# UNIVERSITY PRIVILEGES FOR LOCAL STUDENTS

## COLONEL PECK WRITES OF INTERVIEW WITH THE MINISTER OF RAILWAYS

### University Class for Prince Rupert

#### Delegation Waits on School Board and Asks Special Teacher Be Engaged for the Work; Much Discussion

After hearing a delegation favoring the appointment of a fully qualified teacher to undertake first year university work at High School, the School Board last night decided to allow it to stand over until next meeting in order that members might have time to think it over. The general feeling of trustees seemed in favor of the move.

A petition was read asking for the establishment of the department in the High School in which was pointed out that there were pupils ready to take the work.

Mr. Morrison, heading the delegation, said there were several reasons why the work should be taught in the school here. Children wished to get higher education had to be sent away from a tender age and the cost.

In Vancouver was high, Prince Rupert should look forward to the school board award to the establishment of a teacher here. There would be high schools in Smithers, Terrace and at Telkwa, while Anyox gave two years. This, he thought should be a centre for university work.

Trustee Patmore: "Do you think pupils would come here when they could live at Vancouver and attend the university for the same cost?"

Each year there would be pupils. Some of the parents of university age were of leaving town because there were no facilities here. The local Government paid 40% of the cost of the extra. It cost from \$600 to \$800 a pupil to Vancouver for university year.

Dr. Grant: "Do you think they would because it would be nearer home and they could more easily get home occasionally."

Canon Rix Agrees.

Canon Rix said the other speakers had stated the case fully and he was in agreement with their views.

Trustee McMeekin favored the idea. He moved that they provide a teacher for the opening of the university class.

This was seconded by Trustee Ling but on the suggestion of Trustee Patmore it was decided to allow the question to lie over until next meeting.

Trustee McMeekin said it was the first he had heard of the move and he would like time to think it over.

Dr. Kergin thanked the delegation for laying their views before them and said undoubtedly all were sympathetic with their views.

Atlin sold 50,000 pounds to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 15.1c and 6c.

### PADDY LOGAN WOULD RATHER GIVE BADGE THAN ACCEPT BRIBE

The copy of Hansard just to hand shows that Colonel Peck voted with the Government on the motion of want of confidence moved by W. L. MacKenzie King.

The Prince Rupert shipyard was mentioned in the course of the debate by S. W. Jacobs, member for Hazelton.

In the course of last night's police commission meeting when the qualifications of William S. Ackroyd and George P. Logan for positions on the police force were being discussed, Sergeant Adams was called in by Mayor Rochester as a result of a statement being made about Constable Logan, whom here before, had been responsible for dissensions on the force. Sergeant Adams stated that when he had made the statement to Commissioner Maedonald he had thought that Constable Logan had left the force and would not be returning otherwise he might not have told of the incident.

Sergeant Adams placed Constable Logan's character on a very high level. There had never been any shadow on his character. He related an incident that he had witnessed on Fraser Street. Constable Logan had been offered a large bribe and had flatly refused it, stating that the person offering would some day get in very serious trouble attempting to bribe an officer. "Paddy Logan would give away his badge before he would accept a bribe," remarked the sergeant of police.

### Peck Writes Regarding Fish Car Situation and Interview with Minister

The following letter from Colonel Peck to Mayor Rochester, the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, and the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association was received this morning in regard to the supply of fish cars:

"In reply to your joint telegram of the 25th ult., I may say that no one was more astounded than I was to learn that the passenger refrigerator cars were not to be delivered as agreed upon. I did my best to stir things up here, and will set out herein what has transpired.

"I was present at the conference between the representatives of the National Steel Car Co. and the Minister of Railways. The Minister claims that he was completely deceived and that he fully expected that the cars were to be delivered as per previous statement. You will already have received his wire of yesterday upon the matter and note that this company is under obligation to deliver all the cars before the 31st March.

"All I can say is that I am putting forth every possible effort in this matter, and that no one is more disappointed than I am myself. However, I think that this agitation has had one good effect in any event, which has been to induce the railway to dig up every car available.

"I enclose herewith copy of letter from D. B. Hanna to the Minister of Railways, which will explain itself.

"I would be glad to hear from you when any actual shortage occurs. The above letter seems to prove that with the cars on hand at Prince Rupert and those en route to Prince Rupert, they ought to be enough to, at least relieve the situation.

"I cannot do further than I have been doing and as previously stated I have been using every possible effort in this matter.

G. W. PECK." Colonel Peck enclosed a letter from President D. B. Hanna to Hon. J. D. Reid showing that there were always fish cars in the yards at Prince Rupert from February 6 to February 23, the number running from three to nineteen. He says he is sending one of his officers to Hamilton for an explicit understanding regarding delivery of express refrigerator cars and promises to write further regarding the matter.

Mrs. Ling said they had made exceptions in other years in favor of extra good teachers and she thought they should do so in this case. The senior work she considered worth more.

The opinions of the principals of the High School and the public school were asked and a general discussion ensued.

It was finally decided by resolution that the teachers association should be asked to decide whether the work of the higher grades should be better paid than the other classes and the board would then discuss the matter further when the recommendation was received.

Raymond Albright Falls Victim to Typhoid Fever Epidemic; 30 Years of Age.

HAZELTON, March 11.—The death occurred at the Hazelton Hospital on Wednesday morning of Raymond Albright, aged 30. The deceased died from typhoid fever, having been brought up from Terrace where he was employed as engineer at George Little's sawmill. The remains are being shipped to Edmonton for interment. Frank Morris, the Prince Rupert undertaker, having been called here to prepare them for shipment.

## Of the Making of Newspapers

There is no End.

It seems to be the simplest thing in the world to start a newspaper. A new one has just been started in Prince George, and in all centres it is the custom from time to time for someone to get ambitious along that line and make a plunge. Usually the people who start new publications have little experience in publishing and they go to the wall. It is a question of months, but now and then a very persistent man will keep a weekly or monthly going even for years, although there is usually but one end. Count the number of the survivors and the case is proved.

The present extremely high cost of material and labor makes newspaper publishing difficult. Every department has to be carefully watched and no unnecessary expenses incurred.

Every reader of a newspaper has his own individual taste and he would like to see the paper made to suit him. It is the duty of an editor to take cognizance of the general taste and to make his paper suit that taste rather than to make it accord altogether with his own ideas. At the same time, if he has ideals, as he should have, he should try to improve the taste of his readers and the general tone of the paper should be for the betterment of the community.

Correspondents and

It is very seldom that a letter to the editor can be published in this paper the day it arrives. We aim to give as full a news service as possible and when the telegraphs are working it keeps us busy with the news of the day and letters often have to be held over until the following day. The result is that correspondents are sometimes disappointed in not getting their letters in print. Yesterday we had a letter from Robert Hanna, which was interesting and would have been used today, but when it was found that it had already been published, it went to the waste basket along with much other interesting matter.

The Daily News welcomes expressions of opinion on matters of public interest, but refuses to use them once they have been published elsewhere.

Advanced Rates  
Have Killed Business.

There is a limit to the extent to which prices can be advanced. In a newspaper office there is a decided limit to the rates which can be charged, and the same is true of many other lines. It is true of transportation. The rates have been recently advanced to an enormous extent, but that does not necessarily mean that the roads are paying better. We know that in the case of the lumber business the advance of rates killed the business. The result is not only stagnation in the lumber business of the north, but there is less buying power as a result of the shut down and the railways suffer in not having the goods to haul for the people who were formerly big consumers. As a matter of fact the railways overstepped the mark. It was a fatal step.

Water Traffic Will  
Take Place of Rail.

When the cost of railway traffic went up, people at once looked to the water as a means of transportation. The Panama Canal route will be more and more popular, the longer the present high rates remain. The railways must compete with water on the long haul and that they cannot begin to do at present. They may not carry goods quite as low as ships, but the difference must not be too great. At present the movement is toward water traffic and this will increase every month.

WONDERFUL RECIPE  
FOR SHALE COURTS

Tennis Expert Gives Humorous Advice to Duncan Lawn Tennis Club

The secretary of Duncan Lawn Tennis Club recently advertised for information concerning the making of a shale lawn tennis court. He was considerably edified by the receipt of a communication from "Love-Fifteen", Victoria, who sent the following "recipe":

First get a narrow three-cornered spade and dig up the earth to a depth of eighteen feet (make sure of the depth with a good foot-rule), and send the ground away to China that it may not be wasted!

From Sahara

When the cavity is completed, send away to Switzerland for three tons and an ounce of sea sand, which must be carefully sifted together with three teaspoonsfuls of powdered clam shell. You can get this ready ground from the B.C. Sugar Refinery, or, if you like, send away to the Sahara Desert for the whole clam shells and pass them through an accordion pleated mincing machine—the latter is the wiser way as the Sahara clams have purer shells than the local ones. Besides, as Burbank is producing clams without shells, now, the old fashioned clams are becoming rather rare in the civilized world.

Mix with Seaweed

The next thing to do is to send away to Table Mountain for a wheelbarrow-load of sea weed, which must be salted and finely chopped with a blunt meat-chopper. Mix the sea weed with the other ingredients and sprinkle the whole into the eighteen-foot cavity. (I would strongly advise you to accomplish this with an ordinary salt-shaker.)

This being done, level the court with a tested spirit level, after which a number of Indians or "Jazz" Artists should be employed to stamp the mixture down.

Snipe's Eggs

Leave the court alone for three days and gather snipe's eggs while you wait. When you have collected two dozen of said fruit, separate them and beat well with an American wife-beater.

When you have brought the whites of the eggs to the consistency of whipped cream, purchase two dozen sacks of pastry flour and eight tins of baking powder. Mix these ingredients together and moisten with goat's milk and an empty quart bottle of old South Sea Island/Stout.

Holy Rollers

Spread this mixture lightly over the top of the sea sand, clam shell and sea weed and import some Holy Rollers from the south of France to roll the court flat.

Leave the mixture to rise for forty-eight hours, when it will become a full-blown shale court.

Note—This recipe has been used with great success among the Eskimos and also has been adopted by the South Sea Islanders in Quebec.

## HERRING CHASED BY SEA LIONS MORSE CREEK BRIDGE WORK

Chased up on the beach by a great herd of sea lions, thousands of herring were beached on the shore of the Inlet at Klawak on the west coast of Prince of Wales Island recently, according to members of the crew of the Lightship tender Fern, which stopped there.

"They shone like a great live silver horde," says First Officer Charles H. Nerny, "and in places were several inches deep." The sea lions were so plentiful in the bay that none dared venture across in a small boat.

Millions of herring spawn in the vicinity of Klawak each year, especially on Fish Egg Island, where natives from Craig and Klawak have for years gathered eggs and dried them for food.

There were so many herring in the inlet last Thursday that when the sea lions appeared they simply crowded each other up on the beach, where they were left by the receding tide.

## ACKROYD IS APPOINTED

Considerable Discussion as to the Merit of Applicant—Mayor Opposes Appointment.

William S. Ackroyd, formerly of the provincial police force, was appointed last night by the police commission to fill the next vacancy on the city police force. The application of Mr. Ackroyd, which was turned down this year once before, had the endorsement of the Great War Veterans' Association and the appointment was moved by Commissioner Macdonald and seconded by Commissioner Myhill Jones.

There was a lengthy discussion as to the merits of the applicant in which Mayor Rochester stated that he could not support the appointment. He knew a good deal about the man. He had seen some things with his own eyes and part of his record in other positions had not been to his credit. No officer should be placed on the force who could not be trusted and he considered the police commission would be making a big mistake in doing so.

### Defended by Macdonald.

Commissioner Macdonald said that he was not prepared to turn down a man's application down on just a talk. Chief Minty had referred to Ackroyd as an efficient officer and the G. W. V. A. had endorsed his application. It was his opinion that he would be a decided asset to the police force. If he did not prove up he would move for his dismissal as fast as he had moved for his appointment. It had been said that the police force would not stand for the appointment but he would say that the police force were not going to make the appointments to the force as long as he was a commissioner.

Commissioner Myhill Jones said that a lot of detrimental statements had been made of the applicant but he had been an efficient officer and since his return from the war may have had a rough time. He would favorably consider the application now but let him make one false step and he would go. He had a good record and was endorsed by Chief Minty and others.

"Would these people give him a recommendation?" asked the mayor.

"I think so," replied Commissioner Myhill Jones.

## CARIBOO PAPER URGES COUNTER ATTACK UPON CHURCHES OF COUNTRY

STANLEY, B.C., Mar. 11.—The Cariboo Observer carries the report of a Moderation League meeting recently and records the passing of a resolution reminiscent of the wild and woolly west as described by Bret Harte and Mark Twain.

Asserting that the prohibition movement is a campaign promoted by "puritanical sectarians" against the liberty of the individual, the resolution urges a counter-attack by developing the idea that church property he not exempt from taxation. If that proves ineffective, it goes on, an amusement tax should be paid for admission to any place of public worship, on the grounds that "until the privileges of the clergy be in question respect for the liberty of the layman will never obtain."

The anti-prohibition forces explain the necessity for aggressive action by declaring that they are in general agreement with the contention of Caesar in his commentaries, "O.K'd by Napoleon and U. S. Grant," that no position is defensible from which an attack cannot be launched.

## KILLED GIRL TO SAVE SUFFERING

Man Acquitted when Proved He Shot Her for Humane Purpose

BRUSSELS, March 11.—The question whether one person is guilty of a crime in hastening the death of another who is suffering from a mortal wound has been decided in the negative here in the case of a married man who shot and killed a girl who had attempted to commit suicide. His plea that she was dying and that he killed her rather than watch her suffer. He was arrested, but acquitted of the charge of murder by the Brabant Court of Assizes.

The man in the case was Jerome Hermans, 32 years old, and the girl was Coeline Vandyck, age 18. They had a love affair and the attempt at suicide resulted. The shooting occurred in the Bois de Cambre, Brussels' largest public park.

### Second Shot

"Coeline ran from the path into a thicket," said Hermans. "I heard a shot and ran after her. She had shot herself in the temple but was still alive. I could not see her suffer and I took her revolver and shot her in the neck. Then she was still and I shot myself."

Hermans recovered from his wound and was in prison for eight months until acquitted. Medical testimony given at the trial was to the effect that the girl's suicidal wound ultimately would have been fatal.
