It is expected all available steamboat accommodation to the north will be overtaxed. The Pouce Coupe oil fields are sharing with the Mackenzie in the oil rush and there will be much development there this year.

INDICTMENTS AGAINST BASEBALL PLAYERS ARE ALL WITHDRAWN

CHICAGO, March 17.—The state today dropped the cases against all former Chicago White Sox baseballers indicted for the alleged throwing of the 1919 world series except Chick Gandil. New indictments, however, will be sought.

BRIAND SUSTAINED

PARIS, March 17.—The Chamber of Deputies yesterday voted confidence in the Briand Government by a huge majority, the vote standing 489 to 67. The division was taken following a debate on the reparations decision.

No Improvement Since War Says Sir Philip Gibbs in Chicago Speech Yesterday

CHICAGO, March 17.—Sir Philip Gibbs, the English war correspondent, in a speech here said it would be only a matter of time before there would be another great European war. He said the world had not moved forward as the result of the recent conflict. It was exactly where it was in the year 1914. Sir Philip pointed to the Franco-Polish and other alliances and said the European countries were concerning themselves as much today with the balance of power as they did before the world war.

VETERANS BUSY MEMORIAL PLAN

Proposed to Launch Drive for Funds to Build Handsome Concrete Structure.

The Great War Veterans Association has decided to commence another drive for funds to build the memorial building on the Third Avenue site that was granted them by the vote of the ratepayers at the municipal election in January and a ways and means committee was delegated at the meeting of the association last night to frame up a scheme to submit at the next regular meeting. This committee consists of Captain C. B. Fournby, Jack Cargill, S. L. Warrior, J. Bird and A. Stevenson. When this committee has reported, another permanent committee will be named to go through with the plans.

The Association now has a definite idea of what it is going to build for the memorial. The structure will be a substantial two-story concrete building and will cost between \$20,000 and \$30,000. Such, it is felt, will be a fitting memorial to the many from Prince Rupert who gave their lives in the great struggle. It will prove both a credit to the city and a comfortable place of assembly for the association.

It is proposed to raise the funds by a campaign of the city which will commence as soon as possible and will conclude by Empire Day, May 24.

BRANDON AND VARSITY IN ALLAN CUP FINALS

Prairie Hockeyists Defeated Port Arthur in Final of Play Off Last Night

WINNIPEG, Mar. 17.—Brandon defeated the Port Arthur hockey team in the final game of the Allan Cup elimination contest last night, winning 11 to 7, completing the play off at the long end of a 33 to 44 aggregate. Brandon will now play Toronto Varsity for the cup.

KRONSTADT REPORTED TAKEN BY BOLSHEVIKI

RIGA, March 17.—The Russian mission here asserts that the Bolsheviks have captured Kronstadt from the revolutionaries.

Beer Clause is the Subject of Very Much Speculation in Legislative Circles

VICTORIA, March 17.—The famous beer clause, further debate on which was expected to come up in the Legislature today, is conspicuous by its absence. There are divided opinions on the question of a more liberal sale of beer so the Government is giving further consideration to the matter. The Ian Mackenzie amendment which was designed to raise the maximum limit provided under the bill as now drafted from one per cent of alcohol by weight to two per cent or five per cent proof spirit was subject to keen debate, it is said, at a Government caucus last night. It is believed that Mackenzie's amendment will be approved. The supporters of the Mackenzie amendment claim that the majority of the Government members support it and the independents split even and the Conservatives do likewise.

WORK ON HUDSON BAY RAILWAY IS NOW SHUT DOWN

OTTAWA, March 17.—There will be no further work on the Hudson Bay Railway this year, Dr. Reid, minister of railways, stated in the House of Commons yesterday. Financial stringency is the reason given for the work being held up.

SPRIG OF ORANGE WINS SPRING CUP

LONDON, March 17.—The Liverpool spring cup was won by Sprig of Orange, a 100 to 7 bet, yesterday. The second horse was Trespasser, 6 to 1; third, Money Class, 7 to 3.

LEAVES FOR DUNDAS

The "Billy Boy" leaves today for Dundas Island with a crew to overhaul the scows there preparatory to the opening of the salmon trolling season. It is expected to open the camp on Dundas Island about April 25, when the run of trout fish is usually started.

A great deal of interest has been taken in the competition for the best decorated show window in the local stores for the \$25 prize in connection with the St. Patrick's Day concert. Many of the merchants have gone to considerable pains in adorning their windows and some very pleasing results have been attained. The judging will take place this afternoon and the announcement of the winner will be made from the stage tonight.

Bonar Law Resigns from British Cabinet and House Leader

LONDON, March 17.—Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, Lord Privy Seal, has resigned from the cabinet because of ill health. He is also retiring from the leadership of the Government forces in the House of Commons. His resignation will be a distinct loss to the Lloyd George Government because of the fact that he is leader of the Conservative Unionists which is the strongest faction of the Government supporters.

Mr. Bonar Law has been in Parliament since 1900 with short intermissions and in 1902 to 1905 was parliamentary secretary to the Board of Trade. In November, 1911, he succeeded Mr. Balfour as leader of the Unionist party. He was a compromise candidate at a time when the Conservatives felt that they must reorganize along more popular lines and adopt a forward policy. Being the son of a retired Scotch iron merchant and having no relationships with any of the aristocratic families of the country, he was looked on with suspicion, but he held firmly to his position and carried out the work with dignity and energy.

Had it not been for the war, it is possible that ere this Mr. Law would have been Prime Minister. As it was he was willing to subordinate his ambitions for the good of the country. Mr. Law became secretary to the colonies in the coalition government of 1915 and in the Lloyd George ministry became chancellor of the exchequer and leader of the House of Commons.

FEW CARS; MUCH FISH

Seven Cars Needed Immediately—None Here, Only Three Coming.

Six halibut schooners with 165,000 pounds of fish arrived this morning from the banks to sell here. Seven cars will be required. None are in today and only three are reported for arrival tonight. None others are reported. The boats are holding over for sale until tomorrow.

The following are the arrivals: Panama, 62,000 lbs.; Polaris, 55,000, Norland, 22,000; Johanna, 15,000, Nornen 5,000, and Minnie V., 6,000 pounds.

CHANGE YEAR FOR MUNICIPALITIES

New Mayors and Councils to Take Office on January 1, it is Proposed.

VICTORIA, March 17.—It is proposed to amend the Municipal Act to change the date of municipal elections throughout the province, having them in time so that the new mayor and council may take office on January 1. This would make the municipal year conform with the calendar year. In a private bill before the Legislature, Victoria aldermen are to get a two-year term.

MORE MEN ARE NOW PUT ON AT WALLACE PLANT

Placing of 250 Workers there Helps Local Employment Situation Considerably

Government Employment Agent James M. Campbell reports that although there has been a considerable demand for men from the dry dock during the past week or so and the local situation is easing off, the demand from the outside has not yet commenced. It is expected, however, that by April 1 the office will be sending men to the outside especially to the logging camps which will reopen about then. There were 165 applications for work last week and a good number of these were sent to the dry dock where 250 men are now working.

Last week 131 men were provided with two days' work each by the city in its relief measures. Up till tomorrow night 97 will have been given work by the city. This relief work by the city at McLymont Park and Sixth Ave. playground will be kept up until the situation is improved in other lines. It is found that some men are taking advantage of the city work and appear to be quite satisfied to take the two days per week and remain idle the other five days if permitted to do so. Apparently they would rather do this than take steady jobs. Measures are being taken to prevent this condition. Returned men are being given the preference by the Wallace shipyards.

MILLIONAIRES ARE CHAMPIONS

Defeated Seattle Last Night and Won Pacific Coast Championship Ship

WILL PLAY OTTAWA FOR WORLD TITLE ON MONDAY

SEATTLE, Mar. 17.—Vancouver won the right to play Ottawa for the Stanley Cup last night when the Millionaires defeated the Seattle Metropolitans by a score of 6 to 2 and won the Pacific Coast hockey championship play off by a total of 13 to 2.

The first world's championship game between the Capitals and the Millionaires will take place in Vancouver on Monday night. W. H. J. Norris, of the Provincial Government civil service, arrived in the city yesterday and is engaged in the office of the provincial assessor.

Visitors to the United States bring back word of a feeling of irritation that seems to exist in some quarters against the British. This has been faithfully fanned by the enemy countries during the war and by the still more insidious Hearst press.

War Unthinkable Between Countries.

War between the United States and Great Britain is unthinkable. We are very largely of the same blood, have the same aims, the same civilization pervades the two countries and we should be able to carry on side by side without any trouble.

There is no danger of war between the countries today. There should be no friction and no ill-feeling between the countries. We have no cause to be irritated at the people of the United States and we know of no reason why they should be irritated at us.

It may be some day, when we get big enough that we may annex the United States to Canada, but that will be many years hence, but in the meantime the Yankees need not fear any onslaught from this side of the line.

Pattullo is Under Serious Charge.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo is under a shadow. He is the object of a serious charge in the Legislature. The leader of the opposition makes the allegation that the member for Prince Rupert is trying to obtain special favors for his constituency.

We have no intention of coming to the assistance of the local member for he can fight his own battles. Honestly we fear he is guilty and that he may have to admit it.

Sense of Humor Very Valuable.

Have you a sense of humor? If you have not, you miss a great deal out of life. Humor rounds off the jagged corners that are apt to hurt. It disarms an enemy and binds closer a friend.

Without any irreverence we can quite easily imagine the Great Ruler of the Universe chucking at some of the antics of the human family in their efforts to be serious.

Life may not be a joke, but if we are able to see the funny side of serious matters it takes off much of the poignancy of what might otherwise be poisoned arrow thrusts.

HEARS VOICES LONG DISTANCE

A. L. Hawkins of Winnipeg Claims to Have Wonderful Telepathic Powers

WINNIPEG, Man., Mar. 17.—Through the use of telepathy and concentration, A. L. Hawkins, of this city, claims it is possible not only to speak to, but to see persons, objects and places, regardless of distance.

Mr. Hawkins is a returned soldier and the strange influences which beset him, and by turns oppress, uplift or worry him, have been felt most strongly since his return from the war, where he served three years. The most definite manifestation of this development is the ability to hear, and Mr. Hawkins firmly believes, to transmit the human voice over interminable distances, even interplanetary distances, without mechanical aid.

"This is not a theory with me," Mr. Hawkins stated recently, "it is an actual experience. I have distinctly heard people talking together at a distance—a distance far beyond earshot. I mean—as distinctly as though I had my ear to a telephone. I can receive voices, and I can transmit them, not in the manner of ordinary telepathic impressions which the recipient himself translates into words, but as definite sounds in the ear. I claim more—I can transmit the music of specific instruments so that the person or persons with whom I have made arrangements will be able not only to hear the tune, but to discern and to say what instrument is playing."

FEED SUNFLOWERS TO ALBERTA CATTLE

C.P.R. Experimental Farm Use Weed with Good Results

CALGARY, Alta., Mar. 17.—If the forecast of several dairymen and stockgrowers is realized, Alberta in the near future will be known as the "Sunflower" province. The dairymen and stockgrowers who visited the Canadian Pacific Railway experimental farm at Strathmore are of the unanimous opinion that after seeing the manner in which the cattle there have come through the winter on this particular feed, that an enormous impetus will be given to the cultivation of this plant.

In the opinion of those who have used this silage it only requires the publicity of facts already achieved to induce every stock grower in the province, and indeed through the west, to make it his principal winter feed for cattle, more especially in those sections which are subject to drought.

"It will undoubtedly go a long way towards solving the feed problem of the west," stated E. S. McRory, manager of the western division of the United Grain Growers' Company, in commenting upon this matter. "It is certainly well worth the while of every farmer giving it his most earnest attention."

CANNERIES ON NAAS GETTING READY TO OPEN

Indian Agent W. E. Collison Back From Inspection of Lower Points in District.

W. E. Collison, Indian agent for the Naas River division, returned from the Venture Tuesday night from an inspection of the points in the lower part of his district where he found everything running smoothly and well. Mr. Collison was unable to get up the river to Aiyansh and other points to the east and will go there later in the year after the ice has gone.

Mr. Collison made his headquarters for his ten-day visit at Kincolth where his father, Rev. Archdeacon W. H. Collison, resides.

Mr. Collison visited the Naas canneries and reports that all of them will operate this season with the possible exception of Kamson. Actual preparations are being made at Naas Harbor, Armandale, Mill Bay and Sagerville and it is understood Wales Island cannery is also getting ready.

The oolachan run in the Naas river has not yet commenced this season but just before Mr. Collison left the Indians captured a seal and found an oolachan in the animal. This is an indication that the oolachan are in the straits and the run will commence next week on the high tides. Oolachan are a delicacy among the Indians of the Naas and in the early days provided a great portion of their food.

GENERAL HOSPITAL WILL BE SHINGLED

Question of Painting Building Brings up Advisability of Shingling and Staining.

A committee consisting of Col. McMordie, E. H. Mortimer and P. L. Palmer was named by President D. G. Stewart at last night's hospital board meeting to make plans for shingling and staining the hospital.

Speaking on the matter last night, Col. McMordie stated that the probable cost of shingling the building would be \$300. Doing this would reduce the coal consumption, make the building as nearly waterproof as possible and would add considerably to the comfort of the patients and nurses. An architect should be engaged to draw up plans for the artistic putting on of the shingles. In the long run it would prove a saving investment. To put paper between the present siding and the shingles would cost \$200 additional but this, Col. McMordie felt, was unnecessary.

In answer to a question by E. H. Mortimer as to the advisability of leaving the matter for a couple of months before having the work done, Col. McMordie stated that lumber and shingles were now as low in price as they would be this season, but labor would likely go down in a short time. It might be advisable to leave the matter stand for a couple of months. President Stewart pointed out that the work would have to be done this year.

RUPERT MENTIONED AT ARBITRATION

Engineer Says Location is Excellent One With Plenty of Room for Expansion.

In discussing the value of the Grand Trunk property, J. B. Berry, consulting engineer for the railway, gave evidence at a recent sitting of the arbitrators. He told of the ports on the Pacific coast, mentioning particularly Prince Rupert, where he said the G. T. P. possessed 618 acres of land with 10 miles of sidings and good waterside facilities.

In answer to W. H. Taft, one of the arbitrators, Mr. Berry said he considered Prince Rupert was an excellent location. It had been carefully chosen by a body of experts and he thought it was a good terminal port. The G. T. P. had ample space for further expansion.

H. J. F. Turney will be general manager of the local plant of the Wallace Shipbuilding Co., according to the Vancouver Province. Mr. Turney is also secretary-treasurer of the company.

PATTULLO ON TIMBER BILL

Explains Changes to Legislature and Assures House Growth Much Exceeds Consumption

WILL ENDEAVOR TO ELIMINATE WASTAGE

There is no cause for alarm about the depletion of British Columbia forests, as progressive legislation will put the timber industry on a really permanent basis, the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, assured the Legislature when explaining his Forest Act amendments, says the Victoria Times.

"There has been a good deal of misconception in the public mind with regard to the timber situation in British Columbia," Mr. Pattullo declared. "Unnecessarily alarming reports have been circulated about the depletion of our timber. There is no doubt that there have been what I might almost call 'shocking' methods used in logging in the Province, it is true. Last year this was particularly so on account of the boom in the industry. But there is no need for alarm."

Alarmist Reports-Ridiculous
"I have seen reports in the press that in twenty years lumbering will be a thing of the past in this province. Such ideas are ridiculous. It is perfectly true that some of the great forest giants 250 to 300 years old which are being cut today will not be replaced and will not exist except in preserved areas such as along public highways. We must remember, however, that such trees have reached and passed maturity and should be cut as they are decaying. They will never be replaced again. In the next generation the timber cut will be among trees from seventy-five years up. We don't need to be alarmed at all."

Mr. Pattullo assured the House that at present the annual growth of timber in British Columbia far exceeded the annual cut and destruction combined. The annual growth he said, was approximately six billion feet while the annual cut and destruction amounted to only two billion feet.

"There is no doubt," the Minister proceeded, "that in places about centres of population we have been mining our timber and the waste that has prevailed in the past must not be allowed in the future."

To Ration Pulp Resources
"At the present time," Mr. Pattullo said as he went on to

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explain provisions to encourage pulp and paper manufacture. "The pulp and paper companies have only a thirty years' supply of timber. No one would say that it was advisable that the operations of these great companies should cease after thirty years. Not only would the country be robbed of vast industries, but these companies, knowing that they had only thirty years in which to operate, would have to charge more for their output in the meantime."

The Minister explains that it was proposed to create areas of satisfactory timber at various suitable points in the province. These would be put up for public competition and companies would be able to secure them on condition that they would establish on them pulp and paper mills of a certain size, and under conditions which would ensure the continuance of operations in perpetuity.

"It was proposed also to make available for the use of pulp and paper companies Crown timber lying about the 'areas' created so that these concerns would have sufficient raw material to make possible the continuance of their operations. The price of this timber would be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. These provisions, Mr. Pattullo felt, would help in a very large measure to encourage the establishment of pulp and paper mills in British Columbia.

Speaking of clauses in his amendment governing forest protection, Mr. Pattullo said that timber holders had come to realize the necessity of eliminating wastage and of protecting young timber. Forest protection, the Minister asserted, was essential if the lumber industry was to be preserved.

"We look upon this as a most important measure and one of the most forward-looking pieces of legislation introduced," the Minister concluded.

"It is undoubtedly one of the most important bills introduced this session."

WOULD TAX COAL FOR EDUCATION

Edmonton School Board Wants New Method of Raising Funds

EDMONTON, Mar. 17.—Advocating the opening of entirely new avenues of taxation in the province for educational purposes, a delegation from the school boards of Calgary and Edmonton conferred with Hon. George P. Smith, minister of education.

One of the suggestions put forward by the delegation was that a tax for educational requirements be placed on the output of coal, it being proposed that there might easily be imposed a tax of five cents a ton without injuring the industry in the least. Hon. Mr. Smith pointed out that the province already taxes coal this amount per ton, in addition to the federal royalty. Trustee Simmott, of Calgary, held the opinion that the province could add ten cents per ton to the coal production and not affect the industry injuriously.

What the delegation did impress upon the government was that in the cities especially there must be discovered some new method of taxation other than higher mill rates on property, because, it was declared, property owners in cities already are bearing a heavier load than it will be possible to maintain. They advocated using the natural resources of the province to a great degree as possible for taking care of the paramount needs of education.

AMERICANS COMING TO SETTLE IN CANADA

About End of the Present Month There Will be First Movement into Country.

WINNIPEG, March 17.—With the passing of the snow a large party from the United States will come to western Canada in search of desirable land, according to information received by private interests and railway immigration officials. The first definite movement of settlers from across the line, so far as the prairie provinces are affected, will be about the end of the present month, when two trainloads of settlers and their effects will arrive. These trains will be concentrated at the Minneapolis transfer, and will be composed of farmers from the western states.

The greater part of their effects will be run through North Portal and from there to Moose Jaw for distribution, while the balance of effects and at least two coaches of settlers will come into Winnipeg and from here be distributed to various points throughout the province.

These settlers have been obtained through the efforts of three or four large land agencies operating in the United States and Canada.

A Winnipeg firm has just completed the sale of 5,000 acres in the Swan River district, the balance of 25,000 acres which has been available for purchase in that district.

In connection with the two trainloads of settlers, a Minneapolis firm is bringing in one party of 22 families who will settle in the northwesterly part of the province. These people are going in for mixed farming and dairying, and are understood to be mostly residents of the state of Wisconsin.

John Wardrop, general agent of the Canadian National railways resources department, who has just returned from the United States, said today that enquiries for the past three months were double those of any similar period for the last seven years.

John Maitland arrived yesterday from Vancouver to take charge of the engineering department of the Wallace shipyards here. Mr. Maitland is classed among the best marine engineers in the British Empire and after a long experience in old country yards came to the Coughlan yard at Vancouver when it was established. He severed his connection with that company to take the new post here.
