## Railway Company Takes Over Shipyard and Drydock Here And Will Operate Them Both

There is no chance of the local shipyard closing. Word has been received locally that the Canadian National Railways are to take over the yard and drydock as soon as the present contract with the Wallace Shipbuilding and Drydock Company expires. It is understood, take over the plant put in by the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company, and will also take over all the work now being done in the yard.

It is announced that in order to carry on the work a competent staff will be engaged of men familiar with all classes of shipyard and drydock operation, and the yard will enter into competition for the work of the coast. It is generally expected that the railway will do all the work for the yard and also undertake the building and docking of the merchant marine vessels. This will give a large amount of employment and will be for not only a considerable permanent staff but also will be a good deal of casual employment especially at times when the vessels here for repair. It is very probable that the yard will be put out for new contracts just as business takes a turn and the yard are contracts offering. The shipbuilding company in the yard employed anywhere from 50 to 250 men, according to the amount of repair work. Just what will be needed under the new conditions cannot be stated.

Offer made by the Wallace shipyard was not sufficiently attractive to induce the railway to enter into a lease.

## SEND CHARLES TO AN ISLAND

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The attempt of former Emperor Charles to regain the throne of Austria may result in his being sent to an island of the Canary group, according to diplomatic circles. The general belief is he will be removed to a safe place in Europe.

## EAGLE TRIES CARRY OFF LITTLE GIRL

The struggles of the child and mother prevented the bird from getting away, and it was finally beaten to death by Matthew Sempie. The little girl suffered a number of flesh wounds, but is rapidly recovering.

## PERRY CRITIC OF GOVERNMENT

Objects to Method of Dealing With Beaver Pelts and Urges Completion P. G. E.

VICTORIA, Oct. 25.—H. G. Perry of Prince George yesterday criticized the Government policy in regard to Pouce Coupe oil lands and suggested that the Government stop expenditure on them and let the public do it. He urged the completion of the P. G. E. to Prince George no matter what it costs and the projected railway into the Peace River country. He said the people of the north country wondered why the Government could not spend money on roads there while it spent \$150,000 on a liquor warehouse at Vancouver.

Mr. Perry said the people expected a reduction in taxation and the people with small incomes were entitled to the first reduction. He alleged that the people in the upper country believed there had been graft in the dealings over beaver pelts and demanded that Dr. A. R. Baker, chairman of the game conservation board, resign and the game board be abolished, giving place to a committee of the Legislature.

John Catherwood, Conservative member for Dewdney, introduced an amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne asking the Legislature to express disapproval of the Government's attitude to the petition from settlers of Nicomen Island for assistance in rebuilding the dykes to protect them from the floods, which Catherwood says in two successive seasons have reduced the settlers to poverty.

## Hungarian Rebellion Broken and Ex-Emperor and Empress With Supporters Are in Prison

BUDAPEST, Oct. 25.—Ex-Emperor Charles and the Empress Zita have been captured and imprisoned and the military leaders of the monarchist uprising in Hungary have been arrested. Troops scattered the political allies who have been imprisoned following the second abortive attempt to place Charles on the throne of Hungary. A provisional government under Regent Horty retains the reins of government and the uprising is believed to have been definitely broken.

## STOLE MILLION DOLLARS FROM U. S. MAIL SACKS

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Three armed bandits yesterday halted a mail truck on lower Broadway, unlocked the registered mail sacks, and selecting four which contained valuables, got away with a total of about a million dollars.

## PROHIBITION OF NO EFFECT

United States Government Allows Unrestricted Medicinal Wine and Beer.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The Government authorizes doctor's prescriptions for medicinal beer and wine in the United States. The prohibitionists are up in arms, having prevented effect being given in the courts to the ruling last March that medicinal beer and wine were legal, pending anti-beer legislation which has not yet been passed by Congress.

The Government states that they cannot longer withhold such rights from the public.

## MILLION AND HALF UNEMPLOYED ARE IN GREAT BRITAIN NOW

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Nearly a million and a half people will be without employment in Britain throughout the coming winter, according to W. J. McNamara, minister of labor. The Government has decided to extend the scope of the Unemployment Bill to Ireland.

## FREEMAN WINS FIRST ROUND

is Granted Permission to Carry Passengers and Freight to Stewart.

Capt. Freeman has won the first round of his fight with the Dominion Government Department of Marine and has been granted a clearance for Stewart for the launch Narbethong.

The Captain says that he was going out of his business of carrying Stewart and here. It is too late to get it back. He is instead asking permission to sue the Government for damages caused by their refusal to allow him to ply his business and at the same time giving those rights to others with boats no better equipped. He is asking for compensation in the sum of \$250,000.

## FORMER RULER TRIED TO SHOOT

Would Have Killed Self if Queen Had Not Interfered.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 25.—Former Emperor Charles, whose attempt to regain the Magyar throne met with dismal failure yesterday, attempted to commit suicide by shooting himself following his arrest near Komorn. The former Emperor Zita saw him preparing and prevented him carrying out his intention.

## Colonel Peck Lays His Case Before People of Rupert

The opening meeting of the federal campaign was that held last night in the Westholme Theatre when Lieut.-Col. G. W. Peck, V.C., representative for Skeena riding in the late Parliament, addressed the electors of the city, telling of his work as a member of Parliament, explaining his present position and announcing his future policies. The theatre was filled and Colonel Peck was given a quiet and attentive hearing with no disturbances or untoward incidents. A reel of motion pictures was shown before the curtain was raised on the platform where the soldier member was seated by himself at a flag bedecked table. Before he started his speech two pipers marched up and down the two aisles playing a martial air.

## EFFORTS MADE RESCUE MINERS

Two Imprisoned 2300 Feet Below Surface at Britannia By Cave-in.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 25.—Efforts are being made to rescue two laborers, L. P. Craig and Francis Patenaude, who are imprisoned in the shaft of the Britannia mines, 2300 feet below the surface. The upper works of the shaft caved in Thursday night but both men are believed to be alive.

## WALLACE HAS MADE OFFER

Second Effort to Secure Lease of Drydock by Local Concern.

H. J. F. Turney, manager of the Wallace Shipbuilding and Drydock Company Limited, stated this morning that his firm had made another offer in connection with the lease of the local shipyard and drydock. He said he did not know what attitude the railway company would take toward it.

The opinion was freely expressed around the city this morning that it was hoped the Wallace company would be able to make arrangements with the railway company to continue to operate here because a private company usually got more work and was more successful in a commercial business than a government-operated concern.

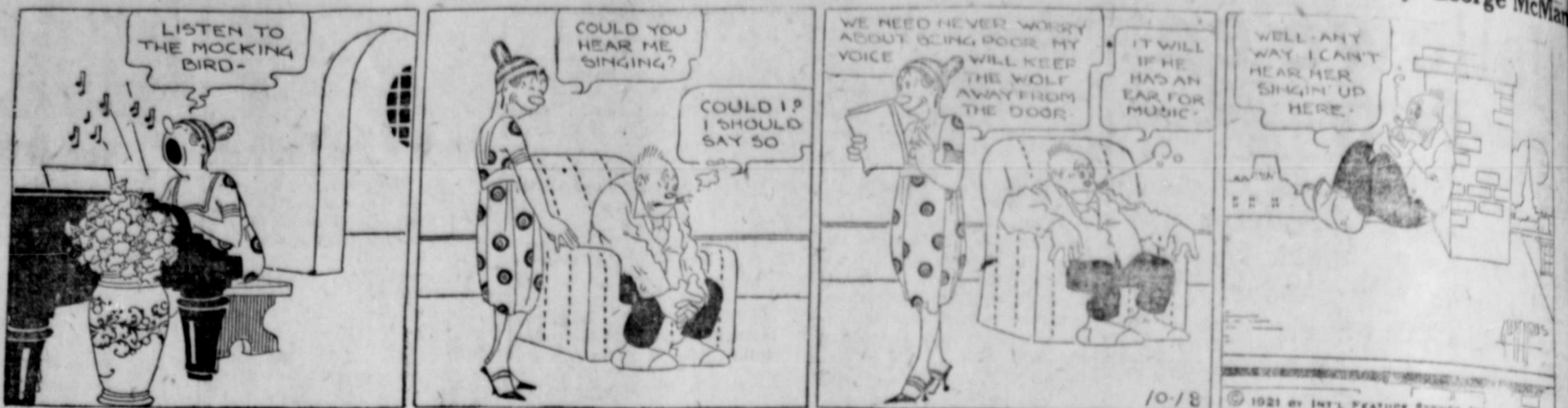

BRINGING UP FATHER



BERT KERGIN PRAISES HIS CONSTITUENCY

Tells Legislature of Wonderful Atlin Country and Mentions P. G. E.

According to the report in the Victoria Colonist, Bert Kergin, member for Atlin was not quite correctly reported in the despatch which came over the wire and which was much condensed.

According to the Colonist, a good word for the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, the Government owned and operated project which has been in the past received scant praise, was voiced in the debate on the address.

"A wonderful piece of work, something the people of the province agreed to and gave the then government a mandate to proceed with its construction," was the way Mr. Kergin described the railway.

Pointing to the peculiar situation of the Atlin riding, surrounded on the north and west by a foreign territory, Mr. Kergin stated that at present access to the riding through Canadian territory could be had only in the south, and last year he had had to pay twenty per cent discount on good Canadian money in seeing his own riding, having to enter through United States territory and being forced to pay exchange on his money.

The crying need of his district is roads, he said, and he pointed to the fact that much is being said at present about a possible war between the United States and Japan.

In such an event his district would practically be cut off, he said. What was imperatively required, he held, was a highway connecting the Atlin district with the rest of Canada, one from Hazelton to Whitehorse to connect with the trans-provincial highway in the south.

While Atlin is essentially a mining country there are large areas of agricultural land. In the Naas River Valley there was the largest area of fine land to be found anywhere else in the Province, and there is not today even a colonization road to that section, something imperatively required if the area is to be settled.

Wage Insurance. Mr. Kergin dealt with a number of the problems confronting the people of Atlin, advocating a system of wage insurance to protect workers in industries, declaring that there had been cases where companies had defaulted in wage payments. The Government, he considered, should arrange to take a lien on a company's payroll and in case of defaultation by the company, collect for the men.

Eulogizing the scenic attractions of Atlin, Mr. Kergin declared: "You talk about Vancouver Island, and you sometimes get as far north as Prince Rupert, but you never hear of your tourist associations down here mentioning Atlin, the district, par excellence, for scenery, game and natural resources, the most consistent gold producer in Canada."

Wealth of Riding. The member for Atlin referred to the Premier mine as an

example of the mineral wealth of the riding and declared that at Anyox is located one of the three biggest copper producing concerns in the world. Atlin, he averred, is one of the greatest assets the Province possesses and it would be to the interest of the people of the other portions of the Province to get acquainted with that district, which must bring in all its supplies from outside and, therefore, is a matter of importance to the business interests of the Province.
