War Veterans Will Have Beer Again

THOUSANDS OF SETTLERS FOR BULKLEY AND NECHACO VALLEYS TO COME

Big Colonization Scheme for Lands in Central Interior of B.C. Is About to be Started

VICTORIA, June 23.—Hand-picked settlers in large numbers will be brought to British Columbia to fill up the vacant lands in the northern and central parts of the province, especially in the fertile Skeena, Bulkley and Nechako valleys, according to plans that have just been completed by the owners of large areas, it was stated here today. Most of the lands to be offered for such settlement are owned by British capitalists.

Some of the choicest lands in the country will be offered the sellers. They will be given the choice of locating in the Bulkley or Nechako valleys or in the Prince George or Lillooet districts.

It is understood that the recent visit of Hon. E. D. Barrow to the districts outlined in this colonization scheme and the announcement of assistance to be given the sellers in these districts by the provincial government following his return to Victoria has had something to do with the present announcement although the principals have had such a course under consideration for some time past.

FEDERATION IN DUBY TALKS TO FAVOR PEOPLE ROTARY CLUB

Was in Optimistic Mood Regarding Business in North.

Does Not Apply This to All Corporate Industries, However.

DENVER, July 23.—The American Federation of Labor in convention here yesterday reaffirmed its stand for government operation of the railroads.

The executive council has been instructed to prepare recommendations for legislation designed to give the workers, through government regulation, equal rights and privileges with capital in organized enterprises.

The convention declined to go on record as favoring government control and democratic operation of all corporate industries.

PREDICTS KAYO FOR DEMPSEY IN SIX ROUNDS

That is Opinion of Bantam-weight Champion of France Who Arrived in New York.

NEW YORK, June 23.—That Georges Carpenter has more than an even chance of carrying away the world's heavyweight title is the opinion of the vanguard of European sporting writers who arrived here yesterday.

Charles Ledoux, bantamweight boxing champion of France, predicted that Carpenter would knock Dempsey out in six rounds. He has seen both fighters in action.

KING GEORGE WILL PRESENT POLO CUP

Americans Will Be Given Valued Trophy On Saturday, It Is Expected.

BANK OF ENGLAND LOWERS ITS RATE

LONDON, June 23.—The International polo trophy, which was won by the Americans yesterday, will be presented to the team by King George. The ceremony of presentation will likely take place on Saturday.

CITY TO GET MORE MONEY FOR HOUSING

City Clerk Woods Receives Notification This Morning That a Further Grant of \$25,000 Made.

City Clerk Ernest A. Woods this morning received a telegram from J. W. Clarke, the superintendent of the B.C. Soldiers' Settlement Board, announcing that a further advance of \$25,000 was to be made to this city under the Better Housing Scheme. The wire asked for acceptance of the advance which was immediately made by the clerk in a return wire.

There are now in the hands of Mr. Woods between forty and fifty applications for loans but the work of allotment of the fund will not commence until the money has been received from the Dominion government. Up to the present time no advances have yet been received as to when this will be forthcoming. The \$25,000 now granted to the city will cover only ten loans so there will be a good deal of work required in the allotting of it to the persons who are most entitled to it.

SWANSON BAY WOMAN DIED AT HOSPITAL

Mrs. Walter Wilson Passed Away This Morning.

The death occurred this morning at the General Hospital of Mrs. Walter Wilson, of Swanson Bay. The deceased had been a patient in the hospital since June 15 and had been in a precarious condition. She is survived by a husband who is employed at Swanson Bay. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of Hayner Bros.

DUBLIN, June 23.—Three magistrates have been kidnapped in this district and their whereabouts are unknown.

First Fine for Drunkenness Under Liquor Control Act Imposed in Local Courts

James McGinn was fined \$50 with the option of sixty days' imprisonment for drunkenness in public under the new Liquor Control Act in the police court this morning. The penalty was also accompanied with the demand that the accused give the name of the person supplying the liquor, the description of the liquor and the place where it had been procured. Failing to do this there is a maximum of an additional three months' imprisonment. McGinn, however, disclosed where he had obtained the liquor, naming the West End rooming house. He was later taken down to the premises to identify the man, a Chinaman, who had supplied him.

This is the first conviction in this city under the new act. Fifty dollars is now the minimum fine for drunkenness in public places instead of the customary \$10 penalty which in the past has been imposed.

RECENT RAINS PUT OUT FIRES

Losses for the Week in the Province are Reported to Have Been Lighter.

VICTORIA, June 23.—Fire losses in the province this week are reported to have been lighter. On account of recent rains in almost all sections of British Columbia the fires have all been extinguished. Up to date there have been 192 fires.

VICTORIA, June 23.—Masons from all parts of the province, numbering about two hundred, attended the opening of the fifteenth annual Grand Lodge convention of the British Columbia A. F. & A. M. here yesterday.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS AND WHITE SLAVERY

Paris Society Sends Recommendations for International Consideration.

VICTORIA, June 23.—The seventh International Congress of the Amis de la Jeune Fille has unanimously voted the following resolutions, which will be forwarded to the Secretariat of the League of Nations:

White slave traffic should be considered a crime.

All preparatory acts and attempts to carry out this traffic should be punished in the same way as the crime itself.

The age of consent should be made uniform in every State, and should be fixed at not less than 21 years.

White slave traffic within the country should be punishable in the same way as international traffic.

The penalties for crimes connected with the white slave traffic should be the heaviest possible.

Soldiers' Clubs Are Not to Be Prosecuted Selling Beer Members

VICTORIA, June 23.—It was stated at the Liquor Board offices yesterday that no action was to be taken against the soldiers' clubs in British Columbia which were selling beer to their members.

The raid and prosecution of the Great War Veterans' club at Fernie was not authorized by the board but it was merely a coup on the part of the local police at Fernie, it was stated.

Beer selling is likely to start here on Friday, the first organization to make preparations to that end being the Army and Navy Veterans' Association.

Business Is Good.

VICTORIA, June 23.—The provincial liquor business under the Liquor Control Board is now averaging \$10,000 daily and it is expected that an average of \$25,000 will be reached shortly. In view of amendments that will likely be made at an early date it has been decided to take no action in connection with the selling of beer to members by soldiers' clubs.

VICTORIA, June 23.—All ex-service men's clubs of British Columbia, whether or not in possession of Dominion charters, are at once to reopen if they are not already doing business in the sale of beer to bona fide members. This announcement was made here at a meeting of the United Soldiers' Council representing practically every veterans' organization in the province. This action was agreed upon, it is intimated, following a conference between the Attorney General and a delegation from the council.

LOCAL CLUB IS LIKELY RESUME SELLING BEER

Decided Last Night to Conform to Regulations—Wire to Victoria.

The regular monthly meeting of the local G. W. V. A. took place last night at the club rooms. There was a large attendance of members.

The chief business of the meeting was the discussion of the matter of selling beer to members in the canteen. It was finally decided to abide by the recommendation of the executive to refrain from breaking the law as constituted and not sell, awaiting further action on the part of the provincial authorities in the matter. The feeling on the subject was unanimous.

A few hours after they went on record in this decision, word was received in the city that the government had decided to drop any prosecutions pending in regard to the selling of beer to members of soldiers' clubs. This morning Secretary J. M. Campbell sent a wire to Victoria to confirm this. It is likely the local club will also resume the sale of beer to members.

GREEKS FAVOR MEDIATION OF GREAT POWERS

Understood Desire to Avert Warfare in Asia Minor.

ATHENS, June 23.—Present indications point to an acceptance by Greece of the offer of Great Britain France and Italy to mediate between the Greeks and the Turkish Nationalists in an effort to forestall warfare in Asia Minor.

SEATTLE, June 23.—The Pacific Coast seamen's conference has been abandoned because the Seattle local union refused to reverse its decision and support the agreement which was arranged between the United States Shipping Board and the Eastern representatives of the striking seamen. The locals in other coast cities desired to reject that agreement. The question is now deadlocked.

**NEW TARIFF LAW
MAKES PRICES IN
STATES MUCH HIGHER**

NEW YORK, June 23.—(By Canadian Press).—Effects of the emergency tariff law are already being felt by United States consumers. Food experts trace the recent advance of pork and beef prices to the new rates imposed on meats coming across the Canadian border.

The Emergency Tariff Law has been in effect but a short time and while live steers and hogs are lower there is an advance of fully 2 cents in the wholesale price per pound of dressed Western steers and pork loins.

Under the new tariff smoked meats and provisions arriving here from Canada are subject to excessive import duty. It is expected that some of this may be refunded to dealers later. In the meantime the consumer will have to pay and will not receive any later rebate.
