COMMONS MAY OPEN FEB. 17

May be Trouble in Store for Meighen when He Meets Parliament

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—It is thought likely that Thursday, February 17, may be the date set for the opening of Parliament. There is some delay, it is suggested, through fear that there may be trouble for the Government at the coming session. All sorts of rumors are afloat in regard to the possibility of Liberal Unionists bolting and thus causing the defeat of the Government. If the Government survives this session it will probably continue until after a redistribution measure has been passed.

YEAR PILLAGE EMERALD ISLE

Hundreds Killed and Injured and Thousands of Raids with Much Destruction

LONDON, Jan. 10.—Two hundred and sixty one persons killed and forty-four injured in Ireland in the year 1920 in what were described as "serious outrages." The figures do not include 82 civilians who died as a result of riots in Ulster last summer, 165 policemen killed and 225 wounded, 53 soldiers killed and 118 wounded, 46 civilians killed and 103 wounded.
Sixty eight courthouses were destroyed and 530 constabulary barracks were destroyed and 163 damaged. There were 998 raids on mails, 56 on coast guard stations and lighthouses, 2,804 raids for arms and 119 raids on inland revenue officers.

May Pipe Fort Norman Oil to Rupert or Vancouver

Prospecting Party Left Vancouver Saturday going in on the Mackenzie by way of Mayo, Crossing Trail of '98

VANCOUVER, January 10.—Fort Norman oil must be piped to Prince Rupert or Vancouver in order to be shipped economically, as the cost of providing railway transportation facilities to Edmonton would be prohibitive, stated George F. Askew, shipyard foreman for the Hudson's Bay Co., when interviewed here.
Other arrivals from the new oil fields agree that the Vancouver-Atlin route into the territory is better than by way of Edmonton. By that route there is only 340 miles of mushing compared with nearly 1,200 from Fort McMurray.
D. Hardie, a prospector, and party left Saturday for Mayo en route to Fort Norman. They will cross the trail used in the Yukon rush of '98.

Peace Negotiations Are Said to Have Broken Down

Lloyd George Refuses to Withdraw Home Rule Bill at Suggestion of Sinn Feiners; Lord Decies Candidate in South

DUBLIN, January 10.—If reports from official circles are to be credited, negotiations for peace in Ireland have broken down. Definite information is lacking but it is said Premier Lloyd George definitely refused to consider the Sinn Fein proposal for the withdrawal of the Home Rule bill.
LONDON, January 10.—Lord Decies is the first candidate to offer himself for election to the southern Irish parliament. He admits that the Home Rule Act is far from perfect, but says it represents the gift of self government "which was ours for the asking." His act is supposed to be part of the plan of the Government to encourage willingness to work for the new act. It is expected that more candidates like Lord Decies will be announced.

BELFAST, January 10.—Inspector McGrath was slain at Ballinalee while the patrolling constable was wounded. Two houses, the property of Sinn Feiners, were burned.

Candidates Speak at the Open Forum

Nickerson and Rochester State Policy and other Aspirants for City Council Express Views on Local Affairs

George Nickerson, the first candidate for the mayoralty called upon to speak at the Open Forum meeting last night in McIntyre hall, stated that there had been two reasons mentioned in opposing his candidature, his lack of experience in civic affairs and his attitude on the Cow Bay question. Also an attempt had been made to maliciously blacken his character.

"It is said that Nickerson has the blind pigs behind him, but let them come out into the open and say what they have to say," he challenged. "It is said that I have the Board of Trade behind me and there would be class legislation. As for a warehouse site, of course I want one and am not ashamed to admit it. We want to be able to compete with the south and do not want Vancouver to steal our business. I am not a stand-patter. If we had not stood pat when the hydro-electric issue was before us some years ago and had let a company have a franchise for the supplying of power to the city we would have had eastern capitalists behind us and we would have been building ships here from the time the first gun was fired in Flanders.

Rochester's Stand.
"Ald. Rochester and the other aldermen went on record last September as favoring the closing of Cow Bay and the relinquishing of the city rights providing outside waterfrontage was granted. Now they stand for an open Cow Bay. This matter is a question between the provincial government, railway company and the city for the Railway Commission to decide. Let the interested parties put up their arguments and the railway commission will decide. I am for the development of the waterfront and have an interest in the fish boats. I helped establish the industry here and am helping to employ thirty fishermen now. The fishermen want a place where they can tie up. All the members of the city council agreed to relinquish the city's rights in Cow Bay for 250 feet of waterfrontage

Assembly Wharf.
"If I am mayor, and I expect to be, I am not going to wait until matters are brought to me; I will go out and get them. We must have an assembly wharf for the nucleus of our lumber business. I know we have the goods but we must show the world and the present council have not done that. Mr. Nickerson went on to refer to financial matters, stating that at the end of 1919 the city owed \$50,000 to the bank as against \$5,000 or \$6,000 at the end of 1917. That had gone towards patching up work and it was hard

to see it. He did not think that good financing.

Business Government. As far as his lack of experience was concerned, municipal government was nothing but business government. The departmental heads were responsible for the operation and the mayor for the legislation. If the officials could not attend to the operation, then new ones must be put in.

Regarding moral affairs he had lived here since April, 1909, and had lived single and married. He had conducted himself properly both as a single and as a married man. He made no promises but if elected he would deliver the goods.

Ald. Rochester.

"As far as statistics are concerned, Ald. Perry has gone into that fully," said Ald. Rochester, on taking the platform. "Statements have been made here which are not true. The school board say nothing was done when their application for money for the new school was received. We took up the matter with the bond houses, but could not sell bonds to Eastern Canada or United States bond houses.

"To move the pipe line at Hays Cove would have cost \$20,000 and we did not feel like entering into that.

Mr. Nickerson quoted Mr. Peters and saying the citizens had no rights in Cow Bay. That is not right as can be ascertained from the files at the city hall. The rights of the city there are not going to be given away but are going to be respected.

"The council did not agree to the exchange of 250 feet of waterfrontage and would give no promise until a definite agreement was submitted. Some years ago a man had come from Victoria as an emissary from the provincial government and the city had agreed to relinquishing its rights for 400 feet of waterfrontage outside but later we found that the man had no authority to make such an agreement. The city is, however, entitled to that much.

"I am not going to make any excuses for soliciting your votes. I have been here for fourteen years and am familiar to you all. I have served for three years on the council board and have no interests to serve. All I have made here I have put back into the city and I have nothing to regret."

D. McD. Hunter.

D. McD. Hunter said he had been for twenty years in the service of the schools of the province and he did not think he had been well treated here. This was the only place where he had not been dealt with frankly. He had served faithfully throughout the years and now he felt the people here would be behind him. While he differed from some sections of the labor people he was in full sympathy with those who worked, for he had always worked himself. He would try to serve them well and fight in their interests if necessary.

Douglas Sutherland.

D. Sutherland made no promises and did not believe in long manifestoes. If they considered he could represent them he would

give of his best and would treat all matters that came before him in a businesslike way. One issue before them was Cow Bay. He was in favor of keeping it open. Any interests that wanted it closed must show that it would be in the interests of the people to close it. He charged that the movement to close it was engineered by selfish interests. The bay, he claimed, was a necessary adjunct to the city. He was in favor of playgrounds for the children and would like to have them where they did not have to climb a mountain to get to them. He was out in support of Harry Rochester for mayor.

George Kerr.

George Kerr, chairman of the board of works for the past year, said he was one of a committee of three of whom Currie had left town and Casey had quit. They had done a good deal of work such as the pipe line across the narrows and Section 2 bridge. He favored keeping Cow Bay open. They might want to bring in the rock for paving that way. In the coming year the Grand Trunk assessment would be a big thing. Power also was a big question. The waterworks was in a better condition than ever, capable of supplying 40,000 people. They had enough water to supply a pulp mill in the city. He advocated the building of an incinerator for the city garbage.

W. H. Murray.

W. H. Murray, said he had been a member of the utilities board and had also been planked on to the board of works. For this Ald. Kerr had not given him credit. He thanked them for electing him on the last occasion and asked for a renewal of their confidence.

C. C. Perry.

C. C. Perry explained that in regard to Cow Bay he kept an open mind. He would keep in view the best interests of the city. As chairman of the utilities committee they had had to deal with the power question. Several projects had been before them including Falls River, estimated cost, \$2,500,000; Khatada, \$1,500,000; a diesel oil scheme which had been thrown out; steam turbine, \$320,000; addition to Shawatinans to generate an additional 1,000 horse power, \$268,000, and the Thulme River project estimated cost, \$700,000, which would generate 4,000 horsepower. The last mentioned project appealed to the committee strongly. If a company could offer them a cheaper rate, he would favor negotiating with them. He suggested making preliminary surveys at Thulme River at a cost of \$20,000. He was in favor of development and progress. It was for the police commission to deal with the moral condition of the city. During the year they had raised the wages of City employees. He asked for support at the coming election.

J. M. Kelly.

J. M. Kelly spoke for himself and Tom Silversides. They were nominees of the G. W. V. A. and stood for a high standard of citizenship. He believed that the power question and the Cow Bay schemes should be decided by the citizens.

It would be his policy to find out what the city needed and then get busy. There was enough industry here today to make this a good city. They wanted permanent streets and buildings. The city had been the last to act in the recent drydock crisis when they should have been the first. They should show that the city was all right by their optimism. He had not much here but he was proud of his little home and would boost for it. He asked that the electors vote for the granting of the building on Third Avenue to the War Veterans, even if they turned down himself and Tom Silversides as candidates.

SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES AT FORUM MEETING

L. W. Patmore and Fred Shaw Heard in Regard to New Building Difficulties.

At the Open Forum meeting last night L. W. Patmore told the history of the new school building with a view to placing the blame for extra cost on the city council rather than on the school board. In this he was backed up by Fred Shaw, another trustee. At the conclusion of his address Mr. Patmore asked that Mr. Shaw, Mrs. Kirkpatrick and himself be again returned as they had worked together in securing the new building.

Mr. Patmore showed that two years ago the schools were overcrowded and steps were taken to secure a new building. Competitive plans were invited and those of Architect Potter chosen. They at once wrote the city council asking for the extraordinary expenditure as required by law. The council ignored the law and delayed from six weeks to two months.

Blame for Cost.

J. C. McLennan blamed the school board for the enormous cost of the school, but he wanted to tell them that it was the delay of the city council that caused the extra expense. The responsibility of the cost of the building was on the council and especially on the finance committee, consisting of the mayor, Ald. Rochester and Ald. McLennan.

When the people had approved the bylaw, it was found that there was an error and it had to be done over again. It was a city council official who caused the delay. After the bylaw was passed there were further delays and nothing but criticism and it took a year and a half before the finance committee got its bonds on the market and then only because the bank forced them to do so.

As a result of the unnecessary delays, lumber jumped 80 per cent and hardware 50 per cent. Eventually the bonds were marketed at a big discount and as a result the city council is from \$26,000 to \$27,000 short in the amount they are able to hand over to the school board for the building. The result will be that the outlayers will have to pay that amount at once instead of it being spread over a period of years. In spite of the year of delay, the building would not cost as much as if it had been let by contract. They expected to save the city \$15,000 through doing the work on force account.

Fred Shaw.

Fred Shaw backed up what Mr. Patmore said. He stated that on the face of it they seemed to be giving Col. McMorde a good meal ticket. He was to get 4 per cent for supervising the contracts let and 10 per cent for other work. The only complete tender they had received was for \$198,000, while Architect Potter's figure was \$127,000. He thought the board had used good business judgment in letting the work to Col. McMorde. He failed to see where the work could be duplicated in Vancouver for the money. They got the masonry work done cheaply.

The city council wanted them to place the building on a site where

Drawford will Put Snowshoes on Horses and Drive Over Snow

STEWART, Jan. 10.—Preparations are being made to ship ore out from the Spider mine owned by the Meloche interests. W. J. Crawford has arrived from the south with his wife and family and it is understood he will use his horses to get the ore out. They will be shod with snow shoes and should be able to handle a large quantity of ore during the time the sleighing is good. This work will commence about February 1 and should continue for three months or thereabouts.

CANDIDATES FOR POLICE COMMISSION ADDRESS MEETING

Two candidates for the police commission addressed the Open Forum last night. They were T. H. Nuttall and R. T. J. Rose. Mr. Nuttall said he thought it his duty to run for the office. Being a Methodist minister he had not enough money to run for mayor. He advocated making this a decent town. He had no property to lease for purposes that were not commendable. They needed five men on the police commission and if they thought he was a live man he asked that they elect him.

R. T. J. Rose said he had no apology to make for running as commissioner. He was out for a clean town. He had fought the late commissioners and the mayor and he would continue to fight to the last ditch. The Comox district was filthy and the people going there were drunk and disgusting in their habits. In Vancouver they could clean things up but here they could do nothing. As soon as work started up again Comox would be a little hell.

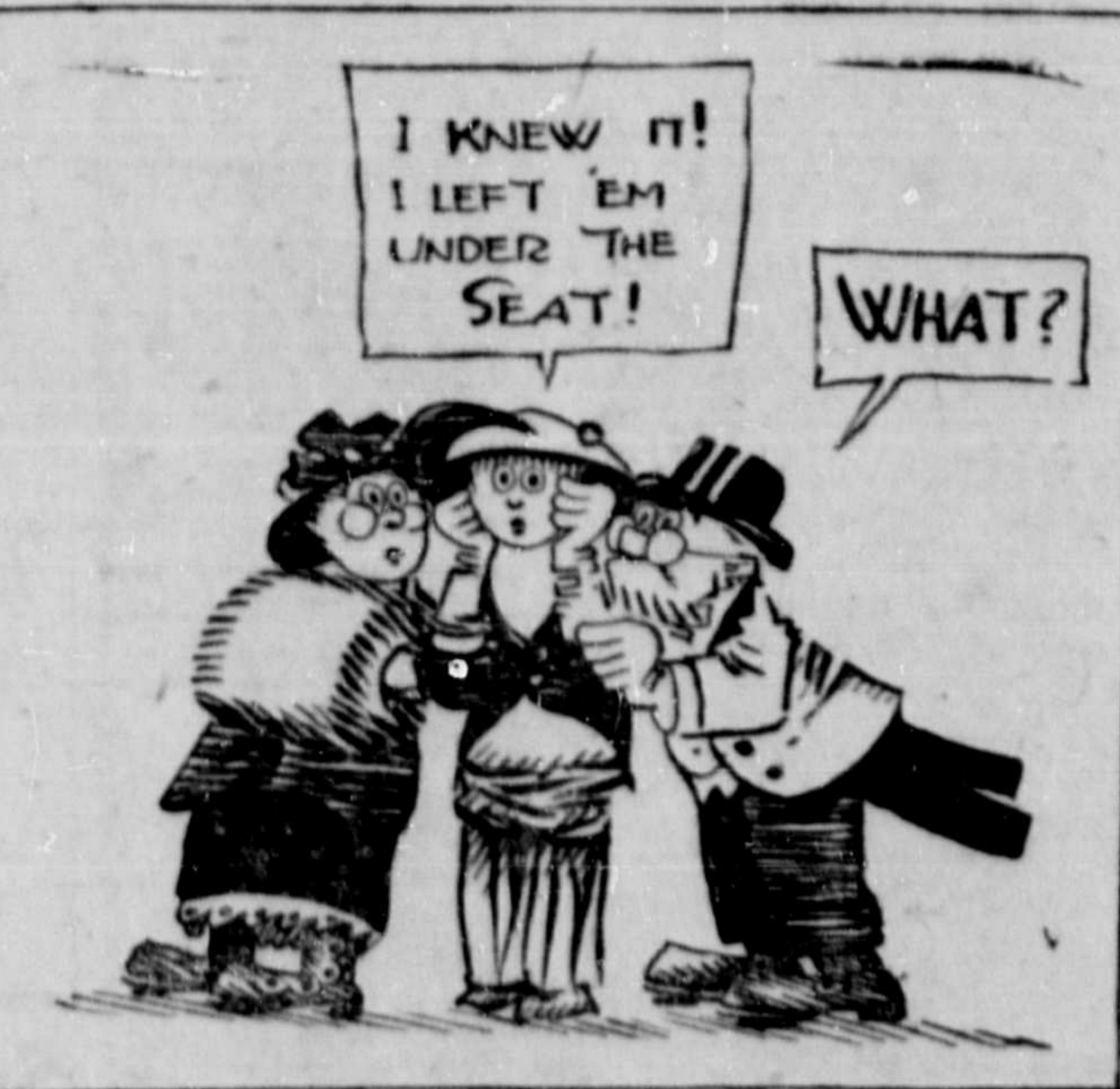

BREAD DEAR IN ITALY TODAY

Workmen Eying Luxuries, but Refuse to Pay Price of Loaf

ROME, Jan. 10.—The Italian government is facing an almost unsolvable problem in the question of the cost of the nation's bread. During and since the war the price of bread was kept down artificially, the government paying \$1,000,000,000 and even lately \$1,250,000,000 yearly as the difference of the actual cost of the flour and the price paid by the consumer.

The price of a kilo (2 1/2 pounds) of ordinary bread used to be equivalent to nine cents, or of a finer quality 11 or 12 cents; now the price of the same quantity of inferior bread is 21 cents a kilo, and the Italian working classes utterly refuse to pay the balance which would increase the cost to them to 40 cents or even half a dollar a kilo.

Italian workmen are now paid wages which compare favorably with the salaries doled out to officers in the army or heads of government departments and do not hesitate to pay enormous sums for wine, tobacco and luxuries for their table. A mason, blacksmith or calmetmaker used to consider himself well paid with less than a dollar a day. Now they earn \$6.50, \$7.00 and \$8.00 a day and look forward to having more in the future.

PRINCIPAL IN SHOOTING HAS REACHED CITY

Robert Holmes, Accused of Manslaughter, Will Await Trial at Assizes.

Robert H. Holmes, the principal in the Thurston Harbor shooting case, arrived this morning on the Prince John from Queen Charlotte City in custody of Special Constable W. Fairbairn and is now in the city jail where he will await trial on a charge of manslaughter at the next assizes. Holmes was committed by J. L. Barge, J. P., at Queen Charlotte City. Mrs. Holmes, the wife, also arrived in the city this morning.

According to the evidence at the inquest and the preliminary hearing the shooting occurred as a direct result of improper attentions that Joseph Booth, the dead man, is alleged to have been forcing upon Mrs. Holmes for the past two months. Booth, it is stated, had attempted to turn Mrs. Holmes from her husband and at one time had attempted suicide, going so far as to put a revolver to his head and snap the trigger, the gun failing to fire.

The attentions ceased for about a month but again Booth broke out and for some time had been carrying firearms in a threatening manner. Mrs. Holmes became so nervous she could no longer keep Booth's actions from her husband and had told him all. The next day after being told, Holmes shot Booth, two of the wounds being mortal, one through the head and the other through the lungs. He expired immediately.

Holmes has made a written statement as follows: "I killed Booth in protection of my home." The accused is a young man of frank and clean-cut features. Apparently every sympathy is being extended to him and all who have come in contact with him state that he was a hardworking and honest man and had ample provocation for the desperate deed.

JOHN HAD VERY STORMY VOYAGE

Topped for an Hour in Sixty Mile Hurricane between Milbank and Ikada

Crossing from Milbank Sound to Ikada northbound from Vancouver, the Prince John, which arrived here at 8 o'clock this morning, experienced the roughest trip that the sturdy little steamer has been through in her ten years of service in northern waters. It took twenty-four hours to make the passage which usually takes eight and a sixty-mile gale was raging. In course of the passage her steam steering gear broke down through the chain snapping and the emergency line to be reverted to. Repairs had just been made to the regular gear to put it in commission again when the emergency apparatus itself went. The ship was stopped for an hour through these causes. Besides these mishaps, the heavy seas also broke into her aft storerooms and flooded them.

The crew of the John seem very glad that it was she that they were aboard. They say that many boats would never have lived through such a storm and are highly pleased with the action of their vessel. It was possibly in such a storm as this that the ill-fated Galiano went down off Cape St. James two years ago.

The Prince John brought a large number of passengers from southern Queen Charlotte Island points, including Robert Holmes, the principal in the Thurston Harbor killing case, Mrs. Holmes and Special Constable W. Fairbairn. She returned south at 2 o'clock this afternoon bound direct for Vancouver via Swanson Bay and Ocean Falls.

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Watson, of Red Deer, Alberta, arrived in the city last evening and are registered at the Hotel Prince Rupert.


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
