NATIVE OF INDIA TALKS PLAINLY TO YANKEES

GUN FIGHTING TAKES PLACE IN SEATTLE; BRITISH SUBMARINE SINKS

Famous Indian Writer Defends British Flag in New York City

Tells Canadian Club that People who Could Not Tolerate That Flag Did Not Know What Liberty Meant

NEW YORK, January 22.—Rustom Rustomje, a former writer of the Oriental Review at Bombay, speaking before the Canadian Club here, at the same meeting which was addressed by Hon. W. Rowell, former president of the Canadian Privy Council, said that should there ever be trouble in the Pacific, he ventured to say India would rise to a man in defence of the Australian Commonwealth. They would rise, not for love of the Australians, but through love of the flag which floated over the British dominions, the flag which, he said to the disgrace of the New York authorities, was allowed to be burned in the public streets of the great American metropolis.

The people who could not tolerate that flag did not know what liberty meant, said the famous Indian.

CANADIAN SILVER PAYS IN KETCHIKAN

Has to Pay Exchange Rates Following Unusual Influx From Outside.

KETCHIKAN, Jan. 22.—Forced to it by the great influx of Canadian silver from the other side, the Miners and Merchants Bank has started exchanging on Canadian coins as well as on currency. The rate of discount is 20 per cent.

Ketchikan until now had enjoyed the unusual privilege of handling Canadian silver at par, whereas in all parts of the States the regular rate of exchange has been charged. This privilege has been of late abused to such an extent that the town is flooded with foreign money.

It is well known that some fishermen coming from Canada have brought with them large quantities of the silver in hope of evading the exchange charged on currency. This practice has been increased with the upward trend of the rate of discount.

Many others, however, deliberately shipped silver in to friends from Vancouver and other places, with a view to beating the discount game.

A taxi driver, appearing in the police court this morning charged with the theft from the person of Joseph Pelrin, an Italian. It is alleged that the man was implicated in the taking of \$220 in an automobile. The arrest was made by Constables McGlinchy and Macdonald.

Submarine Sank with 56 Officers and Men Aboard And Failed to Come Back

LONDON, January 22.—A British submarine went to Davy Jones' locker on Thursday last. The K-5 commanded by John A. Gaines was lost with all hands when she submerged and never came to the surface again. Announcement is made to that effect by the British Admiralty.

The K-5 was practising with four other undersea craft 100 miles off Land's End when in the course of her manoeuvres she sank and failed to come back.

The lost submarine had a full complement of 6 officers and 50 men. She was of the latest type 338 feet long and had a surface speed of 24 knots and a submerged speed of 9 knots.

CLERGYMAN WAS IMPLICATED IN MAIL ROBBERY

Former Rector in Illinois Methodist Church Confesses After Arrest.

VERNON, Ill., January 22.—Guy Kyle, former rector of the Free Methodist Church at Mount Vernon, who was arrested yesterday in connection with the theft on Friday of 31 packages of registered mail containing \$185,000 in cash, has confessed that he was implicated in the robbery, according to the announcement of post-office inspectors.

VICTORIA WON

Aristocrats Took Hockey Game From Vancouver by Score of 4 to 1.

VICTORIA, Jan. 22.—Last night Victoria Aristocrats hockey team turned the trick on Vancouver by a score of 4 to 1. The Victoria fans were much enthused over the change in the fortune of the home team.

Policemen Shot in Seattle Gun Fight

One Killed Outright and Three Persons Fatally Wounded, while a Fifth Sustains Slight Wounds

SEATTLE, January 22.—Two shooting affrays took place here last night in which a policeman was killed and two patrolmen and another person were fatally wounded, while a fifth was slightly wounded. The police took part in each and a good deal of excitement has followed. The affairs are the sole topic of conversation here today.

Last night Patrolman Neal McMillan and W. T. Angle were shot down about 9 o'clock at Capital Hill in the residential district when attempting to search a suspect for concealed weapons.

Half an hour later Detective James O'Brien was killed on Second Avenue in the heart of the financial district, in a gun battle with John Smith, who was himself fatally wounded.

Dean Garman, another suspect, while being questioned by a detective, was wounded in the leg.

COMMERCIAL MAN GETS FOUR MONTHS ON LIQUOR CHARGE

EDMONTON, Jan. 22.—On a second charge of illegally keeping liquor for sale W. E. Gray, who was convicted some months ago, was found guilty by Magistrate Primrose in the city police court and was sentenced to serve four months in jail without the option of paying a fine.

Gray is a traveller and is engaged in the business of selling extracts and in connection with this particular charge was found guilty of aiding and abetting another man in the making of liquor for sale in that he supplied the extracts and the coloring material used in turning out whisky, brandy or other intoxicants.

Get Rid of Him.

A quantity of alcohol was found in his possession together with the extracts and in passing sentence the magistrate declared that he was the kind of a man to be got rid of because of his propensities for putting concoctions purporting to be liquor on the unsuspecting public.

Perjury.

The man who was implicated with Gray in the transaction made an affidavit stating that the liquor was his and shouldered the blame, but in the court denied his sworn statement. He was not given the protection of the court, Magistrate Primrose declaring that under the circumstances he was not entitled to it. The court was of the opinion that he should be arraigned on the charge of perjury.

PARIS, Jan. 22.—A vote of confidence in the new Briand ministry was yesterday voted in the French Chamber of Deputies.

SAYS LEAGUE OF NATIONS IS A SUBSTITUTE

Addresses the New York Canadian Club on Subject.

NEW YORK, January 22.—N.W. Rowell, former president of the Canadian Club here last night, characterized the League of Nations as the most hopeful practical experiment yet tried for providing a substitute for war.

The entry of all the great powers would guarantee success. The consideration accorded the views of Canada and other non-European states was a significant feature of the assembly, judged as a world organization.

MORE IRISHMEN PUT IN PRISON

Reported Tubercular Board Provided in Budget for Irish Volunteer Force.

BELFAST, Jan. 22.—The clerk of the Tubercular board of guardians and all other members of the board who could be found were yesterday placed in Sligo jail. The charge against them was not disclosed but it is reported that the board, in making up a budget recently, provided for the upkeep of an Irish volunteer force.

MAN KILLED IN DRUNKEN BRAWL

Two Fell in Scuffle at Hotel, But One Only Bruised and Shaken.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 22.—Roy Cunningham, railway conductor of Spokane, was killed by falling five floors down stairs during a drunken scuffle at the Empress Hotel last night. He sustained a terribly fractured skull, his neck was broken and he died instantly.

Harry Robinson, a steamboat captain of this city, fell with him but the fall was broken by the stair rail on the fourth floor, where he was picked up bruised and in a shaken condition.

FOREIGN FURS SOLD AT NEW YORK AUCTION

European, Australian, Tasmanian, Chinese and Dutch Pelts Were Offered.

MARKED DECLINE IN PRICE STILL EVIDENT

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—(Special.) The selling of foreign furs, among them more than forty-two lots of rabbit skins from the Andes, was the feature of the Monday of the annual winter fur auction now going on in the Madison Hall here. Chinese, Australian, Tasmanian and Dutch skins were among yesterday's offerings.

The prices again showed marked declines from the spring sale, levels ranging from 35 to 75 per cent below the average figures reported by the buyers of similar furs.

The only domestic pelts sold yesterday were wolf and opossum. Average prices for wolf were 10 per cent below the April sale prices, while opossum showed a drop of sixty per cent. The sale closes today.

VALERA'S NEW YEAR MESSAGE

Irish People to Remain Steadfast in Republican Cause.

DUBLIN, Jan. 22.—In a message to the Irish people, Eamonn Valera, appeals to them to remain steadfast in the republican cause. He says: "Let us face the New Year ready to endure what may be necessary to win for us who are coming after us the blessed boon of permanent peace and liberty in their native land."

RIOTOUS OUTBREAK IN BRITISH INDIA

Only Markets Looted, Instigated By Sympathizers with Non-Co-operative Movement.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—A serious outbreak involving looting of only markets occurred in the Muzaffarpur district of British India. Sympathizers with the non-co-operative movement are believed to have been the instigators of the trouble.

RUPERT CLUB ENTERTAINED

Lady Friends of Members Were Guests for Evening—Dancing and Cards.

There was a great time at the Prince Rupert Club last night when the members entertained their lady friends at an "at-home" dancing and cards being enjoyed until a late hour.

Dancing took place in the sitting room upstairs and music was provided by Howard White's four-piece orchestra. One interesting feature of the dance was an impromptu moonlight waltz. A fuse blew out and the whole building was in darkness except for the moonlight and the light from the street arc lights. The orchestra struck up a waltz tune and all danced for about fifteen or twenty minutes while repairs were being made.

A buffet supper was served in the billiard room and was of a most appetizing character.

The guests all seemed to enjoy the event immensely. The decorations, mostly with bunting, were unusually bright and artistic and the fun was kept up to the end.

Committees in charge were: D. H. Morrison, reception; Capt. Groves, decoration; Geo. Woodland, music; J. G. Steen, refreshments; J. C. McLennan, invitations. President J. G. McEae was on all committees and took an active part in the proceedings.

PROCEEDING SLOWLY

No Rush at Shipyard Until After Signing of Contract With Government.

Construction work on the new vessels is proceeding very slowly until definite word is received from Ottawa of the signing of the contract, providing for which an order in council has already been passed.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—Arrangements have been made for the funeral of Right Hon. A. L. Sifton, secretary of state, to take place on Monday at Ottawa. It will be attended by Premier Meighen and most of the ministers and public officials.

House Shortage Throughout World.

There seems to be a shortage of houses throughout the English speaking world. How it has come about nobody seems to know. Men went to war and killed each other by thousands and when those who were left returned they found there were not enough houses for all.

In Prince Rupert there is still a shortage of dwellings and the condition will be accentuated as soon as the spring work starts up. There is no longer a provincial housing fund on which to draw.

Various buildings are being planned. Several people have schemes in mind in regard to business blocks or apartment houses. These should certainly be given every support.

High Prices For Halibut.

There is no reason why fish should be an expensive food in Canada. If certain varieties are costly in comparison with other fish the fault lies with the Canadian people.

The reason for the higher halibut price is this: It is estimated that from thirty to forty per cent of the catch on halibut lines is cod, which have to be thrown away.

People to Blame For Condition.

But you cannot blame the fisherman for throwing away other fish to get 60,000 pounds of halibut. He is in business for a living. The people themselves, whose tastes the fisherman must gratify, are responsible for the economic waste and the consequent higher prices of their favorite fish.

The drain that has been made upon the halibut banks during the past few years threatens to seriously curtail the supply unless protective measures are instituted.

Increased Demand By Means of Bonus.

The substitution of other varieties of flatfish, equally as palatable, but more abundant and procurable nearer home, has for some years been urged by the Fisheries Branch at Ottawa as a means of protecting the halibut fishery.
