Shaughnessy to Explain His Policy

R. MORRISON GETS PERMANENT APPOINTMENT AS POSTMASTER HERE

Ships Had To Be Policed at Baltimore Result of Strike; Five Sail from San Francisco

BALTIMORE, May 4.—Ships here had to be policed in to stop the rioting in connection with attempts to operate ships while the marine strike is on. Shipping is at a standstill at this port. One ship was raided by strikers and volunteer force removed.

WAGES CUT IN THE STATES

Steel Corporation Makes a Reduction of \$1.40 a Day per Man.

NEW YORK, May 4.—The United States Steel Corporation announces a cut of 20 per cent in the wages of employees and a proportional reduction in the salaries and expenses, resulting in an average reduction of \$1.40 a day per man, effecting a payroll saving of \$150,000,000 annually.

Heavy cuts in the price of steel products have already been announced.

ENGINEERS FOR NEW PULP MILL COMING

John Emerson Arrived From Vancouver This Morning to Spend Few Days.

John Emerson, of the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., has reached the city accompanied by Mrs. Emerson. They will spend a few days in town and may return to Vancouver on Monday.

Engineers Crowell and Leland, of the Mead Engineering Co., Dayton, Ohio, who are construction experts, will reach here on tomorrow night's train to inspect the site at Seal Cove and Engineer Barrows, a hydraulic man, will follow on Sunday night to investigate the power prospects.

A GLASGOW POLICE INSPECTOR KILLED; DETECTIVE WOUNDED

GLASGOW, May 4.—A police inspector was shot dead and a detective wounded this morning in what is believed to be the first Sinn Fein attack on the police in Scotland. The Sinn Feiners fired on a policeman, who was escorting a van conveying a man to prison. The assailants escaped.

FULTON TO FIGHT TEMPLE TONIGHT

PITTSBURG, May 4.—Fred Fulton will meet Jack Temple in a ten-round bout here tonight.

ATTEND CONFERENCE.

OTTAWA, May 4.—Plans are being made for Premier Meighen to sail for London on June 7 to attend the conference of overseas premiers.

STATE OF WAR UPPER SILESIA DECLARE ALLIES

LONDON, May 4.—The Allies declare there is a state of war in Upper Silesia owing to disorders. The French forces have occupied several towns in the territory and efforts are being made to put down the risings.

FUNERAL OF MISSIONARY

Veteran Clergyman of Naas River Laid to Rest This Afternoon

The funeral of the late Rev. James B. McCullagh, veteran missionary of Aiyansh, Naas River, took place this afternoon from the Anglican Church, interment being in Fairview Cemetery. There was a large number of mourners at the service to pay their last respects to the well-known and respected missionary and many of these followed the cortege to the cemetery. Rev. Canon G. A. Bix was the clergyman in charge at the church service and the graveside and he was assisted by Rural Dean W. F. Rushbrook.

Viewed Remains

The body lay in state at St. Andrew's Church from 11 o'clock this morning until the service and many friends passed to view the remains for the last time. The service was a touching one and tender sympathy for those left to mourn a husband and father was expressed by the clergyman, besides sterling tributes that were paid to his memory. The Anglican choir was in attendance and sang the hymns, "Fight the Good Fight," "There is a Happy Land," and "We Thank Thee Now, Our God."

Santa Alicia Carried 3,000 tons of Copper Ore from South America.

SEATTLE, May 4.—The steamer Santa Alicia, owned by W.R. Grace Co., bound from San Francisco to Seattle, ran hard aground today near Port Townsend. Efforts are being made to refloat her.

The vessel carries 3,000 tons of copper ore, which came from South America.

LOCAL MAN TO HELP CELEBRATE AT MCGILL

M. J. Easson, Direct Descendent of University Founder to Visit Montreal.

MONTREAL, May 4.—A search for a direct descendant of James McGill in order that he may be present at the centenary celebration of the founding of McGill University next October is believed to have been found in the person of M. J. Easson of Prince Rupert, aged 21, formerly of the Royal Navy, at present wireless operator on the Dominion Government ship Newington operating in B.C. waters.

DE VALERA APPEALS TO THE VOTERS

Asks Irish to Support Republican Candidates in Coming Election.

DUBLIN, May 4.—De Valera makes an appeal to the Irish people to vote republican in the forthcoming elections as confirmation of the Irish republic, of which he is the titular head. He says the republic was constitutionally founded and is endeavoring to defend the state from its enemies within and without. De Valera further claims that the Irish republic seeks a place in the association of nations.

INVITE THE STATES TO SUPREME COUNCIL

VIENNA, May 4.—Germany is dumping large quantities of goods, trying to hold the Balkan trade despite the allied export tax. German concerns are also acquiring control of Austrian industries.

Canadian National Is Handicapped by Lack of Equipment

OTTAWA, May 4.—The House of Commons railway committee yesterday heard President Hanna testify. He stated that the railways were losing money owing to lack of equipment, quoting Lord Shaughnessy in this regard. He asked the committee not to interfere in the matter of wages.

The committee will probably ask Lord Shaughnessy to appear and explain further his scheme for amalgamation of the railways of the country as set out in the memorandum recently sent to Premier McIver. The memorandum advocated the amalgamation of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways under the management of the Canadian Pacific board of directors with a guaranteed interest rate to G. P. R. bond holders for all time.

DRUG PEDDLERS BIG PENALTY

SOUTHAMPTON, May 4.—A prediction that the coal strike would be over in a week was made here by J. H. Thomas, general secretary of the national union of railwaymen, who is sailing for the United States.

CONTRACT LET FOR NEW ROAD

Company of Alice Arm People Gets Contract for Work of Completion

ALICE ARM, May 4.—The contract for the completion of the road from the proposed new Dominion Government wharf here to the town has been let to O. M. Watson and a company of sixteen local men, according to an announcement made yesterday by Road Superintendent George A. Young on receipt of advice from Victoria where the tenders were opened some days ago. It is understood there were several tenders for the work, some of them from outside places. Preparations are being made now by the local men to get work started immediately with a view to completing the road early this season.

The citizens last week sent a message to Col. Peck at Ottawa inquiring as to what progress was being made on the plans for the new wharf which will now be made necessary and was to have followed the construction of the road by the provincial government. No reply has been received till yesterday morning.

EXTRA DAYLIGHT SAVING IN ENGLAND OWING TO STRIKE

LONDON, May 4.—An extra daylight saving hour has been decreed here owing to the coal strike in order to save fuel. This means that the clocks are two hours in advance of normal.

UNITED WAR VETERANS WOULD AMALGAMATE

WINNIPEG, May 4.—The United Veterans recommend an amalgamation of all returned soldiers in a political effort for a re-established demand for loans free of interest for two years and similar advantages in regard to land settlement for soldiers.

COAL STRIKE IN SILESIA

Clash Between French Troops and Insurgents—No Decision Regarding Territory.

BERLIN, May 4.—The International Commission at Oppeln denies the award of the upper Silesian districts to Germany, stating that no decision has yet been reached.

The coal strike continues and there has been a clash between French troops and insurgents, resulting in a defeat for the insurgents.

COL. WINSBY HERE ON BUSINESS FOR NEW LIQUOR BOARD

Col. W. N. Winsby, of the provincial liquor board, arrived in the city on the Prince George and will look over the local situation in connection with the establishment of the operations of the new liquor act here. After spending a few days here he will go to Prince George, which is also to be a headquarters point under the act.

Col. Winsby will likely leave here on Saturday morning.

Miss Laut Sees
Wonderful Things.

Visitors often see more of our country than we do. They see its possibilities and perhaps have a better basis of comparison than people who are on the ground. Miss Agnes G. Laut, the well known writer, has in MacLean's Magazine an article on the National Railway in which she speaks appreciatively of this part of the country. She says: "When Canadian oil reaches the shipping point it means Edmonton a second Pittsburg, Vancouver a second San Francisco, Prince Rupert a second Seattle, Terrace, British Columbia, a second Spokane." She also mentions that Prince George will become a second Butte or Helena, humbling with mining and lumbering and pulp activity. "These things have materialized in the United States in the last twenty years and they will as inevitably materialize in Canada."

Inside Passage
To Vancouver.

Miss Laut says of the scenery: "Take the Inside Passage Way down from Prince Rupert to Vancouver and American points. As a scenic route, it is the most beautiful thing in the world. There is nothing in Norway to approach it in beauty. I shall not try to describe that beauty. I shall do it elsewhere in another place. There is nothing in the East Coast or the West Coast of America to approach that beauty. It is a sea calm as a mill pond, with a Rocky Mountain panorama of moving pictures in color on both sides. It is a Grand Canyon of Colorado with the sea between."

I suppose you know that the Grand Canyon of the Colorado is what has made tourist traffic the great source of income to the Santa Fe. Well, here is a Grand Canyon for two days and a night with a sea calm as a mill pond! Do you know how many steamships our Nationals have for tourists? Two! They could fill twenty to the roof.

"I was told the rains would fall on me so continuously in this region that I would begin to sprout shoulder feathers like a duck, or fins like a fish. I was on this coast for fourteen days in the transition period from summer to autumn, when the rains are supposed to deluge your soul with gray blankets of mist and depression. There was exactly one shower and it was at night. I suppose people, who hope for the very worst, will say that was a Satanic pre-arrangement to delude me."

"Well, I was deluded. I was deluded into thinking it the most beautiful coastal trip in the world; and I know the coastal trips of America from Labrador to Vera Cruz, and from California to Alaska. There is nothing else like it in the world. It is warm in winter and cool in summer, and beautiful as a dream; and our Nationals have exactly two steamers to handle the tourist traffic."

Benefit for
Local Lad.

There is to be a benefit concert on Monday for a local lad who lost a hand through the bursting of a firecracker at the last Dominion Day celebration. The committee having in charge the work of putting on this public benefit points out that they are acting in purely a gratuitous manner. An action was commenced against the city and the Sons of Canada and several individual members of the celebration committee. The defendants found that there had been no carelessness on the part of any of the defendants and denied all liability. The action was discontinued and a committee was formed to take up a public subscription for the lad. It is proposed to raise as large a sum as possible to be paid to a trustee to provide for the education of the boy and to, as far as possible, compensate him for the loss sustained. The city has undertaken to put up dollar for dollar with the committee, not to exceed \$1,000.

It is unfortunate that accidents of this description should occur from time to time. Public spirited citizens who have celebrations of this kind in hand from year to year feel that parents should co-operate to prevent the use of dangerous fire-crackers. Those who celebrate Dominion Day should, however, be liberal on this occasion and see that the lad gets such help as will do away with the handicap under which he lives.
