AMOUNT OF GERMAN REPARATIONS HAS BEEN SET

ENGINEERS FOR LOCAL PULP PLANT WILL BE HERE EARLY NEXT MONTH

The Hundred and Thirty Two Billion Gold Marks is Sum Set Germany to Pay Allies

BRUSSELS, April 28.—Germany must pay one hundred and thirty-two billion gold marks for reparations under the provisions of the treaty of Versailles, the Reparations Commission informed today.

BRUSSELS, April 28.—Germany's attempt to clarify certain reparations proposals in compliance with a request from the foreign office resulted in even greater confusion, Britain and Germany for further explanations.

BRUSSELS, April 28.—Dissatisfaction with the German reparations proposals is expressed by all the London newspapers today. Mr. George stated in the House of Commons that the British government was committed to action so far as the Westphalian reparations were concerned if the German reparations proposals were unsatisfactory.

GERMANS WILL COME TO TRIAL IN MAY

Charged with Crimes Committed in War—Entente Governments to be Represented

BERLIN, April 28.—Nine hundred Germans, whose punishment has been demanded by the Triple-Entente for war crimes, will face trial at Leipzig beginning May 23. Seven judges will preside at the hearings. At the first three cases there will be forty-seven witnesses from England. The French, Belgian and British governments will all be represented at the trials.

OPERATIONS AT SITE OF COURT HOUSE STARTED

Work being received today consisting of excavation and rock work.

Work on the construction of the \$380,000 provincial court buildings at Market Street commenced this morning. About fifteen men were at work putting up small sheds to be used as offices and for other purposes.

Chief Henry Whitaker and Mr. Sullivan, of the local public works office, were early on the job to map out the work and measurements.

Contractors are being ready for the excavation and masonry work on the grounds. All building operations can commence.

Chief Albert A. McDougall and Mr. McNeill were on the job first thing this morning to clear the site.

MAY SETTLE BIG STRIKE

British Government Offers to Provide Fund to Insure Wages.

LONDON, April 28.—The Government offers to provide a fund of half a million pounds to ensure that the wages of the miners will not be reduced more than three shillings a day.

Recent developments lend new hope that there will be a settlement and that the miners will return to work very soon.

LONDON, April 28 (Noon).—The Federation of Miners today rejected the new offer of the government for a settlement of the coal strike by increasing the temporary subsidy from £7,500,000 to £10,000,000 by an overwhelming majority.

JACK BRITTON TO FIGHT FOR TITLE

Will Meet Winner of McCarthy-Shade Battle in Milwaukee.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 28.—Jack Britton, the welterweight champion, will meet the winner of the Johnny McCarthy-Dave Shade bout, which is being held in Milwaukee on May 6, in a ten round bout at Milwaukee on May 20. Both McCarthy and Shade are San Francisco men.

MOBS ATTACK LIQUOR AND GROCERY STORES

BELFAST, April 28.—Spirit and grocery stores at Newton Roads were attacked last night by a mob and everything portable was carried off.

GERMANY IS FAST BECOMING NORMAL

Charles M. Schwab, Big Steel Man, Says that Country is Outstripping Others.

NEW YORK, April 28.—Charles M. Schwab, president of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, in an address before the Chamber of Commerce here, declared that through economy and sacrifice the working people of Germany were settling down to real production and that country was outstripping the United States and the Allied nations in the fight towards normalcy.

VANCOUVER YACHT AFTER LIPTON CUP

Patricia Successfully Launched at Royal Vancouver Club Last Night.

VANCOUVER, April 28.—The yacht Patricia was successfully launched at the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club last night. The boat was built from plans of Nicholson, the famous British designer.

Later in the season an attempt will be made to lift the Lipton Cup with her. This trophy is now held by the yacht Sir Tom, of Seattle Yacht Club.

FREIGHT RATES ARE UNDER DISCUSSION

WINNIPEG, April 27.—The fight for equalization of freight rates east and west commenced in earnest yesterday morning before the board of railway commissioners. G. G. McGee, of British Columbia joined with H. J. Symington for Manitoba and Saskatchewan are pressing for figures from the C.P.R. accounting department in connection with specific information desired in regard to the earning of the C.P.R. by divisions.

OLDEST FREEMASON IN CANADA DIES

FREDERICKTON, April 27.—John Anderson, formerly member of the Legislature, is dead here aged 99 years and three months. He is said to be the oldest freemason and oldest politician in Canada.

Eastern Investors Favor Establishment Sulphite Plant at Prince Rupert

VANCOUVER, April 28.—Mr. Grant, of Grant, White Co., who has been in the east in connection with the floating of the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. Ltd., has just returned and reports that the pulp and paper people there look with a good deal of favor on the proposed local industry. The success of the flotation now seems assured.

He further reports that the engineers will be in Prince Rupert in May to complete the laying out of the site and the preparation of the plans in conformity with the ground, and its relation to the sawmill.

WILL PROCEED CONSTRUCTION OF WARSHIPS

Amendment That U.S. Disarmament Conference be Awaited Strongly Voted Down.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The House of Representatives has rejected, by an overwhelming vote, the amendment to the naval appropriation bill that no funds be used for continuation of a warship construction until President Harding had called an informal conference to consider disarmament.

ELKS DRIVE MAKES EXCELLENT PROGRESS

Number of New Members Admitted Last Night and Many Applications Received

The Elks big drive for members is going merrily on. Last night at the regular meeting there were a number of initiations and a large number of applications for membership accepted.

It is proposed to put on a big initiation at the next regular meeting, when it is expected to make a record for fraternal organizations in this city. If the present rate of increase goes on, the proposed new Elks Club building should be an assured fact in the near future.

Revolutionaries Protest Irish Executions to Pope and President Harding

CORK, April 28.—There were four executions this morning for offences against the crown forces. The revolutionaries wired the Pope and President Harding in regard to them, claiming that the executions were a contravention of civilized warfare and the dictates of humanity because the British ministry recognized a state of war with Sinn Fein.

OTTAWA, April 28.—An opposition motion to limit the power of the Canadian representatives at the Imperial Conference to be held in London was defeated in the House of Commons. The Government majority was 32.

PERMIT CARDS TO BUY LIQUOR TO ISSUE SOON

Are Being Run off Press and Will Be Ready by Middle of May.

VICTORIA, April 28.—Liquor permits for the purchase of liquor under the government control measure passed at the last session of the Legislature, will likely be on sale by the middle of next month. Permit cards are now being run off the presses.

The decision to prepare the permits at once was decided on in order to give the people a chance of buying permits two weeks before the actual distribution of liquor comes into effect. This is for the convenience of the public and in order to avoid a rush when the office opens.

C.P.R. WILL INVESTIGATE ISLAND MINES

Have Appropriated Large Sum to Prospect E. & N. Railway Belt.

VICTORIA, April 28.—The C. P. R. and its subsidiary, the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co., have appropriated a large sum of money with which to investigate the mineral wealth, production and possibilities of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo railway belt on Vancouver Island.

This D. C. Coleman, vice-president of the railway, told Hon. W. J. Sloan yesterday.

The C. P. R. when it acquired the E. & N. Railway on Vancouver Island some years ago from the Dunsmuir interests took with it most of the lands of what is known as the railway belt. These lands were given to Robert Dunsmuir as a bonus to induce him to build the railway and they include the very valuable coal lands where the Comox and other mines are situated. There are other coal lands not yet touched but some of these were reserved by the Dunsmuirs.

The only minerals, other than coal, which have been worked successfully in the railway belt have been copper at Mount Sicker and limestone for cement on the side of the Malahat mountain and at other points nearby.

OFFER BONDS FOR SULPHITE MILL IN CITY

Million and a Half Dollars Worth to be Sold at Once.

The Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co. Ltd. is offering for sale a million and a half dollars' worth of seven per cent first mortgage sinking fund bonds, the proceeds to be used in erecting a sulphite plant at Prince Rupert.

The directors of the new concern, as advertised, are John Emerson, J. A. Ward, George W. Fay, Norman R. Whitall, Bruce M. Farris, E. H. Moore, T. H. Watson, and John G. Sutherland. Several of these men are connected with pulp and paper concerns in the east and Mr. Emerson and Mr. Bell are connected with the Prince Rupert Lumber Company.

According to the prospectus it is proposed to install a forty-ton sulphite plant and later to sell more bonds with which to erect a newsprint paper mill.

The bonds are sold at 92 1/2 and interest with a bonus of common shares.

KING AND WINGE HAD FIRE IN ENGINE ROOM

Big Seattle Schooner Gave Fire Brigade Run Last Evening at 6 O'clock.

The big halibut schooner King & Winge had a fire yesterday which originated in her engine room and did some damage there and in her after cabin. The blaze occurred about 6 o'clock and the city fire department was called out. Fortunately, the fire was more threatening than it was damaging and the vessel was able to clear for Seattle where she is to sell her 60,000 pounds of fish.

With a good deal of gasoline around the fire appeared hazardous for a few minutes.

BRITAIN STILL OWES CANADA SMALL SUM

OTTAWA, April 28.—Finance Minister Dwyton announces that the accounts between Britain and Canada are not finally settled. There is a balance due the Dominion of \$141,498,764.

Right of Free Speech a Farce.

There is no such thing as the right of free speech or free thought. We dare not say what we think and we dare not think what we would, or at any rate not think aloud. This reference is not particularly to newspapers but to people and institutions in all walks of life. Free thought and absolute independence is a nice thing to talk about, but it does not exist in reality. Sometimes we fancy we are giving free expression to our views and then something happens suddenly to change our minds.

Any person that speaks his mind is a most disagreeable person. He cannot ever get on well with his fellows. Men are social animals and in a community there has to be give and take and the suppression of the individual for the good of the whole.

Take a newspaper as an instance. If we were to say what we think of some people we should be in the courts half the time. As we have no desire to go out of business we have to suppress our own personal feelings a great deal and consider the public good rather than individual preference. Almost every day some person drops a hint that a certain subject should be ventilated in the newspaper. It is usually something which the person would not like to mention publicly himself, but he thinks it is all right for a newspaper to take the onus.

Difference Between Freedom and License.

There is a difference between freedom and license. There are people who live here and who hold conscientious convictions, which, if expressed publicly, would result in riot if not in lynchings. The community will not stand for expressions of opinion adverse to their own or certain subjects. It would not pay to trample on the Union Jack in this community and Lindsay Crawford almost raised a riot in Vancouver when he lectured there recently. So other subjects are taboo.

We believe in as large a degree of freedom of speech as possible, and yet the utterance of some opinions might do much harm to the community or the country. Because of that we have to restrain ourselves. The point at which freedom merges into license is not definable but it is there and cannot be passed without danger. Men are often severely punished either socially or in business for expressions of opinion.

Disintegration Has No Value.

No man lives and no man dies without having an effect on the community. That is what an ancient philosopher said and it is as true today as ever it was. Because of this social responsibility it is necessary to go carefully. A newspaper that comes out with biting criticisms, especially of those in public life, always has a considerable backing, and always eventually goes under in the stress of commercialism. It may live for some time but its fate is assured from the moment it is born.

When an editor comes out with a particularly virulent attack on somebody or something, he is slapped on the back and egged on by those who enjoy a fight whether a pugilistic encounter, a dog fight, or a verbal contest. These exhibitions of rancour on the part of a newspaper always end in disaster, however. They indicate a failure to recognize the fact that life is not a separate existence, but every man is a part of the social whole and anything which tends to disintegrate the community is bad, while that which tends toward unity is lasting and valuable.

MILLER GIVES HIS EVIDENCE

Details of Kidnapping Came Out This Morning in Court.

Evidence of Jack Miller, chief witness for the crown, and of W. J. Nelson, customs officer, was taken this morning in the Michelson kidnaping case. At noon adjournment was made until tomorrow morning when further evidence for the prosecution will be submitted. A. M. Manson, of Williams, Manson & Gonzales, appearing for Miller, conducted the examination for the crown, T. B. Hooper, city solicitor, represented the city, and W. H. Johnson appeared for the defence. Miss M. E. Earle was court stenographer.

In giving his evidence Miller told of the events leading up to the kidnaping and what had transpired on the boat Valorous on November 24. He had made a deal with Swan Swanson, the man who was shot in Ketchikan recently, for the sale of 40 cases of liquor to be paid for on delivery on the boat. Together with Huntley Tate, Bruce Bradford and Braden, transfer man, they had taken the liquor to the Valorous at the garbage wharf about 11 o'clock at night. When the liquor had been placed on board Swanson had invited Miller, Tate and Bradford into the boat to ride up to the Grand Trunk wharf.

Miller was asked to go into engine room to receive payment and while going down the dark companionway after Swanson he flashed his torch and saw at the bottom of the steps three men including Michelson. Some one grabbed his feet and he fell down to find Michelson standing over him with an iron bar in his hand. Asked what they were going to do he was told that he was to be taken to Dundas Island. The company in the boat included Swanson, Michelson, Frank, an Englishman, and Otto, a Finn. By this time the boat was well under way.

Speaking in Norwegian, Miller attempted to persuade them not to take him to Dundas Island and finally they decided to let him off at Digby. At this time the boat was approaching Mella-katla and, turning around, they stopped at Digby Island and assisted Miller, Tate and Bradford to debark into a ten-foot skiff. The boat carried on to sea after this. The next time Miller had seen Michelson was on his arrest here.

Under Cover of Darkness.
W. H. Johnson, conducting a long cross-examination, endeavored to shake the evidence of Miller and bring out illicit proceedings on his part. He emphasized the fact that the delivery had been made in the dead of night under the cover of the dark. In the course of this examination Miller told of a secret panel in the boat inside of which it would be possible to conceal twenty cases of liquor.

W. J. Nelson, customs officer, told of seizing the boat for having failed to clear on the date in question. A .303 rifle and a .32 automatic revolver loaded had been found.
