OTTAWA, January 18.—(Special).—Great interest is being taken in the preparations for the opening of the sessions of Parliament here on February 14. There is a rumor going around in hotels and clubs to the effect that there may be a number of Liberal Unionists bolt from the present Government during the coming session, although on what particular pretext is not known, unless it be that Meighen is a rabid Conservative and is making an effort to conciliate the Liberals who have been supporting the Government since the war cabinet was formed.

Among those mentioned as possible bolters are several westerners, and it is quite possible that some sensations may be sprung before the spring is far advanced and it may even mean an early election.

### SEVENTEENTH IRISH M.P. IS NOW IN JAIL

Several Casualties in Fight Between Black and Tans and Civilians.

BELFAST, January 18.—David Sinn Fein member of Parliament, has been arrested. This makes the seventeenth member of Parliament now in jail.

Constable Boyd was shot dead in County Tipperary. His assailant escaped.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Four civilians were killed and seven black and tan police wounded in a fight in County Galway, Ireland. A fight ensued when a Black and Tan patrol was ambushed near the city of Galway.

### Four British Amateurs Outbox Four Americans

Great Triumph for Englishmen at International Sporting Club, New York, Last Night; Brown Scores Knockout

NEW YORK, January 18.—English amateur boxers triumphed over their American opponents last night in all four bouts staged by the International Sporting Club.

A knockout victory was scored by Hugh Brown, amateur middleweight champion of England and of the British army, in the second round over Ben Davis, Indian light heavyweight champion of the United States.

Army Capt. E. V. Chandler, amateur heavyweight champion of England and the British Army, won from John Cartwright, champion of the United States army, by 33 points to 29.

John Watson, British navy champion heavyweight, defeated Ralph Ritchie, United States navy champion, by 31 to 28.

Harry Mallon, middleweight title holder of the London police, outpointed John Saff of the New York police, welterweight title holder.

### HALIBUT ARE MOVING SOUTH

Number of Smaller Boats Left Here in Last Ten Days to Fish West of Queen Charlottes.

The slack fishing season will soon be over now that the fish are commencing to move southward. During the past ten days several smaller vessels have left this port to fish on the whole banks on the west coast of Frederick Island off the Queen Charlottes. With fine weather, such has been prevailing during the past day or so, these boats should be soon in with their first spring catches.

While there are still some of the large schooners fishing to the westward on the Yakutat banks, many are now undergoing overhaul in Seattle. When they are again in shape for the season's work, they will not go direct north but will fish off Cape Flattery and Destruction Island and work off the west coast of Vancouver Island.

The movements of the boats now mark the commencement of the spring season. Both large and small boats will again be coming here in large numbers.

### PAYING HIGH BUTTER PRICE

British Food Ministry Offers 300 Shillings per Hundredweight Canadian Product.

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—The agent of the British Food Ministry has been authorized to purchase first quality Canadian butter at a price equivalent to three hundred shillings per hundredweight. This will be the highest price ever paid by the ministry for butter supplies.

### ALL BUT COASTS IN ZERO'S GRIP, SAYS TORONTO REPORT

TORONTO, Jan. 18.—All Canada with the exception of the Pacific and Atlantic coasts is apparently in the grip of zero weather. The lowest temperatures officially recorded this morning are at Ottawa, where it is 18 below zero, and at Winnipeg where the thermometers registered 20 below. Unofficial reports give Iroquois Falls 10 below and Cochrane, Ontario, 28 below.

### LOGGER KILLED

Axel Johnson of Ocean Falls is Drowned in Fitzhugh Sound.

OCEAN FALLS, Jan. 18.—Axel Johnson, a hand logger, was drowned in Fitzhugh Sound on Thursday last. He fell into the water from a log and was unable to get out.

### New York Fur Sales Show Fifty Per Cent. Price Drop

Sealskins, Dressed and Dyed, Marketed in States for First Time Today; Brisk Bidding in Some Lines

NEW YORK, January 18.—Large decline in fur prices over those obtained a year ago were shown at the fur auction here, which is resumed after an interval of nine months. An average of fifty per cent decline seems to be shown, yet this is not lower than the current market of other years. It is a drop back to normal. This is the annual sale and is held under the auspices of the Auction Sales Corporation.

Since the last previous sale was held here in April, prices of furs, in keeping with all other kinds of merchandise, have undergone sharp reductions. Most of the prices obtained today, however, either equalled or exceeded the current market. Bidding for marten and fisher was the feature of the day with beaver and muskrat selling well.

### LONDON SINN FEIN GANGSTER

Man is Arrested Who is Supposed to be Leader of Terrorists.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—Six men were arrested in an attempt to set free the Vacuum Oil Co.'s plant at Wandsworth on Saturday. The police believe they have captured the virtual leader of the so-called Sinn Fein terrorist gang in London. They have found papers indicating the connection of the arrested men with the Sinn Fein movement.

### DRUGGISTS DO NOT WANT TO HANDLE LIQUOR

Secretary of Pharmaceutical Association Denies Any Proposals to Undertake Duties.

VICTORIA, Jan. 18.—A rumor has been going the rounds here to the effect that the government was considering making the druggists of the province the distributors of liquor. Joseph Emery, registrar of the Pharmaceutical Association of B. C., said the druggists had made no arrangement to meet Premier Oliver and the cabinet in connection with the reported proposals to let them take over the distribution under the new act. The druggists had not changed their official stand and did not want to handle the business.

### SURPRISED PARTY PREPARING AMBUSH IN COUNTY CORK

DUBLIN, Jan. 18.—A detachment of the Essex Regiment surprised a party of men preparing an ambush at Timoleague, County Cork.

An exchange of firing took place in which 25 civilians were captured, but there were no casualties among the troops.

### Stole Over \$8,000 Worth of Diamonds

Burglars Entered Vancouver Store when place was brilliantly lighted and hundreds of people were passing

VANCOUVER, January 18.—While hundreds of people were passing last night and the place was brilliantly lighted, robbers entered the jewelry store of H. Maxwell, Hastings Street, by cutting through the partition from the adjoining store. They made a successful getaway with 167 diamond rings valued at more than \$8,000.

This is one of the most daring robberies perpetrated in this city. It seems to have been carefully planned and the wonder is that burglars were able to carry out their work without being detected.

### PILE DRIVING GOING SWIFTLY

Work Done on Ocean Dock Gives Idea of What Pier Will Look Like.

Pile driving for the new ocean wharf at the west of the present Grand Trunk wharf is making great headway and already the piles for one section about 50 by 25 feet have been driven. While the pile driver is working immediately at the end of the present wharf, a dredge is just on the other side of it casting up the sand. The piles, so far driven, give a very good idea of what the new 1000 foot salmon and ocean dock is going to look like.

### PREMIER CELEBRATES HIS 58TH BIRTHDAY

LONDON, Jan. 18.—David Lloyd George, premier of Britain, was 58 years of age yesterday. He has been a member of the cabinet for 15 years and prime minister since 1916.

### Garrigan New Manager of Wha'en Pulp and Paper Co.

N. J. Foley in Charge at Swanson Bay; Efforts to Operate All Plants to Capacity

VANCOUVER, January 18.—(Special).—U. M. Waite, vice-president of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., announced this morning that S. H. Garrigan had been appointed manager on this coast, succeeding Sir George Bury.

Mr. Garrigan is to have charge of all departments excepting the treasury, which Mr. McMaster retains. Mr. Garrigan knows the sulphite business thoroughly, having been engaged in production since the age of fifteen, when he started as a mill hand. He has worked his own way up to the top. He was several years with the International Paper Company as superintendent and latterly with the Reliance Paper Board, of Lockport, New York State.

Mr. Waite is unable at present to outline the new firm's policy but all efforts will be concentrated upon obtaining a capacity output from the different plants controlled by the company.

N. J. Foley has been appointed superintendent of the plant at Port Alice. The superintendency of the Swanson Bay plant is as yet unfilled.

## Responsible Government.

In France they do not have responsible government as we understand it. The Premier, if defeated, cannot ask for the right of appeal to the people on a big question. Recently a new premier was appointed, Premier Leygues. His administration did not last long and Aristide Briand is now at the head of affairs. The government lacks the elasticity of all British Governments. It is tied down by a constitution, much as is the government of the United States. The governments are not as stable and it seems quite the proper thing for there to be a change of premier in the middle of a session of the Chamber of Deputies.

## Cold Snap Not Conducive to Comfort.

Prince Rupert houses are not built for cold weather. We have so little of it in the course of the year, that builders do not take that care which builders are bound to take in the interior. Just now we are passing through a rather cold time. The mercury has dropped to as low as 16 degrees above zero and we all shiver because we are not accustomed to such cold. It is, however, a pleasant change and the young people are making the most of their opportunities in the way of tobogganing and skating. It is healthful exercise and should be encouraged.

## Churchill As Secretary to Colonies.

If Winston Churchill is appointed Secretary of State for the Colonies, as is suggested in the despatch of yesterday, the news will be received with mixed feelings. He is a man who is hailed by a large section of the community because of his reactionary utterances and yet he is a live wire, keen and bright and always to the fore. He is every inch a Churchill.

Many people look on Churchill as a great man, and perhaps he is. He may yet do something great. In the meantime he is being given every opportunity to make a name for himself as a Statesman. What everyone is wondering is whether he will be a success as Colonial Secretary. Will he have the necessary tact in dealing with the relations between rising independent nations within the British Empire and the mother of nations which he represents?

## Disarmament Still Being Discussed.

Disarmament and the limitation of armaments are both subjects for general discussion throughout the world. There are now three nations particularly affected by the building of war ships. These are Britain, United States and Japan. The Japanese are virile and keen for supremacy and the United States seems to be afraid of the little islanders from the Pacific. The result is that, as in the case of Germany, there is no letup in the matter of increasing armaments. Millions of dollars are being spent providing against a possible war. The great war has taught us no lessons and we are as crazy as ever.

It is possible that, as a result of the agitation going on, some arrangement may be arrived at which would eliminate the need of the mad race in armaments. The United States objects to the League of Nations, but possibly some other form of organization may appeal to them now that politics has been eliminated for a year or two. It is very greatly to be desired that some stop may be put to preparations which are bound to end in another horrible exhibition of international savagery.

## Feed the Birds During Bad Weather.

C. O. Rowe puts a small advertisement in this paper asking people to feed the birds during bad weather. It was a thoughtful thing for Mr. Rowe to do and it is to be hoped it will have the desired result. It is difficult for the small birds to get food when the country is covered with snow. Just this little reminder will probably save many bird lives, and we need them all.

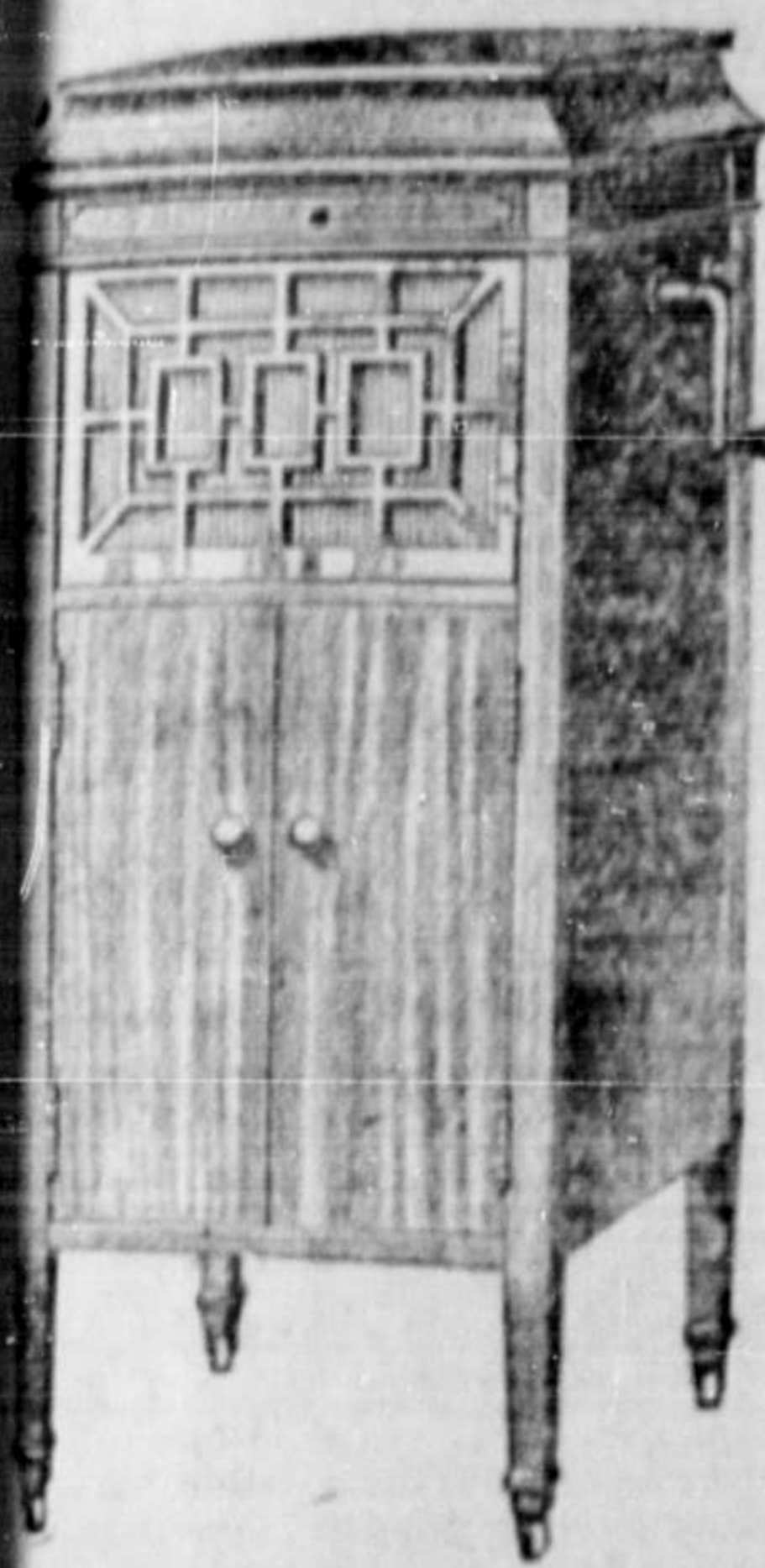

## UNION BANK REPORT

Institution has Materially Improved Position During Year

## STRIKE INQUIRY AT EDMONTON

Coal Sold at Mine Cheaper Than Drumheller—Wages Paid.

EDMONTON, Jan. 18.—Testifying on oath before the commission investigating the wage dispute in seven mines in the Edmonton district, Jas. C. Dunn, manager of the Great West Coal Co., stated that in speaking to Mr. Ryan who had come into this district to organize the United Mine Workers, the latter had stated to him that they were going to organize this field if it cost \$50,000 and also had said: "Your coal is competing with Drumheller coal in the Winnipeg market and we are going to put a stop to that."

The witness further stated, in giving details that led up to the strike, that on the morning of November 25, they had found a picket of approximately one hundred men from the mines across the river. This picket had intercepted the men as they were going to the wash house and there were also some inside the wash house.

### Output of Mine.

Regarding the output of the Great West Coal Co., Mr. Dunn stated that they mined about 100,000 tons a year and were employing a staff now of about 140 men, while in the summer time this was reduced to 50 to 60 men, but they usually kept running all summer. As to the probable continuation of their present work, they hoped to continue another day or two now, as the present storm helped their orders to a degree. They had been in operation 10 years and this was the first time they had had a strike. Any other differences with the employees had been settled inside of twenty-four hours. He was confident that the men were satisfied until there was outside interference.

### Question of Wages.

As to wages, the lowest paid men were laborers, who received 57 1/2c an hour and worked eight and nine hours a day. Drivers received \$5.35 and men on day wage \$5.65 for eight hour day. In continuation of this theme, Mr. Dunn gave the wages for 38 men most of whom were employed continuously in the mine, and at the rate paid since the raise last June, and on a yearly basis of what they had earned during the last six months of 1920, the wages ranged from \$3,025 to \$1,887.

### Price of Coal.

They received \$5.25 at the mine for their lump coal, as against \$6.68 which Drumheller received for theirs. The coal from his mine was put on the market in Winnipeg at \$13.75 as against \$14.50 for Drumheller and the freight rates were practically the same. They had been staggered at the loss they had had to suffer in their Winnipeg sales office.

## STEAMSHOVEL MEN TO GET WAGE INCREASE

TORONTO, Jan. 18.—The engineers, firemen and crane men on eastern lines of the Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian National Railways will probably receive 15 per cent increase in wages shortly according to an announcement of H. O. Jarman, secretary of the local union of the International Brotherhood of Steamshovel and Dredgemen.

## EDMONTON EXPECTS NEW STATION AND ROUND HOUSE SOON

EDMONTON, Jan. 18.—That the coming season is bound to see some activity in Edmonton in connection with the Canadian National railways depot and shops is the assurance given to Mayor Duggan by A. E. Warren, general superintendent of western lines, and R. H. Bell, district freight agent, who called on him on Wednesday morning.

The railway officials are reserved in their statements as to what may be done, but it is highly satisfactory to the citizens to know that the government proposals in regard to the lines at Edmonton embody "enormous plans" in the way of extensions. The plans are so large, it is admitted, that it takes them altogether out of the realm of the ordinary management of the line and places them in the hands of the president and the government for the purpose of making arrangements for financing.

The amount of work in Edmonton in the year will depend upon this question of financing and how it is to be treated by the government.

## PRINTERS RETURN AT OLD WAGE RATE

Demand for Ten Dollars a Day Refused But \$40.50 a Week is to Be Paid.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 18.—The commercial printers' strike is settled so far as the big shops are concerned and the men have returned to work on the basis of \$40.50 a week for a 48-hour week. Negotiations commenced several months ago with a view to a settlement before the end of the year. The employers are said to have informally offered \$45 a week but the unions refused it. As it became more and more evident that the cost of living was coming down the employers offered to sign up on the old basis of \$40.50 but this was refused. The newspaper offices arbitrated and the award was that they continue at the old rate. Men employed in the job offices refused to accept that rate or to arbitrate. They asked \$60 a week for a 42-hour week, and a strike followed. The employers decreased their offer to \$38 but have now agreed to pay \$40.50, the same as last year.

## SKATING ENJOYED AT MORSE CREEK

Many Out During Both Afternoon and Evening—Ice Just Fair.

Skating was the popular sport yesterday. In the afternoon a number of people, especially boys and girls, were at Morse Creek enjoying the fun. A stretch of ice was swept off and it made a pretty fair rink.

In the evening there were about fifty people on the ice, and there was a great display of fancy skating. A few rough spots and humps in the ice had a marvellous effect in proving the skill and agility of the skaters.

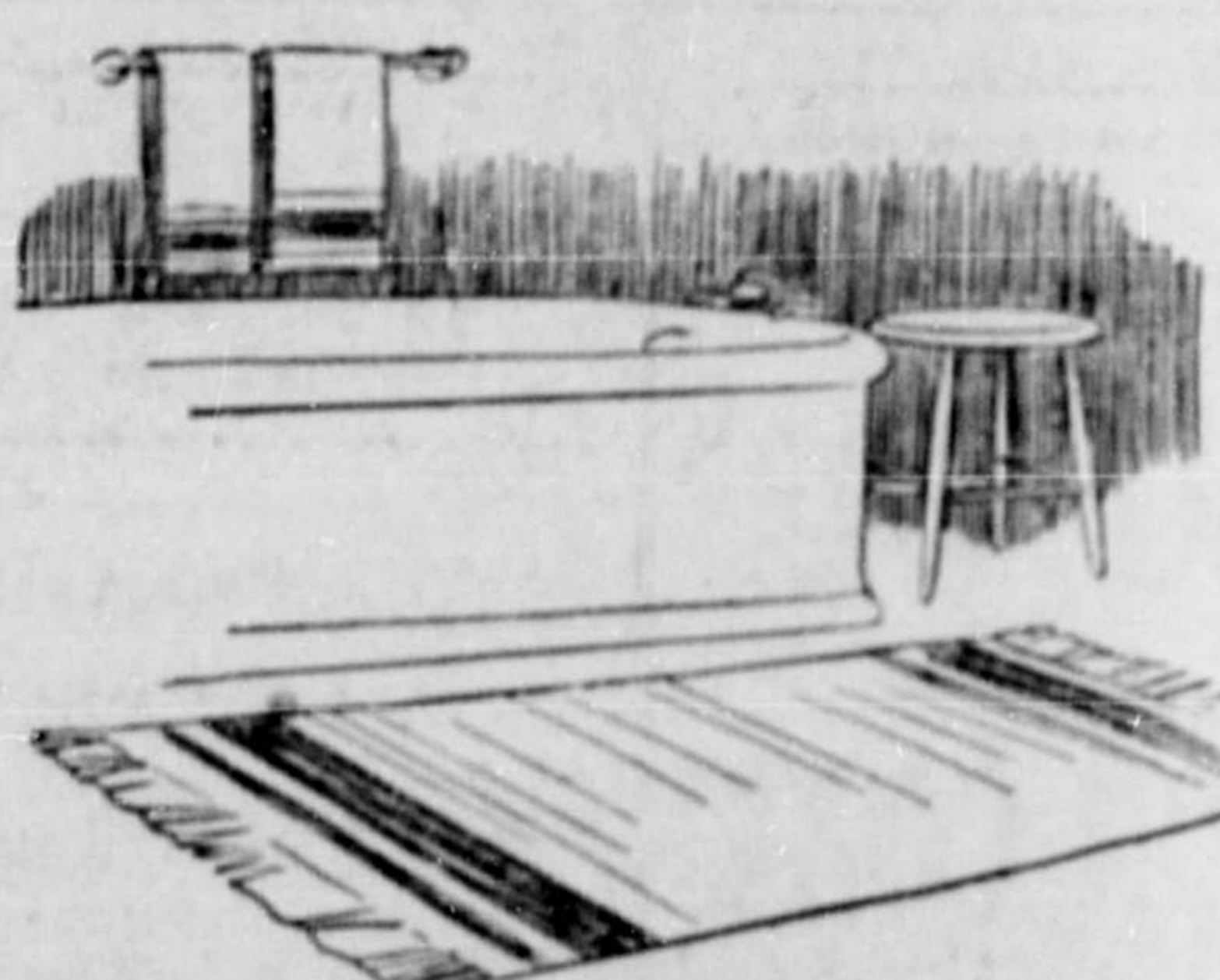
