## EFFECT OF STRIKE ON FINANCES

### EASTERN CANADA SUFFERS SERIOUSLY FROM THE INTENSE HEAT

#### Heat Wave in East Gives Great Uneasiness Because of Danger from Fires; Two Die in Montreal

TORONTO, July 7.—The heat wave continues and much illness is reported as a result. Temperatures ranging from 90 degrees to 100 are reported in all parts of Ontario and business is suffering as a result. Several plants have closed down owing to the condition.

Forest fires continue in Northern Ontario and only the absence of wind is saving the settlements from the fire menace. Property damage so far is very little and there is no definite report of the loss of life so far.

ST. JOHN, July 7.—Forest fires are threatening the summer colony of Hillside in Cumberland county, Nova Scotia. The neighboring country is swept by fires and the situation is threatening.

MONTREAL, July 7.—Two deaths are reported here so far as a result of the intense heat. There are many cases of heat prostration.

QUEBEC, July 7.—Forest fires are laying waste vast timber areas in an unprecedented degree in numerous sections of the province. The situation is considered grave. Officials are consulting in regard to measures to check the devastation.

#### PROSPECT FOR SETTLEMENT IN IRELAND GOOD

General Smuts Went to Belfast at Invitation of Valera, Says Lloyd George.

LONDON, July 7.—Premier Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons today that General Smuts, Premier of the Union of South Africa, went to Ireland on Tuesday on the invitation of Eamon de Valera, the Republican leader. An official refutation of the statement that the outlook was hopeful and that nothing had transpired that would seriously jeopardize the prospects of a settlement was made. Premier Smuts was in conference with King George for half an hour.

#### COMMUNICATION WAS TAKEN UP

Imperial Conference Decides Apportion Commission to Consider Development.

LONDON, July 7.—Sharp criticism of the scarcity and slowness of communication between Great Britain and the Dominions by telegraph, airplane, telephone and wireless was voiced at the Imperial Conference on Tuesday. It was decided to appoint a commission to consider the development of communications throughout the Empire.

#### Coal Miners' Strike Was Cause of Great Loss to Men and Government

LONDON, July 7.—The coal strike cost Great Britain 70,000,000 working days and incurred extra expenditures for the Government alone of £18,000,000, according to an official statement just issued by the Government Department of Labor.

Great Britain is still in a bad way financially and is making enormous efforts to overcome the difficulties. There is a new budget issue, and the statement given out in connection with it discloses the fact that the country faces immediate obligations to the amount of £300,000,000 instead of £100,000,000 shown in the annual budget brought down by the Chancellor of the Exchequer in the House of Commons this year.

#### BRADY SPEAKS ON EDUCATION

Delivered Masterly Address Before Rotary Club This Afternoon.

In a masterly address before the Rotary Club this afternoon, in the St. Regis apartment dining room, Principal Brady of the High School, urged co-operation in the part of the businessmen of the community in connection with the work of the schools. He particularly urged that when the boy left school his ideal should not be shocked by a different ideal found outside the classroom. The mental, physical and moral education had to be attended to and this could not be all done by the teacher, but the parents and the school community must help. Playgrounds were necessary and apparatus must be secured to carry out the physical work. Organized play was one of the best preventives of young people going astray.

In opening Mr. Brady stated he was glad to feel that the world was moving forward and not backward. Education was the leading factor in the development of the country. Without education for the children there could be no future success. He spoke of the value of the work of the Imperial conference on education at Winnipeg and of the urge toward co-operation between parent and teacher, between the people and the school and between the school board and teacher. This co-operation spell success.

#### Education and War.

It was necessary to set ourselves the task of looking at other men's problems. In this way success in civic life was assured. Progress today was unique and wonderful. The war showed forward the cause of education many years. It was shown that the best work in the war was done by the educated. Education was the absolute foundation for the elimination of unrest in order to avoid the social cataclysm which seemed to be eating at the vitals of society. The effect of the press, the cause was seen in the boys and girls.

Mr. Brady said it must be realized that the boys and girls needed 100 per cent attention in order to assure safety, progress and contentment. Many left school early and often before their characters were formed. They found themselves in a blind alley of life. Millions entered that blind alley and their chance of success was small. They were almost hopeless. The High School was the finest character building institution in the world.

"The value of the boy is known today as it never was known before," said the speaker. The teacher takes the child and forms it as a sculptor forms the marble. There was not always complete stress but with the aid of the thinking portion of the community there should be 100 per cent efficiency.

#### RAILWAY BONDS ARE SOLD IN NEW YORK BY GOVERNMENT

NEW YORK, July 7.—The Canadian Government on behalf of the Canadian National Railways has sold in a New York bankers' syndicate \$25,000,000 of 4 1/2 per cent bonds, yielding six and a half per cent. This is understood to be sold for the purpose of purchasing equipment and making improvements to the roads.

#### BISLEY MEET STARTS TODAY

This Meeting Characterized by Getting Back to Pre-War Conditions.

BISLEY CAMP, July 7.—The fifty-eighth annual meet of the National Rifle Association opens here today and continues for three weeks until Thursday, July 21, when the last stage for the King's Prize will be shot.

This year's meeting is notable because it goes back to a large extent to pre-war conditions for the match shooting. The last stage of the King's Prize will be shot at a thousand yards.

The Canadians set a great score in winning the Kolapore Cup open to eight teams from the Mother Country and the Dominions. They were ten shots at 300, 500 and 600 yards.

#### NATIONALISTS DEMAND SULTAN'S ABDICATION

ATHENS, July 7.—The Turkish Nationalist government in Ankara has demanded that Sultan Mehmed VI abdicate.

#### War Veterans Executive Make Many Demands and Will Call General Convention

PORT ARTHUR, July 7.—The Great War Veterans' executive has decided to hold a general convention at Fort William and Port Arthur between September 19 and October 22.

The executive concluded its sessions with a resolution calling for state control and distribution of employment agencies; compulsory employment by firms on their staffs of 25 per cent returned men; a cent a mile rate for veterans going to jobs; reduction of immigration and deportation of undesirables; a proposition for public works to open up immediately to relieve unemployment, one of the principal public works to include the construction of a grand national highway from coast to coast.

#### LORD BALFOUR OF BURLEIGH IS DEAD

Was 72 Years of Age and Had Long Political Career in Britain.

LONDON, July 7.—Lord Balfour of Burleigh is dead here, aged 72. He took a prominent part in British political life and was Lord Warden of the Stannaries since 1905. He was secretary to the Board of Trade and secretary for Scotland with a seat in the cabinet between 1905 and 1906. He resigned in the latter year because of disagreement with his colleagues on the fiscal policy.

#### ARRESTED HERE ON CHARGE OF THEFT

E. W. Thorne to be Sent South to Ocean Falls Tonight in Custody.

E. W. Thorne of Ocean Falls was arrested here this morning by Constable McElroy on a charge of theft in response to a telegram received by Chief Constable Heston of Ocean Falls. Thorne is being sent south tonight in custody and will be held by Magistrate Andrew Tyson at Ocean Falls.

#### TUG LORNE GOING TO OCEAN FALLS

Leaving Tonight with Tow of Logs from This Port to Ocean Falls.

Steam has again been raised in the boilers of the Grand Trunk Pacific tug Lorne, Captain McKernan, and the vessel is today preparing to leave here tonight or tomorrow with a tow of logs from the Prince Rupert saw mill to the Pacific Mills at Ocean Falls. The Lorne has been tied up for about six weeks and now there is only the one trip in sight so it is not known if she will remain in operation long.

#### Smuts Thinks Irish Problem Solved by Giving and Taking

LONDON, July 7.—General Smuts who is back from Dublin thinks the Irish problem can be solved on a policy of give and take. His optimism has impressed London although nothing definite has been given out by the Government and Sinn Fein denied officially in Dublin that the rumor that Smuts brought back written proposals to Lloyd George from De Valera.

The Prince of Wales' visit to Liverpool today found Sinn Fein flags intertwined with the Union Jack. The Sinn Fein official explained that the flags were so displayed on orders from Dublin.

#### TUG BERMUDA GOT INTO TROUBLE AND W'S TOWED TO PORT

Little Vessel Engaged in Car Ferry Service Broke Tail Shaft Outside Harbor.

The Whalen Pulp and Paper Company's tug Bermuda, chartered by the Grand Trunk Pacific National Steamship Co. for towing car barges, broke her tail shaft near the entrance of the harbor yesterday afternoon and had to be towed to port with her ferry behind her by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's fishing schooner, Chief Zimassa. She reached here last evening and has gone into the local dry dock for repairs.

The Bermuda was on her way to this port from Swanson Bay with a tow of cars when the accident occurred.

#### PROPOSAL TO MOVE DIVISIONAL POINT LUCERNE TO JASPER

VICTORIA, July 7.—Representations by a delegation from Lucerne, B.C., regarding a proposal to remove the Canadian National divisional point from there to Jasper, which would wipe Lucerne out of existence, has moved Premier Oliver to wire a formal protest to President Hain and the Railway Commission.

#### SHOOTING IN IRELAND THREE WERE KILLED

DUBLIN, July 7.—Three republicans were killed when a party attacked the special police at Castleknock, Dúnail. Constable Brewer was dangerously wounded in the shooting at Limerick hospital.

Monaghan assizes were isolated when republicans cut the wires and trenched the roads.

#### RAILWAY LABOR

Action of General Chairman of United States Unions Opens Up Local Question.

MONTREAL, July 7.—The railway labor situation will reach a climax this week. The refusal of the general chairman of the United States unions to accept the wage cut which became effective last Friday throws the Canadian situation into the fire.

#### CONVICT SHOT BY SHERIFF'S PURSUIT POSSE

Luther Fagan Shot Man and Abducted Wife and Daughter.

HOOD RIVER, July 7.—Luther Fagan was shot by a sheriff's posse and killed near here on Wednesday night. Two women and a boy he abducted were recovered unhurt.

Fagan is a paroled convict sent up on a charge of assault on a young woman to whose house he returned and when told the girl was not at home shot her step father and forcibly abducted the wife, daughter and a small boy. He fled but the flight ended when the sheriff's posse overtook the party with orders to shoot Fagan on sight.

The step father is expected to recover from his wounds.

#### CARIBOU ARE EXTERMINATED INDIANS STARVE

Terrible Tale of Cannibalism Has Been Brought to Fort Smith to Be Investigated.

FORT McMURRAY, Alta., July 7.—The mounted police at Fort Smith have left to investigate a terrible story of starvation among the Indians of the Caribou tribe. Human bones were brought in as evidence of cannibalism.

The present distress seems to have been brought about by the wantonness of the Indians in past years. A few years ago Caribou were so plentiful that the Indians ate nothing but their tongues, slaughtering the animals by thousands. At that time it was prophesied that the Caribou would disappear from the district and that prophecy has been fulfilled.

#### RUMORED SINN FEIN ABANDONS REPUBLIC

BELFAST, July 7.—A rumor current in usually well-informed circles is to the effect that the Sinn Feiners have abandoned their demand for a republic in Ireland. Confirmation is lacking.

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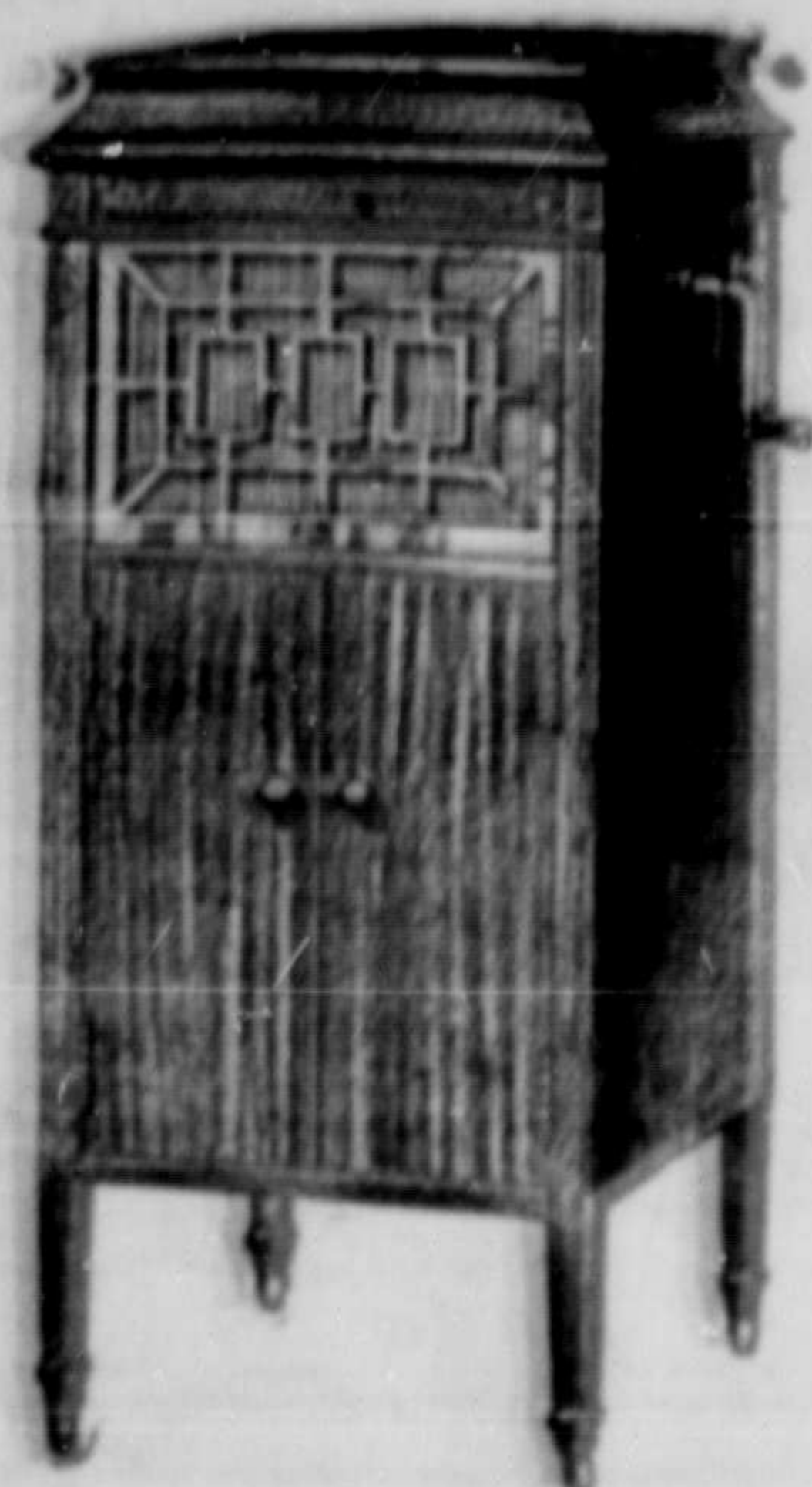
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## ORCHESTRA IS FIRST CLASS

## SASKATCHEWAN WATER SYSTEM

Proposed Plan to Utilize River Supply at Enormous Cost

REGINA, Sask., July 7.—(30) July 27 voters of the province will be given the opportunity of accepting or rejecting the Saskatchewan River Water scheme, recommended by a provincial government commission, whereby 12,000,000 gallons of water a day may be pumped from the river near Riverhurst. Construction necessary is estimated to cost \$5,700,000, and as population increases and expansion is required, \$7,000,000. Cost of branch distribution systems is in addition to this and \$1,000,000 should cover all extra 200 miles of such branch pipe lines.

The water will be distributed by pipe lines throughout the Moose Jaw, Regina district as far east as Lang and Yellow Grass on the Soo Line. The cost of construction will be met, if present plans are ratified, by the proceeds of debentures secured by the total assessable property in the district. Interest and repayment of those debentures will be met from the revenue from the sale of water.

Two years construction work will be necessary before the water can be delivered to the Moose Jaw district and three years for Regina.

### FISH ARRIVALS

Four fish boats arrived today with halibut for the local market. The big schooner Seymour had 55,000 pounds which was sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. for freezing purposes at 8c and 1c. The Agnes B., 3500 pounds, and Daisy, 2500 pounds, sold to the Allen Fishermen at 9c and 5c. The W. and P., with 10,000 pounds, is holding over for tomorrow's regular sale.

### BRADY SPEAKS ON EDUCATION

the Holman and Jelsam of humanity was seen. This Holman and Jelsam had no vision. They were here a great proportion of foreign born. These ideals must be engendered. They must adapt the principles of faith and patriotism. To do this the teacher needed at all times the freshness of youth. He did his part but it was with the community at large that the future rested. The business world should connect up with the schools.

### Health Necessary.

Mr. Brady said it was up to the business men of the community to feed and show that they could not afford to lose one boy. Everyone could help. Well arranged and well ordered playgrounds with organized games were most important. It should be the exception rather than the rule for a boy to go astray. Intellectual development was very important and the children here had that. They must, however, have also the motive power, health and good physique. When a boy went out from the school he was often burdened from his pedestal of ideals. He urged the Rotary Club to give its moral support to the schools and to initiate if possible some form of scholarship to encourage those whose hands were tied by poverty.

## BRINGING UP FATHER

## Lloyd George Urges Churches Not to Interfere in Public Affairs Beyond Their Scope

Speaking in Welsh at a meeting of a Methodist General Assembly at Portmadoc, Lloyd George said that recently there was an important convocation of very highly-placed divines who proceeded forthwith to discuss the coal strike. They expressed an opinion upon the best method of settling the strike. It was not a question which they were in the least competent to discuss. That was an example of an interference by a religious organization in the task of government which, if followed, would be replete with mischief to both Church and State.

**Irish Question.**  
Now he was going to give a perhaps more dangerous illustration, and here he must ask for their forbearance. He alluded to the Irish question. He was going to express no opinion about the wrongs or the rights of that controversy. He was only going to point out what an unfitting subject it was for introduction into the debates of religious conferences.

"A party in Ireland representing two-thirds of the population of that island demand complete severance from the United Kingdom, and the setting up of an independent republic in that island close to our shores. At a recent election they have reaffirmed that demand. Every effort I have made publicly and otherwise to secure a modification of that demand has completely failed. They have emphatically stated that they will agree to nothing else. Whether it ought to be conceded or not may be a very proper subject for debate in senates and in political gatherings, but I know you will agree with me that it is certainly not a matter for discussion at a religious conference.

**"War on Britain."**  
In order to establish this republic the Sinn Fein leaders had raised an army and declared war on Great Britain. In the course of that war Great Britain was drawn to defend its position by the use of armed forces. The only alternative was complete surrender. Compromise of any kind the Sinn Feiners had refused even to discuss.

"It is possible that things may have been done even by our forces under the impulse of passion and wrath and fear which one would rather not have happened, but it is very easy for men in the tranquility and—may I also say—the security of the sanctuary to criticize men who are going in hourly peril of their lives, and who whilst walking along the streets or the roads may at any moment witness the stones on their path becoming the blazing messenger of death.

"If they are to be blamed for mistakes they commit, if they are charged with crimes they have not committed, they ought at least to be heard. A religious conference is the last body to condemn such men unheard. Most of them are men who went through the Great War without a stain on their honor. They are entitled to be heard. If they are heard, religious conferences will have their time taken up with debates on questions of fact which are with great difficulty elucidated. The work of the churches will be neglected, and for the decent transaction of the spiritual affairs of the churches will be substituted the cries of prolonged and heated political controversies. That is why I regret the introduction of these subjects."

**Temperance.**  
Dealing with the question of temperance, the Premier said that not only had the churches

there a right to interfere directly; it was their imperative duty to exert the whole of their influence to promote the cause of sobriety by every means in their power. They should do so without any regard to the effect which their interference might have upon the fortunes of any or all political parties. Resolutions did not have much effect. Temperance must not be used merely as a partisan weapon.

**League of Nations Danger.**  
Coming to another issue, "the great issue of the gospel of peace on earth and goodwill amongst men," Mr. Lloyd George said here was a task indeed for the churches. "I am all for the League of Nations," he said, "but that is not enough. There is a real danger that unless something more is done to instruct opinion in the civilized countries of the world the League of Nations may become a breeding ground of intrigues and feuds. Parties and groups may be formed there, and one day when the majority is one way and the force another you may find that the discussions of the League of Nations have only led up to the greatest conflict ever yet witnessed."

**Conscience of People.**  
There must be some influence that will deal with the heart of the people; the conscience of the people must be learned so that it shall abhor bloodshed as a crime. Whether the Covenant of the League of Nations is the best organization for the purpose or whether the American proposition is more likely to succeed, that I respectfully suggest, is not for the churches to discuss. It is for them to create the atmosphere." (Cheers.)

The same observation applied to industrial warfare. There would be disputes in the future as to wages and conditions of labor and how profits were to be distributed. In these struggles the Christian churches could express no opinion as to the merits without stepping outside their legitimate function and imperiling their greater influence.

## DOLLY VARDEN TO SHIP ORE

Three Thousand Tons of Ore on  
Dump Will Be Removed.

ALICE ARM, July 7.—Work will commence this week shipping to the beach about 3000 tons of ore that is already mined at the Dolly Varden. No work in the mine is contemplated at present.

Preparations are now being made to resume operating the railroad which has been closed down since last winter. The future policy of the Taylor Mining Co. in regard to the operation of the property seems to be as uncertain as ever, no new developments have been announced as a result of the recent visit of the president of the company, A. J. T. Taylor, to England.

## CONCRETE ROADS PROVE POPULAR

It is considered good economy to build this class of road, which gives satisfactory service and reduces cost of maintenance to next to nil.

## FORD PROFFITS ARE IMMENSE

Car Turned Out In July Every Six and Half Seconds.

DETROIT, July 7.—Henry Ford's profits for May were the greatest in history, according to E. G. Pipp, former editor of the Dearborn Independent. Ford's weekly, writing for Pipp's Weekly, profits were placed at \$18,000,000 for May. Profit on each car was placed at \$189.162, materials, an efficiency on the production, a systematizing of the work, a reduction in the cost of July 27 elections of the province part of workmen that enable the Ford company to turn out more cars at less cost than had ever before been done in the history of the company it is claimed.

Despite the average reduction of \$25 in the price of the car it is asserted that June profits exceed May by \$1 to \$1.25 per car on all but sedans. This has been made possible by still greater production and a reduction in price of materials.

In this connection the Ford July schedule called for a car every six and one-half seconds which is nearly 100 an hour or 4,800 in an 8-hour day.

After payment of all bills, notes, etc., the Ford cash balance the first of the month was placed at \$6,113,017.03.
