Germany Will Meet the Indemnity

COMPLETE PREPARATIONS FOR LAUNCHING BIG VESSEL HERE TOMORROW

Germany Accepts Allied Ultimatum Cabinet is Formed

BERLIN, May 11.—The Reichstag has accepted the Allied ultimatum by a vote of 220 to 175. This means that there will be further invasion of Germany if the terms are carried out. Dr. Wirtz has been successful in forming a cabinet and their first acts was to notify the Reichstag that they had agreed to accept the ultimatum of the Allies and asked for immediate decision in regard to the matter. The answer was promptly given and the Allies will be notified of the existence of the Government. The Allies' final demand was that Germany pay \$32,142,000,000. This was given until Thursday next week to say yes or no. An appeal was made by Germany through the United States but Germany was politely told that she must deal directly with the Allies. This was done by the United States taking a place on the counter-ambassadors, thus showing a friendly front.

Germany's unconditional acceptance of the entire reparation terms was delivered to Premier Lloyd George by Dr. Saint-Hamar, German minister to Great Britain, here today.

STRIKE NOW ON STEWART

LONDON, May 11.—The Japanese crown prince was officially received in London and received by the mayor and officials at the Guildhall.

Manager Shipbuilding Plant Tells of Wallace's Idea of Future Operations for Dock

"We are not here alone to finish these two steamers for the Canadian Government but, if business offers, we are here to stay," said H. J. F. Turney, general manager of the Wallace shipyard, when questioned as to the future operation of the local plant by a representative of the Daily News yesterday afternoon. "This depends, of course, on the obtaining of a satisfactory lease, but I do not expect there will be any difficulty in doing that."

"For the next six months and while these vessels are being completed we do not desire to make big profits on repair work, but would be contented to break even with our operating expenses than the Scottish when she does go down. Her trial runs will take place early in November."

Repair Work Next.

Following the completion of the Canadian Thrasher more business will have to be found by the Wallace company for the local plant and Mr. Turney is already alive to this. "Providing that labor costs here are the same as in the south the local yard will be able to compete on the large repair jobs and the yard can be operated but if labor demands a higher price here than in Vancouver or Victoria then the plant cannot continue," states Mr. Turney. The life of the shipyard business now depends on repair work for there are few ships to be built in the immediate future.

"This first six months is in the way of an experiment. If we find that we can continue to operate this yard, and ship repair or other kind of business offers, we shall settle down here and stay permanently. If not we will pack our trunks and take the last vessel out."

Trials in August.

Work at the shipyard on the fitting of the Canadian Scottish will be pushed forward as quickly as possible following her launching. It is likely that she will run her trials in August but this depends on the delivery of the boilers and engines.

On account of the lack of berthing facilities the Canadian Thrasher cannot be launched until after the Scottish has run her trials. The launching of the second vessel will take place in a day or so after the Scottish has left the dock. The Thrasher will be more completely built

Telegrams are said to have been intercepted from Helsinki proving the truth of the assertion.

RIOTING CONNECTION WITH MARINE STRIKE

BALTIMORE, May 11.—Rioting in connection with the marine strike continues. Thirty arrests have been made in connection with four separate demonstrations against strike breakers. There are no indications of a settlement of the strike problem.

OTTAWA, May 11.—The latest issue of the Canadian Gazette contains notice of the incorporation of the Petroleum Corporation of Fort Norman Limited, with head office at Toronto and with a capital of one million dollars.

How Launching will Take Place at Dock Tomorrow

The 8,100 ton steamer "Canadian Scottish," which will be launched tomorrow afternoon from the Wallace shipyard atays Creek, will take the water by means of the hydraulic jack method. After all the keel blocks and shores, the side supports of the vessel, have been removed she will rest entirely on the riding ways, held there by four large triggers, fitted through the ground ways and sliding ways.

One of the ladies of the launching party will actually start the ship in motion by opening a valve which sets off the water pressure releasing the four triggers, each jack exerting a pressure of twelve tons. There are two jacks forward and two jacks aft and when these are released the ship naturally slides down the greased ways propelled by its own weight.

Mrs. Peck, the sponsor, will christen the vessel by breaking a bottle against its side.

Veterans Escort.

On her arrival at the shipyard Mrs. Peck will be met by an escort of twenty veterans of the 16th Battalion, her husband's old command. These will accompany her to the platform where the ceremonies will be conducted.

While the Canadian Scottish slides from the ways to the water Piper Gordon Ross, assisted by local pipers, will play a regimental tune. The Great War Veterans' band is also to take part in the function.

To Make Presentation.

After the launching the party consisting of 20 persons, friends of Mrs. Peck and the company, will go to the general office where the usual souvenir will be presented to the sponsor. Following this refreshments will be served.

The actual hour of the launching will be 1:45 standard time, or 5:45 by daylight saving which has not yet been adopted here.

PIPE M'JOR HERE TO TAKE PART IN LAUNCHING AT DOCK

Pipe Major Gordon Ross arrived this morning on the Prince George from Vancouver to take a leading part in the ship launching tomorrow afternoon. As the steamer made her landing little Miss Lamont, who was also an arrival, danced the highland fling on the main deck in front of the observation room to the strains of the pipe major's music. Her performance met with an ovation from those standing on the dock. As the Canadian Scottish glides into the water from the ways tomorrow afternoon it is expected the piper will ride her down.

John Wiesman was brought here this morning in charge of Constable McArthur of Vancouver charged with defrauding M. M. Stephens of this city of the sum of \$550. Mr. Wiesman is an oil promoter and the charge is said to be in connection with an oil deal. The case will come up in the police court tomorrow.

VICKERS WORKS WILL CLOSE IF STRIKE GOES ON

Would Throw Number of Men Out of Work and Accentuate Condition.

LONDON, May 11.—It is reported that on account of the coal shortage the Vickers Shipbuilding and Engineering Works at Barrow, the largest concern in the United Kingdom, employing 150,000 men, will be closed at the end of the week unless coal mining is resumed.

This action would accentuate the unemployed situation, swelling the number of unemployed. At the end of April the number of unemployed was 1,865,800, with the number working short hours totalling 1,077,000. These figures are exclusive of 1,200,000 idle miners.

REPORT PEACE UPPER SILESIA

Adelbert Korfanty and Allied Commission Come to Arrangement.

LONDON, May 11.—It is reported that negotiations between the inter-allied commission in Upper Silesia and Adelbert Korfanty, leader of the Polish insurgents in that area, has resulted in a suspension of hostilities, says a despatch from Warsaw.

BERLIN, May 11.—German despatches claim that Italians and Germans are fighting side by side against Polish insurgents while there is dissension in the allied ranks in Upper Silesia. British and Italian officials are said to be opposing French officials, complaining of insufficient support at Oppeln.

GRASSHOPPERS ARE MANITOBA MENACE

WINNIPEG, May 11.—Grasshoppers are making their appearance again in sections of Manitoba. J. H. Evans, deputy minister of agriculture has announced.

A conference of district agricultural representatives was held in the parliament buildings to discuss organization for fighting the plague. The sum of \$50,000 is at the disposal of the department of agriculture, and the fight against the pest will start immediately.

Germany Accepts
Allied Ultimatum.

Germany having accepted the ultimatum of the allies, the European situation should settle down very considerably. One of the thorns in the flesh of all the European statesmen was this reparations settlement. In order to get it settled the Germans were keen on stirring up strife in various countries with a view to destroying the solidarity of the demands against them.

Assuming that Germany will now carry out the terms of the agreement, it is to be expected that she will turn her attention to industrial development in order to be able to pay the money. In all probability this will be done quickly for the Germans are a virile and resourceful people and they still have plans for the future.

Interesting Phase of
German Government.

When the German Government was given an ultimatum by the Allies the chancellor and foreign minister conceived the idea of using the United States as a means of securing better terms. They staked their position on the move and the result they were given was so clear that there was nothing for them to do but resign. They failed. As a result they gave place to a new group. They had declared they would never accept the terms offered, but the Reichstag and the people were not behind them. Dr. Wirtz has formed a new ministry in sympathy with the popular opinion and he is now carrying out the decision of the Reichstag. So responsible government as we understand it is being carried out in Germany. Under a fixed government such as that in the United States there would have been a deadlock and no means of overcoming it.

Differential.

In Wages Here.

The question whether there should be higher wages paid here than in other cities of British Columbia is continually recurring and we have not yet heard the last of it. There is a decided difference of opinion in regard to it. There are two arguments used, so far as we know and only two.

The employees say that the cost of living in Prince Rupert is higher than in Vancouver and therefore the men should be paid higher wages. That is the argument in a nutshell.

The employers say that they have to compete with Vancouver and they cannot pay higher wages than are paid there. That too is simple.

The question which arises is as to which side is to give way. The argument of the men is sound, if it is true that living costs are higher. On the other hand there will be no employment here if the employers cannot compete with other places. If there are no industries we shall remain a small town with small town privileges and small town ideas.

Ten Dollar Tax
Liquor Importation.

One of the chief subjects of conversation yesterday afternoon and evening was the ten dollars a gallon import tax on liquors. Up to yesterday the tax was three dollars a gallon so that the amount added under the new budget proposals is seven dollars a gallon.

There is some misconception as to when the new duties come into effect. While the budget has not yet been approved by Parliament, the regulation is in effect now, it being effective immediately the speech is delivered. This is to prevent anyone anticipating the change and laying in a big stock. It is true of all budget proposals.

No Cheap Whiskey
After This.

The imposition of the tax on liquor makes it certain that there will be no cheap liquor under the moderation measure. If there is a tax of about two dollars a bottle it cannot be expected that the price will be low, and possibly it is best that it should be so.

MACHINISTS AT
DOCK WENT OUT

Twenty Men Affected by Differences With Shipyard Firm.

Twenty machinists walked out from the Wallace shipyard yesterday afternoon as a result of the refusal of the company to meet their demand for a wage of 82½c per hour for machinists and engine fitters on repair work. On the demand being made H. J. Turney, manager of the yard, stated that the men could work for the Wallace shipyard at 78c or else the machine shop would be closed. The men refused so the shop was closed at 4 o'clock. The men going out were members of the International Union of Machinists and included Arthur Ellis, the secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, and Len Dewhurst, another prominent member. About twenty men are, so far, affected.

Turney Speaks.

Speaking for the company in regard to the affair, which the men called a lockout and he describes as a walkout, Mr. Turney stated last evening: "Not satisfied with the wages, a demand was made yesterday by the machinists that we answer within half an hour to their request for 82½c per hour for machinists and engine fitters on repair work. It had been agreed before that they would work for 78c on the actual shipbuilding.

"We pointed out to them that after the two ships were completed we would have to compete for repair business with the Vancouver and Victoria yards where 78c and less is paid for similar work and therefore it would be impossible for us to pay higher wages. We might as well make it plain that we are going to stand by this."

Men's Standpoint.

Arthur Ellis, speaking last night of the trouble, stated that other local shops were paying from 82½c to 87½c for similar work on gas boats and these shops were competing with the drydock in gas boat repairing. Wages could not be governed by the rates in Vancouver for living conditions were different here. The men who left the yard intended to stay out until a satisfactory settlement was effected.


