# Colonel Peck's Record In Parliament ANSARD SHOWS HE VOTED CONSISTENTLY AS CONSERVATIVE

Peck's Independence  
Shown during Session  
by Voting Conservative

In view of the speeches being made by Colonel Peck and the indications that he is asking for return to Parliament on his side, some of the supporters of Fred Stork have been searching through that record and have handed in a memorandum which is copied herewith:

Colonel Peck says that he is an independent, but when one over his record in recent years one can probably arrive at a more accurate estimate of the brand of independent which he is.

Going back over the several divisions since the earliest days of the war, we do not think that the Colonel will deny that every occasion he lined up with the Conservatives, with the exception of the one in 1911 when he supported the late Duncan Ross. Usually he explained that as a personal friend of the late Richard McBride and his son, he supported him as candidate, despite his leanings toward Liberalism.

In the face of the fact that Stork, in 1917, in the name of English, adopted as a slogan, conscription, and then hit of wealth, the idea of conscription, one would have expected to have been acceptable to him, we find him a candidate for the Conservative party in riding of Skeena. ## WAR STOCKS DISPOSED OF

Amount Sold Since Armistice  
Realizes £675,000,000 and  
Little Left.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Government is rapidly disposing of its surplus war stocks. Surplus stores worth £675,000,000 have been disposed of since the armistice and the liquidation is now practically completed on the European continent and it is hoped shortly to close down in Canada.

## WAS RIOTING AT BOMBAY

Disturbances in the Native Quarter While Prince of Wales Arriving.

BOMBAY, Nov. 17.—Coincident with the procession escorting the Prince of Wales through the city of Bombay today serious disturbances occurred in the native quarter, attributed by the authorities to agitation by the followers of Mahatma Gandhi, "non-cooperationist" leader, resulting in a number of casualties.

The procession itself was not marred by any untoward incident.

Marshal Ferdinand Foch, Commander-in-Chief of the allied armies during the world war, was greeted by more than 100,000 cheering people when he landed at the Battery in New York City. He was met by General Pershing, who welcomed him to America on behalf of the army, and Governor Miller of New York, as well as several other noted dignitaries. He will attend the American Legion convention.

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—Making his escape from Wilkerson Road medical hospital early yesterday morning, John Lynn, alias Sylvester, alias Sylvester Lynn, murderer, serving a life term and Saylor Malone, a long-term man with a record of crime, made a getaway after overpowering John Walter, nightwatchman. They had been transferred from New Westminster penitentiary some time ago.

## FILIPINOS DROWNED.

MANILA, Nov. 17.—Fifty-eight Filipinos were drowned when the Santa Luisa foundered off Manila Bay.

## British Policy In Ireland Repudiated Minister Resigns

BELFAST, Nov. 17.—Ten thousand loyalists in three meetings yesterday protested against the treatment of Ulster by the British cabinet. They greeted Lloyd George's name with groans and passed a resolution of confidence in Sir James Craig for his efforts to protect Ulster's interests. On the eve of the Liverpool conference with Ulster, the meetings repudiated the idea of Ulster being placed under an all-Irish parliament.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Ulster's reply to the British Government's communication on the question of Irish settlement was delivered at Downing Street this afternoon. It indicates that Ulster stands firm in the attitude she has taken and will not submit to anything considered a violation of her rights.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Thomas Walters Brown, Attorney-General for Ireland, has resigned, presumably on account of the disagreement over the Government's Irish policy.

## Urge right to Trade with Prince Rupert Rather than Being Forced to Seattle

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—John Rustgard, Attorney-General for Alaska, is here opposing the passing of the Jones Bill, which he claims is framed in the interest of Seattle and contrary to the interest of Alaska. To keep foreign bottoms out of Alaska, he says, would be to keep out the Canadian Pacific steamers. He is anxious for the closest possible relations with Prince Rupert, which he regards as the natural shipping port for Alaska. Discussing those relations he says:

"When Prince Rupert established its fresh fish market fish doubled in value."

"Whenever shipments through that port are discontinued temporarily, the price of fish drops 50 per cent. Yet the Alaska bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce has practically closed us out of Prince Rupert. It is high time some one started to make a noise about the present situation."

## Shortest Route.

Pulp mills should be operated at a good profit in Alaska, but all machinery has to be shipped from New England and the freight is prohibitive when routed through Seattle. By far the shortest, quickest and cheapest route is over the Grand Trunk Pacific to Prince Rupert. The product of the mills cannot be shipped to a market at a profit unless the Canadian lines are opened to us for export. Legislation, as it now exists, is safe aboard H.M.S. Renown.

## NEGOTIATIONS GETTING TO MORE DIRECT POINT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Premier reconnaisance gave way to more direct negotiations today in the endeavors of the Armament Conference to find a solution for the problems of the Far East. Sitting as a special committee on the Far Eastern situation, the heads of nine delegations have gone into conference to outline respective policies by which each will be guided. They will work out a plan of procedure which will give all the policies a fair show. Admiral Baron Kato, on behalf of the Japanese delegation, asked for and received a delay of several days to allow for examination of the Far Eastern policies submitted yesterday by China.

## REDUCTION OF FREIGHT RATES

Railway Commissioners Will Probably Take Matter Up at Early Date.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—It is likely that the question of reduction of freight rates on the Canadian railways will shortly be taken under consideration by the Board of Railway Commissioners.

An immediate reduction of ten percent on farm produce has been ordered by the heads of the United States railways.

GIBRALTAR, Nov. 17.—The British cruiser Cardiff with ex-Emperor Charles and ex-Empress Zita of Hungary aboard, left today for the island of Madeira, to which the former royal couple have been exiled by the Allies. They are expected to arrive at their destination Sunday.

## ENQUIRY OPENS

Wreck Commissioner McPherson to Hear Evidence in Case of Importer.

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—A court of enquiry into the mishap to the Canadian importer, as a result of which she had to return to port after rolling helpless in the open seas and being given up for lost, will open next week. The enquiry will be held by Wreck Commissioner J. D. McPherson and two nautical assessors, one of whom will be an engineer.

F. G. Brynolson of the North-West Spruce Co. of this city, who returned from the south yesterday after taking part in the salvaging of the Canadian Exporter, says the lumber market is improving. Enquiries are much more frequent for Australian deals and Atlantic rough spruce for delivery at the Atlantic seaboard. Tidewater mills are practically all selling for export and prices are stiffening. Most of the mills in the south are shipping to Japan and China, with frequent shipments to Australia and an occasional cargo to England.

Prairie and other interior business continues very quiet, but it promises to be a lot better in the spring. The low price of wheat seems to be responsible for the lack of demand, the farmers holding their wheat in the hope of stiffening.

There is prospect of improvement in the northern tidewater spruce business. The Sitka spruce of the Queen Charlottes is far superior to that being shipped from Grays Harbor and Willapa Harbor at the present time.

After losing their boat and everything they had and almost losing their lives living on raw clams for a week and having generally a hard time, two fishermen, Fred Miller and Jack Williams, arrived home yesterday evening, having been away from Prince Rupert since September 30 and yet scarcely out of sight of Kain Mountain. The boat on which they sailed, the Debora, is broken up and the belongings of the fishermen are gone.

Miller and Williams left here on Sunday, September 30, for the half-hut banks in the Debora, a 30 foot boat owned by J. Ryan. The weather was bad and they did not get very far by Tuesday.

Then they had to run for shelter. They struck a rock just this side of Anderson's harbor and immediately the boat began to fill. One of the men realized the situation at once and rushed into the cabin for a blanket, gun and can of matches.

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After a cold and weary night the two fishermen rowed Squadree harbor, thinking I find a fishingboat in the neighborhood but nothing was in sight. For seven days they waited, eating nothing but raw clam and not daring to trust themselves to the sea to return in their skiff owing to the weather.

On Wednesday of last week the weather was better, it was day for Canadian Britishian her trial trips. Miller and Williams could see her, and advised themselves aboard, taking a shift in her diningroom raty for half an hour. However no one could see them as there was nothing for it but to row their hardest. It took them nine hours of hard rowing each Lucy Island. They were in an exhausted condition but they arrived but they went to the lighthouse where Mr. and Mrs. Lock looked after them and gave them the best of treatment.

In her paper, Mrs. Hall explained the aims of the Parent-Teachers' Association and the great success which had attended the organization of such societies in other cities. ## Getting Out Railway Ties from Camps along Railway

Approximately two hundred and fifty men are being employed by the Hansen Tie and Timber Company making ties and other timber requirements for the Canadian National Railway Company between Prince Rupert and Endako this winter. This company, of which Olof Hansen of Prince Rupert is the head, is the main company participating in the railway business this year, and it has contracts for 250,000 ties, about half the quantity cut last year. The 250 men engaged in the work comprise settlers who cut the ties on their own lands and skilled timbers who are engaged in the camps of the company. Of the 250,000 ties, 150,000 are being put out by the settlers and the balance, 100,000, in camps.

The company has three tie camps, one at Quick and another at Walcott Station, both of which points are located about 250 miles east of Prince Rupert. The third camp, and the largest, is located near Decker Lake, 311 miles from Prince Rupert. About 50,000 are being cut at Decker Lake, and the remaining 50,000 between the two camps at Quick and Walcott which, being close together, come under the same camp management.

The actual tie cutting for the present contracts is now about finished and as soon as the frost comes and the snow and grounds become solid the work of hauling them out on sleighs to the railroad will commence. The cold weather has been unusually late in coming this fall and the ground is still soft and muddy, little snow having fallen yet.

### Forty Tie Makers.

In the Decker Lake camp forty tie makers have been employed and between the two camps of Quick and Walcott there have been thirty-five. With the finishing of the requirements these men will be reprieved and the teamsters and the helpers for the hauling work will take their places. Five teams will be used at Decker Lake and five between Quick and Walcott, about forty men, evenly distributed, being needed to carry on the hauling. As soon as this work is done the camps will be closed. This will likely be about March or April.

The Walcott tie camp is located right on the railroad track about three miles west of the station. The Quick camp is three miles west of the station of that name and is about one mile south in the bush from the track. The Decker camp is in an office that has been built near the station. J. Erickson is foreman of the Quick and Walcott camps and P. M. Olsen is timekeeper. These men comprise the management staff of the Hansen Tie and Timber Co., Buildings and Roads.

The camps resemble the ordinary construction camps in appearance and management. They comprise the usual group of log houses including bunkhouses, office, cook-house, stables, etc. Such a camp is usually, and is in these cases, established in the centre of the timber which is to be cut. Before the workers come, the timber is cruised and platted out about a mile in all directions from the camp. Roads branching from the main road are provided for so that they will run directly in the centre of the lengthwise tracts. These tracts are about 100 feet wide so that it is not necessary to bring ties out at any place a greater distance than 50 or 60 feet to one of these roads.

In the past tie cutting and hauling has been done at the same time. This year, however, the cold weather is so late in coming and the roads have been impassable with mud so that there has been no hauling either by wagon or sleighs yet. This makes work lighter for the foremen who have the duties of looking after both tie cutting and hauling. The timekeepers, who are also employed in the camps in addition to keeping the time, run the commissaries and check the ties out.

### Settlers Get Work.

The settlers, who are given first chance on this work, cut ties on their lands and deliver them to the railroad track. About 40 are engaged in the work between Smithers and Endako this winter and 16 or 17 between Pacific and Smithers. The usual cut of each settler is 2,000 ties but some with help cut more. They are paid 50c for first class, 40c for second and 20c for third class or culs. The tie makers in the camps, who are employed on the piece work basis, receive 47c per tie, the delivery of which, of course, the company is responsible for. These men pay 81 per day for board and sleeping quarters in the camps.

Besides the tie cutting contracts, the Hansen company is also supplying the railway company and others this winter with poles and piling. There is one pole camp located at Carnaby, 180 miles from Prince Rupert. This camp is not directly conducted by the Hansen company but is run by a subcontractor, Frank Griffin being one of the principals.

### Tie Officials.

The head office of the Hansen Tie and Timber Co. is located at Smithers, where H. G. Olsen, the general manager of the office business, is located. Harry Orme the superintendent of the work east of Smithers, and Austin Goodenough, western superintendent, also make headquarters here although they spend the most of their time travelling backwards and forwards between the various scenes of operations. Gus Lindstrom is foreman of the Decker Lake camp and John Bergman, well known in Prince Rupert, is timekeeper. The latter is at present located in the camp in the woods but when hauling commences he will move

cost of living and reducing the costs of instruments of production required in the development of our natural resources the name of Peck stands in the Meighen column against the amendment and against the Liberal, Farmer and Independent vote of the House.

**Against Independents.**

On June 28, 1920 on four successive divisions on proposed amendments to the Elections Act emanating from Liberal and Independent benches the member for Skeena hesitated not a moment to stand squarely behind his leader Meighen. It is the only way to stand—squarely behind your leader when you have one and Peck certainly did so in the last four sessions. Was the Government always right? Do the people think so? Are the people of Canada dissatisfied? It is conceded from east to west of Canada that Meighen cannot possibly hope for more than a handful of members in the new House. Peck is listed in the press of Canada today as a Government candidate. Is Meighen satisfied with Peck?

If the records of Parliament mean anything, if political associations of the past mean anything, if political associations of the present mean anything, Meighen is making his fight in Skeena today through his candidate Col. Colson's Compromise.

But the Colonel says he had to do it—he couldn't vote against the Government because he wanted things for Skeena. Is that the brand of politics Meighen insists upon? Does it speak well for Meighen or for the member who stands for that kind of thing? Is it not time to clean up—is it not time to send a man to Ottawa who unequivocally and absolutely stands opposed to Meighen and his methods? Can we afford to do anything else?

## CONDITIONS IN RUSSIA TODAY

J. R. Knight, Red Cross Representative, Addressed Large Gathering Last Evening.

Three hundred people attended the meeting in the McIntyre Hall last night which was addressed by J. R. Knight, of Winnipeg, Canadian representative of the Red Cross Society of Soviet Russia. The subject was "Conditions in Russia" and the speaker gave a clear account of what he had seen during his recent four months' visit there. He traced the early development of the revolution and the relations to the present condition describing the way that the armies and children were fed. The Russians were bearing up under the terrible condition with fortitude but assistance was badly needed.

George Buderha was chairman. There was a collection from the audience of \$122.50 which brings the total of local relief money collected to date to \$1070.

Mr. Knight left last night on the Prince Rupert for Anyox accompanied by J. H. Burroughs secretary of the local campaign committee.

### FIRE IN DENTIST'S OFFICE OCCURRED TODAY AT NOON

A fire occurred at noon today in Dr. A. H. Bayne's dental parlor in the Heigberg Block. One room was rather badly damaged and resulted in a loss of about \$250. The blaze was caused by a defective fuse. Although it will be tomorrow evening before the place is straightened out again, Dr. Bayne's business is not interfered with and he is carrying on as usual. The fire department made a quick response to the alarm and soon had the blaze under control.

### OIL TANKER DUE HERE VERY SOON

J. A. Moffatt Coming Up Coast with 50,000 Barrels for Local Imperial Oil Tanks.

The Imperial Oil tanker J. A. Moffatt is coming up the coast from San Pedro to this port with 50,000 barrels of fuel oil for the local tanks. Last night she was passing Ocean Falls so it is expected here this afternoon or tonight or possibly tomorrow morning.

### FISH ARRIVALS

Five Schooners with 104,000 Pounds Are in Port Awaiting Sale.

Five halibut schooners with 181,000 pounds of fish are in port awaiting sale which is being held over until tomorrow. The boats are as follows: Seymour, 55,000 pounds; Beaver, 30,000 pounds; Tahoma, 21,000 pounds; Malamute, 14,000 pounds, and Rose Spit, 16,000 pounds. Applications must be made by May 1, 1922.

### PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

The scope of this Act is enlarged, making all persons joining and serving with the Army and Navy liable to be compelled to make contributions to a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the date of acquisition to three years from the date of death or separation from the service.

### EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT

Nothing held in fee simple, unpossessed, or existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. One-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

### GRANTING OF LANDS

Grants are to be made for the systematic development of the Yukon River and its tributaries.

Annual grants will be issued based on the area developed by the holder.
