PREMIER RECEIVES OFFICIAL NEWS OF PEACE RIVER OIL STRIKE

Mexican Oilfields Afire and Drilling Towers Are Falling

MEXICO CITY, July 20.—The Amatlan oil fields are afire, drilling towers are falling like chaff and the workmen are fleeing. Reports received here this morning from the field describe the fire as the "greatest catastrophe in the history of the oil fields." The cause of the conflagration is unknown.

CANADIAN ENGLISH IS NEW NAME

H. A. Bull, who is representing the Canadian Government at the local shipyard, received a telegram this morning informing him that the name of the second steamer being built here will be the "Canadian English". The vessel will not be launched until after the trials of the Canadian Scottish which is expected will be run about the third week in August.

SIX CANADIANS IN FINALS FOR KING'S PRIZE

BRISLEY, July 20.—Major C. R. Grose of Guelph won the National Rifle Association silver medal for the highest aggregate score in the second stage of the King's Prize, making a total of 95 out of a possible 100 at two ranges, respectively 300 yards and 600 yards. Canada will have six competitors in the final stage of the King's prize, which is restricted to 100 making the highest aggregate score in the second 100.

CHINAMEN IN POLICE COURT

Mah You and Lee Kwong charged with possession of opium as result of raid. Lee Kwong and Mah You, Chinese who were arrested in the raid on Monday night, appeared in the police court this morning, charged with having opium in their possession and were remanded until tomorrow morning, charged with having taken. The first witness was T. H. Table who testified to "buying" drugs from Mah You with marked money. Constables Macdonald, McMeekin, Poutisic and Loken also gave evidence. The officers told of finding drugs in the possession of both Chinamen as well as the marked money on Mah You.

WANT TO LEGALIZE BEER SELLING

Great War Veterans Association of Vancouver Will Enlist Public Support.

GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES MAY NOT HOLD OFFICE

VANCOUVER, July 20.—The local branch of the Great War Veterans' Association has decided that, hereafter, no government employee may hold office on its executive. Chairman Butlerworth, forthwith, announced his intention of resigning because he was a government employee.

It was decided to inaugurate a province wide campaign to enlist the support of the public for legalizing the selling of beer in veterans' clubs. A letter was read from the Grand Army of United Veterans promising its support on the beer question.

LARGE CATCHES FISH ARRIVING

Three Hundred and Ninety-Three Thousand Pounds Lands Here in Two Days.

Three hundred and ninety-three thousand pounds of walleye but was landed at this port in the last two days. This includes catches of the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Company's trawlers, G. E. Foster and James Carruthers, which made port yesterday with 70,000 pounds and 90,000 pounds respectively. Yesterday the price paid at the Fish Exchange was around 9c but today it had dropped to a few points over 8c. This is on account of the slackening off of the Eastern demand which is being well filled with the large catches that are continually arriving to be marketed here.

It is impractical whether de Valera will go to Belfast to Premier Craig of Ulster, which had been forecasted as a probability.

GALGARY, July 20.—Percival Baker, who was yesterday elected farmer member of the Alberta legislature for Ponona constituency, died in an Edmonton hospital last night as a result of injuries he had sustained while felling trees recently. He was vice-president of the United Farmers of Alberta and had been mentioned for a cabinet position.

Peace River Oil Strike Is Close to B.C. Boundary in Province of Alberta

VICTORIA, July 20.—Premier Oliver yesterday received word direct from Pouce Coupe, where the Imperial Oil Company is drilling for oil, and where it is reported they have struck oil.

The report says the drillers have encountered an outburst of gas with a mixture of oil. The company has fenced its plant with barbed wire and put armed guards around the place to prevent the secrets of the discoverers getting out.

The message explains that the company's well is in Alberta, just the other side of the British Columbia boundary line and south of the Peace River near Rolla, B. C. The company has 70,000 acres under lease and other organizations have 300,000 in the same neighborhood.

OFFICIALS HERE SENDING MEN ON INSPECTION TO PRAIRIES FOR HARVEST

D. Gemble, assistant vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, E. P. Mallory, statistician, and F. B. Naylor, chief inspector of transportation, all of Toronto, arrived in the city by private car attached to last evening's train from the East.

The officers of the railway company are on a trip of general inspection and will go south to Vancouver tomorrow night possibly making the trip tonight by the Prince Rupert to Anyox. After visiting Vancouver they will return East on the Canadian National via Jasper Park, there car turning back to Vancouver to meet them on Saturday.

CONSUL WAKEFIELD LEAVING FOR TWO MONTHS' HOLIDAY

Major George J. Crosby Arrived This Morning From Vancouver to Relieve Him Here.

Major George J. Crosby, American consul associated with the Vancouver consulate at Vancouver for the past year, arrived here this morning on the Prince George to assume the duties of E. A. Wakefield, local consul, who leaves on Sunday night to spend a two months' vacation, in the course of which he will visit New York and Washington. Mrs. Wakefield and family will remain in Prince Rupert.

Major Crosby is a comparatively recent addition to the United States consular staff and during the twenty years preceding his appointment in 1920 was an army officer. He has seen a good deal of service and completed his military career by two years as a staff officer in France. Mrs. Crosby is visiting relatives in the Eastern States.

DUKE AND DUCHESS DEVONSHIRE SAILED

Given a Great Send-off When They Left Canada for Home.

QUEBEC, July 20.—The Duke and Duchess of Devonshire and suite were given a great send-off here when they sailed yesterday for England on the big C. P. R. liner Empress of France.

This morning an English newspaper publication came to the Daily News office addressed Prince Rupert, Comox-Allin-British Columbia, Canada.

VANCOUVER, July 20.—The British Columbia labor officials meet here tomorrow and Friday for the purpose of arranging to send four to six thousand unemployed from the coast to the prairies to work in the grain fields during the harvest. An announcement of a ten dollar rate to Edmonton and Calgary is expected this week with an additional quarter of a cent a mile to places beyond those centres.

PRELIMINARY DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE

Suggestion That Such May Be Held in London Before Premiers Leave.

LONDON, July 20.—It is now definitely proposed to hold a preliminary disarmament conference in London and Premier Meighen will probably have to stay until August 4. President Harding has been notified of the British intention to hold such a meeting while the premiers are here.

LONDON, July 20.—The suggestion that a meeting preliminary to the disarmament conference be held in London to enable the British premiers to express their views on the far eastern questions is likely to be abandoned, it was learned in well informed circles.

ENGINEERS ARE WORKING AGAIN

Returning to All Vessels on Coast It Is Decided by Ballot.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—The marine engineers who have been on strike since May 1 voted by 480 to 50 to return to work on the Shipping Board vessels but held out on private ships. On Tuesday a vote was taken and the result was they will now return on all private ships under a new agreement.

Spending Public Money And Getting Returns.

In governing a country, a province or a municipality, the great thing is to get good value for the money expended. Low taxes are not a benefit if the taxpayers have none of the ordinary advantages of an up-to-date community. Some cities are burdened with debt to such an extent that the people who live there are poor, even though seemingly prosperous.

To the person in business taxes are piling up to such an extent that it is difficult to meet them all. What with Dominion taxes, provincial taxes and municipal taxes, there is little left for the man who carries on the business.

The Citizen's Research Institute of Canada has been compiling some figures showing the bonded indebtedness per capita of the large cities of Canada. The highest municipal debt is in Edmonton, where the share of each person is said to be \$439. The smallest debt is at St. John, where the per capita is \$83. Vancouver comes second highest, Regina third, and the others in descending order are Winnipeg, Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, London, Hamilton and Halifax. Smaller cities are not included.

It is necessary to undertake certain improvement work in every city, and it is desirable to undertake much more than is ever done, but the money is usually not forthcoming. Many cities are now unable to borrow at a reasonable rate of interest and that is having a deterrent effect on their spending. Economy is forced on us in municipal life just as it is in private life. The wise municipal government is the one that spends enough to keep the place decent and healthy and if possible beautiful, but does not spend so much as to hamper the growth of the city or make life unbearable for the residents.

Farmers Made Good Showing.

The farmers carried Alberta by a substantial majority. They have a good working majority although not an overwhelming majority. There will be in opposition fifteen Liberals, four Labor members and four Independents, twenty-three in all. The majority of fifteen is sufficient for all practical purposes of government but not sufficient to make the members of the new party reckless.

The Farmers are not all new to governmental work. Some of the present members have been in politics before as Conservative or Liberal. The new party has a new name but nothing particularly new in policy.

The Ontario Farmers have carried on like any other party. They have done some good work and have also been subjected to much criticism along certain lines. No radical changes may be looked for under the new administration, for the people in charge of affairs will be much like the people who were formerly in charge. Changing a name does not change the nature of the people carrying on the government.

If we thought that the Farmers' party would legislate in the interests of the farmers to the disadvantage of other classes of the community we should be sorry to see the Farmers in control of any part of the country. On the prairies, however, many of the city people are interested in farming. Business men farm for a hobby and many laborers in the city go to the country for the harvest. Farming is the basic industry in each of the prairie provinces and almost the only basic industry except coal mining. Farmers are the mass of the people and all the prosperity of the country is due to their exertions.

In British Columbia things are different. While the farming population is on the increase and the farm products exceed in value the products of any other industry in the province, there is not that preponderance which is found in most of the other provinces. There will be no election in British Columbia for several years and by that time the Farmer party had is likely to have passed.

Rotund Comedian Stars in "The Life of the Party."

The first of the five-reel feature comedies in which Roscoe Arbuckle, the famous heavy-weight star, is to appear, by arrangement with Joseph M. Schenck, is "The Life of the Party," adapted from Irvin S. Cobb's story of the same name. The picture will be shown at the Westholme Theatre tonight. The story reveals the adventures and love affairs of an affable young lawyer, Algernon Leary, in his efforts to break the Milk Trust. Leary's powerful adversaries attempt to ruin his reputation by sending a notorious "vamp" to blackmail him, but he not only succeeds in withstanding her charms, but beats out the corporation's candidate for mayor at the polls. The picture is declared to be rich in laughs, one of the funniest situations being when Leary attends a masquerade party attired as a child of three and, through a misunderstanding, is chased all over town by indignant citizens and policemen.

The author, Anna Alice Chapin, has departed from the beaten trail of all former writers who have chosen this locale for their plots.

She has discarded entirely the old hackneyed themes that have been used time and time again and has injected into her story a plot that is novel, a set of characters that are different than usual, and yet true to life, and an element of dramatic suspense and mystery that compels attention from the first title to the "final close-up."

It is quite true that the handsome blue-shirted hero and the ragged maiden are present. Also to be noted are the well-dressed "city chap" and his beautiful exquisitely gowned lady companion. But right there all resemblance to previous "mountain stories" ceases.

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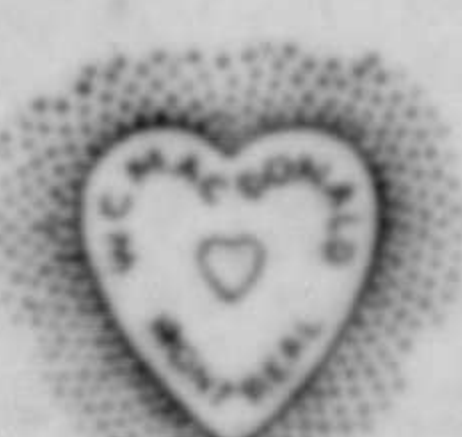

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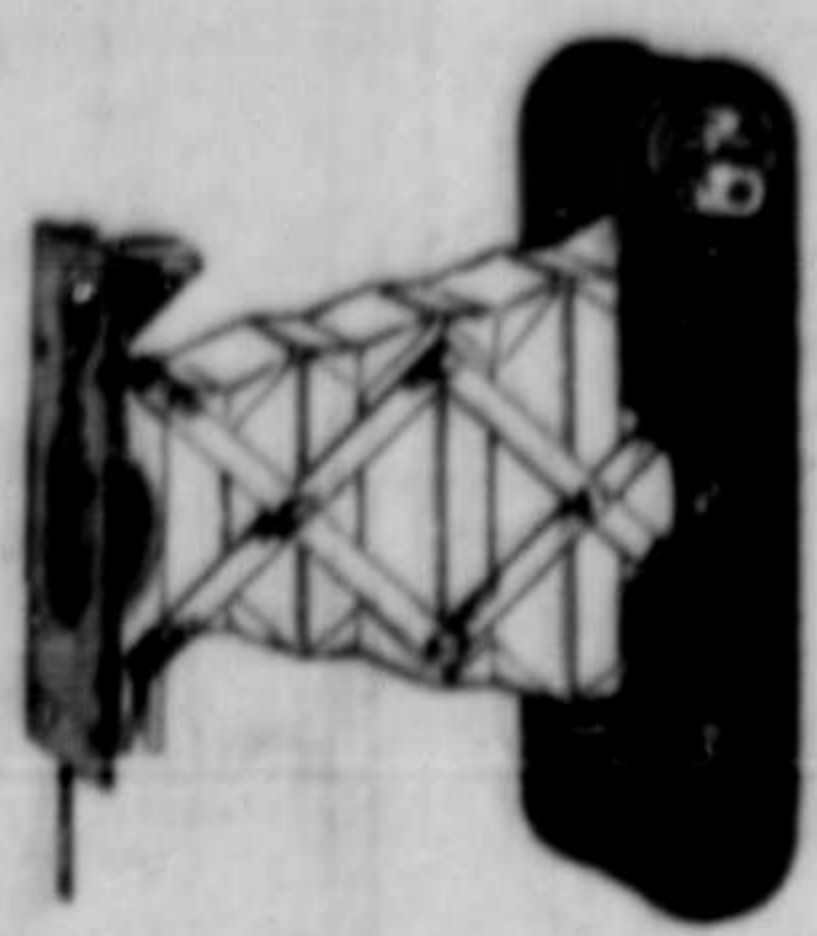

ALASKAN BROWN BEAR PELTS FOR MUSEUM

Rockwell Expedition Obtains Seven Fine Specimens.

NEW YORK, July 20.—Word has been received at the Brooklyn Museum to the effect that the expedition led by Robert H. Rockwell, chief taxidermist of the museum, into Alaska, has obtained seven fine specimens of the Alaskan brown bear, the largest carnivorous animal in the world. One of them measured ten feet six inches and was within an inch of being the largest Alaskan brown bear ever killed.

It will be used in reaching places in the city where it is inconvenient or impossible for the larger machines to go. The new motor will doubtless prove an invaluable addition to the municipal fire fighting equipment.

The body, which includes a chemical tank and hose rack, was built over the Ford chassis by the Rupert Motor Co. and the painting was done by Silversides Bros.

BODY OF VICTIM DROWNING AFFAIR IS NOT RECOVERED

The provincial police are taking steps to find the body of Ben Stone, who was drowned near Inverness Cannery on Monday night, but have not yet been successful. On account of the strong tides that prevail near the scene of the accident it is doubtful if the body will ever be recovered.

Yesterday afternoon Captain Westerman, of the cannery tender Florence, reached the city and told his story of the affair. He had been about 300 feet away from Stone but had not seen the drowning. An Indian named A. Stewart had, however, seen Stone fall into the water from his boat. He will arrive in the city on Saturday and will then be examined by the coroner. Stone sank immediately after falling in the water and only his cap was recovered.

NINE THOUSAND CASES ALASKA SALMON ARRIVES

The barge Bellingham, in tow of the cannery boat Lenine, reached port this morning from the Sunny Point Packing Company's plant at Ketchikan with 9,000 cases of canned salmon, last year's pack, which will be shipped from here to the Eastern States by way of the Canadian National Railway.

JUGOSLAVIA SPENDS MUCH ON DEFENSE

BELGRADE, July 19.—The War Department of the new kingdom of Yugoslavia will cost 2,000,000,000 dinars, one-half the government's total budget, in the next fiscal year, despite vigorous efforts by the Minister of Finance to reduce expenses. This is a reduction of 500,000,000 dinars from the estimates asked for by the War Ministry.

The total budget estimates were 6,000,000,000 dinars but this has been reduced to 4,000,000,000. The nominal exchange value of a dinar is about 19 cents but the present rate it is worth about three cents.

ISLANDER WAS BLOWN PIECES

Former C.P.R. Steamer Located By Diver But No Treasure Secured.

The steamer Islander, wrecked at JEJEAU, Alaska, July 20.—20 years ago next month, lies in 300 feet of water, almost in the centre of Stephens Passage, one mile southwest of Marmion Island light, according to Capt. Frank Walters, deep sea diver, who located the wreck 10 days ago and who has been surveying it since that time.

Captain Walters, who is the man who salvaged the safe of the Princess Sophia in Lynn Canal last summer, organized an expedition this spring and almost two months ago arrived here on the scum boat Suenes to attempt to recover treasure known to be on board the Islander when she was wrecked. Accompanying him was another well known diver, Jack Clouse, and a specially constructed diving suit was used to allow for diving at a great depth.

Torn by Explosion.
Captain Walters said: "We located the wreck of the Islander 10 days ago and found that some terrible internal explosion occurred at the time the boat went down had broken her all up. The decking was all gone, the masts fallen and the whole thing a mass of twisted iron, from which the woodwork had been blown and rotted away."

"After our arrival here we wasted considerable time in searching for the lost steamer as there were so many conflicting reports as to where the boat struck and foundered," he continues. "Ten days ago we found it. The exact location is one mile from Marmion Island light, which is the little island at the south end of Douglas Island. By the compass," he said, "the wreck is one point west of south from the Island, almost in the centre of Stephens Passage."

Filled With Sand.

france of Oliver Inlet on Admiralty Island to the Marmion Island light on the chart would almost pass over the wreck," he continued. "Sand and silt have filled the wreckage and banked up around it to a depth of about 15 feet as it lies upon its side."

Yesterday morning, Captain Walters took his last look at the wrecked vessel and was under water when the picnic party on the Amy passed. He found, he said, that there was absolutely no use in trying to recover anything that might have been on the boat when it went down, as it is his opinion that the great explosion that occurred at the time of the wreck not only blew the vessel to pieces, but scattered the contents all over the bottom of the Passage where they now lie covered with sand and silt.

Expedition Abandoned.
The expedition was abandoned after making sure of the condition of the boat and the Suenes left at noon today for Seattle.

Mr. Walters, before leaving, said that as far as being one of the mysteries of the seas, filled with treasure awaiting for some daring deep sea diver to take, the Islander is a closed incident and will no longer be spoken of as one of the rich prizes to be won by salvaging.

While in these waters, Captain Walters paid a visit to the wreck of the Princess Sophia in Lynn Canal and said that the planking and timbers of the vessel are becoming loosened and that there is little probability of her ever being brought up from her resting place.
