SUPREME COUNCIL IS DISCUSSING REPARATIONS

MATERIAL BEING ASSEMBLED FOR COURT HOUSE AND WORK GOING WELL

Reparations and the Further Invasion of Germany Topics of General World Interest

PARIS, April 30.—In order to avoid occupation of the Ruhr by Allied forces it seems certain that Germany will make modifications in her reparation proposals. It is believed here that satisfactory proposals are not likely and that the Supreme Council will likely approve of the occupation of the Ruhr next week.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The United States government hopes that the reparations controversy between the Supreme Council and Germany is still open to discussion. It is understood that Italy and Britain have not yet definitely rejected the German proposals and that France and Belgium, though rejecting the proposals, have not altogether declined to discuss modifications. No modifications have yet been offered.

Noon Despatches.

LONDON, April 30.—Premier Lloyd George and Premier of France and Count Sforza of Italy were in private conference this morning in an attempt to pave the way for a quick decision at the formal meeting of the Supreme Allied Council this afternoon.

Reports of an impending ministerial crisis in Berlin are current but there is nothing authentic in regard to this. It is expected that Berlin will make another attempt to avert the occupation of the Ruhr district.

Ministers May Resign.

PARIS, April 30.—A Berlin despatch says that the resignation of Chancellor Fehrenbach and Foreign Minister Simons will follow the presentation of the reply from Washington to the German reparation proposals.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—A treaty with Germany will probably follow the enactment of the peace resolution, Senator Lodge, Republican leader, said today in the Senate. He made it clear that the United States would not abandon the Allies.

Attitude of British Labor.

LONDON, April 30.—British labor leaders refused to meet German labor leaders here to discuss the reparations and construction of the devastated areas of France. The Germans remained at Amsterdam but the British were not represented.

LONDON, April 30.—The French delegates to the Supreme Council have decided France will occupy the Ruhr district immediately if necessary.

ARREST MADE OVER MURDER

Aband, Father and Mother are Charged with Killing Young Woman.

VANCOUVER, April 30.—Bernard Couture, aged 25, his father and mother were arrested yesterday and charged with murder in connection with the death of Mrs. Isabelle Couture, aged wife of Bernard Couture, in Vancouver on April 5.

When the death occurred the coroner's jury brought in a verdict that death had been caused by ergotism poison administered to some person or persons unknown.

ORDERER ASKS FOR WHITE STAGE SETTING

CHARLES, L., April 30.—Joseph Barry, the negro, who is being hanged on May 6 for murder, has requested that the gallows be painted snow white and the executioner and attendant wear white clothing to contrast with his own.

NEGRO LYNCHED.

BOWLING GREEN, Mo., April 30.—Roy Hammonds, a nineteen year old negro, was lynched here yesterday afternoon by a four-man mob.

S. MACSWINEY HAS ESCAPED

CORK, April 30.—Sean MacSwiney, brother of the late Lord Mayor of Cork, with two other Sinn Féin men, escaped today from an internment camp. They overpowered the guards and seized a motorboat on the shore.

ENGLISH LADY DIED AT GENERAL HOSPITAL

Mrs. Annie Stevens Passed Away After Long Illness—Funeral on Monday.

The death occurred last night at the General Hospital of Mrs. Annie Stevens, aged 38. Mrs. Stevens passed away after a long illness, having been in the hospital since last October. Shortly before then she arrived in this country from England.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers and interment will take place on Monday afternoon.

NIAGARA NAVIGATOR DIES AT LOCKPORT

LOCKPORT, April 30.—Anna Edson Taylor, the only woman who ever navigated the Niagara Falls in a barrel and survived, died today aged 58 years.

NO DEMAND ON RUSSIA

WASHINGTON, April 30.—It is officially denied that the United States has sent a demand to Russia for the release of American prisoners as stated by the Moscow despatch.

The officials say they are doing all in their power to secure the release of the prisoners but refuse to deal directly with the Soviets.

FRENCH LEAVES IRELAND TODAY

Lord Edmund Talbot takes Charge With Rank of Viscount.

LONDON, April 30.—Viscount French has formally bid farewell to Dublin as viceroy of Ireland. Lord Edmund Talbot assumes charge today with the title of viscount.

ADRIFT IN BOAT BUT RETURN SAFELY

SEATTLE, April 30.—Five members of the crew of the relief lightship at Unatilla reef who had been missing since last Tuesday when they went adrift in an open boat, have returned to the lightship.

JAPANESE PRINCE REACHES GIBRALTAR

GIBRALTAR, April 30.—Crown Prince Hirohito of Japan is here today en route to England.

Oil Concessions Go To British and Dutch with Standard Oil Excluded

THE HAGUE, April 30.—The Dutch parliament has awarded the Djambi oil concessions in the Dutch East Indies to Dutch and British interests barring the Standard Oil bid.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The Government has sent a note protesting against the Djambi oil concessions award and asserting that foreigners will not be allowed to exploit American oil lands unless Americans are similarly recognized elsewhere.

Mariners in United States Strike Tomorrow Against Reduction Present Wage

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—Mariners in every coast city are prepared to go on strike against a reduction of wages which comes into effect on May 1. All shipping except on the Great Lakes will probably be tied up. On both coasts the men refuse to accept the award of the United States Shipping Board.

BURN IRISH FARMS REPRISAL FOR OTHERS

Military Announce Drastic Measures to Stop Incendiarism.

CORK, April 30.—The military announce that three Sinn Féin farms will be burned in reprisal for the burning of two loyalist farms on Wednesday. The statement adds that if three reprisals to two does not stop the burning, it is probable they will burn six.

CARSON GETS POSITION AS LORD OF APPEALS

LONDON, April 30.—Sir Edward Carson, until recently a member of the British Government and leader of the Ulster section of Ireland, has accepted the post of Lord of Appeals.

LOCATE TROOPS NEAR CANADIAN BORDER TO STOP BOOTLEGGING

NEW YORK, April 30.—A detachment of state troops are to be located near the Canadian border and used in a further attempt to stop the activities of the bootleggers.

RADICALS ARRESTED ANTICIPATING RIOTS

Literature Seized at Kansas City When Raid is Made.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 30.—Eight women and two men were arrested by the police here in a drive against radicals anticipating May Day riots. Radical literature has been seized.

Contract Let for Excavation Work Court House Site

Eric Rosang has been awarded the contract for preliminary excavation for the provincial government buildings at Market Place. The contractors are at present putting up a cement shed for an office, and it will be ten days or a fortnight before there is a large crew of men busy on the job.

A scow load of lumber is now on the way here and on its arrival next week the work of making the cement forms will commence. The supplies of sand and gravel are now being looked into and today A. C. McDougall, J. H. McNeill and Architect Whitaker left for Kwinitsa in this connection. Mr. Whitaker will go on to Terrace where he will inspect the work on the new school that is being erected there by Bert Greer and Archie Beatty of this city. Mr. McDougall and Mr. McNeill will be back tonight and Mr. Whitaker may be away for a couple of days.

PRICE FIXING

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The United States Government is preparing to prosecute the United States Steel Corporation for price fixing contrary to the anti-trust laws.

MET AT FOUR.

LONDON, April 30.—The Allied Supreme Council met at 4 p.m. and are considering the measures to be adopted in connection with the German reparations situation.

SAME TIME TOMORROW

May 1 is Date for Time to Change Here—No Advances at Railway Offices

Daylight saving will not commence here tomorrow. Mayor Rochester announced this morning.

Although it was the Canadian national railways that launched the agitation for daylight saving here this year, the local offices have received no information as to whether their trains are to be governed by it and, as far as is known here, tomorrow night's passenger train will arrive on Standard Time. A change in the time card goes into effect tonight which brings the passenger train in here half an hour earlier, so under daylight saving tomorrow night's train will arrive at 8.15.

The change in time is favored in sporting circles for it allows for an extra hour of daylight in the evenings for games, but, nevertheless, it will work a hardship to children, who will practically lose an hour's sleep by its enforcement. Daylight saving was turned down this year in Vancouver, when it was given a six months' hold.

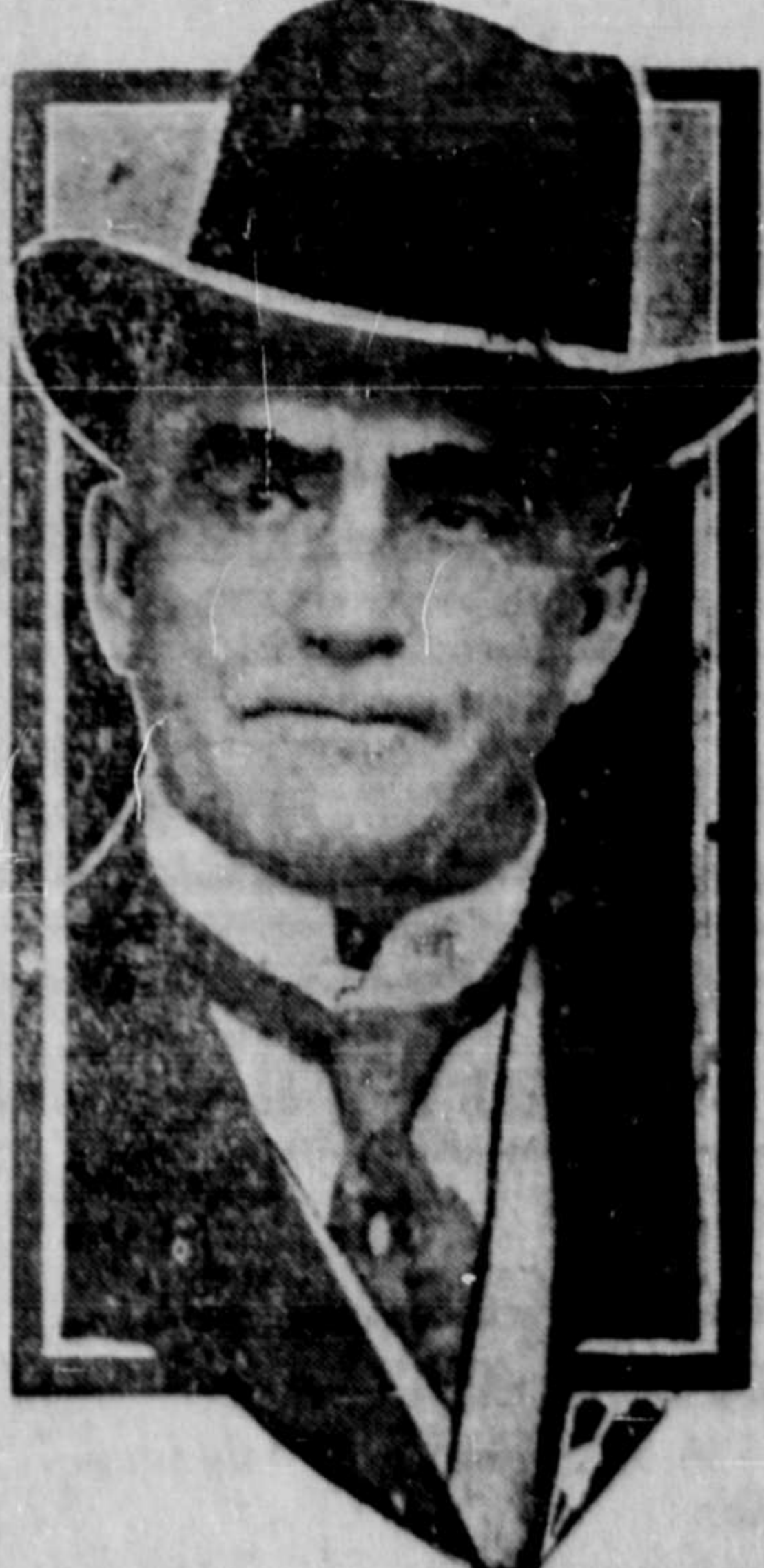
SUBMARINE AGROUND

Road to Mainland
By Galloway Rapids.

The building of a road to the mainland by way of Galloway Rapids was discussed with Mr. Pattullo yesterday and the member at once showed his familiarity with the subject and his keen desire to have the road built. There is no doubt but he will do his part in trying to secure the grant necessary to its construction.

The road follows the pipeline out from the city and will be built in such a way as to conform to the city section of the thoroughfare. It passes the famous Butze Rapids which are very picturesque and will prove one of the attractions of the district, once there is a means of getting there.

Grassy Bay, this side of the rapids will be an ideal picnic ground and place where games may be played when the tide is out. It will undoubtedly be one of the popular resorts for holidaying.

Other points of interest will be opened up by the road and all this in addition to the economic one of connecting the city with the canneries of the Skeena and with Port Edward, which is likely to become a manufacturing centre in the future.

The road will be the first section from this end of the highway across the province connecting this city with the valleys of the Kitsumkalum and Lakelse rivers, an interior plateau extending all the way from Kitimat on the south to the Neas River on the north, all fertile land but now covered with timber.

At a recent meeting Mr. Pattullo mentioned that this road would eventually connect with the interior in such a way that it would be possible to drive from here to Vancouver.

Small Difficulty
In Financing.

There is one small difficulty in the way. The Prince Rupert Boulevard passes through property owned by the Grand Trunk Development Co. and of which one-third is to go to the Provincial Government. To connect with the government road it will be necessary to pass along the road opening up this property. It seems reasonable to suppose the G. T. P. Development Co. should pay a share of the cost of making this road and the Provincial Government a small share. In view of the urgency of the need of a road and the certainty of delay in taking the matter up with the interested parties, it is the general opinion the citizens should be willing to postpone their claims for the present and not let a little matter such as that interfere with the building of the road.

White Salmon
Versus Red.

Red salmon is expensive but white salmon is almost worthless, commercially. The latter is sold on the fish market at wholesale for two cents a pound, a sum too small to make it worth bringing them in. As a result, when a white salmon is hooked, it is taken off and thrown back into the sea. It is worthless commercially.

Authorities agree that the white salmon is just as palatable and nutritious as the red and that a blind man cannot tell the difference between them. The flavor is identical. It is a great pity that there cannot be a campaign of education in regard to this fish with a view to inducing people to eat it instead of red salmon. Part of the fault lies with the dealers who try to sell the cheaper grades, not only of salmon, but also of halibut at prices almost as high as they get for the better grades.

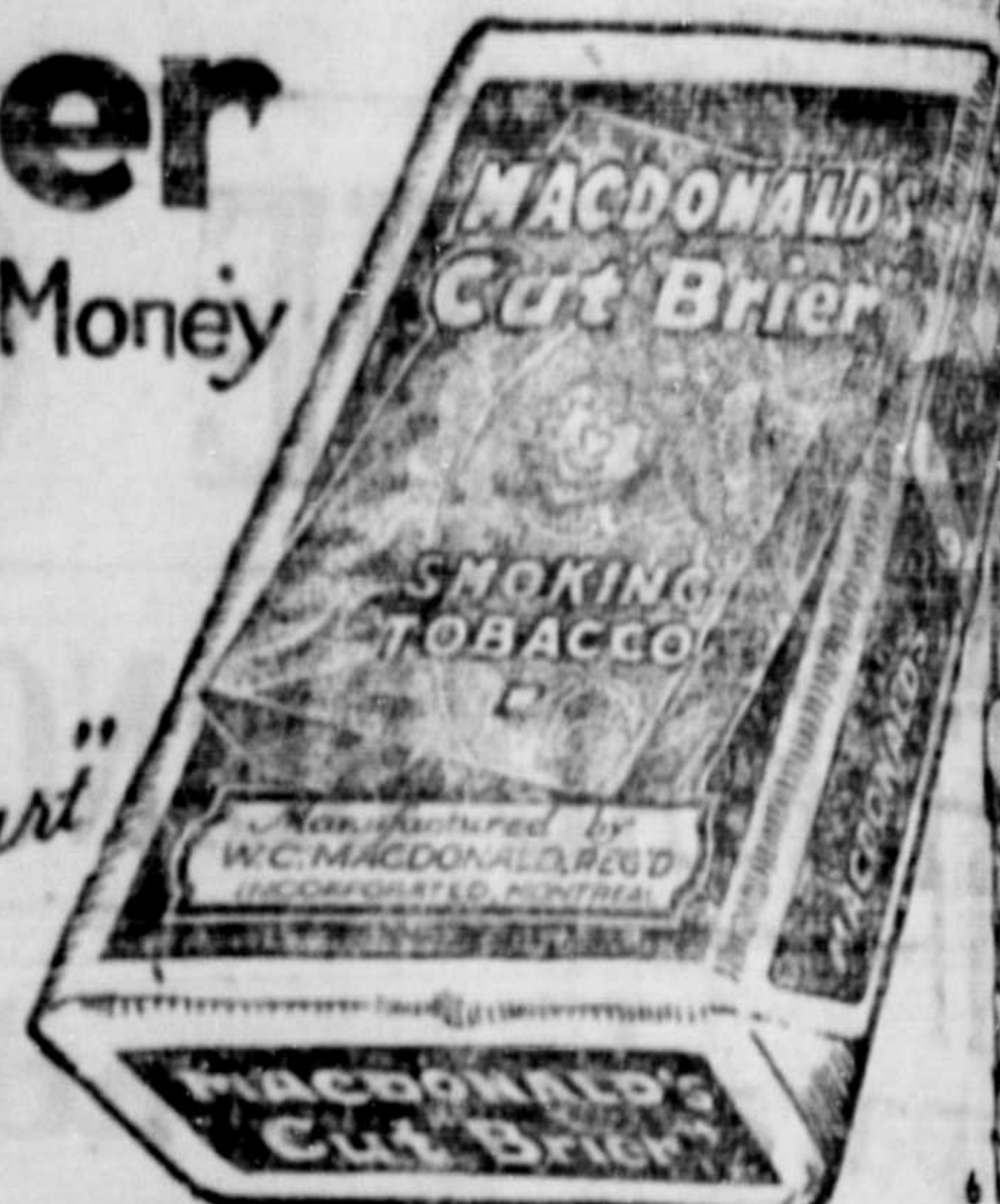

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

TO ELECTRIFY SEED WHEAT

Plant installed in Alberta for the
Purpose is in Great
Demand.

**SYSTEM HAS BEEN
COMMON IN ENGLAND**

CARMAGAY, ALB., April 30.—

Seed treated by a new process of
seed electrification, a method
which it is claimed will increase
the yield, check the spread of
fungal diseases and improve the
quality, will be shown this year
by many of the leading farmers
in Southern Alberta. A plant for
the treating of seed has been
established here and already its
capacity is taxed to such an ex-
tent that an enlargement will be
made immediately.

Great claims are made as to
the advantages of this system
which is known as the Wolfen
Electro-Chemical process of seed
electrification. The process con-
sists in placing the seed to be
treated in a bath containing a
suitable metallic salt such as
calcium or sodium chloride and
electrically treating the same for
a length of time appropriate to
the seed under treatment. The
solution is then run off, and the
seed taken out and dried. The
effect of the salt is not only to
decrease the resistance, or, in
other words, to increase the con-
ductivity of the seed-coat, but to
maintain that conductivity dur-
ing the period of germination.
Calcium and sodium in correct
proportions are, moreover, plant
foods and assist in the after
stimulation of root production.

This method is a new one to
Canada, but it has been tried
with remarkable success in Eng-
land. From the reports for the
season 1920 of field trials made
in England by the seed produc-
tion department of the Board of
Agriculture, on farms selected by
themselves, the results showed a
gain of 2 to 7 bushels of wheat
to the acre; 5 1/2 to 19 1/2 bushels
of oats, and 5 to 16 bushels of
barley.

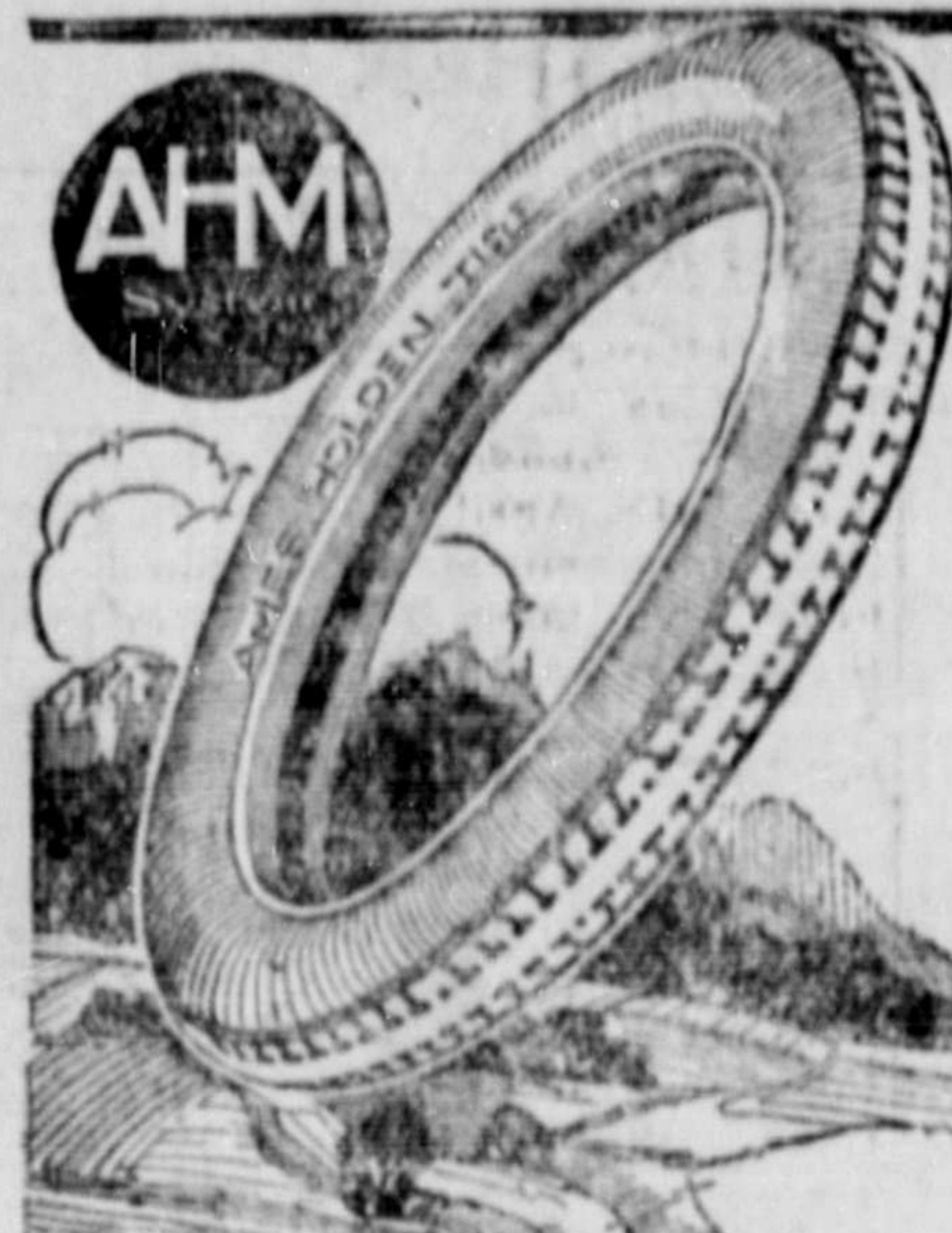

Tragedy of Workers in Russia is Explained by the Federation of Labor

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Russian industrial workers are living through an unexampled tragedy, according to a report made to the International Metal Workers' Federation by representatives of the Menshevik organizations of metal workers in Russia, which was made public here by the American Federation of Labor.

This report, which was translated and sent to this country by the information of American workmen by the secretariat of the Metal Workers' Federation at Berne, Switzerland, describes the conditions of the Russian workers as they are described when they speak against those who fallaciously and insolently call themselves the representatives of the people, and who are so afraid of the workers that they have abolished the right of free speech and of free press. The whole policy of the committee of the United States against the Russian workingmen is to inform the American classes and their organizations, declared the document, "can be summed up as follows:

Freedom Abolished

The freedom of the unions is abolished. The unions are established and work under the control of the Soviet authorities; and can only act in the way prescribed by the Soviet authorities.

Freedom of meetings is abolished. A decree has been issued in accordance with which meetings can only be held by permission of the Soviet authorities.

Freedom of speech is abolished. It is a crime to utter a word against the Communists.

Strikes are declared counter-revolutionary acts. Workmen who go on strike are punished with a brutality unheard of in western countries. Strikers are not only imprisoned, but deprived of their families.

Almost all branches of industry are under martial law. Workers cannot change from one factory or occupation to another. They are forcibly enlisted in so-called "labor armies" and overtime is compulsory.

Trade unions do not exist as independent bodies; they are subordinated to a central organization and thus converted into a compulsory government apparatus.

As a result of this policy, the Russian industrial workers, being

BRITISH CENSUS TAKEN SUNDAY

New Information was Sought in Line With Changed Conditions.

LONDON, April 30.—The most thorough census in England's history was taken on Sunday last, the first since war. Divorce data was a new feature while accurate information regarding orphans was carefully sought because of the attention given by the British government to children who lost parents in the war.

"Since the last census," says the Registrar-General's instructions, "the war has cut clean across every branch of our national life. It has violently upset all birth-rates, marriage-rates and death-rates. It has altered the whole occupational and industrial configuration of the country and has completely changed many of the customs, habits and conditions of the people. There is hardly a single question upon which we can look back to the results of the last census for guidance, so great has been the break between that time and this."

Unemployment.

Precise facts were desired on the scope of unemployment so that the main power of various industries might be determined. The daily tide of travel between homes and places of employment was ascertained so that housing and transport problems might be disposed of.

The previous census in 1911 placed the population of England and Wales at 36,070,191; Scotland, 5,760,901; and Ireland 4,390,219. Total for the United Kingdom, 46,221,615.

ITALIAN-CANADIAN EDUCATIONAL LEAGUE

WINNIPEG, April 30.—Branch of the Italian-Canadian Political and Educational League with headquarters in Toronto, is in process of organization in Winnipeg, and to date has a membership of about 75.

An endeavor to have all Italians living in Canada become Canadian citizens and fully discharge their duties as loyal Canadian subjects is the principal aim of the league. The league also aims to promote moral, educational, spiritual and physical development and to operate club houses in towns and cities throughout the Dominion as Italian educational centres.

put into a desperate position, unable to obtain help from their own organizations, desert the cities and go to the villages."

Militarism

Because a large number of workmen have deserted the cities and are seeking to earn their living in the country the document declares that "in order to save the situation and to detain the workers in the towns the Soviet government has had recourse to measures of compulsion."

"From the beginning of 1920 militarization of the Russian industries has been introduced," continued the report. "This measure was at first applied only to the railways, but gradually it was extended over the coal mines, metal industries and finally over the timber, flour and sugar industries."

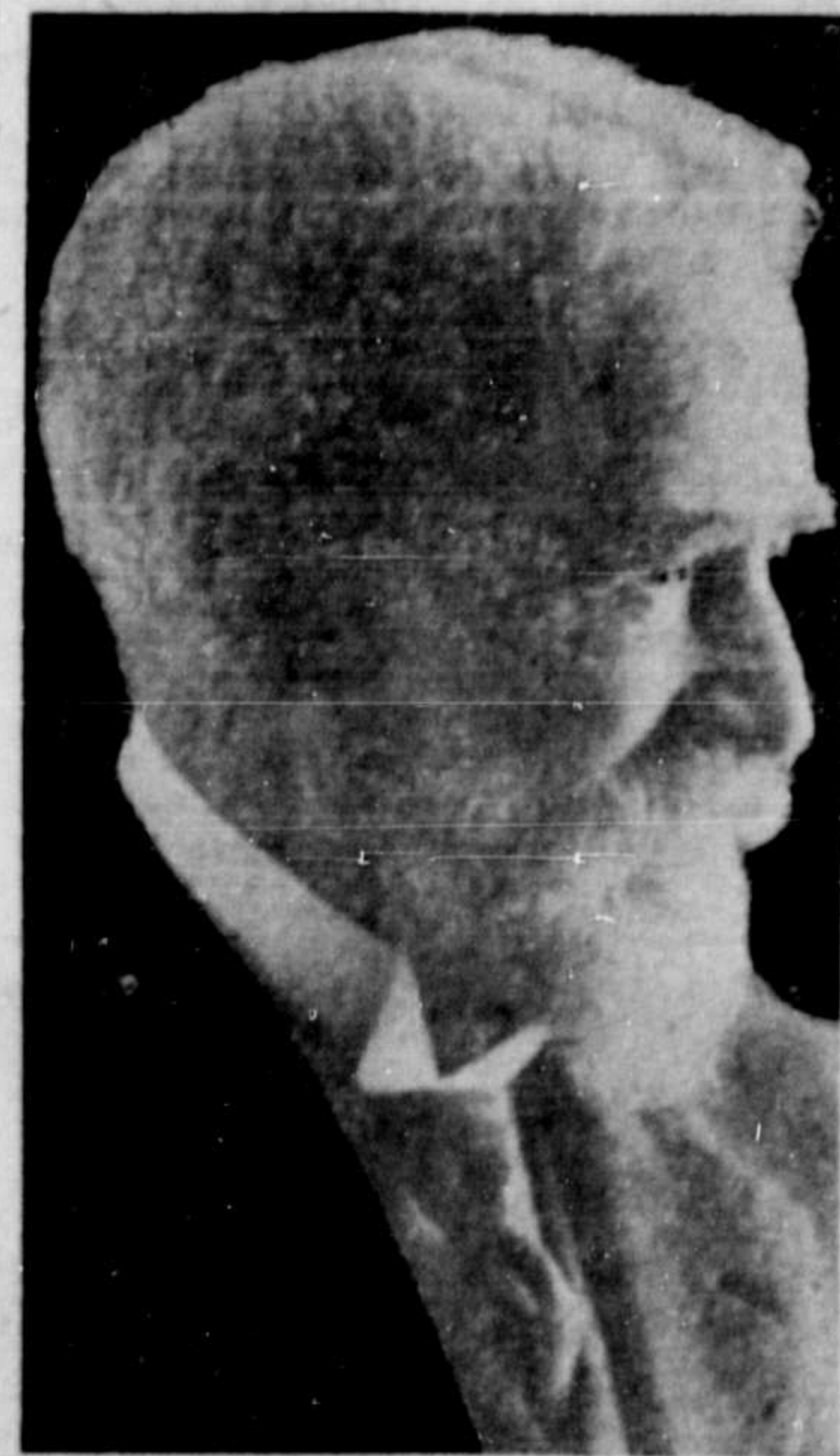
Local Celebrities WESTON COYNEY

Editor of "Resources"

Weston Coyney, editor of Resources, Prince Rupert's magazine, is one of the oldest journalists in the province who is still in the game and his career has been a varied and interesting one. Born near Birmingham, England, his work has taken him to all the cities of Great Britain and during his forty years in America he has been from the Panama to the Klondike and on both the Pacific and Atlantic seaboard.

Early Work

Mr. Coyney's first journalistic work was as a correspondent for two British dailies, London and Birmingham, in his native village he went to the staff of the Birmingham Gazette while Joseph Chamberlain was mayor of that city and it was when he was assigned to interview this great man regarding the approach

of the Prince of Wales, since King Edward VII. that the Republican advocate stated: "We as Republicans believe that the Prince of Wales was born with vested rights to the British throne and we, therefore, believe that he should be accorded the rights, but with the proviso that when he takes the throne, he will be the last hereditary king of England." These words Mr. Coyney sent out on the wires and they were flashed to all parts of the world.

Parliamentary Work

Later Mr. Coyney went to London as a reporter for the General News Association and did parliamentary work, including four weeks on the House of Lords, and returning to Birmingham was sent out to Canada as staff correspondent for the Birmingham Gazette and the London News. He covered one session of parliament and then went to New York on the staff of the Tribune. He became private secretary to Levi P. Morton, ambassador to France, and went to Paris with him in 1880. Two years later he returned to New York and went to the Panama Canal as paymaster for the American Dredging Co. He returned to New York again and spent several years on the staff of the Herald.

THREE BEACHES ARE WONDERFUL

North Beach of Graham Island
Unsurpassed in North America
—Unique Features

The famous North Beach of Graham Island is one of the finest in the world and it is said that it is equalled in North America only on the coast of Florida. This shore extends for thirty miles and the eastern two thirds of it is made up of hard, smooth white sand marred with not even a pebble. Some day, it is predicted, this beach will be used for an automobile race course such as the Florida beaches are now used. Its surface is a hard, straightaway for miles and is so solid that treads hardly mark it.

Besides this wonderful beach the north coast of Graham Island has other unique features. There are hundreds of sand dunes that in some cases are 35 to 40 feet in height. These dunes are formed around trees about which blowing sand has centred.

Rock of Gibraltar
Tow Hill, sometimes described as the North American Gibraltar, is another remarkable feature of the North Beach. Rising sheer up from the sea this rock is about 400 feet high and marks the only elevation for miles in any direction. Standing out as it does it is seen for miles around and forms a lookout point from which, on a clear day, the mainland of British Columbia and Alaska can be seen.

On the sea side of the rock it rises sheer from the ocean while there is a gentle rise from the land up which one can climb with ease. At the foot of the elevation, the constant washing of the sea has washed into the soft rock and formed the "bath tubs." These are cavities in the rock that have been worn away until they resemble bath tubs and are of such shape that it would seem as if they had been carved by hand. On the warm summer days the water becomes quite warm in these basins and they provide comfortable and individual bath tubs in which one may take delightful plunges.

Longest Beach
The longest of the Queen Charlotte Island beaches is the one on the east coast of Graham Island, facing the Hecate Straits, which extends almost unbroken from Rose Spit to Skidegate Inlet, a distance of ninety miles. This east beach is not so hard as the northerly, but it also makes an excellent driveway, for which purpose some portions of it are already used by the settlers.

The best beach for bathing purposes is the southern one which extends from Sandspit to Copper Bay on Moresby Island, a distance of about fifteen miles. Back of this beach the growth of evergreens, indented here and there with open glades, forms a veritable natural park. This beach is more sheltered than either the North or the East beaches and in the summer lends itself to the pleasures of bathers. From a summer resort and camping standpoint the south beach is the most suitable on the islands. Already there are a number of settlers along its expanse.

Recent Formation
The beaches of the Queen Charlotte Islands are said to be of recent formation. The winds and waves are constantly washing more sand on to them and they are growing all the time. In some places long bars extend as far as ten miles into the sea, one example of these being the Rose Spit bar. All the Queen Charlotte Island beaches can be traversed by automobiles and wagons and the creek and river mouths are easily crossed for they are not deep.

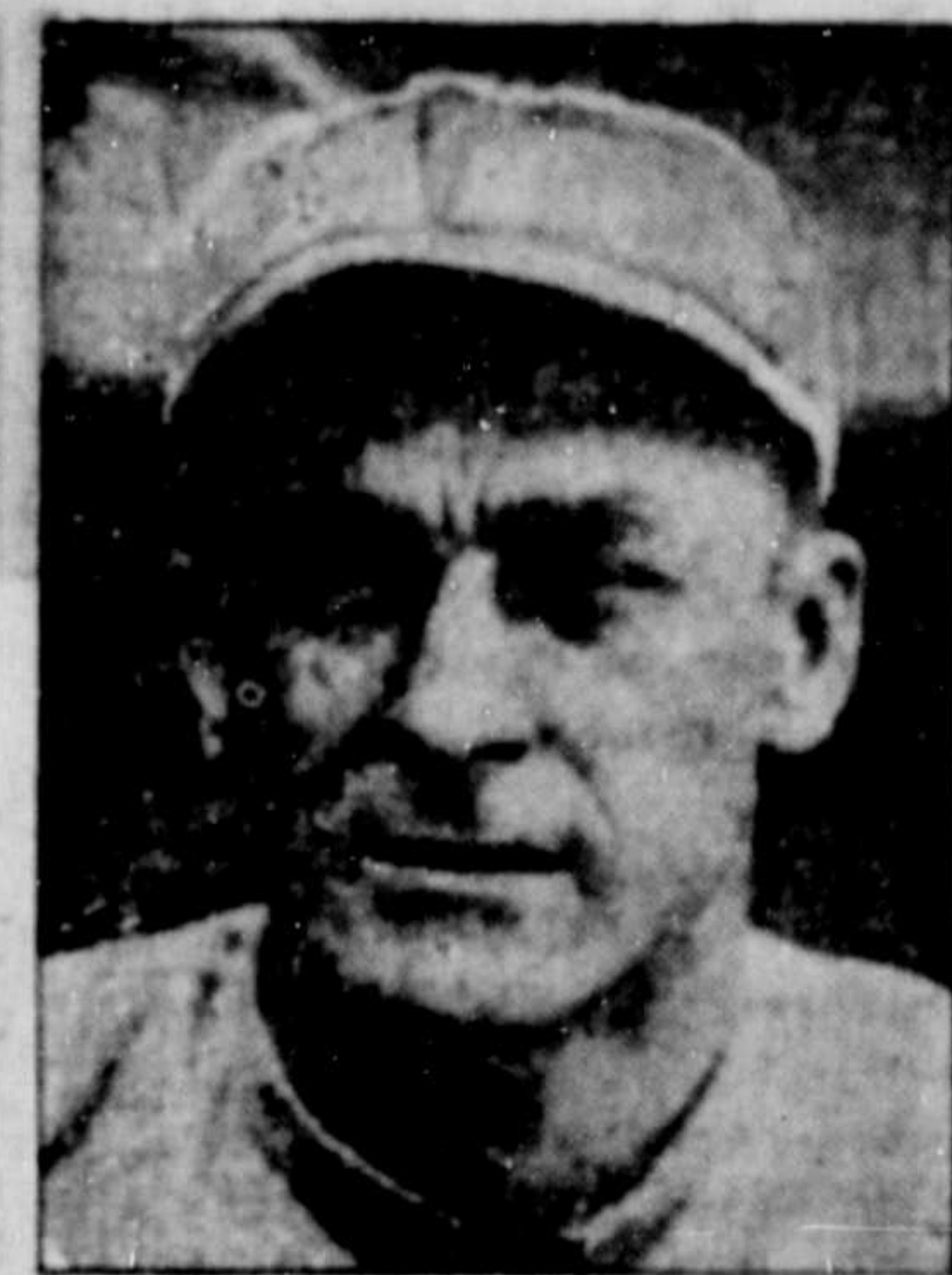

YEAR FOR KILLING BASEBALL PLAYER

BOSTON, April 30.—James J. Conner, a bartender, was sentenced to a year in jail for killing Larry McLean, a major league baseball player, in a barroom row several weeks ago.

LEIGH WINS CUP

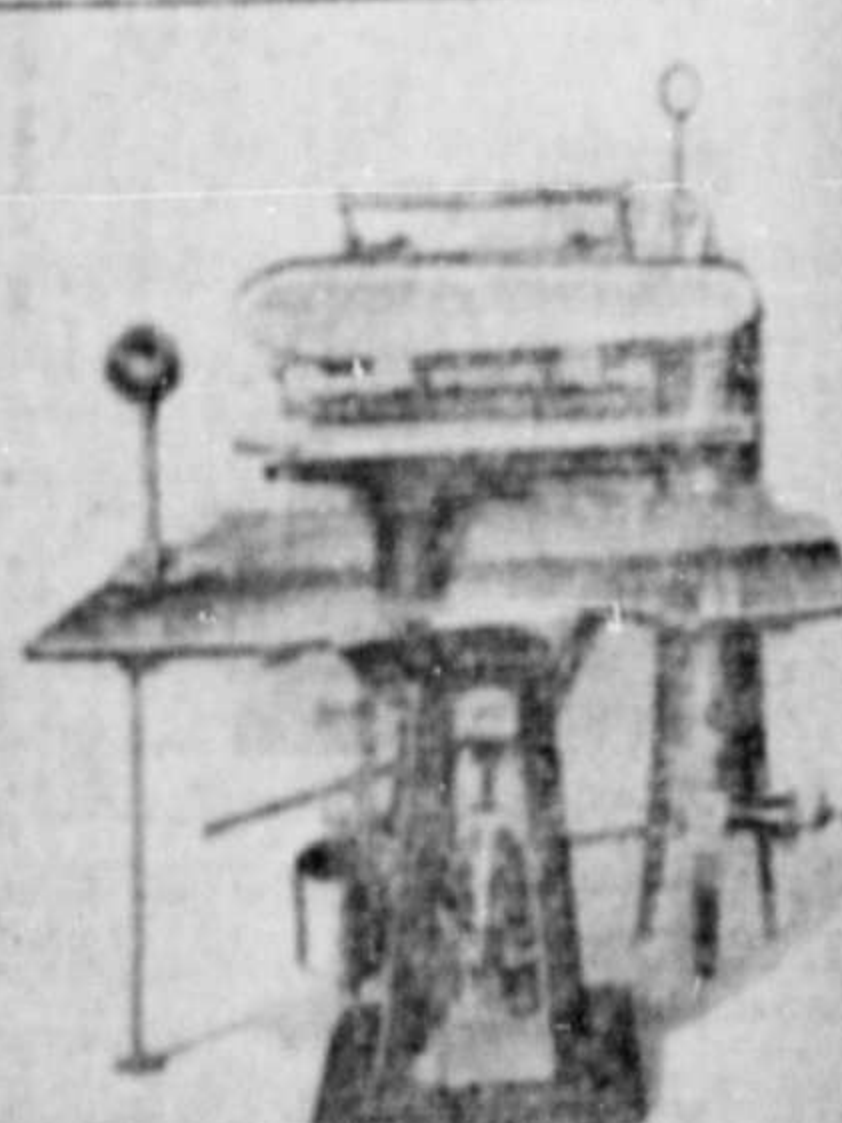
LONDON, April 30.—Leigh defeated Halifax thirteen to nil in the final game for the Northern Union Rugby Cup.

OIL WAS DANGER TO MANY LOBSTERS

Ten Thousand Dollars' Worth Were Taken Out and Washed Off.

HALIFAX, N.S., April 30.—Neville's Lobster Canneries here very narrowly averted a loss of upwards of ten thousand dollars a few days ago by incontinently scooping one hundred and fifty crates of lobsters which were floating off their wharf out of the oil covered waters of the harbor and carrying them outside to Sambre where they were put overboard again and washed off. The loss was small but lobster fishers here are apprehensive of a recurrence of the oil difficulty and are considerably exercised over the matter.

John Neville of the Neville Canneries says that owing to the smallness of the penalty imposed for dumping oil into Halifax harbor, this practice is much worse in Halifax than in any other port on the continent. It is, he says, a serious menace to certain lines of harbor trade. Representations have been repeatedly made by the Halifax Board of Trade to the Dominion Government in an attempt to have penalties remedied.

The fine for dumping oil into Halifax Harbor is \$100, while in New York it is said to be five thousand.

Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$10 an acre, second-class to \$15 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but power of not more than four men to acquire adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements will result in forfeiture of claim.

Records may be issued for less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 1 acre cleared and cultivated, and 1 acre of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained. Crown grant land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be issued as domestic title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grading and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be issued by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial site on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions including payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased from the Government for a term of years, not exceeding one-half of cost of purchase, and one-half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year to two years after the date of the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption records issued after June 26, 1915. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments of fees or taxes on soldiers pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, or fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser does not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1915, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

OPPOSES SALE TO GERMANY

Would Be Shame If Surrendered Ships Went Back to That Country.

LONDON, April 30.—The British Chamber of Shipping has decided to oppose the sale to foreigners of any of the merchant ships surrendered by the Germans. It holds that under no circumstances should any of them be sold back to the Germans. A vote to that effect was taken at a meeting of the Council just held to decide what disposition should be made of the vessels remaining in the possession of the British government.

Lord Inchiquin, who has been entrusted with the sale of the vessels on behalf of the British Chamber of Shipping, said that 168 German ships had been previously disposed of to British nationals, but a good number still remained to be sold and the demand for them, owing to the slump in the shipping trade, had slackened. It had been suggested that some arrangement might be considered whereby the market for the ships might be thrown open to the whole world.

One Newcastle ship owner affirmed that England would be disgraced in the eyes of the world if, after all her commerce had suffered from German submarines, any of the German ships were allowed to go back to Germany, particularly at the present prevailing low prices.
