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## Quarter Million Aerial Tram Line

### TENDERS WILL BE INVITED TOMORROW FOR NEW GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS

#### Contract Is Let for Aerial Tramline at Premier Mine To Cost Quarter Million

Contract for the construction of the aerial tram line from Premier mine to tide water at Stewart has been let to the Tramway Co. of Spokane, Washington. It is eleven and a half miles long with a 1,400-foot drop and is one of the longest on the continent. The distance by road from the mine to the wharf is fourteen and a half miles but the tramway takes a direct route.

Surveys for the new tramline are already almost complete and tenders are being called for the clearing of the right of way. Work for this are to be let in lengths and thirty days is allowed for the completion of that part of the work.

By the right of way is the remainder of the work. It is hoped that the material on the ground will be broken up and hauled to the break up, and enable the tramline to be in operation by the middle of the summer.

**700 Tons on Albert.**  
Yesterday the Prince Albert left with over 700 tons of ore aboard and there is about 150 tons at Nine Mile and some still remains on the wharf at Stewart.

Date L. Pitt is manager of the mine and he seems to have done excellent work in getting out the ore under difficult conditions. This ore has all been carried south to the Tacoma smelter by the G. T. P. coast steamships which have loaded it expeditiously.

The Premier is the only mine shipping ore in the Stewart district but there are a number of very good prospects that should become mines in the near future and this year a great deal of development work is likely to be done. The result is that Stewart will undoubtedly be a lively place and the adjoining town of Hyder will share in the prosperity.

Progress is being made by the company with the new contract to which will have a capacity of 125 tons a day and is ready for operation by summer. By the very latest process the lower grade ore will be treated and all the extracted. This will have the most modern improvements in science for the treatment of such as those found at the Premier mine. The usual flotation process will be used and the tails will then be treated cyanide process, so that nothing of any value will remain when it releases the

**200 Employees.**  
The mine employs about 200 men and present in all capacities. It is expected that about seventy to eighty men will be required to clear the right of way for the tramline. There are 15 miles of cable used which will weigh approximately 150 tons.

Difficulty of working the mine and getting out ore at present is understood when it is known that there is now six to fifteen feet of snow on the ground.

**200 Employees.**  
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Plans are already here at the office of the government agent and are slightly different from those on which tenders were called some time ago. It is understood that the contract will be let very soon and work will be pushed ahead so that a large part of it may be done this summer.

**YOUNG RUSSIAN DIED YESTERDAY**  
Joseph Wiscosky was Fisherman From Trawler Andrew Kelly.

Joseph Wiscosky, a Russian, aged 23, died in the General Hospital yesterday afternoon. He had been a fisherman on the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage trawler Andrew Kelly. He was a member of the Central Labor Council. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

**WIND DOES MUCH DAMAGE**  
Visited by Tremendous Storms on Saturday.

ONTARIO, March 21.—There was a serious storm in Ontario on Saturday. Hugh John McArthur predicted a falling bar and heavy rain and William Ferris was at the same place. The storm was followed by railway accidents at several places. Thousands of panes of glass were destroyed by hail at Stouffville.

#### MEXICO HAS BIG DROUGHT

Unless Rain Comes Middle of Next Month No Water in Country

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 21.—This city has been suffering for weeks from a shortage of water and light owing to an unusually long dry season. Water and street lighting have been rationed, electric advertisements prohibited and the street cars stopped from midnight to six o'clock.

The newspapers say the city is facing the most severe dry season in its history and that unless heavy rains come its water supply will be exhausted by the middle of April.

#### RAILWAY COMMISSION GIVES JUDGMENT ON PRINCE GEORGE STN

Will Hear Western Freight Rate Argued in Vancouver and Victoria.

OTTAWA, March 21.—The Board of Railway Commissioners have issued a judgment in regard to the Prince George station on the G. T. P. line. By this judgment it is to be located between Dominion and Quebec streets. This in a measure reverses the former decision of the board.

Western hearings of the Railway Commission will be held in Vancouver on April 7 and in Victoria April 11 to investigate the equalization of eastern and western freight rates.

#### UPPER SILESIA TO BE PART OF GERMANY

People Vote by Large Majority Against Joining Poland.

BERLIN, March 21.—Germany won an overwhelming victory in the plebiscite held in Upper Silesia to determine the future nationality and status of that region. There were 876,000 votes for Germany and 389,000 for Poland.

#### POLES THREATEN TO SHOOT BRITISH OFFICERS ON DUTY

WATTOWITZ, Silesia, March 21.—Poles threatened to shoot some British officers detailed to police Schoppnitz during the voting in the Upper Silesia plebiscite. Two officers will take over the supervision of the polling stations.

#### DRYDOCK CREDITORS

Possibility of Settlement of Difficulty with Government.

Information has been received from OTTAWA that things are looking more hopeful for a settlement of the differences between the creditors of the dry dock and the government.

#### MANY KILLINGS IN IRELAND AT THE WEEK END

Ambushes at Different Points and Casualties at All on Both Sides.

CORK, March 21.—Seven soldiers and one policeman were killed, several wounded and seven attackers were killed in an ambush near Kindale, according to latest reports. The fatalities to the crown forces were caused by the blowing up of bridges when three lorries were crossing. Twenty Sinn Feiners were captured.

There is a reign of terror at Cork. Farm houses and produce were burned as reprisals.

DUBLIN, March 21.—In an ambush at Castleknock by 150 men, a constable was killed and some attackers wounded.

In another ambush near Dangan the fight lasted five hours and a constable was killed and several of the attackers were killed.

BELFAST, March 21.—Five hundred Sinn Feiners ambushed thirty soldiers, killing six and wounding five. Reinforcements arrived, the Sinn Feiners retreating and many falling. The district is in a ferment.

DUBLIN, March 21.—Crown forces last evening killed and eleven wounded in ambushes in Ireland over the weekend. It is believed that thirteen revolutionaries were killed and thirteen wounded. One private citizen was killed and one wounded by Sinn Feiners. Street rioting occurred at Belfast and Londonderry.

#### HOCKEY CHAMPS BEAT THE CALGARY TIGERS

CALGARY, March 21.—Ottawa Senators, the world's professional hockey champions, defeated the Calgary Tigers, champions of Alberta, by a score of 2 to 0 in an exhibition game here on Saturday.

#### Liquor Is Largest Item In Estimates for Year Presented by Minister

VICTORIA, March 21.—Of \$17,910,595 estimated revenue for the coming year shown in the estimates presented by Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, the profit on liquor sold under the liquor act is set down as the largest item, it being expected to bring in \$2,500,000. Other items mentioned are as follows:—

- Automobile licenses \$750,000 as against \$650,000 last year.
  - Assessment tax, \$350,000.
  - Income tax, \$1,050,000.
  - Wild land, coal and timber land tax, \$975,000.
  - Poll tax, \$235,000.
  - Succession duties, \$700,000.
  - Timber licenses, \$1,350,000.
  - Land sales, \$550,000.
  - Timber royalties, \$950,000.
  - Timber sales, \$300,000.
- Of the expenditures, legislation will cost the province \$109,870. Prince Rupert gets \$200,000 for a new government building. Capital expenditure on mental hospitals will be \$227,100. Mothers' pensions will cost \$143,680. The educational department requires \$670,000, of which cities get \$100,000, municipalities \$137,500 and the rest goes to rural districts. The sum of \$60,000 is set aside for oil investigations.

#### BIG HALIBUT CATCHES HERE

Nearly 300,000 Pounds Comes in Over Week End and Eight Cars Arrived.

#### BOATS HAVE TO HOLD OVER—CAR SHORTAGE

Eight refrigerator cars which arrived yesterday from the east are being loaded today with fish caught at the exchange this forenoon and 68,000 more pounds besides, which arrived, is holding over until tomorrow for the six cars that are due to arrive tomorrow night. Over the weekend nearly 300,000 pounds of halibut came in and the eight cars were soon snapped up to accommodate it.

#### ROBERSON IS TO COMMAND THE RUPERT

To Relieve on Prince George for Month, then Gets Permanent Command

When the Prince Rupert comes back into commission early in May she will be commanded by Capt. Roberson of this city, one of the pioneer officers of the service who is at present skipper of the Prince Albert.

Capt. Roberson will leave the Prince Albert in about a week and relieve Capt. Moorhouse from the Prince George in order for that officer to take a holiday. This position he will retain until the George goes into dock, when the Rupert will take her place.

Capt. Roberson is a veteran of the sea and a pioneer in so far as Prince Rupert is concerned. He has been at sea 29 years, seven of which was in sailing craft, and part of it in India. He took part in suppressing the Boxer Rebellion in China, going there from India on a transport.

Accompanied by Mrs. Roberson, the Captain was one of the first white people to land on Kaien Island in connection with the founding of the city. He has seen service with the G. T. P. coast service since its inception, going first as chief officer on the Prince Albert with Capt. Barney Johnson. He then commanded the Henriette and left her to go to the war where he engaged in mine sweeping, patrolling and escorting for two years and for two years more was in command of various "Q" or mystery ships both sail and steam. He did valiant service with the navy and then returned to take charge of the Prince Albert. His promotion to the larger vessels will be a popular move. His place will be taken on the Albert by Capt. Nedden.

#### MUST HAVE \$250 ON LANDING IN CANADA

That is Text of Order-in-Council Passed at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, March 21.—An order-in-council has just been passed extending indefinitely the provisions of the order passed last November whereby immigrants of the mechanic artisan class, skilled or unskilled, is required to have \$250 on landing in Canada in addition to a ticket to the point of destination.

The city police had a call this morning from the residence of Louise Adams, Fulton St., where Harry Lathrop was alleged to have been doing willful damage. Warden Bailey was despatched to the scene but on arrival found a door broken and his man gone.

#### Peace Between Poland and Russia.

The Russian Soviet Government has signed a peace treaty with Poland and the Ukraine. The same government has made a trade pact with Great Britain. This seems to indicate that they are becoming more reasonable and that the powers are beginning to recognize them as the government of the country. There have been rebellions but the rebels are put down in true capitalistic style, only with a little more ferocity and with more drastic consequences to those taking part. It would seem as if the British Government must have had assurances that their financial interests in the country would be protected. It is possible that the country may settle down under the present dictatorship.

#### Value of the Premier Mine.

The Premier mine is one of the valuable assets of northern British Columbia, not so much on account of the money it is making for its owners as from the impetus it gives to others to develop their mining properties and try to get a shipping mine similar to it. If there is one good mine in the region of Stewart there is no reason why there should not be a dozen. It is possible that even richer ores may be found than those being taken from the mountains up the Salmon River. The success of this mine will induce hundreds of people to go to the hills this year to try to find another just as good.

#### Government Buildings In Estimates.

The placing of a sum in the estimates for the construction of Government buildings this year is really not of very great importance except in that the amount is double that placed there last year. There has been no doubt whatever in regard to the work going ahead. Everyone who knows anything about it was convinced that a beginning would be made very soon.

It is most misleading to speak of the new building as a court house. There will be a section of it devoted to the administration of justice, but all the government offices will be grouped there, these including the public works, lands, forestry, mines, government agent's offices, the employment bureau, land registry, supreme and county court, provincial police and a number of other departments. Some of these are now in rented quarters and others are crowded into shacks.

#### Bringing Order Out of Chaos.

The Provincial Government is gradually bringing the finances of the country back into a satisfactory condition. Under a stable and careful administration the income is increasing and the expenditures are being kept well within bounds. That is as it should be. Every district would like to have more money spent there, but it is absolutely necessary that the financial condition of the province be kept intact so that when money is to be borrowed for capital account, a reasonable rate may be secured. No province can afford to have a potlatch every now and then. They must carry on with care all the time. We have been a long time recovering from the financial debacle of pre-war days.

## AUSTRIA PRINTS PAPER MONEY

Only Way She can Meet Debts is  
by Keeping Presses Running

VIENNA, Mar. 21.—The financial plight of Austria is indicated in the supplementary budget brought in by the Minister of Finance, estimating the deficit for the current fiscal year at 42,000,000,000 crowns.

This is nearly double the figure given by his predecessor in the autumn, and even now does not take into consideration certain factors such as new demands on the part of the federal civil servants and that just made by the provinces that the federal government shall increase their appropriation three-fold and bear one-half of the salaries of provincial civil servants, including school teachers.

It is reported that the money presses are now turning out paper crowns at the rate 3,000,000,000 a month for Austria alone, the government apparently having adopted this as the expedient way of meeting the never-ending demands of its own servants, the workmen and all classes of people for increased pay to enable them to meet the equally never-ending increase in cost of living.

**Crown No Value**  
"The Austrian crown no longer has any value outside the country," said a member of the government to the correspondent today, "and soon will have none within. As a matter of fact, money is the cheapest thing in the country. No one attaches any value to it and the result is a general effort to convert the currency into foreign values or something of intrinsic value.

This has created a mad market for dollars, pounds sterling and other stable money, causing fluctuations of as much as 200 crowns to the dollar within a period of one week. The same condition is reflected in the stock market, while precious stones, jewelry, works of art, fine rugs and similar articles find ready sale at fair values. It is said that banks are financing art dealers who are scouring the country for pictures and selling them outside for foreign values, the money either being left here in the shape of credits against a collapse here, or brought in for further speculation on the money exchange.

#### KERMIT ROOSEVELT

Is Appointed Second Vice President British War Veterans in States

NEW YORK, Mar. 21.—Captain Kermit Roosevelt, who served with the British forces under General Allenby in Palestine during the war, has been appointed second vice-president of the British War Veterans' Association of the United States. Captain Roosevelt, who joined the British army before the entry of the United States into the war, was awarded the Military Order for bravery.

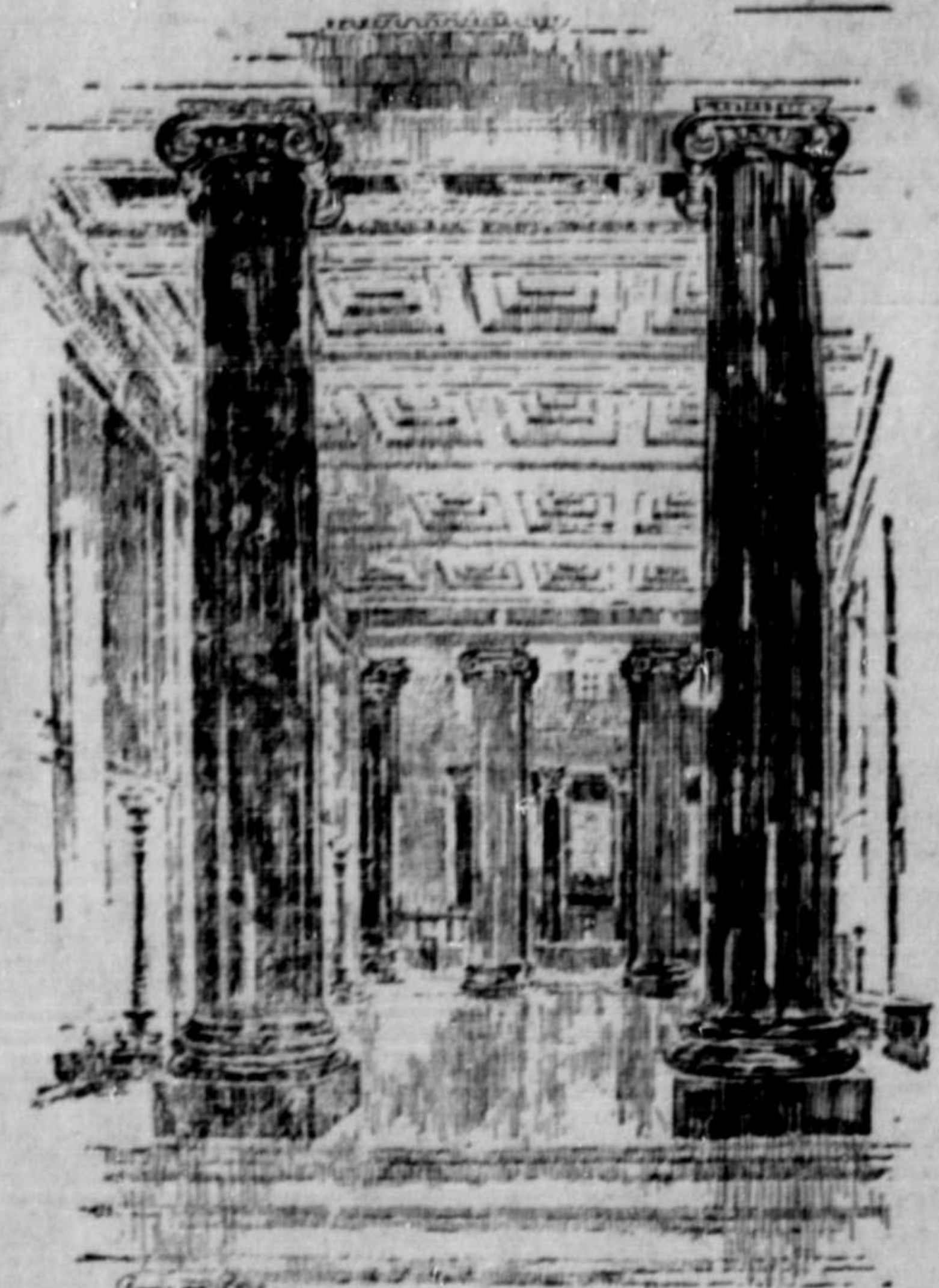

# GARDE SENDS APPRECIATION

Compliments David Whiteside for His Remarks About Prince Rupert

"We misjudged the situation entirely when we undertook to divert traffic from the North to Vancouver," said David Whiteside, member for New Westminster, in speaking of Pacific Great Eastern matters in the legislature last Monday and urging that the completion of the line to Prince George be abandoned. "That was where the great mistake lay. Prince Rupert is the logical Pacific outlet for the Peace River country and by attempting to make Vancouver the outlet we have made a costly and ridiculous blunder. There is no question about where the initial responsibility for the first expenditure on this road lies. It lies on the Government led by the present leader of the opposition, but it is equally plain where the responsibility will lie if we proceed with the fatuous policy.

"We are forgetting that in extending the line into Fort George we are in no way assisting in the development of the North which can be just as well served by a branch from the Grand Trunk Pacific.

**Garde Replies**  
A. C. Garde, representative of the local Board of Trade, who is at present in Vancouver, has sent the following letter to Mr. Whiteside:

"It was with undivided pleasure that I read your recent speech in the house with particular reference to the importance of Prince Rupert as the logical outlet for the Peace River country.

"On behalf of the Board of Trade for that city, I desire to thank you for the courage and ability with which you have been pleading for the cause of Northern and Central British Columbia.

"Unfortunately so many of your fellow members from the southern parts of the province fail to realize that every man and every woman travelling North with a view to developing the natural resources there spells more power and greater commercial possibilities for the southern cities, where social and other conditions are more congenial to the comforts of human nature.

**Our Treasure Box**  
"Let us give to the cities and transportation companies of the south that which belongs to them by virtue of precedence, population or geographical situation and they in turn will soon bow down and admit that we, in the North, hold the key to the treasure box, which a kind goddess bestowed upon us.

"Whether her name was Pandora or Patallo does not matter—probably the Minister of Lands will claim that he is too young to have known this gracious lady personally—but, nevertheless, he is one of the few members who, like yourself, has the courage of his convictions at heart and he knows the great possibilities and vast resources of his constituency. Good luck to him and you and all your fellow workers who are trying to open the eyes of the world to see this new empire in its right perspective."

# CANNERIES PREPARE CO-OPERATIVE PLANS

May Work One Plant with the Boats and Equipment of Three in Efforts to Reduce Cost of Packing

VICTORIA, Mar. 21.—Cannermen along the coast are this year considering the advisability of combining energies for the fishing season and running jointly plants numerous enough to handle the catch.

The difficulty of disposing of last year's catch has made the operators wary of running at full speed this season, and most of them have vowed to pack no more of the lower grades of fish, such as pinks and chums, as there has been little market demand for these varieties for the past three years.

A scheme is being advanced for the packing of sockeye on a co-operative plan. One cannery will take the equipment of two others, and by working to capacity will put away the pack of all three companies, thus reducing the overhead. During late years the canneries of British Columbia have been working only on a

# JAMES MANNERS' BODY IS FOUND

Rose to Surface at Government Wharf on Saturday Afternoon—Discovered by Boy

The body of James Manners, who has been missing since Tuesday night, January 11, was discovered on a Saturday afternoon about three o'clock at the government wharf. It was noticed first by a lad, Jack McNulty, underneath the corner of the wharf near the Prince Rupert hotel house. The police were notified and a few minutes later Constables Leek and Home and Dr. Gade arrived.

The remains were badly decomposed with the two months submersion and identification was made by the heavy mackinaw coat which Manners was known to wear. It was apparent that the discovery of the body had been made soon after it had risen to the surface for it was still covered with mud and sand from the bottom. It was removed to Flayner Bros., undertaking establishment.

Manners was prominent among the colored people of this city and had lived here for many years, his last residence having been in a cabin behind the Central Hotel. He had travelled extensively and could speak fluently in several foreign languages. Theory of suicide had been accepted soon after his disappearance on account of certain writings that had been found on searching his cabin.

**WOMEN JURORS SIT IN ENGLAND**

Many Wish to be Excused and Many are Challenged by Lawyers

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Excuses offered by women who for the first time have just been called to sit as jurors in Old Bailey, the world's most famous criminal court, excited a good deal of laughter in that usually sedate place.

Twenty-four women were summoned for jury service in criminal cases and mixed juries were formed with, in at least one case, a woman serving as forewoman. The charges included murder, arson and manslaughter.

The women appeared quite as anxious as men to avoid service on the juries.

"I'm too nervous," was the plea of one.

"I'm not strong-minded enough," said another. She was excused.

Others pleaded inability to leave housework, shopping, business, care of babies or sought to evade service on the ground of their own illness or that of members of their families.

After Lawyers

"I know one thing we women will do," said one jurymen after sitting in the court for a half-hour. "We will make the lawyers wear clean wigs and have better manners."

Others, after their first appearance in the jury-box, made suggestions that women jurors should be compensated for disruption of their household routine and that "light refreshments" should be served during the afternoon court sessions.

Those in the courtrooms seemed to regard the spectacle of women telling their true ages, in most cases without noticeable hesitation, the most surprising part of the novel procedure. One was eighty-three and was excused.

Mostly Not Guilty

While, in the cases heard during the opening day, the majority of the verdicts were "not guilty," litigants, both men and women, and their counsel, seemed reluctant to have women sit in judgment in their cases. It was noticeable that men defendants in particular sought, through repeated challenges, to prevent their being seated as jurors.

"Men know women can't be hoodwinked and bamboozled so easily—they are too likely to overlook technicalities and go to essentials—that's the reason they don't want us," said one woman who had been challenged and excused.

Women jurors soon will be called to decide libel actions, breach of promise suits, others for false imprisonment, and assault in the London law courts and also will make their first appearance as jurors in the divorce court.

They have been sitting as jurors in some of the counties of England for some months.

gestions that women jurors should be compensated for disruption of their household routine and that "light refreshments" should be served during the afternoon court sessions.

Those in the courtrooms seemed to regard the spectacle of women telling their true ages, in most cases without noticeable hesitation, the most surprising part of the novel procedure. One was eighty-three and was excused.

Mostly Not Guilty

While, in the cases heard during the opening day, the majority of the verdicts were "not guilty," litigants, both men and women, and their counsel, seemed reluctant to have women sit in judgment in their cases. It was noticeable that men defendants in particular sought, through repeated challenges, to prevent their being seated as jurors.

"Men know women can't be hoodwinked and bamboozled so easily—they are too likely to overlook technicalities and go to essentials—that's the reason they don't want us," said one woman who had been challenged and excused.

Women jurors soon will be called to decide libel actions, breach of promise suits, others for false imprisonment, and assault in the London law courts and also will make their first appearance as jurors in the divorce court.

They have been sitting as jurors in some of the counties of England for some months.

LONDON, Mar. 21.—The British government has decided to hold a conference with representatives of the British dominions in order to formulate a policy of promoting the settlement of British colonists in new and undeveloped parts of the British Empire.

This plan is intended to serve the double purpose of distributing the population of the United Kingdom so as to populate the empty spaces of the empire and insure that the additional population of these undeveloped territories will be British both in birth and in spirit. By these means it is hoped to provide for the defence as well as the development of the empire and to reduce the surplus of women over men in the population of the United Kingdom.
