Colonel Peck's Record In Parliament ANSARD SHOWS HE VOTED CONSISTENTLY AS CONSERVATIVE

Peck's Independence Shown during Session by Voting Conservative

In view of the speeches being made by Colonel Peck and the allegations that he is asking for return to Parliament on his own terms, some of the supporters of Fred Stork have been searching for that record and have handed in a memorandum which is set forth here with:

Colonel Peck says that he is an independent, but when one looks over his record in recent years one can probably arrive at a accurate estimate of the brand of independent which he is. Looking back over the several years since the earliest days of the war, we do not think that the Colonel will deny that on every occasion he lined up with the Conservative party. In the last thirteen years in the House of Commons, with the exception of the time in 1911 when he supported the late Duncan Ross, he can be explained that as a personal friend of the late Richard McBride and his associates support him as a candidate, despite his own leanings toward Liberalism. In the face of the fact that Stork, in 1917, in the House of Commons, adopted as a platform, conservatism, and that since that time the Colonel's independence had not yet become apparent, for on every recorded division his vote was cast in opposition to not only Liberal votes but to the votes of the cross-members in Parliament. WAR STOCKS DISPOSED OF

Amount Sold Since Armistice Realizes £675,000,000 and Little Left.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Government is rapidly disposing of its surplus war stocks. Surplus stores worth £675,000,000 have been disposed of since the armistice and the liquidation is now practically completed on the European continent and it is hoped shortly to close down in England.

WAS RIOTING AT BOMBAY

Disturbances in the Native Quarter While Prince of Wales Arriving.

BOMBAY, Nov. 17.—Coincident with the procession escorting the Prince of Wales through the city of Bombay today serious disturbances occurred in the native quarter, attributed by the authorities to agitation by the followers of Mahatma Gandhi "non-cooperationist" leader, resulting in a number of casualties. The procession itself was not marred by any untoward incident.

REAR-END COLLISION.
CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Twenty-five persons were injured, two probably fatally, this morning when five cars of elevated trains bound downtown were wrecked in a rear-end collision.

BORDEN, Ottawa, Ont.: 'Would like one thousand soldier votes at large for Manitoba, of which 200 for Selkirk, balance divided between Provencher, Macdonald and Springfield, or same proportion of division no matter what our allotment may be. 'ARTHUR MEIGHEN. 'Charge Union Government Committee."

MARSHAL FOCH GREETED BY THOUSANDS UPON ARRIVAL.



Marshal Ferdinand Foch, Commander-in-Chief of the allied armies during the world war, was greeted by more than 100,000 cheering people when he landed at the Battery in New York city. He was met by General Pershing, who welcomed him to America on behalf of the army, and Governor Miller of New York, as well as several other noted dignitaries. He will attend the American Legion convention.

UNIONISTS ARE IN FAVOR OF SETTLING THE IRISH TROUBLES

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 17.—By an overwhelming majority the Unionist party, in session here today, endorsed with certain reservations the negotiations now going on between the British Government and the Irish representatives.

MURDERER GETS OUT OF JAIL

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—Making his escape from Wilkerson Road medical hospital early yesterday morning, John Lynn, alias Sylvester, alias Sylvester Lynn, murderer, serving a life term and Saylor Malone a long term man with a record of crime, made a getaway after overpowering John Walter, nightwatchman. They had been transferred from New Westminster penitentiary some time ago.

FILIPINOS DROWNED.

MANILA, Nov. 17.—Fifty-eight Filipinos were drowned when the Santa Luisa foundered off Manila Bay.

British Policy In Ireland Repudiated Minister Resigns

BELFAST, Nov. 17.—Ten thousand loyalists in three meetings yesterday protested against the treatment of Ulster by the British cabinet. They greeted Lloyd George's name with groans and passed a resolution of confidence in Sir James Craig for his efforts to protect Ulster's interests. On the eve of the Liverpool conference with Ulster, the meetings repudiated the idea of Ulster being placed under an all-Irish parliament.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Ulster's reply to the British Government's communication on the question of Irish settlement was delivered at Downing Street this afternoon. It indicates that Ulster stands firm in the attitude she has taken and will not submit to anything considered a violation of her rights.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Thomas Walters Brown, Attorney-General for Ireland, has resigned, presumably on account of the disagreement over the Government's Irish policy.

Urges right to Trade with Prince Rupert Rather than Being Forced to Seattle

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—John Rustgard, Attorney-General for Alaska, is here opposing the passing of the Jones Bill, which he claims is framed in the interest of Seattle and contrary to the interest of Alaska. To keep foreign bottoms out of Alaska, he says, would be to keep out the Canadian Pacific steamers. He is anxious for the closest possible relations with Prince Rupert, which he regards as the natural shipping port for Alaska. Discussing those relations he says:

"When Prince Rupert established its fresh fish market fish doubled in value."

"Whenever shipments through that port are discontinued temporarily, the price of fish drops 50 per cent. Yet the Alaska bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce has practically closed us out of Prince Rupert. It is high time some one started to make a noise about the present situation."

Shortest Route.
"Pulp mills should be operated at a good profit in Alaska, but all machinery has to be shipped from New England and the freight is prohibitive when routed through Seattle. By far the shortest, quickest and cheapest route is over the Grand Trunk Pacific to Prince Rupert. The product of the mills cannot be shipped to a market at a profit unless the Canadian lines are opened to us for export. Legislation, as it now exists, is extremely un-American, un-patriotic and stupid."

Complaints of Port Charges.
Rustgard further stated that he had compiled port charges of nearly every port in the United States and that none of them compared with the high rates charged in Seattle. Such charges as storage, at least for the first fifteen days, switching and loading from ships to freight cars, are taken care of by the railroad company at Prince Rupert, but must be paid in addition to the freight at Seattle, with the result that the Alaska pulp mills have been forced to close down, he said.

PROBLEMS OF FAR EAST AT ARMS PARLEY

Japan Asks For and Gets Delay in Which to Study Chinese Proposals.

NEGOTIATIONS GETTING TO MORE DIRECT POINT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Preliminary reconnoitering gave way to more direct negotiations today in the endeavors of the Armament Conference to find a solution for the problems of the Far East. Sitting as a special committee on the Far Eastern situation, the heads of nine delegations have gone into conference to outline respective policies by which each will be guided. They will work out a plan of procedure which will give all the policies a fair show. Admiral Baron Kato, on behalf of the Japanese delegation, asked for and received a delay of several days to allow for examination of the Far Eastern policies submitted yesterday by China.

REDUCTION OF FREIGHT RATES

Railway Commissioners Will Probably Take Matter Up at Early Date.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—It is likely that the question of reduction of freight rates on the Canadian railways will shortly be taken under consideration by the Board of Railway Commissioners. An immediate reduction of ten percent on farm produce has been ordered by the heads of the United States railways.

EX-EMPEROR IS ON WAY TO MADEIRA

GIBRALTAR, Nov. 17.—The British cruiser Cardiff with ex-Emperor Charles and ex-Empress Zita of Hungary aboard, left today for the island of Madeira, to which the former royal couple have been exiled by the Allies. They are expected to arrive at their destination Sunday.

ENQUIRY OPENS

Wreck Commissioner McPherson to Hear Evidence in Case of Importer.

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—A court of enquiry into the mishap to the Canadian Importer, as a result of which she had to return to port after rolling helplessly in the open seas and being given up for lost, will open next week. The enquiry will be held by Wreck Commissioner J. D. McPherson and two nautical assessors, one of whom will be an engineer.

BRITISH SET SELVES RIGHT

to Soviet Strongly Worded Document Donyinn Falsity of Evidence.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The British Government has handed to the Soviet Government at Moscow a firmly worded note absolutely denying the allegations of the foreign Minister Tschitchek that the British evidence of the Bolshevik propaganda in the Far East and Afghanistan is based on forged documents, German or otherwise.

MEMORY OF MISSIONARY IS HONORED

Elders of Late Rev. William Duncan's Mission in Alaska Revisit Port Simpson.

PORT SIMPSON, Nov. 17.—A few days ago the elders of the Christian Church of Metlakatla, Alaska, revisited their former homes in Port Simpson where, in 1857, the late Rev. William Duncan first brought the light of salvation among the Tsimpsian people. These elders held their service on the same site as where Mr. Duncan held his first service. The ruins are still standing. During the service, tribute was paid to the memory of the great missionary who sacrificed everything in order to minister to the warlike and savage Indians, doing so, many times, at the peril of his own life. It was brought out at this service that his efforts had not been in vain. The results of his labors reflected in the law abiding, Christian and independent natives. Mr. Duncan taught them the simple faith in Christ and encouraged the people to develop industries among themselves in order to make them self-supporting and a credit to their adopted country. Last Sunday a service was conducted by these visiting elders in the Grace Methodist Church. At this service a bible was dedicated to the people of Port Simpson by the elders in memory of Mr. Duncan. During the service mention was made of the great missionary's life, of how he came among them in Port Simpson and later moved to Metlakatla, B. C., and started there a successful mission, and of how he made the people self-supporting by conducting their own industries.

Aid. Louis Francescini of Cumberland Relative of Chas. Balagno of This City.

Aid. Louis Francescini of Cumberland, an account of whose death through a hunting accident on Vancouver Island was given in The Daily News yesterday afternoon, was a cousin of Charles Balagno of this city. Reading the article yesterday afternoon, Mr. Balagno heard for the first time of the tragedy which had overtaken his relative. Mr. Francescini was shot through the heart and instantly killed when he was mistaken for a deer while hunting in the woods near Cumberland. He was an experienced hunter himself.

AMSBURY SAWMILL CLOSED FOR WINTER

Lakelse Lumber Co. Was Operating All Summer—George Dover, Manager.

The mill of the Lakelse Lumber Company at Ambury closed last week for the winter after having cut lumber all summer. George Dover of Terrace is the manager of this mill and J. R. Azar is the bookkeeper. It is owned by George Little of Terrace and associates.

ROYAL MILL AT PITMAN SPUR IS RUNNING AGAIN

Royal Mills, at Pitman Spur, owned by Olof Hansen and R. E. Allen, is operating again. Logging is going on, but the mill is not operating full blast yet. The late arrival of the snow and frost is delaying the hauling of the logs from the bush to the mill.

Church Difficulties.

After some years of success, difficulties arose between Mr. Duncan and the higher dignitaries of the Anglican church, resulting in the missionary severing his connection with the mission although continuing to teach among the Tsimpsians at his own expense and devoting his whole time and life to their welfare. The difference became so serious that it was deemed advisable to seek another village so an appeal was made to the United States Government for land in Alaska. The mission was received with open arms by the Government and the result was the establishing of the village of Metlakatla, Alaska. Here was started a salmon cannery, sawmill, church and industrial school in which different crafts were taught. The village was made a model one in every way and, through the untiring zeal of Mr. Duncan, was made one which would be a credit to any country. It was to perpetuate his memory in the field of his first labors that the Bible was presented to the Grace Methodist Church at Port Simpson. The elders are also visiting Metlakatla, B. C., and Kitkatla before returning to their homes in the north.

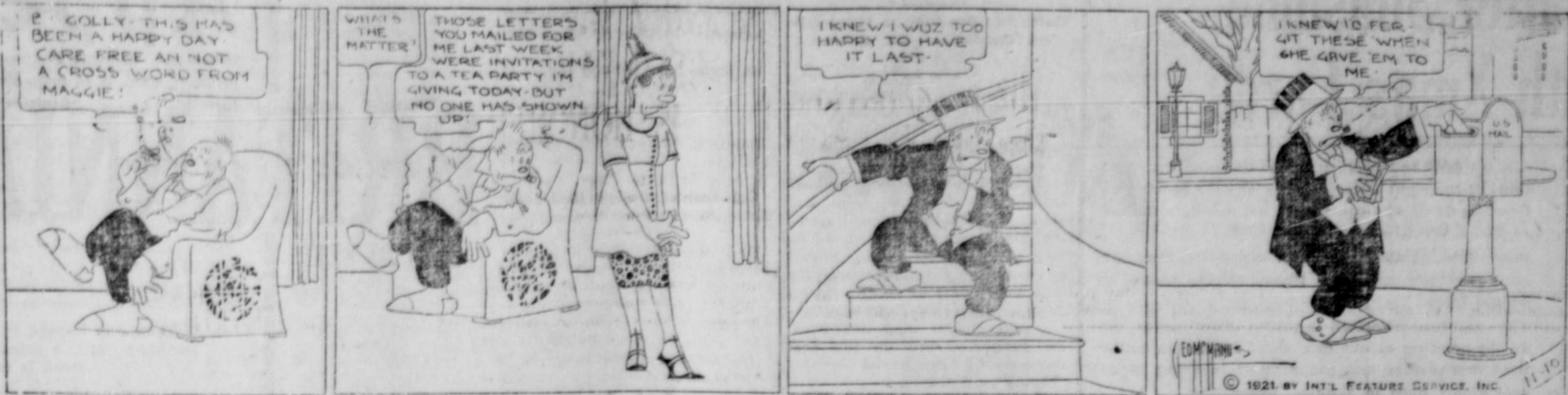

cost of living and reducing the costs of instruments of production required in the development of our natural resources the name of Peck stands in the Meighen column against the amendment and against the Liberal, Farmer and Independent vote of the House.

Against Independents.

On June 28, 1920 on four successive divisions on proposed amendments to the Elections Act emanating from Liberal and Independent benches the member for Skeena hesitated not a moment to stand squarely behind his leader Meighen. It is the only way to stand—squarely behind your leader when you have one and Peck certainly did so in the last four sessions. Was the Government always right? Do the people think so? Are the people of Canada dissatisfied? It is conceded from east to west of Canada that Meighen cannot possibly hope for more than a handful of members in the new House. Peck is listed in the press of Canada today as a Government candidate. Is Meighen satisfied with Peck? If the records of Parliament mean anything, if political associations of the past mean anything, if political associations of the present mean anything, Meighen is making his fight in Skeena today through his candidate Colonel Peck.

Colonel's Compromise.

But the Colonel says he had to do it—he couldn't vote against the Government because he wanted things for Skeena. Is that the brand of politics Meighen insists upon? Does it speak well for Meighen or for the member who stands for that kind of thing? Is it not time to clean up—is it not time to send a man to Ottawa who unequivocally and absolutely stands opposed to Meighen and his methods? Can we afford to do anything else?
