First Step Is Taken Toward Pulp Mill L FROM WRECKED STEAMER ALASKA CAUSED LOSS OF LIVES

Water Agreement Was Unanimously Passed by Council

Last night the City Council unanimously agreed to granting Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Company Limited an amount not to exceed 3,000 gallons per minute, to be used in connection with the proposed pulp mill which is to be erected in the city. The stipulation being made that the water taken shall not interfere in any way with the present or future requirements of the city.

MOONER IS HELPLESS AT BLUNT'S REEF

FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—The steamer Multnomah, 909 tons, has been disabled through a hole in her propeller and is lying helplessly near Blunt's Reef where the Alaska wrecked, says a wireless message. She carries a crew of 25 and was enroute from Seattle to San Francisco.

SELLERS OF BEER MUST GO TO JAIL

Heavy Fines on Clubs at Vancouver That Broke Moderation Law.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 9.—Three sentences of six months each were announced yesterday in the police court here in the cases of offenders against the Moderation Act. These were for selling beer in clubs. Appeals are being entered in each instance. A fine of \$1,000 each was imposed on the Campaigners Club and the Overseas Mechanics' Club for selling beer on the premises.

FAMINE THROES RUSSIAN HORROR

Terrible Picture of Starvation and Death Are Given by American.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—Thousands of Russian refugees are pouring into Brest Litovsk, many crawling on their hands and knees, too weak to stand, and scores are dying along the roads. An appalling picture of desolation, death and devastation in Russia were given by F. Thompson of the American relief administration. The hunger pangs were horrible. The bodies of the victims swelled and the cheeks puffed out, this stage being the prelude to death.

GOLF PLAYER STRUCK BY AN AUTOMOBILE

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 9.—Douglass Edgar, twice holder of the Canadian open golf championship, died here after being struck by an automobile.

WILL GOVERNMENT TAKE ANY ACTION REGARDING FISHING?

Says the Victoria Colonist of recent date:

"Fishing companies on the Pacific, especially those bringing fish from the British Columbia banks to the ports of Prince Rupert and Vancouver, are awaiting the action of the Canadian Government in response to that of the United States, which recently put into effect the statute forbidding entry of Canadian fishing vessels to United States ports. During the war this restriction was suspended.

"The action the Canadian Government will take is of vital interest to the Pacific. It may be a denial of Canadian ports to American vessels. As it is estimated that three-fourths of the cod and halibut vessels operating off the British Columbia coast and Vancouver are Americans, the creation of a barrier to these vessels would be a serious matter for the fish companies."

BODY OF DROWNED MAN IS RECOVERED FROM LAKELSE LAKE

The body of Fred Guegan, who was drowned in Lakelse Lake on Sunday, was recovered yesterday according to word which reached the local provincial police office last night. It appears that Guegan was rowing a boat out of the lake into the river and it capsized in a riffle, the unfortunate man being unable to reach shore. There were two witnesses to the accident standing on the beach. Guegan was well known in the Lakelse district and is survived by a widow.

ANOTHER CANADIAN FREIGHTER ASHORE

HALIFAX, Aug. 9.—The Canadian freighter, Lady of Gaspe, struck on Thrum Cape shoals in a dense fog and probably will be a total wreck. The crew escaped.

DE VALERA IN CONFERENCE WITH MEMBERS

DUBLIN, Aug. 9.—All the members of the Republican Parliament conferred with De Valera today. The first matter considered was the desirability of making representations in regard to the conditions of the internment camp of which the members complained.

PLANNING FOR STREET WORK

Council Adopts Bylaw for Grading Section 5 Streets Under Local Improvement.

A report from the Board of Works, dealing with permanent street grading in Section 5, was received and adopted by the city council last night with instructions that the City Engineer bring in further estimates on the work. Estimates on part of the proposed improvements were brought in. These were for Fifth Avenue, between Fulton and McBride Streets at a cost of \$22,845.79; Dunsuir Street, between Fourth and Fifth Avenues, \$4,822.98; and McBride Street, from Fifth to Sixth Avenues, \$4,339.32.

Other streets for which estimates are to be submitted are: Fourth Avenue, Section 5, from Agnew Place, east; Fulton Street from the Fire Hall to Sixth Avenue; Fifth Avenue from Fulton Street to Musgrave Place, and Tallow Street from Fifth Avenue to Sixth Avenue. It is proposed to combine all the work under one local improvement bylaw.

JAPANESE KILLED.

HIROSHIMA, Aug. 9.—One hundred persons were killed or injured here when a government powder magazine exploded from an unknown cause.

Captain and Crew of Anyox Commended for Rescue Work; Horribly Smeared with Oil

EUREKA, Cal., August 9.—The freighter Anyox did splendid work in rescuing drowning persons after the wreck of the steamer Alaska, and Captain S. Sloddy and crew have been commended for it. One of their lifeboats rescued thirty persons clinging to wreckage in as many minutes. The Anyox formerly was engaged in carrying copper from Anyox to Tacoma. Recently she has been carrying the product of the Ocean Falls mill to American ports. Luckily she was near by at the time of the accident.

Many people were lost owing to the large quantity of oil on the water. The bodies and clothing of the persons in the water became saturated with oil and some slipped back into the water from the arms of would-be rescuers.

The bodies were so smeared with oil that those recovered in many cases could not be identified at the morgue and had to be washed with gasoline.

There is a constant patrol along the beach opposite Blunt's Reef, searching for the bodies of the missing. The actual number lost may never be known as the purser's records sank with the ship.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—The recovery of 18 bodies from the wreck of the steamer Alaska leaves about 30 people unaccounted for. Survivors to the number of 199 landed safely. One Canadian known to be on board has been found dead. He is named Frank and is from Winnipeg.

Victoria Survivors.
EUREKA, Aug. 9.—(Noon).—Among the survivors of the wrecked Alaska who are ill or injured in hospitals here are Mr. and Mrs. J. Wyzauski of Victoria.

BODIES WERE BURNED BEYOND RECOGNITION

HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 9.—Fifteen men, unauthorized persons aboard, were burned to death in the wreck of the Gulf Coast freight train. The bodies were burned beyond recognition.

MISSING BANKER IS HIDING IN MEXICO

CHIHUAHUA, Mexico, Aug. 9.—Warren Spurgin, the missing Chicago banker, is hiding near this city under an assumed name and will fight any movement to extradite him and will appeal to the authorities for permission to remain in Mexico, according to men who are in touch with him.

SINN FEIN MAY AGREE

Settlement of Irish Question Likely With Last Obstacle Removed.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—A correspondent of the London Times learns from well informed sources that the British offer to Sinn Fein is likely to be accepted. Lloyd George has ordered the release of John J. McKeown, the Sinn Fein convict of the murder of a constable, thus removing the last obstacle to an amicable discussion.

It is understood that the officials of Dublin Castle took their own initiative in refusing to release McKeown.

ANOTHER SHIP WAS WRECKED

Pacific Mail Steamer San Jose Hits Reef in Mexican Waters.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 9.—The Pacific Mail steamer San Jose, two thousand tons, struck a reef near Ascension Island in Mexican waters at midnight last night and will probably be a total wreck. There were 33 passengers and a crew of 66 aboard.

Travelling from Panama to San Francisco, the United States ship Farquhar left port this morning and is expected to reach the scene of the wreck about 4 o'clock this afternoon. It will be the first rescuing boat, it is believed. Details are meagre.

Passengers Landed.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 9.—All the passengers from the steamer San Jose have been landed and an effort is being made to get the vessel off the San Pablo Reef by her own engines, says a wireless despatch.

TEACHERS FROM BRITAIN HERE

Reach Canada and Will Attend League of Empire Conference At Toronto.

HALIFAX, Aug. 9.—To develop a better understanding of the education needs of the Empire by bringing together the members of the teaching profession, 77 members of the Imperial Union of Teachers have arrived here from England and will proceed to Toronto to participate in the League of Empire conference, after which they will visit various parts of the Dominion to advance the plan for the interchange of teachers between the nations of the Empire.

MAQUINNA STRUCK A ROCK IN THE FOG AT QUATSINO SOUND

VICTORIA, Aug. 9.—The Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Maquinna which plies from this port up the west coast of Vancouver Island, struck a rock in the fog at Quatsino Sound on Saturday. She was not seriously damaged and came home under her own steam. She will dry-dock at Esquimalt.

DAMAGE BY HAIL TO FRUIT AT SUMMERLAND

SUMMERLAND, Aug. 9.—The damage by hail to apples and peaches in this district is estimated at \$50,000, according to Fruit Inspector Tait.

Fundamentals
Of Prosperity.

A little book recently published by Roger W. Babson on "The Fundamentals of Prosperity" should appeal to a great many people in Prince Rupert, because prosperity is the one thing most of us are looking for. Most people want to make money and consider the man who makes most to be the most prosperous man in the community. The dollar is the standard of success.

If the dollar was considered the standard of success in newspaper work very few newspapermen would ever be successful. There are some newspaper men, for instance, who consider making a good newspaper to be success, rather than making money from the business.

Babson in his book speaks of several essentials to success. He mentions integrity, industry, co-operation, faith and vision. He shows that there is no security without integrity. Banks may have strong vaults, but unless their employees can be depended on the funds and valuable papers contained therein may be stolen. Even our money or securities may be fraudulent. The very corner stone of success is integrity.

Industry the Basis
Of All Success.

People who succeed are those who work hard. If anyone tells you that success is a matter of luck, don't believe them. It is nothing of the sort. We make our own success. Of course there are people who work hard but because they have some foible that draws them back they never get ahead. Of one thing you may be certain, and that is that without industry you cannot succeed. The specialist is the man who has prepared himself for a special kind of work by means of industry. He has worked hard and is then by continuing to work better able to succeed. Honest work is what developed all the great things we use. It is not necessary to turn to Edison for an example. There are plenty all around us. The man who works does not always seem to do it. He does not fuss and create an impression of industry. And yet he works. Laziness and extravagance were once looked upon as sins. They are occasionally worshipped as virtues.

Co-operation
Still Counts.

A man may work alone for a century and he will not get far. If he will make a success of life he must learn to co-operate with others. We can't live to ourselves, and when we die we remain either a pleasant memory or we cause a great deal of distress and leave memories that all would efface. We cannot even die to ourselves. All civilization is dependent on the power of people to co-operate. A letter signed by the Prince Rupert Swimming Club executive and published elsewhere is worth quoting. It says: "Some people have the habit of harshly criticizing us. We ask them to abstain from such criticism which takes the joy out of life and discourages those trying to help the community as a whole." The Swimming Club is a cooperative movement, organized for the public benefit and with no thought of profit to the members. They give time and effort and get nothing in return except some occasional abuse. So it seems to be with any who try to serve the public. There are always enough people who never do anything themselves but who take it upon themselves to criticize the manner in which others do it. That new phrase, "If you can't boost, don't knock," is a pretty good one. The whole of civilization is dependent on the ability of people to co-operate, whether it be in business, in social life or even in sports.

Faith and Vision
Go Hand in Hand.

Faith and vision go hand in hand toward the desired end. The man who sees beyond his own little surroundings and notes the effect of the action of today on the life tomorrow is a man of vision. To carry on with something beyond today in view there must be faith. The man of integrity who is industrious and who works hard in hand with his fellows may yet fail to get far beyond the common run unless he has a vision of the future and faith in himself, his fellows and his ideals. To live for the future is perhaps the greatest impulse a man can have. It is always before him.

Possibly talking about integrity, industry, co-operation, vision and faith does not help much, but that is what the little book does. It also talks about the influence of the church and religion and speaks of both as valuable. At any rate, "Fundamentals of Prosperity" is a valuable inspirational volume written by a business man and can be read with pleasure and profit by any who are interested in seeing the world prosper.

NOT RECEIVING
SQUARE DEALMeeting of United Tribes at
Port Essington Takes Up
Reservation Question.

PORT ESSINGTON, Aug. 8.—There were 50 Indians in attendance at the meeting of the United Tribes of Northern British Columbia held in the Band Workers Hall here on Saturday night. Henry D. Pierce, the president, was in the chair and Sam Bennett delivered an address of welcome to the representatives.

The official report of the Canadian Parliament was read and, after careful consideration the meeting decided that the government was using its power and authority to override the interests of the Indians and was treating them in high handed and arbitrary manner. It was decided unanimously that money be raised to meet the future court expenses.

It was also decided that the Indians be represented by a council nominated and paid by them. Two new tribes were accepted for membership and it is expected that others will come in later and that all will be united one body and head.

47,000 Acres Cut Off.

Excerpts from official reports were read and dealt with and among them were the following: "There are twelve hundred reserves in British Columbia and the total cut-offs were 47,000 acres without the consent of the Indians." Official report by Sir James Longhead on June 28, 1920. In this report Sir James gave assurance that the Privy Council had rejected the claims of the Indians. It could not give consideration to so important a problem unless the government set the case in motion and this the government refused to do.

Worth the Large Sum.

"The total cut-offs amounted to \$1,059,49 acres and had two valuations — one, \$1,527,704.72 and the other, \$1,247,912.22. The amount would be equally divided between the province and the Dominion." Report of April 6, 1920.

The natives have approached the provincial and federal governments and have always employed peaceful channels. They have had confidence in the past and continue to be sure that they will be justly dealt with in spite of the fact that the door of the Canadian Government seems to be closed against them.

MINE TO COMPETE
RUPERT BUSINESS

EDMONTON, Aug. 9.—Mine head coal will be a strong competitor in meeting the demand for a good domestic fuel next winter throughout the 1800 miles of territory lying between Winnipeg and Prince Rupert.

The mine, which has been intermittently operated for the past four years, changed hands on June 28th last. The Alberta Standard Coal Co. entered into possession on that date, and has had a strong force of men at work ever since producing coal and doing development work and improving facilities of the property in every line.

Ten Years Ago

WILL BE DELAY IN
GRAND TRUNK AWARD

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—It will probably be some time before the Grand Trunk arbitration board is in a position to make an award. Sir Walter Gessels, Sir Thomas White, and Hon. William Taft, the members of the board, are now, it is stated, examining the evidence taken during the sittings. This examination will probably consume some time, but it is only preliminary to the meetings of the board at which the award will be discussed. Announcement of the award will be made to the government before it reaches the public.

The question of appointing a new board of management for the Canadian National Railways, including the Grand Trunk system is awaiting the return of the premier.

CANCELLATION OF RESERVE.

Notice is hereby given that the reserve against the acquisition of coal under the "Coal and Petroleum Act" established by order dated 13th February, 1920, and published in the British Columbia Gazette on the 12th of February, 1920, is cancelled, except in so far as the same relates to the following areas:

1. All the lands lying within the boundaries of the drainage areas of the Skeena River above and including the Skeena River, the Little Skeena River, the Skeena River, above and including Skeena and Indian Creeks.

2. All that portion of Vancouver Island lying easterly of the following described boundaries:
Commencing at a point on the West Coast of the Island at the mouth of Muir Creek, thence following the western boundary of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Belt to the southeasterly corner of the Strathcona Park Reserve, thence west following the south boundary of the said reserve to its southwest corner; thence north following the west boundary of the said reserve to its northwest corner; thence west along the south boundary of Sayward and Rupert Districts to the westerly boundary of the watered of Skeena River, thence north westerly along the westerly boundary of the watershed of said Skeena River, through Skeena Lake and Skeena River to the south boundary of Township 3, Rupert District, thence west along the south boundary of Townships 2, 4 and 10 to the Pacific Ocean, and including all the lands between the boundaries of the Skeena River, Skeena Lake and Skeena River, Skeena Lake and North and South Skeena, Skeena and Highland.

The cancellation of this reserve shall not take effect and staking for coal shall not be lawful until notice of such cancellation is published for sixty (60) days in the British Columbia Gazette and in a newspaper published or circulating in each of the Districts of the Province of B. C.

This notice shall in no wise affect the reserve against the acquisition of Coal, Petroleum and Natural Gas in the Skeena River District, established by notice in the British Columbia Gazette on the 27th of March, 1915, which reserve is still in force and effect.

City Council Last Night Decided Terms For Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co.

The city council last night decided on terms for an agreement to be entered into with the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. in regard to supplying of electrical energy for pulp mill purposes. The company will be required to pay \$25 per horsepower year with a minimum charge of \$500 per month, this to become effective at the expiry of the present contract on March 8, 1922 or sooner if arranged. There will be a sliding scale for lighting rates from 3.33c to .65 per kilowatt hour.

WAR MEDALS BEING PAWNED

Montreal Reports Many Men Who Won Decorations Are Disposing of Them.

Montreal, Aug. 8.—War medals issued to Canadian veterans of the great war are, through dire necessity, beginning to find their way in large numbers into the hands of collectors and stores which supply collectors.

Enquiries at ten pawnshops on one street and within three blocks brought out the fact that at least twice a week some ex-soldier will endeavor to bargain away the medal commemorating the war and given to him in acknowledgement of his courage and fortitude. In most cases the reason given is that he is out of work, has no money and is hungry.

er remarked, "Oh yes, we had one man in here last week who wanted to sell his medal. I don't know what you call it, but it was a silver cross and had a purple and white ribbon." Presumably a Military Cross. "But," continued the man, "I would not buy such a thing from any man, it is Government property and I don't want any trouble with that institution. The tales these men tell are pitiful, and they are true, in the majority of cases. In most cases where a pawnbroker had taken the medal the man had redeemed it later, although some cases were mentioned in which the medals had been sold outright. Even the posthumous medals given to the mothers of the men who fell in France are pawned, and the ex-service badges which are worn in the lapel of the coat have been taken in the pawnshops for sale, but none have been pawned because the proprietor would not be able to get rid of them should he take them.

Souvenirs Also.
Souvenirs gathered probably under great danger in France have also passed from the hands of their owners to the man who makes a hobby of collecting these things and weaving a story around them—having already been told the actual story of how the bomb or helmet or some such thing had been secured—and all for the sake of a dollar or so.
