 would be the next premier of
 Canada.

Railway Policy.
 The speaker mentioned the way
 in which the Canadian Northern
 had been sloughed off on to the
 Government and the Grand Trunk
 taken over. Walter Scott had pre-
 dicted that a condition like the
 present would follow and that an
 effort would be made to hand the
 railway over to some interests
 who were anxious to get it. This
 seemed to be the present move.
 The railway was opening mag-
 nificent offices at San Francisco,
 Los Angeles and in other Ameri-
 can cities but here at Prince Ru-
 pert we could not get even a sta-
 tion as big as a packing case. The
 expenditures in the States were
 useless and the money might bet-
 ter be expended in fishery. The
 only advantage in the present
 policy was that it was a magnifi-
 cent opportunity to furnish jobs.
 It was no wonder the railway was
 broke today.

Mr. Stork referred to the work-
 ings of the Government press bu-
 reau at Ottawa. The present
 leader had been chosen in a dem-
 ocratic way and he was worthy of
 their support.

President Williams.
 W. E. Williams said that in
 Prince Rupert of all places they
 felt the heel of the present Ottawa
 Government. No one could feel
 more deeply than we the fatal
 railway policy, especially in con-
 nection with our fish business.
 Every man was aware of the
 troubles and trials in efforts to
 secure a business which
 would be remunerative to the rail-
 way. They had been working on
 it for years, but there was not a
 sign of a car yet. If we were not
 good law-abiding Canadians we
 should not stand for it. It was
 because we were law-abiding we
 suffered but tried to get redress.
 Over one thousand cars of fish
 had been driven from the coast
 last year and 650 of these would

probably have come here.
 Short speeches were made by
 several others and the meeting
 then adjourned.

**Annual Meeting Held Last Even-
 ing—W. O. Fulton Re-
 signs Secretaryship**

The annual meeting of the
 Wanderers' Club was held last
 night when officers were elected and
 general business for the
 year transacted. The club was
 shown by financial reports to be
 on a very stable basis at the
 present time due to the cap-
 able management of the out-
 going board of directors. The
 resignation of W. O. Fulton,
 who has been secretary for
 some years, was received with
 regret and a vote of thanks was
 accorded him for his faithful
 service.

**GERMAN WHO PLOTS
 TO BRING MONARCHY**

**Hugo Stinnes, Owner of Chain of
 Newspapers Pulls Strings**

LONDON, Mar. 30.—Hugo
 Stinnes, generalissimo of German
 industry, recently accused of
 plotting a strike of several hun-
 dred thousand workers in the
 Ruhr district to make more diffi-
 cult the Allied occupation of
 Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhr-
 ort., is referred to by the Berlin
 correspondent of the Times as
 "an earnest and dangerous
 patriot."

Stinnes, a multi-millionaire
 member of the Reichstag, has put
 through some of the greatest
 financial deals of his career since
 the armistice. He has been called
 "a relentlessly efficient calculat-
 ing machine." It has been said
 that he would sacrifice every mark
 of his enormous fortune to bring
 back the monarchy.

Mine-owner and coal merchant,
 ship-owner, landed proprietor,
 head of a great chain of news-
 papers, proprietor of the finest
 hotel in Berlin, trader in oils,
 paper, hides, jute, peat and man-
 ufactured wares of many kinds,
 Stinnes, the Times correspondent
 says, "is today the wealthiest,
 most influential, best known, and
 at the same time the least well-
 known man in Germany."

Publicity and notoriety are
 alien to him, it is stated, and it
 is stated, he prefers to remain be-
 hind the curtains in the Reich-
 stag, permitting his henchmen
 and lieutenants to do the talking
 while he pulls the strings.

**SIMPLON TUNNEL TO
 BE COMPLETED BY
 THE END OF JULY**

GENEVA, Mar. 30.—The second
 Simplon tunnel under the Alps
 between Switzerland and Italy will
 be completed by the end of July,
 engineers say. Railroad traffic
 will be diverted through it im-
 mediately and repairs made in the
 first tunnel, opened 30 years ago.
 Both will be used sometime in
 1922.

The first tunnel 4 1/4 miles
 long, cost £2,940,000. The new
 bore will cost only about one-
 third that amount. Construction
 was begun before the war, but
 work was abandoned because the
 workmen were nearly all mobil-
 ized. Half-way through, sub-
 terranean boiling springs were
 uncovered and many workmen
 were killed.

Perry, chairman of the utilities board, was laid over indefinitely, the present time being deemed not opportune for the reductions with the ratepayers already paying taxes to capacity and the sale of bonds not yet complete.

In introducing the bylaw, Ald. Perry stated that he had expected there would be opposition to it on the ground that the reductions would not be timely and that the new system of measurement would be cumbersome. He felt, however, that these could be explained away in view of the fact that there was a general demand for lower rates.

Ald. Dybhavn, who led in the opposition to the bylaw, stated that the present time was not opportune for the reduction, the year ahead would be a difficult one and the taxation was up to the limit. It was no time to lessen the revenues of the city and before the year was out the city might be called upon to use all the funds that the utilities committee could produce.

Good Profits.
Supt. Duncan explained that the Department had been making good profits and last year there had been a surplus of \$33,000 in the light department. Even with the proposed reductions there would be a surplus of \$16,000 this year.

Mayor Rochester was inclined to fall in with the views of Ald. Dybhavn, feeling that there was a general tendency in all municipalities to husband wealth. While it was a good policy to reduce rates where possible it was not wise to run too close to the wind.

Is Laid Over.
Some discussion as to the allotment of the earnings of the utilities Department then followed, Ald. Perry feeling that at least some portion of them should be used in extensions and improvements to the system making for increased efficiency. Ald. Dybhavn felt that the utilities department was a part of the city as a whole and should not be treated separately but the revenue should be used where necessary always allowing sufficient to keep the system in good running order, however. It was finally decided, on suggestion of Ald. Dybhavn and motion of Ald. Perry, that the bylaw be laid over indefinitely.

The bylaw for the consolidation of bond issues of the city was read again by the city council last night. It has passed through the hands of the municipal inspector who states that he is prepared to recommend it to the attorney-general for approval.

SHIP WHEAT TO LONDON

Buenos Aires Carries Wheat to England from This Coast

LONDON, Mar. 30.—The arrival here of the steamer Buenos Aires with a cargo of Canadian wheat shipped by way of the British Columbia coast and the Panama Canal has attracted widespread attention here. She brought 3,200 tons of wheat.

F. C. Wade, agent general for British Columbia, has drawn special attention to the shipment which he says is destined to become historic. The Pacific coast, he says, is destined to become the front door of Canada, and shipments of wheat by that route will become steadily more frequent.

DECOLLETTE OUTLAWED IN ARGENTINE REPUBLIC

BUENOS AIRES, Mar. 30.—Bare arms and low-necked dresses have been outlawed by the ecclesiastical governor of Argentina. A notice has been posted in the doorways of all the Catholic churches reading:

"After Sunday, March 27, no priest for any reason will be permitted to administer holy communion to any married woman, girl or child who approaches the altar without having completely covered the breast, shoulder and arms with material that is not transparent."

HEART OF CHICKEN THAT NEVER LIVED CONTINUES TO BEAT

NEW YORK, Mar. 30.—Dr. Alexis Carrel, who is to sail for France soon, will leave at the Rockefeller Institute laboratories one of the surgical marvels of the age. It is the heart of a chicken that never lived, although its heart, which was removed from the embryo in 1912, still beats and feeds its tissues in a special container. The organ has been nourished artificially for eight years.

Long before the war Dr. Carrel startled scientists with the announcement that he had kept portions of animals' hearts alive for months immersed in a special antiseptic solution, and that these portions, after a comparatively short time, surrounded themselves with living cells and grew to more than sixty times their original size.

Dr. Carrel was awarded the Nobel prize in 1912 in recognition of his surgical achievements, notably the transplantation of organs and the suture of blood vessels.

TORONTO PARSON IN FAVOR OF DANCING

Says It Always Has Been and Always Will Be, but should be Controlled

OTTAWA, Mar. 30.—In the last of a series of sermons at the First Congregational Church here, Rev. Dr. Byron Stauffer of Toronto expressed himself in favor of dancing but expressed the opinion that it should be controlled.

In a recent controversy in Toronto over the matter of dancing he had shocked some religious people by declaring that dancing always had been and always would be. But modern dancing needed controlling in three ways. There must not be too much time devoted to it, there must be no improper sexual suggestions and it must be conducted in proper associations. The church could not suppress the life of young people; it must regulate the young people's amusements. So long as the three conditions he had laid down were fulfilled he would give dancing his support.

GERMAN EMIGRANTS RUSH TO ARGENTINA

Four Hundred on First Vessel Flying German Flag to Visit Country

BUENOS AIRES, Mar. 30.—Four hundred German immigrants came to Argentina a few days ago to seek their fortunes anew on board the first passenger vessel flying the German flag which entered this port since the beginning of the war. The majority of them were members of the former German middle-class and about 80 were officers of the German army, but few are understood to have possessed any capital with which to start life afresh. Most of them were counting upon prompt employment to provide them with livelihood. The same vessel landed about 300 German immigrants in Brazil and a smaller number in Uruguay. It is understood that this was the first of several steamers which are to bring contingents of German immigrants to these shores.
