Oil Excitement at Terrace Today

COLONEL PECK ANNOUNCES HIS CANDIDATURE AS INDEPENDENT

Oil and Coal Excitement Seems Engrossing at Terrace Where Large Number of Claims Staked

PRINCE RUPERT, Oct. 19.—The people of this place have been what jarred out of their usual quiet manner of life by the prospect of the valley becoming a centre of oil and coal supply. Nothing approaching an oil boom has struck the place. The countryside from north of Kitsumkalum Lake in the neighbourhood of the Naas River to Lakelse Lake has been staked for oil. Oil companies and syndicates have been formed, and local farmers and business men have either staked a few acres for themselves or have taken shares in some of the syndicates or companies.

Terrace has always been looked on as a quiet little fruit growing community with a modicum of miners and prospectors in the neighborhood who have gone to the hills in the summer and done their assessment work. Today everyone is talking oil or coal or mines. Fruit growing seems a trivial thing compared with the riches that may be achieved if the precious liquid is struck in paying quantities, or if the coal claims should be developed into mines.

Optimism is the watchword here and it really looks as if the people had some reason for their hopes.

Valuable Coal Lands.
Recently there has been staked 36 miles north of this town a rich strike of anthracite coal. Six seams have been discovered

measuring from eighteen inches to seven feet wide. Prior to the war these coal lands were under the observation of the late Lord Rhoads but owing to his death and the outbreak of the war development on the properties was allowed to lapse with the result that the lands reverted to the Government. There was a Government reserve placed on the district which has only recently been lifted and the Callahan interests have re-staked the coal. The holdings consist of eighteen sections.

There has already been a preliminary private survey made for a railway line to these coal fields and the topographical conditions are particularly well suited for the construction of a railroad on a grade of something less than 2 per cent.

Many Oil Claims.
Oil claims have been staked from the vicinity of Naas River south to Lakelse Lake, a distance of 70 miles, and as far up the G.T.P. line as Doreen (East) as far as Shames (West) a distance of approximately 30 miles. These stakings comprise approximately three hundred claims, or nearly 200,000 acres. Local oil seepages are known around Terrace and paraffin wax has been discovered where these seepages have occurred.

At the present time operations are handicapped for the lack of a decent wagon road. There is a road from Terrace as far as Kitsumkalum Lake which can be navigated by a wagon, but a motor car cannot go more than eight miles from the town. A boat has to be taken to the end of the Lake, from thence northward it is possible for a wagon to navigate for another seven miles. From this point to Cedar River crossing there is two miles which is impassable, although a wagon bridge was built some years ago across the Cedar River which is connected by a foot trail.

Reported Oil Indications.
It is reported that a Mr. Monckton, a civil engineer of Vancouver, in 1913, examined the district between Naas and Kalum Lake for the purpose of locating coal. He then said that indications pointed to immensities of oil shale which would signify that oil had been in the district at some time or else that an enormous basin of oil was still held in the porous sandstone. It would appear that this report is correct, for the simple reason that P. Ghessey who was associated with Mr. Monckton when he made this examination, has himself staked large holdings in the Kitsumkalum Basin this summer.

Two to Drill.
The Kitsumkalum Basin Petroleum Co. Ltd., which was formed last spring to prospect for oil near Kitsumkalum Lake is preparing to put a drill in the field this autumn as soon as there is sufficient snow on which to haul the drill to the operating location.

The Anderson-Goughlan interests are also preparing to drill at once so it should not be very long before the question of the value of the oil field is decided. It may be necessary to put down a number of holes to give the district a fair test.

INDIA'S LEADER IN FIGHT FOR FREEDOM

Though a political leader in India's fight for freedom, he is revered by the Hindus, Mohammedans and Christians of India for the unselfishness of his motives and avowal of poverty. He renounced wealth and has taken the vow of poverty and has thrown his lot with the submerged masses of India. By voluntary fasting, he has reduced himself to a mere skeleton.

Soldier Member to Seek Re-Election This Constituency

"I am going to run in the forthcoming federal election as an independent candidate," announced Colonel C. W. Peck, V. C., this morning. "On Monday a meeting will be held and I will then give an account of my stewardship as member for the past term and will make announcements as to my future intentions."

"I was always a Liberal in federal politics until the election in 1917, and then I was a Liberal Unionist. I am just as much a Liberal now as I ever was as far as Liberal principles are concerned, but I am absolutely convinced that the people are tired of the old line politics. I want to go back to Ottawa free and untrammelled so that I can be at liberty to act in the interests of this riding as I see fit."

"I wish to fight a good straight fight without any personalities or dirt whatever, and if anybody else starts anything it will be their own fault and none of mine."

Col. Peck expects to be in town on Monday or Tuesday when he will start on his campaign in the district visiting various points.

It is understood that the Conservatives will put no candidate in the field to oppose Col. Peck.

SIR ROBERT BORDEN BRITISH SECRETARIAT AT THE CONFERENCE

LONDON, Oct. 19.—It is officially announced that Sir Robert Borden, Canada's delegate to the Washington conference and L. C. Christie, legal advisor to the internal affairs department, will be placed on the British secretariat.

Legislation Outlined In Speech from the Throne At Victoria Yesterday

VICTORIA, Oct. 19.—The Legislature was opened at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon by Lieutenant-Governor Walter Nichol with the usual formalities before a large number of spectators and invited guests. The speech from the throne outlining the policy of the Government for the session was read. It said among other things:

"During recess investigation was made into the financial condition of municipalities, and legislation will be submitted providing for an extension of the sources of their revenue."

"Amendments to the Taxation Act will be submitted in order to apportion more equitably the burden of taxation on all classes of property and persons."

"Satisfactory progress has been made with the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, and the financial provision made last session will prove adequate for the completion of the line to Prince George."

"A measure will be introduced extending the work of the insurance department."

"Amendments to the Liquor Act will be submitted and to the Mineral Act and further amendments to the Placer Mining Act are proposed."

GOLD SEAL LIQUOR CASE

Loses First Appeal and Will Go to Privy Council.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 19.—Following an announcement from Ottawa that the Supreme Court had dismissed the Gold Seal liquor firm's appeal from the decision of the Alberta courts, arising out of the refusal of the Dominion Express Company to transport liquor from Vancouver to Calgary for the Gold Seal Company, it was announced by the company today that an appeal would be carried to the Privy Council.

TWO MILLION NAVAL BASE

Singapore to Have Chief Station and Another in Australia.

LONDON, Oct. 19.—The Daily Sketch says the British Government is preparing to spend £2,000,000 in converting Singapore into a first class naval base, while an alternate base of lesser importance is to be created in Australia for the defence of the Pacific.

STRIKE ON THE RAILWAYS

Possibility Now Seen of More Organizations Joining With Train Service Bodies.

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—The possibility of an extension of the general railroad strike was seen this morning when a call for the assembling tomorrow of a conference of one hundred railway employees was called by the Federation of Labor. Sixteen labor organizations may now join the five train service bodies. The committee has full power to call a strike of six shop crafts.

VETERANS IN CONVENTION

Make Recommendations in Regard to Soldiers' Housing and Other Matters.

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 19.—The Great War Veterans convention yesterday discussed the unification with other veteran bodies. Representatives of the Imperial Veterans and the Grand Army of United Veterans were present by invitation and both favored it. The convention reached no vote on the subject.

The convention recommended to Parliament a plan for making loans to soldiers for housing as a means of checking unemployment.

Dominion and Provincial Governments and private firms are to be asked to give returned men the preference in the matter of employment.

BLACK NOMINATED

Former Yukon Commissioner is Now Conservative Candidate For Territory.

DAWSON, Oct. 19.—Capt. George Black, a former commissioner for the territory, was nominated by the Conservatives as their candidate in the forthcoming federal election.

Crerar's Address to the People.

The address of Hon. T. A. Crerar to the people of Canada contains nothing new. It is the Liberal policy to a very large extent. Mr. Crerar even goes so far as to speak of the farmer movement as a liberal movement.

"No one who has studied closely the farmers' movement, so-called, in Canada but will admit it has imperfections. But no one who studies it and is honest will deny that it embodies an aspiration for purity in government, for higher standards of morality and for the sweeping away of special privilege in all its forms.

"The tendency of political parties is toward reaction until a protest arises instinctively from the people against such a reaction. The new political movement in Canada is such a protest and further is essentially a movement of liberalism—not in the sense of a party name but in the liberal and true sense of the word—that seeks to sweep away abuses in government and to provide policies that will meet the needs of the people.

That is the pith of the farmer movement, and it is the same policy identically that the Liberals hold and that has aroused the people of Canada to action today so that they are ready to slough off the Meighen monstrosity which has been kept in power too long and kept in power by people who ought to have known better.

Profiteers in War Profiteers in Peace.

The profiteers have become so accustomed to grafting on the public that they are at a loss what to do since the close of the high price period. They have under their control a group of men calling themselves statesmen who are willing tools to their profiteering schemes.

The tariff profits form a terrible weapon with which to fight the people. With money it is hoped to subvert a majority of the voters of Canada, including the women of the country. Insidiously they are placing the issue before them and the cry for purer politics as sent up by Mr. Crerar was never more necessary than it is today.

We have great sympathy with the farmer movement, but it has no effect except to divide the forces of Liberalism and give opportunity for the common enemy to get back to power. Mr. Crerar doubtless means well, but his movement, while it is fairly widespread, has few followers in this province, where all nominations so far have been by the old parties, with one possible exception.

INDIAN SCHOOL FRASER LAKE

Splendid New Building Equipped For Teaching Natives Useful Trades.

READY BY OCTOBER 1

Formal Opening to Take Place Before Christmas With Big Celebration.

BURNS LAKE, Oct. 19.—R. Moncrieff, the contractor for the building of the Indian Industrial School at Fraser Lake is visiting the Burns and Francois Lake districts accompanied by W. J. MacAllan, the local representative of the Department of Indian Affairs.

The school and grounds are situated on the south shore of Fraser Lake, about eight miles west of the town of Fort Fraser and occupy one of the most beautiful sites on the lake front. The surrounding grounds embody some three hundred acres of choice agricultural land.

The building was erected at a cost of \$700,000.00 by the Indian Department, and the management and education of the Indian children will be in the hands of the Roman Catholic Church to which religion all of the Indians of the district belong. The school will provide accommodations for 150 children with commodious quarters for the teaching staff.

The training of the children will be largely on technical lines, and agriculture, carpentry, blacksmithing, shoe making, etc. will be taught, this policy being decided on with the idea of fitting them for the various walks in life, and putting them on an equal footing with the white people in order that when they are prepared they may be given the franchise and eventually relieve the Government of a huge responsibility.

The building is of brick veneer with concrete basement and a notable fact is that Mr. Moncrieff made the brick on the ground and proved the clay to be of excellent quality.

The brick is almost a salmon red in color. With the roof finished in green, the building presents a most picturesque appearance.

It will be ready for occupancy by the end of October and will be lighted by electricity, and amply supplied with water of best quality.

The opening ceremonies will take place some time before Christmas, when Indians from

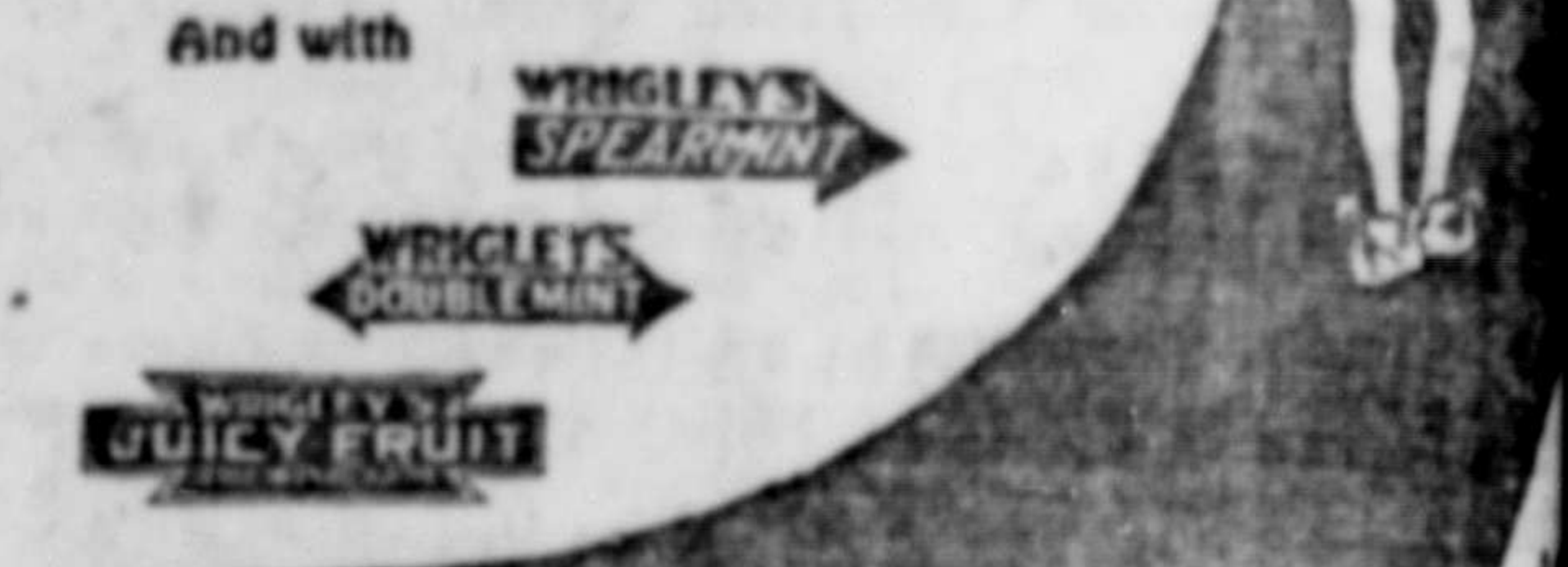

FINLANDER BEATEN UP

Tom Sarri of Ketchikan Attacked When Aboard His Boat.

Tom Sarri, native of Finland, was beaten up and attacked with a small hand axe aboard his boat at the city float by two unidentified men about 7:30 o'clock in the morning, says the Ketchikan Chronicle. The motive for the attack evidently was robbery for \$150 in cash was stolen.

Chas. H. (Happy) Tynan, and Alfred Brooks, jitney drivers, were apprehended in connection with the case but were later released because of lack of evidence.

Struck in Face.

Sarri, who sustained bruises about the face and seven or eight deep cuts in his head, made presumably with the blunt end of the hand axe which he had aboard his boat, a small fishing craft, says he heard a slight noise which awakened him out of a sound slumber. He sensed immediately that someone was aboard but in the semi-darkness and because of just coming out of a deep slumber he could see little. As soon as he stirred, someone struck him in the face, knocking him back on the bunk. He arose and gave fight but was unable to best his two opponents because of lack of room in the small cabin of the boat, he said.

Took Cash.

However, he grappled with one endeavoring to choke him, and it was at this juncture that the other perceived the hatchet, and began pounding him on the head with it, according to his story. He was knocked to the floor, exhausted where they wrapped a blanket again and again about his head and upper body, and left the boat, taking with them \$150 in cash, all the money he had.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class to \$25 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but such making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emption conditions are less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be cause of illness or other cause be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$20 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Grant may record another pre-emption, if he reserves land in conjunction with his father's actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamp.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchasable conditional upon construction of a road to road, not exceeding half of purchase price is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons mining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Interest on account of payments accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, less or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enrollment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights of purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

GERMAN SHOPS ARE REOPENING

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—The principal former military and naval work-shops of the German government, which were closed in 1919 in accordance with the treaty of Versailles, have been reopened as "peace-time factories" and are producing goods more adapted to usages of peace than war.

Two hundred thousand workmen, thrown out of employment by the closing of the shops, have been re-employed.

Among the larger factories converted from military to commercial pursuits were the artillery workshops, ammunition gun, powder and fireworks laboratories at Amberg, Dachau, Cassel, Erfurt, Ingolstadt, Lippstadt, Munich, Siegburg, Spandau and Wolfzeng, near Hanau, as well as the navy yards and naval torpedo shops at Friedrichsort, Kiel and Ruestringen.

Operate Full Time.

These factories are operating virtually full time, producing foundry products, castings and wrought iron stamped and drawn pieces, all sorts of machinery, railroad supplies, motors, motorcycles, hand and machine tools, pneumatic tools, electrical utensils, ship machinery, motor and sailing boats, agricultural implements, furniture, locomotives, railroad cars, automobiles and auto-trucks.

The work of transforming the war factories to commercial usages, undertaken by the government with the permission of the Council of Ambassadors, was assigned to a stock company, shares of which were taken by the government, the board of control being composed of government officials and representative financiers and industrialists.

Ready Market.

German demands are accounting for most of the output of these factories but surplus products are finding a ready outside market, particularly in the Scandinavian countries, where the high price of money as against the German mark adds to the attractiveness of purchases of German wares. German-made automobiles are especially in demand by foreign dealers.

The manufacturers of farm machinery and railroad equipment are looking to Russia as a chief customer as soon as conditions in that country have been established and already hundreds of representatives of German exporting firms have gone into the Soviet republic to study the situation and prepare for a commercial offensive, in which the British are expected to be the most alert competitors.
