EDITORIAL

MOMENTOUS MESSAGE

Three years ago today at 11 o'clock a. m. there was flashed and the globe, probably, one of the most momentous messages that this world had ever received. It said to the millions then engaged in the most bitter and ghastly struggle of that mortal men had ever engaged in, "cease fire," an order has been arranged." Looking back, even after the short years that have elapsed since the termination of the Titanic struggle, forced humanity through the necessity of right minded men taking stand in the defense of the weaker and weaker nations upon the world, as compared today, it is hard for those who have survived to realize the crisis that mankind has passed through in such a comparatively short space of time. A tremendous upheaval of the earth and upsetting of our cherished and in many ways, abjectly hidebound and narrow-minded beliefs, has been a means of broadening our minds and bringing us into closer touch with the peoples of other lands, who have suffered and gone through such a host of similar heart-breaking tragedies and sufferings. In connection with every other part of the British Empire, as well as other parts of the world, forgetting the enemy comes to the word "Armistice" will be the one thing that throbs in the hearts of the people of the world. The terrible years between 1914 and November 1918, millions of human beings were dying for cessation of hostilities, "peace."

All Look Forward.

It is almost impossible to believe that the experiences through were other than a dream. However, today we all once again what is termed military parlance "as you try" in our various capacities to "carry on" and make the most of the spell of granted to us in the allotted time in which it has pleased to place us. There should be no cynical or critical looking backwards or comment on what has taken place in the past. Everyone should look forward with the one aim in mind to make this world a better and happier place for all of us to live in, and try to profit by the experiences and lessons of the last few tragic years, so that after all the sacrifices of millions of our fellow countrymen made in doing what they thought their duty as they were made in vain. This seems to be the message to be conveyed in all, on commemorating Armistice Day.

Railway Takes Over Shipyard On Monday Morning: Is Said Will Do Railway Work Here

On Monday the railway company takes charge of the local shipyard and will operate it under the management of J. H. Pillsbury. Most of the present staff of shop foremen will be retained and the ship repair work will proceed as usual. This closes the work of the Wallace Company at this port for the present.

While there is nothing definite to announce yet, it is understood it is the intention of the railway company to do a good deal of its car repair work at the yard in this city, as well as building cars and other railway work. The yard is admirably fitted for such a purpose and if this gets going, according to the intimation, there will be a busy time here. There is no other place on the system so well suited for the work and with such good machinery and favorable conditions.

TERRACE WANTS BRIDGE BUILT

Monster Petition Has Been Signed and Forwarded to Victoria Asking Action.

TERRACE, Nov. 11.—A monster petition to the Government of British Columbia asking it to proceed at once with the bridge across the Skeena River at this point has been signed by everyone in the district. The petition states that the people are willing to abide by the decision of the engineers of the department as to the site.

It is understood that the reason for delay in commencing the bridge has been the fact that the people here could not agree where it should be built, one part of the district pulling against the other. Now they have agreed that what they need is a bridge and the experts shall decide where it is to go.

The people here are also very keen to have the road to Kitsumkalum Lake put in shape for traffic. An immense number of oil claims have been staked and there is a mill established at one of the mines. What is needed now is means of transportation.

RAISED FROM MURKY WATERS

Olier Besner's New Studebaker Brought to Surface and Lifted Out.

Olier Besner's new car, which ran backwards and fell into the waters of the harbor on Wednesday was yesterday afternoon salvaged by Swanson's boat Pachena aided by Albert & McCaffery's crane. A diver was sent down and affixed a rope to the submerged vehicle. Then it was raised with windlasses and towed to the Albert & McCaffery wharf where it was lifted clear by the big steel crane and landed safely on the wharf.

The top of the car had disappeared and will not be recovered. A new one will have to be built to replace the other.

The men who fell in the water are today none the worse for their ducking.

Will Be Officially Known in Future as Booth Memorial School.

The school board at their regular meeting last night decided to accede to the desire of the committee in charge of the installation of the Booth tablet at the new school and change the name to the Booth Memorial School. This will be briefer and more suitable, it is thought.

On the tablet will be mention of the reason for the name and hung in the building will be an enlarged photograph of the late Sergeant William Booth, together with the medals and ribbons of the deceased soldier after whom the school is named.

The committee reported that up to the present they had collected \$291.24 toward the fund with which to erect the tablet.

FAMOUS COURT CASE COMING

POPPY LADY TELLS STORY

Is Not Uneasy About Poppy Day for Canada Will Go "Over the Top."

VICTORIA, Nov. 11.—The "Poppy Lady," Madame Berneron, who has been travelling through Canada in connection with the raising of money to aid the French re-establishment and relief work, speaking of the day said:

"The crimson poppy has been adopted by the Great War Veterans as their memorial flower. To be worn by every citizen on Armistice Day. Not to have the emblem commercialized, these flowers have been made by the women and children living amid the ruins of the battlefields, at the very places where the boys fought and won, and where so many sleep."

The speaker stated that the French Children's League is furnishing these poppies, and the proceeds above the cost derived from the sale of them will remain right here in the local community. About one and a half million poppies have been shipped to Canada, free transportation having been furnished by the C. N. R.

Children's League

Speaking of the Children's League in France, the visitor said that it is a clearing house for the relief work among the children of the war-torn areas, and the funds raised will ameliorate their condition. The honorary president of the league is Madame Millerand, wife of the French President, who has been heart and soul in relief work ever since the declaration of war. She has given many hours daily to it, and still continues to do so, despite the demand upon her time as first lady of the land.

United Effort.

Referring briefly to the condition of France, Madame Berneron said that the French people were united in their effort to bring their country back to the place she occupied before the war. She declared that in the Ypres district alone that for over 200 miles the ruins could not be replaced by permanent structures before four or five years. "Anything we say about the conditions of France is above what it really is. Words cannot describe the awful sufferings of many of our people," she said.

"I am not uneasy about the results of Poppy Day," said Madame Berneron. "Canada will go over the top all right, and the red poppy of Flanders' fields the flower immortalized in verse when it bloomed over the grave of the hero dead sleeping there, will prove a new bond of friendship between us."

DEPUTY MINISTER OF LANDS EXPECTS COME BACK BY THIS ROUTE

Is in Prince George Making Personal Inspection of Timber Limits for Projected Pulp Mill.

George R. Naden, deputy minister of lands for the provincial government, who passed through the city on Wednesday morning enroute to Prince George where he will personally examine the timber properties on which the Fraser Timber Syndicate are endeavoring to obtain stumpage rates for their proposed pulp and paper mill, expects to return to Prince Rupert by next

Thursday night's train. He will spend a day here, returning to Victoria by the Princess Mary the next afternoon.

The principals of the syndicate who conferred recently at Victoria with the Department of Lands, have returned to Eastern Canada but expect to be back to the province before the end of the year when final arrangements will likely be entered into. Robert Tyhurst, the local manager at Prince George, has also returned to Prince George from Victoria. The only matter that is now holding up the actual building of the mill at Prince George is these negotiations between the syndicate and the provincial government which may soon be settled. The government is attempting to ensure a perpetual supply of timber.

JAP FORESTRY EXPERT VISITED

Tsuneko Hayashi Making Six Months' Tour of United States and Canada.

Tsuneko Hayashi, forestry expert for the Imperial Government of Japan, was a visitor in this city early in the week. He arrived on Tuesday from the Queen Charlotte Islands by the Prince Albert and left on Wednesday morning's train for Vancouver by way of Lucerne.

Mr. Hayashi is making a six months' tour of United States and Canada studying forestry conditions. He expects to spend Christmas in New York and, returning to Japan in the spring, will make exhaustive reports to his government.

Mr. Hayashi was especially impressed with the stands of timber on the Queen Charlotte Islands and considered that the spruce should be especially adapted to the manufacture of pulp and paper.

Mr. Hayashi's office address is Sapporo, a city in the north of Japan.

TOO MUCH SHOOTING ON KAIEN ISLAND BY ILLEGAL POT HUNTERS

Complaints have come to the Daily News office from time to time of men who go out hunting on Kaien Island. It may not be known to everyone that the whole of the island is a perpetual game reserve. There are both deer and grouse on the island but unfortunately the pot hunters are killing them off.

HEAR CONCERT BY WIRELESS

Group of Edmonton People Enjoy San Francisco Concert by Telephone.

EDMONTON, Nov. 10.—Transmitted over 1,400 miles from San Francisco to Edmonton by wireless telephony, instrumental and vocal selections were heard clear and distinct by the listeners, as on an ordinary telephone during a demonstration near here.

This achievement it is asserted, makes a world's record for the transmission of wireless telephony over land. Water is a much superior conductor for the electric waves than the solid earth as so far, greater distances have been achieved with wireless telephony at sea than on land.

The wizard who brought this accomplishment was W. W. Grant, chief radio engineer with the Bert L. Perry Company, Limited, and formerly of the Dominion Radio Service, who has been carrying out some tests at Edmonton for the Bert L. Perry electrical company in connection with the work now being under-

taken by the company in installing a wireless service to the oil fields and outposts of the north country.

Makes Local Station.
 Where the experiments were carried out is a conspicuous landmark in the city, being the Dawson Estate, on the south side of the river, east of the low level bridge. Here adjoining the Dawson house on the high river bank there still remained a part of the old wireless installation of the Athabasca Oil Company. This was dismantled when the war came, and little was left save a small building and the pole forming a part of the "aerial."

The use of this building has been obtained from Mr. Dawson, and here Mr. Grant assisted by Mr. Perry, installed a temporary receiving set for the purpose of commencing a series of tests. These are for the purpose of ascertaining the power which will be required for instituting the northern service. A temporary transmitting set is to be installed and tried out during the coming month. Mr. Grant has been in charge of the government experimental wireless station at High River, Alberta.

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ADVERTISE FOR LIFE PARTNERS

German Bureaus Do Large Business in Finding Mates for Women and Men.

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—The numerous matrimonial bureaus of Berlin, where a spouse may be had for the payment of 10 marks registration fee, are doing a rushing business. The advertising columns of the newspapers are being utilized. "Prospects" are being bombarded with letters and circulars extolling the advantages and virtues of the several bureaus and being scattered broadcast.

The marriage literature makes its principal appeal to the "home-loving instinct" of men, who are in much greater demand in the marriage market than women.

The press agents, however, are not always discriminating or discreet in the selection of "eligible males." One bureau sent a letter to a married man man with a large family urging him to "marry happily; don't select your acquaintances at random from the streets; send us 10 marks and we'll find you a good wife."

Those Who Marry.
 The man became very indignant and wrote a scornful letter about it to his favorite newspaper.

Most of the marriages arranged through the matrimonial bureaus are women more or less advanced in years, and of doubtful physical attraction, but with substantial bank accounts, and young men out of work or weary of working, said the agent of a bureau. The financial arrangements are agreed upon before the marriage.

One young man who accepted a much older woman as wife after she had assured him she had money to support him, brought suit for divorce, alleging he had been deceived and that the woman really had very little money. The woman admitted that she had misrepresented her income, but declared she felt justified because of the lonely life she had been living, with no opportunity to become acquainted with marriageable men.

Few Young Wives.
 While the young, attractive girls who make application for husbands are comparatively few, according to the agents, scores of young men apply for wives, virtually always with the stipulation that they must be wealthy or well-to-do. Formerly the chief women applicants were servant girls. Shop girls seldom patronize the marriage bureaus.

Scores of marriages are made through the medium of the matrimonial bureaus every month, and their popularity has steadily increased since the war, which left German women in a large and conscious majority.

NO ARRANGEMENTS FOR FUNERAL OF LATE MR. MELVIN

No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral of the late George Melvin, who was yesterday found dead in his shack on Third Avenue opposite the Government buildings. He was lying on his bed fully dressed. Dr. J. P. Cade was called and stated he had been dead some hours. He had a small amount of money on his person.

Mr. Melvin had lived here since the early days, being engaged as a watchmaker and dentist, at both of which professions he was an expert. He was about 70 years of age.
