## JASPER TO COAST PEDESTRIAN REACHES GOAL

## TRADE RELATIONS OF BRITAIN AND CANADA ARE TO BE INVESTIGATED

### BUILDING OF WOODEN SHIPS WILL BE RESUMED VICTORIA YARDS BY THE GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, June 21.—The impasse in the wooden shipbuilding situation which has prevailed for six months and has seriously affected local yards in that time was broken yesterday by an announcement from Ottawa stating that the Dominion Government had decided to take over the shipyards and uncompleted ships of the Victoria Ship Owners Limited and complete their program of construction.

The news is received with a good deal of satisfaction in local marine circles and in the city generally. It will mean the resumption of work and the consequent employment of a large number of men for a time at least. The government will complete the ships now in hand but no announcement has been made as to further work at the yards.

### TERRIBLE MINE DISASTER TOOK PLACE AT HERNE

Twenty-two Known Dead—179 Miners Unaccounted for.

HERNE, June 21.—Twenty-two are dead and many injured as a result of the explosion of fire damp which destroyed a coal mine here yesterday. One hundred and seventy miners still remain unaccounted for.

### BODY OF TEDDY GERSTER FOUND

Japanese Fishermen on Skeena River Picked it up Last Night.

The body of Edward Alexander Gerster, the local youth who lost his life three weeks ago when he fell overboard from the launch Irish Belle near Porecher Island, was found floating on the fishing grounds at the mouth of the Skeena River last night by Japanese fishermen of Inverness Cannery.

### TWO MINISTERS LEAVE CANADA

Ballantyne and Guthrie Will Meet Meighen June 28.

OTTAWA, June 21.—Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister of labor, and Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, leave Quebec today for England and will remain two months. They will join Premier Meighen on June 28 and Hon. Mr. Guthrie will endeavor to settle transportation accounts between Canada and Great Britain. The business involves millions of dollars arising out of the transportation of troops during the war.

### APPOINTMENTS TO LIQUOR STORE MADE

P. I. Palmer Has Already Named Four of His Staff.

### OLD TIMER OF PROVINCE DEAD

"Sandy" McRae, of Revelstoke, Dies of Heart Disease While Hunting.

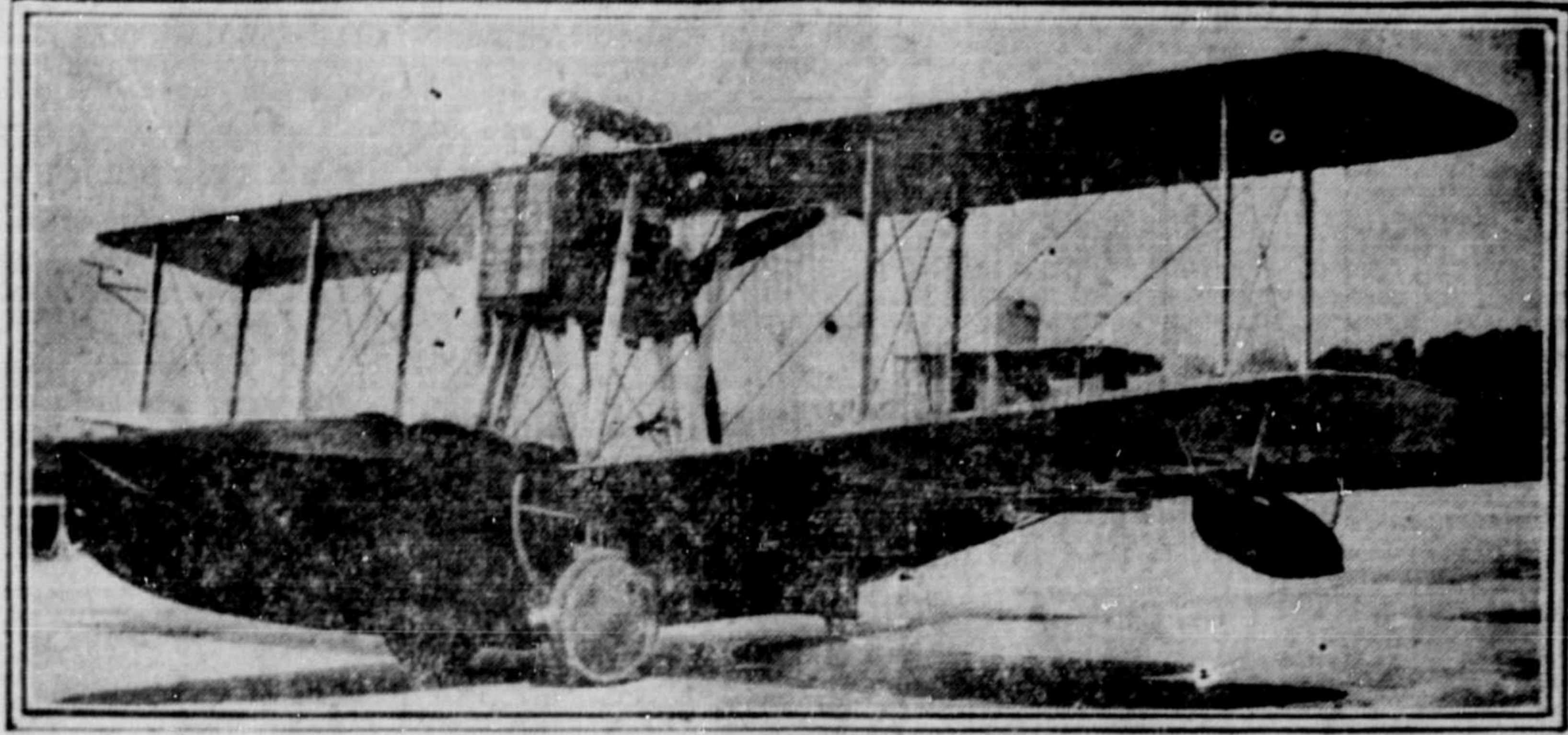
REVELSTOKE, June 21.—Alexander "Sandy" McRae, died of heart disease while hunting with a party of friends for bear just outside the city limits. Deceased was one of this town's oldest residents and had lived here for thirty-five years. He was well known throughout the Kootenay and in the province generally. He was active in politics and was a Liberal of the old school. He was 57 years of age.

### CITY WANTS MORE SOLDIERS' LOANS

Decided Last Night to Ask for Another Allotment of \$100,000.

The city council last night, on motion of Ald. Kelly, seconded by Ald. McNeill, decided to ask for \$100,000 of the Soldiers' Housing loan which, it is understood, will be shortly forthcoming from the Dominion Government. The city has already asked for \$25,000 but requests for loans are coming in so fast that the soldier-alderman felt that the city was justified in asking for a larger allotment. This loan would cover the cost of erecting 30 or 40 more houses in the city.

### BUSY SALMON SEASON IS ON

Sockeye Fishing in Northern Waters Commenced Yesterday.

Sockeye fishing in Northern British Columbia waters opened yesterday, the area affected including the west coast of Vancouver Island north of parallel 48.30 and the Gulf of Georgia north of 49.30. This includes the mouths of the Skeena and Naas Rivers and Rivers Inlet and all other sections of the coast with the exception of No. 1 district embracing the Fraser River, Burrard Inlet, Howe Sound and waters of the International boundary line and certain portions of District No. 3, contiguous to Vancouver Island, where the ban will not be raised until July 1.

### LONGED FOR SEA.

Last January he became tired of life on the prairies and longed for a sight of the sea once again and a chance to follow his calling as a sailor and fisherman. Leaving Jasper, a distance of 700 miles from here with an outfit consisting of a sack of salt, a package of matches and two one pound plugs of tobacco, he started on foot for the coast. Even when he had all but accomplished his object and reached the sea coast he did not know it, for when close to the bridge at Zenardi Rapids yesterday he turned round again and was found by the police searchers heading inland.

### Overland Journey by Foot Has Ending in City Police Station

The hurried trip of Sergeant Bailey and Constable Logan from the city yesterday afternoon, upon receiving a tip that a man closely resembling the escaped prisoner Michaelson, had been sighted in the wilds somewhere in the vicinity of Somerville Cannery proved not entirely barren of results. A person was discovered who assuredly did resemble the man they sought, but was not him.

### MAY PRESENT PEACE OFFER

Rumored This is Intention of the Sinn Fein on Visit of the King Tomorrow.

LONDON, June 21.—It is rumored that the Sinn Feiners of Ireland intend to present King George with a peace offer when he visits Belfast tomorrow to open the Ulster parliament. The offer will be made personally.

### SECOND SESSION OF BIG CONFERENCE

LONDON, June 21.—The Premier of Britain's overseas Dominions held their second session this morning. Edwin Montague, secretary for India, and General Jan Smuts, premier of the Union of South Africa, had prepared statements for today's meeting.

### Chairman British Producers' Organization to Visit This City in Course Tour Canada

LONDON, June 21.—Ben H. Morgan, chairman of the council of the British Empire Producers' Organization, sails tomorrow on the Empress of Britain for Canada and in the course of his visit to the most of the Canadian cities, where export possibilities may be worked up, expects to visit Prince Rupert.

### UNEMPLOYED IN GERMANY FIGHT IN THOUSANDS

Broke up Union Meeting and Wage Street Battle in Demand for Work.

BERLIN, June 21.—A mob consisting of thousands of unemployed workmen broke up a meeting of a labor union assembly here last night demanding that employment be given to the thousands of workers who are now unemployed here.

### STEAMER QUEEN IS IN DISTRESS

Picked up Hopelessly Adrift by Power Schooner and Being Towed to Golden Gate.

VICTORIA, June 21.—The Pacific Steamship Company's steamer Queen is reported disabled off the Oregon coast because of engine trouble. She has been taken in tow by the power schooner Johanna Smith and is being towed into San Francisco. Before being picked up the vessel was hopelessly adrift.

### MANY FAILED TO REGISTER

In Vancouver 15,500 voters Lose Franchise—Victoria, 400.

VANCOUVER, June 21.—Announcements made of the business of the Courts of Revision on the provincial voters' list which closed yesterday show that 15,500 voters in Greater Vancouver and 400 in Victoria failed to apply for reinstatement and will lose their franchise for the next provincial election.

### HECATE STRAITS FISH BOAT HAD FIGHT WITH FIRE BUT IS NOW SAFE

**Importance of  
 Dominions' Conference.**

The Imperial Conference of Prime Ministers of the British  
 Dominions which commenced yesterday in London will be one of  
 the most important meetings, as far as the British Empire is  
 concerned, that has taken place since the Great War. Many  
 problems of vital interest to the Empire will be discussed and  
 the results of the conference will reflect in the future policies of  
 the Imperial government as well as those of the autonomous  
 dominions. At the gathering the viewpoints of the various out-  
 posts of the Empire will be set out and a better common under-  
 standing between all will be formed. The conference has not  
 been called to consider constitutional changes but merely to deal  
 with questions that are facing each and all of the different parts  
 of the Empire in a common sense. Among questions will be the  
 matter of naval defence of the Empire, the Anglo-Japanese al-  
 liance and its relation to other friendly nations and other matters  
 of foreign policy.

**Greater Unity  
 Will be Result.**

It is not to be expected that Great Britain, Canada, Australia,  
 New Zealand and South Africa will see eye to eye in every ques-  
 tion. They will not and that is one reason why the conference  
 has been called. By personal representation and explanation  
 each will be able to better learn the others' attitude and view-  
 points on various intricate questions of common moment. The  
 vast differences in geographical position that exist between the  
 dominions will put very different lights on various questions.  
 Compromises will have to be made on some points and it is with  
 a view to making clear the necessity of these compromises that  
 the conference is in session. By means of co-operation and mu-  
 tual agreement it is likely that the bonds which tie these five great  
 sections of the Empire together will be more strongly welded and  
 they will all stand shoulder to shoulder with a common front  
 unanimous and agreed on questions that affect their common  
 relationship with foreign countries.

**British Empire and  
 Foreign Alliances.**

To remain united in peace as they were united in war is  
 the great object of the dominions at the present time. To attain  
 this the sense of sectionalism and autonomy must for the present  
 be submerged in the consideration of the relations of the Empire  
 with outsiders. While the hostility of none should be incurred  
 too great friendships, at the same time should be avoided. It is  
 not that Britain wants to stand aloof by doing this but it is for  
 the reason that too much favor to one foreign power might result  
 in the causing of ill-feeling with another. This point can be  
 readily illustrated in the case of the Anglo-Japanese alliance. It  
 is highly desirable that Britain remain friendly with Japan, but  
 this should not be done at the expense of misunderstanding to  
 the United States. After all Columbia, the daughter of Britannia,  
 should be closer to the maternal heart and, from present indica-  
 tions, all the statesmen who take part in this great conference  
 will keep that feeling in mind.

**Constitutional Changes  
 Not Needed Now.**

It has already been pointed out that the Conference of Pre-  
 miers was not called to consider matters of constitution in the  
 British Empire. This may come later—perhaps a year from now  
 and perhaps not even then and, in any case, it is not a question  
 of immediate import. The expression has been voiced at many  
 times and in many parts of the Empire that there should be an  
 Imperial council or some legal formula to hold the nation to-  
 gether. Those who give this matter prominence at the present  
 time forget that the Empire has existed for centuries without  
 these things. This is what Premier W. M. Hughes of Australia  
 says in regard to persons who now favor the redrafting of the  
 Empire's constitution: "In their desire to improve upon the  
 British Empire these persons display complete ignorance of the  
 geographical, ethnological and historical facts. If their advice  
 were to be followed the Empire would most assuredly tumble to  
 pieces. I think nothing is more certain than that the surest way  
 of destroying this mighty empire would be to tamper with its  
 constitution. The complete autonomy of its parts is the founda-  
 tion upon which its unity rests. The basic principle underlying  
 the relations between Britain and her overseas dominions is free-  
 dom of action."

**A. Greenwood, Experienced Dog  
 Fancier, Thinks There Should  
 Be One Here**

A. Greenwood, local manager of A. P. Slade & Co., the Vancouver wholesaler, who is an experienced dog fancier and breeder and who has a splendid kennel of prize winning dogs in Vancouver, is quite enthusiastic about the establishment of a Kennel Club in Prince Rupert. He wants to meet any other local fanciers who are interested in the forming of a club or putting on of a show and expresses his willingness to assist local people in trimming their animals and putting them in fit show condition.  
 "I was very interested in the remarks about dogs made by Bert Finch in the News the other day," said Mr. Greenwood to a News man last night. "He is quite correct in saying that there are many dogs in this city fit for show purposes.  
**Would Be Success.**  
 "If the dog fanciers of Prince Rupert would get together and form a Kennel Club, I am quite satisfied that we could put on a good local show for a start. Later a big championship show could be arranged and exhibit could be brought from such places as Vancouver, New Westminster, Victoria, Nanaimo, Calgary and Edmonton. Then Prince Rupert people could see a real show with specimens of all breeds.  
 "An exhibition of this description would be well patronized and could be made a semi-annual affair by running it so that it would fit in with the spring and fall circuits in the south.  
 "You would soon find that, instead of a lot of mongrels about the district, people would want to own pure bred specimens and try their luck at the shows. I will be glad to get in touch with anyone interested in the putting on of a show here."  
 In this connection, it has been suggested on various occasions that a Dog Show could be held in connection with the Fall Fair. This was done at the earlier exhibitions but on account of the lack of interest and the lack of worthy specimens, the class was deleted. There is a possibility that, if there are now enough dog fanciers with suitable animals in the city, that it could be revived. Immediate action might result in having a Dog Show even this fall.

### EGYPT MARKET LOCAL LUMBER

Wm. Turnbull, Provincial Lumber Commissioner, Going to Visit London and Egypt.

On a mission which will carry him to London, where he will study market conditions, and later to Egypt, where it is believed there is awaiting a market for British Columbia lumber, William Turnbull, formerly editor of the Daily News and now provincial lumber commissioner, will leave shortly for the Old Country. His trip will be part of the programme of lumber trade extension which the Forest Branch of the Provincial Department of Lands has been successfully prosecuting in an effort to open up new markets for the British Columbia products, a work to which Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, has been giving much attention.

Egypt, as a market for lumber, has already been brought to the attention of the lumber trade of this Province. As a result of a visit made to the province in February by Major R. E. Fischer, of Cairo, the Government was enabled to bring to the attention of the lumber exporters of the Province the opportunities of trade, and as a result some 8,000,000 feet of railway ties were sold for the use of the Egyptian railways. The lumber was shipped via the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, and delivery has already been made.

#### Market B. C. Lumber.

While in B. C. Major Fischer urged upon the Hon. Mr. Pattullo the possibilities of the Egyptian market, where great quantities of lumber will be required, and where, despite the competition from European countries he believed British Columbia could find a profitable market. Mr. Turnbull will fully study conditions there, and on his return report to the minister.

The one great need of the lumber trade of British Columbia, if it is to be placed upon a stabilized basis, Hon. Mr. Pattullo stated recently, is a sound export business. During the war this province's products could not be shipped owing to lack of shipping. Now, however, the position is reversed. Shipping is to be had for the asking and rates are very much reduced.

The question of whether British Columbia exporters can compete with other exporting countries and under what conditions will be the aim of Mr. Turnbull to ascertain and undoubtedly his report will prove of material aid to shippers in this province.

In London Mr. Turnbull will also study fully the market conditions there from the standpoint of British Columbia.

### PRITCHARD SPEAKS ON ORGANIZATION OF LABOR OF TODAY

W. A. Pritchard, the Winnipeg labor organizer, addressed about 300 persons in the McIntyre hall last night under the auspices of the Central Labor Council on "Labor Organization." W. E. Dickens was the chairman.

Mr. Pritchard's speech was based along lines in sympathy with the O.B.P. movement and his theories clearly supported the doctrines of that organization. The speaker traced the organization of labor and the development of industry, stating that the method of the former has fallen far behind the progress of the latter. The bulk of the labor movement of today was obsessed with ideas of previous conditions. The system of dividing labor into crafts under the present capitalistic regime was not suitable and called for a transformation of policy that would recognize the development of industry. Only by making the organization of labor fit the modern organization of industry could the workers hope to meet the capitalistic interests on equal terms.

### SENTENCED TO BE SHOT THREE TIMES

Alleged Representative of United States Hal Life of Suspense - Bolshevik Prison Camp.

WARSAW, June 21.—Three different times Captain Merion Cooper, of Jacksonville, Fla., while in a Bolshevik prisoner's camp in Russia for nine months, was notified that he was to be shot at sunrise. Then, for hours preceding the time set for the supposed execution, Cooper was grilled by Soviet authorities who pretended to believe that he was a representative of the American government. When the hour of execution came round no Bolshevik appeared but Cooper was never notified otherwise, being left in suspense day after day until he escaped.

### PULP COMPANY WANTS OFFER OF CITY MADE EFFECTIVE NEXT YEAR

A reply from the Prince Rupert Pulp and Paper Co., regarding the offer that was submitted to it by the city council some weeks ago for the supplying of power to the proposed mill was last night received at the regular weekly meeting. The company pointed out that plans, at the present time, were not far enough advanced to make immediate acceptance of the offer advisable. It was suggested in the letter that the offer be made effective on the expiry of the present agreement with the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. on March 31, 1922. The matter was referred to the Utilities committee for report.

 Otherwise Bright Chances.

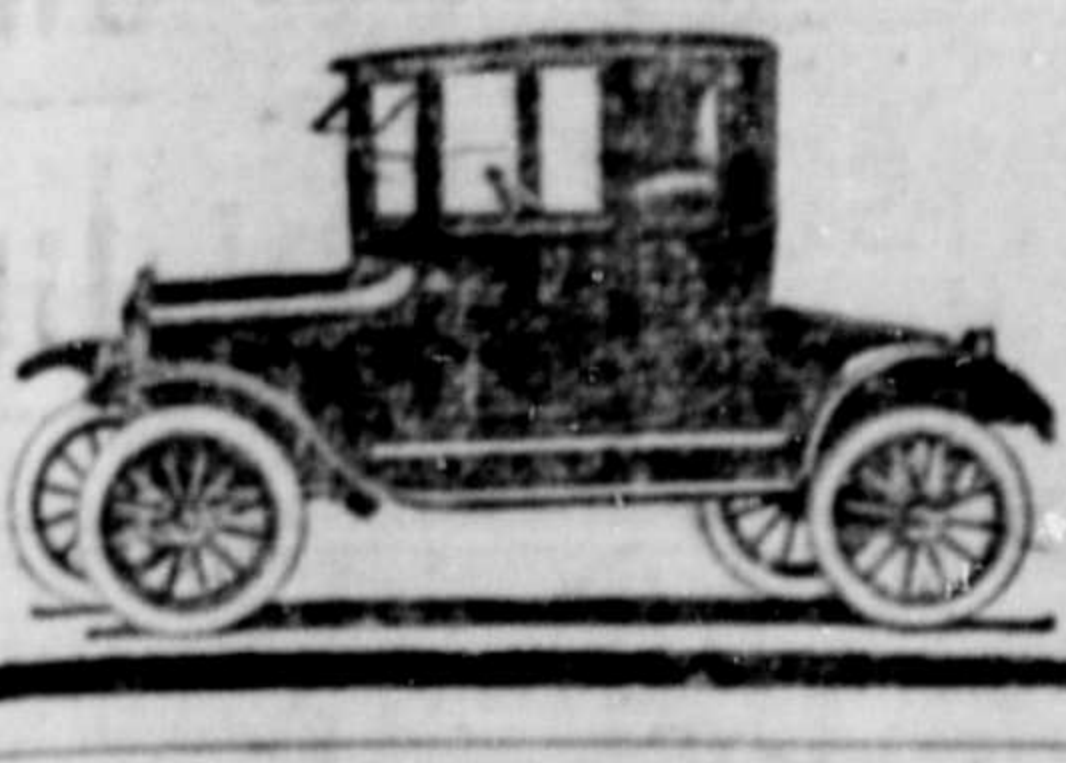

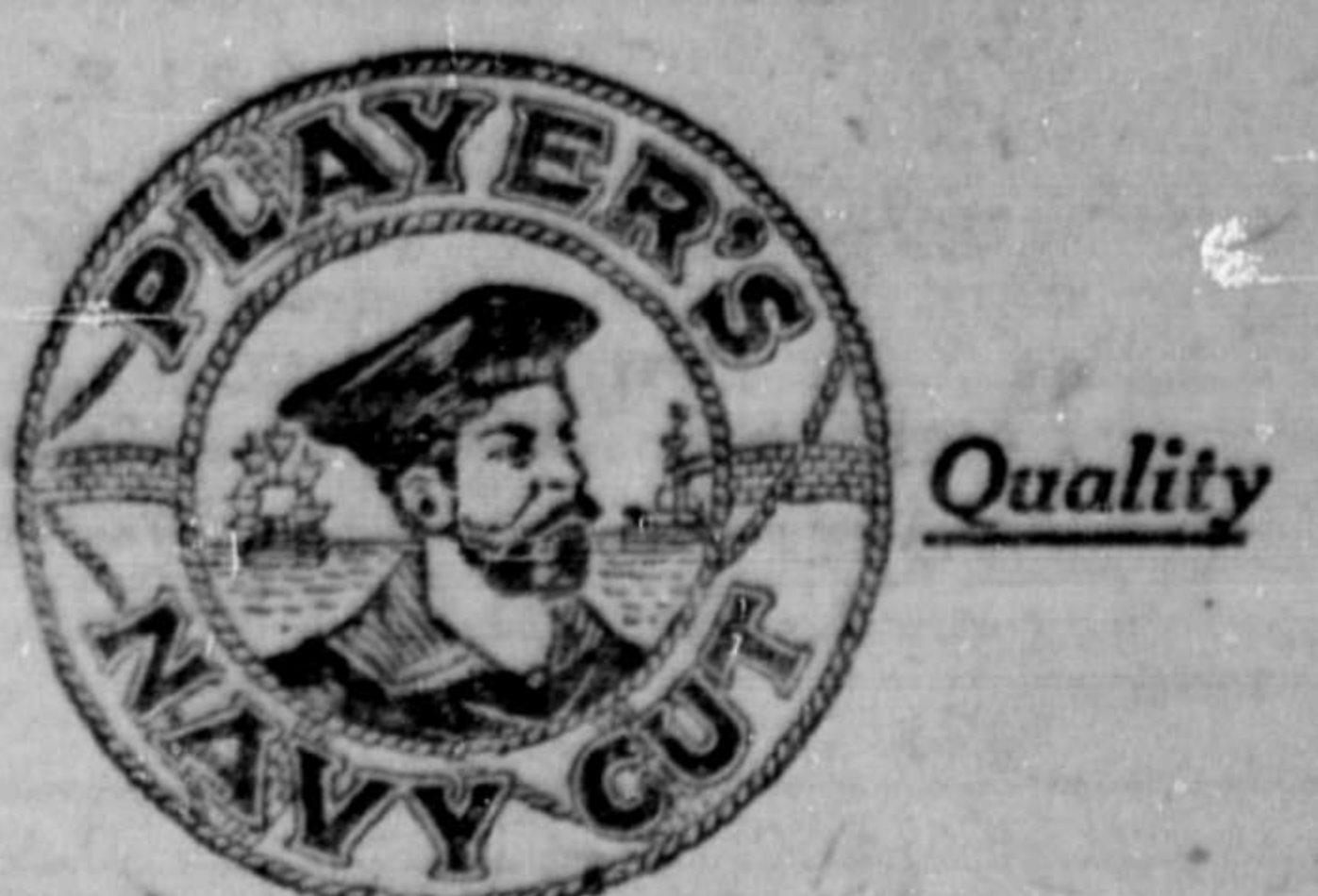

**Sport Chat**

**Boxing's greatest showman.**

That is the title which George Lewis ("Tex") Rickard, has earned in the staging of boxing bouts that have drawn the largest gate receipts in the history of the sport. Rickard was born in Kansas City, Mo., January 2, 1871 and at the age of 12 was thrown on his own resources with a widowed mother, two brothers and three sisters to support. He started cow punching and after travels from Texas to the Klondike he turned up in Goldfield, Nev., at the time of the mining craze and here his promoting career commenced. The miners wanted something more than their local activities so got busy and after several unsuccessful attempts was able to stage a big boxing match there between Joe Gans and Battling Nelson for a \$30,000 purse. Since that time he has promoted the greatest ring contests ever staged and with the fight between Carpentier and Dempsey on July 2 comes into the "million dollar" class. "Take a chance" and "Be Sure" are his mottoes and it is largely through these that he has had such great success.

George Carpentier, challenger of Jack Dempsey, is one of the most unusual boxers who ever competed for the world's championship. In temperament and intelligence, there has been none like him among aspirants for heavyweight honors. He will be outwitted by Dempsey when they clash. Other physical measurements may also appear to the disadvantage of the Frenchman but the essential item of courage will not be included in these shortcomings. A survey of the opponents Carpentier has met in the ring and sketches of several battles in which he revived from a count of nine to outpoint or knock out his rivals convinces one of his ring courage. The list of opponents Carpentier has met is more impressive than that of Jack Dempsey's rivals and Carpentier is by far the older in ring experience.

But the Frenchman has done most of his important fighting outside the ropes. The cockpit of an army combat plane has seen his most thrilling engagements and greatest demonstrations of courage. Comrades of Carpentier relate how they had watched him thousands of feet in the air attacking an enemy or swooping low over a Boche camp or airbase while German anti-aircraft guns tried to make a sieve of his plane. Often, they say, they mournfully uttered goodbyes to the youth, only to see him a few minutes later climbing out of the ship wearing the smile that spectators at New Jersey undoubtedly will see when he enters the ring to meet Dempsey.

### LONGEST DAY OF YEAR TODAY

Summer Solstice at 11:36 Tonight  
—Then Sun Starts Toward South.

TORONTO, Ont., June 21.—(By Canadian Press)—Popular by today, June 21, is the longest day of the year. Technically it is actually so, though only a margin of a few seconds. As a matter of fact the longest day sometimes falls on June 22. The almanac compilers thus describe it.

June 21, Sun enters the sign of Cancer (Summer Solstice) 23 h. 36 m.—or, in other words at 24 minutes to midnight.

It is all made perfectly clear by the following scientific explanation. Though there is but slight difference in the length of the interval between sunrise and sunset on the days about June 21, there is in general one of these days which is a few seconds longer than any other. This is the day on which the Summer Solstice falls, and at the end of a century is June 20 or 21, whilst at the beginning it is a day later and June 21 or 22 is the longest day. The reason for this difference in date may be briefly stated. Because the tropical year is not an integral number of days the solstice falls later in the calendar year by year by six hours nearly. It is not permitted to be late because the intercalation of the extra day in leap year brings it back on whole day. This whole day is too much, because the solstice is later yearly by not quite six hours, and hence, on the whole, it falls earlier in the calendar year as the century progresses, and the dates of the longest day at the beginning and end are as stated. In this year it happens that the solstice occurs 24 minutes before midnight of June 21, and the difference in length of the two days is scarcely appreciable.

This acceleration of the date during the century is corrected by the omission of the intercalary day in the centennial year, which puts the date a day later. But this does more than is necessary, and a further compensation is made by making the four centennial year a leap year.
