins and Harriet Ford in cooking up a play out of "Main Street" had to search through the dramatic cook book for a new recipe. They had all other materials in abundance but no plot. "Main Street" is as pitiless as a musical comedy. One closes the book with a feeling that Sinclair Lewis has cheated. He has lured the reader through a mass of detail by remarkable ability to make trite things interesting; has led him hopeful and expectant down numerous blind trails, and then in the end has left him nowhere in particular. As he slowly recovers from his word-jag, the reader realizes that nothing very serious has happened to Carol Kennicott and nothing that would be worth a stickful of type in any newspaper has occurred in Gopher Prairie. Carol has been left in the same exasperating state of vague dissatisfaction and indecision, and the Gopherites are unaltered and unchanged.

STORK SURPRISED

Did Not Expect to Find So Many Supporters at Mining Camp.

Slim Material

Here is mighty slim material for a play. The first act gives us a view of Main Street scenically depicted very much as the author of the book describes it, though possibly with less attention to detail. An attempt is made to convey to the audience an idea of the trivialities of Gopher Prairie life through the opening dialogue between Sam Clark and Dave Dyer, which consists of an apparently interminable reiteration of the fact that it is a warm day. Carol's arrival with Kennicott and their welcome by the town's leading citizens serve to introduce many of the characters of the book, though a few of the most interesting and picturesque, notably Raymie Wether-spoon and the Widow Bogart, have failed to emerge from between the covers. This scene also serves to indicate Carol's immediate distaste for some of the Gopher Prairie creeds and customs. Here we get the first indication of the stage story which the dramatists have evolved from the more or less disconnected episodes of the book. Maud Dyer, whose brief interest in Kennicott was merely a passing incident in the book, is made to suffer from a lifelong infatuation for the doctor in the play, and her love and her jealousy of Carol are indicated in this opening scene. Whiskey Going One Way and Motor Cars the Other Says Collector.

Winnipeg, Nov. 18.—A searching investigation into the alleged smuggling of thousands of automobiles over the border line from the United States to Canada is promised here by T. H. Verner, collector of customs and inland revenue.

The report of the smuggling of cars is substantially true," Mr. Verner declared. "There has been smuggling on a large scale for some time. The situation will be looked into thoroughly, and everything done to check the wave over the border."

Figure Too High. Mr. Verner said 17,000 was too high a figure at which to place the number of stolen and smuggled cars. Many persons drove in and out of Canada, and did not stay in this country; many cars were driven by men claiming to be owners, and customs officials could not investigate the ownership of each car, he said.

There will be no wholesale prosecution of smugglers, Mr. Verner said, although court actions were being taken all the time.

The liquor-smuggling activity was generally in the western provinces, he added. Arrests were being made at the border for liquor smuggling, but as fast as one gang would be "cleaned up" the smugglers would break out in a new place.

May Not Be Same. Border-running of millions of dollars worth of liquor and the theft of thousands of automobiles are not necessarily kindred "industries" operated by the same organization, J. N. MacLean, chief inspector under the Manitoba Temperance act, said today.

Each gigantic illegal organization is a separate entity, in Mr. MacLean's opinion, formed to transact their respective businesses.

Smugglers of booze "do not steal cars or anything else to get it across the lines," he said. "Moreover, they leave a report with the liquor commission as to who they are, what they are and where they are going. Their transaction in obtaining the liquor from the Canadian export warehouses is absolutely legal and, so you can see, they conduct it legally. They pay their good elegant coin for their booze."

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Five acres now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not under lease.

Partnership agreements abolished, but parties of not more than four may acquire for agricultural purposes, with joint residence, up such units necessary improvements as respectively.

Provision made for the sale of five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre including clearing and cultivation of the land before receiving Crown Grant.

Where an applicant in possession of land for three years, and has made the improvements, he may be granted a temporary certificate of ownership and cultivated and residence of at least 3 years is required.

Records, without payment of fee, may be issued provided applicant has made improvements to value of \$10 per acre and residence of at least 3 years, and improvements of at least 3 years is required.

Provision made for the sale of five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre including clearing and cultivation of the land before receiving Crown Grant.

Unimproved areas not exceeding 25 acres may be sold after satisfying real-estate and improvement conditions.

For granting and location of reserves, the applicant must be a Canadian citizen or a person of legal age, and must be a resident of the province.

Mill, factory, or industrial site, on which an applicant has expended at least \$1000, may be sold to the applicant on the condition that the applicant must be a Canadian citizen or a person of legal age, and must be a resident of the province.

Natural gas reserves, accessible to the surface, may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them, within a period of one year after the date of purchase.

FREE CAPTORS FREE GRANTS ACT

The scope of the Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The Act also includes the heirs or devisees of a deceased person who may apply for title under the Act in extended form, for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, with one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to the application are due or payable by soldiers on application received after 25th Oct. 1918. Fees are required for five years.

Provision for return of soldiers' accrued due and unpaid wages, August 1, 1914, on account of payments, see 1st section of the Act.

Interest on arrears of the mortgage of a city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or those to be acquired direct or indirect, registered from an instrument to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for insurance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of land, made, arising rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of condition of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1922.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1912, for systematic development of grazing industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

EATING GRASS MANY DYING

Terrible Conditions in Russia Says Press Association Special Correspondent.

SAMARA, Nov. 18.—(By a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press).—The whole truth about the famine becomes readily apparent after observations here. Reports of millions of people eating grass or lying in a dying condition on the banks of the Volga River or migrating en masse are rather far-fetched.

Entering the famine area the correspondent had provided himself with canned meats and hard bread but was not compelled to use any of it in the first two weeks of travel as food was always available at reasonable prices.

People do not die of hunger in one week. It takes months of underfeeding. Then they reach the point where they are unable to eat food at all. Their hands, feet and stomachs begin to swell or they succumb to an epidemic of malaria or else the new disease described as anuria no cure for which is known here. Or they may be killed by cold winds, snows, and rains which have been setting in for the past two weeks, with each hour taking a toll of hundreds.

Die Before Christmas.

The people of the provinces of Canara, Kazan and Simbirsk are in a starving condition. In these three provinces, there are probably 500,000 children and 1,000,000 adults who must die before Christmas.

The American Relief Administration is feeding barely 200,000 children but is giving no food to the adults. One of the best effects of its food distribution will be to cheapen prices and check the hoarding of food-stuffs.

The Moscow government appears to be unable to send food into this district owing to lack of money and poor organization. Also the typical Russian indifference to misery is evident.

The correspondent while sitting on the platform of a railway station throughout a long, cold night, waiting for a train, saw a barefooted, little insane girl tripping along but the train, hands and other refugees let her wander unaided until she drifted past the Red entry into a waiting room already filled to overflowing with several thousands of persons lying asleep on the floor.

Used to Starvation.

A member of the local Soviet who lived in the United States for seven years, showed us pity but said: "You foreigners do not realize how much our peasants can stand. They are used to starvation."

The famine area does not present a forbidding aspect, except in the fields from which no harvests were obtained. The meadows and grazing lands showed many herds of horses and cattle. The villages seemed abnormally quiet, yet their workers were abroad pulling in winter rye wheat. To the visitor they made the customary charge that if it had not been for the Soviet requisitions their crops would have been sufficient.

"Now our only hope for bread is America," they say; yet many know they must die by winter and accept their fate with stoicism.

"Why leave our homes and go die on the railway stations?" many of them retort when asked why they do not desert their land.

In the Hospitals.

Medical conditions are distressing. The country doctors are unable to practice as they are without medicines and the situation is almost the same in the fifteen hospitals of Samara. Dr. Glasson, the surgeon in one of these hospitals, having 180 patients said: "We have no quinine, no bandages, no aspirin, no chloroform, nothing."

The same condition exists in the children's hospitals and also in the dozens of homes open for the care of refugees, for there are no sanitary arrangements. In one such home 300 children are crowded in two rooms, without blankets, fires or mattresses and with little or no clothing. Their only advantage is that they have a real roof over them and receive hot soup daily.

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
