## Civil Servants are to be Pensioned

### RUSSIAN CONSTITUENT ASSEMBLY TO ASK RECOGNITION FROM GREAT POWERS

#### Soviet Opposition Asks Recognition

##### Constituent Assembly for All Russia Formed at Paris About to Place Case Before Britain, U.S. and France

PARIS, February 1.—Formal application is about to be made to Great Britain, France and the United States to recognize the Russian Constituent Assembly as at present the de jure government of Russia.

The Russian Constituent Assembly has just been created here of Russian elements opposed to Bolshevism.

The de facto government of Russia is the Bolshevik Soviet with Lenin as president.

The claim is made that while the Soviet holds power by might, they hold the position illegally and that the Constituent Assembly represents all parties and factions and is therefore more nearly representative of the mass of the people of the country.

#### Superannuation for All Civil Servants

##### Provincial Government will Introduce a Bill at Coming Session of Legislature Giving Effect to Scheme

VICTORIA, February 1.—All provincial civil servants and municipal employees, including the police and firemen throughout British Columbia, are to be placed under a superannuation scheme under the terms of a bill which the Provincial Government will introduce early in the coming session of the Legislature.

For many months W. H. McInnes, civil service commissioner, has been making investigations regarding the payment and duties of civil servants and the advisability of establishing some system of superannuation which would add permanence to the service by making it worth while for men and women to stay with it. He has handed in his report to the Government and, under instructions from the cabinet, is now drawing up a bill to cover the conditions which he found.

#### BOARD OF CITY IN COW BAY TO RAILWAY BOARD

The recommendation of a special committee, appointed by the mayor, a letter is to be sent to the F. B. Carvell, chairman of the railway commission, setting forth the city's stand on the proposed filling of Cow Bay by the railway company. The letter suggests that the railway and the municipal government get together with a view to putting in a road crossing and a road to the wharf, which is vital to the city. The trackage there should be reduced and the plans limited to the city council. If the bay is filled it should not be more than 50 feet north of the tracks and should not be less than the filling is warranted. The city's consent as to the filling would be largely dependent on the fact of adequate and suitable waterfrontage being given by the provincial government in exchange for riparian rights in Cow Bay.

#### EVIDENCE IS NOW COMPLETE

##### Twenty Dollar Bills Found in Shoes of Accused

All the evidence in the J. R. Rudland theft from the person hearing is now in and the case is adjourned until Friday when Magistrate McMordie will decide for committal or dismissal. W. E. Williams took the case for the defence in the police court this morning. Evidence was given by Louis Lazzar, Dominic Marra, Constable Macdonald and Constable McGilichy.

Lazzar, a bartender in the Royal Bar, told of the informant, Petrin, having come into the Royal Bar on the evening of the alleged theft and having flashed a roll of bills. This he had again done in the Citizens' Club after midnight. Petrin was feeling good, but was not drunk in his opinion.

**Flashed a Roll**

Marra, steward in the Citizens' Club, told of Petrin having come into the club and having made considerable noise. He was not very drunk and he thought he knew what he was doing. He had flashed a roll of \$20 Bank of Commerce bills.

Constable McGilichy told of Petrin coming to the police station about 1:30 in the morning. He was very excited and talked like a crazy man. On the theft being reported, the witness and Constable Macdonald went with Petrin to investigate. They were taken to a point off Comox Avenue on Ninth Ave, where the informant showed them where there had been a struggle.

**Bills in Shoe.**

They had then gone to the taxi office where Petrin pointed out Rudland as the driver of the taxi in which he had been robbed. He was arrested and brought to the station and asked if he had any money. He said he had only 50c which he had borrowed from the boss. He was then searched and 60c was found in his pockets and in the heel of his left shoe were found two \$20 Bank of Commerce bills which were produced in court and identified. Asked to account for them accused first said he did not know they were there and then said that they must have been there since Christmas. The informant had been excited all the time and had mentioned a threat as to what he would do if he had a gun.

#### Conciliation Board Rules Against President Hanna in Dispute with Ry. Employees

##### Two Members of Conciliation Board Hold View that Men May Take Part in Politics if They Wish; Outlook Interesting

OTTAWA, February 1.—The majority report of the Board of Conciliation which investigated the dispute between employees of the management of the Canadian National Railways, recommends the withdrawal of the "Hanna Order" which is the main cause of dispute. The report is signed by John M. Godfrey, chairman, and D. Campbell, representative of the men.

The order issued by President Hanna to which exception was taken prevented the participation of employees of the Canadian National Railways in politics. As a result, several employees who had been elected to legislatures in the different provinces previous to the promulgation of the order had been dismissed.

The question was taken up by the railwaymen's union and at one time a strike seemed imminent. Then it was decided to arbitrate.

President Hanna is reported on several occasions to have declared he would stand by his order and if defeated go down with it. All eyes are now looking to him to see what action he will take.

#### ROSEBERRY IS WORRIED OVER U.S. ATTITUDE

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Lord Roseberry, writing to the Times on the subject of Ireland, says: "The people of the United States are very free with criticism of our government, but one is curious to know what their plans would be. An extreme party is trying to set up a hostile state in America when the southerners wished to do the same thing? We have no other clue as to their policy and that obviously is no precedent. Until the United States policy in regard to Ireland is clear the citizens of that country should restrain their criticism."

**Interest Taken in West Peterboro Election.**  
 Great interest is being taken throughout the Dominion in the election campaign in West Peterboro. The constituency has been visited by the leaders of all the prominent parties and the issue is being carefully watched.

When addressing the electors at Peterboro recently Mackenzie King objected to the issue being made one of protection vs. free trade. He said that no matter which way that issue went, there would be protection until a general appeal was made to the country. The issue was one of whether the people should rule or not. There was no longer a Union Government. The Union cabinet had resigned when Mr. Borden left office. Now there was a National Liberal and Conservative Government with Premier Meighen at its head. Under the circumstances the people of Canada had a constitutional right to an election. The people would then have a right to voice an opinion on the tariff.

**Burnham Runs As Conservative.**  
 Mr. Burnham, a Conservative, who was elected as a Unionist at the last general election, resigned because he considered the present Government was no longer Unionist and appealed to the people of his constituency for re-election as a Conservative. He would not pledge himself to vote against the Government if returned, so the Liberals are running a candidate against him. There is also a Government candidate in the field, a farmer and a labor representative. It looks like a British Columbia free for all. Because of the multiplicity of candidates, the result will not mean much, unless the result goes against the Government. Then it will be an indication that there is but a very small minority of the people of that constituency favoring a continuance of the present administration.

**Wonder is Everyone Was so Patient.**  
 Since the people of this city began to express themselves so very emphatically in regard to the lack of fish cars, the opinion is very generally expressed that the wonder was people stood it so long. It is years since there has been sufficient cars to handle the business. As a matter of fact there never has been sufficient, even with borrowings from the United States. Since the U. S. roads have refused to lend their cars in any numbers for this purpose, the shortage has been more marked than previously.

With the advent of the Government as owners or controllers of the line, we were told everything would be lovely. We should get many things we were unable to get before. Instead of a better condition, we have a worse. If we can get fish cars, a station, a round house and a suitable extension of the yards in addition to coal bunkers, we shall feel like welcoming the Government ownership of the road. The immediate need, however, is fish cars, and these we expect to get soon.

**Real Race to be Held Very Soon.**  
 There is to be a real yacht race in the near future, if the sportsmen of the countries interested will only take the matter up and enter boats. The King of Belgium has offered a prize for a race from Sandy Hook to Ostend. This will be no fine weather race. A boat will have to be a real sailing craft and not a toy in order to enter. An international event of that kind would be something to talk about.

**VISCOUNT GREY AND TREATIES**

**Urges Keeping League of Nations to Prevent War in Future**  
 When having conferred on him the freedom of the city of Glasgow, Viscount Grey spoke of present world politics. He said in part: "What I do feel about this country is that the general sense of the community will show that, as has often been the case before when other nations had been driven to extreme courses, there has been an element of stability and solid sense in this country which has sought for remedies, not by sudden violence, but by steady and peaceful reform. But I do feel that it is essential that there should not be another war, and if there is not to be another war we must see that in Europe there does not grow up again the state of things that there was before the war. (Cheers).

**No Secret Treaties**  
 Proceeding, Lord Grey said that he agreed with those who said there should be no secret treaties. He had made some, but that was in time of war when they were inevitable. Mentioning incidentally the military conversations with France, he pointed out the stipulation on our part that these conversations were not to commit either country. The state of Europe before the war was one of alliance and counter-alliance and competition in armaments. "I am as strong as anybody could be," Lord Grey continued, "that we ought to maintain the closest possible relations with our late Allies, especially with France and Italy. I say nothing about the United States for the moment, because the United States is waiting for a declaration of policy from its newly-elected President. Until that policy is declared I think any attempt to anticipate what line the United States may take, and still more any attempt to influence that line, would be perfectly futile and probably mischievous.

**Armament Competition**  
 "The Triple Alliance made by Germany after 1870 brought into existence the Franco-Russian alliance, which led to competition in armaments. If we let things take the same course again in spite of the warnings of this war, we shall have the same result. It is absolutely necessary to keep some Council of the Nations together. Keep them in touch; keep your relations with your Allies, but watch for any tendency to this growth of competition in armaments and when any nation is beginning to force the pace in the competition of armaments prevent that competition growing up as before the war.

**League of Nations**  
 To do that you must have something which keeps nations in touch and keeps them together. Some people say that in a League of Nations there will not be any certainty. There will not be a certainty, but I am quite convinced if you have another war 20 years hence it will, in a sense, be like this war, but it will be infinitely worse and there will be a certainty that it will destroy the civilization of Europe. If you tell me the League of Nations is Utopia the answer I give is: "I prefer the chance of Utopia to the certainty of destruction."

**STATION AGENT WAS SENTENCED TO TEN MONTHS AT OKALLA**  
 H. Birdsall, of New Hazelton, had \$700 Shortage in His Accounts  
 Arraigned for a hearing on the charge of failing to account for a shortage of over \$700 in his accounts as station agent at New Hazelton, H. Birdsall was tried at that town last Thursday before Magistrate Hoskins. Acting on the advice of his counsel, L. S. McGill of Smithers, Birdsall pleaded guilty and asked for clemency. The magistrate took into consideration the plea, which saved much trouble and expense and also the fact that accused's predicament was the result of a protracted spree, and imposed a sentence of ten months at Okalla. Two painters at the New Hazelton station at the time were discharged as having nothing to do with the money shortage. Two-color window cards take the eye quickly. 

### NEW CREAMERY FOR TOWN OF TELKWA

Edmonton City Dairy Purchases Lots and Lets Contract for Building.

Word has been received here that the Edmonton City Dairy has purchased two lots in the north end of the town of Telkwa and will erect a creamery there, which they will operate in connection with their general creamery business. The contractors for the building are the Telkwa Lumber Co. and it is understood the creamery will be ready for operation in the spring.

The Edmonton City Dairy tried to purchase the Vanderhoof Creamery, which was started by the Provincial Government, but failing in that decided to erect one at Telkwa, which is the centre of a large dairying and cattle country. The experience of the farmers in marketing beef this year has made them keen to take to dairying.

### BOARD OF WORKS IS TO NEGOTIATE FOR CITY GRANITE QUARRY

The Board of Works has been authorized to open negotiations for the securing of a granite quarry for obtaining surfacing rock for the proposed resurfacing of the downtown streets. It is understood that the city has offers already, one of these being from C. C. Ketchum.

The idea of shale rock being used is discouraged by reports from the Board of Works and the city engineer. Granite rock would be a much superior material and would fill the needs of the streets for some years to come, making a good basis for permanent concrete surfacing.

### FUR AUCTION

Bear Skins Brought as High as \$15 and \$20 for the Best Black and Grizzly.

Mail advices give more particulars of the recent fur sale at New York. The generally good prices obtained for squirrel and the active bidding for the choicer assortments of this fur were easily the leading features of the closing day. Several good lots were included in the collection, and a high price of \$1.28 each was paid for prime dark Russian skins. Squirrel prices were said to be well above the dealers' original estimates of the values of the skins, and more than one buyer was at a loss to understand why the bids were so high. The collection contained over 124,000 skins.

Next in interest to squirrel came raccoons, which also sold well and brought good prices, the highest of which was \$7.70. Bidding for mole, the collection of which was said not to be of particularly good quality, dragged quite a little, and the best of the approximately 475,000 pelts sold brought 15 cents. The highest prices of the day were obtained for the offerings of polar, grizzly and black bears. Polar bear reached \$52.50, while the best grizzly and black bearskins brought \$20 and \$15.50, respectively. About 51,000 ermine fetched prices ranging from 4 cents to \$1.70 each.

### MILITARY HONORS FOR DAWSON FIRE CHIEF

Late Andrew Hart was Laid to Rest Sunday at Yukon Capital.

DAWSON, Y. T., Feb. 1.—Andrew Hart, Dawson's famous fire chief, a veteran of three British wars, was laid to rest on Sunday. Among the veterans who followed the remains was Hugh Hamilton, an octogenarian, who fought in the world-famous charge of the Light Brigade at Balaclava.

Full military honors were accorded the deceased by the Canadian Mounted Police and the Great War Veterans, the American veterans and others being present.

### Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to 15 an acre; second-class to 12 1/2 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may apply for adjustment of boundaries with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted a certificate of title, or, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted an immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to value of \$500 per annum and records same each year.

Failure to make improvements on record same will operate to nullify future. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption which requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 50 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. From time with the said forces, or the wife of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended for or one year from the death of such person, as formerly until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**

Grazing Act, 1913, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or cash-for-free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, to be issued.
