Definite Step Towards Street Work INTERNATIONAL LABOR LEADER HOWLED DOWN LAST NIGHT IN THE SOUTH

Equipment for Surfacing Of Down Town Streets is Ordered by City Council

That the surfacing of the down town streets is to commence in the near future was indicated at the committee meeting of the council last night when it was decided unanimously, to purchase the necessary machinery for the immediate carrying out of the work. This will entail the expenditure of approximately \$2,500 which will purchase an asphalt scarifier and a street grader. The recommendation of the purchase was made at last Monday night's council by Harold Thackeray, the new road superintendent, but action was held over until this special meeting to allow aldermen to obtain full details about the matter. Mr. Thackeray, who was recently engaged by the council and comes highly recommended having been recently engaged on big jobs in Vancouver, at Shaughnessy Heights, and the Fraser River Delta, pointed out that the expenditure would be more than justified by the results that would be obtained and in the long run would mean economy for the city. The decision, being unanimous, the purchasing agent has been instructed to order the machinery immediately, and without waiting for the next meeting of the council.

BLOODY DOINGS ON ERIN'S ISLE

People Killed and Wounded; Lorry Attacked and Houses Entered.

ERIN, June 9.—In three separate attacks at once on a police lorry, one civilian was killed and three men, four women and five constables were wounded. The coast guard station at Bally Donagan was burned by revolutionaries and is a total loss. Two brothers, named Ryan, were taken from their beds at backlane and were shot. Their house was burned. Three men in County Cork were killed when they tried to make arrest.

TO BRING DOWN PRICE OF COAL

Conference of Public Bodies and Coal Interests Opened This Morning.

VICTORIA, June 9.—To work out a means of bringing down the price of coal along the lines outlined in the report of Alex. Henderson, K.C., who recently made an inquiry into the charges of excessive prices, Hon. Wm. Sloan, minister of mines, this morning opened a conference here. There was official representation from the city councils and municipal and semi-public organizations of the province and the coal dealers and operators were also in attendance.

ANOTHER BOAT HITS ICEBERG

American Freight Steamer Charlotte Limping into St. John's.

HALIFAX, June 9.—The American freight steamer, Charlotte, bound from Philadelphia for London and Hamburg, struck an iceberg 269 miles off Newfoundland last night. Her bow was stove in and the steamer Columbia is now proceeding to her assistance. The craft is leaking but it is expected she will reach St. John's safely. She is a 3,515 ton vessel and is owned by the United States Shipping Board. Her crew numbers twenty-five.

INQUEST HELD OVER BODY CHAS. EMBLETON

Verdict That Deceased Met Death By Own Hand When Temporarily Insane.

The inquest into the death of the late Charles W. Embleton was held this morning before Coroner J. H. McMullin, and resulted in a verdict being returned that "the deceased met his death by his own hand, whilst temporarily insane." The evidence adduced, brought out no new facts, and was in line with the account of the tragedy published in the local press on the day following the occurrence. A funeral service will be held at the Presbyterian Church tomorrow afternoon. The following were on the jury: F. W. Hart, foreman; E. R. Tabrum, Geo. Richmond; C. C. Westaway, W. J. Wakefield and D. McCullough.

JUSTICE GREGORY AT ROTARY CLUB LUNCHEON TODAY

The administration of justice in this province was scored by Mr. Justice Gregory who was the guest of honor at the Rotary Club luncheon held this afternoon. The judge said that many crown cases fell down through inefficient handling by the provincial police department. Referring to the recent Holmes trial at the assizes here his Lordship stated that the case for the crown was made difficult through the actions of the police in not attending sufficiently to details when called to the scene. He was concluded by saying that it was up to the people themselves to see that proper representations were made to the attorney general's department in such cases.

ARMISTICE AND THANKSGIVING TO BE SAME DAY

OTTAWA, June 9.—Armistice Day and Thanksgiving Day in Canada will in future be coordinated according to the Armistice Day Act which was recently passed by the House of Commons. Throughout Canada every year the Monday in the week on which Armistice Day, November 11, occurs will be observed as a legal holiday and by proclamation Thanksgiving Day shall be, whenever appointed, observed on the same day.

BUSINESS OF CHURCH SYNOD

Many Reports Submitted from Various Fields of Work in District.

The afternoon session of the Anglican diocesan synod which was held in St. Andrew's Church was occupied with matters of intense interest. The proposed clergy beneficiary fund was fully discussed and the canon of the Provincial Synod dealing with the matter was endorsed.

The increasing of some of the apportionments from the various missions to the Diocesan Central Fund was a matter of gratification in that it points to advancement. An interesting report was that submitted by Miss Davis in regard to the Ridley Home.

The matter of delegates to the various church organizations was dealt with. The delegates to the General Synod elected were Canon G. A. Rix and Mr. R. L. McIntosh. Following the business of the session Rev. Canon Rix presented a report on the Anglican Theological College of British Columbia. A great tribute was paid by Canon Rix to Archbishop Du Vernet who was the prime mover in amalgamations that had been made.

This Morning.

This morning the meetings were resumed. A report was submitted on the Anglican Forward Movement, stating that 73 per cent of the amounts pledged for the Dominion had been paid in.

Reports on the Japanese work in the city were made by Rev. Canon G. A. Rix and Rev. Rural Dean W. F. Rushbrook who paid compliments to the efforts of Mr. Higashi.

Archdeacon Collison reported on the work of the Indian Missions in conjunction with Rural Dean Rushbrook and Rev. J. Gillett.

LABOR PARTY WINS SEAT IN ENGLAND

LONDON, June 9.—The by-election in the Heywood Division of Lancashire, necessitated by the elevation of Albert Hingworth to the peerage, resulted in a victory for the labor party. The figures were: W. Halls, Labor, 13,430; Colonel England, Coalition Liberal, 5,671.

LENINE WILL HAVE TO SATISFY MONEY INTERESTS FOR HELP

BERLIN, June 9.—It is reported that German and British capitalists, including Hugo Stinnes, have entered into an agreement for the exploitation of Russian trade on the understanding that Premier Lenin reconstruct the government to the satisfaction of the financiers.

CYCLING PATROL WAS AMBUSHED IN IRELAND

BELFAST, June 9.—A police cycling patrol was ambushed near Newrie and one constable is dead and another wounded. Two Sinn Feiners were killed and one was wounded.

GIVES HERSELF UP.



Mrs. Hazel D. Warner, in whose home John Reid, a wealthy manufacturer of lace, was seriously wounded, has given herself up to New York police authorities. She disappeared immediately after Reid was shot. Sensational developments are expected.

OIL PIPES TO PRINCE RUPERT

Men Recently Coming From Fort Norman Say This is Most Feasible Route.

J. McDowell, of Vancouver, and T. Bee, storekeeper at Carnack, were southbound passengers on a recent trip of the Princess Mary after having made the trip to Fort Norman by way of Skagway and Whitehorse. They stated that the route they took was the quickest and easiest way of getting into the oil country in the winter time. Mr. McDowell is of the opinion that the most feasible way of getting oil out will be to build a pipe line to tidewater at Stewart or Prince Rupert. The distance, he said, would not be more than 600 or 700 miles and the highest altitude would be 4,500 feet.

The trip they made into the Fort Norman country took just three months from the time of leaving Vancouver until their return.

QUIET ELECTION IN SASKATCHEWAN

Expected Martin Administration Will be Returned With Big Majority.

REGINA, June 9.—One of the quietest provincial elections in the history of the province of Saskatchewan is in progress today. It is expected that the Liberal administration under Premier W. M. Martin will be returned with a large majority, especially in view of the fact that sixteen of its members, including three cabinet ministers, were returned by acclamation at the nominations last Thursday. Sixty-three seats are to be filled at this election. There is little opposition to the government, and that which there is mainly coming from the Independent ranks.

EDITORS ARE ARRIVING IN VANCOUVER

Main Body Delayed by Slide or C.N.R. Near Kamloops.

VANCOUVER, June 9.—Members of the weekly section of the Canadian Press Association, arrived here this morning for the annual convention to be held there today and tomorrow. The main body, which is delayed for ten hours on account of a slide on the Canadian National Railway near Kamloops, comprises newspapermen from all sections of Canada. A civic welcome will be accorded them. They will spend Saturday and part of Sunday in Victoria and in Vancouver.

LUMBER BEING HELD IN PRICE

Charge Made by Federal Trade Commission Regarding Pacific Coast Industry.

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 9.—Charges that loggers and manufacturers of the "Douglas Fir Region" on the Pacific Coast are organized to fix the prices of lumber by "concerted restriction of production" have been made by the Federal Trade Commission in a report that it has submitted to Congress.

FLYING TRIP FROM HALIFAX TO OTTAWA

HALIFAX, June 9.—A flying boat piloted by Col. Robert Lockie and Captain G. C. Brown, left here this morning for Ottawa, and is expected to arrive there tomorrow.

Tom Moore Denied Hearing Last Night Vancouver Meeting

VANCOUVER, June 9.—Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, was howled down at a meeting held here last night. He tried for one hour to speak but without success. His hearing was prevented by the noise which was apparently organized in one part of the hall. A. Fernaloe, western organizer for the American Federation of Labor, was present on the platform with him.

It is understood that the disturbances were due to the presence of a number of One Big Union sympathizers and members following the lead of the treatment given the prominent International leader in a recent meeting at Winnipeg when he was prevented from speaking.

FEW MEN OWN COAL MINES

Multimillionaires and Nobility Are Chief Proprietors in Britain.

LONDON, June 9.—The most valuable coal possessions in England and Scotland are owned by a handful of men, all multimillionaires and members of the nobility. In many cases their vast possessions were inherited. The Duke of Hamilton owns vast estates in Lanarkshire. He is a descendant of William Douglas, first Earl of Douglas, Lord Justice, recently made a baron, is believed to be the wealthiest of the coal kings. Lord Londonderry and Lord Gainsford also own important mines.

FRASER RIVER FLOODS AGAIN

Roads Protected by Nicomen Island Dyke Closed—Breach Feared.

VANCOUVER, June 9.—The Fraser River is still rising and at Yale and Mission the flood water has become dangerous. Two roads protected by the Nicomen dyke which was last year overflooded, have been closed fearing a breach in the dyke which is already showing seepage.

VANCOUVER, June 9.—The Fraser River threatens to overflow into the New Westminster farm lands. Pumps are at work on Annacis Island lifting sixteen thousand gallons of water per hour back into the river. Fields are afloat south of New Westminster.

"WHITE PAPER" IS ISSUED AT LONDON

Purports to Contain Text of Treaty Between Ireland and Soviet Russia.

LONDON, June 9.—The Government has issued a "white paper" the text of which purports to be the draft of the proposed treaty between the Russian Soviet Government and the "Republic of Ireland" which it is stated was seized in Dublin.

BOUNDARY BETWEEN ALBERTA AND B.C. BEING SURVEYED

EDMONTON, June 9.—R. W. Gaultley, and a party of eleven men, have left for the British Columbia border where they will be engaged until late in the fall marking out the border between the two provinces. The season's programme comprises the completion of the boundary between Yellowhead Pass and the International border. The work is being done under joint arrangement between the two provinces.

SULPHUR RAIN AT DAWSON YESTERDAY

DAWSON, June 9.—Another sulphur rain similar to the phenomenon of two years ago was experienced here yesterday.

DAWSON HOTEL MAN DIES—LONG ILLNESS

DAWSON, June 8.—James B. O'Neil, a pioneer hotel man, died here after a lingering illness.

BRITISH FARM ACT REPEALED

With This Action Guarantees and Powers Will Be Discarded.

LONDON, June 9.—The British Government has decided to repeal the Agricultural Act of last year. This means that guaranteed prices to farmers and minimum wages to laborers as well as power to compel cultivation of the land is discarded.

DEVONSHIRE TO SAIL FOR ENGLAND IN JULY

Will Embark on Empress of France on July 19—May Pass Lord Syng.

OTTAWA, June 9.—The Duke and Duchess of Devonshire and their family will sail from Quebec on July 19 for England by the Canadian Pacific Ocean steamship Empress of France. They may pass the new governor general, Lord Byng, of Vimy, on the Atlantic.

GENER'L STRIKE IS OVER BUT SHIPPING IS STILL PARALYZED

CHRISTIANIA, June 9.—The general strike is ended but the dock workers, stokers and engineers remain out. Shipping is thus still tied up from Norway.

Give Vancouver A Good Welcome.

On the arrival of the Vancouver Board of Trade excursionists this evening Prince Rupert will welcome one of the most important parties of guests that it has ever been the pleasure of the city to receive. These men who are coming comprise some of the most prominent business men of the southern metropolis, many of them paying their first visit to this town, about which they have all heard so much. In the course of their twenty-four-hour visit here they will form their first real impression of the city and what they think and state about it will probably mean a good deal to us. Therefore, it is fitting that each and every citizen should see to it that in every way possible they endeavor to make the impressions of the visitors favorable ones. This can be done, first, by giving them a right warm welcome, secondly, by showing them with concrete examples the present importance of the place, and, above all, by expressing to them the confidence that we all have in our own city and our faith in its future. Show them our civic pride and the reasons for it and they cannot help but being impressed with their northern neighbor and its importance. If we forget the petty provincial rivalry that the word Vancouver seems to inspire in many, there will be great possibilities in the next day or so of promoting a better and more co-operative spirit between the two cities.

No Definite Date For New Station.

The plans for the new Canadian National station at Prince George have been approved by the railway commission which has ordered that the station be built and in operation here by August 1. The plans for the Prince Rupert station have not yet reached that stage and, as far as known, have not been dealt with by the commission. Therefore, the date as to when the building will be erected and in commission here is still indefinite. Even if the company starts building the station at Prince George at once it will hardly be ready by the date set. It is to be hoped, however, that when the company gets the order to proceed here that it will do so immediately and have the depot ready by the prescribed date. It is needed certainly and it would be regretted if another winter were to pass without it.

Church Union is Now Close at Hand.

The vote taken yesterday at the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Toronto on church union may be regarded as a final one and it is now likely that the union of the three churches, Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational, will be consummated at an early date. Both the latter churches have already voted as strongly as the Presbyterian favoring the movement and the matter has now reached a point where there is a stable basis for the government and theology of the Union Church. The agitation for church union has been going on for eighteen years, having first been brought up at the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in 1903. Twice since then have the people of the church voted on it and on both occasions it has received strong endorsement. Likewise, it has been voted on twice by the General Assembly and both times it carried in the same degree. Before taking the final step towards union, the assembly in 1917 agreed to let the matter stand until the second assembly after the war when the many ministers and members of the church would have returned from service overseas—the assembly at Toronto this year is that one.

Grand Union of All Protestant Churches.

The Protestants of Canada are now looking towards even a broader union and the possibility of having the Anglican Church join up will be the next question. The Lambeth Conference in Montreal provided for the union of the Anglican Church with the others and in the province of British Columbia the matter has been under negotiation for two years, the synods of both the Presbyterian and Anglican churches having considered it. If the Baptist Church could be included, and the older members of that church are the only ones it is thought who would oppose the measure, all the Protestant churches of Canada would thus be united to form one strong and far-reaching Union Protestant Church. The advantages to religion and to the church itself through this union can readily be appreciated.

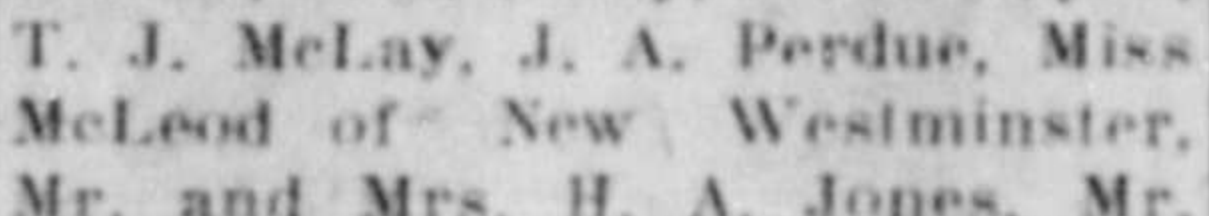

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

LADY MINE RUNNING

BOOZE TO MEXICO

Schooner Which Was Located Here Last Summer Secretly Left for Mexican Coast.

The schooner Lady Mine which last summer was engaged in the coastwise passenger service and freighting out of Prince Rupert and conveyed the memorable Fourth of July excursion to Ketchikan, left Vancouver a few days ago with a cargo of first class liquor for a private warehouse near Espenada, Mexico.

Fear of pirates en route caused silence as to the schooner's departure and destination and she got clear away from Vancouver without it being known. Senior Vittorio, Mexican consul at Vancouver, stated that in future he is going to know when such boats go to Mexico, or Mexican gun boats will be the pirates that will meet these booze runners.

WHOLE COAST FLEET IN PORT TONIGHT

All C. N. R. Steamers Will Be Here Late This Evening.

The entire fleet of the Canadian National Railway coast services will be in this port tonight. This will be the first time in many years that all have been here together.

The Prince Rupert arrives at 8 o'clock from Anyox, the Prince George will be here at 10:30 with the Board of Trade excursion from Vancouver, the Prince John will be in from the islands as well as the Prince Albert, and the tug boat Lorne is already tied up at No. 3 shed.

RECORD APPLE CROP IN THIS PROVINCE

Will Provide Good Supply for Prairie Consumer.

CALGARY, June 9.—Everything points to a record apple crop in British Columbia this year, and, if nothing unforeseen happens, the prairie markets are assured of a good supply of high-grade apples, according to J. Mr. Grant estimates that five thousand cars of apples will be shipped out of British Columbia this year, which is an increase of nearly 100 per cent over last year's output.

George Quirie, Aged 70 Years, Shot Himself in Lonely Cabin.

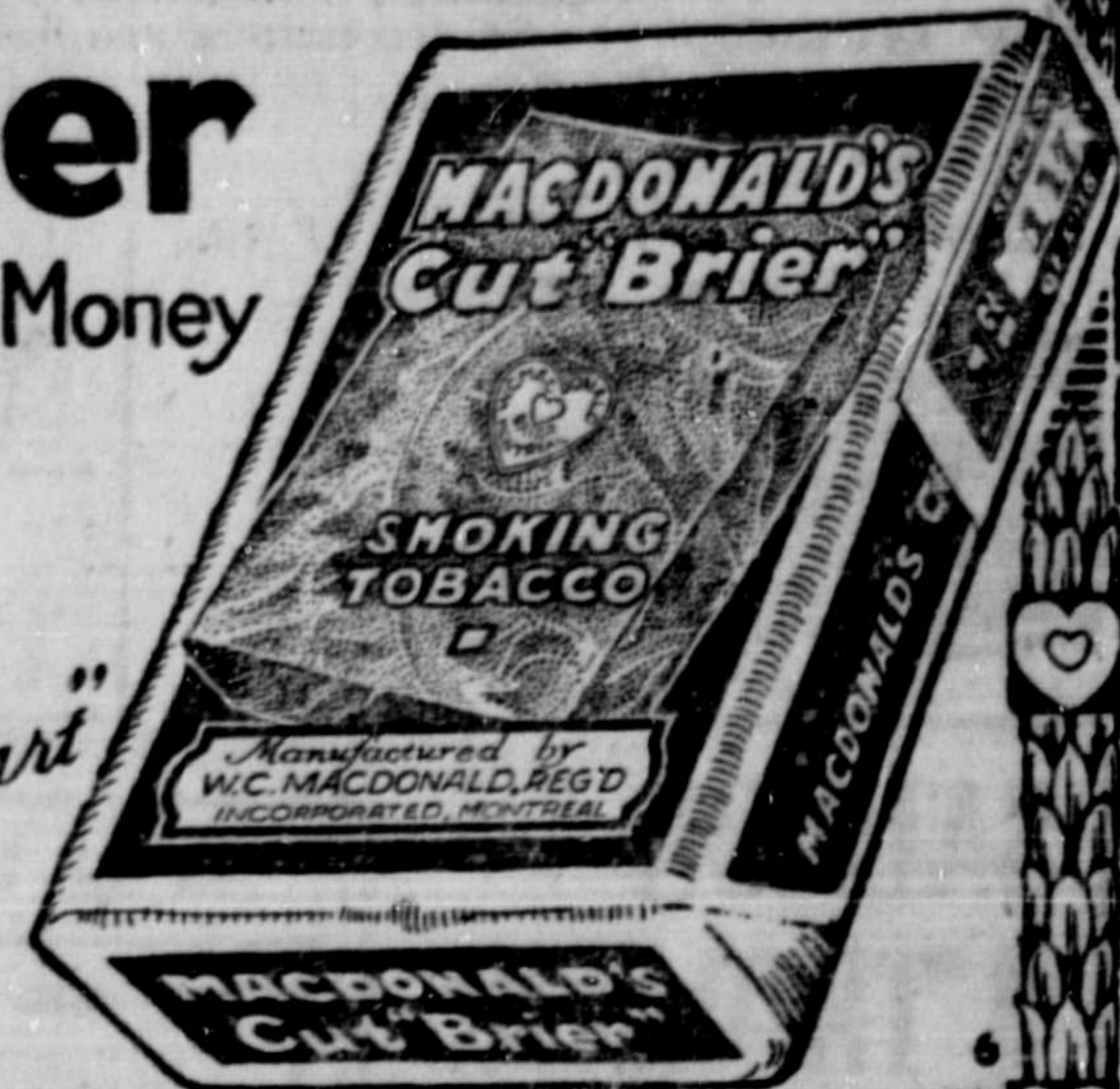

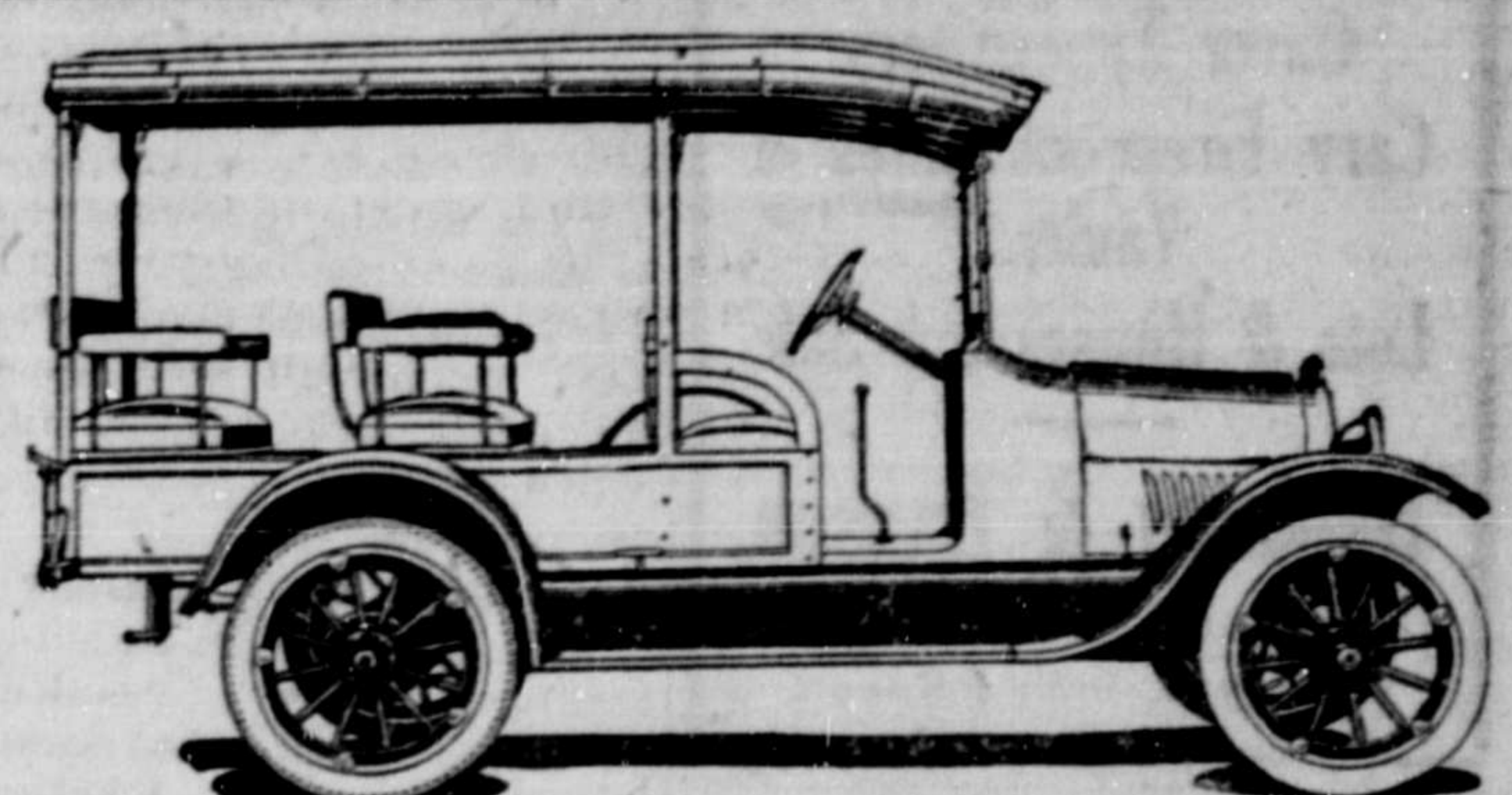
New Name of Old German Liner, Kaiser Wilhelm II.

In the Letter Box

THRIFT AND UNEMPLOYMENT

The Editor, Daily News:—The other day I heard two men, presumably quite interested in the welfare and prosperity of the country, debating on some questions affecting the future of our people. Their physical appearance reminded me of "Mutt and Jeff." "Mutt" was disapproving capitalism in a very emphatic manner, saying: "These millionaire capitalists back East control all the money and we never get a look in." To which "Jeff" apparently, had no rebuttal.

Why the Agitation?
Now, what is the cause of this continual unrest, resulting in much agitation, that seems to follow us around? I believe our present social structure is sound, but something is lacking which makes possible periodical "hard times." That elusive "something" is nothing more than misunderstanding the biggest job that is going on around us day in and day out, which is just "every-day living."

Many of us endeavor to maintain high standards of living. Most of us attempt to make life as inviting, as pleasing and as comfortable as our standards demands. Let us go on. The best factor we have in making the job I mentioned in my last paragraph an indisputable success is THRIFT.

"And what is thrift?" Mr. Mutt will ask. "I'd like to buy a little if it'll do all that fellow Waide says it will."
Thrift is cheap. It does not demand a great amount of effort. In order to become visible in a community it does require that a large majority of the people indulge therein.

What Thrift Is.
Thrift does not consist in refusing to spend money or buy things. It consists, under a money economy, in spending money and buying things, but in spending money for things of a different kind from that which thriftlessness buys. Thrift buys things with a relatively vivid appreciation of the future; thriftlessness buys things with a relatively dull or weak appreciation of the future. It very generally, though not exclusively, consists in investing money; that is, in buying income-bearing goods. This may be done directly, as when a farmer buys a tractor or improves his farm as a producing unit.

Thrift regards future need as comparable in importance with present desires; thriftlessness regards present desires as of greater importance than future needs.
Thrift may be practiced indirectly, as when one deposits money in a savings bank, buys an insurance policy or a corporation bond. In all these and many other cases the saver merely turns his money over to other agencies and they do the investigating; that is, they buy the producer's goods or the income-bearing goods with it.

Look to the Future.
It is obvious, is it not, that

when a farmer buys a tractor he spends money as truly as when he buys a luxurious automobile, and that the money spent employs as much labor and stimulates business as much in one case as in the other? Temporarily, he has, by so doing, deprived himself of immediate enjoyment. In the long run, however, farmers who undergo this form of deprivation spend more money and have more means of enjoyment, possibly better automobiles, than those thriftless farmers whose standing of living never looks to the future. As a matter of observation, thrifty communities spend more money in the long run than thriftless communities, for the sufficient reason that they have more money to spend. But, even with their larger expenditure, so long as they remain thrifty a larger proportion of their economy is spent for producers' goods than is true in a thriftless community.

In the Community.
And now let us assume our community has become thrifty. There comes a period when work is scarce and, through necessity a number of men voluntarily offer their knowledge and energy—either or both as the case may be—in return for reasonable compensation. If the community as a whole has made a success of the job of living by their application of the big factor Thrift what is the attitude they will take when there is a surplus amount of human energy or knowledge offered? Don't you see, Thrift says it will be a big loss to the future if you do not take advantage of this voluntary desire to work, and, if you follow the dictum of Thrift, future generations will bless you and say: "Those people know that money was a medium for accomplishing great tasks, and that by providing for the future, they have erected a great monument to perpetuate the ideals of a mighty race."

FINE ADDRESS BY ARCHBISHOP

Absorbing Subject Taken Up At Opening of Synod Meeting Last Night.

Those privileged to listen to the lecture delivered by His Grace Archbishop Du Vernet last evening at St. Andrew's Church on "Recent Discoveries in Modern Psychology, as related to health, character and happiness" were accorded an intellectual treat, as well as being given food for deep thought and earnest consideration.

The lecture, which was a part of the programme arranged for the meeting of the Anglican Synod of the Diocese of Caledonia being held in the city, was attended by a large number of the members of the church, and many others as well as by most of the clergy of the Diocese.

Student of Psychology.
His Grace opened his address by telling his hearers that he had been an ardent student of psychology for the last thirty years, having come in contact during his youth when a professor at Toronto, with the leading students of psychology, who were just then bringing to light the practical application of this new science in relation to mental healing. He mentioned the debt the world owed to Germany, Austria, and perhaps more especially to France, for the great discoveries that eminent thinkers and scientists had made and which had brought such untold blessings. The study of psychology as regards mental healing was not a fad practiced by enthusiasts, but was rather the sum total of the conclusions arrived at, by the deep and intense studies of many of the world's greatest thinkers. It was the latest and greatest science and now occupied its recognized place in the medical and educational world.

Psychology, which was defined as the science of the soul, was in a word, the knowledge involved in the bringing of the truth of God to the human mind. The greatest of French scientists engaged in the work expressed it as "The law of reversed effort."

His Grace, while going most carefully and thoughtfully into his subject, gave many examples in relation to the training of children's minds when young and the effect of mental suggestion, in cases of healing disease and mental disturbance, especially dwelling on the numberless cases of shell shocked soldiers who had been restored to health through psychological treatment. The lecture took an hour and a half, and at the expiration of that time, the audience's attention still riveted, it was evident that, most of those present were brought unquestionably to think deeply of the great truths that His Grace had put before them in regard to many things to do with the relations of the mind towards matter and the wonderful results that were obtaining in the modern treatment of disease both mental and physical, through the psychological method of mental suggestion.

Pictures of Islands.
Tonight, on the conclusion of the conference, there will be a social gathering of members of the church and clergy, when Rev. James Gillett, of Massett, will show a moving picture film made by himself on a special portable machine that he possesses and with which he has taken a number of scenes of life on the Islands, especially among the Indians. Touring the island with these pictures he has given already a vast amount of entertainment to the settlers. All will be welcome to attend the gathering.

FOOTBALL GAME RESULTED EVEN

Sons of England and Sons of Canada Staged Good Exhibition Last Night.

The Senior Football League game last night between the Sons of England and the Sons of Canada resulted in a 4 to 4 draw. In spite of the inclement weather there was a good crowd of spectators and they witnessed a game which was full of incident. The Sons of Canada were fortunate to share the points, as their opponents formed a better balanced team and did the more effective work throughout.

The Sons of England started playing down grade commencing with only nine men but it was not long before the arrival of Kelsey and Judge put them at full strength. Play was fairly even to begin with, good play on the part of Farquhar and Tinker being matched with fine combination of the Sons of Canada inside forwards. The Canadians scored the first goal when a hard drive from Dobbie cannoned off Wearmouth's head. Very quickly, the latter player redeemed himself by scoring a point which Corkle should have saved. At the other end, Dobbie narrowly headed over from a corner while B. Fanthorpe gave Corkle a hard one to stop from foul. Canada's second goal came from an oblique shot by Dobbie which gave Eason no chance. Almost immediately after, Percy Tinker equalized after a dashing effort on his own. After a prolonged attack on Eason's goal, Swan, with a neat header, again put the Sons of Canada in the lead. To give the spectators full value, Eddie Craggs scored from a foul, the ball glancing off Harry Menzies' head so at half time, the score was 3 all.

Second Half.
With the hill in their favor, it looked like odds for the Sons of Canada but on play it was largely the other way. The English halves had the whip hand over their rivals and Tinker's dashes and well timed passes to his outside men always looked dangerous. Although outplayed, the Maple Leafs once more took the lead when Clark scored after some blundering by the English defence. Undaunted the Rose kept up the attack and receiving the ball from a corner, Bert Wearmouth scored from a long drive. This ended the scoring of the game.

For the Sons of England, Percy Tinker played a sterling game, the best he has played this season. B. Fanthorpe played well but Farquhar spoiled good work by erratic finishes. The English halves were distinctly better than those of the Canadians, the veteran, Kelsey, being as good as any. Wearmouth was practically the soul of the English team.

For the Sons of Canada, the inside forwards shaped best, Dobbie being the brightest star. Harry Menzies played a strong game at back but Corkle was rather unsafe in goal.

Sport Chat

Emil Meusel, of Philadelphia, again leads the National League in the number of home runs scored and has brought his total to ten, one ahead of George Kelly, of the New York Giants, who it was predicted at the opening of the season, would run Babe Ruth close for the high record number. Now, Bambino is away ahead in the big league record with sixteen round trip hits to his credit. There is little doubt that he will again cop the record for the season.

Georges Carpentier, champion heavyweight of Europe, is well aware of the fact that he will enter the ring on July 2 against Jack Dempsey, the world's champion; several pounds lighter than his opponent. However, he does not worry for he demonstrated to his own satisfaction that he can drop a heavy man with ease. He has shown this in his training work at the Manhasset camp.

The noon hour dinner bell no longer rings for Jack Dempsey at his training quarters in Atlantic City. The world's heavyweight champion was yesterday placed on a restricted diet and his eating has been reduced to two meals a day. His first meal is breakfast and the second is a late dinner. How long the order will remain in effect depends upon the speed and manner in which he takes off the weight he and his trainers are now doing their best to reduce.

There seems to be quite a good deal of favor for Carpentier among boxing fans of this city. Some of these boys, who were overseas, have seen the French champion in action and say that he is, indeed, a marvel of speed. One describes of the circumstances under which he saw the "wonder man." He had just witnessed a tournament in which the Canadian Army lightweight champion had been engaged. He said the Canadian fought like a cow in comparison to Carpentier whom he saw boxing a few days later. This is an absolute indication of great speed which is not developed so much in the heavyweight class as it is among the lightweights. A second rate lightweight generally shows more speed than a champion heavy.

They are now busy on the building of a new park at Ocean Falls and this would be ready by the time proposed for the game.

As the excursion to Anyox was abandoned for July 1, on account of the local celebration it is doubtful if the Rupert boys would be able to go south for the date mentioned by Ocean Falls as there is no steamer sailing that would allow for the team being here on Dominion Day and at Ocean Falls the day following. There is, however, a possibility that one of the separate City League teams might be able to make the trip for the day proposed. In any event, the idea of a game at a later date with Ocean Falls would, likely, be very favorably entertained by the local association and arrangements to that effect might be made.
