German Situation Is All Absorbing IRISH MEETING AT VANCOUVER CAUSES MUCH EXCITEMENT; OTHERS BANNED

British and French Labor Protests at German Treatment

PARIS, April 23.—The communist party has placarded the streets with a manifesto declaring that the German gold is the property of the German people and declares that the reparations question is a problem for the classes. The manifesto requests the workers not to respond to the mobilization orders.

LONDON, April 23.—The labor executive and parliamentary committee of the union's congress have protested against the repatriation of the Ruhr coal fields by the French. The protest is for settlement by neutral arbitration of an impartial court on all questions regarding German obligations and protests that the repatriation of Germany will make misery for central European countries.

SETTLEMENT OF IRISH TROUBLE IS POSSIBLE

Derby Said to Be Meeting Cardinal Logue and De Valera

DUBLIN, April 23.—Freeman's press says the Earl of Derby is in London conferring with the League and De Valera. The government announced today that South Ireland's request for postponement of the Irish settlement cannot be granted. The belief is growing that there will be a peaceful settlement of the Irish question. It is understood that the Government and Sinn Fein leaders may meet today.

John Harrison, farmer, and Charles Loughlin were shot by revolutionaries and Thomas Logan was killed by the military while running away after he was captured.

Such damage was done when an attempt was made to blow up railway bridge at Castletown.

SINN FEIN BOLSHEVIK

Attorney-General Says Will Make Evidence Public in Few Days.

LONDON, April 23.—Evidence that there is connection between the Bolsheviki Government of Russia and the Sinn Fein movement in Ireland has been found, it was stated in the House of Commons yesterday by Dennis Henry, attorney-general for Ireland.

Mr. Henry promises to make the evidence public in a few days.

LOOKING FORWARD TO HUNDRETH YEAR

Former Senator Chauncey M. Depew Says 87th Birthday Not Worth Comment.

NEW YORK, April 23.—On the event of his eighty-seventh birthday today, former Senator Chauncey M. Depew said that the occasion was unworthy of much comment but that he was looking forward with enthusiasm to entering his hundredth year.

GERMANY EVADES GOLD QUESTION

Agrees Not to Export It Before October 1.

PARIS, April 23.—Germany, instead of either agreeing to or refusing to transfer the gold reserves of the Reichbank to the Allies within the occupied territory of Rhineland as the Allies demand, say they will agree to export or permit exportation of the gold from Germany before October 1.

VANCOUVER, April 23.—The New York Colored Giants defeated the Vancouver Pacific International League team yesterday by a score of four to two in an exhibition game yesterday afternoon.

SPEEDING BUSINESS DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, April 23.—On Monday, April 25, will be the last day on which private members' resolutions and bills have precedence. After that date Government business will have the right of way on Mondays.

GERMANY WILLING TO RECONSTRUCT DEVASTATED LAND

LONDON, April 23.—Germany has sent a note to the British Government reiterating her complete willingness to undertake the reconstruction of devastated France.

LOGGING STRIKE IS IN PROSPECT

Northern Part of Vancouver Island Likely to be Tied up Says Member for District.

VICTORIA, April 23.—Strikes in the logging camps of Vancouver Island with the possibility of the supply of timber for the mills being cut off, is predicted by Rev. Thomas Menzies, M.P.P. for Comox, who is here to discuss with the Government the labor troubles that are threatening the activities of the upper part of the island.

The trouble, Mr. Menzies says, started when wages were cut 10 per cent.

OLD COUNTRY GIRLS SMILED FOR CANADA

One Hundred and Fifty Domestic Sailed from Liverpool on Metagama Today

LONDON, April 23.—One hundred and fifty young women sailed on the steamer Metagama from Liverpool today for Montreal to enter domestic service in Canadian homes, where positions have been found for all at £6 per month.

Crawford Followers Forced Kiss Union Jack Following Irish Meeting in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, April 23.—A crowd of five thousand people waited three hours outside the Dominion Hall last night while Lindsay Crawford, of Toronto, addressed a meeting under the auspices of the Irish Self-Determination League.

Half an hour after the meeting had closed and the police had announced that Crawford had left the hall, the crowd reluctantly dispersed voicing determination to find Crawford after having persistently tried to drown the brass bands and the singing of patriotic songs.

There were only a few interruptions in the hall and as the people emerged they doffed their hats to the Union Jack. There were a few fights and some compulsory kissing of the national emblem.

Efforts were made yesterday by the members of the British Empire League to prevent the Crawford meeting. The mayor and council were asked to prohibit it. This was not done but today Mayor Gale issued a proclamation that no further meetings were to be held by Crawford in the present state of public feeling.

ARMED BANDITS ROB \$200,000 FROM A JEWELLERY STORE

CHICAGO, April 23.—Armed bandits entered the jewellery store in the downtown district, robbed the place of \$200,000 in cash and jewellery and escaped.

SIR SAM HUGHES ILL.

OTTAWA, April 23.—The condition of Sir Sam Hughes, who is ill here, is unchanged this morning.

Two Badly Injured When Way Freight Was Wrecked Sixty Miles East of Here

Samuel J. Douglas, fireman, and John A. Sutherland, engineer, remain in the hospital suffering from bad burns and other injuries as a result of the way freight running into a bad rockslide along the Skeena River about sixty miles east of here last night.

A big slide came down over the snow sheds driving them out of place and, owing to the bad lighting and the curves, the engineer did not see the obstruction until too late and crashed right into it, turning the engine end for end and piling the tender on top of it and damaging badly six freight cars. Conductor Abbott and the two brakemen were not injured.

Immediately after the accident, which took place about 10:30, the news was flashed to the city and Superintendent Walton at once rushed a special train to the scene with Dr. Eggert on board to look after the injured men. This was followed as soon as possible by a wrecking crew and work is proceeding as fast as possible clearing up the debris of the wreck and removing the rocks.

KIDNAPPING CASE COMES INTO COURT

E. Michelson Arrested on Charge of Stealing 40 Cases of Liquor.

The slide is an extensive one and its removal will take some time. A crew from Smithers is working from the other end, and the utmost despatch will be used in clearing the line and getting the trains through.

The shed that was damaged was the most easterly one of the series.

Very favorable reports are received from the General Hospital this afternoon as to the condition of the injured. Both sustained severe burns but Engineer Sutherland, with a broken leg, is the worst. The condition of neither is critical although the doctors were kept busy during the night and this morning attending them.

The regular eastbound passenger train, which was due to leave here at 11:15 this morning, will not get away until 7 o'clock this evening on account of the trouble at Salvers where the wreck occurred. A snowshed practically collapsed over the locomotive, cars and the line with a big quantity of sliding rock and earth behind it.

LEAVE FOR STATES

Irish Were Leaving That Country Reason for Prohibition.

DUBLIN, April 23.—The decree of the Irish republican parliament prohibiting emigration from Ireland "without proper authority" was occasioned by the heavy increase of emigration to the United States of late.

VICTORIA, April 23.—The tenders for the construction of the road at Alice Arm to connect the wharf with the town were opened yesterday, but the contract will not be let until next week.

BOLSHEVIK TRADE COMMISSIONER IS TO VISIT CANADA

LONDON, April 23.—Leonid Krassin, head of the Bolsheviki trade commission in Britain, will visit Canada at the end of May. The visit will be purely commercial in character, it is stated.

SNOW STORM IN ALBERTA

LETHBRIDGE, April 23.—Southern Alberta is in the grip of a snowstorm today. This morning at Nanton the snow was eight inches deep and there is more or less snow everywhere. Seeding operations are temporarily held up.

**C. N. R. OFFICIAL SAYS
 BUSINESS IMPROVING**

Robert Creelman Gives Interview in Edmonton Regarding Prospects

EDMONTON, April 23.—Visiting this city after an extensive tour that took him to many of the coast cities as well as the large centres of the Eastern states, Robert Creelman, assistant passenger traffic manager of the Canadian National Railway, stated that a general improvement of business is everywhere prevalent and that the present season should witness great strides along stable industrial lines. Mr. Creelman is accompanied by W. C. Muir, general manager of the Canadian National Express Company with headquarters in Winnipeg.

Edmonton and Alberta generally, Mr. Creelman says, is particularly fortunate in having returned to almost normal conditions. In the United States a general chaos in business and industry exists and it is expected that a considerable time will elapse before the United States will return to a normal and settled basis.

While in the United States Mr. Creelman found many Americans anticipate coming to Canada this year. The resources department of Seattle routed fifty-two settlers to Canada during the month of March, which, considering the early period of the year, was considered a record for the office.

Ambulance is Badly Needed.

Early this morning when the two engineers were brought in badly injured from up the river, they had to be driven to the hospital in ordinary taxi cars. No provision has yet been made to provide the necessary ambulance to which attention has been drawn many times. It seems very sad that we should allow these men to suffer unnecessarily in that condition simply because we will not afford an ambulance to drive them in comfort. On behalf of the suffering men, who from time to time are conveyed from the train or boat to the hospital we appeal to the women of this city to get busy and see that an ambulance is provided. This is no fad. It is our duty to provide it. We benefit from the work the men do and we should provide the necessary means of caring for them at a time when it is needed.

Off to Salt Lakes For a Swim.

Tomorrow night the Swimming Club is to have its annual meeting. The weather is gradually changing and very soon we shall all be ready to visit the Salt Lakes for a swim. Before this happens, however, there are a lot of improvements to be made. The most serious of these is the provision of a float to replace the one that was carried away during the winter. We must have that.

The swimming club has done splendid work in the past in connection with the improvements to Salt Lake. The public have supported the work generously. It is to be hoped that this year there will be no falling off in the enthusiasm and support. The Salt Lake is our holiday resort. It is our popular playground and, as we all like to go there, we should all take a pride in it, see that we make it a credit to the community. We can do that by attending the swimming club meeting tomorrow night and by contributing later when the committee goes out for funds.

No Reduction Of Armaments.

It looks as if the lessons of the past have not been learned and the mad race for armaments is likely to continue, in spite of the great sacrifices of the war and the hopes entertained that it would prove to be the last. Even the United States is looking forward to more trouble, judging by the way in which that country is preparing by increasing her army and providing a military machine which will be always ready for an emergency.

The Allies are discouraging the military spirit in Germany by making that country pay the cost of the trouble she gave the other countries. The Allies are a unit in their determination to force payment and to comply with other terms of the peace treaty.

It is a good thing to see that Germany is kept out of the military race for supremacy, but little advantage will be gained if another race is to take its place, that between United States and Japan, with Britain as an interested third party.

Possibly the treaty between Britain and Japan may aid in smoothing things out with the United States and in bringing Japan into line in regard to disarmament or a scheme for restriction of armaments.

Premier Oliver and P. G. E.

Premier Oliver, minister of railways for B. C., is having a great time with the P. G. E. It is like the wild cat the man had up the tree. He finds it difficult to hold it and more difficult to let go. The people of Prince George and Peace River districts are insistent that, not only shall the present projected line be completed, but it shall be extended into the Peace River country. Vancouver is also an interested party and is backing the interior districts in its demand.

Now Mr. Oliver is trying to get the Dominion to take over the railway or at any rate to bonus the extension into the Peace River. The difficulty is that the Dominion Government has had all it wants of railways and would like to let go some of those it already owns.

Walk to Port Edward
and What I Saw by the Way.
By H. F. P.

One day I met a man who had just walked to Port Edward and back.

"Did you see anything," I asked.

"No, nothing but scenery, water and trees and railway track."

Remembering this answer, I determined to walk to Port Edward and try to discover if there was anything interesting besides scenery, water and trees and railway track. I did it Sunday and it was a great success. I saw and heard a lot of things.

Being alone, I had plenty of opportunity for observation. From the time I left Prince Rupert almost until I reached Port Edward, a distance of nine miles, they say, I was hardly ever out of each other of the blue grouse. Just adjoining the edge of the townsite the first was heard and from that time on they were everywhere. I did not see one, but I knew where they were. They were sitting away up in a spruce or hemlock tree in a bunch close to the trunk and as I heard the soft warbling note, I guessed I could see the bird rise, puff out its breast and give its levee call.

Love Calls Compared.

Another rooster in love has been seen on the highest point and crowed loudly at every other rooster and there is always then a chance of a fight. His call is a note. Another rooster gets up and darts back. Pretty soon there are feathers flying.

"When the cock blue grouse is in love he sits high up in a tree and in the softest voice possible says: 'I have the finest little wife there is in the country.'"

Another male blue grouse in another tree answers: "My wife is the sweetest little thing in the blue grouse world."

After considering this a short time the first grouse hoots softly "My wife loves me and I love her" and the answer is, "There is no lady blue grouse alive that can compare with mine." The birds never dare each other but they say soft sweet things and that in the softest, love tone imaginable. These were some of the things I heard as I walked to Port Edward.

Other Birds.

Besides the blue grouse I heard wrens singing at several points. On the mud flats in Porpoise Harbor was a crane, a long legged graceful creature, timid because it is always hunted. Just beyond Zenardi as I was watching a hawk, a pebble shot out of a hole away up the steep side of the cut. On the other side of the cut was a kingfisher sitting on a telegraph pole. I knew immediately what it was. The other bird was in that hole digging to make a nest and had thrown out the pebble.

Of course there were other things to be seen. There was a

white butterfly that was out rather early and a brown moth that could not fly very well in the bright sunlight. Ducks and grebes were enjoying the sunshine in the water and the glasses made them seem so close that it was like looking at them in a pond close by.

Coffee Was Ready.

There were a lot of other things but it's difficult to remember them all. The walk was one of the most enjoyable I have had for many a day. The alder trees were bursting into leaf, the alder catkins were just at their best and here and there a skunk cabbage was pushing up its yellow hood. There was a seal in the rapids at Zenardi and there were several friends I met en route and two that had some coffee ready just as I came on their camp fire.

If you want a change from the crowded throng of Third Avenue just take a walk out to Port Edward on a Sunday afternoon when the sun is shining and there is just enough cool breeze to make things pleasant. Nothing can equal such a trip.

WOULD HAVE SUNK SHIPS IN KIEL CANAL

Admiral Sir Percy Scott Urges Attention to Air Craft.

LONDON, April 22.—Admiral Sir Percy Scott, commander of the aerial defence of London in the world war, has no use for battleships. He believes the British navy would be better off if it spent the £10,000,000 intended for battleship construction in research and providing newer weapons of warfare.

"The late war," Sir Percy said, "showed that the only safe policy as regards battleships was to stow them away as far as possible from the enemy. If we go to war now with France I do not think our battleships will be safe unless we construct a harbor to contain them in Iceland."

Spent no Money.

"Personally," continued Sir Percy, in a newspaper interview, "I am fully in accord with Rear Admiral Adair when he said that we ought not to spend one penny on battleships, but whatever money we may have to spare should be laid out on research work. Rear Admiral Adair told the House of Commons that if we built new battleships we should also have to provide new bases at great cost at Halifax, Bermuda and Jamaica, on the West Coast of Canada, in New Guinea, and at Singapore. I say this nation, with the income tax at six shillings in the pound, cannot afford this huge expenditure, when nobody can tell me what we are going to do with these battleships when we get them."

"In the first few hours of the next war Plymouth, Dover and even London, may be reduced to ashes unless we are prepared with an adequate counter to the fleets of airplanes that would attack us. It seems to me, therefore, nothing but plain common sense that we should spend what we can spare not in battleships that are 'no d---d good' as the midshipman said, but in providing the very best we can buy of the newer weapons that will count in the war of the future."

New Davis Gun,

Speaking of the latest developments in death dealing instruments, Sir Percy explained the principles of the new Davis gun, which fires from both ends and with which he said all American airplanes were to be armed. It would be possible for an airplane to carry a 12-inch gun and fire at battleships from 10,000 feet up. Battleships could have no protection against such weapons.

Speaking of the progress that had been made in planning aerial attacks on warships, Sir Percy said, in an interview in the Evening Standard: "It is no secret now—every man in the service knows it—that had the war lasted another fortnight, we would probably, by means of an aerial attack, have sunk all the German ships in the Kiel Canal."

ALBERTA CITIES TO HAVE FIVE MEMBERS

EDMONTON, April 23.—In the event of a general provincial election being called before another session of the legislature is held, amendments proposed to the election act and the legislative assembly act will provide for Edmonton and Calgary electing five members each instead of three each as at present constituted.

In each case the candidates will be required to stand for the city at large, the three-constituency division of the past being abolished. This provision has already given rise to the opinion that Edmonton and Calgary will probably be given a system of proportional representation in the next election.

This measure of redistribution will therefore give the next legislative assembly sixty members instead of fifty-eight, the present number. While the two overseas constituencies of the province at large, now held by Robt. Pearson and Mrs. R. C. Price, will be wiped out, the four extra members in Calgary and Edmonton will add two more members to the house.



SKEENA MEMBER SECONDS MOTION

Backs Mr. Lemieux in Request for Protection of Canadian Citizenship Abroad

A resolution moved by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux in the House of Commons asking for a copy of all correspondence between the Canadian Government and the Serbian Government concerning the expulsion of Dr. Burubom and his hospital mission from Montenegro was seconded by Colonel Peck, according to the latest copy of Hansard.

Mr. Lemieux outlined the case of the doctor who had served during the war and had raised money and given his services to aid the Serbian forces. Later he had been badly used and ordered out of the country. Mr. Lemieux spoke at considerable length, urging the necessity of Canada asserting her nationality and protecting her citizens. He said: "If we cannot as a Dominion within the four corners of the British North America Act assert our rights and protect our nationals abroad, we still have the old British flag which protects every British subject wherever he is to be found in the four quarters of the globe."

Peck's Speech

In seconding the motion, Colonel Peck said:

"I listened to the speech of the hon. member for Maisonneuve with great interest, and he certainly spoke temperately and with dignity. I think we should first do what he asks for, that is, investigate those charges. He did not state that the charges were true, he simply asked the Government to take measures to investigate them. In that he is entirely right. All I can say is, if those charges are true, it is a case of base ingratitude on the part of Serbia, because this young nation plunged into the war with the greatest courage and chivalry to uphold, among other things, the rights of small nations, and particularly the rights of Serbia, who was the first nation to get us equipped in the war. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, although I am not a scathing imperialist and although I do not go so far, as the hon. and gallant gentleman said, with a whip on my shoulder, I think we may rely upon the fight of a gentleman who is the head of the Government in this country, if he discovers that injustice has been done to a Canadian citizen, to be the first to uphold the cause of the nation with that dignity and firmness which are characteristic of him. It is a very good occasion upon which to let the world know that the rights of Canadian citizens must be respected everywhere. The Government should take every step necessary to the fullest investigation of this matter and adopt such measures as the facts seem to warrant."

CONFIRMATION AT KITKATLA

Picturesque Village Visited by Bishop Du Vernet and Parson Rushbrook

CHURCH ARMY PROVES ATTRACTIVE TO NATIVES

Forty-two miles south from Prince Rupert and a little off the Ogden Channel is the Indian village of Kitkatla, picturesquely situated on the shore of Dolphin Island. Among the public buildings are St. Peter's church, which is on rising ground, the Day school, the Church Army hall and the town hall, which are on the water front. "Chic" Gamble and Angus Collison have fine houses. The streets are paved with gravel and broken clam shells which together become beaten into a fine surface. The street to the church covered with clam shells might be called the "White Way" and dazzles the eye when the sun is shining on it.

The Anglican Church began its work in this village in 1882 and the Indians have responded well to the teaching both of the church and the school. They are an intelligent and independent people. More than two dozen gas-beds are owned and operated by the Kitkatlas, the meaning of the name being "The people of the sea."

Confirmation

Rural Dean Rushbrook, skipper of the Northern Cross, visits this village monthly and is always warmly welcomed. Last week he took with him Archbishop Du Vernet for a special confirmation service. Dr. Bayne also accompanied them as an invited guest and both in a medical and a dental capacity administered first aid and relieved some suffering. Calls were also made at Lewis Island, Oona River and North Porcher, and to the lonely white settlers. Parson Rushbrook's monthly visit with a bundle of magazines kindly donated by various Prince Rupert citizens.

Georges Carpentier Has Had Marvellous Career

Georges Carpentier, world war hero, idol of France and the heavyweight champion of Europe, was born in Lens, the famous little coal mining town of France, on January 24, 1894.

Of good French stock, Carpentier's parents had acquired but little of the world's goods, nevertheless little Georges was given the best education the schools of the town afforded, and early showed that he was possessed of an alert and inquiring mind.

Fought at Nine.

When the lad had reached the age of eight he came under the discriminating eye of Francois Deschamps, then lightweight champion of France, who was gymnastic instructor of the Lens schools. The master was convinced that the boy was a great athlete in embryo. In little less than a year his protegee made his debut as a bantamweight. Largely through a soporific punch, that Deschamps discovered to his sorrow, and through the defensive tactics of Georges, the tutor began to have visions of developing a real champion.

FINE ATHLETIC PROGRAM GIVEN

Fourth Entertainment of Wallace Social Club Was Highly Enjoyable One.

The fourth entertainment given by the Wallace Dry Dock Social and Athletic Club on Thursday evening proved a most interesting affair. The program consisted of boxing, wrestling and ball punching with musical turns between bouts. J. McGready, vice-president and manager of the club, presided.

Started as Amateur.

Carpentier's debut in the ring was as an amateur and he finally worked his way to but one man from the amateur championship of France at the age of thirteen. Joining the professionals the youthful whirlwind fought his way through a brilliant bunch of bantam-weights, feather-weights and light-weights in each win-

ning the championship. Then followed an uninterrupted string of victories in the middle-weight and welter-weight classes.

Despite his success and the adulation of a hero worshipping public, Georges Carpentier remained the unassuming gentleman devoted to his parents whom he had set up in business in Lens.

Fought Wells.

In 1913 Carpentier, then 19, fought Bombardier Wells, the heavy-weight champion of England, and won in a furious battle despite the fact that he was topped in weight and size. Then came Joe Jeannelle and Gunboat Smith.

In 1914 came war and Carpentier enlisted and won many honors and since that time he has had only one light of note, that with Joe Beckett, whom he knocked out in 48 seconds.

All the sporting world is keenly interested in the battle to come off on July 2 for then Carpentier is to prove what he can do with Jack Dempsey, no less a superman than himself.

GREAT PLANS FOR BASEBALL

PRINCE GEORGE, April 23.—A Central Interior Baseball League is being planned here and there is every likelihood that it will be established. The league would likely comprise teams from Quesnel, Vanderhoof, Jasper and Prince George.

After the series in this league are completed it is planned to have the winning team play the champion coast team for the championship of Central British Columbia. The team might also take on the leading amateur baseball aggregation from the southern cities.

Baseball fans here this year have very ambitious plans and there should be a good many inter-town games.

JACK JOHNSON'S GLOVES IN THE CITY

Morris Gendon Has Interesting Memento of Historic Battle With Tommy Burns.


Morris Gendon, manager of the Trail Club, has in his possession here one of the most interesting pair of boxing gloves ever seen in this part of the country. They are the gloves that Jack Johnson, the big negro heavy-weight, knocked Tommy Burns out with at Sydney, Australia, when he won the world's heavy-weight championship.

Mr. Gendon acquired the gloves some years ago when he was managing Joe Bailey, the well known Victoria lightweight, in his fight against Allen at Calgary when the former won the Canadian title.

The gloves weigh but 3 1/2 ounces and are of foreign make. One pair is large and thin to fit the large hands of Johnson while the other pair is smaller and thicker to suit the white man's hand. The gloves were used in the Bailey-Allen battle, there being no gloves to fill the requirements of the agreement for the match at the ringside when the fight was about to be started. Bailey used Johnson's gloves and administered a terrible punishment on Allen, knocking him out for two hours.

PRINCE GEORGE DEALING WITH UNDESIRABLES

Notice Served on Colored People to Move and Whites May Follow

Alderman Barney Keegan, the oldest member of the city council, "started something" while acting as mayor during the absence of Mayor Henry Wilson on the coast, says the Prince George Citizen. At a special meeting called a few days ago to consider an offer on the city's school bonds, resolutions were passed by the council instructing the acting mayor to take action towards ridding the city of the undesirable colored population. A number of these people have been reported by Chief of Police Sinclair as being occupied in criminal pursuits, including the running of assignation houses, red light brothels and boot-legging.

Ultimatums

Following the action of the council, Acting Mayor Keegan signed ultimatums addressed to about fourteen of these people, advising them that their presence in the city was not considered advisable in the public good and suggesting that a change of scene would be beneficial to their health.

The chief of police has served the notices upon the undesirables and further action is expected to be taken.

While it is a difficult matter for the police to secure proper evidence against these law-breakers, by the very nature of their offenses, they will probably recognize the futility of trying to carry on in the face of police action concentrated against them with the strength of the mayor and council behind it.

White Bootleggers

Aside from the undesirable element in the colored population here, there is a feeling that the white bootleggers doing a thriving trade should be put out of business. There are a number of known bootleggers who carry on a flourishing trade, who appear to be free from active interference. The peddling of dope has also been under the observation of the police, and one of the suspects who carries on this traffic here, and who has been fighting against conviction on a technicality, will come up for trial shortly.

There was a special meeting of the police commissioners called to consider a resolution sent to them by the city council in regard to the matter of the underworld.

CLAIM \$60,000 FROM CANADIAN PACIFIC RY.

EDMONTON, April 23.—A civil claim for \$60,000 was filed in the supreme court Tuesday morning against the Canadian Pacific Railway by Mrs. L. B. Dougher, whose husband was killed at the defendant's railway crossing near Blackfalds last September.

On the date in question the deceased and the plaintiff were travelling by automobile on the Calgary Trail and on approach to a level crossing at Blindman River near Blackfalds, a train on the line suddenly and without warning, approached the crossing according to the claim, and dashed into the car, completely demolishing it and killing Mr. Dougher and seriously injured the plaintiff.

It is claimed that the steel on the crossing was too high and that the train blew no whistle, sounded no bell, and neither the fireman nor the engineer was on the lookout.

The plaintiff claims \$1,300 for the demolished car, \$65 a month from the time of the accident till the present, which is the salary she was making at the time, \$200 hospital expenses, \$30,000 for the death of her husband and \$30,000 general damages.

From Vancouver on Friday came word that a White Leghorn had beaten the record created by an Ottawa fowl a week ago and had secured the heavy-weight championship for the Dominion.

A Calgary Buff Orpington took up the challenge and on Friday nosed out the Vancouver favorite by a scant margin both by way of the long diameter and also around the short diameter.

Intense Interest

An intense interest has developed in sporting circles through the fight for the egg pennant and the report is current that a number of Victoria hens are going into training.

An egg-laying tournament is rumored, fowls from all over Canada to compete. It appears likely that Tex Richard may take up the proposition, but if he waits as long in watching the aspirants as he has in the Franco-American internationale he will have to decide the matches with the pulling of wishbones, for a hen stays in the manufacturing business only a certain length of time and then becomes mere meat and soup without soul.

Victoria Offers Prize

In the regulations it must be set out whether a double-yolk and white filling is permissible, and whether it shall be allowable to feed a hen cement in order to bolster the weight of the shells. There should be a series of play-offs here in order to determine the fit and proper hen to compete for the Canadian leadership.
