Board of Trade Ask for Co-operation in Bringing Car Shortage to Attention

Manager of Cold Storage Expresses Himself Strongly in Regard to Matter; Committee has Campaign in Hand

"Thousands of dollars have been lost to this port owing to the refrigerator car shortage," declared T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co., at the meeting of the council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon. "Unless there are cars nobody here can do the business. The first delivery was to have been made in August last but the cars have not yet arrived. A few days ago I wired John Pullen, head of the Canadian Express Co., asking when they will be here and he now suggests March as the time for commencement of delivery. I think we should find out if the cars are really being built."

After a good deal of discussion the matter was left in the hands of the fisheries committee with the understanding that follow-up telegrams were to be sent, and that the City Council, the Fisheries Association, the member for the district, and others he asked to co-operate in bringing forcibly to the attention of the Government and railway the loss of business resulting from the car shortage and the suicidal policy of continuing as at present.

NEGRO BURNED BY SOUTHERN MOB

Henry Lowery Charged With Murder of Man and Daughter Gets Short Sheriff

OSCEOLA, Ark., Jan. 27.—Henry Lowery, a negro, charged with the murder of G. T. Craig and daughter at Nodena on Christmas Day, was burned to death by a mob last night on the Mississippi River levee near the Craig plantation.

PRINCE GEORGE LEGAL CASE

Order Granted Restraining Broner & Flynn from Disposing of Their Assets

VANCOUVER, Jan. 26 (Special).—An interim injunction was granted today restraining the firm of Broner & Flynn of Prince George from disposing of their assets pending a hearing on February 18.

An application for charging the order against the interest of one partner on behalf of the judgment creditors for \$2,983 was heard.

SOPHIA WRECK HEARING

Witnesses at Seattle Testify to Refusal of Captain to Accept Help

SEATTLE, January 27.—Three witnesses today testified in the hearing of the C.P.R. application for a limitation of liability in regard to the sinking of the Princess Sophia in Alaskan waters on October 25, 1918. They said that the commander of the stricken vessel refused offers of assistance from other boats and would not let the passengers be removed from the wreck.

ANOTHER FISHING BOAT LOCATED HERE

Annie Tucker to Fish From This Port During the Coming Season.

Yesterday the fishing boat Annie Tucker sold her first catch here and it is the intention of her owner, Joe Bacock, to operate out of this port during the coming season. She is an almost new craft and last season fished out of Vancouver. Her capacity is about 50,000 pounds.

COMMITTEE ON COW BAY

Mayor Rochester Selects Committee Chairman to Define City's Stand.

Mayor Rochester has named Alderman Dybahn, Kerr and Perry to the committee to draft reports defining the city's stand on a settlement of the Cow Bay dispute. These reports, after passing the council, will be submitted to the railway commission and the provincial government.

Farris Takes Part In Delta Election

Declares Charges of Bowser are Unfounded; Leader of Opposition Repeats His Statements Regarding Underworld Pact

GLOVERDALE, January 27.—In a speech here last night in the interest of A. D. Paterson, the Liberal candidate in the Delta riding, Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, attorney-general, said the alleged pact between the Oliver Government and the Vancouver underworld consisted of the endorsement of the Liberal candidates by some of the most respected citizens of Vancouver, members of the Moderation League, who were dissatisfied with Mr. Bowser's refusal to support their platform calling for non-restoration of bars and saloons and for the appointment of an independent non-partisan commission to administer and the underworld of Vancouver. He said people did not want a return of the bar. If John Oliver was honest he could make a definite statement as to whether or not beer was to be sold in hotels or government liquor stores.

MORE MURDERS BELFAST CITY

Shootings in Hotel Near Police Headquarters—Several Fatalities.

BELFAST, January 27.—Two strangers inquired at a hotel near police headquarters for some guests. When shown to the bedroom they shot two of the guests dead and wounded a third seriously. Later it was discovered that the party consisted of five armed men, two of whom kept watch.

A farmer, who was shot dead on Tuesday evening at Bandon, was visited two days previously by six men supposed to be British officers seeking information regarding Sinn Fein movements in the district, which was given.

Pinned to the dead man's coat was a note saying he had been shot for intending to give information to the enemy in regard to republican troop movements.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY

Remains of Late George Ross Buried by His Comrades.

The funeral of the late George Ross took place yesterday at 2 p.m., the members of the One Big Union, to which the deceased belonged, conducted the service. There were about 50 present.

Car Shortage is
Killing Business.

The car shortage is killing business at this port. Some figures, which have been carefully collated, are quoted on another page where it is shown that no less than 2,000,000 pounds of halibut, valued conservatively at \$200,000, was sent away from this port last season and probably 2,000,000 pounds did not come here because of information received by them that there was a car shortage. Much of that money would have been spent here if the fish had been sold here and the result would have been more passenger and freight business for the railway, as well as increased prosperity for everybody.

Promised Cars

August Last.

The cars were promised to be delivered in August last but none arrived. Then other promises were made from time to time and orders were supposed to have been placed, but still no cars appeared. Frequent representations were made by the Board of Trade, Colonel Peck and the fishermens of the port, but with no effect. At Christmas time Colonel Peck returned from Ottawa and announced that another fifty cars had been ordered, making eighty in all, but none have yet arrived. March is mentioned as a possible time for delivery but there is no surety that they will be here at that time and indeed there is no surety that they are really under construction.

Great Loss to
Fishermen.

It is not only the railway and the city that loses business through the car shortage. The fishermen suffer, even more than anyone. When there are two cars on the siding to accommodate eight carloads, a good price is paid for the fish that is shipped but the remainder of the day's catch is sacrificed at two-thirds its value.

The car shortage makes the fishery calling very uncertain. There is no stability and hence people are kept away from the business. What is the use of catching fish if there is no market? How is a market to be supplied without cars? These and other handicaps are suffered through the wretched unbusinesslike administration of the railway system, which pretends to serve this city. It has become a crying scandal. For a national line to deliberately cripple a national industry, as has been done here of late, is little short of criminal. It is even worse than that.

Specious Promises
Soon Forgotten.

When Hon. C. C. Ballantyne and D. B. Hanna were here last summer they addressed the Board of Trade and they specifically pledged themselves to give the city those facilities which others before them had promised, but failed to give. They used expressions which could not be mistaken. Hon. Dr. Reid specifically stated that provision had already been made for more equipment. That was July 21 of last year but apparently nothing has been done. At that time the minister was given a hearty welcome because the people believed he meant what he said. He said he would go back to Ottawa imbued with the needs of this place and if Prince Rupert was not developed it would not be his fault. What has he done? If Hon. Dr. Reid returned to Prince Rupert today without having fulfilled any of the pledges made that day, when the people cheered him and sang "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," he would be received with hisses and jeers and hootings. On that July day political affiliations were forgotten because people here believed the minister was honest in his expressions. Today the one thought in most minds is "How long will it be before there is an opportunity for us to show by our votes what we think of these people?"

LADY FOSTER IS
PLEASED TO RETURN
TO THIS COUNTRY

Worked in Hospital During War
and Later Established Creche
in London

OTTAWA, Jan. 26.—"I am very glad to be in Canada again and look forward to living in Ottawa with a great deal of pleasure," said Lady Foster, whose marriage took place to Sir George Foster at Geneva in December, upon her arrival here recently.

Lady Foster, who before her marriage was Miss Jessie Allan, a daughter of the late Sir William Allan, is a Scotswoman in whom dignity and charm are admirably blended, and is a welcome comrade to the ranks of cabinet ministers' wives at Ottawa. She is both wide-awake and well-informed and having been the daughter of a British parliamentarian is highly qualified for her position as the wife of Canada's veteran statesman.

This is not her first visit to Canada, for she spent some time here just before the war on an immigration mission.

It is interesting to note that Lady Foster did not meet her husband until he was in London to attend the Imperial Conference. Subsequently they were passengers on the same liner crossing the Atlantic Ocean.

When war was declared Lady Foster, like so many other women, gave up her service and it is tribute to her efficiency that she went to Switzerland for the British government, where her knowledge of German was of value in the handling of military records.

Until the middle of 1915, Lady Foster worked in a French hospital and since 1919 she has established a creche in London for war children.

Because of her father's political associations, Lady Foster has followed national destinies with keen interest, making friends with the leading diplomats of the time.

Sir George and Lady Foster will occupy their residence on Somerset Street this season.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

FERRY PLANNED FROM ENGLAND TO SWEDEN

Both Governments Concerned to Aid Scheme for Trade Promotion

LONDON, Jan. 27.—A plan for linking up Sweden with England by means of a train ferry to cost £10,000,000 is being considered by business men of the two nations.

The scheme aims at the establishment of a daily service by at least six 13,000-ton ships of 18 knots speed, each capable of carrying 50 railroad cars. As the gauges of the British and Swedish railroads are the same, rapidity of transportation would be assured.

The Swedish government is understood to be willing to guarantee a 10 per cent return over a given number of years, if Britain will guarantee the capital necessary for the initial outlay.

The route suggested runs from Hull to Gothenburg and there is also a suggestion of an extension across the Baltic, so as to provide direct communication between Hull and Petrograd.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., Jan. 27.—That the staff of the Prince of Wales College and Normal School who went on strike last autumn for higher salaries and returned to their positions on the promise of the Provincial Government that the matter of increases would be given favorable consideration, are still dissatisfied and may "walk-out" again, is the substance of a persistent rumor. The faculty are keeping their own counsel, but interesting developments are expected at any time.

The pedagogical strike took place while the teachers were in receipt of the following stipends:

Miss L. Seaman \$1,200

After the college had been closed for several days and the staff withdrew its resignations as a body and went back to work, increases of \$300 were given to the Principal and the Vice-Principal; another member of the staff had his salary increased \$400, another \$250 and the remaining two each received a \$200 increase.

These additions to their salaries did not meet the full demands of the teachers who are asking \$2,500 a year for the principal, \$2,200 for the vice-principal, and a further increase of \$200 for the rest of the staff.



REDUCTION MADE IN LUMBER PRICES

Drop in Price of Logs Responsible; Only Domestic Market Affected

Retail lumber prices in connection with domestic trade only have been reduced according to an agreement reached by the Victoria Lumber Manufacturers Association last night. "Though operating on a very small margin even after a reduction in the price of logs, we are determined to do all in our power to encourage local building," announces A. Gonnason, president of the association.

The cut in price amounts to about 20 per cent, on rough lumber and about 18 per cent, on clear, and is in now in effect. The former price of rough was \$27.50 per thousand and the new price \$22.50. No. 4 grade clears sold formerly at \$80 a thousand and he new price is \$65.

The reduction follows the recent announcement of a reduction in the price of logs, but even with the present reduced price of logs the larger mills contend that they are still unable to operate for foreign markets and the East and 75 per cent, of these mills are still closed down. The reduction in logs amounts to about 85 per thousand and the new rates run from \$20 to \$30.

In a statement, Mr. Gonnason said: "I do not expect that there will be any marked improvement in the building situation for a month or so at least until such time as some of the other commodities that enter into the situation drop in price, such as plastering, plumbing and electrical installation."

"People are too apt to think that lumber prices are holding up building. They base their contention, no doubt, on the fact that a larger volume of lumber than my other material is required in building a house. This, however, is a case where outward appearances are deceptive. If the prices of all commodities used in house building were analyzed, it would be found that lumber is the most reasonably priced of any, and that the argument about lumber being responsible for inactivity is simply based on ignorance."

SHIPPING LIQUOR INTO SASKATCHEWAN

SASKATOON, Jan. 26.—Liquor valued at millions of dollars is being shipped into Saskatchewan at the present time by wholesale liquor concerns, according to an announcement made by the Saskatchewan Liquor Commission. There is enough whiskey being shipped into the province at the present time to take care of all the export requirements of Canada for at least two years, it is asserted. Members of the commission anticipate that while this liquor remains in the province it will be a menace to the putting into effect of the prohibition measures which become effective February 4. There will always be a certain amount of leakage within the province and will be until this vast quantity has been finally disposed off.
