# British Said Last Word On Ireland

## ANOTHER GOVERNMENT STEAMER MEETS MISFORTUNE AND SINKS

### whole British Terms Stated in Letter to Valera Declared Lloyd George and Lord Curzon

LONDON, August 19.—The British Government in making its proposals to Ireland put the whole terms into the hands of De Valera without keeping anything back, declared Lloyd George in a statement to the House of Commons yesterday.

Lord Curzon, secretary for foreign affairs, speaking in the House of Lords on the Irish negotiations, said the government had done all that could be given without compromising the safety of the realm, the sovereignty of the Crown and the dignity of the Empire.

#### Imperial Conference.

LONDON, August 19.—Ireland was not discussed by the British at the Imperial Conference. Lloyd George, in reviewing the work of the conference in the House of Commons yesterday, spoke of the war services of the Dominions and said the Empire had fully discussed the foreign policy of the Empire, the Silesian question and the relations with Asia, but not the Irish question. The British had no objection to the conference discussing Ireland, but "they had their differences quite as we did and there was no burning desire to take up the question."

#### No Prorogation.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—The settlement of the Irish problem or the decision as to measures to be taken in case the Irish republican leaders break off negotiations with the British Government will possibly be laid before Parliament prior to final decision by Premier Lloyd George. This is indicated by the sudden decision today not to prorogue parliament but to call a recess for two months.

### D GEORGE OULD INSURE ORLD PEACE

Hopes for Agreement  
in United States and  
Britain.

ON, Aug. 19.—Earnest efforts are expressed by Lloyd George in a statement in the House of Commons dealing with the disarmament conference in Washington, that the conference would result in a complete understanding on the problems of the Pacific and the Atlantic, and the re-establishment of a tripartite agreement in Japan, United States and Canada, insuring the peace of the world.

Times Endorse.

ON, Aug. 19.—The London Times endorsing Lloyd George's reference to the Washington disarmament conference says: "We have represented the deep feelings of the Dominion members and representatives of the Canadian government as well as the premier and government of Great Britain through the premier, and through the people have declared our undivided friendship for the United States that can be taken to make the world."

VICTORIA, Aug. 19.—Attorney-General Farris told the convention of Life Underwriters of Canada in session here yesterday that at the fall session of the Legislature a bill would be introduced which would compel every man doing life insurance business in British Columbia to secure a license.

#### PRINCE OF WALES NOT COMING HOME BY WAY OF CANADA

LONDON, Aug. 19.—The Prince of Wales will leave Portsmouth on H. M. S. Renown on October 26 to tour India and later visit Japan to return home by way of Canada.

#### WRECK LOOTED BY FISHERMEN

Lloyds Propose to Pull Off Forward Half of Vessel With Engines.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., Aug. 19.—Fishermen boarding the wrecked Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian Exporter, which was stranded on the spit of Willapa Harbor, looted everything movable, reports Captain Winbeck. Coastguards salvaged about \$7000 worth of stuff and has one fisherman arrested.

It is said that bids for the cargo have been rejected by Lloyds Underwriters, as it is now believed that the forward half of the vessel can be pulled off. By placing a boiler aboard it is proposed to start the engines and pull her off.

#### LOADED LUMBER AT PORT CLEMENTS ON BARGES FOR SOUTH

The launch Nechaco is back in port, bringing her owner, F. G. Brynolson, manager of the Northwest Spruce Lumber Company of this city, who has been in charge of the loading of the lumber from the Graham Island Spruce and Cedar Company on barges for shipment to New Westminster. The barges Louisiana and Pioneer have taken the lumber, the latter being towed by the steamer Amur owned by the Granby Company. The purchaser of the lumber was the Premier Lumber Co., which will resaw and manufacture it at its mill.

The provincial elevator system has earned the province 6 per cent. on the investment.

#### ELKS ELECT HEAD FOR COMING YEAR

CALGARY, Aug. 19.—R. T. Pendray of Calgary has been elected grand exalted ruler of the Canadian Order of Elks at the convention here yesterday, succeeding J. F. Morris of Vancouver. The next annual convention will take place at Winnipeg.

#### Another Canadian Government Steamer Is Sunk; Rammed by Coal Ship in River St. Lawrence

QUEBEC, August 19.—The Canadian Government steamer "Canadian Recruit," laden with coal outbound, was rammed and sunk in shallow water in the St. Lawrence River forty miles below Quebec last night in a dense fog. The vessel that collided with her was the coal barge Maskinonge, which was slightly damaged. The crew of the Canadian Recruit were all saved.

#### Station Contract Goes to Moosejaw Builder Against Tenders of Six Local Firms

Word has been received in the city that the contract for the erection of the Canadian National Railway station at Prince Rupert has been let to P. W. Graham of Moosejaw, the same firm that is to build the station at Prince George.

In connection with the letting of the contract one of the firms that tendered received the following letter last night:

"Godwin, Blair & Gavigan, General Contractors,

"Prince Rupert, B. C.

"I am returning you herewith by registered mail your marked cheques for \$500 and \$1895.55, total \$2395.55, which being the deposit in connection with your tender for the construction of the station building at Prince Rupert.

"This work has been awarded to P. W. Graham, Moosejaw, who was the lowest tenderer.

"J. A. HEAMAN, Assistant Chief Engineer."

In connection with the letting of the contract to a Moosejaw man, J. G. Gavigan, one of the members of the above firm said while disappointed that his firm did not get the contract, he would not have cared if some Prince Rupert firm had got the work. He thought it was time they took up with the management matters of this kind and saw that Prince Rupert got her share of business. Capitalize Scenery  
Is Suggestion.

At the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday R. R. Neild of Vancouver suggested that Prince Rupert should join with the other parts of the province in the effort to capitalize the scenery of the province and more particularly of the district in which we live. He spoke very appreciatively of the coast scenery which he had seen.

Mr. Neild said nothing of the scenery of the Skeena Canyon and of the wonderful sights of the Interior along the Canadian National Railway between this city and the prairies. This scenery is superb, something to be long remembered. It will some day be worth a mint of money to the whole district. While there is much fine scenery on the route from Vancouver to Edmonton over part of the northern route, the line this side of Mount Robson is filled with interest to the tourist.

One method of entertaining tourists in the future will be to have them leave the train at Terrace and come down the river in canoes to the mouth of the river, and possibly to Prince Rupert. It is said to be an ideal trip, and it is certain there is no other such possibility of a canoe trip anywhere on this coast. Think what a man or woman with a kodak could get when passing down those wonderful gorges with the snow-capped mountains and combinations of water and foliage. All this should be made available to the tourist, which means to the people here the capitalizing of the scenery.

This is labor's own day and doubtless, as practically all the people of Prince Rupert know what it is to labor, they will join with the organized forces of labor and celebrate the event in a proper manner.

Chautauqua  
End of Month.

At the end of this month there will be a week of Chautauqua, fifteen local business men having put up a bond to secure the event here this year. There will be lectures and musical events twice daily throughout the week, something that will tend to change the daily routine of our lives. The Chautauqua idea is purely educational, although sometimes it has degenerated. It is promised that this year will see something better than has ever come to Prince Rupert before, and doubtless it will get the support of the community. In a place that is somewhat cut off from the big centres, such as is Prince Rupert, we need an affair of this kind once a year at least.

GOOD AGAIN

Shortage Was Caused by Failure of Alaskan Plants to Supply Boats.

All fish boats and halibut packing houses here are now being supplied with ice again after having experienced a shortage for the past few weeks. The situation is satisfactory at the present although there is no definite assurance that the shortage will not occur again. The fish packing houses, with the exception of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., and the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co., are being supplied by the railway company from the stores at Prince Rupert, Pacific, Smithers and other divisional points. This ice was cut during the winter at Lucerne and stored up for summer use. The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. makes its own ice at its cold storage plant and the Booth Fisheries Canadian Co. has its supply at Lake Kathryn, near Smithers. The fish boats are getting ice from the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. and the Western Packers at Butedale. The weak point that may cause another shortage is the fact that the Railways' supply may give out as far as the fishing industry is concerned.

## Alaskan Plants Failed.

The recent ice shortage was not brought about by a scarcity at Prince Rupert but on account of several of the Alaskan plants having failed to make and supply it while repairs were made. The New England Plant at Ketchikan, for instance, has not been turning it out for some time. This lack of supply at Alaska ports, where many of the larger boats usually obtained their ice, forced them to come here and thus created an unusual demand on the local supply with the result that the various sources of supply were taxed to such a point that they could no longer fill the demands. At the present time there is actually not shortage existing.



## RELIGION THAT HEALS DISEASE

Lecturer Explains Difference Between Christian Science and Other Churches.

### NO PROMISSORY NOTES REDEEMABLE IN FUTURE

tell of his own healing. He had been for 34 years a clergyman in the Anglican Church, ministering to a large congregation. After a long illness he went to England and there met with a Christian Science practitioner and was healed instantly. He left his church and for the past ten years had been a member of the Christian Science Church. Mayor Rochester presided.

"Christian Science leads people from the wilderness of loneliness, doubt, disease, sickness and death," declared Rev. Andrew J. Graham, C. S. B., who lectured last night on Christian Science at the Empress Theatre. The radical difference between Christian Science and any other religion is that whereas the others raise hope in the eternal promises, Christian Science solves present problems and diseases are healed. There is healing and forgiveness here now.

The speaker said Christian Science was not a religion of belief, but a religion of knowing; God is omnipresent and always will be. All his attributes are everywhere all the time. He is just as much here as anywhere else. God is love, truth and health. The work of Christian Science is to waken people up and make them realize that God is here. Christian Science healing is action and correction of thought. It awakes a person to the presence of God and makes use of it. Any problem can be solved where God is.

### Delivers the Goods.

The speaker went on to say that many men and women accepted statements which could not be proved. That was opposed to the Christian Science doctrine. They never asked people to accept anything they could not prove. It was a religion of knowing. God was active and reliable all the time everywhere. He warned people against anyone who promised to do anything and did not deliver the goods. Christian Science delivered the goods. There was no cloud between God and man as the churches taught. Those churches gave a lot of promissory notes with not very good security, redeemable in the future. Three million Christian Scientists had learned that God was not very far away but was here now. God and good meant the same thing and there was no good which was detached from God. All the good in the universe comes from God. Whenever an unselfish act was performed by any man or woman there God was in action. Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy made God understandable. Jesus represented God 100 percent.

### Power of Healing.

Mr. Graham said it was generally acknowledged that up to the third or fourth century the church retained the power of healing as taught and demonstrated by Jesus. After that they turned their sick over to Matera Medica. In Christian Science, healing came when struggling to know God. God was almighty and sin, sickness and death had no power. A lot of people would rather die than be healed by Christian Science but the wall of disbelief was being broken down and healing was every day becoming easier. The practitioners were not perfect for Jesus was the only perfect practitioner, and the people who wanted to be healed had to do something for themselves.

There was no sickness that could not be healed. Sin, sickness and death were simply creations of the mortal mind.
